TWIN FALLS • With wildfire season quickly approaching, fire officials are preparing to fight flames with fewer resources and personnel.

Federal budget cuts have affected almost every agency, and firefighters haven't been spared.

The U.S. Bureau of Land Management's Twin Falls District Office is facing a 9 percent wildfire budget cut, said Chris Simonsen, BLM fire management officer. This has resulted in the elimination of 12 seasonal firefighter positions, he said. Engine crews have also been reduced from five to four.

"It's not going to keep us from fighting fire, but it's simple math," he said. "You can do more with five people than four."

The BLM will also face a change in the type of helicopter available for its air attack, said Kyli Gough, spokeswoman for the BLM.

Unlike last year, the BLM will rely on a Type III helicopter instead of a Type II, Gough said. A Type III helicopter allows for a three-person crew and carries about 140 gallons of water, Gough said.


Stocks Rise on Hopeful Signs for the US economy

NEW YORK (AP) • Encouraging news about the U.S. economy is extending the stock market's rally. U.S. stock indexes rose for the fourth week in a row

and are at record levels. A gauge of future economic activity rose more than analysts had expected, as did a measure of con-

sumer confidence. The Dow Jones industrial average rose 121 points to close at 15,354 Friday, an increase of 0.8 percent.

The Standard & Poor's 500 climbed 15.65 points, or 1 percent, to 1,666.12.

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One Domestic Violence Charge Against Twin Falls Deputy Dropped; Three Remain

TWIN FALLS • A judge dismissed one count of felony domestic battery against a Twin Falls County sheriff's deputy Friday after a preliminary hearing.

Prosecutors needed to prove they have enough evidence to take their case against Sgt. Michael Cooper to trial.

Twin Falls County 5th District Judge Roger Harris said the state had enough evidence in three alleged incidences of domestic violence in Twin Falls County, but not enough evidence in a count from Camas County. The Camas County case has been consolidated with the Twin Falls County case.

Cooper was charged with three counts of felony domestic battery in Twin Falls County and one count in Camas County in mid-April.

On Friday, the alleged victim in the case was the only witness to testify. She described several alleged instances of domestic abuse that are outlined in a police report.

During her testimony, the woman admitted that she previously withheld information from police, saying at first she wanted to protect Cooper, and later that she was scared that his actions would escalate once she got authorities involved.

"When I started to talk, it infuriated Michael," she said in court.

The woman described Cooper as controlling and intimidating, adding that he didn't like her to have friends, and that he'd interrogate her when she didn't return phone calls or text messages.

During her testimony, the woman said Cooper used his position as a sheriff's deputy to scare her out of reporting the alleged abuse.

The woman described one instance in July 2008, after a verbal argument, Cooper pulled her hand back, bending it in an unnatural way.

"It's a police move that's used to subdue a suspect," she said.

After that alleged incident, the woman said she did not immediately seek out medical attention because she knew doctors would ask her to explain the injury.

"I felt like I could continue to manage the situation," she said.

In another alleged incident, the woman said she dialed 911, then hung up, after an argument seemed to be escalating to violence. When 911 dispatchers called back, the woman said she told them everything was OK.

Deputies from the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office responded anyway, and spoke to Cooper and the woman, who'd gone to her parents' house, she said in court Friday.

At that time, the woman said, she chose not to tell deputies about the fight or previous alleged violent incidents.

Late in July 2010, the woman said she was interviewed by Twin Falls Police Department detectives. She testified that she also withheld information about the alleged domestic violence from them.

"I didn't know who to trust," she said.

The woman testified that Cooper instructed her to tell officers she injured herself accidentally. Being dishonest with police was a way to keep her family safe, she said.

During the final alleged incident, at a cabin in Fairfield, the woman said she and Cooper began fighting.

Under cross examination from Cooper's attorney, Keith Roark, the woman said both she and Cooper were drinking, but she said she had a clear memory of the evening up to a certain point. The woman said the two

began arguing, then Cooper began shoving her. The woman testified that she slapped Cooper and he became enraged. Then, she testified that the next thing she remembers is waking up on the couch with a "golf ball size to tennis ball size" goose egg on the back of her head.

The woman said she saw that the stove she had been standing near during the argument was damaged the next morning, and believes Cooper pushed her into the stove, causing her injury and causing her to black out.

At the end of the hearing, Harris said the state had enough evidence to take the three Twin Falls County charges to trial, but called a recess in court in order to study case law to decide on the Camas County charge.

When he returned to court, Harris said sometimes circumstantial evidence can be used, but in this case he felt that the state was asking him to make an assumption.

Harris said the woman's testimony that she couldn't remember how she got the head injury didn't meet the burden of proof for the preliminary hearing.

Should I Be Worried that My Heart Is Racing?

Over the past few weeks my heart feels like it is racing, and I feel weak all the time. Could it be atrial-fibrillation?

f you are experiencing irregular heartbeats and constantly feel weak, it is very important that you contact your healthcare provider. You could be suffering from a disorder known as atrial fibrillation. A-Fib is a very common disorder of cardiac rhythm. It is easy to diagnose with an electrocardiogram (an ultrasound of the heart). There will be a few cases where A-Fib comes and goes, but most cases have persistent

Fifty percent of those who are diagnosed with A-Fib also experience sleep apnea. Sleep apnea is a sleep disorder characterized by abnormal pauses in breathing or instances of abnormally low breathing, during sleep.

The main concern with A-Fib is the potential for stroke. The low pressure chambers of the heart, the atrium, quiver in A-Fib. In the left atrium, there is a place where the blood stagnates, increasing the

The goal in treatment of A-Fib is to alter the heart's electrical system with medications, cardioversion (an electric shock that can return the heart rhythm to normal) catheter ablations, or advanced surgical options. FILER • As music blasted Friday night during the Twin Falls Relay for Life, cancer survivors gathered behind members of the Honor Guard to get ready for their

first lap. As survivors headed in one direction, their caregivers went the opposite direction. After meeting in the middle of the track, they all walked together.

Cancer survivor Tim Taylor said he tries to make it to Relay for Life as often as possible and has been com-

ing for about seven years. He said he was cured of cancer, but now it's back in

his right lung. Taylor said Relay for Life is a good cause and people come together for the event.

"I like to see everyone participate as equals," he said, noting that bosses and employees participate right alongside each other.

The 22nd annual Twin Falls Relay for Life kicked off Friday night and continues today at the Twin Falls County Fairgrounds.

This year's goal is to raise \$230,000 for the American Cancer Society. Hundreds participated, and there were 73 teams.

Vendor booths stretched along the edge of the track.

Relay for Life kicked off with a reception for cancer survivors. Many wore purple shirts with a sentence on the back: "I AM HOPE."

Cancer survivor Wiley Dobbs – superintendent of the Twin Falls School District - was the honorary chairman for this year's relay.

He shared the story of his cancer diagnosis with dozens of other cancer survivors.

Nearly 20 years ago, Dobbs received a phone call as he was just about to go into a faculty meeting.

At the time, he was the principal of O'Leary Junior High School. He had a young son and another on the way.

Dobbs' doctor told him that he needed to come into the office. After Dobbs asked for the news over the phone, he found out an X-ray showed a "presence" in his chest.

His doctor wasn't ready to call it a tumor, but did say that if it was put all together, it was the size of a bowling bowl.

"I'm going to be honest. I thought at that moment I was dead," Dobbs told dozens of fellow cancer survivors.

Dobbs' opening remarks centered on the theme of good luck and bad luck. His diagnosis with Hodgkin's lymphoma, he said, was in a way good luck because there's a high survival rate.

"Keep focused on the good parts of your life," he said, and that will help with getting through the bad

Dobbs said there were a couple of things that helped him get through chemotherapy and radiation. One of them: He didn't want his sons call someone else dad throughout their lives.

OJ's Ex-lawyer Contradicts His Testimony on Guns

LAS VEGAS • O.J. Simpson's former lawyer defended himself point-bypoint Friday against allegations he botched the former football star's armed-robbery trial, after giving damaging testimony that Simpson actually knew his buddies had guns when they went to a hotel room together to reclaim some sports memorabilia.

Miami-based attorney Yale Galanter quickly found himself under withering cross-examination from a Simpson lawyer intent on proving that Galanter's word couldn't be trusted that he knew ahead of time of Simpson's plan and spent more effort covering up his involvement than representing Simpson.

The weeklong hearing concluded late Friday with Clark County District Judge Linda Marie Bell telling attorneys she will issue her decision in writing. She didn't specify a date.

Simpson was returned to prison custody. His attorneys, Patricia Palm and Ozzie Fumo, said they were optimistic that the judge would grant a new trial.

"I just think the evidence of his claims is overwhelming," Palm said.

Galanter took the stand

as the state's star witness in a hearing on Simpson's claim that he was so badly represented at trial and on appeal that his conviction should be thrown out.

He spent most of the day on the defensive, with Simpson lawyer Tom Pitaro grilling him with accusations and pointed questions.

"Mr. Simpson never told me he was going to go to the Palace (Station) hotel with a bunch of thugs, kidnap people and take property by force," Galanter said at one point. "To insinuate I, as his lawyer, would have blessed it is insane."

Galanter conceded at one point that Simpson's conviction was his responsibility. At another point, he conceded that he "misspoke" when he told the trial judge, Jackie Glass, that crucial audio recordings had been carefully analyzed by experts.

"Clearly I misspoke," Galanter said as Pitaro bored in. "I would never, ever ... I would just never intentionally mislead a judicial officer or a lawyer. I'm falling on that sword."

Galanter denied giving Simpson the go-ahead to retrieve the photos and footballs he believed had been stolen from him. He denied keeping Simpson in the dark about offers of plea deals that carried only a few years in prison. He said his client agreed all along with the decision not to put him on the stand to testify at his

Bozeman Woman Dies of Hantavirus

BOZEMAN, Mont. (AP) — State health officials say a 20vear-old Bozeman woman recently died of hantavirus while a Carbon County man in his 40s has been diagnosed with the disease.

Park County Coroner Al Jenkins tells the *Livingston* Enterprise that Rhea Lynn Baxter of Bozeman died May 11 of hantavirus pulmonary syndrome at Billings Clinic. Jenkins says it's not clear where Baxter was exposed to

Hantavirus can be contracted by breathing air containing the virus, which is present in the urine, droppings and saliva of infected rodents.

Early symptoms include fatigue, fever and muscle aches while the late symptoms include coughing and shortness of breath as the lungs fill with fluid.

Focusing on Phony Issues

The following editorial appeared in Friday's Washington

epublicans and conservative media obsessed with what they regard as the Obama administration's scandalous coverup of the nature of the attack on the U.S. mission in Benghazi, Libya, last Sept. 11 have offered a shifting series of allegations. First they charged that U.N. Ambassador Susan E. Rice "willfully or incompetently misled the American public" when she appeared on news programs Sept. 16 and described the attack as having emerged from a spontaneous demonstration against an anti-Muslim video.

When it was established that Ms. Rice was simply repeating talking points prepared by the intelligence community, Republicans claimed that the guidance must have been subjected to political doctoring by a White House determined to avoid describing the assault as a terrorist attack. This week Republicans claimed a smoking gun: emails leaked to the Weekly Standard and ABC, they alleged, showed that the talking points had been altered to remove references to al-Qaida and a Libyan jihadist militia as well as to CIA warnings before the attack about an extremist threat in Benghazi.

This is one of those Washington dust-ups where the actual facts don't seem to matter much to the scandal mongers. But for those not already infected with this particular Potomac fever, we'd like to point out a few of those facts.

First, it turns out that every version of the talking points, from the first draft by the CIA to the final one approved by a high-level interagency committee, contained the assessment that the Benghazi incidents "were spontaneously inspired by the protests at the U.S. embassy in Cairo and evolved into a direct assault." Those Cairo demonstrations were triggered by reports of the anti-Muslim video. It follows that Ms. Rice did not willfully mislead anyone, and that the 97 House Republicans who signed a letter charging that she did owe the ambassador an apology.

Second, the email record makes clear that the talking points were prepared not for Ms. Rice but for a Democratic House member who requested them so that he could know what he could tell the press. Ms. Rice's staff got wind of them and asked for a copy. What's more, an e-mail sent to then-CIA Director David Petraeus late in the process stated that "the White House cleared quickly" a draft that said "initial press reporting linked the attack" to a jihadist militia called Ansar al-Sharia, though the militia had denied involvement. That draft also referred to previous CIA warnings about "the threat of extremists linked to al Qaida in Benghazi and eastern Libya." So if there was a White House conspiracy to suppress the terrorist angle in Benghazi, it did not touch these talking points.

So why were those points eventually edited? The e-mail record shows that the State Department raised objections for several reasons. Spokeswoman Victoria Nuland pointed out that the CIA was proposing to have members of Congress put out information, such as the reporting about Ansar al-Sharia, that State had withheld on the grounds that it was unconfirmed and might prejudice an investigation. She also worried that the references to warnings "could be abused by Congressmen to beat the State Department for not paying attention." As all in the bureaucracy knew, State believed this would be unjust because the Benghazi mission was largely a CIA operation and was under the protection of a CIA security force, though that had not been publicly disclosed.

Ms. Nuland, a distinguished career Foreign Service officer who served during the George W. Bush administration as ambassador to NATO and as an aide to Vice President Dick Cheney, hardly fits the role of an Obama political enforcer. She was attempting to protect her department from what looked like bureaucratic buck-passing and herself from reporters who might ask why she had failed to deliver information being retailed by members of Congress. On the merits, she was right to suggest that it would be unwise for the U.S. government, before even beginning an investigation, to publicly pin blame for the attack on a group that had denied responsibility.

As we have previously written, there were serious errors by the State Department and other agencies leading up to the Benghazi debacle. An independent review board commissioned by the State Department identified some of them, such as the failure to properly fortify the Benghazi compound that was first attacked. More broadly, the Obama administration's zeal to avoid commitments in the Middle East caused it to underestimate Libya's need for security assistance following NATO's 2011 intervention and to fail to prepare for the possibility of a military emergency in North Africa.

By focusing on the phony issue of the talking points, Republicans are missing the opportunity to press for needed reforms at State and a more active U.S. policy in the Middle East. They should also be spurring a sluggish FBI investigation to determine who really organized and led the attacks in Benghazi; it has yet to be established whether they were ordered by local jihadists, terrorists linked to al-Qaida or someone else, and whether they were planned because of the Sept. 11 anniversary or inspired by the events in Cairo.

Instead, with their bigger-than-Watergate rhetoric, the GOP's scandal-pushers are making themselves look small-minded, hyperpartisan and foolish.

Vote 'Yes' on Jerome Wastewater Bond

s concerned businessmen and citizens of Jerome, we would invite the members of our community to vote yes in the upcoming Wastewater Bond election.

The reasons for passing this bond are many, including bringing new business to our area. In the last year, Jerome has lost the opportunity to add over 500 jobs to our present workforce, due to our inability to service its wastewater needs.

What is equally important in our view, is the current and future needs of our present

business and industry.
Without approval of this bond, there will be no expansion of capacity at our wastewater plant. This means that existing operations will be unable to grow. No growth means no new jobs.

Failure to pass this bond, will likely result in the City having to rely on judicial confirmation to comply with the demands of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). Best estimate of the amount required to bring the facility up to code is \$33.3 million dollars, which equates to approximately \$17

per month per household. This will only bring the plant up to code, but will not provide for the expansion needs of current business or provide service to new industry looking at our area. The additional \$15.3 million dollars included in the upcoming bond will provide that additional capacity. The cost per household for that expansion will be approximately \$7 per household, bringing the total monthly cost per residence to \$24 per month.

Scandals, Real and Imagined

was 12 years old during Sam Ervin's Watergate hearings, and watched them over the course of a long, hot summer, a time when I seemed to register the startling fact that my parents weren't infallible and grownups did not necessarily know more about the world than I did. Watergate was empowering in a sense: It told you that the authority figures were flawed, perhaps deeply so, that you should not blindly trust the powerful. Bad men do bad things, and lie about them, and it is our challenge to scrape away that deceit and find the truth beneath.

There is much talk this week of the "scandals" breaking in Washington, and we are offered three, a tidy triumvirate. The IRS. Benghazi. The government snooping on the Associated Press. Many of us who are old hands, who are tenured scandal-watchers, are for the moment somewhat unimpressed by the scale and potential reach of these scandals. At the moment, this isn't Watergate, or Iran-Contra, or Lewinsky. In my day a scandal would sear your eyeballs.

What makes a scandal not only momentarily compelling but historically significant is when it reaches the condition of automatic self-regeneration. It has to spark new elements contin-

uously. It must shock and appall and transfix on a regular basis, tumbling in time with the news cycle. Most of all, it has to have a cast of interesting characters, ideally at least one with a crewcut.

So far the IRS scandal seems to involve civil servants. A person I never heard of got sacked (and he was "interim"). At the core of the Benghazi story is a tragedy, but so much of the furor is about spin. There's talk of duplicitous tampering with "talking points." Do you think in the Nixon White House that G. Gordon Liddy was worried about talking points? Do you think E. Howard Hunt ever had "spin" on his mind?

There was a time when most of us didn't know who Liddy or Hunt were, or Haldeman, or Ehrlichman, or Mitchell, or any of the president's men. Bob Woodward and Carl Bernstein had pursued the story at *The Washington Post* when few others in town wanted to touch it, but by the summer of 1973 it was all anyone could talk about. The president's men came to life via the magic of tele-

vision, the hearings carried live through the summer, pre-empting the soaps. Hovering over the entire proceeding was the hypothesis that Nixon, and his men, were guilty of criminal conspiracies, with the Watergate break-in itself just one piece of a larger puzzle that involved an enemies list and dirty campaign tricks and slush funds and "black bag jobs" and general thuggishness.

Incredibly, the scandal had been secretly taped.

And one of the tapes had a gap! An 18 and a half minute gap! Which Nixon blamed on Rose Mary Woods, his secretary. Riiiiiiiiight.

The astonishing hypothesis of the Watergate scandal was that the Nixon White House had corruption in its DNA — that the abuse of power was a routine matter for the administration, and that the president's natural paranoia, his insecurity, his trickiness, had generated a malevolence and criminality that had spread to every root and twig of the organism.

The president had his defenders, of course, including one of my senators from Florida, Ed Gurney, who served on the Ervin committee. The ranking Republican, Howard Baker, seemed committed to the truth no matter where it led

him. Sam Ervin, the chairman, was a lovable, simple country lawyer, as he put it. The proceedings were, let it be noted, glacial. I have no idea if today such hearings would have the same effect. In the summer of 1973 we had to listen to a lot of testimony to get any sense of what really had happened. Most of the president's men denied everything.

That's where John Dean came in: the canary. He told the country that there was, indeed, a cancer on the presidency. This was high drama, and most of all, it was a daily event. Watergate became its own little industry. The wheels of impeachment began to turn. I don't need to recount for this audience how the whole thing played out (Nixon at the last minute proving it was a setup, and ending his second term with sky-high approval ratings, as noted by the tour guides at the huge memorial to him on the Mall).

We will see how these new scandals proceed, keeping in mind that the "Second Term Scandal" template is easily deployed by partisans and the news media. But for a scandal to avoid collapse into kerfuffledom, it has to keep delivering revelations day after day, for weeks and months. Also, some secret tapes would be nice.

Mormon Church **Arranged Meeting** Ahead of LGBT Vote

POCATELLO (AP) . Pocatello city officials met with an attorney for a Washington, D.C.-based conservative group brought in by the Mormon church a few weeks before councilors rejected an ordinance intended to protect gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender people from discrimination.

The Idaho State Journal reported Thursday that Jacki Pick of the American Religious Freedom Program on April 4 met with Pocatello Mayor Brian Blad and council members Jim Johnston, Steve Brown, Roger Bray, Eva Johnson-Nye and Craig Cooper. City attorneys also took part.

The meetings were held over five sessions and none included a quorum of the council, so no notes were taken.

A vote on the anti-discrimination ordinance planned later that day was delayed until April 18. At that meeting, the six city councilors split 3-3 with Johnson-Nye, Bray and Gary Moore voting for the ordinance. Those opposed were Steve Brown, Craig Cooper and Jim Johnston. The mayor cast the deciding vote to reject the ordinance 4-3. All four votes against the ordinance were from members of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

A new hearing on a revised version of the ordinance is set for June 6.

City records obtained by the newspaper from a Pocatello resident show Larry Fisher, regional public affairs director for the LDS Church, contacted Blad and told him the American Religious Freedom Program wanted to meet with city leaders to "provide information regarding non-discrimination guidelines."

On its website, American Religious Freedom Program describes itself, in part, as combating "those voices in the national conversation that are increasingly negative about religious freedom and the role of religion in public life."

Fisher, in an email to the newspaper on Wednesday, said "ARFP has expertise in this area, and the Church offered to the Mayor and City Council to put them in touch, and they accepted. Our desire is to be helpful in developing an ordinance that unites our community."

The rejected ordinance which mirrors protections passed in Sandpoint, Boise and Moscow in the past 15 months - would have criminalized discrimination in cases of housing, employment and use of public services.

Fisher, in another email to the paper, defended the decision to have Pick meet with city leaders: "The Church has spoken publicly in support of nondiscrimination ordinances, and also recognizes the need for balance and the importance of all voices being heard. We felt that ARFP had a valuable perspective to offer regarding balance in crafting nondiscrimination ordinances."

Blad didn't immediately return a call from The Associated Press on Thursday.

The Mormon church is among the religious organizations urging the U.S. Supreme Court to uphold a California provision approved by voters banning gay marriage.

Firefighters Battle Flames, Terrain North of Los Angeles

FRAZIER PARK, Calif. (AP)

 Firefighters had to battle terrain as much as flames as they worked to surround a wildfire burning for a third day in harsh hills and mountains north of Los Angeles.

dipped Temperatures Thursday and remained cool Friday, but winds exceeding 20 mph continued to swirl, and much of the blaze that has blackened more than 6 square miles was in rocky, rugged, difficult-to-reach places, making containment a challenge.

After a heavy aerial firefighting effort, the blaze was 35 percent contained Friday.

Meanwhile, 30 miles away, a second blaze broke out Friday afternoon in rural Castaic, briefly threatening an elementary school.

Although it quickly grew to consume 40 acres of light brush, firefighters attacking the flames from the ground and air steered it away from Northlake Hills Elementary School.

The campus was put on lockdown and buses were put on standby for a time in case hundreds of kindergarten through fifth-grade students needed to be evacuated.

After the flames were redirected, Los Angeles County sheriff's Sgt. Brian Allen said the students were released to their parents without incident.

Firefighters didn't immediately know how the blaze started.

The Frazier Park fire broke out near Interstate 5 on Wednesday when temperatures were in the 80s, and though they have since cooled, winds have continued to be a problem.

"It's definitely gusty, but we're lucky, the winds are blowing away from homes," Kern County Fire Department spokesman Corey Wilford said Friday. "It would be better if we didn't have winds at all though."

Lower temperatures were expected to persist into the weekend.

The fire has spread to

three counties - Los Angeles, Kern and Ventura – but burned in mostly unpopulated areas and threatened no homes or buildings.

A Kern County high school was closed as a precaution.

The fire started early Wednesday afternoon and initially burned thick brush, seasonal grasses and sage, but then moved into trees.

The cooler weather helped firefighters overnight clear brush and create breaks in hopes of slowing the blaze. Efforts Thursday were focused on the southern edge of the fire.

The cause of the fire was under investigation.

Pa. Coffee Run Leads to Hatchet Hitchhiker Arrest

ELIZABETH, N.J. • Two cups of coffee ended life on the run for an Internet sensation known as Kai the hatchet-wielding hitchhiker.

An employee at a Starbucks in Philadelphia is credited with recognizing 24-year-old Caleb "Kai" McGillvary, whose fledgling celebrity took a turn toward notoriety when authorities announced this week that he was wanted in the beating death of a New Jersey lawyer three times his age.

The unlikely pair met amid the neon lights of New York City's Times Square over the weekend and headed back to the squat brick home of 73-year-old Joseph Galfy Jr. on a quiet cul-desac in suburban Clark, N.J., authorities say. On Monday, Galfy was found beaten to death in his bedroom, wearing only his socks and underwear. McGillvary was arrested Thursday shortly after leaving the Starbucks and

charged with killing Galfy. McGillvary gained a measure of fame in February after intervening in an attack on a California utility worker. In an interview viewed millions of times online, he described using a hatchet he was carrying to repeatedly hit a man who had struck a worker with his car, fending off a further attack, and thus became known as "Kai the hatchetwielding hitchhiker."

Galfy's funeral was held Friday in a small stone chapel in Warren, N.J. He was buried in East Hanover.

Galfy was an "excellent land use attorney," said friend Robert Ellenport. He said Galfy loved to travel and

was a fan of the New York Giants and the Seton Hall University basketball team. Galfy would fly to warmer climes to watch Seton Hall play its first games of the season and was urging Ellenport and his partner to travel to Bali, one of Galfy's favorite vacation spots.

Galfy was a respected lawyer who in recent years handled land use and domestic violence cases, according to Union County Prosecutor Theodore Romankow, whose office is prosecuting McGillvary. The two knew each other through legal circles.

"He was just a nice man, a gentle man, well-regarded in the community," Romankow

In addition to his law practice, Galfy was the attorney for the planning board in Green Brook, N.J., and played drums in a wedding band.

Authorities said McGillvary was arrested Thursday evening after he walked into a Starbucks near a bus station in downtown Philadelphia and ordered two coffees. The woman who served McGillvary recognized him and alerted her manager, who called the police.

McGillvary took off before police arrived, Philadelphia Police Commissioner Charles Ramsey said, and without his coffee. But an officer went to a nearby bus terminal and found McGillvary, who was arrested there.

"He wasn't lying low," Romankow said. "He was out

Woman Gives First Interview since Big Mega Millions Win

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) • Holly Lahti won one of the biggest lottery jackpots in U.S. history, then seemed to disappear from the face of the Earth. She actually moved to the California

Lahti, 31, of Rathdrum, Idaho, gave her first interview this week since splitting a \$380 million Mega Millions jackpot in January

Coeur d'Alene Press reported Friday that Lahti received lots of real estate and business invitations after her good fortune. Letters from inmates and marriage proposals from strangers also followed after she claimed what was then the nation's second-largest lottery jackpot ever.

Shortly after she hit the jackpot, she decided to flee to a coastal community that she declined to reveal. Her focus, she says, has been trying to build a normal life for her two daughters, ages 14 and 12.

"What I thought would happen is that I'd leave for a couple weeks and come home," said Lahti, who worked as a bank teller in Post Falls before she won the lottery. "I couldn't see myself moving back. Reporters were showing up to my home and trying to dig up anything and everything they could. I felt my privacy was invaded."

Lahti is telling her story

amid the frenzy over a \$550 million Powerball jackpot in Saturday's drawing.

Lahti's rollercoaster ride was even more complicated because she was separated, yet still married to Josh Lahti when she hit the jackpot. The two are now divorced after 10 years of marriage, and Holly Lahti declined to say how or if the lottery funds were divided.

"The divorce is sealed and I am not allowed to discuss the outcome," she said. "He and I are on good terms. We've grown a lot together since this happened."

She said her ex-husband has visited her home and their children, and she sees him when she returns to Idaho.

"I love his family," she said. "I don't have a bad thing to say about him, despite the reports."

After taxes and splitting the jackpot with co-winner Jim McCullar of Ephrata, Wash., Holly Lahti collected \$80 million as a one-time cash option.

She said she had a relationship with another man after the divorce, but it didn't last.

Her daughters are now enrolled in private schools in California.

"I'm so excited to be able to get them this education and open doorways for them that they wouldn't have otherwise," she said.

$5\,SW\,Idaho\,People\,Indicted$ in Synthetic Marijuana Case

BOISE (AP) • Federal authorities have arrested five Boise-area residents as part of an investigation into money laundering and trafficking synthetic marijuana products known as "spice."

The arrests came after a federal grand jury in Boise issued an indictment against all five defendants on Tuesday. The indictment alleges conspiracy to distribute a controlled substance analogue, conspiracy to smuggle goods into the country, selling drug paraphernalia and money laundering.

Federal officials say the scheme occurred between March 2011 and July 2012 in Idaho as well as Alaska, California, Washington and Wisconsin.

Those arrested include: Mark Ciccarello, 35, of Meridian; Robert Eoff, 30, of Boise; Troy Palmer, 43, of Boise; William Mabry, 45, of Boise and Holly Ciccarello, 39, of Meridian.

State and federal investigators allege the group imported from China a series of chemicals that were then used to treat plant matter to make spice, a synthetic form of marijuana, a concoction now illegal in Idaho and many other states.

The group is accused of then selling and transporting drug paraphernalia and scheming to launder monev gathered from illegal

"This investigation has taken out a major player in the synthetic drug industry who was operating coast to coast," said Matthew Barnes, a special agent in charge for the Drug Enforcement Agency. "This emerging industry poses a significant threat to our communities and regardless of how they are marketed, we will continue with our law enforcement partners to aggressively pursue them."

All five defendants have already appeared and been formally charged in U.S. District Court in Boise.

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
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


Pinnock had a lead through two laps, but Nesbitt, like Parsons, showed a different gear, getting a 100meter lead before coasting to the end.

MIDDLETON • For some athletes competing at the Class 3A state track and field championships, it just wasn't their day.

Most athletes strive to achieve their personal records (PR) at state, the culmination of a year of dedication and hard work. But as Friday's events unfolded at Middleton High School, that wasn't the ongoing theme.

Gooding senior Tia Conrad, who entered the meet with the highest shot put mark in 3A, was more than a half foot short of her personal best. Her toss of 40 feet placed her as runner up.

A similar fate fell upon Buhl's David Murdoch, who finished fifth in the triple jump and sixth in the long jump.

"I wish I would have finished higher, obviously, but I got injured and this is only my second week back, so it's not too bad of a jump, I guess," said Murdoch, who won the state triple jump title his sophomore year.

Gooding senior Kevin Arkoosh's high jump mark of 5 feet, 8 inches placed him in a five-way tie for third place in a competition where several athletes settled below expectations. Arkoosh said his best jump in practice is 6-0.





MIDDLETON • Camas County's Issac Simon finished runner-up in the high jump at the Class 1A state track and field championships Friday at Middleton High School.

Just a sophomore, Simon could potentially own the event before he graduates in two years. But his main focus isn't a state championship.

"I'm hoping to beat my dad," Simon said.

"My goal is to win as many golds as I can," Berndt said. "I will stay focused and perform the best I can."

Carey senior Jaide Parke also stepped to the top of the podium after winning the 3200-meter run. She raced out in front on the first lap, but was overtaken by Carly Hansen of Butte County. Parke stayed on Hansen's shoulder and then kicked it in on the last curve and breezed down the final straightaway for the victory in 11 minutes, 52.77 sec-

"My coaches and I have been working on speed the last couple laps. I felt pretty good, and Carly is a great runner so I just knew I had to stay right on her heels," Parke said. "I'm so excited. It's something I've worked for for a long time. I'm really grateful to be there and it was a fun race."

Hansen junior Kaleb Gunnell won the discus throw, tossing 147 feet, 5 inches. Stephanie Moore, a senior from Camas County, placed second in long jump with a mark of 16-7.25

Mingling Business with Religion

Valley Christian Church hosts first ever Chick-fil-A Leadercast event in Twin Falls.

TWIN FALLS • It was probably the first time local business leaders found themselves in church on a

On May 10, almost 200 participants attended the 14th annual Chick-fil-A Leadercast, a live event broadcasted from Atlanta to hundreds of sites throughout the nation, including, for the first time, Twin Falls. This year's theme was "Simple Lead." Last year the conference attracted more than

100,000 leaders from 14 countries. The one-day leadership conference was held at Valley Christian Church. The point of the conference was to challenge, inspire, encourage and improve leadership skills by offering an array of speakers sharing advice on how to sim-

Jeremy Fort, pastor at Valley Christian Church, said the church decided to host the event as a nontraditional form of supporting the community.

"Rarely do you see a chance to rise up and reach out to the business community," Fort said. "I don't think churches see themselves in a position to do that.... There's no reason not to work together. I hope that we opened the

While the religious ethics or stance of some companies is unknown, Chick-fil-A's is no secret.

Chick-fil-A, which opened in Twin Falls in January, was founded on Christian principles. According to an August 2012 article in The Economist, "a plaque at Chick-fil-A's headquarters in Atlanta says the company's mission is to "glorify

God," which it does by serving chicken burgers and closing its 1,600 outlets on Sundays. The founder, Truett Cathy, once said that while "you don't have to be a Christian to work at Chick-fil-A... we ask you to base your business on biblical principles because they

brings about more collaboration between the church and business communities.

"Yeah, we might be a church, but we don't want to stay in those traditional elements," Fort said. "We have to find different ways to connect with people in our community. Our ultimate goal is to introduce people to our church, but not one time was anyone asked to attend."

Valley Christian Church, he also works as a full-time employee for a technologies company based in West Virginia. He said bivocational pastors are becoming increasingly common, as pastors find themselves having to work part-time or even full-time jobs in a secular profession to support their families. Before moving to Twin Falls, Fort spent many years working as a business consultant in Phoenix,

than twice as many people signed up. Fort said some people had to be turned away because they were at the church's capacity.

"It was the first time I attended, and I thought it was awesome," said Bill Ystueta, owner and operator of

Chick-fil-A in Twin Falls. Next year Ystueta said they will be looking for a bigger venue. Though held in a church this time, Ystueta said the event had nothing to do with religion but was meant to be a positive influence on the

community. And while many of Leadercast's speakers had Christian ties, it was not the subject of their presentation. One speaker, Andy Stanley, founded North Point Ministries, which has five churches in metro-Atlanta and more than 30 strategic partner churches worldwide, didn't talk about religion or faith but instead focused on his knowledge as a leadership author and communicator.

Fort said Valley Christian Church decided to take down crosses and pictures of Jesus so not to offend someone who was non-Christian.

"Not everyone will agree with that, even within the church there were some people who didn't agree with that," Fort said.

However, Fort said the fact it was inside a church was enough to deter some.

Wife of LDS President Monson Dies

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • The wife of the Mormon church's president shied away from the spotlight,

but her lifelong work behind the scenes left a lasting impression on those who knew her. Frances B. Monson, 85,

died early Friday at a hospital in Salt Lake City surrounded by her family, The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints said. Her daughter, Ann Dibb, said her mom was a supportive wife, a proud mother and one heck of a fixer-upper around the house.

"My mother was just a woman who went about doing good without needing attention or fanfare," Dibb said. "She just recognized what needed to be done and did it."

Church President Thomas S. Monson said his wife was the family's beacon of love, compas-

sion and encouragement. Publicly, very little was known about her, despite being the matriarch of one the church's most important families. She made occasional appearances at the church's biannual general confer-

ences but opted not to give any speeches of her own, said Matthew Bowman, assistant professor of religion at Hampden-Sydney College in Virginia. Her husband has been church president since February 2008.

"She was fairly quiet," said

Bowman, who wrote a book about the Mormon church in 2012. "She didn't want to be viewed as figurehead or public figure."

The cause of death was not immediately disclosed. The church said she had been hospitalized for several weeks. Funeral arrange-

ments were pending. Utah Gov. Gary Herbert and Sen. Orrin Hatch, both Mormons, expressed their condolences. Both called her a remarkable woman, with Hatch saying in a statement that she "had a quiet strength you could feel in her presence."

Frances Monson grew up in Salt Lake City during the Great Depression. She was the youngest of five children and her parents' only daughter. She was named after her father, Franz E. Johnson.



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Exiting IRS Chief Denies Targeting as Republicans Pounce

WASHINGTON • Steven Miller, who is being forced out as acting commissioner of the Internal Revenue Service, told House lawmakers Friday that the IRS has learned from its mistakes while denying that it had targeted nonprofit groups for review because of their political views.

Under persistent questioning from House Republicans at the first hearing on the agency's scrutiny of small-government groups that applied for tax-exempt status, Miller insisted that IRS employees didn't have partisan motivations.

"What happened here is that foolish mistakes were made by people trying to be more efficient," Miller said at a House Ways and Means Committee hearing that lasted almost four hours.

Lawmakers peppered Miller with questions, demanding that he explain why he didn't inform Congress once he learned in May 2012 about what had happened. Republicans expressed frustration with Miller's answers, at times interrupting him.

"You're arguing today that the IRS is not corrupt, Rep. Peter Roskam, R-Ill., said to Miller. "But the subtext of that is you're saying, we're just incompetent. And I think it's a perilous pathway to go down."

Miller, while maintaining that the agency didn't target the groups for attention, acknowledged errors in how the IRS handled the applications.

"I can say generally, we provided horrible customer service here," he said. "I will admit that, we did horrible customer service."

Questioning grew more critical as the hearing progressed.

"This is offensive to hear this testimony," Rep. Tom Reed, R-N.Y., told Miller.

Four congressional committees are investigating the IRS in a scandal that has erupted over the past week and more hearings will be held next week. Miller is losing his job. The Justice Department has started a criminal probe that could ensnare senior officials for lying to Congress and lower-level workers for other potential offenses.

Lawmakers said they wanted investigations to continue and were unsatisfied with the answers from Miller. The Senate Finance Committee will hold a hearing May 21. The House Oversight and Government Reform Committee will follow on May 22.

"I am more concerned today than I was before," said Rep. Mike Kelly, R-Pa. "This is absolutely an overreach, and this is an outrage."

BOMBS TARGETING SUNNIS KILL AT LEAST 76 IN IRAQ

BAGHDAD (AP) • Bombs ripped through Sunni areas in Baghdad and surrounding areas Friday, killing at least 76 people in the deadliest day in Iraq in more than eight months. The major spike in sectarian bloodshed heightened fears the country could again be veering toward civil

The attacks followed two days of bombings targeting Shiites, including bus stops and outdoor markets, with a total of 130 people killed since Wednesday.

Scenes of bodies sprawled across a street outside a mosque and mourners killed during a funeral procession were reminiscent of some of the worst days of retaliatory warfare between the Islamic sects that peaked in 2006-2007 as U.S. forces battled extremists on both sides.

Tensions have been intensifying since Sunnis began protesting what they say is mistreatment at the hands of the Shiite-led government, including random detentions and neglect. The protests,

which began in December, have largely been peaceful, but the number of attacks rose sharply after a deadly security crackdown on a Sunni protest camp in northern Iraq on

April 23. Majority Shiites control the levers of power in post-Saddam Hussein Iraq. Wishing to rebuild the nation rather than revert to open warfare, they have largely restrained their militias in the past five years or so as Sunni extremist groups such as al-Qaida have frequently targeted them with large-scale attacks.

Nobody claimed responsibility for Friday's attacks, but the fact they occurred in mainly Sunni areas raised suspicion that Shiite militants were involved. The bombs also were largely planted in the areas, as opposed to the car bombings and suicide attacks that al-Qaida in Iraq and other Sunni insurgents are known

Talal al-Zobaie, a Sunni lawmaker, called on politicians across the religious and ethnic spectrum to put aside their differences and focus on protecting the nation.

"The terrorist attacks on Sunni areas today and on Shiite areas in the past two days are an indication that some groups and regional countries are working hard to reignite the sectarian war in Iraq," he said. "The government should admit that it has failed to secure the country and the people, and all security commanders should be replaced by efficient people who can really confront terrorism.

Cancer, Rape Fraud Case Bowls over Mich. Community


LEXINGTON, Mich. (AP) • Carol Connell remembers well the gift she gave Sara Ylen, a friend seemingly forced to bear too much misery. Ylen, a Michigan mother of two young boys, said she was battling cancer just a few years after a man was convicted of her rape.

"It was a little box, a very ornate box, to hold a prayer. She needed God to look over her," Connell said, recalling the 2008 lunch when she gave Ylen the jewelry. "Sara was visibly touched."

Connell now can't help but wonder whether Ylen was showing gratitude or simply perpetuating years of jaw-dropping deceit. Ylen's community, which had come to admire her as the subject of a newspaper's award-

winning 2003 series about surviving a rape, rallied when her cancer diagnosis became public. Churches sold Super Bowl sub sandwiches and auction items to raise money. Friends cut her grass, bathed her at her modest home and provided hot meals. An insurance company paid nearly \$100,000 for hospice care.

Now the 38-year-old is charged with fraud, false pretenses and using a computer to commit a crime after state police found no doctor who diagnosed cancer. The charges come as those who regularly helped Ylen reel from the news that the man who spent nearly 10 years in prison for her rape was released last year, after newly discovered evidence cast doubt on whether she'd ever been attacked.


BRUNSWICK, Maine (AP) • The automatic budget cuts that grounded the Navy Blue Angels and Air Force Thunderbirds are taking a toll on performers, air show announcers, concessionaires, vendors and others who depend on air shows and the millions

of spectators. All told, the International Council of Air Shows says 64 air shows that depended on military participation have canceled this season.

Those included Wings over Wayne at Seymour Johnson Air Force Base in North Carolina and Skyfest 2013 at Fairchild Air Force Base in Washington state this weekend.

The council says air shows draw nearly three times more spectators than NASCAR events and pump about \$1.5 billion into the economy.

Aerobatic pilot Sean Tucker describes the air shows as "the Indianapolis 500, the Fourth of July, and 'Top Gun' rolled into one."

Argentine Dictator Videla Dies in Prison at Age 87

BUENOS AIRES (AP) • Former dictator Jorge Rafael Videla, who took power over Argentina in a 1976 coup and led a military junta that killed thousands of his fellow citizens in a dirty war to eliminate so-called "subversives," died quietly in his sleep Friday while serving life in prison for crimes against humanity. He was 87.

Videla ran one of the bloodiest military governments during South America's era of dictatorships, and later sought to take full responsibility for kidnappings, tortures, deaths and disappearances when he was tried again and again for these crimes in recent years. He said he knew about everything that happened under his rule because "I was above everyone."

Videla had a low profile before the March 24, 1976, coup, but quickly became the architect of a repressive system that killed about 9,000 people, according to an official accounting after democracy returned to Argentina in 1983. Human rights activists believe the real number was as high as 30,000.

This "dirty war" introduced two frightening terms to the global lexicon of terror: "disappeareds" — people kidnapped and never seen nor heard from again — and "death flights," in which political prisoners were thrown, drugged but alive, from navy planes into the sea.

"The disappeareds aren't there, they don't exist," Videla told a news conference defensively in 1977.

Videla's dictatorship also stood out for its policy of holding pregnant prisoners until they gave birth, and then killing the women while arranging for illegal adoptions of their babies, usually by military or police families. This happened hundreds of times, and the Grandmothers of the Plaza de Mayo rights group has relentlessly sought to reunite these children, now in their 30s, with their biological families. Videla was sentenced to a 50-year-term for the thefts of these babies last year after some of the more than 100 people who have recovered their true identities to date testified against him.

Adolfo Perez Esquivel, who spent 28 months in prison during the dictatorship and won the Nobel Peace Prize for his work documenting Videla's crimes, said his death is no cause for celebration, and urged Argentina's justice system to keep investigating the dirty war era. "The death of Videla should not bring joy to anyone. We need to keep





working for a better society, more just, more humane, so that all this horror doesn't ever happen, never again," Esquivel said in an interview with Radio Once Diez.

The regime's brutal processes soon spread internationally as the junta joined Operation Condor, an effort launched by Chile's dictator, Gen. Augusto Pinochet to make sure the countries of South American's southern cone provided no refuge to each other's enemies. The leaders of Paraguay, Bolivia, Brazil, and Uruguay also joined this pact.

Videla retired in 1981 and handed leadership to a succession of other generals. By then the junta was weakened, pressured by persistent inflation, a sluggish economy and an explosion in Argentina's debt load after nationalizing the red ink of private corporations. The dictators then launched an ill-advised war against Britain for the Falk-

land Islands, which Argentina claims as the Malvinas and considers part of its territory. Argentina's defeat hastened the return of democracy on Dec. 12, 1983.

President Carlos Menem, pardoned the junta leaders in 1990, and Videla remained free until 1998, when a judge charged him in the baby thefts. He spent a month in prison before asserting the right Argentines over 70 have to house arrest pending trial.

In 2003, during the presidency of Nestor Kirchner, the Supreme Court nullified the amnesty laws. In 2010, Videla was condemned to life in prison for torturing and killing 31 political dissidents, and was ordered to serve the time in common prison. The baby thefts conviction was added in 2012.

Videla ultimately spent only five years behind bars after courts ended his house arrest in 2008. He died while standing trial for Operation Con-

dor's kidnappings and killings. Videla's hated economy minister, Martinez de Hoz, also died, in March, while being tried for crimes against humanity. Argentina's justice system has moved slowly, but activists are proud that such dictatorship figures have been tried by civilian courts as part of a democratic process.

"History will evaluate the genocide and shame of the civic-military regime Videla headed, and of which he never repented," said the Grandmothers' president, Estela de Carlotto. She predicted that Videla "won't go to heaven" because "despite what man says on Earth, he up above says something else."

Today's deal comes from the Cavendish Teams of a decade or so ago, and it features the use of suit preference on defense.

It is bad enough to stay low and miss a cold game, but when your opponents beat you in the safe partscore you have reached, it hurts even more. After Peter Weichsel's natural but limited opening of two clubs, Paul Chemla did not have enough to overcall in diamonds, and when Christian Mari reopened with two hearts rather than a double, Chemla decided not to explore for three notrump, but to take the safe positive ... not so fast!

Weichsel led the club ace, an incisive shot, then carefully played the club seven for Alan Sontag to ruff. Sontag now found the fine move of underleading the diamond ace. (Weichsel's middle club clearly indicated that he had no preference between the pointed suits; hence, he was likely to have the king of both suits.) Weichsel won his king, then gave Sontag a ruff with a high club. At this point, Sontag led the spade two to ensure one down, setting up the defense's spade trick before declarer could establish the diamonds for discards.

At the other table, West's opening bid of one club let North overcall one diamond and South could show hearts, then raise his partner's call of one no-trump to game. Declarer found the club jack and had no problem in making nine tricks.

ANSWER: Your soft 10-count might have been better suited to a one-no-trump call on the previous round. However, once you bid two diamonds — which is forcing but does not guarantee a second call and can't tempt partner to a second call — what game can your side possibly make? Your partner must have a minimum hand with at least two spades, and without a diamond fit; pass two spades and hope to beat it.

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

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
