Remembered

Woman pays tribute to husband.

JEROME • As her 17-month-old twin daughters grow up, Jordan Brown talks with them about Memorial Day.

“I’ve started teaching them the meaning of today,” she said.
It’s just the second Memorial Day since their father — Army Sgt. Dan Brown — was killed while serving in Afghanistan.

On Friday, Jordan Brown smiled as she talked about her daughters and how proud she is of them. She said they’re

so smart and one looks just like her dad.

Today on Memorial Day, she plans to take them to visit their father’s gravesite.

Jordan Brown said she hopes people will remember what Memorial Day is truly about. Since her husband’s death, the day is even more significant for them.

“Now that I have one soldier, it’s so important now,” Jordan Brown said.
Dan Brown, 27, of Jerome was killed March 24, 2012 as a result of injuries from an improvised explosive device in Afghanistan’s Kandahar province.

“I miss him more than the day I found out,” Jordan Brown said.

Thoughts from
a Soldier’s Mother

Anna Workman shared her thoughts about Memorial Day and her son, Army Sgt. Chris Workman, 33, Rupert. Workman was killed in a helicopter crash on April 19, 2012 while serving in Afghanistan.

It is very difficult to talk about my son, even at this point, one year later. We love our son and miss him very much. Perhaps because it was so sudden, as casualties of war are, or perhaps we just did not realize how dangerous his situation was, we were shocked at his death.

I don’t know that there is very much that can prepare a pilot for disorienting dust storms in the dark of a moonless night. He never spoke about his missions or where he was exactly or what the crews were up to. We had many friends whose sons and daughters had been deployed and they had returned to their families. No one ever expects the weather to kill someone in a war zone. I would imagine though, that history shows that the weather is a huge factor during tactical operations of the military. Nevertheless, since we were a non-military family, we were hoping for the best during his deployment and his safe return to us. We hoped that he would have returned and continued his life inconspicuously. We hoped that he would have completed his officer’s training and continued to bigger and better things. We longed for the day that he would have transferred back to the mainland from Hawaii so that he and his family would have been closer to the rest of our family.

As a young man, we insisted that Chris go to college and earn a degree. As parents we felt that it was important

Chilly April Temperatures Frustrate Sugar Beet Growers

BOISE (AP) • An early-season of frosty nights across southern Idaho has the region’s sugar beet producers thinking about replanting their crops.

The *Capital Ag Press* reports that a string of mid-April temperatures below freezing forced growers from Mountain Home to Minidoka County to replant thousands of acres of sugar beets.

Fewer replants occurred in western Idaho, where temperatures were warmer in April.

The freeze and subsequent replant cycle has damped prospects for a crop projected to rival last year’s record 35.5-ton-per-acre average yield.

Still, growers who planted again say warmer May temperatures have brightened the outlook.

Fire Officials Blame Snake Cage Heat Lamp for Fire

BOISE (AP) • Boise fire officials say an apartment fire that displaced four families was ignited by a heat lamp in a snake cage.

Boise Fire Battalion Chief John Peugh tells KTVB-TV that the fire started about 7:15 p.m. Saturday in the closet of an apartment and moved into

the attic. Firefighters say the heat lamp ignited items in the closet and the fire spread.

Fire officials say the snake didn’t survive, but that no other pets or people were injured.

An estimate for the amount of damage wasn’t available.

N. Idaho Group Reaches Consensus on Forest

LEWISTON (AP) • An advisory collaboration of environmentalists, lumber companies, the Nez Perce Tribe and local and state officials has reached an agreement intended to restore wildlife habitat and protect pristine areas while also allowing economic activities such as logging in the Clearwater Basin in northern Idaho.

The *Lewiston Tribune* reports that the Clearwater Basin Collaborative announced the agreement on Wednesday.

“We believe this balanced package is the blueprint for breaking the gridlock that has paralyzed land management actions in the past,” said Alex Irby of Orofino, a co-chairman of the group.

The agreement proposes new wilderness and wild and scenic river designations, an

increase in timber harvest from areas with roads, and economic development and financial support for timber-dependent counties.

Republican U.S. Sen. Mike Crapo of Idaho has agreed to push legislation stemming from ideas generated by the collaborative. New wilderness areas would need congressional approval.

However, parts of the agreement could be accomplished administratively by the U.S. Forest Service, such as increased timber harvest.

Group members also agreed to continue working with the Forest Service on future logging and restoration plans, looking for areas where they believe logging is appropriate.

The diverse nature of the group means environmentalists support some logging while some county commis-

sioners who dislike restrictions on public lands support new wilderness areas.

“We have decided we need one another to get what we want and we decided since

we are going to be in the same boat, we just as well all row in the same direction,” said Don Ebert, chairman of the Clearwater County Commission.

Searchers Find Body of Teen Missing in Texas Flooding

SCHERTZ, Texas (AP) • Search teams on Sunday found the body of teenager who was swept away by floodwaters as he tried to swim across a swollen creek near San Antonio, authorities said.

Avron Adams, 18, of Schertz, and a friend got caught Saturday in the swift waters of Cibolo Creek after about half a dozen friends swam across. One friend held onto a tree branch and got out, but Adams did not, officials said.

David Harris, a spokesman for Schertz, said about 5:45 p.m. searchers located Adams' body near the water's edge. Harris said Adams' family has been notified.

"The body was found near where the search and rescue dogs had identified a scent," Harris said.

Earlier Sunday, Adams' father said he was holding out hope.

"We're hopeful, but at this point, you just don't know," his father, Kenneth Adams, told The Associated Press as his wife stood nearby. "It's very hard. We're just keeping the faith."

The search effort included helicopters, divers and rescue teams in inflatable boats.

The usually dry creek in Schertz, northeast of San Antonio, had dropped about 10 feet since Saturday. Other rivers in the San Antonio area and surrounding counties continued to drop after peaking above the flood stage, but flood warnings remained in effect Sunday. The National Weather Service issued a flash flood watch for seven counties until 6 p.m. Sunday, saying thunderstorms could produce heavy rainfall.

Two women died Saturday after being swept away by floodwaters, some as high as 10 feet on some roads. One who was trapped in her car climbed to the roof be-

fore being swept away, and her body was found against a fence, said San Antonio Fire Department spokesman Christian Bove. Emergency officials also recovered the body of a woman in her 60s, whose car was carried away by water as firefighters were trying to rescue her. Author-

ities did not immediately identify the women who died.

On Sunday, about 20 people were at a shelter set up by the American Red Cross, including some whose apartment complex roof caved in under the weight of the heavy rainfall.

Obama: Gov't with Oklahoma 'Every Step' of the Way

MOORE, Okla. • President Barack Obama visited tornado-devastated Moore, Okla., Sunday, consoling people staggered by the loss of life and property and promising that the government will be behind them “every step of the way.”

“I’m just a messenger here,” the president said, saying “folks are behind you” across America. He offered moral and monetary support in the wake of the monstrous EF5 tornado that killed 24 people, including 10 children,

last Monday afternoon.

Standing with Gov. Mary Fallin and other state and federal officials, Obama noted a substantial rebuilding job ahead and said that “our hearts go out to you.”

“This is a strong community with strong character. There’s no doubt they will bounce back,” he said. “But they need help.”

The White House said the Federal Emergency Management Agency has already provided \$57 million in rebates and incentives to help build about 12,000 storm shelters in Oklahoma. “These storm shelters can be the dif-

ference between life and death,” presidential spokesman Josh Earnest told reporters accompanying Obama to Oklahoma on Air Force One.

For Obama, Sunday’s visit had an all-too-familiar ring.

Only five months into his second term, he has traveled to the northeast to console people in the wake of the Boston Marathon bombing, and visited Connecticut and Arizona to comfort people traumatized by shooting rampages. He also has undertaken his consoler-in-chief role at the site of plant explosions and mine disasters, not

to mention a series of natural disasters including Joplin, Mo., and the Jersey Shore, which was heavily damaged by Superstorm Sandy last year.

Once on the ground, Obama urged the American people to make contributions, saying the damage was “pretty hard to comprehend.”

Shortly after his arrival on a partly cloudy day, Obama rode past grassy fields strewn with scattered debris, witnessing devastation so awesome that it appeared as if garbage had literally rained from the sky. His first stop was the demolished site of the

Plaza Towers Elementary School, where seven students were killed when the tornado turned the one-story building into a heap of bricks, broken concrete and twisted metal.

“I know this is tough,” he told superintendent Susie Pierce as he gripped her hand. As he walked, the demolished school was on his left and on his right, homes as far as the eye could see were reduced to piles of rubble. Vehicles were turned upside down and toys like a pink doll carriage and children’s books were strewn with furniture and ripped out wall insulation. Every tree

had been stripped of its leaves and bark.

Obama at one point joined the Lewis family, which lost their home behind the school. He said the important thing was that they survived and could replace their things.

“What a mess,” he told their son Zack, a third grader at the shattered school. Zack’s father, Scott, ran into the school just before the storm hit and ran with his terrified son back to their home’s storm shelter.

“You’ve got some story to tell,” Obama told the boy. “This is something you’ll remember all your life.”

10 Fans Injured When TV Cable Falls on Race Track

CONCORD, N.C. • Charlotte Motor Speedway said 10 fans were injured Sunday at the Coca-Cola 600 and three of them were taken to the hospital after a nylon rope supporting a Fox Sports overhead television camera fell from the grandstands and landed on the track surface.

According to CMS spokeswoman Danielle Frye the three people taken to the hospital had “minor injuries that are not life threatening.” She said seven people were treated with “minor cuts and scrapes” on site and released.

Fox Sports released a statement Sunday night saying it hasn’t determined the cause of the accident and it is suspending use of the camera system indefinitely.

“Our immediate concern is with the injured fans,” Fox said in the statement.

Fox said the camera system consists of three ropes — a drive rope that moves the camera back and forth, and two guide ropes on either side. Fox said it was the drive rope that failed near the first-turn connection and fell to the track.

“The camera itself did not come down because guide ropes acted as designed,” Fox said in the statement. “A full investigation is planned, and use of the camera is suspended indefinitely.”

Fox said it has used the camera system at the Daytona 500, at last week’s NASCAR Sprint All-Star race and other major sporting events.

“We certainly regret that the system failure affected tonight’s event, we apologize to the racers whose cars were damaged, and our immediate concern is for the race fans,” Fox said in the statement. “We also offer a sincere thank you to the staff at CMS for attending to the injuries and keeping us informed on this developing situation.”

Rockets in Lebanon Capital Signal Syrian Spillover

BEIRUT • Two rockets hit Hezbollah strongholds in Beirut on Sunday, tearing through an apartment and peppering cars with shrapnel, a day after the Lebanese group’s leader pledged to lift President Bashar Assad to victory in Syria’s civil war.

The strikes illustrated the potential backlash against Hezbollah at home for linking its fate to the survival of the Assad regime. It’s a gambit that also threatens to pull fragile Lebanon deeper into Syria’s bloody conflict.

Despite such risks, Hezbollah chief Hassan Nasrallah made it clear there is no turning back. In a televised speech Saturday, he said Hezbollah will keep fighting alongside Assad’s forces until victory, regardless of the costs.

For Hezbollah, it may well be an existential battle. If Assad falls, Hezbollah’s supply line of Iranian weapons through Syrian territory would dry up and it could become increasingly isolated in the region.

At the same time, Hezbollah, a Shiite Muslim group, is raising the sectarian

stakes in Lebanon by declaring war on Syria’s rebels, most of them Sunni Muslims.

Lebanon and Syria share the same uneasy mix of Sunnis, Shiites, Christians and Alawites, or followers of an offshoot of Shiite Islam. In trying to defeat the rebels, Assad relies on support from minority Shiites, Christians and his fellow Alawites.

On Beirut’s beach promenade, opinions about Hezbollah’s new strategy seemed to fall along religious lines.

Mahmoud Masoud, a Sunni, said he fears Lebanon will become more unstable. “I don’t want to see everything I’ve worked for and my country fall apart of because of a certain group’s interests,” he said of Hezbollah.

Tamam Alameh, a Shiite, sided with Hezbollah. “The Syrians helped Lebanon a lot. We should help them and rid them of the conflict in their country,” he said.

The rockets struck early Sunday in south Beirut, an unusual type of attack. In occasional sectarian flare-ups since the end of Lebanon’s 15-year civil war in 1990, rival groups have mostly fought in the streets.

Temporary Bridges Planned for Fallen I-5 in Washington State

SEATTLE • Federal investigators used 3D laser scans Sunday to study what remained of a collapsed Washington state bridge as Gov. Jay Inslee announced temporary spans will be installed across the Skagit River within weeks — if plans go well.

Sunday’s announcement comes a day after the chairwoman of the National Transportation Safety Board called last week’s Interstate 5 bridge collapse a wake-up call to the state of safety of the nation’s infrastructure and the Saturday destruction of a highway overpass in Missouri that was struck by a cargo train.

Two New York Veterans of Edson’s Raiders Recall WWII Battles

GLENS FALLS, N.Y. • Gerald West held the laminated sheet of paper fellow World War II combat veteran Robert Addison pulled from an old briefcase and perused the 300-plus names listed under the words, “Lest We Forget.”

“I knew quite a few of those guys,” said West, 93, who made the short drive to Addison’s home 45 miles north of Albany recently to reminisce about their wartime service with the legendary Edson’s Raiders, an elite Marine Corps unit that was the forerunner of today’s U.S. Special Forces.

The document Addison keeps among his wartime mementos and literature lists the names of members of the 1st Marine Raider Battalion who died while fighting the Japanese in the South Pacific. Addison and West are among the dwindling number of Edson’s Raiders still alive. Out of an original roster of about 900 men, fewer than 150 are believed to survive, according to Bruce Burlingham, historian for U.S. Marine Raider Association.

Dubbed Edson’s Raiders after their colorful, red-haired commander, Col. Merritt “Red Mike” Edson, the unit was the first U.S. ground force to attack Japan-held territory after Pearl Harbor. Landing on Tulagi in the Solomon Islands in August 1942, they beat the larger 1st Marine Division’s arrival on nearby Guadalcanal by an hour.

The 1st and 2nd Raider battalions, formed just days apart in February 1942, were the first commando-style units in the American military, predating the creation of the U.S. Army Rangers by four months. Trained in jungle warfare and hand-to-hand combat, the Raiders’ leatherneck pride paired with a pirate’s attitude was reflected in their distinctive battalion patch: a white death’s head skull in a red diamond, set against a blue background with five white stars representing the Southern Cross constellation.

Angelina Jolie’s Aunt Dies of Breast Cancer Days after Op-ed

ESCONDIDO, Calif. • Less than two weeks after Angelina Jolie revealed she’d had a double mastectomy to avoid breast cancer, her aunt died from the disease Sunday.

Debbie Martin died at age 61 at a hospital in Escondido, Calif., near San Diego, her husband, a hospitalist, told The AP. Debbie Martin was the younger sister of Jolie’s mother, Marcheline Bertrand, whose own death from ovarian cancer in 2007 inspired the surgery that Jolie described in a May 14 op-ed in the *New York Times*.

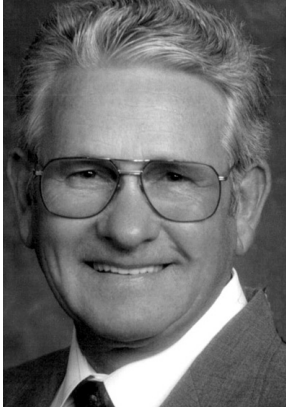

Called “Mr. Instant Point” by late Lakers broadcaster Chick Hearn, the 6-foot-1 Robinson averaged 9.9 points and 2.2 assists in 64 games in 1971-72, helping the Lakers win an NBA-record 33 consecutive games and the franchise’s first title in Los Angeles.

“We are very sad to hear

of the passing of Flynn Robinson,” said Jeanie Buss, the Lakers’ executive vice president of business operations. “Flynn played an important role on the 1971-72 Lakers team.”

Robinson had his best season in 1969-70 with Milwaukee, averaging 21.8 points and 5.5 rebounds in 81 games and appearing in his lone All-Star game.

In seven NBA seasons with Cincinnati, Chicago, Milwaukee, the Lakers and Baltimore, the former University of Wyoming star averaged 14.5 points and 3.1 assists.

He finished his career in the ABA with the San Diego Conquistadors in 1973-74.

World War II Vet Who Received the Medal of Honor Dies at 91

Vernon McGarity, an Army sergeant who received the Medal of Honor for what was described as his intrepid leadership of his frozen, outgunned squad during the Battle of the Bulge, the last significant German offensive of World War II, died Tuesday at a hospice in Memphis, Tenn. He was 91.

He had cancer, said his daughter-in-law, Lee McGarity.

Sgt. McGarity spoke rarely, if ever, about the events that began on the morning of Dec. 16, 1944. At the time, the Allies were pushing toward Germany as the Wehrmacht suffered setbacks on both the Eastern and Western fronts.

The Germans decided to launch a surprise attack in the Ardennes Forest in Belgium an epic offensive that became known as the Battle of the Bulge. The most complete account of McGarity’s actions there is the citation for his Medal of Honor, awarded to him by President Harry S. Truman after the end of the war in 1945.

McGarity was positioned near Krinkelt, Belgium, with the 99th Infantry Division. Before the battle started, he was wounded in an artillery assault. He refused medical evacuation and instead returned to his men in the field, according to the citation, where “the fury of the enemy’s great Western Front offensive swirled about the position.”

Despite intense hostile fire, and despite the frigid conditions of the Belgian winter, McGarity managed to rescue a wounded friend. It would be his first of at least two rescue efforts during the fight. As the night wore on, the citation reads, he “exhorted his comrades to repulse the enemy’s attempts at infiltration.”

The morning brought an even fiercer assault of German tanks and infantry, and McGarity used a rocket launcher to take out the lead tank. His squad drove back the infantry and three other German tanks. Still under heavy fire, McGarity rescued another wounded soldier and then took on an enemy light cannon.

“Now, could he take a breather?” reads a 1970 tribute to McGarity in Checkerboard, a publication of the 99th Infantry Division Association. “Not on your life his squad’s ammunition was running low.”

McGarity moved 100 yards toward the enemy to retrieve a hidden cache of ammunition. By that time, a German machine gun was trained on what would have been his way out. “Unhesitatingly,” the citation reads, “the gallant soldier took it upon himself to destroy this

menace single-handedly.” Armed with a rifle, he killed or wounded all the gunners.

McGarity and his men fought until they had depleted their last rounds.

“I was still holding,” the (Memphis) Commercial Appeal quoted him as saying years later, “and did hold until such time as we ran out of ammunition and it was necessary to surrender.”

McGarity was captured and spent much of the rest of the war in captivity, until the German surrender.

In all, the Battle of the Bulge resulted in as many as 81,000 American casualties and more than 100,000 casualties on the German side, according to the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington.

McGarity’s “extraordinary bravery and extreme devotion to duty,” reads the citation, “supported a remarkable delaying action which provided the time necessary for assembling reserves and forming a line against which the German striking power was shattered.”

Reflecting on the battle years later, McGarity told an interviewer, “The last words I heard were to hold at all costs.”

Vernon McGarity was born Dec. 1, 1921, in a small town near Savannah, Tenn. He worked with the Depression-era Civilian Conservation Corps before joining the Army at 21.

After the war, he served in the Tennessee National Guard for 28 years, achieving the rank of lieutenant colonel, according to his daughter-in-law. He worked in his home state for the Veterans Administration for 35 years, many of them at a Memphis hospital, where he helped veterans secure government benefits.

His wife of 52 years, Ethelene McGarity, died in 1998. Their daughter, Sharon McGarity, died in 1995. Survivors include a son, V. Ray McGarity of Bartlett, Tenn.

Besides the Medal of Honor, McGarity’s decorations included the Bronze Star Medal and the Purple Heart.

“Next time we feel like giving up, we’ll remember Vernon McGarity,” reads the Checkerboard tribute. “Next time we think we have an impossible job, with nothing but trouble and no hope of recognition, we’ll remember Vernon McGarity he proved that we can win by coming back for more.”

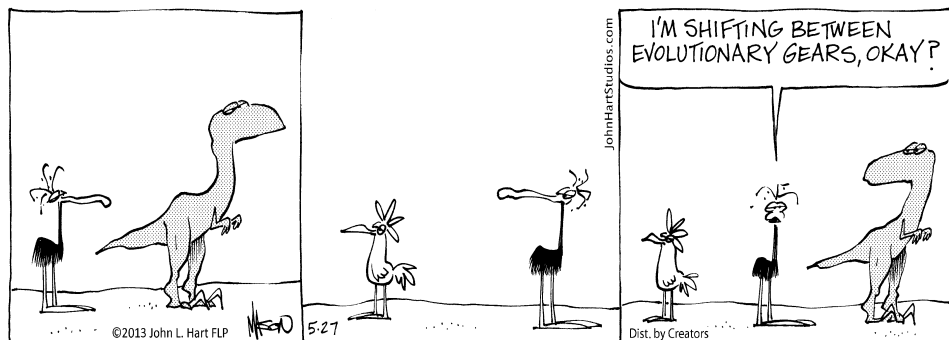

Rejecting Taxes for the Sake of Rejecting Taxes

Idaho voters hate taxes so much they re-elect, and re-re-elect, legislators who (mostly) reflexively slap down anything with a sniff of tax about it.



Here is what Idaho voters did on Tuesday: Approved, often by overwhelming margins, local tax increases or renewals. In the Vallivue School District (Canyon County) 75 percent voted in favor; in Lewiston’s school district 86 were in favor; in the Moscow School District, 70 percent. There were affirmative passing votes in the bulk of money-raising ballot issues around Idaho. They passed last week in Arbon, Cottonwood, Fremont County, Fruitland, Hagerman, Hansen, Kimberly, Mountain View, Nezperce, Orofino, Parma, Rockland, St. Maries, Salmon River, Troy and Whitepine. That’s a lot of tax approval going on for a state like Idaho.

There were rejections too, but considerably fewer of them, and often by narrow margins: Emmett, Homedale, Jefferson County, Kellogg, Plummer-Worley, Salmon. (There list of voting results here likely is incomplete, but it’s what was available shortly after the election.)

Conditions differ, of course; the needs in the various districts were scattered. But the pattern seems reasonably clear, especially when you consider the non-school tax measures. A new jail OK’d at Jerome. Library district levies passed in Burley and Richfield, a cemetery district levy in Hagerman.

Idaho voters are no wild spenders, but — faced with specific situations — they do seem willing to consider needs and raise money to deal with them. Their attitude seems at odds with that of many of their legislators.

The counter attitude shows up in the case of the vote at the Salmon School District.

The headline on the Web page about the Salmon School District’s proposed bond levy (the district’s page) seems ironic in the face of the actual election on Tuesday: “Information about the May 21, 2013 Bond Election ... And Why It Is Different than the Past Elections.” Those past elections are eight previous in the last decade or so, all rejecting proposed levies.

The district asked permission to levy about \$14.6 million for a new elementary school building and \$3.6 million for repairs to a middle school (75 years old) and elementary school (55 years old). The repairs do not sound frivolous. The district said that late last year “State building inspectors came to Salmon and inspected the Pioneer Elementary and Middle Schools and found that structurally they are at risk of imminent failure if we were to have a seismic event and/or heavy snowload. The result of their inspection is they accepted our application and determined that the remedy is to provide increased structural integrity at the two schools and replace portions of the roofs.” The foundations and walls were found to be crumbling, and could collapse if anything resembling a significant earthquake — like the one some years back centered near Challis, an hour away — happens again.

Actually, failure of the levy might not result in that since, the district said, “If neither option wins by a super majority (66.6 percent) your taxes will increase because the State will impose the Structural Fix to the community. This will be the \$3.6 million bond for a 5 year term.”

Whatever conclusions might be drawn from that, the Idaho Legislature may be drawing them as well.

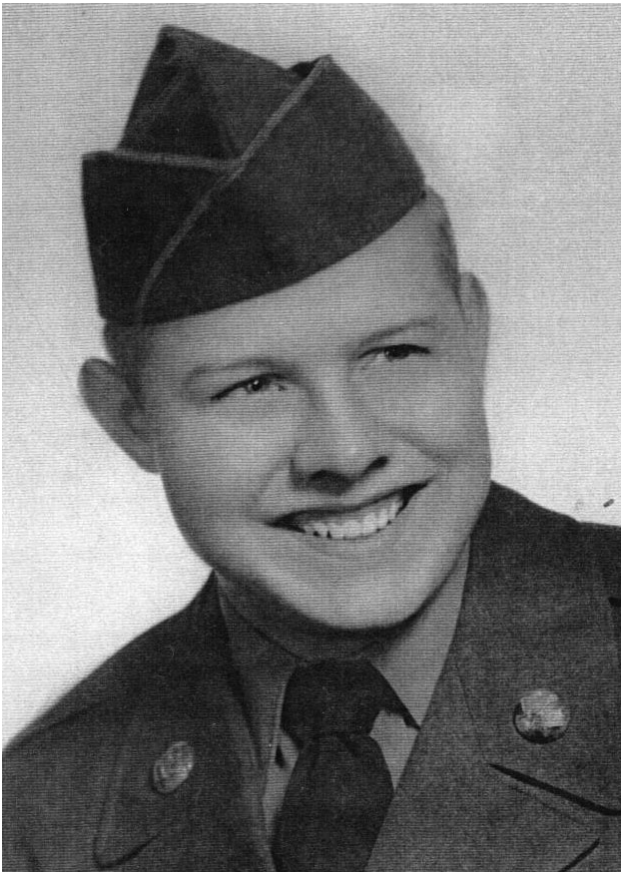

worked for what is now Clear Springs Trout Company until 1965.

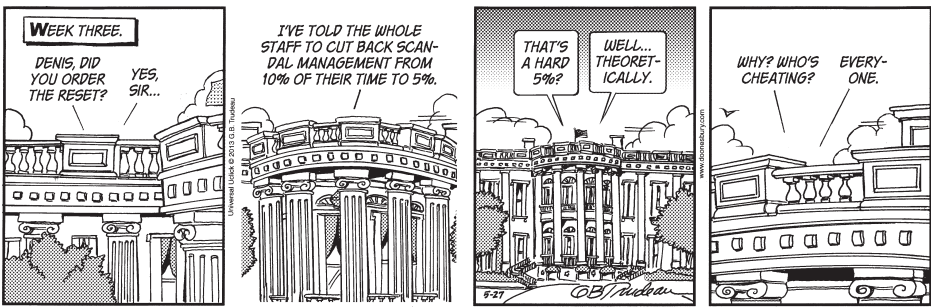

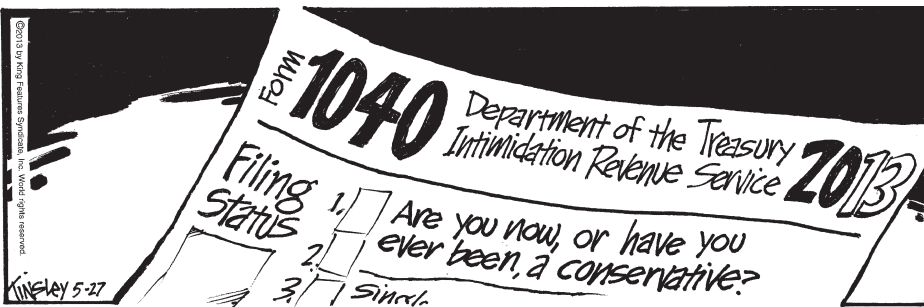

Missing Mom’s Diary Foreshadows Tragedy

‘If I die, it may not be an accident even if it looks like one,’ Susan Powell wrote.

SALT LAKE CITY • Susan Powell had been married about a year when she started writing a journal. She was a love-struck, 20-year-old newlywed, dreaming of the future she would build with her husband.

“I just feel incredibly lucky to have Josh,” she wrote in 2002.

Before long, however, she found herself torn. A growing sense of danger was telling her to grab her kids and flee, but her strong religious faith led her to believe she could save her young family. The journal entries turned grim.

“If I die, it may not be an accident even if it looks like one,” she wrote in 2008. “Take care of my boys.”

She went missing the following year and hasn’t been seen since. Her husband later killed their sons and himself. No one was ever charged in her disappearance, and the people at the center of the police investigation — her husband, his brother and their father — are all either dead or in prison.

As leads have gone cold, the chief agency in the investigation, the West Valley City Police Department, has closed the case saying for the first time they believe Josh Powell played a role in killing his wife and that his brother Michael Powell helped get rid of her body. Both men denied involvement in her disappearance before committing suicide about a year apart.

With the investigation over, police released thousands of pages of documents, providing new details about a scandal that made national headlines with each development.

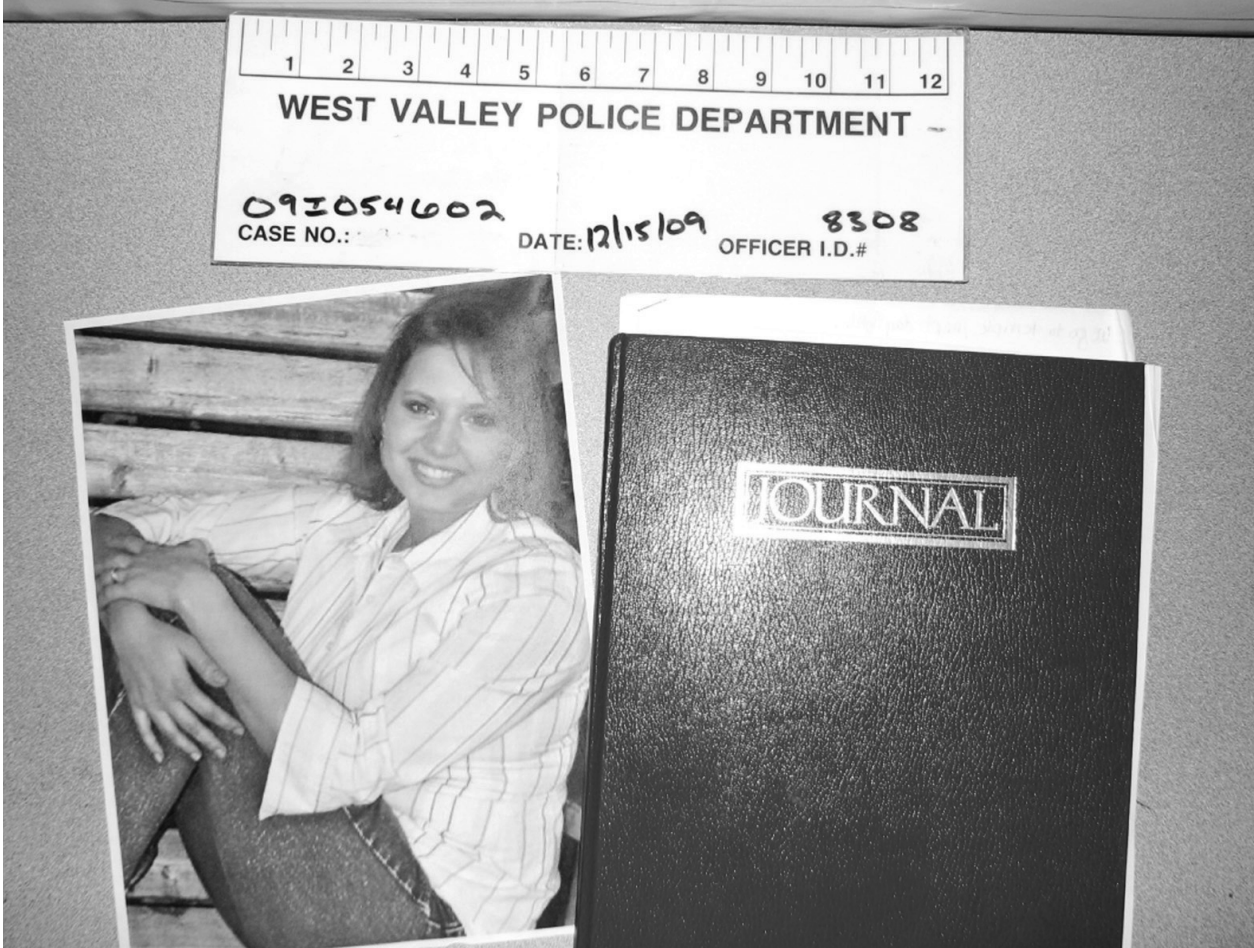
Susan Powell’s story first gained attention when she vanished from her suburban Salt Lake City home in the middle of the night in December 2009. The documents released May 20 show that police focused on her husband, doubting his alibi from the outset.

Josh Powell said his wife went missing shortly after he left to go camping in the high desert with their sons, who were 2 and 4 years old at the time, despite a snowstorm that blanketed the area.

The police investigation led to searches of abandoned mines in Utah and neighboring Nevada, and authorities kept their attention on Josh Powell even as he moved from West Valley City, Utah, to Puyallup, Wash., where he ultimately attacked his boys with a hatchet last year after saying he “had a big surprise” for them. He then set his home on fire, causing an explosion that killed them all as a social worker watched in horror.

It was the sum of the missing woman’s fears, and her journal entries show the downward spiral.

Susan Cox and Josh Powell married in spring 2001 at a Mormon temple in Portland, Ore., about four months after meeting at a Latter-day Saints singles dance. They



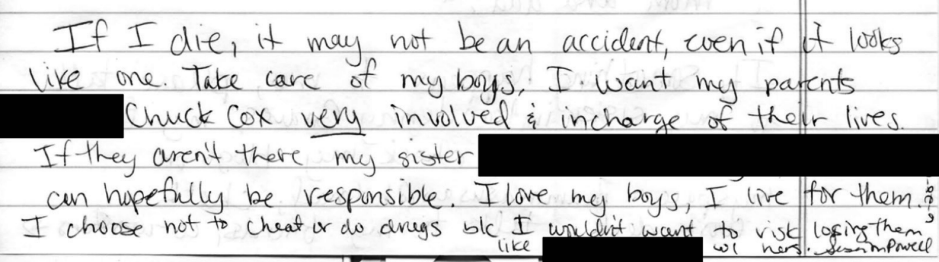

didn’t have much money. But they had their faith and each other.

They were regulars at church and sang together in the choir. One Sunday morning they overslept and missed service, so instead they walked together in the fresh snow.

“Some kids with a snow fort threw some snow balls at us and Josh did the same,” she wrote in 2002. “He’s just a big kid.”

The newlyweds bounced from job to job and from apartment to apartment, sometimes living with Josh’s father, Steve Powell. Susan Powell wrote that her husband was “computer smart,” but she worried that he couldn’t keep a regular job.

Money was a constant problem. They disagreed over whether to tithe 10 percent of their income to the church, with Josh Powell considering it a waste of money, according to the journal. He also wanted to spend as little as possi-

ble on food, proclaiming, she wrote, “The food we eat will only be from our garden and if we don’t grow it, we will not eat it. We will only buy dairy products and meat.”

Eventually, Susan Powell found steady work at a call center to support the family financially. Her husband’s behavior, meanwhile, grew increasingly controlling, according to both the handwritten journal and police records.

Josh Powell tried to cut his wife off from the world, limiting her computer and phone access. He had calls to their home forwarded to his cell and would decide which messages she received. He refused to let her have a cellphone of her own.

According to a police interview, Susan Powell’s sister, who is not identified by name, stated, “He wouldn’t let me talk to Susan a lot, and he monitored my conversations with her.” The sister said she began calling Susan Pow-

ell at work so Josh Powell couldn’t eavesdrop.

Things weren’t going well, and Susan Powell knew it.

“I can’t believe our marriage deteriorated so quickly. I feel so blind and naive and foolish,” she wrote in 2008.

She also came to see her father-in-law as a meddlesome and negative influence on her husband.

Josh Powell began to distance himself from the Mormon church, as Steve Powell had done years earlier. Father and son took countless family photographs, which she wasn’t allowed to see. And the men talked on the phone for hours each week, conversations that often triggered fits of anger in the younger man, according to documents.

Steve Powell is behind bars on voyeurism charges after being convicted of taking photos of young neighbor girls without their knowledge, a crime that emerged after police seized computer hard-drives from his

Puyallup, Wash., home while investigating Susan Powell’s disappearance. He has denied involvement, but Steve Powell became a public figure in the case after going on national television and saying he and his daughter-in-law had been falling in love.

Documents show Susan Powell was uncomfortable with Steve Powell’s feelings, which she considered a one-sided sexual obsession.

She sent notes to friends in 2009 from a work email address, saying she needed to “take a shower” after reading lyrics to songs her father-in-law posted on his website. She wrote that his song “I’m Missing You,” is directed toward her: “I can love you in a secret way. I can love you each and every day.”

“Glance over the lyrics — they are creepy,” she writes. “Especially when you know the background.”

She wrote that she felt betrayed by her husband when he blamed her for “sending mixed signals” and encouraging his father’s infatuation.

Her writings also suggest she saw something terrible coming.

She believed Josh had bipolar disorder, and wrote about his violent temper. She worried about saying things that would set him off and told her sister in the fall of 2007 that Josh Powell said he would kill her before agreeing to a divorce.

“Will he do something irrational? Do I need to pack up kids and run,” she wrote in 2008. “Will he hurt me and/or take the kids, hurt them?”

Terrica Powell, who hasn’t spoken publicly about her sons or ex-husband, said in a police transcript that Josh Powell was headstrong, impulsive and self-centered. Yet, she defended him, and she adored her daughter-in-law, according to the transcript. She said they both had “strong personalities.”

“I would hear them yelling at each other,” Terrica Powell told police. “Susan would yell at him, and he would yell at

her. I never saw any violence or anything physical between them.”

Others, however, described Josh Powell as abnormal and disturbing.

During their investigation, authorities circulated a questionnaire about him to neighbors in West Valley City.

“He had such odd behavior that we just started calling them ‘JP Stories,’” said one neighbor, whose name was redacted.

Another told police: “I know Josh because he weirds me out! He is just weird!”

One woman said he made her uneasy, standing “right behind me” on a sidewalk without speaking. She called the encounter “creepy,” according to police files.

Yet, Susan Powell’s faith continued to provide her with hope that things would improve. She saw her husband’s withdrawal from the Latter-day Saints as the root of their problems. She urged him to attend services, tithe and read the gospel.

“I’m hoping going to church and such will soften him back and let the Lord back in,” she wrote just months before she disappeared.

She was encouraged they had started counseling and prayed for more children, maybe a girl or even twins. Her penultimate journal entry included a list of names: Adeline and Jadelaine or Aubrey and Andrey.

It wasn’t to be. Josh Powell had started an affair with a woman he met online, documents reveal. He called his wife a religious fanatic and said the church was brainwashing her, an opinion that mirrored his father’s. This deeply troubled her, and she began to assert her independence.

According to police files she took the family car on her days off, and opened her own bank account so he couldn’t control her spending. She got computer and a cellphone.

“I think he thought I would always be docile and do whatever he says,” she wrote in an email to a friend in the fall of 2009. “Now I’ve learned the mother bear protection/survival mode so I’m stronger than I think he ever thought would happen.”

She disappeared months later. Her husband killed their sons and himself in February 2012. Her father-in-law was convicted three months later. Within a year Michael Powell killed himself by jumping from a Minneapolis parking garage in February.

As for their sons, a dark granite gravestone in Susan Powell’s hometown of Puyallup marks their short lives. It reads “Powell” at the top and has a picture of Susan with the young boys.

“Charlie J., Jan. 19, 2005, to Feb. 5, 2012.”

“Braden T., Jan. 2, 2007, to Feb. 5, 2012.”

Beneath the boys’ names the marker mentions their mother.

“Susan, Oct. 16, 1981, Missing Dec. 6, 2009.”

The bottom of the stone reads, “United In Heaven.”

T.F. Road Closures Planned for Western Days Parade on June 1

Officials urge motorists to plan routes accordingly.

TWIN FALLS • The annual Western Days Parade is scheduled to begin at 9 a.m. Saturday, June 1. During that time, there will be several road and lane closures to protect participants and spectators.

• Falls Avenue from Blue Lakes Boulevard to Harrison Street will be closed from 6 a.m. until 1 p.m. to provide a staging location for the parade floats.

• Addison Avenue also will be closed from Harrison Street to Elm Street from 8 a.m. until 1 p.m.

• Blue Lakes Boulevard North from Falls Avenue to Shoshone Street and Addison Avenue will be closed from 8 a.m. until 1 p.m. One southbound lane of Blue Lakes Boulevard North in this section will be closed at 6:30 a.m. for the Magic Valley Community Fun Run half-marathon event.

• Shoshone Street from Addison Avenue to Second Avenue South will be closed from 8 a.m. until 1 p.m. One southbound lane of Shoshone Street in this section will also be closed for the half-marathon event.

The parade route will be as follows:

• Starting point: Falls Avenue at Frontier Road.

• First leg: East from Falls Avenue at Frontier Road to the intersection of Falls Avenue and Blue Lakes Boulevard North.

• Second leg: South from Falls Avenue at Blue Lakes Boulevard North to the intersection of Shoshone Street at Blue Lakes.

• Third leg: Southwest from Shoshone at Blue Lakes to the intersection of Shoshone at Second Avenue South.

• Dispersal point: 100 and 200 blocks of Second Avenue South.

Numerous police agencies and citizen volunteers will help with traffic control along the parade route.

As in previous years, all vehicle traffic will be blocked from crossing both Blue Lakes Boulevard North and Shoshone Street from approximately 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. The practice of rerouting

traffic is done to ensure the safety of the large amount of pedestrians along the parade route and to permit the parade floats to move unobstructed. If you will be traveling during the time of the parade, plan your route accordingly.

In the past, there have been instances in which small children have been injured after running onto the roadway to gather candy thrown to them from passing floats. The police department asks that all parents attending the parade watch their children closely and restrain them from running onto the roadway. All of the parade participants in the parade have been warned that throwing candy from their float is illegal and that they will be escorted from the parade if they violate this city ordinance.

In order to prevent parking congestion, park your vehicles two to four blocks away from the parade route. Be careful to allow yourself enough time to walk to the parade route and please do not block the driveway to any home or business. There will be no parking allowed in the 400 and 500 blocks of Shoshone Street East and Shoshone Street North.

The truck route will be diverted during the parade.

Motorists driving into the city of Twin Falls from the Perrine Bridge area are asked to plan ahead. All through southbound traffic on Blue Lakes Boulevard North will be diverted to the east at Falls Avenue East. We recommend that all motorists use alternate routes before entering the parade area, utilizing Pole Line Road to travel either to the east or west side of Twin Falls. All truck traffic traveling through Twin Falls are recommended to go west on Pole Line Road to Washington Street North or to remain on Pole Line Road to Highway 93 or travel east on Pole Line Road to Eastland Drive then south to Kimberly Road.

A LIFE REMEMBERED

TWIN FALLS • For many years, you could expect to be greeted by Linda Bowen after walking through the doors of the Twin Falls Fire Department.

Last week, just about every Twin Falls firefighter who was able to attend Bowen's memorial service was there.

The room overflowed with city employees. Three fire trucks, and other emergency service vehicles, were parked outside, Fire Chief Ron Clark said. Firefighters led the funeral procession to the Twin Falls Cemetery.

"At the funeral service, I was thinking to myself, 'She was a co-worker of many people, but she was a friend to everyone,'" Clark said.

Twin Falls resident Linda Bowen, 55, a mainstay in the fire department for 32 years, died on May 14.

When I talked with her cousin Edwin Kimball on the phone, he described Bowen as a kind, honest, joyful person.

"She's probably one of the best people I've ever known," Kimball said.

Kimball said Bowen was "somebody that you like to be around" and had a strong faith in God. Bowen tried to help anybody who came along and did good things for others, Kimball said.

Karen Tribulla and Bowen's other close friends celebrated her 56th birthday on May 17 at Jakers Bar &

Grill Restaurant. It was just a few days after Bowen died.

Recently, Tribulla found cards that Bowen sent her in the mail. Tribulla read one of them to me on the phone.

"I was reminiscing about how beautifully she wrote cards and the nice things she had to say," Tribulla said.

Tribulla said Linda was a devoted daughter who took good care of her mother until she died.

Bowen was also a big Broncos fan and used to come over to Tribulla's house to watch football until she got a big-screen television last year.

Another of Bowen's interests: ice skating. Tribulla said her friend used to go to Sun Valley with others from church to watch ice skating shows.

Bowen served in a number of ways in her church, including as a Sunday school secretary and with the music ministry.

"She was in charge of special music up until she started getting sick," Tribul-

la said. "That was a big thing with her."

Bowen loved music and singing — especially as a member of the First Assembly of God. She also sang for years at Christmas events around town.

Tribulla said Bowen frequently bought Bibles and gave them to others. Bowen used to tell friends that she wanted to be a minister's wife someday.

Last year, Tribulla and her husband took Bowen on a trip for her birthday to Orlando, Fla.

"Knowing that we made her happy last year was a big blessing to us," Tribulla said.

Tribulla recalls her husband and Bowen going on a lot of rides — especially, laughing and having lots of fun on Splash Mountain, that trip included lots of shopping.

"She liked to go to flea markets," Tribulla said. "We shopped till we dropped."

They had plans to go on other trips in the future. Bowen wanted to attend a camp meeting by television evangelist Jimmy Swaggart.

As a city employee, Clark said, Bowen was loyal and dedicated.

Jack Barnes, battalion chief for the Twin Falls Fire

Department, said Bowen was helpful and knowledgeable in her job. "She was just a really good person."

Barnes remembers laughing with Bowen about her shorthand — a skill she'd learned many years ago.

"In some of our meetings, she'd be taking notes in her shorthand but couldn't remember how to read it," Barnes said, and they laughed about it together.

Bowen took an early retirement in March, and Barnes said he's disappointed that she didn't get a chance to enjoy it.

Clark told Bowen goodbye for the last time on May 3 just before his former employee was going to be transported to a long-term care facility.

Bowen couldn't speak, but her eyes were open and she was smiling. They communicated by writing.

"We said goodbye to each other," Clark said. Eleven days later she died.

Clark said Bowen was a "very religious person" who was devout in her faith.

"From that standpoint, there's absolutely no question in anyone's mind where she is," Clark said. "Personally, I've taken comfort in knowing where she is now."

Boise Eyes Options for New Parking Meters

BOISE (AP) • Possible new parking meters in Boise could allow downtown visitors to use their cellphones from wherever they're at to add more time rather than having to run out to the street.

CSI's Walker Inducted into Third Hall of Fame

GRAND JUNCTION, Colo. • Another decade, another hall-of-fame induction.

Thirty-year College of Southern Idaho baseball coach Jim "Skip" Walker was inducted into the NJCAA Baseball Coaches Association's Hall of Fame on Friday, the third hall-of-fame honor of his career. He was inducted into the CSI Hall of Fame in 2003 and the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2012.

This one might have been the most special. Held at a convention center not too far from Sam Suplizio Field, site of the NJCAA national championship, which started Saturday, and in front of 1,500 attendees, Walker connected with many of his old friends, enemies-turned-friends, and even players-turned-coaches, like Colorado Mesa University head coach Chris Hanks.

"So great to see him," Walker said. "He learned some things."

Walker told stories of Hanks, of his 1984 national championship team that Walker said "everyone wanted to talk about," and the teams that were on the cusp but fell just short. Walker coached four teams that finished in the top five.

"I shot from the hip (during my speech)," Walker said. "I'm always shooting from the hip. I talked about the '75 team that was so close. It was nostalgic."

Walker said in a phone interview over the weekend that he'll likely have a much reduced role as an assistant for his son Boomer Walker, going as far to say he was "retiring, retiring."

Walker told the Times-News that he won't travel on road trips, save the occasional flight and will limit his roles on the team to mentoring hitters and maintaining the field named after him.

"What really factored in and when I really made the decision was the day of my birthday (May 11), Walker said. "It was an absolute bad day, and it hit me hard. I said, 'I am an old man, what am I doing?' That kind of sealed the thing right there. I don't want to go through this kind of grind anymore in an everyday, six days a week kind of thing."

Walker's birthday was just after CSI was eliminated from the Region 18 tournament.

The disappointment subsided, however, as Walker looked back in time with a wide lens — more sweet

than bitter.

Walker preferred talking about the impact CSI and Twin Falls had on him.

"I think it has gone hand in hand. I think the college has had huge impact on me, too, especially President Meyerhofer," Walker said. "Because I could talk things over with him, and he would try to

help as much as he could within limits. I came here thinking I had answers, and after the first day of practice, I knew I didn't have any answers. I just gradually matured."

Heat Offense Puts away Pacers 114-96

INDIANAPOLIS • LeBron James scored 22 points and the Miami Heat rediscovered their offensive punch, routing the Indiana Pacers 114-96 on Sunday night to take a 2-1 lead in the Eastern Conference finals.

James got plenty of help as the Heat reclaimed the home-court advantage they lost two nights earlier. Dwyane Wade had 18 points, and Udonis Haslem added 17.

David West led Indiana with 21 points, and Roy Hibbert had 20 points and 17 rebounds. The Pacers lost for the first time at home in the playoffs this season, dropping to 6-1.

Game 4 is Tuesday night in Indianapolis.

It was vastly different from the first two games when the Heat couldn't pull away.

Miami used an 8-2 run to open up a 10-point lead in the second quarter led 70-56 at halftime — Miami's biggest lead in the series.

Indiana didn't get closer than seven the rest of the way.

It was a rare letdown from one of the NBA's top defensive teams.

Miami shot 54.5 percent from the field, was 24 of 28 from the free-throw line, matched its highest-scoring quarter of the playoffs this season (34) in the first, broke the franchise's postseason scoring

It traded baskets through the first quarter, building a 34-30 lead and getting the Pacers out of their grind-it-out style, then opened up the second quarter on an 8-2 run to make it 42-32. Indiana couldn't get closer than seven the rest of the half and when James knocked down a 15-foot jumper with 1.3 seconds left, the Heat had the record.

SHOSHONE • After finishing the regular season over the weekend, the All-Around cowboy and cowgirl, top boy and girl rookie and the six qualifiers in each event that will represent the District V at state June 9-15 in Pocatello were decided.

Brogan Bennett from Gooding and Kortney McReynolds from Valley View High School (Boise) that rodeos for Gooding accumulated the most points, earning them the title of boy's and girl's all-around. The boys and girls reserve winners, Wyatt Williams and Cassie Bahe are also from Gooding. Williams also won the top boy rookie title and Jessica Anderson from Jerome won the girls title.

Bennett won the individual title in steer wrestling and team roping with Williams and finished third in calf roping and will compete at state in each event. McReynolds heads to state to compete in barrels, breakaway, goats and poles. She also picked up the individual title in goats.

Riley Jo Johnson and her horse, Truck, qualified for state in Johnson's rookie year in poles but the Jerome freshman doesn't seem too overly concerned about the trip.

"After going to Nationals (in junior rodeo) in the sixth grade, hopefully state shouldn't be that bad," said Johnson. "But I'm still excited to be going. I want to enjoy state but I also plan on staying focused."

Johnson will be heading to Pocatello on a winning note after placing first on Friday and Saturday in Shoshone. Her time of 21.964 led all competitors on Friday and was even better in the win on Saturday with a run of 21.297 seconds.

"I really didn't do anything different. I just let him run. He does fly through the poles and he isn't one bit lazy."

Johnson said the toughest part of high school rodeo has been the lack of consistency for practicing because of the weather but she has enjoyed the experience and all the people she has met. The lessons she will take into her sophomore year are about

the effort and dedication it takes to compete. In the sport of rodeo, Johnson has learned not to rush, and that it takes time, more like taking it all in in baby steps.

"Truck and I had problems early but we went to the trainer and worked out the kinks," said Johnson, who has been riding her horse for two years.

To any girls wanting to run poles and barrels, Johnson's advice would be to concentrate on making a clean run and not always trying to run the fastest.

In today's rodeos, spectators get accustomed to seeing many of the cowgirls riding a different horse in each event. But in District V, families and friends are familiar with seeing Whitnee Hurless and her mare, Bobby, together in barrels, breakaway and poles. (If it wasn't for two knee surgeries on Hurless, there could be a possibility that they might even be competing together in goats)

The pair has a long history together dating back to when Hurless was four years old and started riding Bobby. On her fifth birthday, her mom, Shelley bought her the horse. And keeping it in the family, Whitney's sister, Kortney, even barrowed Bobby her senior year while at Camas County when her horse, Orville was injured and Bobby became a pole horse taking her to state.

"She is something special with her trademark short tail and at 16 years old, she has not slowed down a step," said Hurless. "She even takes a nap every day at 1:30 and you can set your watch to it. Bobby is a horse for all events and can handle each one. She and Bobby will be making a trip to Pocatello after qualifying in barrels.

"I give all the credit to Bobby," said Hurless. "She got me to state and I'm just along for the ride."

Tony Kanaan Ends Heartbreak with Indy 500 Victory

INDIANAPOLIS • Tony Kanaan had one more lap, one anticlimactic last lap under the yellow caution flag, to end 12 years of frustration in the Indianapolis 500.

He flipped up his visor to wipe away tears as the crowd roared its approval, and then in Victory Lane gave his bride of two months a long kiss and poured the celebratory winner's milk over his head.

Kanaan is Indy's hard-luck loser no more. He is its champion at last, fittingly with a dose of good luck for a change.

"I have to say, the last lap was the longest lap of my life," Kanaan said.

It was one of Indy's most popular victories.

The losers were pleased

with the outcome, evidenced by a scene similar to rivals lining up to congratulate Dale Earnhardt when he finally won the Daytona 500 on his 20th try. Dario Franchitti, whose crash brought out the race-ending caution, stood grinning by his crumpled car, two thumbs up as Kanaan passed under yellow.

"When I saw who was leading, it cheered me up a little bit," said Franchitti, last year's winner. "He's a very, very deserving winner."

The fans thought so, too, standing on their feet, screaming "TK! TK! TK!" as he and team owner Jimmy Vasser went by during the traditional victory lap. It felt magical to Kanaan, like he had given the crowd at Indianapolis Motor Speedway a gift.

Harvick Pulls Away to Win Coca-Cola 600

CONCORD, N.C. (AP) • Kevin Harvick pulled away from Kasey Kahne on a restart with 11 laps left to win the Coca-Cola 600 for the second time in three seasons, a race stopped nearly 30 minutes Sunday night when a TV camera support rope snapped.

Kahne led 156 laps and appeared to have the strongest machine in NASCAR's longest race. But Harvick took the low

line following the last of 11 cautions and slowly pulled away.

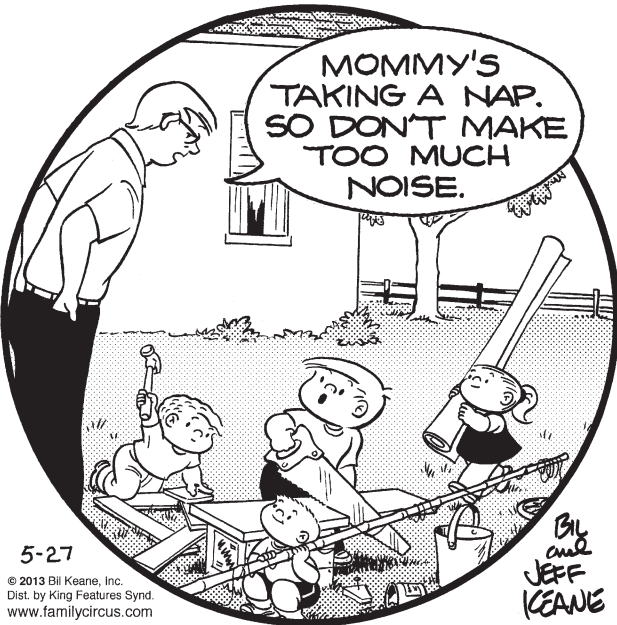

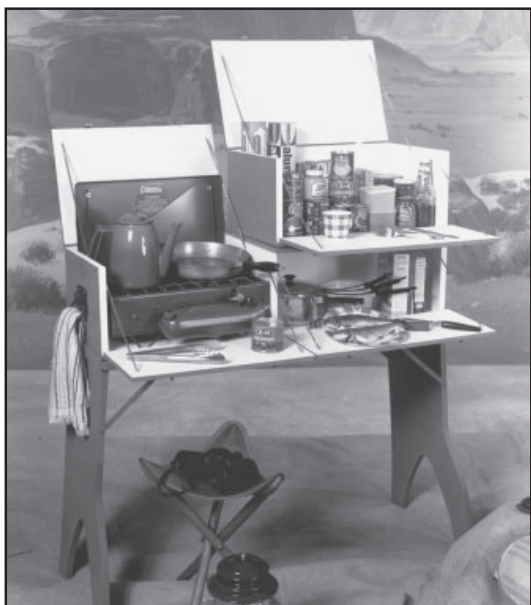

Today's Highlights:
On May 27, 1933, the Chicago World's Fair, celebrating "A Century of Progress" officially opened. Walt Disney's Academy Award-winning animated short "The Three Little Pigs" was first released.

TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:
In 1861, Chief Justice Roger Taney, sitting as a federal circuit court judge in Baltimore, ruled that President Abraham Lincoln lacked the authority to suspend the writ of habeas corpus (Lincoln disregarded the ruling).

In 1896, 255 people were killed when a tornado struck St. Louis, Mo., and East St. Louis, Ill.

In 1929, Charles A. Lindbergh Jr. married Anne Morrow in Englewood, N.J.

In 1935, the Supreme Court struck down the National Industrial Recovery Act.

In 1936, the Cunard liner RMS Queen Mary left England on its maiden voyage to New York.

In 1937, the newly completed Golden Gate Bridge connecting San Francisco and Marin County, Calif., was opened to pedestrians (vehicles began crossing the next day).

In 1941, the British Royal Navy sank the German battleship Bismarck off France, with a loss of some 2,000 lives, three days after the Bismarck sank the HMS Hood.

In 1942, Navy Cook 3rd Class Doris "Dorie" Miller became the first African-American to receive the Navy Cross for his "extraordinary courage and disregard for his own personal safety" during Japan's attack on Pearl Harbor.

In 1962, a dump fire in Centralia, Pa., ignited a blaze in underground coal deposits that continues to burn this day.

In 1964, independent India's first prime minister, Jawaharlal Nehru, died.

In 1985, in Beijing, representatives of Britain and China exchanged instruments of ratification for an accord returning Hong Kong to Chinese control in 1997.

In 1993, five people were killed in a bombing at the Uffizi museum of art in Florence, Italy.

Ten years ago: Two Iraqis shot and killed two American soldiers in Fallujah, a hotbed of support for Saddam Hussein. Derrick Todd Lee, a suspected serial killer of women in Louisiana, was arrested in Atlanta. (Lee is under sentence of death for one killing and sentenced to life for another.) A study was released that showed women who took hormones for years ran a higher risk of Alzheimer's or other types of dementia.

Five years ago: Myanmar's military government renewed pro-democracy leader Aung San Suu Kyi's detention for one year; the move came as officials said that international aid workers had finally begun entering Myanmar's cyclone-devastated delta area after being blocked for more than three weeks by the junta.

One year ago: Syria strongly denied allegations that its forces had killed scores of people — including women and children — in Houla, but the U.N. Security Council condemned government forces for shelling residential areas. At the Cannes Film Festival, Austrian director Michael Haneke won the top prize for a second time with his stark film, "Amour." Dario Franchitti won the Indianapolis 500 for the third time. Johnny Tapia, the five-time boxing champion whose turbulent career was marked by cocaine addiction, alcohol, depression and run-ins with the law, was found dead at his Albuquerque, N.M., home; he was 45.

But next, declarer must ruff a diamond to hand to try to score his small trumps in hand as safely as possible in case of bad breaks.

Now the next thing to ensure is taking the club ruff in dummy. Declarer leads a club, and East wins cheaply, cashes the heart king, and leads the heart queen. Declarer must ruff high as West pitches a diamond and a club. Now comes a second club. East wins and plays the diamond queen. Declarer is again forced to ruff high, and when West discards, declarer knows West started with five red-suit cards. When he leads a third club from hand, West is down to just his four trumps. He ruffs low and declarer overruffs, leads dummy's remaining heart, and ruffs with his remaining high trump. He then leads to dummy's spade K-9 and takes the "sure" finesse.

The key move was to ruff a diamond at trick four. If he doesn't, declarer will never be able to score his small trumps safely. If West is allowed to discard two diamonds early on in the play, the defenders cannot be prevented from arranging a trump promotion.
