## Major Economic Parts Align as TF Expands

Agriculture, tourism, commercial and industrial development come together.

**TWIN FALLS •** Major pieces of the Magic Valley economy are coming together, fostering more population and economic growth in Twin Falls now than in more than a century. A far reaching collaboration between city, community and economic leaders resem-

ble the ambition shared by the town's founders. There have been visionaries throughout Twin Falls history, but there has never been everyone at the same table before, said Twin Falls City Manager Travis Rothweiler. Although Rothweiler started an economic think tank last year called "The Ready Team," widespread teamwork among leaders started in the early 2000s. Southern Idaho Economic Development Organization (SIEDO) joins private and public economic sectors throughout the region. SIEDO Executive Director Jan Rogers helped 40 corporations expand and/or move to the Mag-

ic Valley since 2001. Now that the area's agriculture core is strengthened by dairy and there are solid plans for downtown Twin Falls and the commercial center along Blue Lakes Avenue, Rogers said the next step is to package those pieces with Idaho's natural beauty. "They never packaged and marketed it in a way to make it resonate," Rogers said. "Now is the time to do that. Not just because of the economy but because of the way we diversified our core as well as outside of our core. We're not as vulnerable as we used to be or the way other places are. What can we do to create that

place image in peoples' heads that works for business, life and scenery?"

### Agriculture

Dairy kings, city people and economic developers agree, dairy restored and strengthened the core of southern Idaho. "Dairy stabilized our core business: ag," Rogers said. "Before we diversified the core, it was tsunamis. Everybody was talking about diversifying away from ag and we have done some of that. We've layered the

## Sheriff vs. Sheriff

Twin Falls, Jerome law enforcement officers race to raise money for homeless shelter.

**TWIN FALLS •** Jerome and Twin Falls county sheriff's deputies were involved in a high-speed pursuit Saturday night about a mile west of the Magic Valley Regional Airport. One officer lost control of his vehicle in a blow out but no one was injured. No arrests were made. Officials say no laws were broken. The six deputies involved chased each other around the Magic Valley Speedway, hoping to capture the checkered flag and take custody of a first place trophy. The Magic Valley Speedway hosted its first Sheriffs Race Saturday night, pitting teams of three drivers from Jerome and Twin Falls counties against each other to benefit the Valley House Homeless Shelter. In the pits before the race, Twin Falls County Chief Deputy Don Newman was trying to figure out

## Father, daughter lost home in Richfield blaze.

**RICHFIELD •** Rick Walker was at work when his phone rang. It was his daughter, Hannah Walker, but he couldn't understand her frantic words. A woman took the phone and explained that Rick and Hannah Walker's home was burning. On April 23, the two lost everything when an electrical fire destroyed their mobile home in Richfield. "It started in my bedroom and worked its way through," Rick Walker said. Hannah Walker, 15, came home from school that day, then walked to the grocery store, less than two blocks away, Rick Walker said.

Hannah Walker overheard a police radio scanner in the store: fire crews were responding to her address. Rick Walker rushed home from work in the Wood River Valley. "By the time he got there it was pretty much history," Kent Laverty, Rick Walker's

brother, said. Parts of the home that weren't damaged by flames were overtaken by smoke and heat. "It got so hot through the whole thing, what didn't burn melted," Rick Walker said. His daughter was shaken by the fire. Please see **FIRE, A4**

# Damaging Storms Moving Through East, South

**PORTLAND, Maine (AP)** • Damaging winds flattened trees and utility wires and knocked out power in parts of northern New England on Sunday, flights were delayed in New York City and there were reports of a tornado in South Carolina as the East Coast weathered the remnants of violent storms that claimed 13 lives in Oklahoma. Heavy rain, thunderstorms, high winds and hail moved through sections of the Northeast on Sunday afternoon, knocking out power to more than 40,000 in Vermont, New Hampshire and Maine. The National Weather Service issued a rare tornado warning as a line of thunderstorms raced through New Hampshire into western Maine. The National Weather Service said a tornado warning was issued as radar indicated a possible tornado moving from Kingfield, Maine, to Bingham, Maine. The tornado was not immediately confirmed.

In northwestern South Carolina, authorities checked unconfirmed reports of a tornado, said Jessica Ashley, a shift supervisor for Anderson County’s 911 center. The fire department responded to a report of roof damage to a home and callers said trees were blown over. No injuries were reported. The weather service said thunderstorms and winds in excess of 60 mph in Vermont produced 1-inch-diameter hail and knocked down numerous trees and wires. In northern Maine, radar picked up a line of thunderstorms capable of producing quarter-sized hail and winds stronger than 70 mph. Forecasters warned of tornadoes. The prediction for stormy weather in the New York City region produced delays at major airports. La Guardia Airport and Newark Liberty Airport in New Jersey had delays of up to 90 minutes.

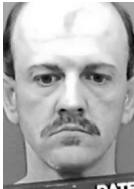

# Palin Speaks at Small-town Commencement

**REPUBLIC, Wash. (AP)** • Former Alaska governor and Republican firebrand Sarah Palin had a gift and a message for the 26 graduates at a small-town commencement in northeastern Washington state this weekend.

The grads in the high school gym in the town of Republic found a dollar bill taped under their seats. The message, Palin said: “You gotta get off your butt to make a buck.”

The Spokesman-Review reported that 700 people crowded into the gym for the ceremony Saturday. Republic, the government seat of Ferry County, is a town of 1,100 in a

historic gold-mining region. Palin told the audience that in 1964, when her father, Chuck Heath, set out for Alaska from Sandpoint, Idaho, where she had been born just a few months before, the family had car trouble. She said they stopped in Republic, where a mechanic fixed the car for a pittance and sent them on their way.

“You got us on our path,” Palin said, to more applause.

That was a big part of the reason Palin accepted an invi-

tation from senior class President Tyler Weyer to be the graduation speaker. The class posed in the school’s front yard holding a “We Want You, Governor Palin!” banner that got attention on Facebook.

“Through this entire process, I’ve learned many things,” Weyer said in his introduction of the former vice presidential candidate. “Anything is possible; all you’ve got to do is want it.”

Palin’s presence lent a little extra pomp and circumstance to the annual tradition in Republic. The ceremony featured caps, gowns, squealing infants and tearful parents sending face-reddening hand

waves toward their children, the newspaper reported.

There were also reminders of rural Washington. Senior Heather Giddings received the home economics award, earning praise as the “best wild game cook in Eastern Washington.” Giddings and her classmates celebrated their accomplishment on a stage flanked by paper banners bearing the class motto: “You Only Live Once.”

Shops along Republic’s main drag welcomed Palin, and Helen Weinart, a Czech immigrant, traveled all the way from her home outside Seattle with her daughter, Helen De Leon.

## Initiative Seeks to Close Gaps in Idaho's Online Coverage

**BRUNEAU (AP)** • Look at a map showing broadband Internet access in Idaho and you'll see broad swaths of online nothingness.

Add that to the many Idaho communities that have weak or otherwise limited service, and Idaho has a problem, Mike Field said.

"This is as essential as the railroads were in the 1850s or highways were in the 1950s: The communities that got them prospered, and the communities that didn't went down in size," said Field, coordinator for LinkIdaho, a federally funded initiative to expand broadband access and use throughout the state.

Field is also the executive director of the Idaho Rural Partnership, established by state law in 2007 to create a collaborative effort to improve economic and social conditions in rural Idaho.

"People need to connect with the outside world to sell products, to get information," he said. "They're going to have to have connectivity to be successful."

Quick, reliable online connections can help health care providers and emergency responders deliver crucial information where it needs to go.

People rely on the Internet to find jobs, take courses, keep in touch with loved ones, sell and buy things, and manage banking and other accounts. And when their only connection is weak, they do those things slowly, if at all.

Field estimates that about 85 percent of Idahoans have good access to some form of high-speed Internet, but that population is concentrated in the urban areas that make up a fraction of the state's land mass.

Scattered across the vast

spaces that remain, rural Idahoans are often hard-pressed to communicate and do business in an increasingly online-centric world, he said.

Equalizing those residents' opportunities and access is a complicated task that encounters numerous challenges, from mountainous terrain to money.

Much of the focus of LinkIdaho has been to map broadband service across the state and identify gaps that need to be filled. Before 2009, no such statewide information was readily available, said Field and Brady Kraft, technical director of the Idaho Education Network, which extended broadband to every state high school between 2009 and 2011.

Many of Idaho's smallest communities rely on copper digital subscriber lines for Internet access. People who live more than a couple of miles outside a town are beyond the reach of DSL service, Field said. Likewise, communities too small to attract cable TV can't take advantage of that broadband service.

The Idaho Education Network launched a few months ahead of the wider broadband initiative and found that the Internet situation in "most of rural Idaho was very dismal," Kraft said. "We had multiple districts that had 256-kilobit DSL lines ... in one district, teachers could only check their email once a week, and they would sign up for it. Now the same school that had 256 kilobits has 4.6 megabits" — millions of bits

versus thousands, producing a relative blaze of speed.

That has made schools the only source of reliable Internet in some parts of the state. LinkIdaho is working to broaden that reach, in part by better equipping the libraries that double as community hubs in tiny towns.

In the past two years, LinkIdaho has boosted connectivity at 55 public libraries identified as "the least well-connected in the state," said Idaho State Librarian Ann Joslin.

With \$1.8 million in grants and nearly a million dollars in matching funds and in-kind services, the project has, among other things, provided computers and upgraded online connection speeds in those libraries.

That's the case in Bruneau, an Owyhee County hamlet of about 500 best known for its nearby sand dunes.

The library broadband project replaced the Bruneau Valley Library's five aging computers and made online connections seem downright speedy, Library Director Clara Morris said.

"I think we are getting more people in," she said. "And they are happy that

they don't have to be waiting forever for it to download.

"Now our speed is 10 (megabits per second). Before, I think we were below 1."

Those before-and-after figures are about average for the 55 libraries in the broadband project, Joslin said. Other Treasure Valley-area communities included Grand View, Marsing and Wilder, plus some that don't fit most people's concept of remote: Caldwell, Nampa and Garden City. Their libraries made the cut because of the broadband grant's emphasis on reaching underserved populations such as low-income and minority families, Joslin said.

## INL Researchers Applying Medical Imaging Techniques

**IDAHO FALLS (AP)** • Scientists at the Idaho National Laboratory in eastern Idaho are applying technology typically used for mammograms to examine nuclear fuel.

"We're looking to adapt some of the technology used for creating 3-D images of the human body," Dan Wachs, INL nuclear fuels engineer, told the *Post Register*.

Researchers at the nuclear facility about a year ago contacted Real Time Tomography. The Pennsylvania-based company develops techniques for processing 2-D and 3-D medical images of solid objects.

Wachs said the method could save months of work and in some instances up to \$100,000 per experiment.

Researchers examine irradiated fuel by cutting small pieces from rods, he

said, but using tomography will allow researchers to take a nondestructive look first.

"We'll be able to see defects in fuel cladding (a metal layer that encases the fuel) more clearly," Wachs said.

Susan Ng, Real Time Tomography CEO, said the project will make the jobs easier for both laboratory and industrial workers.

"If you want to image something and can't actually touch it, (tomography) is a way of determining structural damages (and) small cracks," she said.

Wachs said he hoped interest in the technology will spread.

"The ability to do this analysis is unique, so what we anticipate is to see users from industry, other national labs, even international interest in using this capability," he said.

Hezbollah, Syrian Rebels in Worst Clash in Lebanon

BEIRUT • Syrian rebels and Hezbollah guerrillas battled Sunday in their worst clashes yet inside Lebanon, a new sign that the civil war in Syria is increasingly destabilizing its fragile neighbor.

Syria’s foreign minister, meanwhile, rebuffed an appeal by the U.N. and the Red Cross to let humanitarian aid reach thousands of civilians trapped in the rebel-held town of Qusair, under regime attack for the past three weeks. The Red Cross said many of the wounded were not receiving desperately needed medical care.

The latest confrontation between Lebanon’s Hezbollah militia and Syrian rebels, who have been fighting on opposite sides inside Syria, came at a time of increasingly incendiary rhetoric between Sunni and Shiite Muslims in the region.

Congressmen Find Few Boston Attack Clues in Russia

MOSCOW • The head of a U.S. congressional delegation said Sunday that its meetings in Russia showed there was “nothing specific” that could have helped prevent the Boston Marathon bombings, but that the two countries need to work more closely on joint security threats.

Rep. Dana Rohrabacher, a California Republican who led the six-member delegation, described discussions with Russian parliament members and security officials as productive. Some of the meetings, he said, were made possible by American actor Steven Seagal.

Seagal, who attended the news conference in the U.S. Embassy, is well connected in Russia. He met with Russian President Vladimir Putin in March, and last week paid a visit to Ramzan Kadyrov, the strongman who rules Chechnya, a province in southern Russia that has seen two brutal wars between federal troops and Chechen separatists since 1994.

Court Says Egypt Legislature Illegally Elected

CAIRO • Egypt’s highest court ruled on Sunday that the nation’s interim parliament was illegally elected, though it stopped short of dissolving the chamber immediately, in a decision likely to fuel the tensions between the ruling Islamists and the judiciary.

The Supreme Constitutional Court also ruled that a 100-member panel that drafted the new constitution was illegally elected.

The immediate impact of the ruling is limited. The Islamist-dominated upper house of parliament, called the Shura Council, will remain in place until elections are held for a lower house, likely early next year. The constitution, which was ratified in a nationwide referendum in December with a relatively low turnout of around 35 percent, will also remain in effect.

Reports: Fire Kills 43 at Poultry Farm in China

BEIJING • Reports say 43 people have died in a fire at a poultry farm in northeastern China.

The official Xinhua News Agency says the fire broke out Monday morning, trapping workers inside sheds at the farm in Jilin province’s Mishazi township.

It says the bodies were discovered by rescue workers, and that rescue efforts were continuing.

Angelina Jolie Joins Brad Pitt at ‘World War Z’ London Premiere

LONDON • Brad Pitt and Angelina Jolie stepped out together Sunday at the premiere of zombie thriller “World War Z” — Jolie’s first public appearance since announcing last month that she had undergone a double mastectomy.

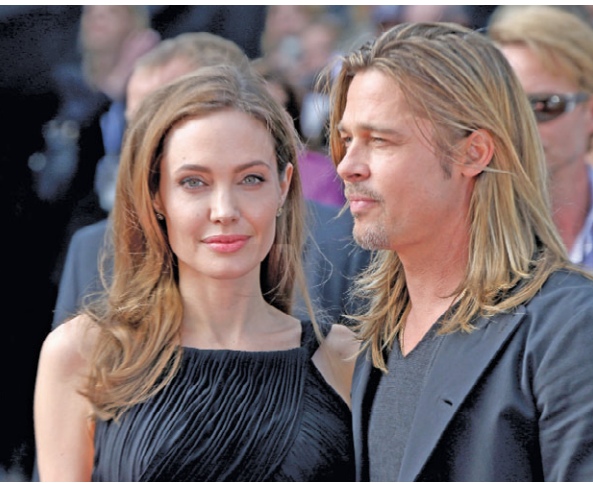
The couple said they had been moved by the outpouring of public support that followed Jolie’s disclosure.

Jolie told reporters she felt great, and had “been very happy to see the discussion about women’s health expanded” by her announcement.

“And after losing my mom to these issues, I’m very grateful for it, and I’ve been very moved by the kind of support from people,” she said.

Jolie revealed last month in an op-ed piece for *The New York Times* that she had had her breasts removed after discovering she has an inherited genetic mutation that puts her at high risk of breast and ovarian cancer.

THOUSANDS FORCED TO LEAVE AS CREWS FIGHT CALIFORNIA WILDFIRE

LANCASTER, Calif. • A wildfire that destroyed at least six homes, damaged 15 others and threatened hundreds more grew quickly Sunday as it triggered evacuations for nearly 3,000 people and burned dangerously close to communities in the parched mountains north of Los Angeles.

The blaze had burned about 35 square miles of very dry brush in the Angeles National Forest mountains and canyons, some of which hadn’t burned since 1929. The fire was growing so fast, and the smoke was so thick, that it was difficult to map the size, U.S. Forest Service Incident Commander Norm Walker said.

“This is extremely old, dry fuel,” Walker said at an afternoon news conference.

The fire, which was 20 percent contained, appeared to be the fiercest of several burning in the West, including two in New Mexico, where thick smoke covered several communities and set a blanket of haze over Santa Fe on Saturday. Crews fighting the two uncontained wildfires focused Sunday on building protection lines around them amid anticipation that a forecast of storms could bring moisture to help reduce the intensity of the fires.

The fire raging in Southern California had crews fighting the fire on four fronts, with the flames spreading quickest northward into unoccupied land, authorities said. But populated areas about 50 miles north of downtown LA remained in danger, with more than 2,800 people and 700 homes under evacuation orders in the communities of Lake Hughes and Lake Elizabeth, sheriff’s Lt. David Coleman said.

They wouldn’t be allowed to return

home until at least today and possibly Tuesday, Coleman said.

About 2,100 firefighters aided by water-dropping aircraft, some of which were making the rare move of flying through the night, were attacking the blaze.

“We’re putting everything that we have into this,” Walker said.

The cause of the fire was under investigation.

Winds were blowing 20-25 miles per hour with gusts of more than 40 mph, so fast that speakers at the news conference were difficult to hear with hard winds hitting the microphone.

“That has created havoc,” LA County Deputy Chief David Richardson said through the winds. “It’s had a huge impact on our operations.”

At least six homes burned to the ground overnight, and 15 more were scorched by flames, LA County fire Chief Daryl L. Osby said.

House Panel: Report Finds \$50M for IRS Conferences

WASHINGTON • A government watchdog has found that the Internal Revenue Service spent about \$50 million to hold at least 220 conferences for employees between 2010 and 2012, a House committee said Sunday.

The chairman of that committee, Rep. Darrell Issa, R-Calif., also released excerpts of congressional investigators’ interviews with employees of the IRS office in Cincinnati. Issa said the interviews indicated the employees were directed by Washington to subject tea party and other conservative groups seeking tax-exempt status to tough scrutiny.

The excerpts provided no direct evidence that Washington had ordered that screening. The top Democrat on that panel, Rep. Elijah Cummings of Maryland, contested Issa’s claim, saying none of the employees interviewed have so far identified any IRS officials in Washington as ordering that targeting.

The conference spending included \$4 million for an August 2010 gathering in Anaheim, Calif., for which the agency did not negotiate lower room rates, even though that is standard government practice, according to a statement by the House Oversight and Government Reform Committee.

Instead, some of the 2,600 attendees received benefits, including baseball tickets and stays in presidential suites that normally cost \$1,500 to \$3,500 per night. In addition, 15 outside speakers were paid a total of \$135,000 in fees, with one paid \$17,000 to talk about “leadership through art,” the House committee said.

Three Veteran Storm Chasers Killed by Oklahoma Tornado

Three veteran storm chasers died doing what they loved: roaming the Great Plains in search of dangerous storms like the one in Oklahoma that ended their final pursuit.

Tim Samaras, his son Paul and colleague Carl Young died Friday night when an EF3 tornado with winds up to 165 mph turned on them near El Reno, Okla. After years of sharing dramatic videos with television viewers and weather researchers, they died chasing a storm that killed 13 in Oklahoma City and its suburbs.

“It’s something we’ve done countless times in the past and have done it successfully and safely,” said Tony Laubauch, who was working with Tim Samaras’ chase team Friday night. “And, you know, whatever happened on this one, it’s just horrible beyond words.”

The men’s deaths in pursuit of the storm are believed to be the first among scientific researchers while chasing tornadoes, the Storm Prediction Center in Norman, Okla., said.

“They put themselves in harm’s way

so that they can educate the public about the destructive power of these storms,” said Chris West, the undersheriff in Canadian County, where the men died.

Tim Samaras, 54, of Bennett, Colo., had a reputation for being safe but was trapped on the highway with his son, Paul Samaras, 24, also of Bennett, and Young, 45, who taught geology at Lake Tahoe Community College in South Lake Tahoe, Calif.

“I don’t know if I would say I worried about it because one of the biggest things he stressed was safety,” said Tim’s brother, Jim Samaras, who confirmed the deaths to The Associated Press. “He knew what to look for. He knew where not to be and in this case, the tornado took a clear turn toward them.”

Tim Samaras and his Twistex tornado chase team produced material for the Discovery Channel, National Geographic and meteorological conferences.

“He looked at tornadoes not for the spotlight of TV but for the scientific aspect,” Jim Samaras said. “At the end of the day, he wanted to save lives and he gave the ultimate sacrifice for that.”

## Bill Austin, Lombardi Protege, Dies at 84

Bill Austin, who became head coach of the Washington Redskins in 1970 as the handpicked successor of the ailing Vince Lombardi, and who later returned to the team as offensive line coach, died May 22 at his home in Las Vegas. He was 84.

The New York Giants, for whom Austin was an all-pro guard in the 1950s, announced his death. The cause of death was not disclosed.

Austin spent 11 years with Lombardi as a player and assistant coach before taking over the top job with the Redskins in 1970. The previous season, when Austin served as Lombardi’s offensive coordinator, the Redskins compiled a 7-5-2 record the team’s first winning record in 14 years.

Lombardi had won five National Football League championships and two Super Bowls with the Green Bay Packers, but in Washington, the coaching legend never had a chance to improve on his promising start.

Stricken with colon cancer, Lombardi died Sept. 3, 1970, at age 57. Before his death, however, he anointed Austin his heir apparent with the Redskins. Austin had a mediocre record of 11-28-3 during three seasons as the Pittsburgh Steelers’ head coach from 1966 to 1968, but he had a long history as Lombardi’s protege.

After playing under Lombardi with the Giants for four years, Austin was the first assistant hired when Lombardi took the

head coaching job in Green Bay in 1959.

As the Packers’ offensive line coach for six years, Austin was a principal architect of the team’s powerful running attack, which featured fullback Jim Taylor and halfback Paul Hornung. The linemen Austin coached included guards Jerry Kramer and Fuzzy Thurston and two Hall of Famers, tackle Forrest Gregg and center Jim Ringo.

Austin was credited with helping develop the Packers’ signature play, the power sweep, in which Kramer and Thurston pulled out of the line to lead the ballcarrier to daylight downfield.

“One thing we must recognize,” Austin told *The Washington Post* in 1970. “There was only one Vince Lombardi. I can’t hope to be him.” He did say that he could shout as loudly as Lombardi and added, “Naturally, some of his ideals, philosophy, and even mannerisms have rubbed off on me.”

Like his mentor, Austin was a strict disciplinarian who led his players through grueling two-a-day drills in training camp, each lasting more than two hours. Some players said they were so worn out by the practices that they couldn’t play their best in games.

In 1970, Austin’s sole season as the Redskins’ head coach, quarterback Sonny Jurgensen threw 23 touchdown passes, and running back Larry Brown rushed for 1,125 yards to become the first Redskin to gain more than 1,000 yards on the ground.

## Things that Turn and Twirl: Whirligig Art Creator Vollis Simpson Dies at 94

**RALEIGH, N.C. (AP)** • Where others saw trash, Vollis Simpson saw whimsical, wind-powered whirligigs, creations with hundreds of moving parts that turned and twirled.

The whirligigs were made from recycled heating and air conditioning systems and reflector material Simpson patiently cut into thousands of tiny pieces that made the works shine when lights hit them in the dark. His work was featured in museums, backyards, dentist offices and the 1996 Olympics.

“I got caught with a lot of material, and I worked it out,” Simpson said in a 2010 interview with The Associated Press.

Simpson, 94, died Friday, Beth Liles of Joyner’s Funeral Home said.

Folklorist Jefferson Currie, who began working with Simpson about three years ago to record stories about the whirligigs and their creator, said Simpson’s daughter told him he died at his home in Lucama, about 40 miles east of Raleigh.

Simpson had a heart valve replacement in February and had returned home recently, Currie said.

Some of Simpson’s whirligigs stand as high as 50 feet and are constructed from recycled HVAC parts including motor fans and cotton spindles. They can weigh as much 3 tons.

He built the contraptions near his machine shop in Lucama. More than 30 of them were on display there until last year, when an effort to restore them began. That process is about halfway complete, with a few of the larger whirligigs still in the pasture, waiting to be moved.

The Vollis Simpson Whirligig Park is scheduled to open in November in Wilson, about 10 miles from his home.

People from across the world visited Simpson at his shop, and he would happily sit and talk with them.

“What Vollis was doing mechanically, creatively and artistically is unparalleled,” Currie aid. “He worked on a scale that was a lot larger than anyone else. And even in that scale, he had a lot of intricacy. And I think that’s one of the things people recognized.

“They also saw the whimsy and the happiness in his pieces. They told stories — stories of community, of his time in World War II, of his love of airplanes. . People who see them for the first time, there’s this sense of wonder, and it’s kind of overwhelming. It’s hard to

get your head around how one man could create all of this”

His first whirligig, which he built while he was overseas during WWII, was stolen. He came home from the war and married Jean, the mother of their three children. He farmed and moved houses with trucks before opening the machine shop that eventually became whirligig central.

He started on his first whirligig at home in the early 1980s and spent about 10 years building other large ones. “People would drive by here every day to see what I

## Mayo Stuntz, Spy and Man of Many Skills, Dies

**WASHINGTON** • Mayo Stuntz: soldier, scholar, merchant, gentleman, spy.

He began his military career in the old horse cavalry, before the United States got into World War II. During the war, he was an imaginative and resourceful supply officer who coaxed from an often hidebound Army bureaucracy the weapons and gear for elite units to wage covert warfare in the South Pacific.

“By hook or crook, he managed to get them what they needed,” said Lance Q. Zedric, author of “The Silent Warriors,” a book about the war in the Pacific.

Back in the United States, Stuntz researched and wrote histories of his hometown of Vienna, Va. and the state of Virginia, where his family traced its ancestry to the 1600s. With his wife, Constance, he was author of three books on local history. For 10 years, he and his wife ran a Vienna antiques store called Antiques Uniques. He was a former president of the Fairfax Historical Society and the recipient of an award in 2012 from the Stuart-Mosby Historical Society as a “consummate and exemplary Virginia gentleman.”

For 25 years, Stuntz was in the CIA, serving in Nicaragua and Japan and at the agency’s headquarters in Langley, Va.

He would say only that he was “an intelligence officer.” “He was James Bond, Robert E. Lee and William Faulkner,” observed a friend and retired Navy officer, Tom Aanstoos.

Stuntz was 97 when he died May 9 at the Virginian, a retirement center in Fairfax

County, Va. He had a heart attack, said his daughter, Anne Stuntz.

Mayo Sturdevant Stuntz was born Oct. 15, 1915, in Vienna, Va., which would be his lifelong home.

He was a descendant of the Fitzhugh family, which has been in Virginia since colonial times. Fitzhughs were friends with George and Martha Washington and later neighbors of Robert E. Lee, the Confederacy’s most successful general during the Civil War.

In 1932, Stuntz graduated from Oakton High School in Virginia. As a teenager, he

worked in hotels in Virginia and North Carolina, and he later studied hotel management at Cornell University. He was drafted into the Army before receiving a degree.

As a child, Stuntz picked up a soft Southern accent and a courtly deference to others, both of which he would retain all his life.

His World War II service was primarily with the Alamo Scouts, an all-volunteer unit made up of small teams operating from a base in New Guinea.

Their missions included forays deep into Japanese-held territory to attack enemy

installations and to gather intelligence including the locations and movements of enemy troop and supply ships.

Because the Alamo Scouts were a unique military unit, there was no prescribed table of organization setting forth the supplies and equipment to which they were entitled, said Zedric, the “Silent Warriors” author. Stuntz relied on his own wit and persuasion to get his troops what they needed: rubber rafts, paddles, special weapons, ammunition, climbing gear, shovels, rain gear, hip boots and knives large enough to clear paths in dense tropical jungles.

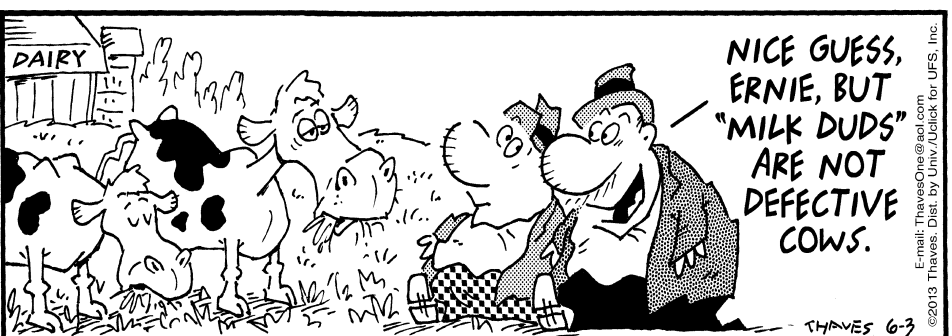
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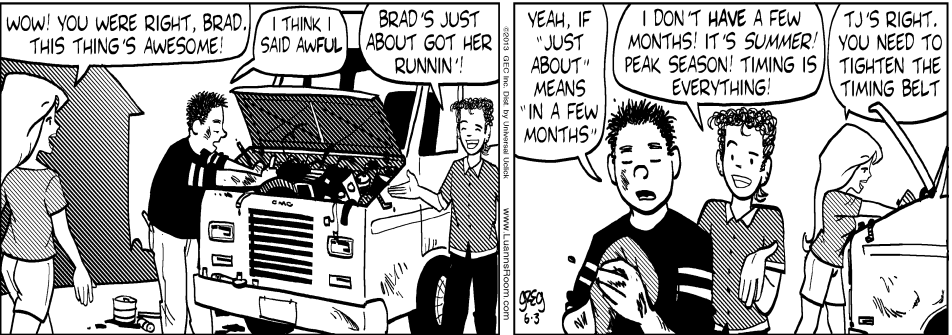

Editor’s note: Randy Stapilus will address the Twin Falls Rotary Club at noon on Wednesday, June 5, at the Turf Club. He will be joined by Chris Carlson, author of the book “Cecil Andrus: Idaho’s Greatest Governor.” The public is invited to attend.

Since 1981, the four states of Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana have — under terms of a federal law signed into effect early that year — created and formed a joint agency aimed at planning for electric power production and resource (especially fish) production, and meshing the two goals together. It is now, after a name change a while back, called the Northwest Power and Conservation Council, and it is based at Portland.

It’s a fair-sized agency, starting with a council that has two members from each of the four states, and including staff at Portland and elsewhere. For decades, it has rolled along, often not much noticed by the public or many other people aside from the Bonneville Power Administration, with which it is required to work. It delivers occasional reports and recommendations.



Here’s a little secret few people probably have ever realized: All it would take to eliminate this agency is for three of the four state governors to agree to end it. That’s it: The Council would then vanish.

That’s one point about the council that its very first member, Idahoan Chris Carlson, makes in his new book *Medimont Reflections: 40 Years of Issues and Idahoans*. (Disclosure: I’m the publisher of that book, which is being released right about now, through Ridenbaugh Press.) You can find this highly obscure dissolution provision in the Northwest Power Planning Act at section 839b(b)(5)(A). If the governors invoked it the Council would be gone, period.

Here’s another point Carlson makes: The governors should use that authority and eliminate the council.

The idea of eliminating a government agency most of ten comes up as parcel of an ideological harangue. It ought to be more specific than that. The usefulness of specific programs, efforts and lines of spending is something that ought to come up for regular review, in ways they usually don’t now.

In a chapter called “The Toothless Tiger,” former member Carlson has this to say about the Council: ‘Candidly, it has been a gargantuan waste and its shortcomings in not producing a viable plan to restore wild salmon and steelhead fishery runs decimated by the four lower Snake River dams is prime reason to put the Council out of its misery. They shoot horses with broken legs, don’t they? The council has broken legs, as well as arms, feet, hands, and head. It too should, in an act of compassion, be eliminated. The governors should act, and act now.’

Apart from some amusing description of his own experience and brief membership on it (there’s some clear-eyed description of the sausage-making involved), Carlson points out that it has done little either to foster more electric power development — a less troubling issue now than it was then — and little to help the salmon runs whose preservation was a key reason for the council’s invention. Some of its original advocates suggested it might be the basic policy-maker for federal power in the region, but Carlson writes that it was co-opted by the BPA and merely offers easily bypassed advisory opinions.

He suggested, as an option, instead that a board of directors for BPA ought to be set up, one with actual ability to impose direction on that agency. It might work. At least as well.

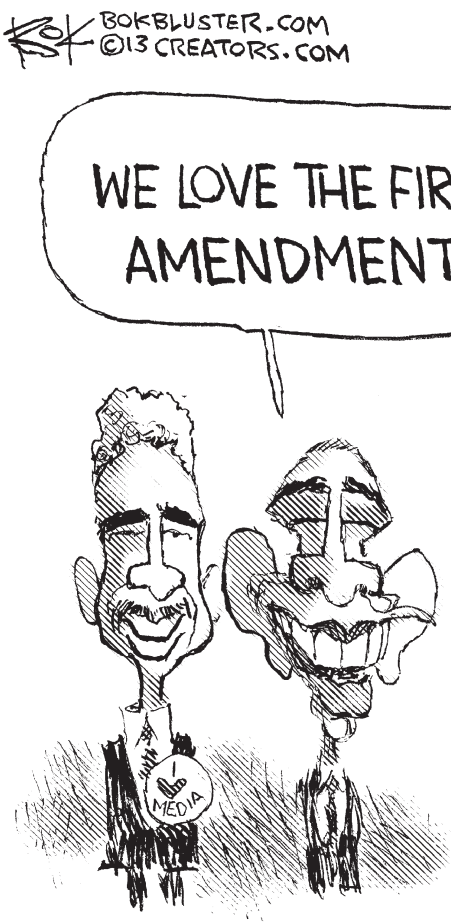

# Don’t Mess with the State Lottery

Philip Allaire had a really great idea. Using his skills as a businessman, Allaire posed a plan to help the Nampa School District escape from a \$5 million deficit. He created a nonprofit, Enriching Endowments, proposed selling raffle tickets for homes he purchased and would use the proceeds to pay down the school district’s accounting mess.

The *Idaho Press-Tribune* opined on Friday that Allaire’s proposal was not grounded in reality, magnanimous but not fully vetted, because the proposal got sideways with Idaho state lottery officials who say the plan violated state regulations.

Because the state lottery objected, Allaire gave up on his proposal.

“The irony of the situation is that the same form of bureaucracy and incompetence of government that created the financial crisis we currently face is now preventing a common sense and cost effective solution,” he wrote in a press release. “Had it not been for the obstinate atti-

tude and positions of the Idaho lottery, the generosity of the community would have provided a solution to the financial troubles that have threatened the future of Nampa’s students.”

He’s absolutely right. Allaire’s proposition put some creativity in the mix. It was a private, nonprofit, charitable solution. The *Press-Tribune* accuses Allaire of not fully airing his idea with lawyers before going public with his plan.

But under-reported in the press is Allaire’s side of the story. From the same statement released to the media, Allaire claims the Idaho lottery obstructed his plan from the beginning. He said the lottery’s position regarding online raffle ticket sales, end dates for drawings and prize donations are not based in Idaho law. But Allaire says he has no desire to spend time and energy in a legal tussle with the state lottery.

It is unfortunate that the blame in all of this has been placed on a private citizen who thrust himself into the spotlight to help his community. The blame should really be placed on the policymakers and bureaucracy that have created a regulatory barrier to a plan that would help students, parents and teachers in the Nampa School District. Whether Allaire is right or the lottery is right doesn’t matter. Either way, government stands in the way of enabling a free-market solution from occurring.

Where is the outrage at government for making it harder to solve this problem? Where is the outrage at government for standing in the way of a solution that required no additional taxes and had the potential to stop or offset serious cuts to the Nampa school system? Where is the outrage at government for failing to help Allaire make his plan become reality? Where is the outrage at government for having a thicket of regulations that make it so that an individual who comes forward with an

idea cannot determine if it is legal or not, or has to battle to prove that it is permissible?

This reminds me of a case a few years ago where volunteer doctors arrived in Joplin, Mo., site of a devastating tornado, to offer free eye exams and glasses. They were told to go home because they weren’t licensed to practice medicine in that state. Then as now, certain sectors of the community were upset with the doctors for failing to acquire the proper documentation or to “fully vet their idea” before arriving to provide aid.

Once again, a Good Samaritan has raced to help the community, not because he was compelled, but because he cares. Because he didn’t want students like mine, parents like me and teachers like the ones who teach my kids to suffer. And once again, government has stepped in to shut it down at great cost to the community and the giving nature of people like Philip Allaire.

### Public Invited to Attend Morrisite Descendent Reunion

Why would you invite people to a reunion who may have never met? The community of Soda Springs, the Presto Preservation Association and the Caribou County Sesquicentennial Committee are planning to have a “reunion” of Morrisite descendants on Aug. 4 this year.

Soda Springs was founded in 1863 by a beleaguered group of Morrisites and others who came into the newly formed Idaho Territory under military escort. The Morrisites were followers of Joseph Morris. The group broke away from The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, rejecting some tenants of that religion at the time.

Morris, who thought he was a prophet, had predicted the second coming of Jesus, repeatedly, in 1862 when he and his flock of some 300 followers were holed up in Kingston Fort near present day South Weber, Utah. Morris and several others were killed when the Utah Territorial Militia attempted to free two men who wanted

to leave the sect and who were being held in the fort against their will. The story is complex. That’s part of the reason for the “reunion.” We want to put Morrisite descendants in touch with each other so they can learn more about their mutual history.

It is especially appropriate during this sesquicentennial of Idaho Territory, which coincides with the sesquicentennial of Caribou County.

Time is quickly running out for the U.S. Postal Service to survive, which needs no tax dollars whatsoever to effectively operate.

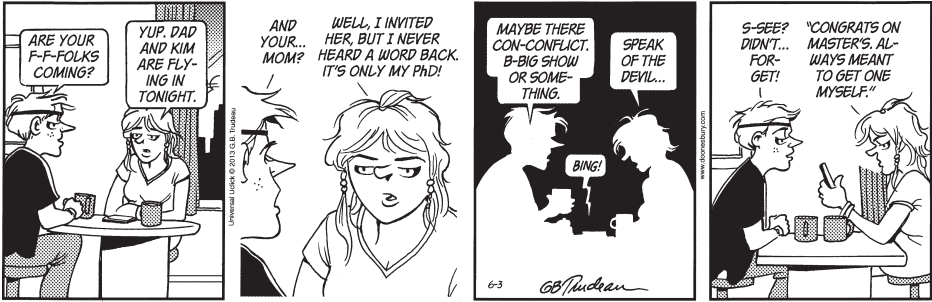
Congress controls the future of the USPS and needs to remove a crushing

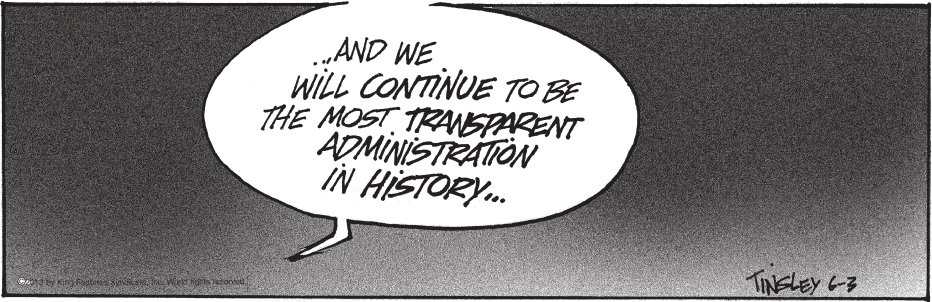

## A LIFE REMEMBERED

## A Counselor Dedicated to Helping Children

**TWIN FALLS •** As rain lightly fell outside, Jay Reis took a phone call from a customer inside the office of his third-generation family business in Filer.

Then, as he leaned back in his chair at Reis Plumbing & Heating, he started talking about his mother Jane's influence.

"My mother was basically all about kids," he told me, whether they were her biological children or those she counseled at school.

Twin Falls resident Catherine Jane Reis, 63, died May 14.

Jane spent nearly 20 years working as a counselor at Magic Valley High School, an alternative school in Twin Falls, until she retired in 2010.

"In everybody's eyes, she was there to serve a purpose for the kids," Jay said.

Catherine Talkington, a friend and former co-worker, said Jane's role at Magic Valley High was not only to help students finish their high school educations, but to guide them to make better choices.

"Jane was determined to help alternative school students find a better life focus," she said.

As she talked about the alternative school, Talkington said it was "kind of like the school for the kids who really were being given a second chance."

Talkington said Jane wanted community members to see that "everybody needs another chance at some point in their lives." And Magic Valley High students were seizing that opportunity.

She and Jane worked together for about 15 years at

Magic Valley High and had a friendship of nearly 25 years.

Talkington — who taught English at Magic Valley High — recalls one time when Jane organized a senior breakfast for students and all the staff members cooked.

"We all had our aprons on," she said. It provided a nice experience for students to honor them for their achievements and overcoming obstacles.

Jane said some of the students his mother helped were going through hardships, such as homelessness.

Jane took in one of Jay's friends in high school who didn't have any place to go. Jay told me about how well his friend is doing now.

In addition to working at Magic Valley High, Jane shared a private counseling practice.

Even when she wasn't at work, Jane was helping others and making sure former students were doing well.

"People would run into her at Costco," Jay said, and they'd catch up. "She was always checking on how people were doing."

Jane said his mother put him and his siblings as the No. 1 priority in her life.

"Growing up, she supported us kids with every-

thing we wanted to do," he said.

Talkington said Jane supported her children in every way she could and invested in their passions.

"Jane was thoroughly devoted to her family," Talkington said.

After her divorce in the early 1990s, Jane became a single mother to her three children.

About that time, Jay was involved in snowboarding. He recalls seeing his mother "being at the bottom of the mountain all the time" during competitions. Later, he competed in high school rodeo.

"She supported it 100 percent," Jay said. She videotaped the rodeos, even though she cringed as she watched.

Jane said his sister Jody went to Interlochen Center for the Arts in Michigan when she was 16. His sister Erin was into gymnastics. Jane supported those activities too.

"She was just there for everything we did as kids," Jay said.

More recently, Jane loved to spend time with her four grandsons.

Jane loved traveling and went to destinations such as Hawaii or Europe. For her 60th birthday, the family traveled to Barbados. A short time later, she was diagnosed with pulmonary fibrosis, a lung disease.

Talkington said Jane had a strong will and a determination "to do things and do them better."

As a young woman, Jane moved from Iowa out to the Magic Valley with her dog and horse.

"That speaks of the determined, adventurous and persevering soul that Jane had," Talkington said.

## Trinity Ridge Rehab Work Moves Forward

**BOISE •** U.S. Forest Service officials say helicopters have been dropping weed-free wheat straw in areas of the Boise National Forest damaged by last year's Trinity Ridge fire.

Project coordinator Terry Hardy says the helicopters have worked nine days dropping 1,000-pound straw bales. Hardy says more than 1,000 tons of straw are being used to cover about 1,200 acres. The work was expected to be finished Sunday at a cost of \$800,000.

Hardy says the emergency rehabilitation project will reduce risks of erosion and flash flooding.

Other rehabilitation work that started last fall will continue this summer to repair recreation trails and improve culvert road crossings.

The Trinity Ridge fire started on Aug. 3 and burned nearly 229 square miles, including popular recreation spots.

## N. Idaho Permit Scofflaws Could See Higher Fines

**SANDPOINT •** Bonner County officials in northern Idaho are looking at increasing fines for residents who put up buildings without proper permits.

The *Bonner County Daily Bee* reports that county commissioners at a public hearing on Wednesday will consider doubling the \$80 fee charged to landowners who fail to get permits for construction.

Besides the initial fee, landowners who fail to get a permit are assessed \$160 plus mileage for each additional visit county officials make to a site.

**BILLINGS, Mont. •** The Billings School District has decided to drop the "marching" part of its high school band classes.

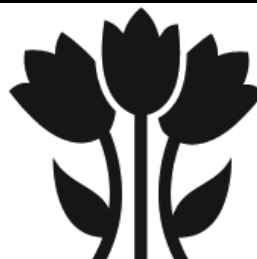
Music director Scott Corey tells *The Billings Gazette* the bands will continue to play at sporting events, but won't be playing on the field at half-time of football games.

she said.

The transmission failed on The Hulk during practice, so Johnson changed to The Pecker.

## Llama Busts Loose in Fla., Subdued with Taser

**TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)** • When Scooter the llama busted out of his penned-in yard in Tallahassee, it took three county sheriff’s deputies and a taser gun to get him back in again.

The 6-foot-tall, 7-year-old llama outran the authorities in Tallahassee for a while, even leaping over a 4-foot fence to avoid capture, Leon County Lt. Tony Drzewiecki said Sunday.

“Scooter was running in the middle of the road, so he was going to cause an accident eventually,” Drzewiecki said.

Outside of Tampa, meanwhile, authorities chased an errant kangaroo for 10 hours before finally getting close enough Sunday to stop him with tranquilizer darts.

Scooter’s owner, Jack Conrad, discovered him missing sometime Friday night and searched for him until the early morning hours of Saturday, Drzewiecki said.

Authorities also heard from concerned residents. One reported a camel on the loose; another claimed to have spied an alpaca trotting by.

# 2013 T-N Softball Player of the Year: Megan Hinojos

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**TWIN FALLS** • In much the last half of 2012, the Times-News softball player of the year Megan Hinojos was just trying to make sure she'd be a pitcher in 2013. She worked. It worked. "This was before Christmas, during the fall," Bruins first-year coach Jessica Pistole said. "She wanted it." Hinojos didn't want to catch, didn't want to have another season like last, where she pitched just a third of the team's games. Graduations opened up a spot — the spot — on the bump.

"I was kind of thrown into the situation as the only pitcher," Hinojos said. Here's how the junior responded. She pitched nearly every game, finishing with a record of 16-2. She averaged a strikeout an inning. She posted a 1.85 ERA, and walked just 26 batters. She beat Canyon Ridge twice in the District IV tournament, and then shut-out Skyview in the state tournament. She didn't

always hit, but finished with a slugging percentage of .500. "The best part (of the season) was winning the district tournament," Hinojos said. "We proved something. We could beat Canyon Ridge." Hinojos credited the team's new coach, Pistole, a former collegiate softball and volleyball player who came from a coaching job at Utah State and has already started two college softball programs in her young career, with, not surprising-

ly, "team building." "I was so much more confident in my pitching this year," Hinojos said. Confident, not just because of the work she put in, and not just because of the two new pitches she learned from Pistole, but in what would happen once she let go. Trust. "We talked with Megan all year that she didn't have to try to strike everyone out," Pistole said. "There

would be times where she'd get hit. But if she hit the spots we told her to hit, the defense would be lined up to those spots. She just needed the command to hit them." And that's where the offseason work really kicked in — Hinojos could successfully pitch to contact because she could find just the right part of the bat by going to the most appropriate part of the plate. "The hitters knew where we'd be going with the pitch," Hinojos said. But it rarely mattered. When Hinojos did her job, the defense did, too. Trust, team building, neither would have mattered had Hinojos not been determined to pitch.

# Kuchar Holds On to Win Memorial

DUBLIN, Ohio • Matt Kuchar was in a good spot Sunday at the Memorial. He had his first multiple-win season, and an audience with tournament host Jack Nicklaus.

Needing two putts from 20 feet to hold off a late charge from Kevin Chappell, Kuchar punctuated a remarkably steady final round by making the birdie putt for a 4-under 68 and a two-shot victory at Muirfield Village. He joined Tiger Woods as the only players with more than one win this year on the PGA Tour.

Kuchar, who goes to a career-best No. 4 in the world, won the Match Play Championship in late February.

Tiger Woods made another triple bogey — two shots from a bunker, three putts from 15 feet on the fringe — at the par-3 12th and had to rally for an even-par 72. Woods came into the Memorial having won three times in his last four starts, and left with the second-highest score of his career at 8-over 296.

The final round was a snoozer until the very end, when Chappell birdied three of his last four holes. His approach to the 18th settled within tap-in range for birdie, putting a little extra pressure on Kuchar. When the putt dropped, he flashed that easy smile and thrust his fist into the air as his 3-year-old son Carson gave Nicklaus a high-five.

“This is such an amazing feeling. This never gets old,” said Kuchar, who won for the sixth time in his career. “To have Jack Nicklaus congratulate me is a real treat. This is as special as it gets.”

Chappell, who missed four birdie attempts inside 10 feet on the front nine, closed with a 4-under 68.

“He’s world class with that putter, and I figured it was over with,” Chappell said of Kuchar’s final putt.

# Stewart Wins Cup Race at Dover

DOVER, Del. • With one big move, Tony Stewart put Juan Pablo Montoya and a slugish season well behind him.

After a mundane start, Stewart is back in Victory Lane — and in the thick of Chase contention.

Stewart’s outside pass on Montoya with three laps left was enough to win Sunday at Dover International Speedway and snap a 30-race winless streak.

“Our guys at our shop have been digging,” Stewart said. “None of these guys get down. We have been down, but they haven’t gotten down. That is what carries you to days like today at the end of the day.”

Stewart was stuck in 20th in the standings and didn’t

even have a top-finish before he rallied in Dover. Stewart hadn’t won on the concrete mile track since he swept both Cup races in 2000.

The No. 14 team erupted in celebration in the pits after winning for the first time since last July in Daytona.

It was a long time coming for the two-time Cup champ.

“It’s been such a tough year,” Stewart said.

It got a little easier Sunday. Stewart stoutly defended crew chief Steve Addington’s performance this year and thanked Hendrick Motorsports for supplying engines to his Stewart-Haas Racing team.

He also knows their work is far from finished.

“We realize this could put the 14 team in contention to

make the Chase,” he said. “That’s not good enough.”

Meaning, he wants to not only make the 12-driver field, but know he’s a top contender to win another championship. His 48th career win pushed him to 16th in the points standings and aided his cause for a wild-card spot. The two drivers in the 11th to 20th spot in the standings with the most wins earn a slot in the Chase for the Sprint Cup championship. Stewart is the only driver in those spots with a win.

“It’s been very hard when you have the start of the season that we had,” Stewart said. “You start questioning, you start doubting, you start looking for answers that you don’t have the knowledge to diagnose. That makes you feel very helpless at times.”

# Blackhawks Beat Kings to Take 2-0 Lead in Series

CHICAGO • Bryan Bickell and Michal Handzus scored on consecutive shots in the second period, and the Chicago Blackhawks chased goalie Jonathan Quick on their way to a 4-2 victory over the Los Angeles Kings on Sunday night in Game 2 of the Western Conference finals.

Andrew Shaw and Brent Seabrook also scored as the rolling Blackhawks grabbed a 2-0 lead in the best-of-seven series with their fifth consecutive victory. Patrick Sharp added two assists, and Corey Crawford made 29 saves in another

solid performance.

Game 3 is Tuesday night at Los Angeles, where the Kings have won 14 consecutive games, dating to the regular season. The Kings also lost their first two games of the playoffs at St. Louis before winning four straight to eliminate the Blues in the first round.

Jeff Carter and Tyler Toffoli scored for Los Angeles, but the Kings struggled to score while playing without Mike Richards, who was scratched because of an undisclosed upper body injury. The defending Stanley Cup champions have 29 goals in 15 postseason games.

Richards, who leads the

team with 10 playoff points, was sidelined after taking a big hit from Dave Bolland in the final minutes of the Blackhawks’ 2-1 victory on Saturday.

Kings coach Darryl Sutter said Richards was “fine” a couple of hours before the game, but the center was scratched from the lineup.

Los Angeles forward Brad Richardson and defenseman Drew Doughty gingerly skated off at separate points of the first period, but both returned to the ice.

The series took on a more physical tone in the second game in two days — a rarity in the playoffs brought on by The Rolling Stones’ tour.

# Federer Comes Back to Beat Simon at French Open

PARIS • Chasing a shot, Roger Federer caught his right shoe in the French Open’s red clay, twisting that foot awkwardly and tumbling to the ground.

Soon enough, he was in a real rut, in danger of his earliest exit from a Grand Slam tournament in nine years.

Federer regrouped and restored order eventually, coming back from a two-sets-to-one deficit to beat 15th-seeded Gilles Simon of France 6-1, 4-6, 2-6, 6-2, 6-3 Sunday in the fourth round to reach his 36th consecutive major quarterfinal.

“I didn’t hurt myself or anything,” Federer said. “But maybe I did lose that touch of confidence for a little bit, and then I was out of the match there for a bit.”

During a rare stretch of mid-match mediocrity from the owner of a record 17 Grand Slam championships — the 2009 French Open trophy is part of his collection — Federer lost 10 of 13 games, including the one in which he fell.

“I didn’t give him time,” said Simon, a one-time Grand Slam quarterfinalist.

But Simon could not keep Federer down. Able to “tidy up my play,” as he put it, Federer went from hitting more than twice as many unforced errors as Simon in the second and third sets, 25-12, to generating more than twice as many winners in the third and fourth, 29-14.

His message was clear: Get ready for Game 7.

Here comes the ultimate game. To the winner, a trip to the NBA Finals. To the loser, an offseason loaded with regret. It’s that simple now for the champion Heat and the confident Pacers, who meet in Game 7 of the Eastern Conference finals Monday night in Miami — a perk the Heat earned by finishing with the league’s best record this season.

“Each and every year there are 30 teams that would love to be a part of this, to have one game to advance to the NBA Finals,” James said. “And there’s two teams that’s in this position. And it’s something that you can’t substitute, this feeling. You can’t substitute the atmosphere that we’re going to be in on Monday night for both teams. We should all

cherish this moment.”

When it’s over Monday, only one club will be cherishing the outcome.

For the Heat, it’s a chance to move into the finals for the third straight year and keep hope alive of winning a second straight title. For the Pacers, it’s a chance to cap what would surely go into the books as one of the biggest upsets in NBA playoff history, considering that they finished 16½ games behind the Heat in the regular season.

None of that matters much now. The Pacers have beaten Miami five of nine times this season. They need a sixth, or else it was all for naught.

“It is a closeout game and an elimination game,” Pacers coach Frank Vogel said. “Our approach right now is not if we lose we’re out — our approach is if we win, we get to the finals. And that’s what we’re going for. We’re going to give our best shot and try to win the Eastern Conference championship.”

Monday’s winner will open the NBA Finals on Thursday against San Antonio.

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

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

Consider just the North and South hands today. You are declaring three no-trump, West leads the spade jack, and dummy’s king wins the trick. How do you plan to make nine tricks?

You should call for the club five from dummy at trick two, intending to play the nine from hand. This is a plan that succeeds against all 3-2 club breaks as well as 4-1 divisions so long as the singleton is either the ace or the jack — and may do even better if the defenders slip. Suppose the full deal is as shown in the diagram.

When the club five is led at trick two, East can do no better than play the club jack and return a spade. A second club is led to dummy’s king, and East is fixed. The best he can do is to take his club ace and shift to a heart, holding declarer to nine tricks.

There are two traps to avoid. The first is coming to hand with a diamond to run the club eight. East will win the club jack and exit with a heart on the above layout. In this variation, West would win and shift to his remaining diamond, and the contract would collapse around your ears. The second trap to avoid is that you must not lead the club king at trick two. On this layout, East allows the king to hold, and you would never be able to establish any more tricks in the club suit.

ANSWER: Dummy rates to be close to entryless. Which of the four suit-leads will give declarer a finesse he cannot take for himself? This is very close, but I’ll go with the diamond lead because of the slim chance that repeated diamond leads might promote my heart 10 to an additional trump trick.

On June 3, 1963, Pope John XXIII died at age 81, ending a relatively brief but highly influential 4½-year papacy; he was succeeded by Pope Paul VI.

**On this date:**  
**In 1808**, Confederate President Jefferson Davis was born in Christian County, Ky.

**In 1888**, the poem “Casey at the Bat,” by Ernest Lawrence Thayer, was first published in the San Francisco Daily Examiner.

**In 1937**, Edward, The Duke of Windsor, who had abdicated the British throne, married Wallis Warfield Simpson in a private ceremony in Monts, France.

**In 1943**, Los Angeles saw the beginning of its “Zoot Suit Riots” as white servicemen clashed with young Latinos wearing distinctive-looking zoot suits; the violence finally ended when military officials declared the city off limits to enlisted personnel.

**In 1948**, the 200-inch reflecting Hale Telescope at the Palomar Mountain Observatory in California was dedicated.

**In 1962**, Air France Flight 007, a U.S.-bound Boeing 707, crashed while attempting to take off from Orly Airport near Paris; all but two of the 132 people aboard were killed.

**In 1963**, a Northwest Orient Airlines DC-7 military charter en route from McChord Air Force Base in Washington state to Elmendorf Air Force Base in Alaska crashed off Annette Island with the loss of all 101 people aboard.

**In 1965**, astronaut Edward White became the first American to “walk” in space during the flight of Gemini 4.

**In 1972**, Sally J. Priesand was ordained as America’s first female rabbi at the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in Cincinnati, Ohio.

**In 1983**, Gordon Kahl, a militant tax protester wanted in the slayings of two U.S. marshals in North Dakota, was killed in a gun battle with law-enforcement officials near Smithville, Ark.

**In 1989**, Iran’s spiritual leader, Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, died. Chinese army troops began their sweep of Beijing to crush student-led pro-democracy demonstrations. SkyDome (now called Rogers Centre) opened in Toronto, Ontario, Canada.

**Ten years ago:** World leaders closed out a summit in Evian, France, by pledging to rebuild Iraq and combat the threat of nuclear weapons in Iran and North Korea. Arab leaders pledged to renounce terror and help end violence against Israel, standing in solidarity with President George W. Bush at a summit in Egypt. Sammy Sosa was ejected in the first inning of Chicago’s 3-2 win over the Tampa Bay Devil Rays after umpires found cork in his shattered bat.

**Five years ago:** Barack Obama claimed the Democratic presidential nomination in a long-time-coming victory speech, speaking in the same St. Paul, Minn., arena that would be hosting the Republican national convention in September 2008. Astronauts installed a 37-foot-long Japanese lab at the international space station.

**One year ago:** A Dana Air MD-83 jetliner carrying 153 people crashed on the outskirts of Lagos, Nigeria, killing everyone on board and at least 10 people on the ground. George Zimmerman, the former neighborhood watch volunteer charged with killing Trayvon Martin, surrendered to police and was booked into a central Florida jail two days after his bond was revoked. The River Thames became a royal highway as Queen Elizabeth II led a motley but majestic flotilla of more than 1,000 vessels to mark her Diamond Jubilee. Tiger Woods birdied three of his last four holes to win the Memorial, closing with a 5-under 67. Olivia Culpo, a 20-year-old cellist from Rhode Island, won the Miss USA crown in Las Vegas.

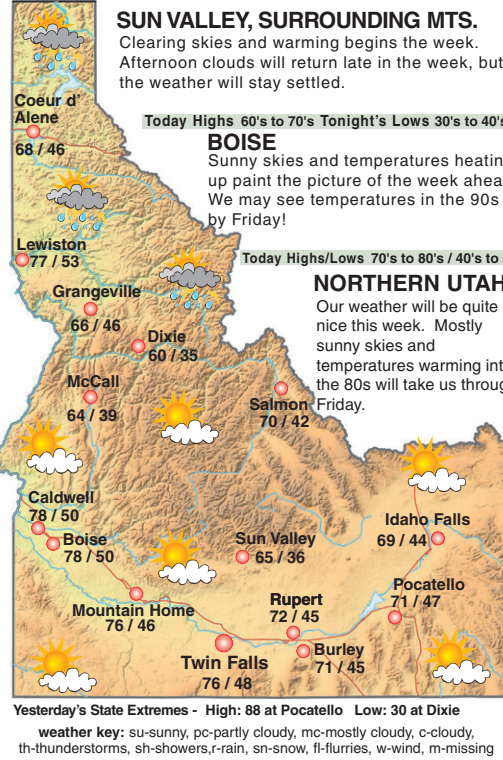
