Asphalt Distribution Plant Opening in Twin Falls

Development surprise to mayor and chamber CEO.

TWIN FALLS • One of the largest asphalt producers in the Magic Valley is opening a distribution facility in Twin Falls, with 500 tons of the rocky sludge on hand to tackle "a project of any size," Times-News learned Wednesday.

Burley-based distributor Kloepfer Inc. set its sights on Twin Falls because of increasing demand for asphalt, said coowner John Kloepfer.

"It's a good time do something like this," he said. "We've always looked at the market. We just didn't feel like there was room for a third player, but now changing conditions have opened up opportunities for us to move in."

The third player, Gordon Paving in Twin Falls, was one of the largest asphalt distributors in the region. But it auctioned off millions of dollars in equipment last year, said city spokesman Josh Palmer. Before Gordon downsized, he said, the company's front yard was full of equipment. Now it's an empty field.

Gordon Paving has downsized to the point where they're no longer handling a lot of commercial or industrial projects," Palmer said. "Within the city of Twin Falls, we expect to see an increase (in demand) with the canyon

rim development."

That enormous outdoor mall currently is under construction. Kloepfer "will make it more competitive for bids. Not only the city, but the taxpayer will appreciate," Palmer said.

Mayor Greg Lanting and Shawn Barigar, president and CEO of the Chamber of Commerce, both said they didn't know that Kloepfer was opening a distribution facility

Idaho Sand and Gravel Co. in Jerome is the largest asphalt distributor in the area. When Kloepfer opens June 18, it will be one of Idaho Sand's greatest competitors.

"We're closer to a lot of highway districts at this end of town,"

said co-owner Larry Kloepfer. "...Our motto is 'When Perfor-

mance Counts." The availability of asphalt doesn't mean the city will use it, said City Manager Travis Rothweiler.

"It's really hard for us just to pick an asphalt company. Most of what we do is through a competitive bid process," he said. "Certainly they're a quality company. Being located in Twin Falls makes them an option. We still have to

Police Say Parolee Was **Trafficking** Meth

TWIN FALLS • A Twin Falls man on parole for a drug charge was trafficking methamphetamine out of his home, Twin Falls police say.

John E. Ash, 53, was arraigned on a charge of meth trafficking Tuesday in Twin Falls County District Court.

Police say Ash had more than an ounce of meth and \$741 cash when he was apprehended Monday.

After receiving tips of meth sales at the High Desert Trailer Court, police began surveillance.

A blue Chevrolet truck with expired tags began to leave the trailer park about 9 p.m. Monday, police report. They stopped the truck and identified Ash and his passenger as parolees.

Parolees are not allowed to associate with one another.

The passenger, Shawn Bradshaw, was arrested on a felony probation violation.

"I learned Ash was on parole for possession of a controlled substance, and since they were leaving a location suspected for drug sales, I asked them if I could check them for illegal substances," Officer Ken Rivers

Ash stepped out of the truck with a plastic bag of meth in his pocket, the report says, and another bag of meth was found inside a phone case in the truck's center console.


though, because its county attorney, Lance Stevenson, interpreted the law differently.

Weak Signals On the Economy Send Stocks Plunging

NEW YORK (AP) · A series of weak economic reports sent the stock market plunging to its lowest level in a month on Wednesday.

Companies like miners, banks and chemical makers, whose fortunes are most closely tied to the prospects for growth, led the market lower.

The troubling data included weak hiring at private companies, a plunge in mortgage applications and sluggish orders to U.S. factories.

The Dow Jones industrial average fell 217 points and finished at 14,960, a drop of 1.4 percent.



Shoshone Falls: An Unfulfilled Memorial

SHOSHONE FALLS • Before potatoes

- and Evel Knievel - the Niagara of the West was this valley's claim to fame.

"It is hard to imagine anything in nature more picturesque or sublime," visitor Charles Nelson Teeter wrote in 1865.

In 1900, proponents tried to have Shoshone Falls designated as a national park. Congress opposed the move, but the falls captured the nation's attention. That October, the Chicago Tribune devoted a full page to photos of Shoshone Falls, Twin Falls and Blue Lakes.

The scenic view of the falls begged for more recognition. At the end of World War I, a memorial park, dedicated to returning war heroes, was proposed for

the falls on the south side of the Snake River Canyon. The Shoshone Falls Memorial Park Association was organized in 1919.

That summer, the association's board hired young California landscape architect Florence Yoch to draft a plan for an elaborate park, complete with trees, benches and resting areas.

Yoch blazed a trail through a maledominated profession and became nationally known for her architectural designs. She later designed the David O. Selznick estate in Beverly Hills, the Getty House gardens in Los Angeles, and various landscapes for film sets, including Tara in "Gone With the Wind?

The canyon land south of the Snake River, however, was owned by various entities – private and public – making the park plan nearly impossible to implement. The Twin Falls County commissioners proposed a memorial bridge to span the Snake River Canyon at Shoshone Falls as an alternative to the

Neither project got past the drawing board at the time, but the land eventually was donated to the city of Twin Falls and developed into today's park.

Idaho Resurrects Child Fatality Review Panel

BOISE • Idaho is no longer the only state without a panel that reviews circumstances surrounding child deaths.

The 13-member Idaho Child Fatality Review Team was re-invigorated this year following an executive order from Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter to focus on ways to prevent kids from dying. The team will meet in July to review cases of children who died in automobile accidents, in hopes of helping prevent future fatalities.

Idaho first had such a team in 1998. Then-Gov. Phil Batt created it after reports Idaho had a higher childhood death rate than the U.S. average. But it was disbanded after just three years.

Subsequent efforts to re-

new the panel failed in the Legislature, on lawmakers' concerns it might be too intrusive for law enforcement or lead to criminal charges against parents.

Consequently, the new panel's members say their aims are limited: To analyze circumstances under which children have died to help determine if they can be avoided in the future — without giving police, local coroners or even grieving moms and dads the feeling they're breathing down their backs.

"We're not here to secondguess people involved in these cases," said Jerrilea Archer, a retired Ada County Sheriff's Department child abuse investigator who coordinates the review team, on Monday. "We're only here to protect children and make sure there isn't a glaring 'something'

that is continuously being done (in fatal instances) that hasn't been addressed."

Its members include state epidemiologist Christine Hahn, as well as private doctors, nurses, lawyers and Department of Health and Welfare employees.

Fifteen years ago, Batt created the state's first child mortality review team. What emerged were recommendations that Idaho focus education on the proper use of child safety restraints, as well as tougher laws against seatbelt scofflaws.

But the group broke up after 2000. Among other things, some members worried they might be subpoenaed to testify in court cases involving deaths they reviewed.

That left Idaho as the only state without such a panel, though some counties had review boards of their own.

Efforts to re-establish a statewide group in the Idaho Legislature in 2008 and 2009 failed. In 2009, for instance, a measure passed in the House but was blocked in the Senate by foes who said they feared it would target individual parents whose kids had died in accidents.

To allay those worries, this latest group is careful to say that's not part of its mission, as it seeks not to arouse suspicions in libertarian Idaho that it will meddle too deeply into family life.

"This child fatality review team is not an activist group, nor is it a lobbying group," said Kirt Naylor, a child advocate lawyer and chairman of the Governor's Task Force on Children at Risk, which chose the review team's members.

More on Southern Idaho's Wind

o matter how long I have been a meteorologist, the weather always finds a way to amaze me. I enjoy experiencing how the winds, at or slightly after sunset, seem to dramatically decrease or stop. This is not true every day, but it happens frequently.

To understand why, you have to understand what causes wind. As noted in previous columns, we have wind because of pressure changes across the area or region. Wind wants to go from high pressure to low pressure, just as a ball atop a hill wants to roll to the lowest point. The steeper the hill, the faster the ball will roll down it. With wind, the

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greater the difference between high and low pressure over a short distance, the faster the winds will

Another driving factor for wind and wind speed is a difference in temperatures. Across Southern Idaho, we can experience radical temperature changes from mountains to valley and even from Burley to Twin Falls. These temperature fluctuations also can cause pressure differences. In summer, for example,

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winds start calm and light in the morning. But as the day wears on and the sun provides significant heat, the winds increase. The air rises when it's warmed, and other air rushes in to replace it. This creates low pressure, and winds begin to increase from calm to perhaps 10 to 15 mph. So when we lose daytime heating from the sun at sunset, the winds quickly die down as the air stabilizes and cools.

Weather remains quiet and warm over the next several days with little to no

rain. Temperatures will rise into the 80s and even 90s as we head into the weekend. We'll have possible breezy conditions Friday with our next real shot at rain not coming until Tuesday. Love to answer more of your weather questions. Feel free to ask.

Churches Split on Scouts' Gay Policy

In suburban Atlanta, northern Idaho and a number of other places, churches have moved swiftly to sever ties with the Boy Scouts of America in protest over the vote last month to let openly gay boys participate in Scouting.

To date, it's far from the mass defection that some conservatives had predicted before the vote by the BSA's National Council. But the exodus could soon swell, depending on the outcome of the Southern Baptist Convention's annual meeting next week in Houston.

Baptist leaders say the agenda is likely to include a resolution encouraging SBC-affiliated churches to phase out their sponsorships of Scout units.

"I would bet there would be a resolution expressing disappointment with the Boy Scouts' decision and calling on Southern Baptist churches to prepare for the need for alternatives," said the Rev. Russell Moore, president of the SBC's Ethics and Religious Liberty Commission.

"How quickly that happens will probably differ from congregation to congregation," Moore said. "I do think most Southern Baptists see the Boy Scouts moving in a direction that's not going to be consistent with our beliefs."

The Southern Baptists the largest Protestant denomination in the U.S. - already have a youth program for boys, the Royal Ambassadors. SBC leaders have suggested it could expand to accommodate boys leaving the Scouts.

According to BSA figures, Baptist churches sponsor Scout units serving about 108,000 of the BSA's 2.6 million youth members.

In Marietta, Ga., pastor Ernest Easley said his Roswell Street Baptist Church is ending its affiliation with Boy Scout Troop 204 that dates back to 1945.

"I never dreamed I'd have to stand up publicly and say to parents: 'Pull your kids out of the Boy Scouts," Easley told Baptist Press, the SBC's official news agency.

Baptist churches in Elizabethtown and Rineyville, Ky., Helena and Pelham, Ala., and Jacksonville, Ark., also say they're cutting ties with the BSA.

Tim Reed, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Gravel Ridge in Jacksonville, said in an email that his congregation - including a 15year-old boy on track to win the coveted Eagle Scout rank - strongly backed the decision to end sponsorship of a Scout troop.

"He was set to be one of the youngest boys to make Eagle," Reed wrote. "He said that he must uphold God's word over the Boy Scouts' decision no matter what the personal cost."

Among the latest to cut ties was Candlelight Christian Fellowship, a nondenominational church in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, which announced this week that it would end its charter of a Boy Scout troop at the end of this year.

"We're a Bible-believing church, and the Boy Scouts have opted to pursue a different moral path," said the associate pastor, Buck Storm. "It's a sad time for

vidual Methodist leaders have been critical, while the General Commission on United Methodist Men, which oversees the denomination's youth programs, says it will continue to support Scouting.

Similar divisions have surfaced within the Roman Catholic Church, the thirdlargest Scout sponsor serving about 273,000 youths.

A Catholic pastor in Bremerton, Wash., the Rev. Derek Lappe of Our Lady Star of the Sea, wrote an open letter to his parishioners announcing that the parish would cut its ties with the Scouts and develop new youth programs of its own.

"I am very aware that my objection to the change ... is increasingly considered bigoted and backward," Lappe wrote. "But I won't put public opinion ahead of the good of the boys and young men in my parish."

In the Chicago suburb of Crystal Lake, the pastor of St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Catholic Church notified local Scout leaders that the church would no longer sponsor a Cub Scout pack and Boy Scout troop. In a letter conveying the decision, the Rev. Brian Grady wrote that it would be "not only unjust, but immoral" for straight boys to have to share tents on camping trips with gay Scouts.

Monsanto Says **Modified Wheat** 'Isolated Occurrence'

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) •A genetically modified test strain of wheat that emerged to the surprise of an Oregon farmer last month was likely the result of an accident or deliberate mixing of seeds, the company that developed it said Wednesday.

Representatives Monsanto Co. said during a conference call that the emergence of the genetically modified strain was an isolated occurrence. It has tested the original wheat stock and found it clean, the company said.

Sabotage is a possibility, said Robb Fraley, Monsanto chief technology officer.

"We're considering all options and that's certainly one of the options," Fraley

Fraley said the company has a test it has shared with other countries that could "fingerprint" the exact variety of wheat that carried the gene, and it's awaiting samples from the U.S. Department of Agriculture or the Oregon farmer to test for the exact variety that emerged.

The USDA has said the Oregon wheat is safe to eat and there is no evidence that modified wheat entered the marketplace. No genetically engineered wheat has been approved for U.S. farming.

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack said he would not address Monsanto's suggestions that it could have been sabotage.

"I'm not going to speculate on what could or couldn't have happened," Vilsack told reporters in

Washington, Wednesday. "Because you could go down that road and we'd be here all day."

Fifteen inspectors from the USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service are working on the investigation.

Vilsack said the department's priorities are to investigate and also to focus on getting markets open as quickly as they can after some overseas markets balked at the discovery of the modified crop. He said the department believes it is an isolated situation because tests in the farmer's adjoining fields have turned up negative, as have tests on neighboring fields

He said the South Korean government had notified USDA on Wednesday that tests so far on wheat and flour had showed no indication of contamination.

Consumers' unease with genetically modified crops, particularly those in Europe and Asia, led St. Louis-based Monsanto to end the testing of modified wheat in 2005.

Many countries will not accept imports of genetically modified foods, and the United States exports about half of its wheat crop. Since the announcement of the discovery of the genetically modified wheat in Oregon, Japan one of the largest export markets for U.S. wheat growers – suspended some imports. South Korea said it would increase its inspections of U.S. wheat imports.







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Panel: Fertility Drugs, Nature Better Than Wild Horse Roundups

RENO, Nev. (AP) • A scathing independent scientific review of wild horse roundups in the West concludes the U.S. government would be better off investing in widespread fertility control of the mustangs and let nature cull any excess herds instead of spending millions to house them in overflowing holding pens.

A 14-member panel assembled by the National Science Academy's National Research Council, at the request of the Bureau of Land Management, concluded BLM's removal of nearly 100,000 horses from the Western range over the past decade is probably having the opposite effect of its intention to ease ecological damage and reduce overpopulated herds.

By stepping in prematurely when food and water supplies remain adequate, and with most natural predators long gone, the land management agency is producing artificial conditions that ultimately serve to perpetuate population growth, the committee said Wednesday in a 451-page report recommending more emphasis on the use of contraceptives and other methods of fertility

The research panel sympathized with BLM's struggle to find middle ground between horse advocates and ranchers who see the animals as unwelcome competitors for forage. It noted there's "little if any public support" for allowing harm to come to either the horses or the rangeland itself.

The report says the current method may work in the short term, but results in continually high population growth, exacerbating the long-term problem.

The American Wild Horse Preservation Fund, a national coalition of more than 50 advocacy groups, said the report makes a strong case for an immediate halt to the roundups that livestock ranchers say are necessary to protect the range and provide their sheep and cattle with a fair share of forage.

"This is a turning point for the decades-long fight to protect America's mustangs," said Neda DeMayo, president of the coalition's Return to Freedom.

The National Cattlemen's Beef Association is among the livestock groups that have voiced support in the past for aggressive, increased use of fertility control but remain adamantly opposed to curtailing roundups. Horse advocates themselves are not united behind the idea of stepping up use of contraception on the range.



ence recommends stopping cruel roundups, but we challenge their decision to control alleged overpopulation like a domestic herd with humans deciding who survives and breeds," said Anne Novak, executive director of Protect Mustangs in San Francisco.

The conflict has raged for decades but has intensified in recent years for cashstrapped federal land managers with skyrocketing bills for food and corrals and no room for incoming animals.

"The business as usual practices are not going to be effective without additional resources," said Guy Palmer, a pathologist from Washington State University who chaired the research committee.

Rep. Raul Grijalva, D-Ariz., said the report should serve as a wakeup call to bring changes he and others in Congress have urged for

"These unsustainable practices are a waste of taxpayer money and jeopardize the health and safety of wild horses across the West," he

BLM officials said they

welcomed the recommendations to help in their effort to make the program more cost-effective. Spokesman Tom Gorey said the agency "needs and wants to do a better job" managing horses, but said those advocating an end to all roundups are mis-

"It appears that our critics want to use the report as a propaganda tool to stop gathers," which the BLM are required to do by law, Gorey

"Do the American people and does Congress support changing the law so that BLM would carry out a laissez-faire management policy that would subject horses and burros to mass starvation or dehydration by letting Mother Nature work her will?" he asked in an email to The Associated Press.

Panel members said they found little scientific basis for establishing what BLM considers to be appropriate, ecologically based caps on horse numbers and even less basis for estimating the overall population itself.

"It seems that the national statistics are the product of hundreds of subjective, probably independent, judgments and assumptions by range managers and admin-

istrators," the report said. BLM's current population estimate likely is anywhere from 10 percent to 50 percent short of the true level, the report said.

The number of animals at holding facilities surpassed the estimated number on the range in 10 Western states earlier this year for the first time since President Richard Nixon signed the Free-Roaming Horses and Burros Act of 1971.

The agency averaged removing 8,000 horses from the range annually from 2002 to 2011. Last year, it spent 60 percent of its wild horse budget on holding facilities alone, more than \$40 million, the committee said.

Palmer said the public traditionally adopted about 3,000 of the horses annually but that has fallen off in recent years.

"The goal would be to manage horses better on the range so that any numbers that would be taken off would be matched with the adoption demand, which is not the current case."

Some Casinos Ban Gamblers from Using Google Glass

• Casinos in several states are forbidding gamblers from wearing Google Glass, the tiny eyeglasses-mounted device capable of shooting photos, filming video and surfing the Internet. Regulators say the gadgets

could be used to cheat at card

The New Jersey Division of Gaming Enforcement issued a directive on Monday ordering Atlantic City's 12 casinos to bar casino patrons from using the device. The directive was first reported by The Press of Atlantic City.

Similar bans are in place at casinos in Las Vegas, Pennsylvania and Ohio, among other places.

"If these eyeglasses were worn during a poker game, they could be used to broadcast a patron's hand to a confederate or otherwise be used in a collusive manner," David Rebuck, the division's director wrote in a memo to the casinos.

That type of use would constitute a crime in New Jersey. But it would be difficult to establish beyond a reasonable doubt that the glasses were actually being used to cheat, Rebuck wrote. For that and other reasons, he decided to ban the glasses on the casino floor and anywhere else gambling is taking

"Even if the glasses had not been used for cheating ... their presence at a gaming table would lead to the perception that something untoward could be occurring, thereby undermining public confidence in the integrity of gaming," he wrote in the directive.

In a statement issued Wednesday, Google said, "We are thinking very carefully about how we design Glass because new technology always raises new issues." It said its "Glass Explorer" pilot program "will ensure that our users become active participants in shaping the future of this technology."

Burley, Cassia Co. Mull Police Service Contract

BURLEY • How much the city of Burley should pay Cassia County for contract police services next year is back on the bargaining table.

The county is asking for \$1.5 million in fiscal year 2014, up from the \$1.4 million current contract.

The City Council made no decisions during its bimonthly meeting Tuesday.

Under the existing contract, the sheriff's office provides a dedicated staff of 15 officers for Burley, the county's largest city.

"Every dime we collect in property taxes, if I'm not mistaken, goes back to the sheriff's office and the county," said Councilman Steve McGill.

The city took in \$1.5 million in property taxes in fiscal 2013, its budget shows.

"I think what gets forgotten in this scenario is we're all Cassia County citizens paying Cassia County taxes just like people not living in the city. We need credit for that," said McGill.

County Undersheriff George Warrell presented statistics for police services provided in the city.

Seeking Sense on Sentencing

ibertarians believe government should have a compelling reason before it restricts an individual's liberty. Today's liberals believe almost any reason will do,



because liberty is less important than equality, fraternity, fighting obesity and many other aspirations. Now, however, one of the more senior and liberal U.S. senators and one of the more junior and libertarian have a proposal that could slow and even repair some of the fraying of society.

Seven-term Democrat Pat Leahy's 38 Senate years have made him Judiciary Committee chairman. Republican Rand Paul is in his third Senate year. They hope to reduce the cruelty, irrationality and cost of the current regime of mandatory minimum sentences for federal crimes.

Such crimes are multiplying at a rate of more than 500 a decade, even though the Constitution explicitly authorizes Congress to criminalize only a few activities that are national in nature (e.g., counterfeiting, treason, crimes on the high seas). The federal government, having failed at core functions, such as fairly administering a rational revenue system, acts like a sheriff with attention-deficit disorder, haphazardly criminalizing this and that behavior in order to express righteous alarm about various wrongs that excite

Approximately 80,000 persons are sentenced in federal courts each year. There are an estimated 4,500 federal criminal statutes, and tens of thousands of regulations backed by criminal penalties, including incarceration. There can be felony penalties for violating arcane regulations that do not give clear notice of behavior that is prescribed or proscribed. This violates the mens rea requirement - people deserve criminal punishment only if they intentionally engage in conduct that is inherently wrong or that they know to be illegal. No wonder the federal prison population - currently approximately 219,000, about half serving drug sentences — has expanded 51 percent since 2000 and federal prisons are at 138 percent of their supposed capacity.

The Leahy-Paul measure would expand to all federal crimes the discretion federal judges have in many drug cases to impose sentences less than the mandatory minimums. This would, as Leahy says, allow judges - most of whom oppose mandatory minimums - to judge. Paul says mandatory minimum sentences, in the context of the proliferation of federal crimes, undermine federalism, the separation of powers and "the bedrock principle that people should be treated as individuals."

Almost everyone who enters the desensitizing world of American prisons is going to return to society, and many will have been socially handicapped by the experience. Until the 1970s, about 100 per 100,000 Americans were in prison. Today 700 per 100,000 are. America has nearly 5 percent of the world's population but almost 25 percent of its prisoners. African-Americans are 13 percent of the nation's population but 37 percent of the prison population, and one in three African-American men may spend time incarcerated. All this takes a staggering toll on shattered families and disordered neighborhoods.

The House Judiciary Committee has created an Over-Criminalization Task Force. Its members should read "Three Felonies a Day: How the Feds Target the Innocent," by Harvey Silverglate, a libertarian lawyer whose book argues that prosecutors could indict most of us for three felonies a day. And the task force should read the short essay "Ham Sandwich Nation: Due Process When Everything Is a Crime," by Glenn Harlan Reynolds, professor of law at the University of Tennessee. Given the axiom that a competent prosecutor can persuade a grand jury to indict a ham sandwich, and given the reality of prosecutorial abuse - particularly, compelling plea bargains by overcharging with "kitchen sink" indictments - Reynolds believes "the decision to charge a person criminally should itself undergo some degree of due process scrutiny." He also suggests banning plea bargains:

"An understanding that every criminal charge filed would have to be either backed up in open court or ignominiously dropped would significantly reduce the incentive to overcharge.... Our criminal justice system, as presently practiced, is basically a plea-bargain system with actual trials of guilt or innocence a bit of showy froth floating on top."

U.S. prosecutors win more than 90 percent of their cases, 97 percent of those without complete trials. British and Canadian prosecutors win significantly less, and for many offenses, the sentences in those nations are less severe.

Making mandatory minimums less severe would lessen the power of prosecutors to pressure defendants by overcharging them in order to expose them to draconian penalties. The Leahy-Paul measure is a way to begin reforming a criminal justice system in which justice is a diminishing component.

We have elected to retire in the Wood River Valley and 17 years ago built a house in a valley on a lot bounded on two sides by Bureau of Land Managementmanaged land. Each year we enjoy seeing herds of elk and deer, the occasional grey wolf, foxes, coyotes and many species of birds in or above our yard which is planted in native grasses, flowers and sage. There is access to all of this BLM property, even near our home, for skiers, hikers and sheep herders who pass by on the hill above us each early summer.

But whether, like my wife and I, one lives in or on the edge of wilderness, it is important to all of us. As Wallace Stegner so brilliantly ended his 1960s Wilderness Letter:

"We simply need that wild country available to us, even if we never do more than drive to its edge and look in. For it can be a means of reassuring ourselves of our sanity as creatures, a part of the geography of hope." One of the things the federal government does well is protect and preserve the parks and wilderness for all of us. All of this property in Idaho is a treasure and shouldn't be acquired by the state, potentially to be sold off to the highest bidder, today, tomorrow or in a century.







Staff Sgt. Robert Bales Pleads Guilty to Afghan Killings

JOINT BASE LEWIS-MC-CHORD, Wash. (AP) •

The American soldier charged with killing 16 Afghan civilians during nighttime raids on two villages last year pleaded guilty Wednesday then described shooting each victim, telling a military judge there is "not a good reason in this world" for what he

To avoid the death penalty, Staff Sgt. Robert Bales pleaded guilty to multiple counts of murder at the hearing at Joint Base Lewis-McChord south of Seattle. He then read from a statement in a clear and steady voice, describing his actions for each killing in the same

Bales, 39, said he left the remote base where he was in southern Afghanistan in March 2012, and went to the nearby villages of mud-walled compounds. Once inside, he said he "formed the intent" of

killing the victims, then shot

"This act was without legal justification, sir," Bales told the judge while seated at a defense table, his handles folded in front of him.

Most of the victims were women and children, and some of the bodies were burned. Relatives have told The Associated Press they are irate at the notion Bales will escape execution for one of the worst atrocities of the Afghanistan war.

The judge, Col. Jeffery Nance, still must decide whether to accept Bales' plea. Lt. Col. Jay Morse, one of the prosecutors, raised concerns during the hearing that the soldier's testimony contradicted what he earlier acknowledged in a signed "stipulation of facts" from that night.

Morse noted Bales testified that he made the decision to kill each victim when he raised his gun and pointed it at them.

"We do not know how many people were actually in the thrift store this morning when the wall collapsed on the building," Mayor Michael Nutter said late Wednesday afternoon.

Survivors were taken to hospitals with minor injuries, Ayers said.

The collapse involved an empty building that once housed a first-floor sandwich shop and apartments above. The thrift shop was on one side. The other side was an adult bookstore and theater that had been taken down within the last few months.

Several witnesses said they had been casting a wary eye on the demolition site and questioned how the workers were tackling the job. That raised questions about how closely the highly visible spot on Market Street - one of Philadelphia's signature boulevards - was being monitored.

Roofer Patrick Glynn said he had been watching workers take down the doomed building over the past few weeks, and said he suspected a collapse was inevitable because of the methods the workers were using.

"For weeks they've been standing on the edge, knocking bricks off," he said. "You could just see it was ready to go at any time. I knew it was going to happen."

Glynn and Anthony Soli were working on a roof atop a nearby building when they heard what sounded like two

loud bangs or explosions. They immediately ran down the scaffolding and helped pull out two women and a

Steve Cramer, who has been working as a window washer across the street for several days, said the demolition crew left 30 feet of a dividing wall up with no braces and it compromised the integrity of the building

"We've been calling it for the past week — it's going to fall, it's going to fall," his coworker Dan Gillis said.

There were no existing violations on the building and the demolition company had proper permits for the work they were doing, according to Carlton Williams of the city's Department of Licenses and Inspections.

Copters Pluck Families from Raging European Floods

DRESDEN (AP) • Desperate families were plucked from rooftops by helicopters, cars were swept away by raging torrents and levees failed without warning Wednesday as central Europe staggered under an inland ocean of flooding. Tens of thousands of people had to be evacuated in Germany and the Czech Republic and chemical plants along the mighty Danube and Elbe rivers were hastily shut down. City officials, federal troops and emergency workers across a vast region either raced to prepare or struggled to cope as flood crests roared downstream.

Near the southeastern German town of Deggendorf, two levees broke along the Danube and Isar rivers and their raging waters engulfed nearby houses. A southern German highway disappeared under the muddy floodwaters, cars were swept away and only the top of a few trucks peeked out above the waters.

Families scrambled to their

"This is an absolutely lifethreatening situation," local firefighter Alois Schraufstetter said. "Houses are covered up to 10 feet deep in water."

Four farmers were rescued at the last minute by a helicopter airlift as floods submerged their tractor, he said. About 2,000 people were evacuated. "We would have risked our lives had we stayed at home," resident Hans Loefflmann said, adding that he and his wife had to leave all their valuables behind.

NJ's Gov. Chris Christie Bashed for Election Move

TRENTON (AP) • Seven months after he stood shoulder-to-shoulder with President Barack Obama in what was celebrated by many in storm-battered New Jersey as a selfless display of bipartisanship, Republican Gov. Chris Christie finds himself accused of hypocrisy and nakedly political self-dealing.

The reason: On Tuesday, the day after Sen. Frank Lautenberg's death, Christie announced a special election to fill the seat. But instead of holding it in November, when Christie is on the ballot for reelection, the budget-slashing governor scheduled it for Oct. 16, at an expected cost to the state of \$12 million.

The move was at odds with Christie's reputation for frugality and the politics-bedamned stand he took last fall, and it infuriated Democrats and some Republicans as well.

Some said Christie clearly doesn't want to be on the same ballot with a strong Democrat for Senate - say, Newark Mayor Cory Booker, a rising star in the party — for fear that that could boost black and Democratic turnout and deny Christie the blowout victory that could make him a strong candidate for the White House in 2016.

Former Rep. Dick Armey, a tea party leader from Texas who was once GOP House majority leader, called the October special election "debilitating stupidity."

In an interview with ABC, he predicted it would backfire with Republicans because Christie was stressing fiscal responsibility as governor, yet willing to waste millions on special elections.

Allegations of Sex, Drugs Roil Baltimore Jail

BALTIMORE (AP) • Inmates often complain of idleness, but Tavon White apparently had no trouble keeping busy behind bars.

Investigators say the man nicknamed "Bulldog" impregnated four female corrections officers at the Baltimore jail while running a sophisticated criminal organization that smuggled in drugs and cell phones and employed guards as gang associates. A federal indictment charging White and two-dozen others in a contraband-smuggling conspiracy has offered an embarrassing glimpse into a jail where inmates stand accused of controlling the very officers hired to guard them.

Effects of the scandal have been widely felt, and state lawmakers plan to hold a hearing Thursday to discuss

problems at the state-run jail.

The state prisons director has moved his office into the jail to offer closer oversight, the jail's security director has been dismissed and top administrators there have undergone polygraph tests to determine what they knew about the criminal activity. Gov. Martin O'Malley, a potential Democratic presidential contender in 2016, announced a task force last week to fight corruption at the jail but has also been criticized by Republican lawmakers about the detention center's conditions.

The indictment alleges widespread dysfunction at the Baltimore City Detention Center, a downtown jail that holds thousands of defendants awaiting trial or serving short sentences.

Prosecutors say the man at the center was White, a 36year-old with a long rap sheet who was being held on an attempted murder charge. He ascended to a gang leadership position — acquiring the title of "Bushman" - soon after arriving several years ago, investigators say. He impregnated four female guards, one

Corrections department spokesman Rick Binetti said that although the indictment "reads like a Hollywood script," the number of correctional officers implicated represents a small fraction of the workforce. He said the department proactively requested the investigation to help root out corruption and has made progress in efforts to seize contraband cellphones and disrupt gangs.

Arab-American Scholar Dies at 93

McLEAN, Va. (AP) • Alixa Naff, an early and pioneering historian who documented the lives of the first wave of Arab-American immigrants a century ago, has died after a brief illness. She

Naff died Saturday at her home in Mitchellville, Md., according to two of her friends who were with her that day.

Naff, who immigrated from what is now Lebanon when she was a toddler, is perhaps best known for a collection of oral histories and artifacts that she donated to the Smithsonian and which is still available for scholarly research at the National Museum of American History.

"Through her research, Alixa Naff greatly contributed to the understanding of the early Arab immigrant experience in the United States from 1880 through the 1950s," the Smithsonian said in a statement Wednesday.

The collection, named for her parents Faris and Yamna Naff, contains more than 2,000 photos, 450 oral histories and 500 artifacts such as personal and household goods.

Naff traveled the country in a blue Volkswagen Beetle nicknamed "the camel," to collect the histories, and used her powers of persuasion to convince people to give up treasured family items to be included in the collection, said friend and colleague Rosemarie Esber. Items in the collection in-

clude musical instruments, clothing and even a kibbe pounder, a large stone used to make a traditional Middle Eastern dish, Esber said.

"Her greatest legacy is saving all this material for all the others who came after her," Esber said.

Her work documented the diversity in a community that was often overlooked by scholars, focusing on the first wave of Arab immigrants, mostly Christian,

who came to America in the years surrounding the turn of the century.

"Her ability to tell their story was important in understanding the diversity of the Arab American experience," said Helen Samhan, a friend and former executive director of the Arab American Institute in Washington. "Even in scholarly circles, the history of the Arab-American experience was often skewed in favor of hot political issues."

Naff grew up in Spring Valley, Ill.; Fort Wayne., Ind.; and Detroit. Before moving to Mitchellville, she lived for a number of years in Falls Church, Va.

Civil Rights Leader Will Campbell Dead at Age 88

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) • The Rev. Will Campbell, a white minister who drew acclaim for his involvement in the civil rights movement, has died at the age of 88.

John Egerton, a close friend of Campbell's for nearly 50 years, told The Associated Press on Tuesday that Campbell died Monday night from complications following a stroke he had about two years ago. Egerton said he was contacted by Campbell's son, who was at the minister's bedside in Nashville when he died.

"He never really recovered from it,"

Egerton said of the stroke.

The Tennessean quotes former President Jimmy Carter as saying of Campbell, "He used the force of his words and the witness of his deeds to convey a healing message of reconciliation to any and all who heard him."

Campbell was born in 1924 in Amite County, Miss.

After a stint in the military, he attended Yale, where he earned a divinity degree in 1952 and then headed to Taylor, La., to preach at Taylor Southern Baptist Church.

He later came to Nashville, where he

was described as a staunch leader for civil rights, and was well respected by others in the movement.

Campbell was the Nashville representative of a pro-integration operation called the National Council of Churches. Because he was white, he was allowed entry into rooms unapproachable by some of those at the forefront of the movement.

"When we had the sit-ins, Will would show up," Bernard Lafayette, a civil rights leader in Nashville and close friend of Campbell's, told The Tennessean.

Morning After Pills **Allowed over** the Counter

NEW YORK (AP) Generic versions of emergency contraception can be sold without a prescription or age restrictions while the federal government appeals a judge's ruling allowing the sales, an appeals court said Wednesday.

The brief order issued by the 2nd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Manhattan permitted two-pill versions of emergency contraception to immediately be sold without restrictions, but the court refused to allow unrestricted sales of Plan B One-Step until it decides the merits of the government's appeal.

It did not specify why the two-pill versions were being allowed now, though it said the government failed to meet the requirements necessary to block the lowercourt decision.

The order was welcomed by the Center for Reproductive Rights, where President Nancy Northup called it a "historic day for women's health."

"Finally, after more than a decade of politically motivated delays, women will no longer have to endure intrusive, onerous and medically unnecessary restrictions to get emergency contraception," she said in a statement.

Ancient Primate Fossil Discovered

WASHINGTON (AP) •

New fossil evidence of the earliest complete skeleton of an ancient primate suggests it was a hyperactive, wide-eyed creature so small you could hold a couple of them in your hand - if only they would stay still long enough.

The 55 million-year-old fossil dug up in central China is one of the first primates. This tiny monkey-like creature weighed an ounce or less.

Primate is the order of life that includes humans along with apes, monkeys and lemurs. Humans are set apart from other mammals because of our grasping five fingers and toes, nails and forward-facing eyes. And this new species called Archicebus achilles fits right in, said Christopher Beard, curator at the Carnegie Museum of Natural History in Pittsburgh.

Among primates there are three suborders: anthropoids which include apes, monkeys and us; and two other suborders that include lemurs and the lesser known tarsiers. This new species is in the same grouping as tarsiers. The fossil includes anthropoid-like features.

"It's a cute little thing; it's

ridiculously little," Beard said. "That's one of the more important scientific aspects of the whole story."

With a trunk only 2.8 inches long, the furry creature was about as small as you can get and still be a mammal, Beard said. Just like elephants and horses, the farther back in time you get for some of today's bigger mammals, the smaller they get, Beard said.

Because it was so small and warm-blooded, it had to eat bugs and move constantly to keep from losing internal heat, Beard said.

That means, Beard said,

they were "very frenetic creatures, anxious, highly caffeinated animals running around looking for their next meal." They lived in a treelined area near a Chinese lake, swinging around trees in a

hotter climate, Beard said. Outside experts praised the study as significant. Rick Potts, director of the human origins program at the Smithsonian Institution, said this fossil's mix of different features illustrate the fascinating and crucial changes that occur around major evolutionary branch points in our family tree.

CONN. GOV. SIGNS BILL RESTRICTING **NEWTOWN PHOTOS**

HARTFORD, (AP) • Gov. Dannel P. Malloy signed legislation into law Wednesday that prevents the public release of crime scene photos and video evidence from the Connecticut school shootings that took the lives of 20 first graders and six school employees.

The new law, a result of efforts to balance private and public interests, creates an exemption to the state's Freedom of Information Act and applies to homicides in Connecticut.

The law prevents the release of photographs, film, video and other images depicting a homicide victim if those records "could reasonably be expected to constitute an unwarranted invasion of the personal privacy of the victim or the victim's surviving family members."

Malloy signed the bill hours after the General Assembly approved the eleventh-hour compromise during the early morning hours of the final day of the state legislative session.

Malloy said he believes "a parent of a deceased child should have the right to remember that child" as they wish and not because they were "caught up in some tragic and unbelievable circumstances."

Vet Recommends Medical Marijuana for Pets in Pain

LOS ANGELES (AP) • Until she introduced "magic cheese" to her sick and aging bulldog, Laura Bugni-Daniel watched him suffer for two years. He'd spend his days lying down or throwing up.

Today, at age 12, he plays like a puppy through the day, his fur is soft and he sleeps at night, soothed not by magic, but by the dose of marijuana in that cheese.

Bugni-Daniel is part of a growing movement to give medical marijuana to pets in pain. Many urge caution until there's better science behind it. But stories abound about changes in sick and dying pets after they've been given cannabis - although it isn't a proven pain killer for man or mutt, and it's an illicit drug under federal law despite being legal for people in 19 states and the District of Columbia.

Leading the charge is Los Angeles veterinarian Doug Kramer, 36, known as the "Vet Guru," who felt it was his duty to speak out while he has no family that would feel a verbal or financial backlash.

"I grew tired of euthanizing pets when I wasn't doing everything I could to make their lives better," he said. "I felt like I was letting them down."

Pot eased his Siberian

husky's pain during her final weeks, after she had surgery to remove tumors. Not only did Nikita stop whimpering while using cannabis, but she started eating, gaining weight and meeting him at the door

It gave him six extra weeks with his dog before he had to euthanize her, he says. It wasn't a cure, but he thinks it freed her of pain and improved her last

Some other vets contacted said they share Kramer's view on pot, but they wouldn't talk on the record for fear of arrest or retaliation.

Kramer hasn't lost any clients over his view, but he was asked not to return to some of the clinics where he volunteered or relieved other vets because of concerns over the negative image his advocacy creates, he

Dr. Duncan Lascelles, a professor of surgery and pain management at North Carolina State University College of Veterinary Medicine, thought about studying marijuana a decade ago. He didn't, not for lack of interest, but because the timing was wrong.
"I have been considering

looking at that field again because I think it does have a lot of potential," he said.

BIG MAKO SHARK COULD BE RECORD

HUNTINGTON BEACH, Calif. (AP) • A huge mako shark caught off the coast of Southern California could set a record, but a critic said it should have been released because sharks are threatened worldwide.

Jason Johnston of Texas caught the 1,323-pound shark off Huntington Beach on Monday after a 2and-a-half hour battle, the Orange County Register reported.

"I've hunted lions and brown bears, but I've never experienced anything like this," Johnston told the newspaper. "It felt like I had a one-ton diesel truck at the end of the line, and it wasn't budging."

If the catch is confirmed and meets conditions, it would exceed the 1,221-pound record mako catch made in July 2001 off the coast of Chatham, Mass., said Jack Vitek, world records coordinator for the Florida-based International Game Fish Association.

It takes about two months for the association to verify domestic catches, he told the Los Angeles Times.

The shark should have been released, argued David McGuire, director of the

California-based protection advocacy group Shark Stewards.

"I'm a little shocked by it," he said of the catch.

"People should be viewing these sharks as wonderful animals that are important to the ocean and admiring how beautiful they are" rather than "spilling their blood and guts," McGuire told the Times.

DULUTH, Minn. (AP) • An aspiring half-marathon runner in Minnesota attributed her unbearable back pain to a twohour training session. A day later, she was cradling a newborn.

Trish Staine, 33, says she had no idea she was pregnant before Monday's surprise birth. The Duluth mother of three said she hadn't gained any weight or felt fetal movement in the months before. And besides, her husbandhada vasectomy.

"I said 'no, no, that's impossible," Staine said Wednesday from her Duluth hospital room.

"I definitely thought I was done having kids," she joked. Staine and her husband, John, have a daughter, 7, and a son, 11. She's also stepmother to John's three boys, ages 17, 19 and 20.

Staine said she ran for about two hours Sunday in preparation for the Garry Bjorklund half-marathon on June 22.

"I had a sore back Sunday evening. I had taken a hot shower and was dealing with it," Staine said. "Monday morning, I woke up and had more back pain, and as the day went on it got worse. I thought

I should go to the ER. I thought I ruptured a disc or pulled a muscle."

But she soldiered on, watching her husband play basketball at noon and going to her daughter's short play. When Staine got home, she thought a

bath might help her pain. As she talked to her husband on the phone, Staine said her pain was becoming unbearable. Her husband called an

ambulance. "I felt like I was dying. I didn't know what was going on," she said.

First Tropical **Storm Forms**

MIAMI (AP) • The first named storm of Atlantic season, Andrea, formed Wednesday over the Gulf of Mexico and was expected to bring wet weather to parts of Florida's west coast by the end of the week.

Forecasters issued a tropical storm warning for a swath of Florida's west coast starting at Boca Grande, an island to the northwest of Fort Myers, and ending at an area along the coast south of Tallahassee.

FLORIDA WOMAN, 84, CLAIMS \$590M POWERBALL JACKPOT

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)

• An 84-year-old Florida widow who bought her Powerball ticket after another customer let her get ahead in line came forward Wednesday to claim the biggest undivided lottery jackpot in history: \$590 million.

Gloria C. MacKenzie, a retiree from Maine and a mother of four who lives in a modest, tin-roof house in Zephyrhills, where the lone winning ticket in the May 18 drawing was sold, took her prize in a lump sum of just over \$370 million. After federal taxes, she is getting about \$270 million, lottery officials said.

She did not speak to a crowd of reporters outside lottery headquarters, leaving quickly in a silver Ford Focus with her son and family friends. She was accompanied at the lottery offices by two unidentified attorneys.

MacKenzie bought the winning ticket at a Publix supermarket in the town of about 13,300 people 30 miles northeast of Tampa. It is best known for the bottled spring water that bears its name — and now, for one of the biggest lottery winners of all time.

The \$590 million was the second-largest lottery jackpot inhistory, behind a \$656 million Mega Millions prize in March 2012, but that sum was split, with three winning tickets.

In a statement read by lottery officials, MacKenzie said she purchased the ticket after another buyer "was kind enough to let me go ahead in line." MacKenzie let the lottery computers generate the numbers at random. She said she also bought four other tickets for the drawing.

"We are grateful with this blessing of winning the Florida Lottery Powerball jackpot," the statement said. "We hope that everyone would give us the opportunity to maintain our privacy for our family's benefit."

Cheerios Stands By Ad with Mixed-race Family

NEW YORK (AP) • A mom sits at her kitchen table when her grade schooler saunters up with a big box of Cheerios.

"Mom," says the girl.
"Dad told me Cheerios is good for your heart. Is that

Cut to dad waking from a nap on the living room couch with a pile of Cheerios on his chest (where his heart is) crunchily cascading to the floor.

The message is in line with the company's Heart Healthy campaign, except this 30-second ad features a black dad, white mom and biracial child and produced enough vitriol on YouTube last week that Cheerios requested the comments section be turned off.

This week, the company is standing by the fictitious family, which reflects a black-white racial mix uncommon in commercials today, especially in ads on TV, at a time when interracial and interethnic couples are on the rise in real life, according to 2010 U.S. Census data, brand strategists and marketing consultants.

"The reality is that in general most big companies don't want to take a lot of risks," said Laura Ries, who has written five books on marketing and brand

strategy and consults for companies large, small and in between.

"The ability for nameless, faceless people to get on the Internet is out there, and companies don't like it when people yell at them," she said.


Camille Gibson, vice president of marketing for Cheerios, said it's the first time the ad campaign that focuses on family moments has featured an interracial couple, with General Mills Inc. casting the actors to reflect the changing U.S. population.


"We felt like we were reflecting an American family," Gibson said.

As a large company, Minneapolis-based General Mills is used to getting some degree of negative feedback and wasn't surprised by the comments on YouTube, she said, but it was the first time the company requested the site turn the comments section off because of the vitriol.

Another site, Reddit, filtered out negative comments on a thread started with a comment in support of the ad. The site left Cheerios defenders' remarks online.

The national ad will continue running as scheduled for several more months, and Cheerios isn't planning any changes.



day. Alone. "I closed the season out right there last fall," Nick says, pointing to the lake's outlet. "I love it. It's a very special place we have here."

Lupine blooms along the trail to Sullivan Lake, a pink sky heralds the sunrise, and 6 a.m. is crazy noisy with birdsong.

It's May 25, the opening day of fishing season on the Silver Creek Preserve, and these waters will be congested with fly fishers within a few hours. But Nick beat the rush.

He also beat the creek's famed hatches. So the Bellevue man -aBureau of Land Management firefighter who hopes to become a flyfishing guide — instead is targeting big, aggressive brown trout with a "militant" fly of his own creation. He's seen lots of big browns since 4:30 a.m.

"They come flying out of the water. I don't know why I can't hook them this morning," Nick

Idaho Anglers Are Never Going to Live This Down

PICABO • What fly fishing guide John Huber described was irresistible to a journalist: anglers who arrive at midnight to be the season's first to wade into the famous waters of Silver Creek.

It sounded a little too good to be true, but Dayna Gross, Silver Creek Preserve watershed manager for The Nature Conservancy, backed it up. She told me about people who take pride in being the first to sign the logbook at the preserve's visitor center in the first minutes of opening day each spring.

So I talked photographer Ashley Smith into giving up part of his holiday weekend, enlisted my husband as an unpaid camping outfitter and packed my toothbrush.

In the Hayspur Fish Hatchery campground on Friday evening, May 24, I interviewed anglers around their campfires while Ashley and his camera worked with the light of a full moon.

I met Adam Kimball of Boise standing apart from the fires to use his smartphone. Would he be fishing Silver Creek at midnight?

"I totally understand it. I've done it before," he said. "But not tonight."

What's the point of midnight fishing? It's those wise, experienced trout that swim in the catchand-release creek.

"They haven't seen anything fake since November," Kimball said. "Later in the year, they get really suspicious."

He and a lot of other people can't catch anything in Silver Creek after the first few weeks, he said. "That's no joke. That's real."

A few minutes later, my conversation with Tim Mansell, owner of a Boise fly fishing shop, gave me more evidence of midnight activity at Silver Creek Preserve on opening day: "I've signed in at 11:59 before," he said.

After most of the campground crowd tucked themselves into RVs for the night, Ashley and I geared up for phase two of our assignment. We chose a spot to position Ashley's SUV – where he planned to sleep - so that it separated my tent from the generator noise of the nearest RV. Well before midnight, Ashley and I left my husband there, trying to fix the hole in our air mattress, and headed for the preserve.

I was prepared with extra pen, headlamp, fingerless gloves. Ashley had his tripod for long night ex-

If nobody's there, we'll never let Idaho anglers live this down, Ashley said as we crossed Kilpatrick Road Bridge. Moonlight illuminat-

ed the lovely contours of Kilpatrick Pond, and Ashley wondered aloud how anglers' flashlights would look in a long exposure.

We drove to the visitor center, which sits on a hill overlooking a long stretch of Silver Creek. Anyone who visits the preserve is supposed to sign in, so this would be the first stop for any midnight

I checked the logbook. Three people had signed in, listing "fishing 5/25/13" as the purpose of their visit. But someone had noted below those three names that they'd actually signed in on May 24.

I hoped it meant we'd find three anglers already in position to wade in at midnight.

But a drive to the other end of the preserve turned up no vehicles parked along the road. Just quiet darkness. And back on the visitor center's porch, we watched headlights pass along U.S. Highway 20. None of them turned in at the preserve entrance (except my husband's).

When my phone clicked over to 12:00, I was the only person signing the logbook. Ashley and I took photos of each other to document the moment, waited another 15 or so philosophical minutes and headed back to the Hayspur campground for a little sleep. We'd be back five hours later, fueled by cof-

fee from my husband's propane burner.

Some of the anglers I met on opening day laughed at my midnight tale. Hook, line and sinker, they said.

So was I a sucker? No, Gross assured me later.

One man who habitually tries to write the first signature on the opening-day log was at The Nature Conservancy's barbecue lunch later that day, she said. He told Gross this was the first time in eight years that he didn't fish Silver Creek at midnight.

"What are the chances?" Gross wrote to me in an email. "You should have brought your fly rod and you could have been the first to fish Silver Creek in 2013!"

Humph.

night. So they won't be interested in flies tomorrow.

But her husband disagrees. Trout eat all the time, Marty Downey says. Those insects are tiny.

Later in the night, Tim Mansell of Boise and his family join the group around Mike's campfire.

"He has a fire ring and we don't. So you make friends real quick," Janet says.

Tim has fished Silver Creek's opening day for close to 20 years — usually because water levels are too high elsewhere in the state during the holiday weekend. Not this year.

"You can pretty much fish anywhere you want this year," Tim says. But he's back anyway. "It's just tradition."

By 7:30 the next morning, three hours after Nick Anderson's first cast, parked vehicles spill out of the small lot at the preserve's visitor center. Beside tailgates or open SUV hatches, anglers pull on their boots and and assemble their fly rods.

Some avoid eye contact with anyone carrying a notebook or camera, but Travis Swartz of Boise welcomes attention. He's a YouTube filmmaker whose comedy fly-fishing character, "Hank Patterson," has earned Travis speaking engagements with Trout Unlimited, the Orvis Guide Rendezvous and the Simms ICE OUT Guide Event.

"The Hank thing, over the past year it's just exploded," says Paul Peterson of Boise, Travis' cousin.

"It sucks for people who are really good at fishing to watch someone who's an idiot getting all that attention," Travis says.

Still, there's a serious side to this two-man fishing trip, a tradition rooted in their childhoods. "My dad has brought me up here since I was an infant," Paul

And Travis' patter slows down when they're in the water making long casts, their lines flashing in the morning light.

Back at the visitor center, Mike O'Harra of Carey is signing in after a night of feeding sick calves. His friendliness is of the smalltown Idaho variety, so he's not making jokes for the journalists.

"I've been fishing out here all of my life," Mike says. With an ankle hurting too much to wade, he intends to float the S curves today. That's where he watched a family of foxes hunt mice for half an hour on opening day

First, he scrubs his boots in a watering trough at the parking lot, to avoid transferring snails from one water to another. Everyone should

do it, he says. Nearby, David Lupien's

foursome is gearing up.

"Our plan is to get our egos put in place so we can spend the rest of the year building them back up again," the Meridian man

But he clearly expects to enjoy this humility.

"I've been hoarding some Cubans for this weekend," David says, opening his waterproof humidor to show off the cigars.

By 8:25 a.m., parked SUVs line the dirt road through the preserve

Carrying float tubes, a father and son hike from the road to the head of the S turns. They're longtime fishing buddies, but this is dad Rod Smith's first time floating. The Tempe, Ariz., man timed his visit to son Chris Smith of Mountain Home for the same reason that brought other anglers out today: "As soon as the season starts, the fish get a little smarter every day," Chris says.

They plan to float through the S turns and walk back on the road four or five times.

Do they have supplies to keep them happy for a few hours? Yes, Rod answers. But he means flies. The food is back in the truck.

At the water's edge, Rod pulls on more layers of clothing while Chris searches through the pouches of his fishing vest for his reading glasses.

"I'm sure it's nice and chilly in there," Rod says.


For now, Chris strings a dry fly (a blue-winged olive) and a wet fly (a midge). Later, he'll dip a net and see what insects are in the

A float tuber with a full white beard appears on the opposite bank, sips from a mug, pops in earphones, drops a lanyard of tools around his neck, then sits on his tube to wait for Chris and Rod to pass. As Chris floats by, he and the man with the white beard exchange a one-word greeting: "Mornin"."

In a scene of SUVs and trucks, the BMW on its way to Kilpatrick Road Bridge at 9:05 a.m. is an anomaly. Somehow, Peter Crow of Ketchum stuffed a fully inflated tube in there.

"I always fish opening weekend here," Peter says as he into

steps waders beside the car.



He expects to run into people he knows on the creek, at The Nature Conservancy's barbecue and at the Picabo Angler shop. "It's

very social, which is nice." Peter – who's wearing two pairs of sunglasses on his head and one around his neck – is general manager of Smith Fishing, a division of Smith Optics. "So I'm here product testing is what I'm really doing," he says with irony in his voice.

The polarized sunglasses manager has already made the acquaintance of the father and son gearing up at the vehicle parked in front of the BMW.

"We're all fishaholics. We fish everywhere in the world that we can," Peter says, gesturing toward Rod MacKinnon of Boise and son John MacKinnon of Portland, Ore.

"Have you been for the taimen in Mongolia yet?" Rod asks Peter.

No, that's still on Peter's list. But so are a lot of fish.

Today, the MacKinnons are clients of fishing guide Brett Drummond of Silver Creek Outfitters.

"Even a professional golfer takes golf lessons," Rod explains. He and his son book part of every Silver Creek opening weekend with Brett. "He teaches us new tricks every year."

Brett stocks all three tubes with water bottles and advises John to nymph the current just downstream of Kilpatrick Road Bridge. John gets a bite immediately.

Then a man walking by on the bridge makes a surprising comment: "That kind of fishing should be illegal here," Mark Klingerman says quietly.

It's a purist's preference, not an ethical judgment.

"I just don't do that. I don't fish that way," Mark elaborates a few minutes later. The guide's young client is using both a strike indicator and a wet fly, and he's hooking too many small trout to count.

"Bobber fishing," Mark calls it. "Dragging the bottom," Ken Bennett of Hailey says.

"You can call me a snobby dry-fly fisherman. And I'm happy to be called that," says Mark, a tall, whitehaired Ketchum man who's fished here for more than 40 years. He likes to choose his trout. "You've got to get just the right bug in the right place at the right time, with a light leader, and maybe he'll eat it - if you're lucky."

Mark and Ken hang out around Kilpatrick Road Bridge, waiting for evidence of an insect hatch beginning on the creek's surface. They speak with some scorn of the strike indicators just downstream, and of the opening day crowds.

"I bet I could walk down the S turns without getting wet, from one tube to another," Mark tells Ken.

Crowding is relative, of course. Only two float tubes are visible upstream and four downstream.

By 10 a.m., a few more dry-fly locals have joined Mark and Ken on the bridge, watching and pondering, and it'll be another halfhour before these two make their move. Why get there before the insects they'll mimic?

The strongest hatches appear later in the season, says Ed Grimes of Ketchum, a man whose hearty laugh follows every sentence. And they'll vary with air and water temperatures and the weather.

"Every year's a mystery," Ed says. "That's why it's interesting."

App Identifies Craters of the Moon Plants

IDAHO FALLS (AP) • Officials with Craters of the Moon National Monument and Preserve have a new tool to help visitors: a smartphone app that identifies 100 of the most common plants and wildflowers found at the Idaho park.

Ted Stout with the monument's outreach program told the *Post Register* that this summer is the first time the park has made the technology available to visitors. Visitors can download the free app to their Apple or Android devices and use it to search for plants by color, shape and other characteristics.

A variety of flowers already are blooming on the park's sagebrush-covered slopes and up through cracks in the lava, with the most blooms usually showing up on the cinder slopes in mid-June and early July, Stout said.

Dwarf monkey flower, dwarf buckwheat and silverleaf phacelia make up the bulk of the display on the cinder cones, but the varied habitats of the park support more than 700 different types of plants.

Guided walks and evening programs at the park begin this Friday.





THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

"Real stupidity beats artificial intelligence every time."

The humiliation of losing to a machine would never befall a top-class bridge player, would it? Playing bridge had previously seemed to be an insurmountable task for artificial intelligence. Until a decade ago, no program had proved capable of offering more than mediocre opposition to a decent player. But things may be about to change.

Onno Eskes of the Netherlands has written in IMP magazine about how, in the right circumstances, computers can defeat humans. Over the next few months, I will be running some deals that reflect their strengths.

In seven diamonds (reached after West had shown the majors and a weak hand), two expert Dutch declarers went wrong. They won the spade lead and led a diamond to the ace, West discarding a spade. With hearts not breaking, declarer could not take advantage of the favorable lie of the clubs and went one down for a flat board.

Eskes decided to present the hand to GIB, a bridge program developed by Matt Ginsberg, which can process the information about West's hand plus the opening lead.

After 30 seconds it produced the spade ace, then, after a pause, it played the club ace. The computer discarded the spade queen and ruffed a small club in hand. Next came the diamond ace (discovering the bad trump split), a diamond to the queen, the two top clubs and the master club six. East ruffed, South overruffed, and he could now draw the last trump and ruff his last heart in dummy.

ANSWER: You are worth a second call, but the danger of bidding three clubs is obvious; no one likes playing in a 5-1 fit. The way to get spades into play would be to double. By contrast, a call of two no-trump is not natural but shows minors, with longer clubs of course. Your sequence suggests this precise pattern, plus extras.

Questions, Answers About MLB Drug Investigation

ASSOCIATED PRESS

Major League Baseball is checking into links between players and performanceenhancing drugs, centering on a now-closed clinic in the Miami area. A look at the expected lineup and possible penalties:

Q: What makes this MLB investigation different than past probes?

A: The scope. Perhaps 20 or more players could eventually be disciplined, including some pretty big names. Q: Like who?

A: MVPs, All-Stars, a Cy Young Award winner. Alex Rodriguez, Ryan Braun, Melky Cabrera, Nelson Cruz and Bartolo Colon are among those who have been tied to Biogenesis of America.

Q: What is that?

A: An anti-aging clinic in the Miami area that closed late last year. MLB wants to know whether it supplied banned drugs to players.

Q: How will MLB find out?

A: By talking to the clinic's founder, Anthony Bosch. After months of pressure and a lawsuit, he has agreed to cooperate with the investigation. What he tells MLB and the records he turns over could be enough to lead to penalties.

Q: What kind of penal-

A: Suspensions. There's been a lot of speculation that players could be tossed for 50 games or even 100 games, costing them millions of dollars in salary.

Q: Is that likely?

A: The players' union could file grievances over

each one, and it would take a while to sort them out. Even if penalties were announced next month around the All-Star game, the appeal process might keep them from taking effect until next season.

Q: Are the players talking?

A: Well, MLB has been interviewing them - what they're saying is uncertain. For about three weeks, they've been summoned and have been showing up with their lawyers.

Q: How serious is MLB about penalizing some of its stars?

A: Very. Commissioner Bud Selig and his team appear determined to catch the cheaters. They were livid when Braun's 50-game suspension was overturned by an arbitrator in early 2012, and seem eager to nail the offenders.

Q: Haven't we been through all of this before?

A: Yes. Baseball is still recovering from the Steroids Era, a time in the late 1990s well into the 2000s when oversized sluggers and pumped-up pitchers ruled. MLB has imposed tougher testing and stiffer penalties in recent years, but that hasn't deterred every player from trying to find an easier way to get better.

Q: Will the drug cloud ever go away?

A: Hard to say. Fans, players, managers and executives hope so, but scandals keep popping up. There may come a day when every 430foot home run isn't followed by whispers of "is he juicing?" - we're not there yet,though.

Nadal, Djokovic to Meet in French Open Semifinals

PARIS • The ease with which Rafael Nadal and Novak Djokovic swept aside their quarterfinal opponents at the French Open was remarkably similar.

Both men won in straight sets Wednesday, hardly challenged. Both earned 12 break points, Nadal converting seven, Djokovic five. Nadal's serve was broken only once, Djokovic's twice.

In what amounted to heavy-duty practice sessions for the real test that lies ahead, Nadal needed 1 hour, 56 minutes to beat No. 9seeded Stanislas Wawrinka 6-2, 6-3, 6-1 in Court Philippe Chatrier, while a short walk away, Djokovic's 6-3, 7-6 (5), 7-5 victory over No. 12 Tommy Haas in Court Suzanne Lenglen lasted just 17 minutes longer.

Now comes the showdown everyone's been anticipating since the field was set nearly two weeks ago: A Djokovic vs. Nadal semifinal Friday that will have the feel of a final, and not only because they met for the championship at Roland Garros a year ago.

"A lot of people in the tennis world are looking to the matchup coming up with Rafa and Novak," said Haas, who at 35 was the oldest French Open quarterfinalist since 1971. "I'll definitely be watching."

Who wouldn't?

Djokovic, ranked and seeded No. 1, against Nadal, owner of a record seven

French Open titles, including three in a row.

Djokovic, trying to become the eighth man to complete a career Grand Slam, against Nadal, trying to become the only man to win eight trophies at one major tournament.

Djokovic owns six major titles, Nadal 11.

"I would prefer an easier opponent," Nadal said.

Djokovic is 33-4 this season and reached his 12th consecutive major semifinal, the second-longest streak in history.

Nadal is 41-2 since returning in February after missing seven months because of a left knee injury he declined to discuss Wednesday. That absence is why

Nadal's ranking slid and he was seeded No. 3, so was drawn to play Djokovic in the semifinals; their previous 11 matchups came in tournament finals.

"He never gives up. I mean, that's an impressive virtue that he has. Over the years, he's been so consistent and so dominant, on this surface especially," Djokovic said. "He's struggled with injuries, came back, and lost only a few matches since he came back. You've got to respect that."

It's all enough to render Friday's other semifinal something of an after-

thought, even if local fans have a rooting interest when No. 6 Jo-Wilfried Tsonga of France faces No. 4 David Ferrer of Spain. Tsonga, who beat Roger Federer in the quarterfinals, wants to give France its first male champion at Roland Garros since Yannick Noah 30 years ago.

The women's semifinals Thursday are No. 1 Serena Williams against No. 5 Sara Errani, and No. 2 Maria Sharapova against No. 4 Victoria Azarenka. Sharapova, the defending champion, and Azarenka advanced Wednesday; Williams and Errani won their quarterfinals Tuesday.

Back in the NBA Finals, James Can Get Back at Spurs

MIAMI • Before reaching the top of basketball, Le-Bron James was run over by the San Antonio Spurs. The Spurs swept James'

Cleveland Cavaliers in the 2007 NBA Finals, so long ago that the winning game plan focused on exploiting James' weaknesses. Those are nearly impossible to find now, and James essentially warned the Spurs that they shouldn't bother looking.

The Spurs already know. "He'll be a lot more of a problem than he was in '07, that's for sure," Spurs coach Gregg Popovich said Wednesday.

Tim Duncan told the beaten James minutes after that series that the league would someday belong to him, and he was right. The NBA's MVP guided Miami to last year's championship and the league's best record this season.

Now the Spurs will try to take it back.

But James is now the best player in the game, is surrounded by more talent in Miami than he ever had in Cleveland, and still carries the memory of the beating the Spurs laid on him six years ago.

"I have something in me that they took in '07. Beat us on our home floor, celebrated on our home floor. I won't forget that. You shouldn't as a competitor. You should never forget that," James said.

He joined the Heat in 2010, experienced more finals failure a year later, then was finals MVP last year when Miami beat Oklahoma City in five games. Another title now would put him halfway to the four that Duncan and Popovich have won together.

"That's what I'm here for," James said. "I'm here to win championships, and you're not always going to be on the successful side. I've seen it twice, not being on the successful side."

He was just 22 at the end of his fourth year in the league when he carried to the Cavs to their first finals appearance. But there were holes in his game, from an unreliable jump shot to an undeveloped post game, and the Spurs took advantage of every one of them.

James shot 36 percent in the series, including a ghastly 10 for 30 in Game 4, and committed 23

turnovers. "Well, LeBron is a different player than he was in '07," Popovich said. "That was like ancient history. He was basically a neophyte at the time, wondering how all this stuff worked and how it's put together. We were very fortunate at that time to get him so early. But at this point he's grown."

James wasn't interested in discussing much of that series, but he recalled the way the Spurs' strategy kept him from getting into


