Fallen Idaho Soldiers Honored with New Monument in Rupert

RUPERT • Dozens of people paused in Rupert to pay homage to Idaho's fallen soldiers during the dedication of an Idaho Roll Call monument Thursday evening.

"I'm glad we could at least do this for our fallen soldiers," said Betty Anderson, of Heyburn.

A memorial bouquet sat atop the stone monument along with photos of the 70 Idaho soldiers killed in war since the 9/11 terrorist attacks at the World Trade Center and Pentagon. The monument displays the seals of the U.S. Marines, Air Force, Navy, Army, Coast Guard and National Guard, along with the MIA/POW seal.

The list includes two Army soldiers from Rupert: Pfc. Cleston Raney and Sgt. Chris Workman.

"I want you all to stand there and look at that monument. Look at that figure on that monument in grief over a fallen comrade underneath the red, white and blue of the greatest flag to fly in any country in the world at any time," said Zeb Bell, who officiated at the ceremony.

The Rupert POW/MIA committee, spearheaded by George and Dona Maas, arranged

Communicating in a Time of Crisis

New mobile system can be a lifesaver.

HAILEY • Blaine County officers and other first responders need not be left in the dark in the event of a massive power outage like the one that struck the Wood River Valley on Christmas Eve 2009.

A new mobile communications system can conduct even a video teleconference in the wilderness, as the Idaho National Guard demonstrated to the Sheriff's Office, Ketchum Fire Department and other agencies during a training in the park across from the Hailey Armory on Wednesday, June 26.

There, computers were housed under a camel-colored military Drash tent, which expands like an accordion and can be set up in 20 minutes.

A satellite dish and three diesel engine generators completed the operation.

The 10,000 pounds of equipment could be moved to Hailey from Boise and set up within four hours, said Idaho Army Guard Maj. Dan Lister. "Four hours versus 72 hours — that's a pretty quick turnaround."

The Guard has had the equipment for years, but many responders in Idaho still don't know about it, said Col. Timothy Marsano. It has been deployed to Texas to respond to the fallout from a hurricane.

The equipment would allow someone on the ground to tell a Guard helicopter pilot where to search for a missing snowmobile. It allows responders

at the scene to talk to such agencies as the Federal Emergency Management Agency and Homeland Security. And it allows responders to track Internet and email in the backcountry.

If there were a pandemic, a mobile lab could be brought in for testing, too.

In case of a blackout, local law enforcement already can communicate with one another as long as they're in sight. But the new system allows communication on a much broader scale, said Capt. Jay Davis. "In a major disaster with a lot going on and a lot of people in the field, this would be great."

It also would have been advanta-

geous in the 2007 Castle Rock Fire because it allows firefighters to communicate with other departments, said Ketchum Fire Chief Mike Elle.

In the Castle Rock Fire, the U.S. Forest Service was on one frequency; police on another, and other first responders on various frequencies.

"To hook them all together would be great," said Elle. "In all our drills, communication is always the issue that comes up. And communication is key to working through the crisis."

The unit also could have helped the Custer County Sheriff's Office in 2006

WASTEWATER

Jerome City Council Approves Moving Forward with Judicial Confirmation

JEROME • The Jerome City Council will sidestep voter approval and seek judicial confirmation of a \$35.8 million bond for its wastewater treatment facility.

The confirmation process means asking a judge to review the debt and deem it an ordinary and necessary expense. If a judge confirms the bond, a public vote would not be necessary.

Before agreeing to put \$48 million bond on the May 21 ballot, the council spent months debating what improvements and upgrades the wastewater facility needed. Voters turned down the bond by a vote of 393-461.

Officials have been pushing for a wastewater treatment facility upgrade since 2010. The Environmental Protection Agency ordered the city to bring it up to code or face serious fines for noncompliance. The facility is currently running over capacity.

The U.S. Department of Justice sent a letter June 6 that said the EPA would seek civil penalties from the city for illegal discharge and permit violations.

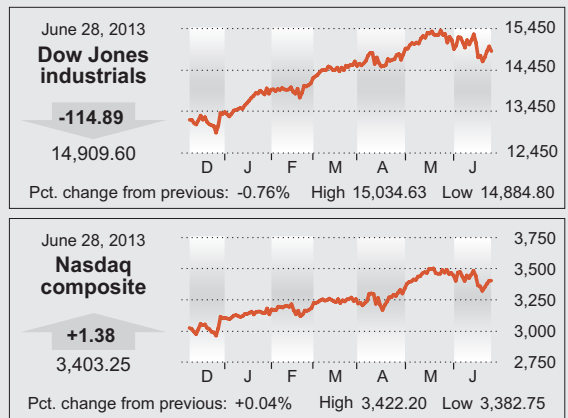

US Stocks Fall in Quiet End to a Bumpy Month

NEW YORK (AP) • Given the wild trading of late, it was a calm close to the month. After flitting between tiny gains and losses most of Friday, the stock market closed mostly lower, a peaceful end to the most volatile month in nearly two years. The S&P 500 stock index closed down 6.92 points, or 0.4 percent, to 1,606.28. The Dow Jones industrial average fell 114.89 points, or 0.8 percent, to 14,909.60. The Nasdaq composite index rose 1.38 points, or 0.04 percent, to 3,403.25.

Pomegranate Kernels Recalled Due to Possible Hepatitis Contamination

No Idaho illnesses have been reported.

TWIN FALLS • Scenic Fruit Company of Gresham, Ore., announced a voluntary recall of eight ounce bags of Woodstock Frozen Organic Pomegranate Kernels due to potential hepatitis A contamination.

Stores that sold Woodstock Frozen Organic Pomegranate Kernels include Atkinsons Market and Main Street Market in Ketchum. Both have pulled the product from their shelves.

People who purchased this product should dispose of it immediately and keep proof of product purchase.

Consumers who ate any of the Woodstock product

within the past 14 days and haven't been vaccinated against hepatitis A should contact their health care provider or local public health district. Consumers who have consumed the product and have any of these symptoms should contact their health care provider immediately for evaluation:

- Yellow eyes or skin
- Abdominal pain

- Pale stools
- Dark urine

Hepatitis A is a contagious liver disease that usually occurs when an infected food handler prepares food without appropriate hand hygiene. Food contaminated with hepatitis A virus, as is suspected with the pomegranate kernels, can cause illness among people who eat or handle the food.

Many Conditions Can Cause Secondary Hypertension

Q. I have recently been diagnosed with sleep apnea. I've heard that it can be partially caused by secondary hypertension. Is this true? And if so, what should I do?
— Tracy, Murtaugh

Answered by Dr. Michelle Myers with St. Luke's — Nephrology.

Certain conditions, such as sleep apnea, can cause hypertension. Hypertension and diabetes are the most common causes of kidney disease. Hypertension itself most commonly is caused by genetics. Blood pressure also can rise as we age. In certain instances, high blood pressure can be the result of another underlying condition. High blood pressure due to an underlying condition is called secondary hypertension.

A nephrologist specializes in kidney disease and hypertension, so people often are referred to a nephrologist for suspected secondary hypertension.

A variety of conditions can cause secondary hypertension. Sleep apnea, excessive alcohol use and overuse of certain over-the-counter medications for colds and inflammation can raise blood pressure, as can certain endocrine conditions. While not as common, tumors that produce certain hormones also can elevate blood pressure. So can blockages or narrowing of the arteries that feed the

kidneys, a condition called renal artery stenosis. An intervention, similar to what is done for blocked coronary arteries, can help open the clogged arteries to the kidneys.

Symptoms of high blood pressure include sudden headaches or changes in vision along with sleep apnea. Many times, people can have elevated blood pressure without knowing it. Because high blood pressure is a common cause of kidney disease, it is best to see your primary care doctor, get screened, and be referred to a specialist if kidney disease is indicated.

WEATHER

No Relief from the Heat

There is no escaping the high heat in store for us across Southern Idaho over the next several days. A very large, strong ridge of high pressure building over the Southwest is causing the massive western heat wave. By early next week, the center of this ridge will be right on top of us, delivering some of the highest temperatures we have seen in a very long time.

The weekend will be a scorcher, with highs near 100 or in the 100s today and Sunday. Bright sunshine and light winds are expected, and moisture in the air will feel muggy and sticky at times. Today's afternoon highs will be 100 for Twin Falls and could be 101 for Sunday. Monday and Tuesday look to be hotter as the high pressure center builds on top of southern Idaho. High temperatures across the valleys could hit

102 or, in some places, 104. The heat will be brutal, and the mountains won't offer any respite, with temperatures in the mid to upper 90s.

To add insult to injury, temperatures overnight won't drop much. Lows across the valleys the next four days will range from 65 to 70; in the mountains, to about 60. Take care of yourself, your pets and people who don't have air condi-

tioning, especially the elderly. Stay hydrated with water. If you must be outdoors, take breaks as often as possible and don't overdo it.

OBAMA VISITS SOUTH AFRICA

CENTURION, South Africa (AP) • President Barack Obama is receiving the embrace you might expect for a long-lost son on his return to his father's home continent, even as he has yet to leave a lasting policy legacy for Africa on the scale of his predecessors. Presidents Bill Clinton and George W. Bush passed innovative Africa initiatives while in the White House and passionately continue their development work in the region in their presidential afterlife. Obama's efforts here have not been so ambitious, despite his personal

ties to the continent. His first major tour of Africa as president is coming just now, in his fifth year, while Bush and Clinton are frequent fliers to Africa. Bush even will be in Dar es Salaam, Tanzania, next week at the same time as Obama, although they have no plans to meet. For Obama, one potentially memorable aspect of this trip — a meeting with former South African president and anti-apartheid leader Nelson Mandela — remained in doubt. Mandela is hospitalized in Johannesburg in critical condition.

China's Entrepreneurs Brace for Credit Crunch

BEIJING (AP) • Like a boxer slimming down for a fight, Li Zhongjian is shrinking his 20-year-old business manufacturing cigarette lighters to brace for a credit crunch he sees looming over China's entrepreneurs. Li's workforce in the southeastern city of Wenzhou has shrunk by half to 300 this year, and he isn't replacing employees who leave. He said he used to borrow money but is preparing to do without credit that might no longer be available as regulators try to force Chinese banks to cool a lending boom they worry could race out of control. "The authorities' shifting policies are not offering stable surroundings for businesspeople to be confident to work," said Li. "I won't

try to get loans for my business anymore. I'll wait and see how the market and policies are doing. I won't invest, either." A cash shortage that hit China's credit markets this month was the first shock wave from what analysts say could be Beijing's most drastic clampdown on credit in two decades. The central bank has called for tighter lending standards, which should reduce risk but is likely to reduce financing for a private sector that generates China's new jobs and wealth. China will benefit in the long run from a safer financial system, but the short-term cost could be a painful squeeze on entrepreneurs. Some say a recovery that already was faltering could weaken further.

Supreme Court Ruling a Boon for Gay Couples with Foreign Spouse

LOS ANGELES (AP) • The Supreme Court decision to give married gay couples equal standing with other married Americans is poised to radically change the lives of

binational same-sex couples. Previously, married gay and lesbian couples were unable to obtain green cards or other immigration benefits awarded to heterosexu-

als. In some cases, couples moved abroad to stay together, faced the prospect of deportation or hopped from visa to visa to remain in the country legally.

Experts say about 32,000 same sex couples have one partner who is a U.S. citizen and another from a foreign country. It isn't clear how many are married.

Witnesses Testify in the George Zimmerman Trial

SANFORD, Fla. (AP) • Two neighbors and a police officer gave accounts Friday in George Zimmerman's murder trial that seemed to bolster the neighborhood watch volunteer's contention that he was on his back and being straddled by Trayvon Martin during a confrontation with the teen.

Neighbor Jonathan Good said it appeared the unarmed teen was straddling Zimmerman during their confrontation, while another neighbor, Jonathan Manalo, said Zimmerman seemed credible when he said immediately after the fight that he had shot Martin in self-defense. Officer Tim Smith said on the witness stand that Zimmerman's backside was covered in grass and wetter than his front side.

All three were called as prosecution witnesses on the fifth day of testimony. Good, who had perhaps the best view of the fight of any witness, said he did not see anyone's head being slammed into the concrete sidewalk, which Zimmerman has said Martin did to him. Good initially testified that it appeared "there were strikes being thrown, punches being thrown," but during detailed questioning he said he saw only "downward" arm movements being made. Zimmerman has claimed that he fatally shot 17-year-old Martin last year in self-defense as the Miami-area teen was banging his head into the concrete sidewalk behind the townhomes in a gated community. But under prosecution questioning, Jonathan Good said he never saw anyone being attacked that way during the fight between Zimmerman and Martin. "I couldn't see that," Good said moments later while being cross-examined. Good, the second person to

take the witness stand Friday, said he heard a noise behind his townhome in February 2012, and he saw what looked like a tussle when he stepped out onto his patio to see what was happening. He said he yelled, "What's going on? Stop it." Good testified he saw a person in black clothing on top of another person with "white or red" clothing. He said he couldn't see faces but it looked like the person on the bottom had lighter skin. Martin was black and was wearing a dark hoodie. Zimmerman identifies as Hispanic and was wearing a red jacket. "It looked like there were strikes being thrown, punches being thrown," Good said. Later, under cross-examination, he said that it looked like the person on top was straddling the person on bottom in a mixed-martial arts move known as "ground and pound." When defense attorney Mark O'Mara asked him if the person on top was Martin, Good said, "Correct, that's what it looked like." Good also said the person

on the bottom yelled for help. Good was in the middle of dialing 911 inside his townhome when he heard a gunshot, he said. Zimmerman followed Martin in his truck and called a police dispatch number before he and the teen got into a fight. Manalo, whose wife had testified earlier in the week, was the first neighbor to step outside and see what happened with his flashlight after he heard a gunshot. He took cellphone photos of a bloodied Zimmerman and Martin's body, and those photos were shown to jurors on Friday. Manalo also described Martin's hands as being under his body. Manalo said Zimmerman didn't appear shocked and acted calmly. After police officers ar-

rived and handcuffed Zimmerman, the neighborhood watch volunteer asked Manalo to call his wife and tell her what happened. Manalo started to tell Zimmerman's wife that her husband had been involved in a shooting and was being questioned by police when "he cut me off and said, 'Just tell her I shot someone,'" Manalo said. Under cross-examination, Manalo said when he asked Zimmerman what happened, the neighborhood watch volunteer told him, "I was defending myself and I shot him." "From what you could tell at that moment, that seemed completely true?" asked defense attorney Don West. "Yes," Manalo said. The first police officer and the first paramedic to respond to the shooting also testified Friday. Smith testified that when he saw Zimmerman after the shooting, the neighborhood watch volunteer's backside was covered in grass and wetter than his front side, bolstering defense attorneys' contention that Martin was on top of Zimmerman. As he walked to the squad car after he had been handcuffed, Zimmerman told the officer that "he was yelling for help and nobody would come help him," Smith said. "It was almost a defeated ... a confused look on his face," Smith said.

Chicago Prepares for New Concealed Carry Gun Law

CHICAGO (AP) • This city, where violent street gangs shoot it out dozens of times a week despite some of the nation's toughest restrictions on guns, now faces a new challenge: Well-meaning citizens with the legal right to hit the streets with loaded firearms, whenever they want.

As Illinois Gov. Pat Quinn mulls whether to sign off on eliminating the country's last concealed carry ban, the question in Chicago is whether it will matter in the crime-weary city. Will a place that long had some of the nation's tightest restrictions on handguns be more at risk? Or will it be safer with a law that can only add to the number of guns already on the street?

Neighborhood leaders, anti-crime activists and police officials worry about additional mayhem in Chicago. But other residents, including some who live in Chicago's more violent areas, believe more guns will allow them to defend themselves better.

"We just had a weekend where something like 48 people were shot, seven died," said Otis McDonald, 79, one of the plaintiffs in the lawsuit that ended with the U.S. Supreme Court tossing out Chicago's strict gun ban three years ago. "Now law abiding citizens like myself ... can carry them when they want to and not carry them when they don't want to, and the people out there who will do us harm won't know when we got them and when we don't!"

At City Hall, where Chicago's anti-gun campaign has centered for years, the reaction to concealed carry legislation has been

relatively quiet. The reasons seem to boil down to this: The city can do little about stopping the law because a federal appeals court ordered Illinois to end its public possession ban by this summer.

"We would prefer to have the (gun) bans we've always enacted... (but) it's the best we could do based upon the mandate we have," said Alderman Patrick O'Connor.

The bill sitting on Quinn's desk is a hard-fought compromise between conservative downstate lawmakers who opposed most gun restrictions and anti-gun lawmakers from urban areas. The legislation requires state police to issue a concealed-carry permit to any gun owner with a state-issued Firearm Owners Identification card, and who passes a background check, pays a \$150 fee and undergoes 16 hours of training.

It's not as stringent as concealed carry laws in California, New York and a handful of others states, which give law enforcement authorities more power to deny permits. But it's more restrictive than earlier proposals by gun rights advocates, including one that would have superseded all local gun restrictions.

Most significantly for gun control advocates, the legislation does prohibit guns in places like schools, buses, trains, bars and government buildings. "If you think about all the prohibited places there are ... I don't think you will see an overwhelming number of people actually (carrying weapons) because it becomes such a headache," said state Sen. Kwame Raoul, a Chicago lawmaker and negotiator.

EU LOOKS BEYOND WARRING PAST IN BALKAN NATIONS

BRUSSELS (AP) • Their proclivity to divide, fight and break up was such that it became a verb — to balkanize. Now, the European Union wants to unite Balkan nations within a united continent, smothering any remaining enmity in cooperation and the promise of prosperity.

In one fell swoop on Friday, EU leaders welcomed Croatia as the club's newest member, agreed to open membership talks with Serbia and held out the promise of open trade and political cooperation with Kosovo. After wars in the former Yugoslavia of the 1990s filled the rest of Europe with dread, EU leaders are slowly shedding their reticence and moving into one of the continent's most perilous areas.

"The European Union is courageous enough," said European Parliament President Martin Schulz at an EU summit in Brussels that wrapped up Friday. Serbian President Tomislav Nikolic said the EU decision means that Serbia has restored its image abroad "even among those countries that do not like us very much."

"But all of them speak of Serbia with respect now," Nikolic said.

The prime minister of Croatia, which battled Serbia in the 1990s, welcomed the leaders' decision to give the go-ahead to talks with other Balkan nations. "Their absence from the EU creates a sort of strategic gap in the European belly," Croatian Prime Minister Zoran Milanovic told reporters in Brussels, where he joined other leaders as an honorary guest. Croatia formally joins the EU on Monday after nearly a decade of negotiations. He warned that Serbian membership is not a done deal.

"This process is going to be long and ... as anybody else

they will have to play by rules," Milanovic said.

For would-be Balkan member states, a big part of the lure of EU membership is financial aid, jobs and investment. However, this appeal has faded because of the debt crises in the eurozone that have hurt trade with other economies in the region too.

The EU leaders agreed to open membership talks with Serbia by January, in recognition of its efforts to improve relations with breakaway Kosovo. Challenges remain before former enemies can sit alongside each other at the same tables in Brussels to agree on joint security policies, for instance, and where to spend common funds.

Highlighting the gingerly walk toward peaceful coexistence, there were clashes Friday between Serbs and Albanians in Kosovo as Serbs celebrated Vidovdan, or St. Vitus Day, commemorating a medieval battle against invading Ottomans and symbolically asserting Serbian nationalists' claim to Kosovo.

France and Germany set the example for the continent by burying enmities and creating an economic union after World War II that was meant to render any new continental conflicts impossible.

Filibuster Was Only the Start

In just 11 hours Tuesday, Texas lawmaker Wendy Davis went from relative obscurity to national fame as the symbol of resistance to harsh antiabortion laws. Davis, a Democrat from Fort Worth, filibustered a proposal that would place new restrictions on abortion clinics and ban the practice after 20 weeks.

Her efforts were one of the more exciting instances of recent legislative activity. Under the rules of the chamber, Davis wasn't allowed to sit, drink, use the bathroom or lean against furniture as she spoke. What's more, she was required to speak on things germane to the topic at hand — the Texas Senate does not allow lawmakers to simply read from, say, a phone book.

Ultimately, state Republicans were able to end Davis' filibuster with a series of procedural challenges two hours before the midnight deadline to pass the bill. But a series of parliamentary questions from Democrats — and a rush of activity from protesters — managed to delay the legislative session long enough for the bill to die.

The odds of it staying defeated, however, are low. Gov. Rick Perry has already called a special legislative session to pass the abortion bill. Speaking at the National Right to Life Convention on Thursday, Perry noted that Davis is the daughter of a single woman and was herself a teenage mother and said that "it is just unfortunate that Davis hasn't learned from her own example that every life must be given a chance to realize its full potential" — an argument that boils down to: Wendy Davis should oppose legal abortion because she wasn't aborted herself. It's a despicable comment that ought to inspire women's rights groups and Texas Democrats to oppose the effort to pass the bill.

Davis has expressed interest in statewide office, and the timing of her turn in the spotlight is fortuitous; her seat is in danger of being gerrymandered away, thanks to the Supreme Court's decision this week gutting the pre-clearance formula of the 1965 Voting Rights Act.

If these new abortion restrictions pass — a likely outcome given Republican dominance in the state legislature — Texas will join the growing list of states whose onerous regulations and requirements have all but banned abortion. Indeed, if there is a trend in reproductive rights, it's toward tighter laws and diminished access to abortion and other services. Davis' filibuster, then, was only the beginning of what promises to be a very long battle to challenge and roll back these laws.

Is the Syrian War Good for the U.S.?

Over the past two years, Syria's descent into civil war has provoked alarm and horror in Washington. While officials have argued over the extent to which the United States can and should intervene, everyone agrees that the conflict poses a humanitarian catastrophe and a threat to U.S. interests across the Middle East, including to the stability of allies, the struggle against Islamist extremism and the effort to keep weapons of mass destruction out of terrorist hands.

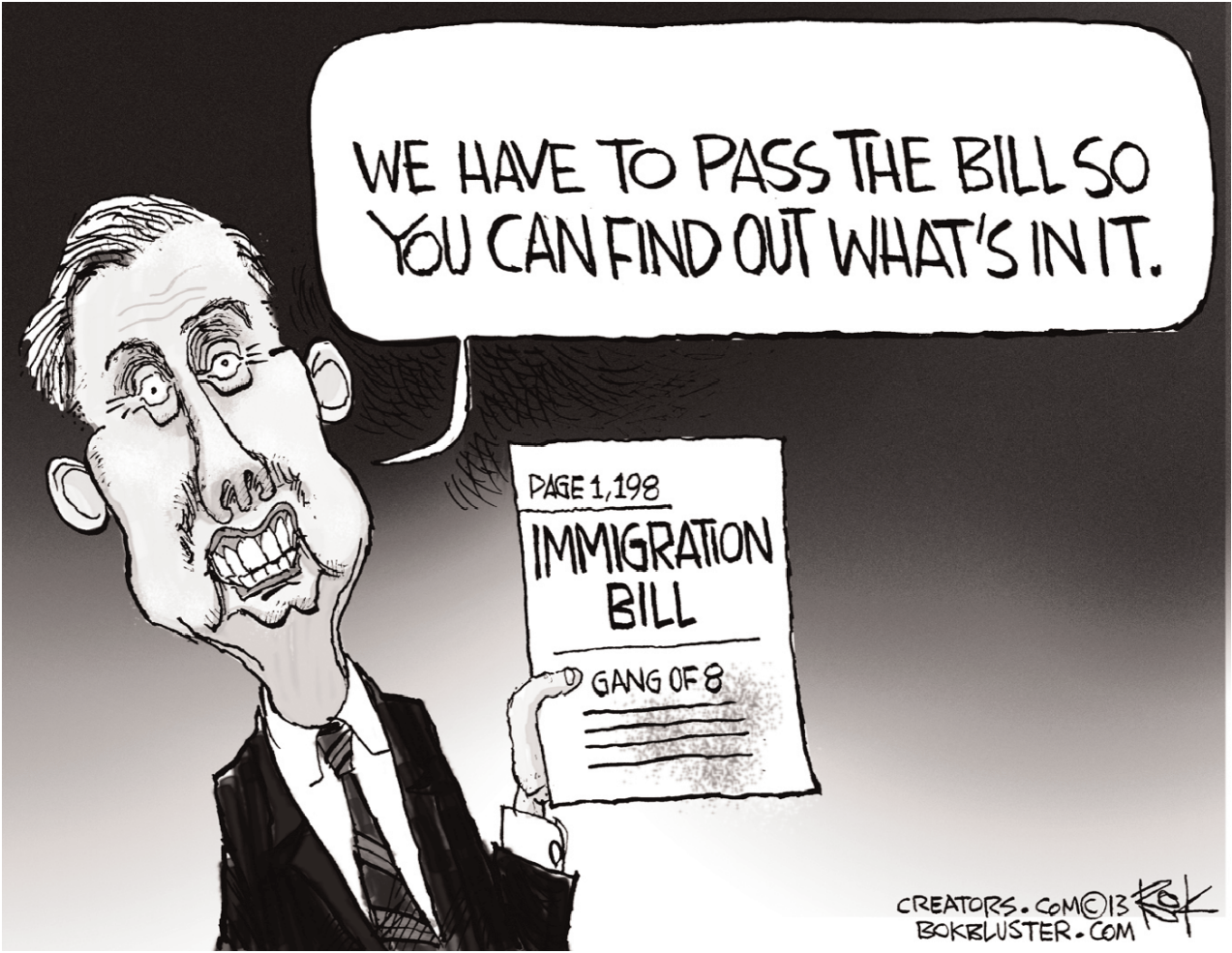
Lately, however, another argument has crept into the debate: the idea that, while unquestionably tragic, Syria's slow-motion unraveling might not be an unmitigated calamity for the United States. Rather, it could carry a upside by embroiling Iran, our foremost enemy in the region, in a costly, protracted struggle with al-Qaida. Syria, the theory holds, could be for Iran what the Iraq war was for the United States.

For the Obama administration, under fire for its handling of the crisis, this could be an appealing notion and a convenient rationalization for not attempting more decisive intervention that might stop the spiral of violence. But there's good reason beyond its ugly moral calculus that this argument is mostly whispered on the margins. Under scrutiny, it withers. The argument presumes that the Syrian conflict is bogging down the Iranians, sapping their strength and distracting them from more vital interests. Unfortunately, the evidence suggests that as Tehran has been riding to the rescue of Syrian President Bashar Assad, it has made disturbing inroads elsewhere, including Yemen and Iraq. That's because the instability the Syrian conflict is fueling across the Middle East is largely good for Iran: Sectarian polarization is driving anxious Shiite populations closer to Tehran, while refugee flows are weakening key U.S. allies.

What might an analogous outcome for Syria look like? We've had a preview of that future over the past month, as a surge of support from Iran and Hezbollah enabled Assad to make significant battlefield gains against the rebels.

Assad doesn't need to reconquer all of Syria for the Iranians to emerge successful. Every day that Assad stays in power thanks to Iranian help, Tehran shows that it can prevent the Obama administration from achieving its stated goal Assad's ouster and that Iran is the relevant power in the region.

And the longer the fighting drags on, the more radicalized Syrian society becomes and the deeper the Iranians can entrench themselves.

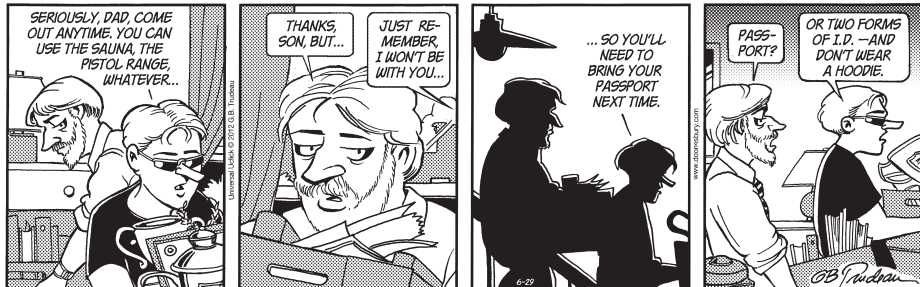

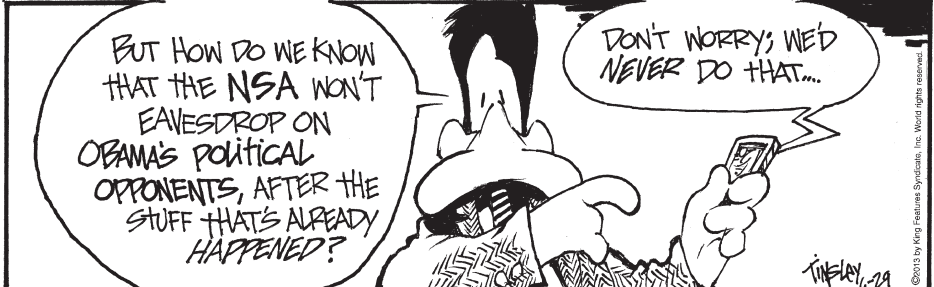

TODDLER DEAD AFTER IDAHO PLANE CRASH

BOISE • Two small planes collided in central Idaho on Friday morning at the site of a backcountry fly-in, killing a 2-year-old boy and injuring three other people.

A single-engine Piper Tri-Pacer and a twin-engine Beechcraft Baron collided in flight at 9:50 a.m. at Johnson

Creek Airport, a backcountry air strip near Yellow Pine, the Federal Aviation Administration reported.

The Valley County sheriff's office said witnesses reported the two planes were landing at the same time when one came down on top of the other and both crashed.

The 2-year-old boy was fatally injured and his father was taken by air ambulance to a

Boise hospital, where he was listed in serious condition, the sheriff's office said. The family is from Utah, but their names were not released.

Two men in the lower plane, both from the Roseburg, Ore., region, suffered non-life-threatening injuries, according to the sheriff's office. They were taken to a hospital in McCall.

The planes' tail numbers haven't been released.

for the monument to be placed at the city park. Many other people contributed to the project, too, Bell said.

“That freedom they (the soldiers) purchased with the blood, the sweat and the tears of their lives was not free,” Bell said. “It’s a continuing battle to keep this county the best country in the world for our youngsters, our grandchildren and future generations.”

Anna Workman, mother of fallen soldier Chris Workman, was unable to attend due to a medical appointment. On Friday, she said the community is fortunate to have such thoughtful people who work so hard to keep the public’s awareness on the military and the sacrifices they make.

At the ceremony, after the monument was dedicated, her husband, John, lowered the American flag to half-staff.

Their son, Chris, was killed last year in a Blackhawk helicopter crash in Afghanistan.

“I feel that people in this community, and Idaho as a whole, are very respectful and very appreciative of the service members who have died on foreign soil and in service to our country,” said Anna Workman.

That is not always the case in other parts of the country and in other diverse socio-economic areas of this nation, she said.

“I especially want to thank George for the beautiful monument and the unknown individual who has been secretly placing items on my son’s grave for the past year,”

when Jon Francis, a counselor at Luther Heights Bible Camp near Ketchum, went missing while climbing Grand Mogul near Redfish Lake, said Marsano.

“It’s kind of been an ongoing investigation through the night,” she said.

A sheriff’s office press release gave this account of the fight:

At one point, deputies believed suspects were in a house. Deputies cleared the house and questioned two people, Stewart said.

“It looks like they are most likely not the suspects at this point,” she said.

Felix, Jackson reflect on memorable NBA Draft.

The road from the College of Southern Idaho to the NBA had Carrick Felix and Pierre Jackson five hours apart Thursday night. The distance between their selections in the NBA draft seemed much closer. The sixth and seventh former CSI players selected in the history of the draft, Felix and Jackson, drafted nine picks apart, spent Thursday night with their families — Jackson at a hotel in his hometown of Las Vegas, Felix with his daughter and cousins in Phoenix. "I was really antsy (as the second round started)," Jackson said. "I wasn't really sure what was going on or where I was going." Felix was selected in the spot most had Jackson going — 33rd to the Cleveland Cavaliers. Jackson went 42nd to the Philadelphia 76ers, but he's likely headed to the New Orleans Pelicans. During the draft, Philadelphia and New Orleans agreed to a trade that would send No. 6 pick Nerlens Noel and a protected first-round pick next year to Philadelphia, with Jackson's rights and All-Star point guard Jrue Holiday headed to the Big Easy. Due to NBA rules, Jackson won't officially be a Pelican until the trade is finalized July 11 and can't have contact with New Orleans or comment on the trade particulars or his role with the team until then. Jackson said he was "excited" when he saw his friend Felix get selected ahead of him, knowing "the road we have both taken to get there." It kicked up a few notches when his name was called. "Seeing the reaction on everyone's faces when I got drafted — I wasn't looking at the TV at that time — it was crazy," Jackson said. "I got tackled by my little brother." Everything is official for Felix, but playing time is all but guaranteed. He was introduced to the media on Friday after flying into Cleveland in the morning. "I was at home with my family, grandparents, cousins, my daughter came to town and we were all just there sitting in front of the TV," Felix said. "I was holding my daughter when my name got called and just tried not to get overly excited, I walked outside, no emotion. Just thank God for the opportunity." Felix was only asked one question in Friday's 16-minute introductory press conference — most questions were directed to No. 1 overall pick Anthony Bennett — but there are plenty speaking on his behalf. Eric Musselman, an assistant coach over Felix at Arizona State University, former NBA head coach and son of former Cavs coach Bill Musselman, was effusive in his praise during an interview with Cleveland's Plain Dealer. "(Cleveland coach) Mike Brown will love him," Musselman said. "He's not a good kid, he is a great kid. He is an NBA-caliber defender right now. He will get virtually every loose ball, those 50-50 balls. He can really rebound. It's 100 percent effort, every day, every game, every practice." "We used Carrick to guard anyone from the point to a power forward," said Musselman. "He could defend anyone but a center in college. In the pros, he'll get after you. He will make every practice better. I coached in the league; you need guys like Carrick on your team." Musselman compared Felix to Shane Battier, whom Musselman coached in Memphis. Armstrong’s U.S. Heirs Challenged to Regain Trust

PORTO VECCHIO, Corsica • They grew up watching Texan Lance Armstrong win the Tour de France every year. Now American riders like Andrew Talansky and Tejay van Garderen carry a burden.

Talansky and Van Garderen are 24 years old and the pick of the six Americans in this year’s 100th Tour, which begins today in the Corsican harbor town of Porto Vecchio. They will be contending for the white jersey awarded to the best young rider.

This is the first Tour since Armstrong acknowledged doping. Cycling may well be much cleaner because of aggressive anti-doping measures, but the stigma persists. Van Garderen thinks it will be hard to fully regain the trust of home fans that was broken by Armstrong.

“I mean, we can try, but what can you really do? You have to just make a decision to ride clean, which I have, and hope people start taking an interest again,” Van Garderen told The Associated Press by phone from his hotel room. “Other than that, I can scream from the top of a building that I’m clean, but I think many people have done that before.”

There are relatively few Americans in this year’s race. On the 1999 Tour — the first of the seven consecutive wins Armstrong has been stripped of for doping — seven of the nine riders on the U.S. Postal team were Americans.

Van Garderen, a powerful climber who was fifth overall in last year’s Tour, hopes to win the showcase race one day.

“Absolutely,” the BMC rider said. “It’s been a dream of mine since I was 10 years old.”

Van Garderen and Talansky were 10 in 1999 and among the legions of fans transfixed by the comeback of cancer survivor Armstrong.

After years of strong denials, Armstrong told Oprah Winfrey in January that he doped on all of his Tour wins. The confession followed a scathing 200-page report compiled by the U.S. Anti-Doping Agency on systematic drug use by Armstrong and his teams.

Armstrong said Friday in an interview with French newspaper Le Monde that it was “impossible” during his era to win the Tour without doping.

Jonathan Vaughters, Talansky’s team manager and a teammate of Armstrong’s on the ’99 Tour as well as a key witness against him in the USADA case, insists cycling is much cleaner, though he acknowledges that fans may take some convincing.

“We’re in a place where the sport has moved for-

Armstrong Uninvited, Unwanted Guest at 100th Tour

PORTO VECCHIO, Corsica • Lance Armstrong made himself the uninvited guest at the Tour de France on Friday, coming back to haunt the 100th edition of the race and infuriating riders both past and present by talking at length in a newspaper interview about doping in the sport.

Armstrong told Le Monde that he still considers himself the record-holder for Tour victories, even though all seven of his titles from 1999-2005 were stripped from him last year for doping.

He said his life has been ruined by the U.S. Anti-Doping Agency investigation that exposed as lies his years of denials that he and his teammates doped. He also took another swipe at cycling’s top administrators, darkly suggesting they could be brought down by other skeletons in the sport’s closet.

None of those comments broke new ground, but in answering questions from Le Monde — a newspaper he scorned when he was still competing — Armstrong ensured that his views on doping at the Tour would have maximum impact in France and couldn’t easily be written off as sour grapes being hurled at the race from afar. The respected daily is very much France’s newspaper of record. Its interview with the rider and his assertion that doping won’t be eradicated from cycling dominated French airwaves ahead of today’s race start, causing dismay and anger in the sport desperate to prove that it has turned the page on his era of serial cheating.

The Tour’s director, Christian Prudhomme, suggested Armstrong was milking the race’s notoriety to further his own agenda.

“This is a very big tournament, just look around: There are 2,300 accredited journalists here, there are cameras everywhere. So if someone wanted to transmit a message, this is the time obviously, espe-

ward. Now, how do we keep it that way? We change the perception,” he said. “On the 1996 Tour de France, no one was talking about doping, but that was when the problem was the worst. So, now you’ve got everyone talking about it but when you look at the speeds on the key climbs and the races on the mean (average)

cially since everyone likes this kind of controversial statements,” he said.

Armstrong’s comments and the consternation they caused highlighted cycling’s dilemma: It is a sport fighting to give itself a cleaner, brighter future by combating drug cheats but much of that good work is being overshadowed by the dirty secrets of dopers from the past.

Pre-Tour, a drip-drip-drip of doping confessions and revelations about the Armstrong era have rained on the sport. Armstrong’s former rival on French roads, 1997 Tour winner Jan Ullrich, admitted to blood-doping for the first time. French media also reported that a Senate investigation into the effectiveness of anti-doping controls pieced together evidence of drug use at the 1998 Tour by Laurent Jalabert, a former star of the race now turned broadcaster.

Armstrong’s claim that it was “impossible” to win the Tour without doping in his era echoed what he already told U.S. television talk show host Oprah Winfrey in January, when he finally confessed. Then, he said doping was “part of the job.” The banned hormone erythropoietin, or EPO, wasn’t detectable by cycling’s doping controls until 2001 and so was widely abused because it prompts the body to produce oxygen-carrying red blood cells, giving a big performance boost to endurance athletes.

they’re down, they’re way down.”

Vaughters took the performance enhancer EPO when he was riding. Many years later, he has instilled a rigorous anti-doping stance at Garmin and has high hopes for Talansky, a second-place finisher at the Paris-Nice race in March.

“I think he can win a

Grand Tour. Whether it’s next year, five years from now, I don’t know, but he’s capable,” Vaughters said.

Talansky wants to avoid putting pressure on himself in his first Tour de France.

“If you let this whole thing overwhelm you then it’s going to affect your performance,” he said.

He echoes Van Garderen’s belief that it is now crucial to restore cycling’s credibility, to move away from Armstrong and Landis.

“It depends on people 100 percent believing in what they’re watching,” Talansky said. “For the most part they’re willing to accept that myself and Tejay and Taylor are racing clean and standing up for the future of the sport.”

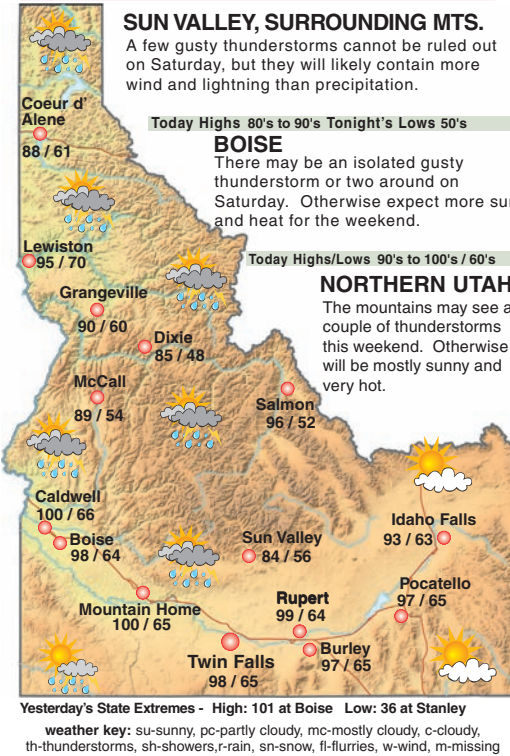

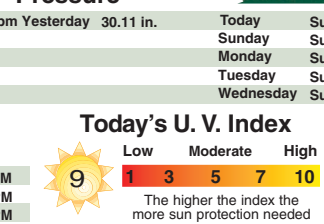

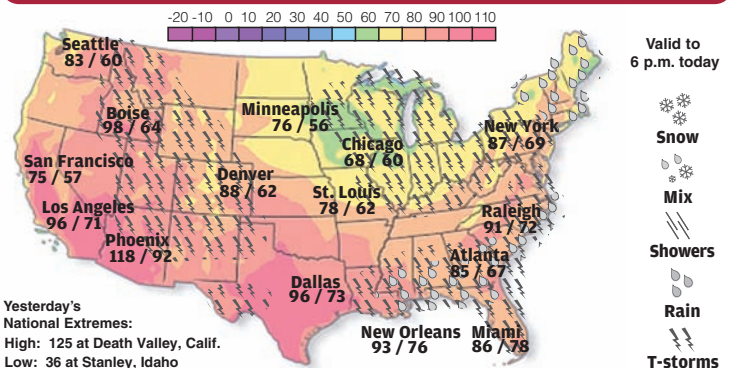

NEW YORK • The Brooklyn Nets will acquire Paul Pierce and Kevin Garnett from the Boston Celtics in a deal that was still developing as the NBA draft ended, according to a person with knowledge of the details.

The trade can't be completed until July 10, after next season's salary cap is set, so pieces were still being discussed early Friday. But the person says the Nets will get the two perennial All-Stars, signaling the breakup of the Celtics' veteran core.

The person was granted anonymity because details of the trade were not being made public.

Nets general manager Billy King refused to comment on the deal during his press conference to discuss the drafting of Mason Plumlee.

Yahoo Sports, which first reported the talks, said the Nets would also get veteran Jason Terry from Boston and send Gerald Wallace, Kris Joseph, the expiring deal of Kris Humphries and three future first-round picks to Boston.

On the day they hosted the NBA draft, the Nets were making much bigger noise with the transaction that will

send Pierce and Garnett to a new Atlantic Division home.

The Celtics already let Doc Rivers leave after acquiring a draft pick from the Los Angeles Clippers. Ray Allen departed last summer for Miami, and now the other two members of the Big Three that led the Celtics to an NBA title and within a victory of a second will soon be gone as well.

"Sort of sad," said Chicago coach Tom Thibodeau, an assistant to Rivers on the

2008 NBA champions.

"You hate to see it. I certainly hate to see them go to Brooklyn, Doc of course going to the Clippers. But that's the NBA. It's constant change, and you have to be ready to adapt. I think what Paul Pierce did for that franchise and Kevin — I think it's good for them. They have an opportunity to continue on. Good for the Celtics, where they can start their rebuilding, and it was good for Doc."

Connecticut Man Arraigned in Hernandez Murder Case

ATTLEBORO, Mass. (AP) • A man arrested in Connecticut in connection with the murder case against former New England Patriots tight end Aaron Hernandez was charged with a weapons count, and investigators said a third suspect was arrested Friday in south Florida.

Massachusetts State Police said local officers in Miramar, Fla., captured Ernest Wallace

early Friday afternoon, hours after a Connecticut judge ordered Carlos Ortiz turned over to Massachusetts authorities.

New Britain State's attorney said 27-year-old Ortiz was arrested in Bristol on Wednesday as part of the investigation into the slaying of Boston semi-pro football player Odin Lloyd.

Hernandez is charged with

murder in the slaying of Lloyd near Hernandez's home in North Attleborough, Mass. He has pleaded not guilty and is being held without bail.

Ortiz was picked up in Connecticut for being a fugitive from justice. He was arraigned Friday afternoon in Massachusetts on a charge of carrying a firearm without a license in North Attleborough on June 17, the day Lloyd was killed.

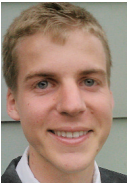

Harvesting Food, Serving Up Community

The Ascension Community Garden is open to all, with plans to expand next year.

TWIN FALLS • Not everyone who grows vegetables in the Ascension Community Garden is a member of the church. But that's the point and the fun of it all, said Betsy Wiesmore, organizer and Ascension Community Garden committee chair.

Two years ago, while at a state Episcopal convention, Wiesmore said the posed question, "What was the church doing to reach out to the community?" made her take action.

Wiesmore — a horticulturist — took it as the perfect opportunity to pursue her dream of starting a community garden.

With the backing of the Church of the Ascension, Wiesmore and a committee of six tilled a section of green lawn on church property for a community garden. The church's property is also home to soccer fields, playground, labyrinth and green space that can be used for walking. All of which is open to the public.

"We (Church of the Ascension) own it all, but we don't need it all," Wiesmore said. "It's a lot of lawn to mow."

Last year, there were 11 plots in the back of the church. This year, there are 19 with plans to double the size of the garden next year. Wiesmore said there is already a waiting list of seven potential gardeners.

Gardeners include parishioners and several refugee families in the Magic Valley. Wiesmore said a large number of the refugee families growing food in the Ascension Community Garden utilize the garden because they live in apartments.

Findayihebra Charles, a refugee from Burundi, has maintained a plot in the community garden for two years. Last year, Charles shared several of the tomatoes he grew with other refugee families.

"It's very helpful. We save some money," Charles said.

Besides the opportunity to grow his own food, Charles said the act of

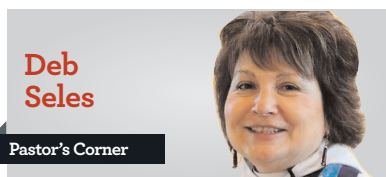

Welcoming the Stranger

A recent *Times-News* story featured the economic growth our area is experiencing as new companies move in, and as established ones expand their labor forces. School teachers and administrators speak of the influx of refugees who seek opportunity, peace and stability far away from violence and oppression. Immigrants move towards citizenship through new laws. They are seeking home, seeking welcome through new jobs, relationships and connections.

God's radical hospitality is found in ancient scripture. When the Jewish people were nomadic, they were commanded to welcome the



stranger: "The alien who resides with you shall be to you as the citizen among you; you shall love the alien as yourself, for you were aliens in the land of Egypt." (Leviticus 19:34).

Jesus broadens the notion of God's radical love by instructing his followers to welcome others as if we are welcoming him and to love our enemies. In 1 Corinthians, Paul derides those who would "eat the body

unworthily" by excluding the poor from what was to be an open love feast (agape) meal.

God's vision of radical hospitality has not yet been fulfilled: while we may not be intentionally and publicly exclusive of the stranger, we've a long way to go to that shared vision of a world in which our racial and cultural differences are seen as blessings. In humility, knowing we've not yet 'arrived,' we work together to incarnate the Body of Christ. The inviting community and church says to the stranger, "Come, join our community and share our values and heritage. Become one of us."

Sears, J.C. Penney Sever Ties with Paula Deen

NEW YORK (AP) • Paula Deen's media and merchandising empire is collapsing.

Sears, J.C. Penney and Walgreen said Friday that they're cutting ties with Deen, adding to the growing list of companies severing their relationship following revelations that the Southern celebrity chef used racial slurs in the past.

Meanwhile, Deen's publisher has canceled a deal with her for multiple books, including an upcoming cookbook that was the No. 1 seller on Amazon.com and Barnes & Noble.com.

Ballantine Books said Friday it would not release "Paula Deen's New Testament: 250 Favorite Recipes, All Lightened Up," which was scheduled for October and was the first of a five-

book deal announced early last year. Interest in it had surged as Deen, who grew up in Albany, Ga., and specializes in Southern comfort food, came under increasing attack for acknowledging she had used the N-word.

Ballantine, an imprint of Random House Inc., said it decided to cancel the book's publication after "careful consideration." It had no comment beyond what was in its brief statement, spokesman Stuart Applebaum said.

Sears Holdings Corp. said it will phase out all products tied to the Paula Deen brand after "careful consideration of all available information."

"We will continue to evaluate the situation," said the parent company of Sears and Kmart stores.

gardening and eventually start cooking classes. However, there are some things sprouting up in the community garden that she has never seen before. A number of refugees are growing mustard greens from seeds from their home countries.

The garden is full of a variety of plants from like lettuce, carrots and eggplants. The only plants gardeners are not allowed to grow are corn and vine plants. Corn would shade other crops and vines would invade neighboring plots.

"Gardeners bring their whole family and it's a good use of our property," Wiesmore said.

Paula Gooding, office manager at the Church of the Ascension, cares for a garden plot with her seven grandchildren.

"We've had great fun," Gooding said. "They helped plant it and were excited to see something come up. When you grow from seed you just hope something comes up, and some of our hopes came true."

Gooding said sometimes interacting with other gardeners is hit or miss because people come all times of the

Moving the next step towards God's vision, the message is: "Help us to be diverse." That implies a willingness of the dominant community to be changed itself. Finally, the stranger is invited to bring all of who they are: their culture, voice and whole self to the journey. The epistles describe the struggles of the early church to address God's call to radical hospitality: should Gentiles be circumcised before becoming Christians? Was it okay to eat meat sacrificed to Roman gods? Could eunuchs and other 'unclean' people be baptized? Over and over, God's message was "All are welcome!" and listening to the Spirit, the church found itself truly becoming catholic, universal.

After 2000 years, the radical welcome of God continues to open doors: to

people from foreign lands, women, the mentally and physically challenged, our LGBT brothers and sisters, slave and free. With the church universal we participate — joyfully and painfully and (we pray) faithfully — in building a house "where love can dwell . . . where saints and children tell how hearts learn to forgive. Here the love of God, through Jesus is revealed . . . where peace and justice meet . . . Where love is found in water, wine and wheat . . . Here the outcast and the sinner bear the image of God's face."

So we pray to be the kind of church and the kind of community "where all God's children dare to dream God's reign anew." We work together to declare, "All are welcome in this place!"

UK Tech Guru Found Dead in Bermuda

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico (AP) • James Martin, a British philanthropist and technology guru who was once the highest-selling author on books about computing, has died near his private island in Bermuda. He was 79.

Authorities in the British territory said Thursday that an autopsy is pending for Martin, whose body was found by a kayaker in waters near his home on Agar's Island. Police have said they do not believe a crime is involved.

Martin was the largest single private donor in the nearly 900-year history of the University of Oxford, donating more than \$150 mil-

lion to help establish the Oxford Martin School, where researchers study global issues, challenges and opportunities facing humanity in the 21st century. Project topics range from climate change to quantum physics to the future of food.

Martin also was a Pulitzer Prize nominee for a 1977 technology book, "The Wired Society," which Oxford University said contained descriptions about the use of computers and the Internet that was still timely a quarter of a century later.

The university also noted that Martin was ranked fourth in Computer World's 25th Anniversary Edition's most influential people in

computer technology. He is also credited with helping automate software development.

"You rarely meet someone who's such an incredible philanthropist whose sole interest is doing good at the highest level," said Dr. Anthony Knap, director of the Geochemical and Environmental Research Group at Texas A&M University. "I think it's a tragic loss. He was an innovative man who could have continued doing good."

Knap, who previously worked in Bermuda, told The Associated Press in a phone interview that he had known Martin for about 18 years and considered him a very

modest and gentle man.

"He was a bit of an enigma," Knap said. "For a long time he was in the background, which didn't really fit into his level of success."

Martin traveled around the world to give lectures and is an honorary life fellow of the British Royal Institution and a fellow of the World Academy of Art and Science.

He wrote more than 100 textbooks and published books including "The Meaning of the 21st Century," which was made into a film narrated by actor Michael Douglas. It analyzes technological, political, ethical, social and environmental issues of modern times.

Pa. Girl Doing Well after 2nd Lung Transplant

PHILADELPHIA (AP) • A 10-year-old Pennsylvania girl who underwent a double-lung transplant amid a national debate over the organ allocation process received a second set of lungs after the first failed, and has now taken some breaths on her own, the girl's parents said Friday.

The first set of lungs failed within hours of the June 12 transplant at Children's Hospital of Philadelphia, and Sarah Murnaghan was placed on machines, according to her mother. She was

placed back on the lung transplant list the night after her surgery and received a second set of lungs on June 15.

"We were told . . . that she was going to die," Janet Murnaghan said at a news conference Friday afternoon as she explained why Sarah's second transplant was not publicly disclosed. "We weren't prepared to live out her dying in public."

The suburban Philadelphia girl initially received lungs from an adult donor after her parents sued over

national rules that place children behind adolescents and adults on the priority list for adult lungs — even if the children are sicker and are capable of accepting adult organs.

The Murnaghans and the family of 11-year-old Javier Acosta of New York City challenged the policy making children under 12 wait for pediatric lungs to become available or be offered adult lungs only after adolescents and adults on the waiting list had been considered. Both children have

end-stage cystic fibrosis.

A federal judge ruled they should be eligible for adult lungs after U.S. Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius declined to intervene.

Janet Murnaghan said Sarah's condition began to "spiral out of control" shortly after the first surgery. A second set of lungs was found and transplanted even though the donor once had pneumonia, making the surgery extra risky. The second set was also from an adult donor.

Today is Saturday, June 29, the 180th day of 2013. There are 185 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight:

On June 29, 1613, London's original Globe Theatre, where many of Shakespeare's plays were performed, was destroyed by a fire sparked by a cannon shot during a performance of "Henry VIII." (No fatalities were reported.)

TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:

In 1767, Britain approved the Townshend Revenue Act, which imposed import duties on glass, paint, oil, lead, paper and tea shipped to the American colonies. (Colonists bitterly protested, prompting Parliament to repeal the duties — except for tea.)

In 1913, the Second Balkan War broke out as Bulgaria attacked Serbia and Greece, its former allies from the First Balkan War.

In 1927, the first trans-Pacific airplane flight was completed as Lt. Lester J. Maitland and Lt. Albert F. Hegenberger arrived at Wheeler Field in Hawaii aboard the Bird of Paradise, an Atlantic-Fokker C-2, after flying 2,400 miles from Oakland, Calif., in 25 hours, 50 minutes.

In 1954, the Atomic Energy Commission voted against re-instating Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer's access to classified information.

In 1956, actress Marilyn Monroe married playwright Arthur Miller in a civil ceremony in White Plains, N.Y. (The couple also wed in a Jewish ceremony on July 1; the marriage lasted 4½ years).

In 1967, Jerusalem was reunified as Israel removed barricades separating the Old City from the Israeli sector.

In 1972, the U.S. Supreme Court struck down a trio of death sentences, saying the way they had been imposed constituted cruel and unusual punishment. (The ruling prompted states to effectively impose a moratorium on executions until their capital punishment laws could be revised.)

In 1988, the U.S. Supreme Court, in Morrison v. Olson, upheld the independent counsel law in a 7-1 decision (the sole dissenter was Justice Antonin Scalia).

In 1993, Joel Rifkin pleaded not guilty at an arraignment in Mineola, N.Y., to one count of murder, a day after police found a woman's body in his pickup truck. (Rifkin, who has confessed to killing 17 women, is serving multiple life sentences for nine murders.)

Ten years ago: Thirteen people were killed, dozens injured, when a third-floor apartment building porch crowded with guests collapsed onto porches below during a party in Chicago. Actress Katharine Hepburn, one of the last stars from Hollywood's Golden Age, died in Old Saybrook, Conn., at age 96.

Five years ago: Zimbabwe's longtime ruler Robert Mugabe was sworn in as president for a sixth term after a widely discredited runoff in which he was the only candidate. Two weeks away from her 20th birthday, Inbee Park became the youngest winner of the U.S. Women's Open by closing with a 2-under 71 at Interlachen in Edina, Minn. Spain won the European Championship 1-0 over Germany for its first major title in 44 years.

One year ago: A day after the House voted to find Attorney General Eric Holder in contempt of Congress, the Justice Department said Holder's decision to withhold information about a bungled gun-tracking operation from Congress did not constitute a crime, and that he would not be prosecuted. The younger brother and business partner of disgraced financier Bernard Madoff pleaded guilty to charges he'd doctored documents for years, but Peter Madoff insisted he knew nothing about his brother's massive Ponzi scheme. (Peter Madoff was later sentenced to 10 years in prison.) The U.S. Anti-Doping Agency filed formal charges against Lance Armstrong, accusing the seven-time Tour de France winner of using performance-enhancing drugs throughout the best years of his career. (The USADA ended up stripping Armstrong of all his Tour de France titles and issued a lifetime ban from cycling.)

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

"More than any other time in history, mankind faces a crossroads. One path leads to despair and utter hopelessness. The other, to total extinction. Let us pray we have the wisdom to choose correctly."

West makes a negative double and North's cue-bids show a sound raise in spades. As you were uncertain about the final spot, you made a trial bid in hearts, prompting North to blast directly to game. How do you plan to make 10 tricks after West leads ace and another trump?

Although it is not crucial, you unblock one of dummy's trump honors under the ace. After winning the second trump cheaply in hand, you judge West began with a doubleton trump because he would surely have led a low trump from ace-third. So, there is no chance of ruffing a heart in dummy, for East will win the heart trick and play a third trump.

Consequently, you will need to set up the diamond suit. Although your chances may look slim, given the shortage of entries to dummy, you can achieve your target — so long as West holds three diamonds including the 10. The layout you need will be similar to the one in the diagram.

When you lead the diamond two to the eight and queen, East will be on lead. He cashes the heart king, then returns a third trump, which you win in dummy. Next you cash the diamond ace (throwing a heart) and then lead the diamond jack. East covers with the diamond king, and when you ruff, West's diamond 10 falls as you had hoped. You will now make four trumps, four clubs and two diamonds for your required total of 10 tricks.

ANSWER: I rarely tell my readers there is no second choice in a deal. But today I'm going out on a limb: Two spades is mandatory, and there are no second choices, including two clubs. Unbalanced minimum opening bids with a three-card raise should start by raising rather than bidding the second suit and then supporting. Switch the club five to the ace and you bid two clubs, then support partner at your next turn.

Many other people contributed to the project, too, Bell said.

"That freedom they (the soldiers) purchased with the blood, the sweat and the tears of their lives was not free," Bell said. "It's a continuing battle to keep this county the best country in the world for our youngsters, our grandchildren and future generations."

Anna Workman, mother of fallen soldier Chris Workman, was unable to attend due to a medical appointment. On Friday, she said the community is fortunate to have such thoughtful people who work so hard to keep the public's awareness on the military and the sacrifices they make.

At the ceremony, after the monument was dedicated, her husband, John, lowered the American flag to half-staff.

Their son, Chris, was killed last year in a Blackhawk helicopter crash in Afghanistan.

"I feel that people in this community, and Idaho as a whole, are very respectful and very appreciative of the service members who have died on foreign soil and in service to our country," said Anna Workman.

That is not always the case in other parts of the country

and in other diverse socioeconomic areas of this nation, she said. "I especially want to thank George for the beautiful monument and the unknown individual who has been secretly placing items on my son's grave for the past year," she said.

"Their families continue to sacrifice every day that their

loved ones are not with them," he said.

Rupert Councilwoman Tammy Jones said she asked a friend how it feels to be a soldier. He answered in three words: pride, honor, duty.

"As we dedicate this monument to our fallen soldiers," Jones said, "let us remember the example they've set, pride, honor and duty. May we show our gratitude to these soldiers by taking their example and paying it forward in our own lives."

The district couldn't afford to reduce the eight furlough days teachers now must take.

"A lot of time as teachers, we feel so stressed trying to get students to learn everything they need to pass the state tests," said Carson, who teaches third grade at Declo Elementary School. "The furlough days represent a lot of classroom time."

The agreement includes a more generous salary schedule than the state's and eliminates a master's degree barrier for teachers with 13 years of experience who have completed a required number of classes.

The district's salary sched-

ule allows those teachers to make \$49,707, nearly \$6,500 more than the state's schedule. The toppling of the master's degree barrier will benefit 51 of the district's 285 certified teachers, Carson said.

Other points in the pact include a minimum teacher's salary of \$31,000 and money to move eligible employees up one level in the salary schedule if they undertake additional education.

The district also will pay for three days of professional development, especially helpful for teachers who have reached the top of the pay scale, Carson said.

Health insurance costs will increase about 11 percent and dental insurance 6 percent. The employee insurance deductible will rise from \$1,500

to \$2,000 a year.

Carson said the team also negotiated a guaranteed 30-minute non-paid break for elementary school teachers.

"That guarantees the teachers will have a period of time each day where they are not responsible for students," she said.

"It looks like they are most likely not the suspects at this point," she said.

The sheriff had requested help from the Civil Support Team, but it's geared to deal with mass destruction rather than first responders. The Guard could even have provided radios to searchers in that case.

"It would have multiplied their response by a factor of 10, without them needing to buy a bunch of equipment," Marsano said.
