PASSION FOR CHEESE, Jumpstart for Downtown

Glanbia opens doors to new cheese center, corporate offices.

Unbuttoning his dress shirt, Glanbia President and CEO Jeff Williams puffed out his chest and proudly bared the blue and white T-shirt beneath.

"Life is gouda," it read.

"We wear our passion on our shirtsleeves. But I can tell you that we also wear it on our heart," he said, rousing applause from the crowd gathered Wednesday morning.

During Glanbia's grand opening of its corporate offices and Cheese Innovation Center in Old Towne, Williams said he hopes the buzz will energize employees to further improve the company and its products.

Much energy, thought and hard work went into building the innovation center, which local officials hope will be an economic boon for Old Towne and downtown, he said.

"It was a huge collaborative effort, and it does show what can happen when people come together - entrepreneurs, business people, government, city folks, townspeople and a group of great employees and milk suppliers," he said. "We have the best milk in the world right here in Idaho, and we are going feed the world."

Between samples of cheese, locals toured the 14,000-squarefoot innovation center and the three-story, 35,000-square-foot corporate headquarters built to house about 100 employees. The buildings are at Fourth Avenue South and Shoshone Street West.

"This is where the money is going to be made," Williams said, gesturing toward the innovation center. "And this (corporate headquarters) is where we are going to count the money."

Cassia County Terminates Burley's Law Enforcement Services

BURLEY • Cassia County has terminated its law enforcement services contract with Burley, effective Sept. 30, after the two governments failed to reach a compromise on a \$50,000 difference in contract costs.

Commissioners voted unanimously in an emergency meeting Wednesday to stop providing police services to Burley.

The decision came on the heels of the Burley City Council's vote Tuesday to spend




Weak Earnings Tug Stocks Lower on Wall Street

NEW YORK (AP) • Disappointing earnings news and a slump in bank stocks tugged the stock market down Wednesday, giving major indexes their first three-day drop since June.

Banks had some of the biggest losses following news that the government filed lawsuits accusing Bank of America of misleading investors.

The Standard & Poor's 500 index fell 6.46 points, or 0.4 percent, to close at 1,690.91. Seven of the index's 10 industry groups ended lower.

The Dow Jones industrial average fell 48.07 points, or 0.3 percent, to 15,470.67. The Nasdaq composite lost 11.76 points, or 0.3 percent, to 3,654.01.

Thunderstorms Increase Fire Danger this Week



ed Flag Warnings have been issued for most of southern Idaho and the Magic Valley through Friday morning. Moisture will move into southern Idaho by Thursday afternoon and evening sparking the development of thunderstorms. The storms will be capable of producing strong winds and frequent lightning. Of course, those two factors will lead to the increased fire danger risk across the area. Unfortunately, it does not appear that much rain will fall with the storms. The best chance for any measurable rain will be in the mountains.

An isolated storm is still possible on Friday, but by the weekend the moisture should move out and we will be left with sunny skies and nice conditions.

The clouds on Thursday and Friday will keep temperatures a little cooler, only climbing to near 90. Temperatures this weekend will be in the upper-80s before climbing back into the low-90s next week.

struck by lightning has always scared me. I figure the odds are against me with a tall metal tripod next to me. I'm also not a big fan of having my gear out in the rain, though I do have rain gear if it becomes a downpour.

"Another aspect of shooting lightning storms is not only picking a spot in the

sky but deciding how much of that spot to pull into the frame. I usually shoot loose with my 16-35mm. I have the megapixels to crop in, but the perspective always feels wrong. Think I'll try the 50mm next time...

"I was off the clock but saw several strikes to the north. I was already on that side of town with my gear and knew I had to shoot it. I found an empty lot and jumped out and set up. ...'

Man Charged With Home Invasion, Lighting Home on Fire

MURTAUGH • A Fort Hall man has been charged with several crimes in a suspicious trailer fire in Murtaugh. Vince Henison Littleman, 31, was arraigned Wednesday, accused of forcing his way into a trailer home, beating up a man, then lighting the home on fire. Littleman was being held at the Twin Falls County Jail on charges of aggravated battery, robbery, first-degree arson and burglary.

Bond was set at \$250,000. His preliminary hearing is Aug. 16. Littleman was with a 39-year-old man and 16year-old girl when they burst into Terry Hollifield's trailer at 3050 N. 4700 E., deputies said. His companions have not been charged.

Twin Falls County sheriff's officials gave this account:

About 12:30 a.m. July 13, trailer resident Rufino Cintora, 43, was awakened by loud knocking. He yelled for the person at the door to identify himself, but then he became afraid and locked himself in the back bedroom. Cintora soon heard the front door being forced open, then the bedroom door was pushed open.

A man with short dark hair entered the bedroom carrying a flashlight and asked for money or marijuana. When Cintora told him he didn't have either, the man beat him in the head and upper body with a heavy metal bar.

About five minutes later, a man with a long, dark ponytail entered the bedroom and started beating him with a bar, also. A girl came in next and asked in Spanish about money and about a man who the group apparently thought lived in the house. Cintora told deputies he'd never seen the three before.

Cintora was bleeding profusely as the intruders searched his bedroom, took his cell phone and left.

He tried to tend to his wounds. But then, afraid that the intruders would return, he drove an ATV to a vacant home on the property.

About an hour later, he heard what he thought was the intruder's vehicle driving by. Cintora hid in the home until about 6 a.m., then left to get help. As he was driving the ATV back to the trailer, Cintora saw it was engulfed in flames. After finding someone with a phone, Cintora and his co-workers called 911.

Tim Wengler, the former warden at the CCA-run Idaho Correctional Center south of Boise, told U.S. District Judge David Carter on Wednesday that in his three years on the job, he never noticed that some mandatory security posts went unstaffed or that some staffing reports were falsified to cover up the missing staff hours.

Wengler was one of several CCA officials and employees to testify during a contempt-of-court hearing over whether the Nashville, Tenn.-based company is abiding by the terms of a settlement it reached with Idaho inmates two years ago.

The inmates, represented by the American Civil Liberties Union of Idaho, sued in 2010, contending that the prison was so violent that prisoners call it "Gladiator School." CCA denied the allegations but reached a deal in 2011 requiring widespread operating changes including increased staffing. Earlier this year, however, the company acknowledged that it understaffed the mandatory minimum posts at the prison by 4,800 hours during seven months in 2012. Shortly after that admission, CCA announced that the 46-year-old Wengler was retiring after 17 years with the company.

But in his testimony Wednesday, Wengler said he was still under contract with CCA and still getting paid by the company. His job is "to assist them with things they need," Wengler said, including making sure the company is following through with the settlement it reached with the Idaho inmates. Wengler said he couldn't remember if his employment contact prohibits him from disparaging or testifying against CCA.

rection and the court settlement order were frequently left unstaffed for all or part of the shift.

"I believed we were fulfilling the terms of the settlement," Wengler said.

He laid the blame at the feet of his subordinates, saying it was apparent "that somebody knew something" and was falsifying documents, but that he never spotted any inaccuracies when he looked at the staffing rosters.

Carter frequently interjected his own sharp questions and comments during question, asking another CCA official how much money the company should pay back Idaho taxpayers for failing to meeting the contract terms. The judge said the 4,800 hours of understaffing appeared to be a low estimate of how much time went unfilled.

Scott Craddock, CCA's top ethics officer, said those hours only accounted for understaffing that occurred during the night shift during a seven-month span, and that CCA didn't fully investigate the number of hours that were understaffed during the day shift.

A partial review showed at least 152 hours unstaffed in May and another 300 in June, Craddock said.

"As I understand it, CCA has represented they're going to pay back IDOC. What amount should they pay them?" the judge asked Craddock.

"Let's add together," he said, "4800 hours, plus 152, plus 300, what is that? ... And we don't know what the day shift for gosh, July, August, September, October, November, we don't know that, do we? So 4800 hours is kind of a pretty low number, isn't it?"

"We reported what we did

ACLU attorney Stephen Pevar said he would show evidence that CCA violated the court's order by failing to fill thousands of hours of security posts, that the company tried to cover up the understaffing by filing false documents with the state, that CCA deliberately avoided learning who was responsible for the problems, and that despite learning of the staffing problems more than a year ago, the understaffing continues to this day.

Pevar said the understaffing problems occurred because there was "inadequate supervision by the warden. Someone was asleep at the wheel."

CCA's attorney Daniel Struck said hiring and retaining qualified correctional officers is a problem at prisons of all sorts, nationwide.

CCA's management team at the Idaho Correctional Center did what it could to try to keep the mandatory posts filled, Struck said, and even hired more staffers than were required under the contract to meet the terms of the court settlement.

"The evidence shows there's always going to be challenges in filling mandatory posts," Struck said. He said the company implemented a plan to make sure the vacancies don't happen again, and that there were no increases in inmate assaults as a result of the understaffing.

"As a result there is no reason to punish CCA for taking the actions that they did," Struck said.

Kevin Myers, a regional managing director of operations for CCA, testified the company offered to pay the Idaho Department of Correction \$117,000 to cover the understaffed hours. That amounts to about \$24.37 an hour.

Cleveland House in Kidnap, Rape Case is Demolished

CLEVELAND (AP) • With several swipes from the arm of an excavator and applause from spectators, a house where three women were held captive and raped for a decade was demolished Wednesday, reduced to rubble in less than an hour and a half.

The demolition had the look of a neighborhood celebration, but some residents have been troubled by guilt for failing to notice tell-tale signs of the women's imprisonment, like windows boarded up from the inside and the kidnapper's practice of keeping visitors from going past the front room. The home was torn down as part of the plea deal that spared Ariel Castro a possible death sentence and forced him to turn over the deed to the house and pay for it to be razed.

Yemen Becomes Hotbead of Al-Qaida and Counterterrorism Operations

Yemen's Government Says It Uncovers Al-Qaida Plots

Military and intelligence officials in Yemen said Wednesday they uncovered an al-Qaida plot to fire missiles at foreign embassies in the capital and to attack naval forces guarding international shipping in the Red Sea.

Details of the plot, which was reminiscent of the suicide attack on the USS Cole in 2000 that killed 17 American sailors, emerged as Yemen remains in a heightened state of alert that has seen the U.S. and British embassies evacuated and a new suspected U.S. drone strike that killed seven alleged militants from the terrorist group.

The discovery of the al-Qaida plot prompted the Defense Ministry to step up security around the strategic Bab el-Mandeb waterway, which connects the Red Sea with the Gulf of Aden. Officials banning speedboats or fishing vessels from the area, and military forces have been ordered to shoot to kill anybody who arouses suspicion or refuses to identify themselves.

Defense Minister Minister Gen. Mohammed Nasser Ahmed visited the area Sunday and urged the forces, known as Battalion 117, to stay on high alert for possible suicide attacks, according to officials who spoke to The Associated Press on condition of

Suspected US Drone Kills 7 Militants in Southern Yemen

A suspected U.S. drone strike killed seven alleged al-Qaida militants Wednesday in southern Yemen, security officials and residents said, as the Arab nation remained on high alert following threats of a terror attack targeting Western of government interests.

It was the fifth strike in less than two weeks in Yemen, which has emerged as the focus of fears of an attack that has led the United States to temporarily shut down 19 diplomatic posts in the Middle East and Africa, and to evacuate staff from the embassy in the Yemeni capital of Sanaa.

The U.S. has dramatically stepped up its use of drone strikes in Yemen in its covert fight against al-Qaida's branch there, which is considered one of the most active of the terror network.

Washington also has been backing a Yemeni military campaign to uproot al-Qaida militants and their radical allies who had taken over a string of southern cities and towns.

The militants have largely been driven into the mountains and countryside, and Yemeni intelligence officials say the current threat may be retaliation for that offensive.

As Al-Qaida Grows, Leaders Remain a Global Threat

Far from being on the brink of collapse, al-Qaida's core leadership remains a potent threat — and one that experts say has encouraged the terror network's spread into more countries today than it was operating in immediately after 9/11.

Nineteen U.S. diplomatic outposts stretching across the Eastern Hemisphere remain closed, and nonessential personnel have been evacuated from the U.S. Embassy in Yemen after intelligence officials said they had intercepted a recent message about plans for a major al-Qaida terror attack. The new communique came from bin Laden's replacement, Ayman al-Zawahri, who as early as December 2001 announced plans to decentralize the network and scatter its affiliates across the globe as a way of ensuring its survival. Now, major al-Qaida hubs are thriving along the Iraqi-Syrian border, in North Africa and, in the most serious risk to the U.S., in Yemen.

The regional hubs may not take direct orders from al-Zawahri, and terror experts say they rarely coordinate operations with each other or share funding and fighters. But they have promoted al-Qaida's mission far beyond what its reach was a dozen years ago and, in turn, created an enduring legacy for its core leaders.

Inferno Roars through E. Africa's Largest Airport

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) • A small fire at Kenya's main airport swelled into a roaring inferno Wednesday that destroyed part of East Africa's largest aviation hub and hampered air travel across the continent.

Firefighters were desperately short of equipment in an area where the county government apparently lacks a single working fire engine. Crews needed hours to get the flames under control and at one point resorted to a line of officers passing water buckets. The early morning blaze gutted the arrival hall, forcing authorities to close the entire airport and airlines to cancel dozens of flights. The flames also charred airport banks and foreign exchange bureaus.

No serious injuries were reported.

The fire broke out on the 15th anniversary of the bombings by al-Qaida of the U.S. embassies in Nairobi and Dar es Salaam, in neighboring Tanzania. No terror connection to the fire was immediately evident.

Hagerman Turns Out to Honor Life of 'Butch' Maag

HAGERMAN • There are some people who leave such a lasting impression it's hard to forget them.

Quentin "Butch" Maag, 75, was one of those people for many in the town of Hagerman.

Maag died Aug. 1 at his Hagerman home. His funeral was held Aug. 7 with more than 500 people attending.

People who knew him said if you wanted to hear a kind word said about Maag, just open the phone book and pick any name in Hagerman. Chances are the person on the other end knew him and had a story to share.

"He was a fine man," said Tim Peterson, fire chief of the Hagerman Fire Department and Maag's neighbor.

Peterson was 10 years old when he first met Maag.

"You never missed trick-or-treating at Lorena and Butch's house. They gave away soda pop," Peterson said.

And while Peterson can't remember what costume he wore that year, he did recall Maag sitting in his living room with a mountain of Shasta pop cans waiting to be given out to trick-ortreaters. Peterson said generations of children in Hagerman have trick-ortreated the Maag home just for those cans of soda.

"Everybody loved Butch," Peterson said.

Maag was born on Jan. 13, 1938, in Stanley. He was the third of seven children born to Dan and Violet Maag. He attended all 12 years of school in Challis, graduating in 1956.

According to his obituary, on Nov. 19, 1962, Maag married his wife of 50 years, Lorena. They had two children, Dan and Mona.

The Maag family came to Hagerman in September 1967 after he accepted a transfer with the Idaho Transportation Department. He retired in November

1996. Pat Taylor of Hagerman knew Maag for 45 years.

Taylor recalled being a high schooler going around town collecting signatures to start a ski club at Hagerman High School. When he knocked on Maag's door, Taylor said Maag told him, "Well, Pat, give me a paper."

And Maag went around town helping him gather more signatures.

The ski club never materialized, but Taylor didn't forget the day Maag took the time out of his day to help him.

Taylor said he was the type of man where it didn't matter if you were the most important person in town or the least, he treated everybody the same.

"He didn't look down on anybody. He was involved with the community 1,000 percent."

So Taylor was not surprised when the streets of Hagerman were lined with cars Wednesday as friends and family said goodbye to a "pillar of the community."

"I've never seen the streets filled up with this many cars unless there is a parade," Taylor said.

Bill Jones of Hagerman met Maag in the '70s. Jones was friends with Maag's sisters, but also found himself becoming friends with Maag.

"I'd go by and visit him and take fruits and vegetables," Jones said. "He's a very good person, very likeable."

In addition to being an active member of three Masonic Lodges in Hagerman, Challis and Richfield, Maag was also a very active member of the "Temple of Truth," a group of men that gather at the local coffee shop to talk politics and life inside the Hagerman Chevron station.

Sigrid Veenendaal's husband, Jerry, is also a member of the "Temple of Truth." When she went by the Chevron station Wednesday looking for Jerry, she said the men were gathered to drink coffee and pay homage to "the president of the Temple of Truth" who will be remembered as one of the most honest people they knew.

"I'm so honored to recognize your business and your family," Risch said.


Although his business survived multiple recessions, changes in TV technology and the expansion of big box stores, Mel Quale is humble about the recognition.

The award is given partially on a business's history and success, Risch said.

"They've been through good times and bad times and have maintained success. The reputation of the people, the quality and character of the people running the business are all things that are factored into it," he said.

Congress Should Bring Back DDT, Stop Listening to Lies

The ban on the insecticide DDT in 1972 by Environmental Protection Agency administrator William Ruckelshaus, despite being ruled safe by EPA judge Edmund Sweeney, has cost millions of lives due to malaria and other insect transmitted diseases like West Nile virus. The ban also is causing the death of millions of acres of pine and hardwood trees due to insects previously controlled

by DDT.

The Environmental Defense Fund and its allies had pushed to have DDT banned. The book, "Silent Spring," with half-truths and lies, was used to place DDT under investigation. J. Gordon Edwards, Ph.D., entomologist, defended the safety of DDT in his publication, "DDT, A Case Study in Scientific Fraud."

There are three major lies still being repeated about DDT. These are: DDT did not kill birds or cause egg shell thinning. The initial test was conducted without necessary calcium to produce normal shells. This was published in Science Journal. A second test with calcium showed no difference, but science editor Philip Abelson refused to publish the truth.

DDT is not toxic to humans and is not a human carcinogen. It is far safer than many replacement insecticides. DDT does not persist in the environment and does not accumulate and concentrate in the food chain.

A documentary, "Three Billion and Counting" by Dr. Rutledge Taylor is named for the number of malaria victims worldwide throughout

decades of genocide due to the DDT ban. Original EPA hearing transcripts (9,312 Pages) reveal that DDT is safe and effective.

Sec. John Kerry: Daring to Fail

ecretary of State John Kerry has pulled off a major achievement in getting Israelis and Palestinians to say yes



to the United States. Can he now get them to say yes to each other?

I admire Kerry's doggedness in getting Israelis and Palestinians back to the negotiating table for the first time in five years, in part by making clear that whoever said no to America's urging that they resume talks would be called out publicly. I also like the fact that Kerry dared to fail. It is how you make history as a secretary of state. It can also be helpful to him going forward. Even a little success like this breeds more authority, and more authority can breed more success in other arenas. That said, the prospects for an Israeli-Palestinian deal remain slim. Indeed, if these negotiations were a play, it would be called: "When the Necessary Met the Impossible."

So why should we even bother? I've always thought that the most important rule of journalism is: Never try to be smarter than the story. There is every reason to doubt that these talks will succeed, but when you look under the hood of this story you find there were some powerful forces propelling both sides to say yes to Kerry - and at least consider saying yes to each other, so it's worth letting this play out a little.

Let's start with a small item in Britain's Independent newspaper on July 24, which began: "He once sang, 'You Gotta Get Outta This Place,' but now Eric Burdon is not even turning up at all having deciding to withdraw from a planned concert in Israel. ... The Animals frontman, whose hits include 'House of the Rising Sun,' and 'San Franciscan Nights,' had been due to perform alongside local Israeli bands in Binyamina. ... However, in a statement, Mr. Burdon's management, said: 'We've been receiving mounting pressure, including numerous threatening emails, daily. ...' Burdon was just the latest of a rising number of artists and intellectuals who have started boycotting Israel over the occupation issue."

Israel's continued occupation of the West Bank is isolating the Jewish state more and more. Just before Prime Minister Bibi Netanyahu agreed to these negotiations, the European Union announced new guidelines banning EU financing or cooperating with any Israeli institutions in territory seized during the 1967 war. This involves research grants, scholarships and cultural exchanges.

The EU is considering requiring any products made in West Bank settlements to be labeled as such (some individual EU states already do) to make them easier to for Europeans to boycott. These are dangerous trends for Israel.

The EU is one of Israel's largest trading partners. And now add the fact that Palestine has been granted U.N. status as a "nonmember observer state," so President Mahmoud Abbas is positioned to ask the International Criminal Court to investigate Israel's settlement activities in the West Bank, which are widely viewed as contravening international law.

Meanwhile, Abbas was looking at a situation where

the turmoil in the Arab world was both sidelining the Palestinian issue and weakening his archrival Hamas, which had been supported by the Syrian regime and Egypt's Muslim Brotherhood. If Abbas - who foolishly did not take advantage of former Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Olmert's offer of a two-state deal in 2008 - did not take advantage of this renewed U.S. effort, it is not clear when the next bus would come again for him, if at all.

If all of that explains why both sides felt these talks were necessary, what makes them feel impossible is the sheer accretion of obstacles. There are some 350,000 Jewish settlers in the West Bank and at least 50,000 to 80,000 would have to be moved, even after land swaps. There are tens of thousands of Palestinian refugees living outside the West Bank and Gaza who will have to be persuaded that they can return to those two places but never again to their original homes in pre-1967 Israel. Hamas will try to use any Abbas concessions to undermine him, while rightists in Israel will go ballistic over any Israeli givebacks in Jerusalem, while Palestinians will denounce any leader who does not restore a Palestinian foothold there.


And have no doubt: Just trying to make peace will have consequences the minute both sides reveal their maps. One should never forget just how crazy some of Israel's Jewish settlers are. They assassinated Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin when he tried to cede part of the West Bank for peace. Nor should one underestimate the capacity of Palestinian hard-liners to generate suicidal violence when left only with despair or a sense that their leadership is selling them out.

But doing nothing also promised disaster - permanent Israeli control of the West Bank - and I think the center in both communities has come to see that. I repeat: They did not come to the table by accident or just to please us. But saying yes to each other will require a new kind of leadership from Abbas and Netanyahu. They will have to help each other face down their respective internal opponents rather than use each other as an excuse for not doing so. How and whether they do that is the drama that you're about to see play out. Pull up a chair.

Jerome Council Passes Tentative Budget

JEROME • Jerome city residents will see an increase in water and irrigation rates next year under a tentative budget approved by the Jerome City Council.

Jerome council members approved the tentative \$21.57 million budget for fiscal year 2014 during their Wednesday meeting. The city will make a final vote on the budget Sept. 3.

Unlike last year, the proposed budget does not include a wastewater bond the city is trying to pass through judicial confirmation.

Last year's 2013 budget was set at \$60.65 million, which included a \$48 million wastewater bond under the assumption that it would be approved by voters. In May, however, voters voted down the bond.

City officials are now trying to secure \$35.8 million through judicial confirmation, which would bypass voter approval.

Yet, because of the bond's unknown future, city officials haven't released how much the city's sewer rates will increase. The city council is scheduled to discuss possible rate changes Aug. 20, said Kathy Cone, assistant finance director.

So far, proposed rate increases include a 3 percent property tax rate and a 10 percent irrigation rate increase.

For water, the new proposed water rate would cost \$1.52 per 100 cubic feet per second of water used, up from the current rate of \$1.48 per 100 cfs. The base fee would also cost more under the new budget with the capital reserve fee increasing to \$7.10 from \$6.83. The debt service and operating reserve fees will not go up.

For a family of four using 800 cfs per month, it would cost \$29.76 per month in 2014. The total is currently \$29.17.

While the council adopted the tentative budget, members are still disagreeing over certain line items.

During Tuesday's meeting, three council members voiced concerns that the budget included a \$40,000 to Jerome 20/20, a collaboration between local government and private industry to promote economic development in the Jerome area.

The newly formed group was supposed to collect \$40,000 from the city, the county and from local businesses. While the city and county paid up, businesses only brought in half of what was promised.

Councilman Chris Barber said he was concerned that the city wasn't getting the return they were promised.

"We're working with a tight budget, \$40,000 is a lot of money," he said. "I know these things take time but they haven't performed."

The council will hold a public hearing for people to voice their thoughts on the city budget on Aug. 26. The meeting will be held at 5:30 p.m. at the city council chambers, 100 East Ave. A, Jerome.

LYNDE, CREATOR OF 'RICK O'SHAY' **COMIC STRIP, DIES**

HELENA, Mont. (AP) . Western cartoonist and author Stan Lynde, creator of the nationally syndicated "Rick O'Shay" comic strip, has died of cancer in Montana. He was 81.

His "Rick O'Shay" comic strip began in 1958 and ran for 20 years with an average daily readership of about 15 million people. In 1979, he launched another comic strip, "Latigo," which ran through 1983. Lynde died Tuesday in Helena, where he lived with his wife.

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Myron Stanford "Stan" Lynde was born in Billings in 1931 and was raised on a cattle and sheep ranch on Montana's Crow Indian Reservation. His mother gave him crayons and paper and taught him to draw to keep her young son occupied, said Lynde's sister, Lorretta.

"Cowboys were my heroes," Stan Lynde told the Independent Record in December 2012. "I followed them around and they played with me."

In the culinary lab, employees can look at how the cheese's flavors carry over to a food product. There they can shred, slice, perform melt tests and use deep fryers, induction burners or a gas range – "everything we need to make any kind of conventional cheese product," said staffer Colin Cassard.

The innovation center is "where the fun starts," said Dave Perry, Glanbia director

of cheese technology.

"Everybody needs to eat some cheese," he told the audience. "If you don't eat some cheese, you've missed the point. Then, from there, you need to every day keep eating some cheese. The more you eat, the more we'll make."

U.S. Sen. Jim Risch, R-Idaho, said Glanbia has been critical to growing the state's dairy industry. It's a "cornerstone" and one of the many reasons Idaho is a great place to live and work, he said.

"This new facility that

Glanbia is building here represents Glanbia's belief, such as we all believe, in the future of Idaho, in the future of this community here in Twin Falls and a commitment to the future of the people of the great state of Idaho," he said.





Boldewijn Hopes to Make Up for Lost Time

BOISE • How many of the 220 pounds on Geraldo Boldewijn's 6-foot-4 frame have been earned through five years in Boise State football's weight program?

It's a scientific query.

But there's some empirical evidence that suggests its considerable.

Take a repetition in Wednesday morning's practice. He easily shed the hands of the defensive back assigned to guard him, givinag him the space to release off the line of scrimmage, and he finished running a route his defender should have been well positioned to cover.

The ball found him late, allowing a safety and linebacker to converge.

No matter. Boldewijn reached well above any of the orange colored jerseys, and when he brought the ball down, a barrage of forces tried unsuccessfully to separate him from its possession.

On a single play, Boldewijn displayed his physicals gifts — height, leaping ability, burst of speed in a short space, large hands — with the wares of his five years of work in the program: size and strength.

Impressing in a non-game situation is nothing new for the Capital High grad, who came over from Amsterdam and still has an accent.

At this point in his Broncos career, Boldewijn is as much of a tease as he was as underclassman, where many thought he was destined for stardom.

On Tuesday, the fifth-year player was talked about as still unproven.



mean to me? It's just that feeling you get at the end of the season that we did it and gave it our all. It is like every play there is probably something you can do better. It's about how much effort and energy you give."

Boldewijn has not surpassed the 20-reception mark in a season yet. He surely would have last year had he been able to avoid a fourgame NCAA suspension for receiving extra benefits.

"What's great about Geraldo is that we are going to have him for the whole season instead of being suspended the first four games," second year offensive coordinator and receivers coach Robert Prince said.

Boldewijn, like the rest of the Broncos offense, also has some momentum and renewed confidence heading into the opener against Washington.

Boldewijn caught five balls for 59 yards against the Huskies in the Las Vegas Bowl.

"For him to end the way he did last year, he had the best game of his career," Prince said.

Multiple players, including receiver Matt Miller, have talked during camp about Boldewijn being primed for a breakout. Add his coach to that list after Tuesday.

"I think the stage is set for (Boldewijn and Burks) to take the next step," Petersen said. "It will take the passing game to a new level."

Boldewijn said he has some big numbers in the "back of his" he thinks he can reach this year, but that's not the primary way he views success.

"I'm pretty sure we have a bunch of receivers who can have big numbers," Boldewijn said. "But when, say, Kirby (Moore) and Matt make a catch, I kind of feel like that is part of my success, too. When we are all running our routes, coming off the ball hard, making big blocks, that is all part of our stats." Practice notes: Redshirt freshman quarterback Nick Patti was nearly flawless in the team portion of newcomers practice Wednesday, completing all but a couple of passes. McIlroy Looking for the Kid Who Won the PGA

PITTSFORD, N.Y. • The curls no longer spilled from under his cap, a big change for Rory McIlroy. Prompted to reveal the rest of his free haircut, he removed his hat and wild brown locks sprang to life.

"Still a little bit on the top," he said Wednesday with an easy smile.

Only then did McIlroy resemble the Boy Wonder who dominated golf last summer, starting with his win at the PGA Championship at Kiawah Island by a record margin. He didn't walk down the fairways that week, he bounced. He was No.1 in the world, and looked every bit the part.

McIlroy would love to rediscover that kid at Oak Hill this week.

In its place is a 24-yearold from Northern Ireland who has reason to feel much older. He hasn't won a tournament, and only once did he even come close. He has finished over par in all three majors, with only two rounds at the British Open. He has failed to make the cut five times this year, which includes walking off the course in the Honda Classic with sore wisdom teeth that still haven't been removed.

Among betting favorites, he was second only to Tiger Woods at the Masters at 5to-1. For the PGA Championship, the odds are 30-to-1, higher than two players (Henrik Stenson and Brandt

Snedeker) who have never won a major. And he can't wait to get to

the first tee this afternoon.

Inspiration comes from videos he has been watching of his eight-shot win at Kiawah Island, along with his back-to-back FedEx Cup playoff wins against some of the strongest fields of the year. Some of what he noticed was technical, such as the position of his club in the swing. What really stood out was the body language.

"It's how you carry yourself. It's all that sort of stuff, your little mannerisms,' McIlroy said. "I guess it's just trying to remember those feelings and remember how I felt that week and trying to carry some of that into this week and just get those good, positive thoughts going.

"Ithink everyone sees when I walk and I'm playing well, I have that little bounce in my step?"

What would go a lot longer at Oak Hill is keeping the ball in play on a traditional, treelined course - so many trees that even being in the fairway doesn't mean a clear shot at the green if the ball is slightly out of position. The greens are small and slope toward the front. Oak Hill is a hard golf course, and the evidence comes from the previous five majors held on this Donald Ross design - only 10 players in those five majors have finished under par.

"This may be the toughest golf course, but the fairest could be him, either.

Most of the attention is on Woods, even though he has gone five years and 17 majors without winning one. Woods won the Bridgestone Invitational last week by seven shots, sparked by a 61 in the second round that tied his personal best. That gave Woods five wins this year, which is five more than McIlroy.

Easy to Find Autographs of College Stars for Sale

NEW YORK • A simple search on eBay reveals Heisman Trophy winner Johnny Manziel is far from the only college football player whose autograph is for sale.

Pick a star and you can find memorabilia with a supposedly verified signature. South Carolina's Jadeveon Clowney. Ohio State's Braxton Miller. Oregon's De'Anthony Thomas. Louisville's Teddy Bridgewater. Alabama's AJ McCarron. The list goes on and on.

The difference is ESPN has reported the NCAA is investigating whether Manziel, the Texas A&M quarterback, got paid to sign autographs, which would violate amateurism rules. That has led to other schools being asked questions about whether their players earned money for signatures.

If the allegations against Manziel, made by unidentified sources to ES-PN, are proved true by the NCAA, his eligibility for the coming season could be in doubt as well as his status as a Heisman winner. ESPN reported that a top autograph authenticator had authenticated nearly 1,000 Manziel autographs.

Brandon Steiner of Steiner Sports, which is the official collectible and memorabilia company of the NBA, the New York Yankees and Notre Dame, among others, said his company does not do business with college athletes.

He said Manziel would likely be able to sign a contract with a collectibles company of at least

\$100,000 after he went pro.

"I know there is a vibrant Heisman Trophy collectible audience out there," he said.

A market flooded with Manziel autographs could cost him money later, Steiner said.

"It creates market confusion and takes a lot away from the category," Steiner said Wednesday. Other college athletes might want

to take note. Two sports websites

bustedcoverage.com and goodbullhunting.com – found what appeared to be dozens of authenticated items signed by Clowney online, and that led to questions for South Carolina officials.

Associate athletic director Chris Rogers said Wednesday the school's compliance office has looked into the Clowney autographs on eBay and found no violations had occurred. "The websites that we've looked

at and the pictures and autographs and items that we've found over the last academic year, we've not had any issues to suggest that anything impermissible had occurred," Rogers said.

Ohio State athletic director Gene Smith said school officials have determined Miller had not profited from the numerous items found online with his signature. Smith said the quarterback signed many autographs at a Big Ten preseason kickoff luncheon. Presumably fans or memorabilia brokers then went and sold items they got autographed for free.

"We've already looked at it," Smith said. "There's no issue there."

Louisville came to a similar conclusion. "We are aware of many of the items for sale online that have been autographed by several of our student-athletes with remaining eligibility. As we are required to do by NCAA rules, we regularly review these items and send correspondence to the seller(s) requesting they remove the item for sale," the school said in a statement. "We have and continue to educate our studentathletes that it is not permissible to accept any type of compensation for their autograph or the sale of memorabilia. We have spoken with Teddy Bridgewater and we are comfortable that no violation has occurred."

Clowney, Bridgewater and Miller enter the season has prime contenders for the Heisman.

Manziel became the first freshman to win it last season. It's unclear if an NCAA violation would cause the Heisman trust to reconsider Manziel's victory. Heisman Trust's rules state: "The recipient must be in compliance with the bylaws defining an NCAA Student-Athlete."

"The Heisman Trust never comments on speculation," Heisman spokesman Tim Henning said Wednesday. Reggie Bush's 2005 Heisman Trophy was later vacated after the NCAA found he had received improper benefits during his winning season.

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

Stewart's Injury Shows Superman Could Get Hurt

CHARLOTTE, N.C. • Aside from a minor arm injury in the 2006 Chili Bowl, and a banged up shoulder that required a relief driver in a NASCAR race later that same season, Tony Stewart has walked away unscathed from many harrowing wrecks.

It was something everyone around him had seemingly taken for granted until Monday night, when the threetime NASCAR champion broke his right leg in a sprint car race in Iowa.

"He's run so many of these races and flipped in those things, I think me and there is a difference in the amount of responsibility we have and obligations to other people, and that's where I think that's kind of where it gets sticky.

"I think it makes him better at what he does here, but it obviously leaves the door open for a situation that we're in now. I think that as many races as he's run in the past, we're probably lucky that this is the first time we're dealing with this, to be perfectly honest with you. We'll do our best at Stewart-Haas to put pieces together and sit down and evaluate it. That doesn't mean anything other than we will talk about it, we'll discuss it and we'll try and do what's best for Stewart Haas and our partners in the future." Zipadelli and many SHR crew members were already in Atlanta on Monday night preparing for a Tuesday tire test at Atlanta Motor Speedway when they got word Stewart was injured. Stewart has always been diligent about texting Zipadelli after every single heat race or qualifying run to give him an update, the updates had become routine after all these years. From there it became a scramble – cancel the test, get planes organized to get the team back to North Carolina and make contingency plans for Watkins Glen. In the chaos, Zipadelli spoke by phone to a remorseful and uncomfortable Stewart. "He was worried about what everybody thought and apologetic and feels like he's letting everybody down here," Zipadelli said. "At the end of the day, the reason we're all here is because of him, so I know he'll get back in it and make it up to us." But like the older brother and mentor he's always been to Stewart, he didn't let him off so easy and didn't give him a chance to talk about getting back in a car. "I told him to hurry up and get his butt down here because I was going to break his other leg, like some of my ancestors used to do, old school, and maybe beat him with it," Zipadelli joked. Zipadelli's most serious task is pulling SHR together and keeping the focus on getting Ryan Newman in the Chase for the Sprint Cup championship. It was just two weeks ago that Newman won at Indianapolis Motor Speedway to move into position to earn a

wild-card berth into the 12driver field, and Stewart left Pocono Raceway on Sunday ranked 11th in the standings holding the first wild-card position. It had SHR in position after a poor first-half of the season to get two of its three drivers in the Chase.

Now Stewart's chances are over, but Newman has a very real opportunity to get into the field.

"Obviously it's a huge letdown to everybody at Stewart-Haas, knowing that we were making some great strides," Zipadelli said. "I think we've had some drastic improvements in the performance on the race track. I



him and everybody around us didn't think Superman could get hurt; this is his day," Greg Zipadelli, his longtime crew chief and the current competition director at Stewart-Haas Racing, said Wednesday.

Zipadelli has never been the biggest fan of Stewart's extracurricular racing and was his crew chief both times Stewart ran the Indianapolis 500 and Coca-Cola 600 double on the same day. But he's understood Stewart's passion to drive anything at any time, and doesn't try to interfere.

And for 15 years, 521 races, 48 wins and three NASCAR championships, none of Stewart's extra activities interfered. But now the star of the organization is in an Iowa hospital, recovering from surgery to stabilize and clean a Grade 2 break to his tibia and fibula in his right leg, and awaiting a second surgery that will give the team a better indication of what his recovery time will be and what the organization will need to do for the coming weeks.

For now, all Zipadelli knows for sure is that road course ace Max Papis will drive the No. 14 Chevrolet this weekend at Watkins Glen, where Stewart is a fivetime winner, and that they'll need to find another replacement driver for at least the next few weeks.

But what the future holds for the organization, for how much extra racing Stewart does in the future, all of that is for later conversations. Stewart was scheduled to race more than 100 times this year.

"We all know Tony loves to do those races. We know that that's his golf game, that's his hunting, his fishing, all the things that the rest of us do," Zipadelli said. "You know, felt like we were peaking at the right time with two race cars having an opportunity. It's a huge disappointment. But we'll try to do our best to take that disappointment and turn it into a positive push for (Newman)."

Fish and Game Proposes Waterfowl Season

JEROME • Idaho Department of Fish and Game is proposing 2013-14 waterfowl seasons of 105 days and a two-day youth hunt, along with some changes in goose seasons and limits. You can comment, by Aug. 16, in open houses or online.

Idaho sets waterfowl seasons by zones. The state has three duck and dark goose zones and four light goose zones. The proposal would separate Canada geese and white-fronted geese seasons, a Fish and Game press

release said.

Idaho's waterfowl seasons must fit within guidelines set annually by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service for all states in the Pacific Flyway. As it has since 1997, Fish and Wildlife has allowed a 107day season.

This year, for ducks and Canada geese, those 107 days may occur only between Sept. 21 and Jan. 26. For white-fronted geese and light geese - snow and Ross's geese - those 107 days may occur only be-

tween Sept. 21 and March 10. Idaho's proposed waterfowl season would open with a two-day hunt Sept. 28-29 for licensed youths ages 10-15.

Duck and Canada goose seasons in the area around American Falls Reservoir would run from Oct. 5 to Jan. 17, with scaup seasons from Oct. 25 to Jan. 17. In the rest of the state it would run from Oct. 12 to Jan. 24, with scaup seasons from Nov. 2 to Jan. 24.

The daily bag limit would be seven ducks - but no

more than two female mallards, two redheads, three scaup, two pintails and two canvasbacks - and four Canada geese.

In 2013, the framework for white-fronted geese was separated from Canada geese. For the first time, Idaho can now select a 107-day whitefronted goose season between Sept. 21 and March 10. Fish and Game said it is considering two options to accommodate white-fronted goose hunting opportunities for the Please see SEASON, S6

HAILEY • Having a trout-friendly lawn doesn't mean you have to sacrifice beauty.

Vanessa Fry's front and back lawns are green and colorful. Instead of her vegetable garden being in the backyard, it is in the front. She has perennials and raspberry bushes. The only grass on the property is a strip of the droughttolerant variety.

So what is a certified Trout Friendly Lawn? It's water-wise, reduces or eliminates the use of synthetic fertilizers and herbicides, and uses native and drought-tolerant plants.

The initiative was started in 2007 by the Wood River Land Trust - an organization that protects and restores land, water and wildlife habitat in the Wood River Valley to work with private landowners and local communities to protect and restore the Big Wood River.

Chad Chorney, southern Idaho project manager with Trout Unlimited, said it's especially important because a number of homes are located along the Big Wood River and a lot of their runoff ends up in the river.

Stars' Orbits

Are Stacked like

Russian Dolls

The Lunar Reconnaissance Orbiter has been taking photos and other data from lunar orbit since 2009. However, without periodic tweaks, Earth's gravity will slowly de-circularize a lunar satellite's orbit until it crashes into the surface. Thus, a natural satellite of the moon would be relatively short-lived.

To answer the related question - How many levels of (stable) orbits can exist in nature? - consider the following star system.

Two red dwarf stars (Gliese 644 Ba and Bb), each with masses roughly one-third that of the sun, orbit a common center of mass in just under three days, bound by their mutual gravity. That's level one.

This pair, in turn, orbits a common center of mass with another (0.41 solar mass) red dwarf (Gliese 644 A) every 627 days. Imagine removing one end of a dumbbell, and replacing it with a smaller, spinning dumbbell, making level two.

Orbiting Gliese 644 A/Ba/Bb, at around a dozen times the separation between the sun and Pluto, is Gliese 643, a (0.19 solar mass) red dwarf, for level three. Finally, there's V1054

Ophiuchi C, a red dwarf with a mere 8 percent of the sun's heft (about as small as a star can be and still have enough internal pressure to sustain nuclear fusion), so far from the other four that its orbit is difficult to quantify.

The key to stability for such hierarchical orbits is distance. Each successive star must be far enough away from the others that the latter's combined gravitational fields don't differ significantly from that of a single, larger star. Explaining how a proto-stellar cloud fragments into such a system in the first place is less straightforward.

• Zone 3 would run Nov. 5-Jan. 24 and Feb. 15-March 10; or Nov. 26-March 10.

• Zone 4 would run Oct. 12-Jan. 24.

The daily bag limit would be 20 light geese, increased from 10 last year.

For light geese, zones 1 and 2 are in the area around American Falls Reservoir, including the Fort Hall Indian Bannock Reservation, County and parts of Bingham, Caribou and Power counties; zone 3 is the southwest and part of the Magic Valley; and zone 4 is the rest of the state.

of handing out fish after the spawning.

Each female produces 3,500 to 5,000 eggs, according to Fish and Game. After spawning, the eggs from each female are placed in buckets, fertilized with the sperm from a male and taken to the hatchery's incubation building, where river water flows continuously through incubators.

You can watch the spawning on Mondays and Thursdays from mid-August to mid-September. This year, you can also watch on Tuesdays and Fridays during late August and early September, when the Rapid River hatchery expects to spawn summer Chinook salmon for Clearwater River hatcheries using surplus broodstock from the South Fork of the Salmon River. Salmon returns to the

tory of 2,200 broodstock adults, most captured in a fish trap just below the hatchery, and 3.1 million small Chinook salmon, most destined for release directly into the Rapid River. The Rapid flows into the Little Salmon River, then the Salmon, the Snake, the Columbia River and the Pacific Ocean, where most Chiby making the water seem deeper and obscuring their view of people walking by. So you're welcome to stand beside the water and ponder the salmon as they swim.

What Else to See There

Another popular spectacle at

the sounds of running water. This 100 percent gravityflow hatchery takes its water from the long, wild Rapid River drainage. So you won't hear any pumps.

In the clover-filled grass of the park are at least seven picnic tables and a pair of cool, clean-smelling restrooms. It's often the site of wedding receptions, church gatherings and the like. In another vegetationlined pond, no longer used in the hatchery operations, Fish and Game stocks trout for children, disabled anglers and seniors, who may fish there from noon to dark on Fridays. Weeds around the water ensure hearty bug production for the trout. "This is very popular with seniors," Steiner said, and some local families return every Friday.

Clearwater were low in 2013, Steiner said on July 25, and the Rapid River hatchery's role is part of Idaho's response.

His next appointment that day would be a conference call on the Clearwater shortfall.

Hatchery Basics

Idaho Power Co. built the Rapid River Fish Hatchery in 1964 and still funds it as part of the utility's operating license for its Snake River dams, but Fish and Game operates the hatchery. The dam-mitigation goal for the Rapid River hatchery is to release 3 million spring Chinook smolts annually to help conserve fish runs.

On July 25, the hatchery's earthen ponds had an invennook spend two years in salt water before returning as 4year-olds. Some smolts will instead be trucked to the Snake River and released below Hells Canyon Dam, and some will be released into the Little Salmon.

That morning, the fish fed constantly on bugs, and a kingfisher dipped into the water for a salmon meal. The Rapid River hatchery doesn't cover its ponds with nets to keep out birds, because it's far enough away from other fish facilities to prevent disease transmission.

"We feed a lot of birds here," Steiner said. Leave the kingfishers alone and a pair will establish and defend a territory, he said; harass the birds and you'll get more of them.

Sprinklers break up the surface of the broodstock pond to keep the adults calm the Rapid River hatchery peaks in the last week of June or the first week of July: workers handling each fish caught by the fish trap downstream from the hatchery. Wild fish - identified by an intact adipose fin are passed around the trap and weir to continue their trip up the Rapid River.

At other times of year, call ahead (208-628-3277) for a tour of the fish trap, a fascinating system of channels diverting river water and fish.

The hatchery sits in a hole surrounded by mountains with a ring of trees at their base. Though the slopes turn brown around June, the treelined hatchery grounds are an oasis where families picnic in the park, watch quail and other wildlife and listen to

Aug. 15 and continues through Sept. 15.

In many units, archery seasons for mule deer, white-tailed deer and elk open Aug. 30 and runthrough September.

In the warm weather of summer, hunters should consider hunting in the higher country, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game said. Hunters have an ethical and legal obligation to salvage the edible portions of their kill, but meat spoilage is a concern during hot weather.

The key to preserving meat is starting the cooling process quickly. Game animals should be skinned immedily to cold storage facilities, Fish and Game said. Earlyseason hunters often use large ice chests to keep game meat cool and clean. Removing meat from the bones also helps speed cooling.

Archery permits are required. And archers using blinds on federal public lands should consult the big game rules brochure or contact the Bureau of Land Management for the latest policies on hunting blinds on public lands.


without herbicides?





At the Dyspeptics Club, complaining about bad luck is something of an art-form.

Here South grumbled that he should have followed his instincts instead of wasting time getting a complete count of the hand when the diamond queen was with West, the short hand, instead of with East, the long hand. While he had a point, of sorts, he had missed a simple clue at the end that would have eliminated any guesswork.

Against four spades, West led the heart king, continued with the ace, then played a third round to kill off dummy's now established nine. East ruffed, then South overruffed and started on trumps. West won the second round and got off lead with his last trump, while his partner discarded two diamonds.

When South tested the clubs, he found they were 4-2. At this point it was clear that West had started with three spades, six hearts, two clubs and hence only two diamonds. Playing, as he thought, with the odds, declarer crossed to the diamond king and finessed the jack, only to lose to West's now bare queen.

Either opponent could have held the missing queen, granted, but before testing the clubs, declarer should have played off his last trump, throwing a diamond from the table. Then, after running the club winners, in the three-card end position East has to keep his club jack, so must come down to only two diamonds. Now, irrespective of its whereabouts, the diamond queen must fall in two rounds.

ANSWER: A hand that can't open or overcall at its first turn can't sensibly jump at its next turn to show a single-suited hand. Here the three-club call is a fit jump – say, four-card spade support and A-Q-fifth of clubs. You have a little in hand for your overcall, but not enough shape to drive to game. Bid three diamonds to show where you live, and let partner determine if he has enough to bid game.







Cassia County Terminates Law Enforcement Services to Burley

BURLEY • Cassia County has terminated its law enforcement services contract with Burley, effective Sept. 30, after the two governments failed to reach a compromise on a \$50,000 difference in contract costs.

Commissioners voted unanimously in an emergency meeting Wednesday to stop providing police services to Burley.

The decision came on the heels of the Burley City Council's vote Tuesday to spend \$1.45 million on those services. The county had asked for \$1.5 million.

The two entitites had been negotiating the contract for months.

"This was a surprise. It was a complete shock to me," said county Undersheriff George Warrell. "I don't know what we're going to do. We will meet with the sheriff and the commissioners to

see what they have in mind and go from there. It was one of those surprising moments."

"We regret we came to this point," said commission Chairman Dennis Crane, "but we just can't afford to keep doing business like this."

Commissioner Paul Christensen was absent from the meeting, and Sheriff Jay Heward was out of town.

The key question now is how Burley will ensure public safety after Sept. 30.

"Having no police services would be an option but a poor one," said City Councilman Gordon Hansen. "It wouldn't be a responsible position to take. One of our primary responsibilities is to provide public safety?

For \$1.5 million, Hansen said, the city may want to investigate having its own police department again.

Burley's police force became part of the Sheriff's Office in 1986.

"I feel like the city has been paying a premium for years," said Hansen.

Other options may be for the city to contract police services with Minidoka County or the city of Heyburn, he said.

The city's current contract, which expires Sept. 30, costs \$1.4 million. The previous year's contract cost \$1.35 million.

Burley had been given data showing that providing its services cost the county nearly \$1.97 million, a commission news release said.

Amid continued state and federal funding cutbacks, if the county absorbed the extra Burley costs as well, it would be an "unfair burden and hardship" to Cassia County taxpayers, the release said. "It is with regret that the city could not accept the county's offer."

Hansen questioned why the county wouldn't let the city pursue other options for the contract.

"Maybe we could have less officers assigned to the city or (fewer) patrol cars," said Hansen.

Crane said a provision in this year's contract states that one Please see BURLEY, A7

"This is where the money is going to be made," Williams said, gesturing toward the innovation center. "And this (corporate headquarters) is where we are going to count the money."

The corporate building features numerous offices and spaces for traveling executives, collaboration areas and sitting and standing conference rooms.

The innovation center - lined with large windows and filled with shiny new equipment - features a kitchen, culinary lab, make area, analytical lab, offices, conference room and posters illustrating pepper matchmaking.

with scientific testing. Instead of leaving the cheese to subjective human tastes, food scientists can gather specific data and produce a more consistent product, said staffer Candace Clark. They can identify, say, what makes cheddar's aged and unique note.

"We can monitor cheese characteristics like moisture, salt levels, fat levels and protein levels," Clark said. "We can also measure things like flavor."

In the culinary lab, employees can look at how the cheese's flavors carry over to a food product. There they can shred, slice, perform melt tests and use deep fryers, induction burners or a gas range - "everything we need to make any kind of conventional cheese product," said staffer Colin Cassard.

The innovation center is "where the fun starts," said Dave Perry, Glanbia director of cheese technology.

"Everybody needs to eat some cheese," he told the audience. "If you don't eat some cheese, you've missed the point. Then, from there, you need to every day keep eating some cheese. The more you eat, the more we'll make." U.S. Sen. Jim Risch, R-Idaho, said Glanbia has been critical to growing the state's dairy industry. It's a "cornerstone" and one of the many reasons Idaho is a
