Video Shows Lish Recounting Fatal Stabbing

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TWIN FALLS • Nearly eight hours after Jerimiah Paiz died, a police detective told the man who killed him, that the wounds he inflicted had been fatal.

Cayde Lish, charged with voluntary manslaughter in Paiz's death, sobs in a police video shown in the second day of his trial Wednesday.

"No, no, no," Lish wails, hands grabbing at his face. "Are you sure? Are you sure?"

The detective nods.

"This is the tough part," the detective, Ben Mittelstadt says in the video, shot in the early morning

The Case

Cayde Lish, 22, is accused of stabbing Jerimiah Paiz 13 times in the back and once in the arm, puncturing a lung twice.

Paiz, 24, died of his wounds after arguing with Lish outside Canyon Crest Dining and Event Center on Oct. 6, 2012.

Lish claims self defense, saying he was in fear of losing his life as Paiz

rapt attention.

The police interview starts casually with Mittelstadt and Lish chatting about Lish's employment. But it doesn't take long before Lish turns the conversation to the night before.

Eight hours before he stabbed Paiz 14 times and left him at the scene to die.

Lish told Mittelstadt he recognized Paiz that night from seeing him at another bar, The Pocket, about a month earlier. That night at The Pocket, Lish recalled that Paiz and his friends made derogatory comments against Lish and his friend Cade Baugh, saying they were gay.

A month later in front of Canyon Crest Dining and Event Center, Lish

Atlanta Fire Crews Fighting for Resources

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ATLANTA, Idaho • After three days of frantic attempts to protect the historic buildings in Atlanta, residents are finally getting a helping hand.

Fire crews were trickling in Tuesday and Wednesday, relieving private citizens who had stayed — despite being ordered to evacuate — to protect and defend their small town of just 40 people from the Little Queens Fire.

Still under investigation as to how it started, the Little Queens Fire has ballooned to more than 9,500 acres. Most of it is burning in the Sawtooth Wilderness, but its edges are closing in three miles northwest of Atlanta.

The unincorporated town in Elmore County is 40 miles from any paved highways. It was founded as a mining town where many of the historic buildings are still preserved today.

Elmore County Sheriff's Office issued an evacuation order on Monday but when the town didn't see the fire resources pulling in to replace them, many people chose to stay, said Amy O'Brien, longtime Atlanta resident and member of the Atlanta Historic Society.

"I've been weed whacking and raking pine needles ever since it started getting chaotic," she said. "We've had so many close calls with fires."

O'Brien is the voice behind the Atlanta Twitter account, @AtlantaIdaho, that started sending out urgent updates and pleas for more resources Saturday.

"Our town is in danger by #littlequeensfire. Fire is 7 miles away and no responders. Please help," O'Brien tweeted when the fire first started erupting near Atlanta.

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BURLEY • Shortly after 9 a.m. Wednesday, emergency personnel rolled onto the Burley High School parking lot in response to a 911.

But the response wasn't to an actual crises. It was instead a preparedness drill.

"I can't believe how real it feels," said Carolyn Hondo, BHS principal, after the ambulance crew removed a burn victim from

the school. The high school, which has not started its fall session, has about 840 students and 80 employees.

A parent disgruntled over her student's grades caused an explosion at a chemistry lab sustaining burns to her face, chest and hands, the scenerio envisioned.

Dozens of local first responders, school officials and other agencies including Idaho State Police, Idaho Bureau of Homeland Security and the Idaho National Guard 101st Civil Support Team responded to the training scene.

Burley-County Dispute Back in Commissioners' Hands

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BURLEY • The Burley City Council returned Cassia County commissioners' serve Tuesday night, lobbying the negotiations for local police coverage back in the county's court.

The Burley City Council unanimously approved a motion during the meeting to offer Cassia County \$1.45 million a year under a two-year con-

tract for law enforcement services.

City Clerk Melanie Haynes said the motion included reducing the number of dedicated city officers by one to 14 and implementing a deadline date for negotiations of July 15 to help the city and the county during the budgeting process.

Cassia County Clerk Joe Larsen said the county will likely discuss the newest city proposal during the commissioners' Aug. 26 meeting.

Burley City Councilman Randy Hawkins, who was assigned by the city council to negotiate the contract with county Commissioner Paul Christensen and a representative from the sheriff's office suggested the same motion in a previous council meeting on Aug. 6. At that time, the motion died for the lack of a second motion.

Instead, the city council voted to pay \$1.45 million directly to Cassia

County Sheriff Jay Heward in hopes the city would continue to receive law enforcement services without a contract in place.

That's \$50,000 less than what the county sought for its police service.

Cassia County Attorney Al Barrus advised the sheriff last week not to accept the payments, because of liability concerns.

Hawkins attended last week's county meeting and said he felt the

city council would be more amiable to his proposal during Tuesday's meeting.

Larsen said the county commissioners sent a letter to city officials after an Aug. 19 meeting clarifying their declaration of termination of the contract on Sept. 30.

"They needed to clarify that without an agreement between the two parties the contract would terminate Sept. 30," said Larsen.




Dow Sinks for Sixth Day as Traders Ponder Fed Exit

NEW YORK (AP) • Stocks fell sharply Wednesday after the Federal Reserve disclosed that its top officials were mostly in agreement that the central bank should end its massive bond-buying program.

The Dow Jones industrial average fell 105 points. It was the index's sixth straight decline, the longest losing streak since July 2012.

In the minutes from Fed's July policy meeting, board members said it "might soon be time" to slow the purchases. The bond-buying program has been in place in one form or another since late 2008 to keep interest rates low and encourage economic growth.

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Chance of Rain, Thunderstorms Continue Today

TWIN FALLS • Moisture streaming in from the south will continue to keep the threat of showers and storms in the forecast today and into Friday morning. Showers and storms never materialized Wednesday despite enough moisture in the atmosphere.

There is a better chance for isolated to scattered showers and storms across southern and central Idaho today as an upper level storm system over California starts to move to the northeast and toward Idaho.



ho. It appears timing could be slower than we once thought, so most of the storm development could take place during the late afternoon and evening.

The threat still remains of lightning, gusty winds and localized heavy rains. These concerns have sparked a continued red flag warning for critical fire

weather across all of southern and central Idaho. With enough sunshine, temperatures this afternoon are expected to reach the low-90s.

Storms will be isolated to scattered. That means some could see rain and other will not depending on your location. These types of showers and storms are hard to predict when it comes to pinpointing the exact when and where these storms will occur. I think there is an equal chance across all of southern and central Idaho for a storm or shower, but some

of you will remain dry. A few storms will linger overnight into Friday morning, but drier and cooler air will arrive for the afternoon. Temperatures on Friday will be in the mid- to upper-80s. By the weekend, it should remain dry with plenty of sunshine and afternoon temperatures in the upper-90s.

Hidden History
The Great Dinosaur Caper of 1963

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TWIN FALLS • In honor of what some in town have called “the greatest senior stunt ever,” the Twin Falls High School rock was recently painted and adorned with plastic dinosaurs, by the class of 1963.

Fifty years ago, members of the senior class travelled to Gooding County and absconded with a large green dinosaur from the Rimview Cafe in Bliss. Somehow the kids managed to return to Twin Falls with the 25-foot-long stegosaurus named Dinney and placed it on the rooftop of the high school.

Back then, there was no freeway through southern Idaho. Families travelling U.S. 30 on their way to Boise stopped at the 24-hour Rimview to grab a bite to eat and fill up at the gas station next door.

In front of the cafe was a parking lot and on the other side of the parking lot was “Dinneyland,” where the fiberglass dinosaur roamed. Actually, Dinney’s feet were embedded in concrete, but that didn’t deter the students. State patrolman Walter Kirtly, who lived in Bliss, heard rumors that something might happen to the dinosaur. But sometime during the night of May 20, 1963, the stegosaurus disappeared from right under his nose.

That night, a long parade of cars and pickups headed out of Twin Falls. Later, several dozen high school seniors descended on the little cafe and gas station in Bliss.

Most of the students were there as a diversion, said John Kelker, son of then-Times-News editor Gus Kelker.

John Kelker wrote in his 50-year reunion memoirs that he and his friends parked in front of Dinneyland to block the view from the restaurant. The students created a ruckus inside the restaurant and at the gas pumps, while other students sawed the dinosaur from its perch.

Dinney was loaded onto a truck, covered with a tarp,

and hauled to Twin Falls, where it was found atop the high school gymnasium roof the next morning.

A large number “63” was taped to the dinosaur’s side. A lot of planning went into the caper, said Jerry Kuykendall, 1963 senior class president. But there was some luck involved too.

A Buhl cop stopped the convoy of cars as students drove through town with a dinosaur’s tail hanging out from under a tarp at 2 a.m. But the cop didn’t bother to look under the tarp, Kuykendall said.

Kuykendall’s classmates didn’t let him participate in the caper — they knew they would later need him as a mediator for the group.

Steve Woodall, TFHS class of 1964, remembers the stunt. “Initially, everybody was pretty proud of themselves for pulling it off,” Woodall said. “However, when talk of a lawsuit and possible criminal charges were brought up, attitudes changed in a hurry.” Soon, word was out that

other schools were planning to steal it off Twin Falls’ roof, and Dinney was moved to a temporary home in a local barn.

Dr. Edward Stewart Robinson owned the cafe, Dinney and Dinneyland, as well as Shoshone Ice Caves in Lincoln County. Robinson told the Twin Falls weekly “Star” that it was the third attempt to steal the dinosaur in five years, and he was tired of the pranks. Robinson promised to sue the students, the school, and Principal George Staudaher for “interruption of business.”

The dinosaur caper was reported on national television, and even Paul Harvey told the story on his national radio broadcast. According to Kuykendall, Life magazine had planned to feature the story when Robinson threatened to file charges against the guilty parties.

“The magazine didn’t want to give him any free publicity after he was being such a jerk about it,” Kuykendall said Wednesday.

The students were pre-

Science and Politics: A Poisonous Mixture

Steven Pinker, professor of psychology at Harvard University and author of such popular science books as "The Blank Slate," recently wrote an essay for the New Republic in defense of science. From left and right, he notes, from intellectuals as well as from anti-intellectuals, science is under attack for its arrogance, vulgarity and narrowness of vision.

Why is this happening? Pinker asks.

Because, he says, science is intruding on the humanities, disciplines lacking in vitality or any real purpose of their own, and the intrusion is resented. Far from deriding science as a campaign to diminish and oversimplify — to reduce beauty to brain chemistry, say, or ethics to natural selection — the humanities should welcome science as a source of new inspiration:

"Surely our conceptions of politics, culture, and morality have much to learn from our best understanding of the physical universe and of our makeup as a species."

No doubt that's true. And while we're praising science, let's agree that Pinker is right to call it a force for enormous social good in all the indisputable ways he mentions. Fine.

Intelligent critics of "scientism" — the term they've adopted for science gone wrong — wouldn't deny any of this.

Their most valid complaints are different — and

Pinker ignores them, perhaps because he hasn't understood them. Put simply, science is a force for good so long as it's done well and its limits are recognized. But science isn't always done well, and its limits aren't always recognized.

When it's done badly or pushes past its proper bounds yet still expects to command respect, that's scientism. The most important limit to science arises from the distinction between facts and values. This isn't to deny that science can shed light on values — lately an active area of research.

Science can make moral values intelligible in physical terms. It can reveal what's happening in the brain when a person wrestles with a moral dilemma; it can explain how certain moral instincts might confer an evolutionary advantage, or why they might persist. It can show that the supposed empirical basis for some moral values is simply false — for instance, as Pinker puts it, that "there is no such thing as fate, providence, karma, spells, curses, augury, divine retribution or answered prayers."

"Though the scientific facts do not by themselves dictate values," Pinker goes on, "they certainly hem in the possibilities."

He's right about this — but the second point, though interesting, is much less important than the first. Science can't dictate values. That's what matters. And because it can't dictate values, it can't dictate courses of action. Pinker forgets this almost as soon as he's said it: In combination "with a few

unexceptionable convictions — that all of us value our own welfare and that we are social beings who impinge on each other and can negotiate codes of conduct — the scientific facts militate toward a defensible morality, namely adhering to principles that maximize the flourishing of humans and other sentient beings."

This emerging "de facto morality of modern democracies" provides "the moral imperatives we face today."

Really? Perhaps Pinker needs to widen his circle of acquaintances. Ideas of what constitutes human flourishing vary a lot even within relatively homogeneous societies. Variation from society to society, or culture to culture, is

far bigger. How to combine the principles that maximize the flourishing of humans is disputable — and always will be. The conflicting demands of individual liberty, family loyalty and social solidarity (to name just three of many such principles) can't be resolved by means of facts. There's no one right formula.

Claiming otherwise isn't a harmless error. It's politically toxic. If Pinker believes that the facts are militating toward a scientific morality, what does that say about the people who take a different view of human flourishing? You no longer have a good-faith disagreement between people with different values — you have a clash between scientific enlightenment and intellectual backwardness.

That's not the basis for friendly interaction. It's no accident that the more aggressive kinds of scientism — the so-called New Atheism springs to mind — are bullying and intolerant. Intolerance isn't conducive to human flourishing.

If science expects to command respect, it should not only be aware of its own limits, but it also should be practiced to a high standard.

Pinker seems to take for granted that it will be. He applauds the scientific temperament.

The defining practices of science "are explicitly designed to circumvent the errors and sins to which scientists, being human, are vulnerable."

Racial History: Alive and Well

You can know something intellectually but not emotionally and, therefore, not know it at all. That's what I realized after viewing "Lee Daniels' The Butler."



I've read Taylor Branch's Pulitzer Prize-winning history of the civil-rights era and watched old news clips of the burning of the church in Birmingham, Ala. But seeing on film how brutally blacks were treated — as second-, if not third-class citizens — is to feel the humiliation and pain.

That's why I wish Chief Justice John Roberts and four of his Supreme Court colleagues would see it, too. Maybe it will help them understand how wrong they got it when they recently decided that we are so far past Jim Crow that we can dispense with a central provision of the 1965 Voting Rights Act.

I'll buy the popcorn. The justices need to focus on some of the movie's vivid, and most stomach-turning, scenes. They will see respectable white citizens of my parents' generation spitting at, pouring hot coffee on and beating up young blacks — and in particular the son of the butler of the title — as they try to do the simple things in life: have a Coke at a lunch counter, drink at a water fountain, go to school. Try to tell the children of those civil-rights pioneers that we're so beyond discrimination that we no longer need the rules to ensure that states (mostly Southern ones) don't put into effect latter-day versions of the literacy test. We see President Lyndon Johnson (on the toilet, in a gratuitous stab at authenticity) making it essential for Congress to pass the Voting Rights Act on top of the Civil Rights Act.

Whites were doing everything they could to deny blacks access to the basic tools of democracy — to go to the polls without being harassed by intimidating and hostile clerks. Literacy tests and poll taxes had replaced Bull Connor's snarling dogs and fire hose. Like the justices — and the butler of the title — we'd like to think things are getting so much better that we can just hope for the best. Not so.

In 2013 alone, more than 80 measures to restrict voting rights — less blatantly racist than literacy tests but almost as pernicious — were introduced in 31 states. They are put forth as remedies, only no problem exists: The incidence of actual voter fraud hovers near zero. Kansas, where new rules are particularly harsh, has had more documented cases of UFO sightings than of voter fraud.

The movie is based on the life of Eugene Allen, a White House butler who served eight presidents. Some liberties are taken, but the spine of the story is true. Cecil Gaines (played by Forest Whitaker) is the son of a sharecropper who rises to a respectable job in the White House. He serves white people, but it's the president and his family that he's waiting on, not a brutal landowner. And he's at-tired in formal wear, not overalls, and delivers coffee on a silver tray. He sees and hears much, but loyally tells nothing, which mightily irritates his loving but boozing wife played by Oprah Winfrey (played so well, in fact, that you forget her talk-show-host persona).

If Cecil/Whitaker is the heart of the movie, Louis, his eldest son, is its soul. He is stirred by the injustice of attending an inferior school with no white kids, going to an all-black college and watching his father perform a menial job on what he sees as a plantation of a different kind. He joins the nonviolent Freedom Riders.

Much of the rest of the movie juxtaposes his brutal treatment by the Ku Klux Klan and Southern sheriffs with the shame his father feels as his son sits in jail instead of the classroom he worked so hard to get him into.

No parent, least of all this proud butler, can bear looking small in the eyes of his or her child. One cost of racism (Cecil is turned down twice when he asks to be paid as much as the white staff) is that Cecil must hide the wounds inflicted by the outside world from his son, who is just as determined to open them. At dinner one night, the truth breaks through as Louis, who brought home his radicalized girlfriend, can no longer protect his father's feelings. The senior Gaines coos over the success of actor Sidney Poitier. The junior Gaines puts down Poitier and his father as Uncle Toms who are only tolerated by the white man because they are servile.

To prove how far we haven't come, Texas Republicans pushed a law through the legislature that allows a concealed-carry gun permit — but not a student ID — to be used as voter identification. A law in North Carolina imposes a special voter-ID requirement while invalidating several forms of government- or public-employee ID, including student IDs and those issued by public-assistance agencies. It reduces early voting and eliminates same-day voter registration, both of which have been favored by the state's black voters. It repeals a mandate for high school voter-registration drives.


Now, like the butler asking for equal pay, you have to prove those laws are discriminatory rather than the state having to show they are not before implementing them.

If the justices don't see the light, perhaps the movie industry will. Hollywood is generally unwilling to risk bankrolling serious movies told from a black perspective. "The Butler" came in at No. 1 at the box office over the weekend, kicking the tush of the higher-budget "Kick-Ass 2." I'm not suggesting that the Supreme Court should be influenced by box-office returns, only that the justices see for themselves how virulent the oppression was 50 years ago and why we still need rules to redress it.


Here's to having the justices see "Lee Daniels' The Butler 2," the sequel, a few years from now.

Let's hope the damage they wrought by ignoring the lessons of the original isn't irreparable.

recognized Paiz and confronted him about the incident at The Pocket.

"We were getting into a pretty heated discussion," he said.

Lish said he was confused about the exact timeline of the fight, but at one point, he was punched.

"My jaw is pretty sore. I know I got hit a pretty good amount of times," he told police in the video interview.

The fight went to the ground and in the blur, Lish thought multiple people were kicking and hitting him.

The mixture of adrenaline, alcohol and being punched made it hard to remember everything, he said.

"I just remember saying, 'If you guys don't get off me, I'm gonna stick you,'" Lish said.

Lish pulled out his knife and started stabbing.

"I remember him bleeding," Lish told police. "I saw a blood trail and I remember being kind of scared."

Lish said he grabbed his cellphone, took off running and tried to call his boss or 911, but his phone battery died mid-dial.

'You're Bleeding Bad'

Lost and delirious, Lish made his way across Twin Falls until he got a ride to Baugh's house just before 4 a.m.

Before falling asleep on the couch, he sent a text to his boss.

"... I got jumped by three Mexicans outside of the bar. Got the (expletive) beat out of me. I stabbed them multiple times in self defense. I don't know what's going on. I'm covered in blood. ... just barely got home. Tried to call the cops, but my phone died."

In a separate text, Lish sent his boss a photo of himself shot in the bathroom mirror, showing blood on his clothes and his bruised face.

The text with the photo read, "I'm hurting man."

Lish told his boss he wouldn't make it to work that day.

Lish fell asleep until police arrived at about 6 a.m.

Toward the end of the video interview, Mittelstadt asked Lish why he stabbed Paiz.

"What else did you try?" Mittelstadt asked.

"I tried to get away physically," Lish said. "It wasn't working."

When Mittelstadt asked Lish how many times he stabbed Paiz, he said he knew it was more than once, but couldn't remember an exact number.

When Paiz let him go, Lish stopped stabbing, he said. Then, he saw blood.

"I think I said, '(expletive), you're bleeding bad,'" Lish said.

Lish told police that's when he turned and ran.

Mittelstadt told Lish the number of times Paiz was stabbed.

"We're looking at 13, 14 times, which is a lot," he said. "A couple of times I could see."

After being informed that Paiz had died, Lish was taken to jail.

Evidence

Before jurors watched the 40 minute police interview with Lish, they heard from Patricia Rohweder.

Rohweder works in the evidence lab at the Twin Falls Police Department.

She described for jurors how she traveled to Boise for Paiz's autopsy. She collected Paiz's clothing and packaged it for evidence.

In court, Rohweder pulled out the green sweatshirt and

black T-shirt that Paiz was wearing when he died. The shirts were mounted on foam boards. Jurors could see where the shirt had been cut down the middle by paramedics and stab holes were visible in the fabric. Blood stains covered the sweatshirt.

Phone Records

Twin Falls Police Detective Greg Lockwood also attended the autopsy, then transported items back to the Twin Falls Police Department from the Ada County Coroner's Office.

Lockwood testified about the search warrant for Lish's cellphone and explained how police took the data off the phone. Prosecutors had Lockwood read from the list of texts Lish sent, including the one to his boss.

Call records showed that Lish called Baugh 16 times between 12:56 a.m. and 1:06 a.m., but never dialed 911 or anyone else.

During a three-hour period, the phone was silent. Under cross examination by Lish's attorney Keith Roark, Lockwood said the phone battery could have been dead during that time.

Before the Fight

The last witness of the day was Hillary Giles, who was working as a cocktail waitress at Canyon Crest the night of Oct. 5.

It was a busy night, but Giles remembers serving Lish a Long Island Iced Tea, Bacardi 151 and Pepsi, and a shot of Wild Turkey.

Several hours later, Giles offered Lish water, she said.

"He didn't look like he needed anything more to drink," she said. "He had that look to me like he'd had enough."

Under Roark's cross examination, Giles said Lish didn't order anything more to drink that night.

Giles also interacted with Paiz that night. She met him at a wedding the previous weekend and chatted with him and his girlfriend as Paiz paid their tab.

Paiz was in good spirits as she told him to have a good night, Giles said.

"He winked at me and said he was going to have a good night and looked over at his girlfriend," she said.

Paiz's girlfriend, Kayla Webb is scheduled to testify this morning as the prosecution's last witness. Prosecutors expect to wrap up their case today, said prosecutor George Gunn.

In his opening statement, Tuesday, Roark said Lish would testify when the defense puts on its case.

The trial was scheduled to continue through Aug. 30, but is ahead of schedule.

"We did great, we learned some things and we applied some new principles, said Idaho Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter. "But, for the most part in going through these practices, folks, what we really do, just like anything else, we build muscle memory."

The muscle memory for this community seems to be very strong and disciplined, said Otter.

"When a parent puts a child on the bus or drops them off at school they have an expectation that they will return home safe and that they'll be safe while they are there," said Tom Luna, state schools superintendent. "We take that charge very seriously."

Luna said after a 2007 incident where a "mad man" massacred children in an Amish community in rural Pennsylvania, most people realized those types of incidents are just confined to large cities or urban areas.

"So we need to be prepared. We know a child is never really free to learn unless they are free from fear and intimidation. And we hear that from students all the time that they want to feel safe and be safe," said Luna.

Luna said what was learned during the drill will be used to increase safety across the state.

Some of the problems en-

countered during the exercise included the sheriff not having knowledge of the school evacuation safe sites in all the communities and the school district experienced a glitch in the staff and parent emergency notification system.

"I hope people in the community will take some comfort knowing that school safety is a priority for us. It's something we take very seriously and we're always looking to improve it," said Gaylen Smyer, superintendent of the Cassia County School District.

Luna said other members of the community can help increase safety by speaking up if they see something suspicious.

"Preventative measures are one of the most valuable

tools we have in these incidents," said Luna.

"In a rural state like Idaho, it's all about relationships," said Ked Wills, deputy director for the Idaho State Police. "When an incident happens if we haven't already built those relationships, it's too late."

Debbie Critchfield, spokeswoman for the Cassia County School District said a sweep was performed before the exercise to make sure there was no one on campus who was not part of the drill.

Critchfield said last year the district implemented a notification system for parents, but it has only been used to notify parents of events including snow days.

Last year new classroom door latches were installed at

the school, Hondo said. The latches allow teachers to lock down their classrooms.

Coleen Rice, state training and exercise program manager for the Idaho Bureau of Homeland Security said they conduct about five drills a year including ones similar to the Wednesday's and tabletop exercises.

"This is typically what you see around the state in these training exercises," said Rice.

Cassia County Undersheriff George Warrell said the sheriff's office received a \$1,500 training grant through Homeland Security.

Warrell said the costs for the exercise are not yet tallied.

"But, I don't know if we'll use all of that money for this exercise," Warrell said.

Later, she posted a picture of the town's librarian driving a truck while pulling a dozer. Pat Craig, she said, was going to dig a line to protect some of the town's historic buildings.

"It just shows what we're trying to do against the flames," she said.

As of Wednesday, the Boise-based National Interagency Fire Center classified the Little Queens Fire

as the second highest priority in the nation. With 150 fire personnel called in to suppress the flames, the fire is competing with many other larger fire also demanding crews, engines and helicopters.

For example, the Beaver Creek Fire had more than 1,700 fire personnel helping contain the 106,000-acre fire. Other larger fires in Montana and California are also threatening homes and increasing in size. Now that the Beaver Creek Fire is 30 percent contained, fire supervisors are re-

leasing the resources to send to other wildfires.

This isn't the first time fire has threatened Atlanta. Both the 2012 Trinity Ridge Fire and the 2000 Trail Creek Fire wreaked havoc on the town. Yet this year, there is an added sense of urgency because of limited fire crews.

"There is this hope that we have, along with that underlying sick feeling that you don't know," O'Brien said. "So you do what you can to keep busy to make an impact and not think about

the outcome. It's a fairly dramatic situation."

Keeping an eye on the sky, Atlanta resident Greg Johns said each day brings a different emotion.

Johns owns some of the oldest homes in Atlanta. While firefighters have assured him they will protect his property, Johns said he wouldn't leave until he thought he wasn't safe.

"Yesterday was really bad, lots of misinformation and rumors," he said. "Today is better because the weather isn't as bad."

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

For Leak, Bradley Manning Gets Army's Stiffest Punishment

Army Pfc. Bradley Manning stood at attention in his crisp dress uniform Wednesday and learned the price he will pay for spilling an unprecedented trove of government secrets: up to 35 years in prison, the stiffest punishment ever handed out in the U.S. for leaking to the media.

Flanked by his lawyers, Manning, 25, showed no reaction as military judge Col. Denise Lind announced the sentence without explanation in a proceeding that lasted just a few minutes.

A gasp could be heard among the spectators, and one woman buried her face in her hands. Then, as guards hurried Manning out of the courtroom, about a half-dozen supporters shouted from the back: "We'll keep fighting for you, Bradley!" and "You're our hero!"

With good behavior and credit for the more than three years he has been held, Manning could be out in as little as seven years, said his lawyer, David Coombs. The soldier was also demoted and will be dishonorably discharged.

The sentencing fired up the long-running debate over whether Manning was a whistleblower or a traitor for giving more than 700,000 classified military and diplomatic documents, plus battlefield footage, to the anti-secrecy website WikiLeaks. By volume alone, it was the biggest leak of classified material in U.S. history, bigger even than the Pentagon Papers a generation ago.

Manning could have gotten 90 years behind bars. Prosecutors asked for at least 60 as a warning to other soldiers, while Manning's lawyer suggested he get no more than 25, because some of the documents he leaked will be declassified by then.

Myanmar Mob Swarms Car of UN Rights Envoy

The U.N. special investigator on human rights in Myanmar says 200 angry Buddhists mobbed his car after he landed in the central Myanmar town of Meiktila this week to study tensions between Buddhists and Muslims.

Tomas Ojea Quintana said Wednesday it was a terrifying experience that hammered home the level of tension in the region.

During his 10-day visit to the country, Quintana toured areas that have been hit by religious violence in the last year.

More than 250 people have been killed — mostly Muslims — and another 140,000 have been forced to flee their homes.

He said mobs surrounded his convoy in Meiktila, forcing him to cut short his visit there.

Many in Myanmar have accused the U.N. envoy of favoring Muslims and ignoring the feelings of Buddhists.

of alleged attacks. Syrian President Bashar Assad's government rejected the accusations, and U.S. officials said they were seeking details of what happened.

No Defense from Suspect in Fort Hood Shooting

The soldier on trial for the deadly 2009 shooting rampage at Fort Hood refused to put up a fight on Wednesday, resting his case without calling a single witness or testifying in his own defense.

Maj. Nidal Hasan could face the death penalty if convicted for the attack that killed 13 people and wounded more than 30 others at the Texas military base.

But when given the chance to rebut prosecutors' lengthy case — which included nearly 90 witnesses and hundreds of pieces of evidence — the Army psychiatrist declined. About five minutes after court began Wednesday, a day after prosecutors rested their case, the judge asked Hasan how he wanted to proceed.

He answered: "The defense rests."

The judge, Col. Tara Osborn, then asked Hasan: "You have the absolute right to remain silent. You do not have to say anything. You have the right to testify if you choose. Understand?"

Hasan said he did. When the judge asked if this was his personal decision, he answered: "It is."

Osborn then adjourned the trial until Thursday to give prosecutors time to prepare closing arguments, and jurors were led out of the courtroom.

Hasan's move wasn't completely unexpected, considering he has made no attempt since his trial began two weeks ago to prove his innocence. He has sat mostly in silence, raising few objections and questioning only three prosecution witnesses.

Instead, he appears to be

making his case through leaks to the media — even though jurors are barred from reading media reports about the case.

Facebook Aims to Get the World Online

Facebook CEO Mark Zuckerberg wants to get all of the world's 7 billion people online through a partnership with some of the largest mobile technology companies. He says the Web is an essential part of life, and everyone deserves to be connected, whether they live in Norway, Nicaragua or Namibia.

"The Internet not only connects us to our friends, families and communities, but it is also the foundation of the global knowledge economy," Zuckerberg wrote in a paper posted to his Facebook page late Tuesday. The title asks "Is Connectivity A Human Right?"

Of course, connecting more people to the Internet is the kind of philanthropy that would create more potential Facebook users, which would also help boost the company's bottom line.

"I think it is actually a profoundly important human right in the 21st century to have access to the Internet."

To get there, Facebook Inc. on Wednesday announced a partnership called Internet.org. It includes the world's biggest social network, plus Korean electronics giant Samsung, Finnish handset maker Nokia and wireless chip maker Qualcomm Inc. More companies are expected to join.

GOP Takes Anti-D.C. Message to Town Halls

Microphone in hand, Republican Rep. Jim Renacci gave his constituents a grim report on Washington's gridlock.

House Republicans, he said, had passed a number of bills that would boost energy production, cut regulations and rein in spending. But, he added, President Barack Obama and Senate Democrats haven't done their part.

"It's not the easiest thing when you only control one-third of the federal government," said Ohio's Renacci, faulting the Democrats who control the Senate and the White House for the stalemate as he flipped through a series of PowerPoint slides intended to send a message that Republicans are focused on "Making Washington Work."

Jerome County Commissioners Select Jail Site

JEROME • After finally securing enough funds to build a new county jail, Jerome County Commissioners have now decided where they would like to put it.

The commissioners have a tentative deal to build the new county jail on the corner of 100 East Road and East Avenue T in Jerome.

The site was selected because the commissioners won't have to pay for additional upgrades to surrounding roads and available sewer, water, natural gas and power, said Commissioner Cathy Roemer.

The land is owned by North Side Development Holding Co. LLC.

Before the deal can be sealed, however, the site must be surveyed, appraised and approved for a special use permit by the city's planning and zoning department.

The owner's asking price is \$42,500 per acre. The county is negotiating for eight acre which would equate to \$340,000. However, the officials won't know the final price until the appraiser is finished surveying the property, Roemer said.

"We looked at about six different sites, this particular site allows us to allocate more funds for the facility rather than do additional site preparation," she said.

The county's new jail will be funded by a \$11 million bond Jerome voters passed in May. The county's current jail is outdated and no longer suitable to house inmates.

Roemer said the county will work with a nonprofit that works with local government to comply with state laws as they undertake projects.

"We want to be transparant in this process," she said.

CSI UNVEILS NEW VIDEO BOARD

TWIN FALLS • The College of Southern Idaho views itself as, in essence, a Division I-style program — at least as far as junior colleges go. On Wednesday, the school unveiled the latest in a series of facilities upgrades geared toward cementing that kind of status. CSI gave sponsors and media a sneak peek at a new, state of the art video board, one

that replaces the old scoreboard that hovered over the basketball court. It will have digital scoreboard and live video capabilities this season, as well as special videos for player introductions. “It’s a great thing for our athletes, and they’re already excited about seeing their faces up there,” said Jason Vickrey, CSI’s coordinator of marketing and athletic promotions. “It’s going to be a recruiting tool, not only for ath-

letes, but for students in general. This is the nicest thing in junior college ... I’ve only found one other even close to this.” Vickrey said the board, which took three days to install, has replay capability and a few other bells and whistles that may not be seen until next season, when there are fewer kinks to work out. The new board is about 18 inches shorter than the old scoreboard but is significantly narrower between the two

sides. The dual-paneled videoboard is 12 feet wide and 5 feet tall, and it cost around \$180,000. That money is being primarily raised by the sale of a home built and donated to the school by James Ray Construction. The rest will be funded by a donation from Idaho Central Credit Union and, if there’s a shortfall, from CSI’s Fall Fest fundraiser later this year. “I was kind of taken aback

DECLO • As the Declo Hornets try to defend their Class 2A state football championship this fall, the thrill of winning the first title in school history hasn’t worn off yet. “It lingers,” said head coach Kelly Kidd. “It’s lingering with me and the other coaches. And I think with the kids, it’s still fresh in their minds. I think it’s going to last for a long, long time, enjoying it.” Kidd can be forgiven if he still basks in the perfect 12-0 season and state title. After all, it was a long time coming for the coach, a Declo alum, who enters his 18th season at the helm. With the monkey finally off his back, he feels like he can relax. But there’s a fine line be-

tween relaxing and complacency. “That’s something that we all have to guard against. As coaches we’ll have to refocus,” Kidd said. “I’m not worried about the kids — it’s a new group, they want to set their mark, they want to be the team to do well and maybe repeat.” As Declo toils through two-a-days this week, most of the key components of its state title run are gone. Beefy running backs Drexton Thrall and Boston Webb (both over 6-foot and 200 pounds) can pound out yardage in the Hornets’ wing-T. Tight ends Kyle Heward and Ty Loveland also have playmaking ability. The question mark is in the trenches, where the Hornets will try to replace some of the grittiest and smartest linemen they’ve ever had. Seniors Brigham Gentry and Hunter Breshears are good

Camas County Heads Into the Unknown

FAIRFIELD • All eyes across Idaho are on this tiny rural town and its football team this fall.

Camas County High was the driving force behind the Idaho High School Activities Association's decision to sign off on a three-year pilot program for 6-man football. For the first time since the early 1950s, 6-man football will be played within Idaho's borders.

Dwindling enrollment numbers caused Camas — which had previously played 8-man ball in Class 1A Division-II — to consider other options. Distance made cooperative agreements (like the one Murtaugh and Hansen made last week) unrealistic, not to mention the thought of losing tradition.

Not as many other small schools jumped on the chance, as the Musers had hoped, but they will still play at least a six-game schedule in 2013. It includes two games with Clark County (the only other school to adopt 6-man), two games against Montana teams, and matchups with JV squads from Raft River (a 1A 8-man school) and Minico (4A).

"I'm ready to show the state how amazing 6-man truly is," Camas County head coach Jason Ellingson wrote to the *Times-News*.

One of the biggest adjustments for the Musers during

two-a-days is teaching linemen how to catch a football. Per 6-man rules, every player on the field is eligible to catch a pass.

"The ability to open the field up and make every player a specialty guy has made for some excitement in the linemen," Ellingson said. "The linemen are working hard at learning the pass routes and getting their catching abilities better, because they get to go out and have a chance now of making that important catch. It is making each player an overall better football player."

Ellingson said the Musers' passing game is ahead of the run game early on, but he expects his boys to put it all together once the season kicks off at Raft River on Sept. 4.

From a team that went 3-6 last year, Camas has an excellent base of seven returning starters to build on, including Shawn Allbritton, Cale Homer, Jordon Moore, Erick Peterson, Mick Martin, Jerry Gonzalez and Niki Kepford.

"High skilled, young, and quick," Ellingson said. "When you start looking into 6-man, you get the feeling it gives an advantage to the offense. I think as long as you have disciplined players doing exactly what they need to when they need to you can undo any offense, and that is something these boys have the potential to be."





ALEX RODRIGUEZ PUTS END TO NON-BASEBALL TALK

NEW YORK • Alex Rodriguez said Wednesday he's cutting off all non-baseball talk after a wild weekend of accusations and retaliations on and off the field.

Playing while he appeals a 211-game suspension for violating baseball's drug agreement and labor contract, the New York Yankees star and his fleet of lawyers and representatives sparred with the Yankees and Major League Baseball over his medical care and evidence in the doping case that stems from MLB's investigation into Biogenesis, the now-closed Florida anti-aging clinic accused of distributing performance-enhancing drugs.

"I think that's behind us now. I've shut everything down," Rodriguez said. "I want everything to be 100 percent on baseball and that's what I want my guys to focus on."

Rodriguez was not in the Yankees' lineup Wednesday night, a day after playing both games of a double-header against the Toronto Blue Jays. The teams will play a day game today.

"I felt I couldn't play him both tonight and tomorrow, it's probably too much," manager Joe Girardi said.

Rodriguez's change of public-relations strategy comes after a weekend in Boston that turned increasingly intense and bizarre.

While the Yankees were playing the AL East-leading Red Sox, it was learned Rodriguez paid Florida-based attorney Susy Ribero-Ayala in February to represent Anthony Bosch, head of the Biogenesis of America anti-aging clinic. ESPN first reported the deal.

Rodriguez's newest lawyer, Joseph Tacopina, accused the Yankees of botching the slugger's medical care last postseason when the three-time MVP was benched and pinch hit for during a pitiful playoff performance. Rodriguez had left hip surgery in January.

Team president Randy Levine basically dared A-Rod to file a grievance, and the slugger said his lawyers would ask the players' union to do so.

Yankees general manager Brian Cashman told reporters on the field in Boston that he felt "lied to" by Rodriguez regarding his medical care, and that he doesn't feel comfortable talking to one of the team's most important players because they are in "a litigious environment."

Finally on Monday, MLB wrote to Tacopina, urging him to waive his client's confidentiality under baseball's Joint Drug Agreement so all the evidence relating to the drug case could be released. The letter was given to Tacopina on the "Today" show. Tacopina rejected the offer.

"I think that's behind us now," Rodriguez said. "Out of respect to my team and my manager and my coaches we are in the middle of a pennant race. We're playing pretty well right now. We want to keep the focus on the field."

Rodriguez wasn't free of controversy on the field, either. In the second inning of Sunday's nationally televised game, Boston's Ryan Dempster threw three close pitches at Rodriguez before hitting him with another. Manager Joe Girardi was ejected for his outburst after Dempster was not ejected.

The moment appeared to galvanize the team, and the third baseman led the charge with a long home run that kicked off a sixth inning rally. Dempster was suspended Tuesday for five games and fined \$2,500. Rodriguez would not comment on the penalty.

Rodriguez returned from hip surgery Aug. 5, the day he was suspended by MLB. The Yankees were swept three straight by the lowly Chicago White Sox in his first three games but have been on a tear since. They've won nine of 12 to creep back into the AL wild-card race — 4 1/2 games back of the second spot. Rodriguez is batting .296 with two homers and six RBIs in 15 games.

"I think if we keep doing what we've been doing the last two weeks — I think we're playing with a lot of energy, a lot of confidence, (getting) a lot of contributions from a lot of people," Rodriguez said.

NATIONAL BRIEFS

Texans DE Smith Suspended by NFL for Opener

NEW YORK • Houston Texans defensive end Antonio Smith was suspended by the NFL on Wednesday for the season opener and the last two preseason games for hitting Miami guard Richie Incognito with the Dolphins player's helmet.

Smith ripped the helmet off Incognito's head, then hit Incognito on the shoulder with it in last Saturday night's preseason game. The two also went at it in last season's opener, when Smith kicked Incognito, drawing an \$11,000 fine. Smith later said Incognito deliberately tried to twist his ankle while holding his legs in the 2012 game.

Incognito was not fined for that play. Smith must sit out Houston's visit to San Diego to begin the season Sept. 9. He also will lose about \$400,000 in salary for his seventh rules violation since 2011.

He was fined three times for unnecessary roughness and three times for illegal hits before the latest incident.

Source: Sharapova Withdraws from U.S. Open

NEW YORK • Maria Sharapova pulled out of the U.S. Open on Wednesday because of a right shoulder injury.

The U.S. Tennis Association announced the 2006 champion's withdrawal. Sharapova has played only one match on tour since her second-round loss at Wimbledon in June.

Sharapova originally was seeded third at the U.S. Open. The USTA said 2012 Wimbledon runner-up Agnieszka Radwanska would shift from No. 4 to No. 3, and all other seeded players below her would move up a spot, too.

The USTA said Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova would become the No.

32 seed.

The draw for the year's last Grand Slam tournament is today. Play begins Monday.

Chris Paul Elected President of NBA Players Union

LAS VEGAS • Los Angeles Clippers star Chris Paul has been elected president of the NBA players' association.

The vote Wednesday came six months after the players fired Billy Hunter as executive director.

Hunter countered with a wrongful-termination lawsuit in May, accusing Derek Fisher, the former union president, of conspiring with league officials during the 2011 lockout.

Also Wednesday, Roger Mason Jr. was elected first vice president, and Anthony Tolliver and Steve Blake were elected vice presidents.

Tebow's Chances of Staying with Patriots Uncertain

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. • Tim Tebow walked off the practice field with no reporters blocking his path to the locker room. Finally, a few strolled up for a 90-second interview then moved on to longer chats with other Patriots.

The media circus that surrounded him last season is gone. His uncertain future remains.

Ten weeks into what could be his last shot at staying in the NFL, Tebow seems to be on the roster bubble. He is simply trying to make the team now, but has played poorly in two exhibition games.

How poorly?

His passer rating was 0.0 — that's zero-point-zero — in New England's 25-21 win over Tampa Bay last Friday night.

"You would definitely want to do better in some areas," said Tebow, the only quarterback the Patriots used in the second half vs. the Buccaneers. "Also, you have different things happen that you just try to handle the best way you can."

He completed just one of seven passes for a loss of one yard, and had one interception on a badly overthrown pass. He was sacked twice on his first nine plays. But the lefty who has trouble reading defenses and zipping passes did what he does best, running six times for 30 yards.

A week earlier, in his debut, he was a bit better — 4 for 12 for 55 yards with four runs for 31 yards in a 31-22 win over the Philadelphia Eagles.

Numbers may not lie, but coach Bill Belichick sees a larger truth. He watches Tebow at every practice, sees how diligently he studies and how dedicated he is in the weight room.

And he sees some positive steps from the player traded by the Denver Broncos and cut by the New York Jets in a span of 13 months.

"Yeah, definitely," Belichick said. "I think if you look at the entire week last week, that it will look different than the game did."

Tebow could get another chance in the third preseason game on Thursday night against the Lions in Detroit. That'll be five days before the mandatory roster cut to 75 players. The Patriots finish the exhibition schedule Aug. 29 against the New York Giants. The final cut to 53 comes two days later.

Tebow, as expected, says he's not thinking about his prospects of sticking around. Grasping the New England offense is difficult enough.

"I just focus one day at a time," he says, "improving every single practice."

It's not even an issue? "Just getting ready for the practice," he says with a smile.

7 Great Hiking Trails for Children

Finding ways to get kids into the outdoors.

A father in his late 20s, Jeff Gilmore feels as though he can climb tall mountains and leap wide rivers in a single bound, he said. Now, the Bellevue man is trying to pass that love of the outdoors to his children.

He knows he has to tone it down, slowing his pace to allow them to check out every bird feather and scratch on the tree. He knows any successful hike requires a lot of gummy bears and cheese crackers, as well.

What's not negotiable is getting out.

"I believe it's important for kids to get out in nature, away from Game Boy and the TV. When I was a kid I was always chasing mayflies in the creek or lightning bugs in the

night," Gilmore said. "I don't want my children to grow up nature-deficient. And it's so easy to get out here — we don't live in Chicago. We live in Idaho where there are plenty of adventures to be had on a variety of trails."

Many trails in southern Idaho are suitable for children who want to get out and commune with nature. Here are seven of them:

Gooding City of Rocks

What child won't let his imagination run wild in this place of hoodoos that resemble Snoopy or a vulture?

There are two trails through these volcanic rock formations. But it's a good place to let your child run free and explore the columns, arches and other rock formations.

Gooding City of Rocks is northwest of Gooding.

Get there: Drive 15 miles north of Gooding on Idaho Highway 46. Turn west at the Bureau of Land Management sign and follow signs 7.5 miles. The dirt road is accessible for passenger cars.

Phantom Falls

Phantom Falls, tucked away in the hills south of Burley, is a hidden oasis in a sea of sagebrush. It's just 1.5 miles to the falls — easy for children of almost any age. And a destination with a waterfall is sure to delight any child, as well as adults.

Get there: Drive one mile west out of Oakley. Turn onto the Goose Creek Road and follow it as it turns into the narrow, gravel Trapper Creek Road. Follow the Goose



Adam's Gulch offers a variety of trails, such as the Sunnyside Trail, that are suitable for youngsters to hike or bike.

Creek/Trapper Creek Road for 20 miles to a fork. Take the left fork and begin looking for a sign pointing to the falls.

Silver Creek Nature Trail

This virtually flat trail, which starts just below the visitor center at Silver Creek Preserve, winds its way through tall grass, past cottonwoods and even along the famed Silver Creek, a world-class trout fishing stream.

Observant children will have no problem spotting a variety of birds — the pre-

serve boasts 150 species, including sandhill cranes and an occasional pheasant. There is plenty of other wildlife to gawk at, as well, including deer, elk and the occasional coyote.

Catch it when the visitor center is open and you can check out a children's guide designed by Hailey artist Poo Wright Pulliam and preserve manager Dayna Gross.

Get there: Drive to the junction of U.S. Highway 20 and Idaho Highway 75 several miles south of Bellevue. Turn east on U.S. 20 and drive seven miles to the Kilpatrick

Bridge Road, named for the Kilpatrick brothers who built part of the railroad through Idaho. Turn south on this road and follow it to the end.

Howard's Preserve

This is another flat, easy walk with lots of nature for kids to get involved in.

The 13-acre preserve along the Big Wood River on the western edge of Bellevue was created through a partnership between the Wood River Land Trust and other entities.

TWIN FALLS • Fires burning around the state have cramped some outdoor enthusiasts' plans to hop onto an ATV or motorcycle.

"Right now with where all the fires are at, it's kind of tough," said Wes Wall, owner of Adventure Motorsports.

As fires burn in popular outdoor recreation areas, "you can't go a whole lot of places right now," said Abram Mingo, parts manager for Action Cycle N' Sleds.

The north half of the Sawtooth National Forest is closed now due to fires, said Ann Niesen, recreation staff officer for the forest.

But once wildfire season ends, you'll find no shortage of places for a good offroading experience.

"There's a lot of options," Mingo said.

South Hills

"South Hills is a very popular area for folks in the Magic Valley," said

Todd Wernex, trails specialist for the Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation.

Smoky Mountain Zone Elk Hunts Affected by Fires

JEROME • Magic Valley hunters, take note: Roughly 50 percent of the Smoky Mountain Zone — game management units 43,44, and 48 — is closed due to several large wildfires, although some roads are starting to open up.

The archery A-tag season for elk in the Smoky Mountain Zone begins Aug. 30. Hunters can exchange Smoky Mountain Zone elk tags for another zone at any Idaho Department of Fish and Game office prior to Aug. 30.

The next hunts affected by the current closure area include a controlled deer hunt in Unit 44 which

opens Sept. 15 and controlled bull elk hunts opening Sept. 25, Fish and Game said. Several other hunts open in October. Fish and Game will monitor access restrictions and fire boundaries in those areas as those hunts draw nearer.

Fish and Game has a number of options for hunters whose hunting access is severely restricted by wildfires or closures, including exchanging controlled hunt tags for general season tags, rain checks for the following year, and in some cases non-resident refunds. As fire and closure boundaries change, Fish

Mingo said he enjoys the area because it's close and easy to go to. "South Hills has always been fun."

For single-track motorcycle trails, Wall recommends Wahlstrom Hollow. Jason Fisher, president of Magic Valley Trail Machine Association, recommends the Diamondfield Jack area for motorcyclists.

For ATV riders, a popular choice is the Rock Creek ATV Loop, which includes 11 miles of trails in the Sawtooth National Forest. It begins near the Diamondfield Jack campground.

When you head out on a trail, there won't be a shortage of scenic views.

"The South Hills are beautiful to explore, with aspen trees in the draws and open slopes in the higher elevations," according to the Stay on Trails website. "Watch for wildlife."

Stay on Trails is an educational campaign by a group of Idaho public land agencies.

How to get there: Take Interstate 84 to exit 182 near Kimberly and go south on Idaho Highway 50. Bear left on 3800 East (Rock Creek Road) and go directly south. Follow the road to the end of the pavement at Diamondfield Jack Campground.

Pick up Trail No. 239 from the campground and ride north several miles to Trail No. 241. Turn right and ride to Trail No. 163, then go left and ride to Trail No. 004, the third fork of Rock Creek.

Go several miles until you hit Forest Road No. 500. Turn right on the road to return to the campground.

Fairfield

With a lot of options for offroading, the Fairfield area is known as a Northwest destination for high-quality singletrack trail riding, Niesen said.

"A lot of people do some pretty significant riding coming into Fairfield," she said.

Experienced riders can go a long distance and connect with trails in the Boise National Forest and beyond.

"There's a lot of connectivity across the jurisdictions of the Forest Service land," Niesen said.

North of Fairfield, Baumgartner is also a huge riding area, Fisher said. You can get to the trails from the Baumgartner Campground, about 12 miles east of Featherville.

How to get there: Get trail maps from the Fairfield Ranger District office: 208-764-3202.

Nearby, a bonus: Another popular destination is the

Wilson Flat ATV trail system, with 11 miles of loop trails. This trail system is in the Mountain Home District of the Boise National Forest. Take U.S. Highway 20 northeast from Mountain Home about 16 miles to the junction with Forest Road 134. Follow 134 north about five miles, cross the dam and go two miles along the reservoir to the trailhead.

Stanley Area

"I'd probably say I enjoy up north the best, just below Stanley," Mingo said about offroading.

One popular place for ATV riders is Custer Motorway, a 40-mile route that goes past old towns and mines. It's east of Stanley in the Salmon-Challis National Forest. The route goes through the Yankee Fork, Bonanza and Custer areas.

"Learn about the history as you encounter 17 interpretive sites between Sunbeam and Challis," according to the Stay on the Trails website.

How to get there: For directions, contact the Salmon-Challis National Forest at 208-756-5100.

Hagerman Pipeline

The trails offer riding opportunities for both dirt bikes and ATVs. Hagerman Pipeline includes several square miles of trails, sand dunes and steep hills.

How to get there: The Pipeline is accessed near the Salmon Falls power plant on Bell Rapids Road in Hagerman.

Devil's Corral

Devil's Corral, in Jerome County just north of the I.B. Perrine Bridge, includes 206 acres of dirt and sand trails. It's popular for offroading and is just a quick drive from Twin Falls.

As cars whizzed by Saturday morning on U.S. Highway 93, Devil's Corral was quiet. Yellow flowers lined the side of Shoshone Falls Road.

Amid dry grass, a few people gathered to target shoot. Farther down the road, a woman rode her bicycle.

IDAHO F&G COMMISSION SETS 2013 SAGE GROUSE SEASON

JEROME • The Idaho Fish and Game Commission on Monday set the 2013 sage grouse hunting season. The season is similar to last year's, with hunting allowed at the "restrictive" level.

From an Idaho Department of Fish and Game press release:

The seven-day season runs Sept. 21-27, with a one-bird daily limit and a two-bird possession limit, open in:

- Butte, Camas, Cassia, Clark, Fremont, Gooding, Jefferson, Jerome, Lemhi, Lincoln, Madison, Minidoka, Power and Teton counties.
- Bannock and Bingham counties west of Interstate 15.
- Blaine County, except within the Salmon River drainage.
- Bonneville County west of Interstate 15 and north of U.S. Highway 26.
- Custer County, except within the Salmon River drainage upstream from and including Valley Creek.
- Oneida County west of Interstate 15.
- Owyhee County west of the Bruneau River.
- Twin Falls County east of U.S. Highway 93.

Closed areas are:

- Eastern Owyhee County and western Twin Falls County, which continue to be affected by the 2007 Murphy Complex Fire.
- East Idaho Uplands area in the southeastern part of the state east of Interstate 15 and south of U.S. Highway 26, because of a lack of long-term data.
- Washington, Adams, Payette and Gem counties. This isolated population

has been closed to hunting since 1984.

- Elmore County, because of a lack of long-term data, 2012 fires and no known active leks south of Highway 20.

Rules:

Any person hunting sage or sharp-tailed grouse must have a valid Idaho hunting license with a grouse permit validation at \$4.75.

Hunters should be aware

that sage grouse and sharp-tailed grouse occur in the same areas in south-central and eastern Idaho. Hunting seasons for these species do not overlap.

Sage grouse is a candidate for listing under the federal Endangered Species Act. Candidate species are under state management, and hunting is legal. Fish and Game monitors sage grouse populations annually.

F&G: New Hatchery Will Help Boost Sockeye Recovery

POCATELLO • Officials will gather just outside Springfield on the morning of Sept. 6 to mark the completion of a new hatchery meant to boost recovery of Snake River sockeye.

The \$13.5 million facility will be capable of producing up to 1 million juvenile sockeye annually for release in the Sawtooth Basin of central Idaho, the headquarters of the Salmon River.

"This additional incubation and rearing space will move the sockeye recovery effort from the conservation phase to a re-colonization phase where emphasis will be on returning increasing numbers of ocean-run adults to use in hatchery spawning and to release to the habitat for natural spawning," the Idaho Department of Fish and Game said in a press release.

The increase may eventually mean recreational and tribal fishing seasons.

and steelhead.

Snake River sockeye were listed as an endangered species in 1991. Fish and Game initiated conservation and research efforts for sockeye earlier that year. Just a few years later the number of adult sockeye returning from the ocean to the Sawtooth Basin dropped to zero — in 1995 and 1997 — but reached 1,336 in 2010, a number not seen since the 1950s, Fish and Game said.

The current run of sockeye into the Snake River is one of three remaining populations in the Columbia River Basin, Fish and Game said. The other two populations are in Okanogan and Wenatchee lakes, on tributaries of the upper Columbia River.

ant. Hot blobs rise to the surface where they radiate their heat, shrink, become less buoyant, and sink back down. It's like a boiling pot of water, but on an enormous scale (the typical solar convection blob is as

wide as Texas).

Once in space, the energy radiated from the surface reaches Earth in just over eight minutes.

So, on the next sunny day, consider the story of a solar photon's journey, revealed by theoretical astrophysics: Sunlight was born in the sun's core, 93 million miles away, and spent the last tens to hundreds of millennia working its way to you, to warm your upturned face.

It includes a hiking trail and plenty of wildlife viewing.

“Turn a kid loose there and they have a fabulous time checking out the birds and other wildlife,” said Susan Giannettino of Hailey.

Get there: Turn left on Broadford Road as you’re heading north through Bellevue. Take an immediate left on Martin Lane, park in the parking lot at the end of the road, and cross the bridge over the canal to get to the preserve.

Sunnyside Trail

This trail on Ketchum’s north side comes with options depending on how energetic the kids are.

You can take Sunnyside through the flats in Adam’s Gulch out and back. Or you can do a short loop utilizing Shadyside if you want shade. Or, you can pair the Sunnyside Trail with Lane’s Trail, which climbs to a picnic table and great views of the Pioneer Mountains and valley below for a 2.5-mile hike.

Get there: Drive north out of Ketchum on Idaho 75 for about 1.5 miles. Turn left on to Adams Gulch Road. Follow this across the river and to the fork in the road under the mountain slope. Turn left and follow this to the trailhead with its large parking lot and outhouse.

Taylor Canyon

Abram Davis of Hailey says this trek right outside Ketchum offers everything a maturing youngster of 6 and older could want: blue moths puddling in the creek, a shady climb through the woods and wonderful views on top looking down on the Glassford subdivision and across to Griffin Butte and the Boulder Mountains.

It does have about 1,250 feet of elevation gain, so it may not be suitable for the very youngest hiker.

Get there: Drive three miles north of Ketchum on Idaho 75 to Lake Creek Road. Turn right and drive another 1.5 miles on paved and dirt road to the Taylor Creek Road. Turn left and follow

this another .25 miles to the trailhead. You can take the loop either way. But with children, it may be advisable to go right, following the creek up to the switchbacks that thread through the woods. The trail will take you across the ridge with all its views. Then it’s a quick downhill back to the car.

Hell Roaring Lake

This trail, in the woods a little north of Smiley Creek and a little south of Redfish Lake, is the one that many Sun Valley-area residents use to take children on their first backpacking trips. And it makes an excellent day trip, as well.

It’s just about 1.75 miles in, should you choose to hike from the upper trailhead using a slow-going, rocky road suitable for Jeeps or four-wheel drives.

A preferable route for many is taking off from the trailhead from the road skirting the Salmon River. It’s a five-mile hike in that way, but it’s fairly level save for a little elevation gain on the first leg of the trip.

Whichever way you choose, your children will be rewarded at the end with a beautiful mountain lake under the majestic Finger of Fate, an unmistakable rocky pinnacle that sits over the lake. There’s even a log to cross, should you choose to go a little farther around the lake.

Get there: Drive about 46 miles north from Ketchum on Idaho 75 over Galena Summit to the Decker Flat Road. Turn left and cross the Salmon River. Turn left where the road splits and drive another quarter-mile to a small parking space on the right that can hold about three cars. The trail starts in this vicinity, following the breathtaking Hell Roaring Creek (you’ll see immediately how it got its name). In about a mile it turns into a beautiful, placid creek.

If you choose to use the Jeep road, pass this by and continue following Hell Roaring Creek Road past Hell Roaring Creek, driving a mile to the Mays Creek junction. Turn right at the road sign and continue driving two miles to the trailhead.

Ask Fish and Game: Hunter Passport

Question: How do you qualify for Idaho’s Hunter Passport to try hunting without having to take a Hunter Education class first?

Answer: Any first-time hunter, resident or nonresident, 8 and older, can get a Hunting Passport to try hunting for one year with an adult mentor

without first having to complete an Idaho hunter education course, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game said.

Anyone who has held a hunting license in any state is not eligible. But anyone who has completed a Hunter Education course but has not yet pur-

chased a license is eligible for a Hunting Passport. It’s good for one calendar year, but only one Hunting Passport can be purchased in a lifetime. The cost is \$1.75.

AN ORDINANCE MAKING THE ANNUAL APPROPRIATIONS OF THE CITY OF PAUL, MINIDOKA COUNTY, IDAHO FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 2013 - 2014, BEGINNING OCTOBER 1, 2013 THROUGH SEPTEMBER 30, 2014 AND SPECIFYING THE FUNDS TO BE APPROPRIATED; LEVYING A GENERAL AD VALOREM TAX AND PROVIDING THAT MONIES REALIZED THEREFROM SHALL BE PLACED IN THE GENERAL FUND; TO BE KNOWN AS THE ANNUAL APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE; PROVIDING FOR THE CERTIFICATION OF TAXES LEVIED TO THE TAX COLLECTOR OF MINIDOKA COUNTY AND THE SECRETARY OF STATE OF IDAHO; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.



The question of whether to lead the only unbid suit when the opponents have confidently reached three no-trump is a vexing one. Michael Rosenberg, formerly of Scotland, is now a world champion in the United States. He resisted the impulse to lead the fourth suit in this deal from the 1995 Vanderbilt and regretted it.

Rosenberg, playing with Zia Mahmood, led a diamond to the jack and king and ducked the club queen. He took the diamond nine with the ace, played a heart, and declarer won this to try a spade to the queen and king. Back came a second spade to the nine and 10.

Zia as East had a choice of three losing options. When he chose a heart, declarer won the king and played the club jack, ducked by Rosenberg again. Now a finesse of the diamond eight was the ninth trick.

This hand represented a 12-IMP swing against the number one seeds in the Vanderbilt Trophy and it represented most of the margin of their loss in that event. The underdog team included Brian Platnick and John Diamond, for whom I had forecast great things at the time they were practicing for the world junior championships, an event they went on to win. Indeed, they have since gone on to collect the open world title in Philadelphia in 2010. Not all my predictions have worked quite as well, so I must make the most of my accurate ones!

Reporting what is heard at meetings is completely against what 12-step meetings are all about. It was unfair of you to place responsibility on someone who is there for his OWN addiction to tell on another group member.

DEAR ANONYMOUS: I received a ton of criticism for my response to that letter. Readers like you wrote to point out that I was misinformed about how these programs work; others berated me for not insisting the writer notify the police immediately.

I was — and still am — of two minds on the question. While it would be satisfying to see "justice done," I could not bring myself to recommend going against the principle upon which these 12-step programs that have helped thousands of people is based. Another principle of these programs is that people who have hurt others must make amends for what they have done. However, this is the responsibility of the person who committed the crime — NOT someone who overheard mention of it at a meeting. **Read on:**

DEAR ABBY: I have been a member of NA for 26-plus years (drug- and alcohol-free for that entire time). I also work in the field of mental health, where I have certain reporting duties as part of my professional code of ethics. I learned long ago how to separate my professional responsibilities from my membership in NA. If I obtain information about abuse or neglect in the conduct of my profession, THEN I have a duty to act. Should I overhear something at a meeting, in the mall or some other social setting, I have no specific duty to report.

DEAR ABBY: As a 30-year member, I can say with certainty that some meeting attendees are grandiose and others are mentally ill. I have not infrequently heard disclosures that I later determined to be not true. The advice for members offered by our NA traditions is, "Take what you can use (in one's own recovery) and leave the rest of what one hears at a meeting."

I am not a believer that if you confess to murder in NA, AA or with a priest in a confessional that they are bound not to tell. That is HOGWASH! For some crimes I would say OK, but not something this serious.
