FILER • Haven Jones looked up and locked eyes with her mother. The 11-year-old Twin Falls girl, wearing a pink shirt, braided ponytail and cowgirl boots, isn't much taller than the 1,300-pound steer — Red — she was commanding. Her mother, Andrea, gave a nod and a smile.

"There you go ... perfect," Andrea said, taking out her cell phone to take a photo. "Scratch." Haven's demeanor shifted from nervousness to poise, and she rubbed the steer's belly with her show stick. Andrea said she is happy to help soothe her nervous daughter's mind from beyond the fence. "I need to keep calm in order for me to keep him calm," Haven said later. "But, 'Look at the judge' and 'Keep him set' is usually what goes through my mind."

It paid off. Red and Haven took third place in the morning commercial showing at the Twin Falls County Fair in Filer. Haven, grinning, wrestled Red back into the barn and rubbed water on his snout. The two are an odd pair — one a hulking mass of slobber, meat and bones; the other a growing girl with a spring in her step.

"She is so confident," Andrea said. "She definitely has a disadvantage when it comes to size. But she works with him enough that he knows she is in charge. He has a certain amount of respect for her." Haven's brother, Bryer, tied up his steer, Boss, next to Red. It was

Bryer's first time competing against his younger sister. "I was a little nervous 'cause she was worried that I would beat her, but I didn't," said the 15-year-old, who took fourth place. "Was that disappointing?" Andrea asked. Bryer paused, smiled and said

Foreman in Lish Manslaughter Trial Sits for Interview

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TWIN FALLS • Cayde Lish's high-profile manslaughter trial wrapped up last week with a guilty verdict from the jury, led by foreman David Bashore, sports editor for the *Times-News*.

Lish stabbed Jeremiah Paiz in the arm and 13 times in the back during a fight outside Canyon Crest Dining and Event Center last Oct. 6. Lish, 22, admitted to the stabbing but claimed self-defense, saying he feared death as he was beaten by Paiz, 24. While Bashore initially believed his ties to the newspaper and family members in law enforcement would bar him from sitting on the jury, he ended up being voted as the group's leader by his fellow jurors. During the trial, jurors were instructed to avoid all media reports about the trial, not do any research on it or even talk about it with each other. In this interview, Bashore discusses the emotional trial, how the jury deliberated and his thoughts on the case.

Q: As a member of the media, was it difficult to avoid news of the case during the trial?
A: No, I just had to make it clear to everybody, with you and Autumn (Agar, *Times-News* editor) especially, to keep (the trial) away from me if at all possible. I made sure on long days, I just went somewhere and made sure I

As part of their case, prosecutors in the Cayde Lish voluntary manslaughter case played the 911 call that Webb made after Lish fatally stabbed her boyfriend, Jeremiah Paiz. After the recording was played in court, many *Times-News* readers were left wondering why she had to speak to two dispatchers. First, the 911 operator answered. Then, when it was determined to be a medical

Mayor Salary Up in the Air as Kimberly Finalizes Budget

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KIMBERLY • The city's new budget doesn't include higher water rates, but there's room for a 150 percent salary increase for the mayor. City council members voted Monday to adopt the \$3.4 million budget for the 2013-14 fiscal year with a healthy surplus to go into reserves or capital improvement projects. But not all the line items have been finalized. Mayor Tracy Armstrong gets a \$600 monthly

stipend, and council members receive \$500 per month. During early budget discussions, the council proposed raising the mayor's salary back to \$900 a month, as it was before a cut in 2011. Armstrong suggested raising his pay to \$1,500 a month, saying that would allow him to cut back on his day construction job and focus more on city projects. "I'm not in the city to get paid money," he said. "I'm there to serve the community, but doing that takes time away from other areas."

Stocks Edge Higher as Syria, Oil Worries Linger

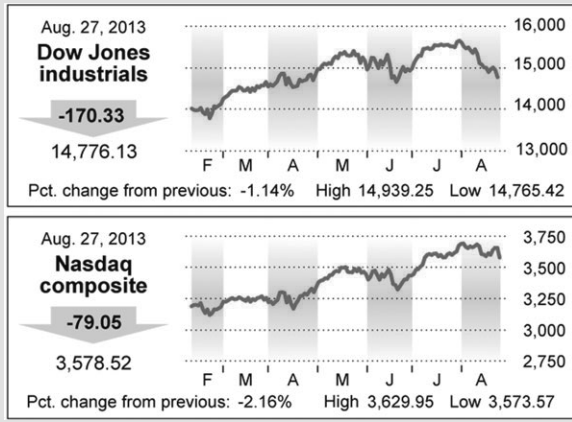
NEW YORK (AP) • The stock market edged higher Wednesday as investors continued to focus on the likelihood of a U.S.-led attack on Syria. Energy stocks rose sharply as the price of oil increased to the highest in more than two years.

The Dow Jones industrial average rose 48.38 points, or 0.3 percent, to close at 14,824.51. The Standard & Poor's 500 index gained 4.48 points, or 0.3 percent, to 1,634.96. The Nasdaq composite rose 14.83 points, or 0.4 percent, to 3,593.35.

The quick rise in the price of oil has caused investors to worry. Costlier oil almost always translates into higher fuel expenses for businesses and consumers, weighing on consumer spending and the economy. While Syria produces little oil, a regional conflict in the Middle East could lead to supply disruptions in an area where half the world's proven oil reserves lie.

"When you add it all up — the problems in Libya, Egypt, Syria — you're looking at 3 million barrels a day in potential production outages," said Nick Koutsofas, a commodities-focused portfolio manager at Cohen & Steers.

Oil rose \$1.09, or 1 percent, to \$110.10 a barrel, the highest price since May 2011. It went as high as \$112 a barrel overnight.

Original 'Freedom Writer' to Speak in Twin Falls Tonight

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TWIN FALLS • Manny Scott dropped out of high school when he was 14.

By the time he was 16, Scott's best friend had been brutally murdered, and his father was incarcerated.

One day he sat on a bench and considered his life over. A stranger sat next to him and encouraged him to follow a positive path.

Now Scott is a married father of three, an entrepreneur and a Ph.D. student who travels the world inspiring leaders about the importance of education, hope and determination.

Scott will speak at Canyon Ridge High School Auditorium at 7 tonight about his experience as a student of Erin Gruwell, the English teacher whose inspirational story was made into the 2007 movie "Freedom Writers" starring Hilary Swank.

The event is free and open to the public as part of the 2013 Back to School Celebration sponsored by the Twin Falls School District.

After being inspired by the stranger, Scott returned to school and ended up in Gruwell's first English class.

Gruwell reaches her student through several methods, such as having them write in journals about their experiences in gangs and a drug-infested neighborhood in Long Beach.

"Life at its best is about helping others make the most of their lives," Scott said in a news release. "My life was changed because others took time to let me know they care, and I believe it is my duty to love and serve others in the same way, helping people turn the page in their lives from despair to hope, and from mediocrity to excellence."

Scott was the keynote speaker at this year's Idaho Title I Conference, attended by several local school administrators and teachers.

"Those who attended were

very impressed with Manny's message and saw the benefit in bringing him to Twin Falls," said district spokeswoman Beth Pendergrass.

At the conference, the state Department of Education named the Twin Falls School District the Title III Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Program of the Year and Title I-C Migrant Program of the Year. The LEP program got a \$10,000 grant, and \$3,000 was awarded to the migrant program.

Some of the grant money was used to bring Scott to Twin Falls, Pendergrass said.

"He talks a lot about his experiences in school, and we have such a diverse population that they thought his insight was valuable."

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WASHINGTON, D.C. • Local economic leader Jan Rogers put the spotlight on the Magic Valley Tuesday while meeting with bigwigs at the annual White House Economic Development Forum.

Rogers, director of the Southern Idaho Economic Development Organization, said she told foreign investors about this

area's growing international business presence. More than 30 large corporations have moved to south-central Idaho over the past decade.

"It was an opportunity for us to network with a number of states as well as federal agencies," Rogers said. "It was a really high-level discussion, but we certainly learned a lot, particularly with SelectUSA, which is going to be good for us going forward."

SelectUSA is a federal marketing campaign to attract international companies to the states.

"Meeting the most senior

decision-makers involved in federal economic development programming and policies will offer tremendous potential to our ongoing efforts in southern Idaho and the state," Rogers said. "We hope to return to Idaho with new ideas and key contracts that will further our regional and state economic development work."

Only five people from west of the Mississippi River were among the 75 people invited to the forum, Rogers said. The other Idahoan was Gyni Gilliam, chief officer for the state Department of Commerce.

Idaho Police Step up DUI Patrols

TWIN FALLS • With Labor Day approaching, the Idaho Transportation Department is warning drivers that law enforcement will be out in force, on the lookout for people who drink before climbing behind the wheel.

ITD, Idaho State Police and local law enforcement agencies have partnered in a high-visibility, impaired-driving education and enforcement campaign through Sept. 8.

Idaho State Police, and local law enforcement agencies will be increasing patrols during the holiday weekend, a period when there are often higher numbers of alcohol-related accidents, officials said.

The campaign is part of a nationwide Labor Day education and enforcement campaign targeting impaired driving.

Kevin Bechan, with ITD's Office of Highway Safety, said people who know they're going to be celebrating should plan ahead.

Revelers should instead designate a sober driver or arrange alternative transportation.

By increasing patrols, officers expect to arrest more impaired drivers and make the holiday weekend safer for motorists. The transportation department is making highway safety funds available to local law enforcement agencies to pay for the crackdown's additional staffing.

If people see a friend or family member reaching for the keys after drinking, Bechan said, they should speak up rather than let that person become "another sobering statistic."

Last year, 73 people died across the state as a result of impaired-driving crashes.

Firefighters Gain More Ground on Idaho Blazes

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TWIN FALLS • Firefighters continue to gain the upper hand in reining in Idaho's largest wildfires after spending weeks and millions of dollars in resources to suppress the flames.

In the Wood River Valley, the 111,000-acre Beaver Creek Fire was more than 95 percent contained as of Wednesday. That blaze was one of the nation's highest priority fires for more than a week and spurred evacuation and pre-evacuation orders for thousands of residents in the Ketchum and Sun Valley area.

One home was lost in the flames, and the fire damaged

many miles of popular hiking and biking trails.

Nonetheless, fire managers have lifted portions of the emergency closure order on U.S. Bureau of Land Management property damaged by the fire. The new closure order only remains in effect north of Croy Creek Road, west of Idaho 75, east of Willow Creek Road and south of Clear Creek.

To the west, where the Little Queens Fire still burns, law enforcement officials lifted the mandatory evacuation order in Atlanta. Residents can return to their homes, however, only with an Elmore County escort. Once back in their homes, county officials warn, residents should be prepared to stay for a few days because they won't get a chance to leave and return.

The fire burning near Atlanta and along the Sawtooth National Wilderness had been 20 percent contained as of Wednesday. Firefighters don't expect to reach full containment until the end of October.

Nearby, the Kelley Fire burned nearly 450 acres in the Sawtooth National Forest, prompting the U.S. Forest Service to close the South Fork Boise River corridor from Skeleton Creek west to near Featherville and south to Lime Creek Trail.

The closure prohibits all hunting and recreation, said Julie Thomas, Forest Service spokeswoman.

"This fire will be with us for awhile," Thomas said. "The steep mountains are making it extremely difficult for our crews to get in there."

The blaze is being fought by 150 firefighters and multiple aircraft, and a Type 2 management team is expected to take over today, Thomas said.

By Wednesday morning, the fire was 5 percent contained. Estimated containment is Sept. 7.

First Human Case of West Nile Virus Discovered in South Central Idaho

TWIN FALLS • The first human case of West Nile virus in south central Idaho has been confirmed, health officials announced Wednesday.

"The adult male, in his 40s, is recovering at home and was not hospitalized. Due to the nature of his work and the fact that he travels throughout the state, it is very difficult to pinpoint exactly where he was bitten by an infected mosquito," said a news release from nurse Logan Hudson of the South Central Public Health District. "... West Nile cases typically peak in mid-August or early September, just in time for students returning to school, early hunting season, and other late summer outdoor activities, so everyone should take extra precautions."

Until Wednesday, West Nile virus had been found only in animals and test pools in south central Idaho this year.

Statewide, seven people have tested positive for West Nile, and three cases of the disease have been confirmed in livestock. Public health officials have been testing for West Nile since May, and

case pools began showing positive West Nile mosquitoes in June.

Four out of five people infected with West Nile do not show symptoms, the district's release said. People with symptoms may experience fever, headaches, body aches, fatigue, nausea, vomiting, eye pain and sometimes swollen lymph glands or a rash.

Symptoms typically occur two to 14 days after the bite of an infected mosquito. More severe infections may involve the central nervous system.

Public health officials gave these tips for protecting your family from mosquito bites:

Drain any standing water on your property that may produce mosquitoes.

Avoid the outdoors at dawn and dusk.

Wear long sleeves and pants when outdoors.

Idaho Gets \$28 M in Drug Price Case

BOISE (AP) • Idaho's lawsuit against several major pharmaceutical companies over allegations of inflated drug prices has come to an end with the state recovering more than \$28 million in damages.

Attorney General Lawrence Wasden announced Tuesday that his office has completed six years of litigation against Watson Pharmaceuticals, Johnson & Johnson, Merck and 30 other pharmaceutical companies. Idaho was one of several states who sued the drug makers, alleging that they falsely reported the "average wholesale prices" of individual prescription drugs, and as a result, hiked the price that Medicaid had to pay for the drugs.

Idaho Medicaid reimburses pharmacies for the "estimated acquisition cost" of the drug, plus a dispensing fee. Until July 2011, Idaho Medicaid based that estimated cost on the average wholesale price as reported by drug manufacturers. But Wasden said the drug companies were giving phony average wholesale prices far above the actual average price. The Idaho Attorney General's office reported that in 2003, Watson Pharmaceuticals Inc. reported an average wholesale price that was 1534 percent greater than the actual average wholesale price for a generic epilepsy drug.

"In negotiating these settlements, we tried to look forward as well as backward," Wasden said in a prepared statement. "We recovered a significant amount of money to compensate the state for past practices. But equally as important, the state will receive pricing data from these companies going forward. That element of the settlements will help protect the taxpayers from future pricing abuses."

Because Idaho gets about 70 percent of its Medicaid funding from the federal government, it is required to return a share of the recovered money to the federal government. As a result, about \$13.5 million has been returned in the form of credits against future payments to Idaho Medicaid.

Physician Who Told of Handling Roswell Debris Dies at 76

HELENA, Mont. (AP) • Dr. Jesse Marcel Jr., who said he handled debris from the 1947 crash of an unidentified flying object near Roswell, N.M., has died at the age of 76.

Denice Marcel said her father was found dead at his home in Helena on Saturday, less than two months after making his last trip to Roswell. He had been reading a book about UFOs.

Over the past 35 years, Marcel Jr. appeared on TV shows, documentaries and radio shows; was interviewed for magazine articles and books, and traveled the world lecturing about his experiences in Roswell.

“He was credible. He wasn’t lying. He never embellished — only told what he saw,” his wife Linda said.

Marcel’s father was an Air Force intelligence officer and reportedly the first military officer to investigate the wreckage in early July 1947. Marcel Jr. said he was 10 when his father brought home some of the debris, woke him up in the middle of the night and said the boy needed to look at it because it was something he would never see again. His father maintained the debris “was not of this Earth,” Linda Marcel said. “They looked through the pieces, tried to make sense of it.”

The item that Marcel Jr. said fascinated him the most was a small beam with some sort of purple-hued hieroglyphics on it, she said. After an initial report that a flying saucer had been recovered on a ranch near Roswell, the military issued a statement saying the debris was from a weather balloon.

“They were told to keep it quiet and they did for years and years and years,” Linda Marcel said. Interest in the case was revived, however, when physicist and UFO researcher Stanton Friedman

spoke with Jesse Marcel Sr. in the late 1970s. Friedman wrote the foreword to Marcel Jr.’s 2007 book “The Roswell Legacy,” and described him as a courageous man who “set a standard for honesty and decency and telling the truth.”

“His legacy is that he had the courage to speak out when he didn’t have to about handling wreckage that his Dad brought home,” Friedman said Tuesday. “He worked with artists to come up with what the symbols on the wreckage looked like. He didn’t have to do that. He could have kept his mouth shut. A lot of people did.”

On his last trip to Roswell in early July, UFO researcher and Earth science professor Frank Kimbler arranged for Marcel to visit his childhood home and the debris site.

“I remember my dad did say that he loved the ride up to the site that day because he was able to discuss science with Frank,” Denice Marcel said in an email to The Associated Press. “One thing about my Dad, he was always reading something on astronomy or some kind of scientific journal. He loved astronomy with a passion.”

Marcel Jr. graduated from medical school at Louisiana State University School of Medicine in 1961 and joined the U.S. Navy in 1962. He retired after nine years and later joined the Montana Army National Guard and became a flight surgeon in 1981. He was called back to active duty in October 2004 and served as a flight surgeon in Iraq for just over a year. He reached the rank of colonel.

He worked as an ear, nose and throat doctor and retired from the Veterans Administration Hospital at Fort Harrison, west of Helena, all of which lent credibility to his story.

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Dr. King’s Dream Inspires a New March, and a President

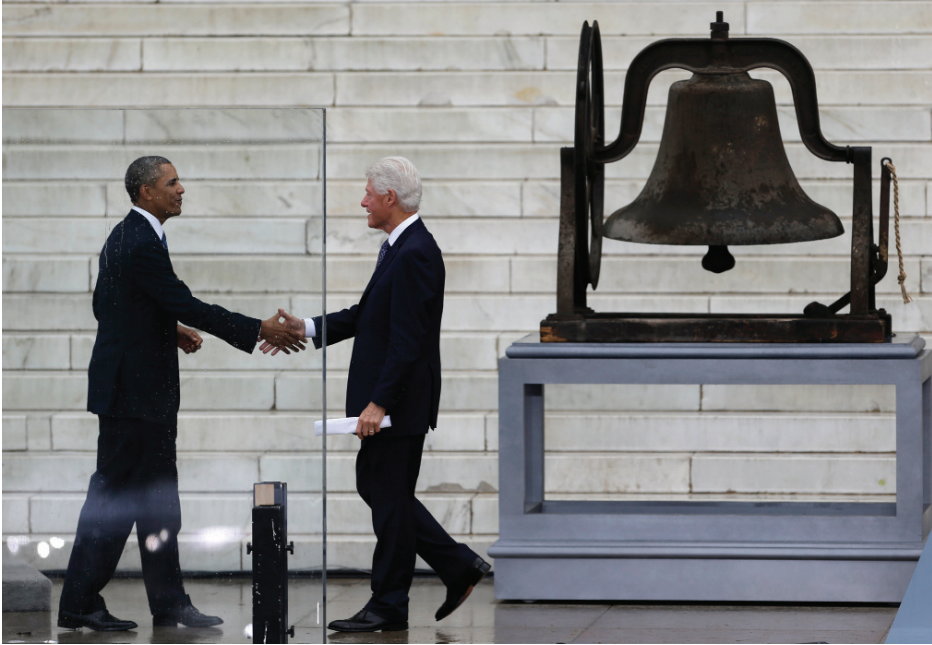
WASHINGTON • Standing on hallowed ground of the civil rights movement, President Barack Obama challenged new generations Wednesday to seize the cause of racial equality and honor the “glorious patriots” who marched a half century ago to the very steps from which Rev. Martin Luther King spoke during the March on Washington.

In a moment rich with history and symbolism, tens of thousands of Americans of all backgrounds and colors thronged to the National Mall to join the nation’s first black president and civil rights pioneers in marking the 50th anniversary of King’s “I Have a Dream” speech. Obama urged each of them to become a modern-day marcher for economic justice and racial harmony.

“The arc of the moral universe may bend toward justice but it doesn’t bend on its own,” Obama said, in an allusion to King’s own message.

His speech was the culmination of daylong celebration of King’s legacy that began with marchers walking the streets of Washington behind a replica of the transit bus that Rosa Parks once rode when she refused to give up her seat to a white man.

At precisely 3 p.m., members of the King family tolled a bell to echo King’s call 50 years earlier to “let freedom ring.” It was the same bell that once hung in the 16th Street Baptist Church in Birmingham, Ala., where four black girls were killed when a bomb

planted by a white supremacist exploded in 1963.

Georgia Rep. John Lewis, a former freedom rider and the sole survivor of the main organizers of the 1963 march, recounted the civil rights struggles of his youth and exhorted American to “keep the faith and keep our eyes on the prize.”

The throngs assembled in soggy weather at the Lincoln Memorial, where King, with soaring, rhythmic oratory and a steely countenance, had pleaded with Americans to come together to stomp out racism and create a land of opportunity for all.

White and black, they came this time to recall history — and live it.

“My parents did their fair share and I feel like we have to keep the fight alive,” said Frantz Walker, a honey sales-

man from Baltimore who is black. “This is hands-on history!”

Kevin Keefe, a Navy lawyer who is white, said he still tears up when he hears King’s speech.

“What happened 50 years ago was huge,” he said, adding that there’s still progress to be made on economic inequality and other problems.

Two former presidents, Bill Clinton and Jimmy Carter, spoke of King’s legacy — and of problems still to overcome.

“This march, and that speech, changed America,” Clinton declared, remembering the impact on the world and himself as a young man. “They opened minds, they melted hearts and they moved millions — including a 17-year-old boy watching alone in his home in

Arkansas.”

Carter said King’s efforts had helped not just black Americans, but “In truth, he helped to free all people.”

Still, Carter listed a string of current events that he said would have spurred King to action in this day, including the proliferation of guns and stand-your-ground laws, a Supreme Court ruling striking down parts of the Voting Rights Act, and high rates of joblessness among blacks.

Oprah Winfrey, leading the celebrity contingent, recalled watching the march as a 9-year-old girl and wishing she could be there to see a young man who “was able to force an entire country to wake up, to look at itself and to eventually change.”

“It’s an opportunity today to recall where we once were in this nation,” she said.

Family No Longer Seeking Kidnapped Calif. Teen's DNA

SAN DIEGO (AP) • The sister of a man suspected of kidnapping a 16-year-old girl and killing her mother and younger brother said she no longer wants paternity tests to determine if the suspect fathered the children.

Lora Robinson said Tuesday she hasn't asked for DNA to determine if James Lee DiMaggio fathered the children and she doesn't plan to. Last week, a DiMaggio family spokesman said she wanted DNA of Hannah and Ethan Anderson to give her a sense of closure in her older brother's death.

Robinson said the request was prompted by rumors that her brother fathered the children but that she doesn't think a test is needed.

DiMaggio, 40, was killed by FBI agents in the Idaho wilderness Aug. 10 after allegedly killing Christina and Ethan Anderson, whose remains were found in his burned home in Boulevard, 65 miles east of San Diego.

Hannah Anderson was rescued and returned safely to California.

The Anderson family said last week that DiMaggio didn't meet Brett and Christina Anderson until Christina was six months pregnant with Hannah and that Brett Anderson's DNA was used to identify the remains of 8-year-old Ethan.

Robinson said she had no explanation for her brother's alleged crimes and that she was "extremely disappointed" in the San Diego County Sheriff's Department's investigation.

"They should come back to us and explain what happened," she said. "They could come forward with evidence — evidence and facts instead of verbally coming out and saying he did it. Where's the proof?"

Robinson said she was also seeking return of evidence that was seized in the investigation, including letters

that Hannah wrote to her brother.

San Diego County Sheriff Bill Gore has called Hannah "a victim in every sense of the word." He has declined to discuss a possible motive and investigators haven't publicly addressed other aspects of the case, including why the family went to DiMaggio's home, how Christina and Ethan Anderson died and how Hannah was treated in captivity.

A spokeswoman for the sheriff's department, Jan Caldwell, said last week that authorities would not comment on the case because it is an open criminal investigation involving a minor and "for a myriad of legal reasons."

DiMaggio was born in Germany, where his father served in the Army, and raised in Texas and Southern California. Robinson said her brother left a military career to look after her when their mother died.

Coach Faces Lewdness Case

LAS VEGAS (AP) • Authorities say a 47-year-old Las Vegas middle school girl's basketball coach is facing misdemeanor lewdness charges alleging he inappropriately touched female students.

Records show that Alphonso Washington of Henderson made a court appearance Tuesday and

was being held at the Clark County jail on \$50,000 bail pending a Sept. 10 preliminary hearing.

Washington's attorney, Michael Gowdey, says the case is blown out of proportion and there was no sexual contact between his client and the alleged victims.

Police say Washington

taught and coached at Lied Middle School in northwest Las Vegas.

Clark County School District spokeswoman Melinda Malone told the *Las Vegas Sun* that Washington was placed on paid administrative leave when police opened an investigation in May.

Idaho Death Row inmate Gets New Hearing

BOISE (AP) • An inmate who was sentenced to death for killing a bank teller in eastern Idaho will get another chance to argue that he deserves a lesser sentence under a new ruling from the Idaho Supreme Court.

Timothy Dunlap was sentenced to death for shooting 23-year-old Tonya Crane to death during a Soda Springs bank robbery in 1991. He also has been sentenced to death in Ohio for killing his girlfriend, Belinda Bolanos, with a crossbow just 10 days before Crane's murder.

Dunlap contends his attorneys didn't adequately investigate mitigating factors, such as his mental illness, during his sentencing hearing. On Tuesday the Idaho Supreme Court issued a ruling rejecting most of his claims but finding that he was entitled to an evidentiary hearing on claims related to his mental health.

Dunlap has had several hearings on various aspects

of his trial and sentence already. He was originally sentenced to death in Idaho in 1992, and in 2005 the Idaho Supreme Court ruled that procedural mistakes made after he entered his plea entitled him to a new sentencing hearing. In 2006, a jury again sentenced him to die.

In his most recent appeal, Dunlap argued more than a dozen issues and most of those claims were rejected by the Idaho Supreme Court. But Justice Joel Horton, writing for the unanimous court, said in the ruling that there were some issues of material fact that needed closer examination.

Among them were Dunlap's contention that his attorneys didn't adequately investigate mitigating factors that could have encouraged a jury to give him a lesser sentence. Specifically, Dunlap said the attorneys didn't do enough to investigate his family and background, his mental illness

and the connection between his medications and his behavior, and his level of remorse. He also said his attorneys failed to adequately rebut the state's theory that he was simply malingering, not seriously mentally ill.

Dunlap also cited a civil lawsuit he filed against the state several years ago as proof that the Idaho Attorney General withheld evidence that would have helped him during the sentencing hearing. In that claim, Dunlap noted after he sued Idaho prison officials for refusing to move him out of solitary confinement, the prison officials defended their position by saying he needed the restrictive housing because of his mental illness.

Dunlap said that the Idaho Attorney General's office represented the prison officials in defending the lawsuit and also represented state prosecutors in his sentencing hearing, and so should have

turned over evidence — the prison officials' statements about his mental health — to Dunlap's attorneys before he was sentenced.

DA to Drop Charges in Chalk Protest Case

LAS VEGAS (AP) • Conspiracy and graffiti charges will be dropped against protesters who wrote anti-police messages in washable chalk outside Las Vegas police headquarters and a courthouse, the district attorney said Wednesday.

Clark County District Attorney Steve Wolfson said he learned after filing charges Aug. 15 that protesters were directed by court officials to a place outside the downtown Regional Justice Center where they could protest by writing on the sidewalks.

He said that implied they were given permission or authorization for the acts for which they were then arrested.

Wolfson said prosecutors will ask a judge Friday to dismiss the case against Kelly Wayne Patterson, Brian Ballentine, Hailee Jewell and Catalino de la Cruz Dazo Jr. No charges were filed against a 17-year-old who was arrested during the protests. Her name wasn't made public due to her age.

Wolfson added that he believes resources could be better used prosecuting

cases involving violent crimes.

Defense attorney Robert Langford, representing Patterson, Ballentine, Dazo and the teenager, credited Wolfson with accepting new information in the case.

He said his clients are considering filing a federal malicious prosecution lawsuit against police.

"In the end, this wasn't about graffiti," Langford said. "It was about someone protesting the government. That should shock anyone in the United States."

Attorneys Josh Tomscheck and Craig Drummond represent Jewell. Tomscheck said they "expected this result eventually."

"We're pleased it came this early in the process," he said.

Officer Larry Hadfield, a police spokesman, said it was up to the district attorney to decide whether to prosecute cases.

The protesters invited media coverage in advance and later posted Internet accounts and videos after scrawling messages critical of police during protests July 13 and July 18.

ing any money. That's life."

Just as Haven and Red learned to communicate, so

have Kendra Keller and her horse, TNT.

Kendra said TNT was bred and trained to be a race horse but had been through six or seven homes because he wouldn't listen to his handlers.

"Right when I got him, he was listening to me," she said. "We have a bond. I told him when I got him that this would be your forever home."

TNT is 22 and getting gray in his mane.

"My old man," she said.

The two were practicing their side pass and pivot for an upcoming horsemanship showing. This is Kendra's first year competing in the senior division, and she is relying on TNT to perform well.

The two feed off each other, however. Yesterday morning, when TNT was being "naughty," Keller got mad and TNT then got crankier. The two had to calm down with a walk. By midday, they were moving well together and goofing around before the show.

But when they walk into the arena, Keller said, TNT becomes a different horse and she a different rider.

"When we get in there, we focus and I swear he watches the other horses do the patterns and just does it," she said. "He pretty much knows what to do."

didn't come into the office until after the news was over and you were gone.

It was easier than I thought it was going to be to avoid it. The toughest part was when I was proofing pages. I'd be doing sports, and walk over and bam - they're laying out (page) A1.

Q: What was your thought process while listening to testimony?

A: I approached it from this way: The defense attorney said in the jury screening that the defense was self-defense, so we knew that going in. I said, OK prosecution, prove to me that it wasn't. At the end of their case I said, I can buy it. I was fairly convinced that what they had was good. I was inclined at the end of their case to vote guilty, but really what clinched it for us was Lish on the stand. There were just a lot of inconsistencies in there. It seemed a stretch to go from what he told the detective to what he testified to on the stand.

I think if you're genuinely in fear for your life, you don't forget that.

Someone else pointed out, a really good point, that Lish mentioned once in the video, he said, "I didn't know if they were going to stomp my head in." I've been shot at, I've been beat up. If you genuinely are in fear of your life, you're going to remember. No amount of alcohol is going to make you forget that.

Q: What was the final thing that made up your mind?

A: I've been hit, and I know what the reaction is. You're going to be mad, and he admitted as much. It's a normal reaction, but the law says he had to be completely afraid.

That was a major hole that the defendant himself poked in the defense. We had to go back and review the interrogation tape again. Notes are great, but they only help you so much. We wanted to see if we missed some stuff, which I did. What I saw the second time helped. I thought it was beyond a reasonable doubt at that point, then we watched it again. I didn't have any lingering doubt at that point.

Q: How did the deliberation process go?

A: I said I guess we need to pick a presiding juror, and two people said "You."

We sat down and we talked through and we were very careful. I didn't want to take a vote im-

mediately, not least because the judge said that would be a bad idea.

I wanted to have everyone explain their opinions. I didn't want to put pressure on a minority opinion either way. That's not fair to the process.

We were trying to establish the timeline at first in our minds. I don't think they intended to, but both the prosecution and defense were getting us lost in the weeds a little bit. We were trying to plow through what was important and irrelevant. That took probably an hour. Then somebody wanted to see the police station tape again, and we all thought it was a pretty good idea.

Then there was some clarifying - what does the law read. I don't doubt (Lish) was afraid, but he wasn't acting only out of fear.

We went over voluntary manslaughter. There was nothing disputed except if Lish acted lawfully. Then we went through self-defense and the five prongs. When we went through, it was pretty straightforward.

Q: What were your thoughts when the guilty verdict was reached?

A: I felt good and bad. Good in the sense that we could see the finish line because it was really a hard week and a really heavy trial. We knew that we weren't putting him in prison; he did that to himself. It was just a bad deal all around. I still feel bad for everybody. It was a run-of-the-mill bar fight that went horribly wrong.

When I got back to the office, I held my head in my hands and cried for about 10 minutes. That kind of stuff takes a toll on the jury too.

Q: Now that nearly a week has passed, what are your thoughts?

A: I feel fine. I still feel bad for everybody. The family has some measure of closure, but (Paiz) is still gone and a guilty verdict isn't going to bring him back. I feel good about the decision. I hope (Lish) takes whatever time the judge decides to give him and straightens himself out. That's the best thing that can come out of this.

I personally had a hard time with a few things in the case. I talked to my sister, who's a dispatcher, and she said, 'It's OK if you're not OK.' A week after I still think about it. When you're on the jury and the trial's going on, it consumes you. Sunday morning about 9 a.m., about when I showed up to church, I said, 'OK, I feel good now.' It took almost 48 hours to feel OK and at peace with the whole thing.

call, a dispatcher from Magic Valley Paramedics was added to the call, and Webb had to re-explain her emergency.

The answer?

Although the city of Twin Falls has its own dispatch for city fire and police, medical calls still are handled by the Southern Idaho Regional Communications Center, said city spokesman Joshua Palmer.

In December 2003, the city opened its dispatch cen-

ter after separating from SIRCOMM. Decisions about which agency would handle each call were made based on efficiency, Palmer said.

Although the dispatcher in Webb's call had her speak directly to the ambulance dispatcher, that's not the norm, he said.

"Normally dispatchers will relay the information directly," he said. "There could be incidents, though, where they connect the person to the medical responders because they need to have that direct line of communication."

But in this case, Webb had

to repeat the same information to the ambulance dispatcher. That call can be heard on magicvalley.com.

On every medical call, ambulance dispatchers are connected to the information with the click of a button.

"It's a one-button deal," Palmer said. "By one button, we can dispatch all the information we have to Magic Valley Paramedics. It almost instantly connects communication between the two organizations so we can communicate between the two crews."

A similar method is used to alert the fire department

of a fire call. As the dispatcher collects information from a caller, they enter it into a log. With one click, all that information is made available to the fire department, Palmer said.

"Dispatchers are in constant communication," he said.

In an instant, dispatchers decide whether to send police, paramedics, fire or all three, he said. In addition, firefighters and police officers are trained in some emergency medical techniques so whoever arrives on the scene first can begin to help.

I'm trying to take care of the city and my family."

Former Mayor Dave Overacre reduced the salary to \$600 before running for re-election, Armstrong said.

"They talked about it being a ploy to (deter) others from running for mayor," he said.

The council approved the budget without making a final decision on the mayor's salary, said Councilman Jim Eisenhower. The budget includes enough wiggle room to pay for either proposed pay scale.

It's extremely unlikely, though, that the council will

approve the mayor's suggestion, he said.

"Nothing is set in stone," Eisenhower said. "We wanted to allow for the possibility of reinstating the original salary of \$900."

Armstrong agreed his suggestion isn't likely to be enacted. "Some of the council members were willing, but I don't think they're

going to go that far. I knew it was a large leap."

The mayor said he didn't know when the council would decide.

Overall, the budget shows signs of the city's stability and growth, he said.

Seven years ago, Kimberly faced budget shortfalls. Yet over the past year, Armstrong said, he and city

staffers have made important cuts and structural changes to improve the city's finances.

"The water and sewer rates are now stabilized, and they are not going up," he said. "Bottom line is, the budget is going to look a lot different than last year. We made an improvement."

Foreign Policy by Whisper and Nudge

New York Times News ServiceIf you follow the commentary on U.S. foreign policy toward Egypt and the broader Middle East today, several themes stand out: People in the region argue: “Whatever went wrong, the United States is to blame.” Foreign policy experts argue: “Whatever President Obama did, he got it wrong.” And the American public is saying: “We’re totally fed up with that part of the world and can’t wait for the start of the NFL season. How do you like those 49ers?”

There is actually a logic to all three positions. It starts with the huge difference between Cold War and post-Cold War foreign policy. During the Cold War, U.S. foreign policy “was all about how we affect the external behavior of states,” said Michael Mandelbaum, the Johns Hopkins University foreign affairs expert. We were ready to overlook the internal behavior of states, both because we needed them as allies in the Cold War and because, with the Russians poised on the other side, any intervention could escalate into a superpower confrontation. Post-Cold War foreign policy today is largely about “affecting the internal composition and governance of states,” added Mandelbaum, many of which in the Middle East are failing and threaten us more by their collapse into ungoverned regions - not by their strength or ability to project power. But what we’ve learned in Bosnia, Afghanistan, Libya, Iraq, Egypt and Syria is that it is very hard to change another country’s internal behavior - especially at a cost and in a time frame that the American public will tolerate - because it requires changing a country’s political cul-



ture and getting age-old adversaries to reconcile. The primary foreign policy tools that served us so well in the Cold War, said Mandelbaum, “guns, money and rhetoric - simply don’t work for these new tasks. It is like trying to open a can with a sponge.” To help another country change internally requires a mix of refereeing, policing, coaching, incentivizing, arm-twisting and modeling - but even all of that cannot accomplish the task and make a country’s transformation self-sustaining, unless the people themselves want to take charge of the process. In Iraq, George W. Bush removed Saddam Hussein, who had been governing that country vertically, from the top-down, with an iron fist. Bush tried to create the conditions through which Iraqis could govern themselves horizontally, by having the different communities write their own social contract on how to live together. It worked, albeit imperfectly, as long as U.S. troops were there to referee. But once we left, no coterie of Iraqi leaders emerged to assume ownership of that process in an inclusive manner and thereby make it self-sustaining. Ditto Libya, where President Barack Obama removed Moammar Gadhafi’s top-down, iron-fisted regime, but he declined to put U.S. troops on the ground to midwife a new social contract. The result: Libya today is no more stable, or self-sustainingly democratic, than Iraq. It just cost us less to fail there. In both cases, we cre-



ated an opening for change, but the local peoples have not made it sustainable. Hence the three reactions I cited above. People of the region often blame us, because they either will not or cannot accept their own responsibility for putting things right. Or, if they do, they don’t see a way to forge the necessary societal compromises, because their rival factions take the view either that “I am weak, how can I compromise?” or “I am strong, why should I compromise?” As for blaming Obama - for leaving Iraq too soon or not going more deeply into Libya or Syria - it grows out of the same problem. Some liberals want to “do something” in places like Libya and Syria; they just don’t want to do what is necessary, which would be a long-term occupation to remake the culture and politics of both places. And conservative hawks who want to intervene just don’t understand how hard it is to remake the cul-

ture and politics in such places, where freedom, equality and justice for all are not universal priorities, because some people want to be “free” to be more Islamist or more sectarian. “With the traditional tools of foreign policy, we can stop some bad things from happening, but we cannot make good things happen,” noted Mandelbaum. For instance, if it is proved that Syria has used chemical weapons, U.S. officials are rightly considering using cruise missiles to punish Syria. But we have no hope of making Syria united, democratic and inclusive without a much bigger involvement and without the will of a majority of Syrians. And too often we forget that the people in these countries are not just objects. They are subjects; they have agency. South Africa had a moderate post-apartheid experience because of Nelson Mandela and F.W. de Klerk. Japan rebuilt itself as a modern nation in the late 19th

century because its leaders recognized that their country was lagging behind the West and asked themselves, “What’s wrong with us?” Outsiders can amplify such positive trends, but the local people have to want to own it. As that reality has sunk in, so has another reality, which the American public intuitively understands: Our rising energy efficiency, renewable energy, hydraulic fracturing and horizontal drilling are making us much less dependent on the Middle East for oil and gas. The Middle East has gone from an addiction to a distraction. Imagine that five years ago someone had said to you: “In 2013, Egypt, Libya, Syria, Tunisia, Yemen and Iraq will all be in varying states of political turmoil or outright civil war; what do you think the price of crude will be?” You’d surely have answered, “At least \$200 a barrel.” But it’s half that - for a reason: “We now use 60 percent less energy per unit of GDP than we did in 1973,” ex-

plained the energy economist Philip Verleger. “If the trend continues, we will use half the energy per unit of GDP in 2020 that we used in 2012. To make matters better, a large part of the energy used will be renewable. Then there is the increase in oil and gas production.” In 2006, the United States depended on foreign oil for 60 percent of its consumption. Today it’s about 36 percent. True, oil is a global market, so what happens in the Middle East can still impact us and our allies. But the urgency is gone. “The Middle East is China’s problem,” added Verleger. Obama knows all of this. He just can’t say it. But it does explain why his foreign policy is mostly “nudging” and whispering. It is not very satisfying, not very much fun and won’t make much history, but it’s probably the best we can do or afford right now. And it’s certainly all that most Americans want.

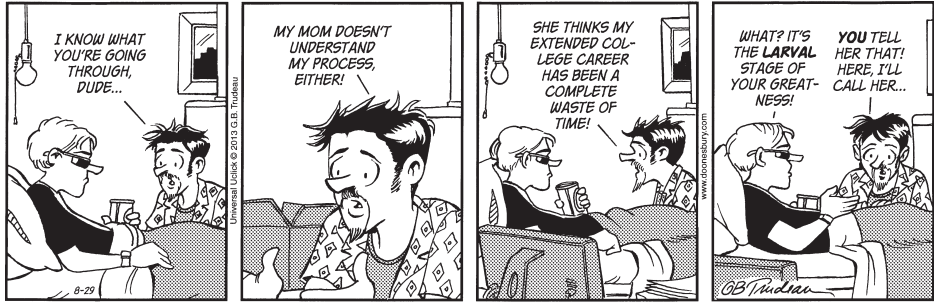

Calif. Launches Drone to Aid Wildfire Battle

GROVELAND, Calif. (AP) • Firefighters battling the giant wildfire burning in the Sierra Nevada added a California National Guard Predator drone to their arsenal Wednesday to give them almost immediate views of any portion of the flames chewing through rugged forests in and around Yosemite National Park.

The MQ-1 unmanned aircraft being remotely piloted hundreds of miles away quickly alerted fire bosses to a new flare-up they otherwise wouldn't have immediately seen.

"They're piping what they're seeing directly to the incident commander, and he's seeing it in real time over a computer network," said National Guard Lt. Col. Tom Keegan.

Previously, ground commanders relied on helicopters that needed to refuel every two hours.

The 12-day-old Rim Fire continued to grow, expanding to 301 square miles. But crews building lines around the flames made significant progress, and containment jumped to 30 percent. Cooler temperatures and lighter winds are aiding firefighters.

Increasingly confident fire officials said they expect to fully surround the blaze in three weeks, although it will burn for much longer than that.

"We continue to get line around this fire," California fire spokesman Daniel Berlant said Wednesday. "It's not

nearly as active as it was last week."

While unmanned aircraft have mapped past fires, use of the Predator will be the longest sustained mission by a drone in California to broadcast information to firefighters in real time.

The plane, the size of a small Cessna, will remain over the burn zone for up to 22 hours at a time, allowing fire commanders to monitor fire activity, determine the fire's direction of movement, the extent of containment and confirm new fires ignited by lightning or flying embers.

The drone is being flown by the 163rd Wing of the Califor-

nia National Guard at March Air Reserve Base in Riverside and is operating from Victorville Airport, both in Southern California. It generally flew over unpopulated areas on its 300-mile flight to the Rim Fire. Outside the fire area, it will be escorted by a manned aircraft.

Officials were careful to point out the images are being used only to aid in the effort to contain the fire.

In 2009 a NASA Predator equipped with an infrared imaging sensor helped the U.S. Forest Service assess damage from a fire in Angeles National Forest. In 2008, a drone capable of detecting hot spots

helped firefighters assess movement of a series of wildfires stretching from Southern California's Lake Arrowhead to San Diego.

The Rim Fire started Aug. 17 and quickly exploded in size, becoming one of the 10 largest California wildfires on record. Its progression slowed earlier this week when it moved from parts of the forest with thick underbrush that had not burned in nearly a century to areas that had seen fire in the past two decades.

But it will burn for months, possibly until California's dry season ends this fall.

"My prediction is it will

burn until we see rain," said Hugh Safford, a regional ecologist with the U.S. Forest Service.

That means the smoke could continue to foul air north of Yosemite in the Lake

Tahoe basin and neighboring Nevada, although residents received something of a reprieve Wednesday when for the first time in three days blue sky was sometimes visible through the haze.

The air quality index in the Reno area still had improved only to the "unhealthy" level, and in Douglas County, Nev., school children were kept indoors again when the index registered in the "hazardous" category Wednesday morning.

The air was clear, however, in the tourist mecca of Yosemite Valley, home to the towering Half Dome and El Capitan rock formations and the 2,425-foot plunge of Yosemite Falls.

The Rim Fire has destroyed 111 structures, including 11 homes, and posed a threat to ancient giant sequoias.

The fire also has threatened San Francisco's water supply at the Hetch Hetchy Reservoir, but Stratton said it was burning itself out as it approached and that crews were lighting back burns to push it back into the wilderness.

Federal Agency Orders Armored-car Service to Stop Serving Legal Marijuana Sellers

DENVER • Steve DeAngelo says his staff may need to carry cash in personal vehicles to pay Harborside Health Center's bills after his armored car provider told his co-founder that a federal agency ordered it to stop serving cannabis businesses.

"The only way we have to pay our bills is transporting cash from point A to point B," said DeAngelo, executive director of the medicinal marijuana collective based in Oakland, Calif., with 128,000 patients. "This includes 15 percent of our \$30 million-a-year gross that goes to the cities of San Jose and Oakland and the state of California for our taxes," he said. "This is a huge threat to the safety of my patients and staff, and beyond that it's a huge threat to the general public."

DeAngelo isn't alone. Several large marijuana dispensaries in California and Colorado received similar notices from their armored vehicle services, said Steve Fox, director of government relations for the Washington-based National Cannabis Industry Association. The U.S. Justice Department declined to comment on the matter, Ellen Canale, a spokeswoman, said by email in response to repeated requests. The U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration referred questions to the Justice Department, its parent agency.

The end of armored-car service to some marijuana dispensaries underscores ongoing tension between federal law, under which cannabis remains illegal, and laws in 20 states and the District of Columbia that legalized medical marijuana consumption, plus measures in Colorado and Washington that allow those 21 and older to possess up to

an ounce of pot.

Attorney General Eric Holder hasn't provided a federal response to the laws in Washington and Colorado that will also allow retail sales of pot next year.

The U.S. Senate Judiciary Committee will hold a hearing on the conflicts between state and federal marijuana laws on Sept. 10, Chairman Patrick Leahy, D-Vt., announced Aug. 26.

Federal laws bar banks from offering accounts to pot shops, forcing medical marijuana firms to pay their sales taxes and other bills in cash. Cannabis businesses also are unable to obtain credit cards.

DeAngelo's car service, Dunbar Armored Inc., didn't return calls and messages for comment.

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Salt Lake County DA to Review Dismissed Drug Cases

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • The Salt Lake County district attorney who dismissed a raft of drug cases out of West Valley City for lack of credibility is reconsidering his decision on a case-by-case basis.

Sim Gill said he dropped more than 100 cases because West Valley's city attorney refused to vouch for the character of the officers involved after an internal review found some of them mishandled evidence and kept souvenirs from drug busts.

"Theoretically, we can go back and file on some of those cases, but that will be a narrow analysis, on a case-by-case, officer-by-officer basis," Gill told *The Salt Lake Tribune*.

Gill added that "our cases were dismissed with certain officers in mind, not the

Neighborhood Narcotics Unit as a whole."

West Valley attorney Eric Bunderson told the newspaper he couldn't respond earlier to Gill because he was conducting his own review of West Valley's troubled drug unit.

Bunderson said he was ready to disclose any possible credibility problems of each officer. He plans to act within a week.

West Valley City Manager Wayne Pyle said four of nine officers on the drug unit have been cleared of wrongdoing. He declined to identify any of the officers.

The internal review was prompted by an officer-involved shooting death last November of 21-year-old Danielle Willard, who was unarmed.

Investigators were staking out an apartment complex where they said Willard appeared to have purchased drugs. When officers approached her, she put her car

in reverse and the two officers fired. Gill has ruled the shooting unjustified and is investigating whether criminal charges are warranted against the officers.

Attorneys for Willard's parents have filed a wrongful-death lawsuit against West Valley, alleging a pattern of misconduct and corruption by officers.

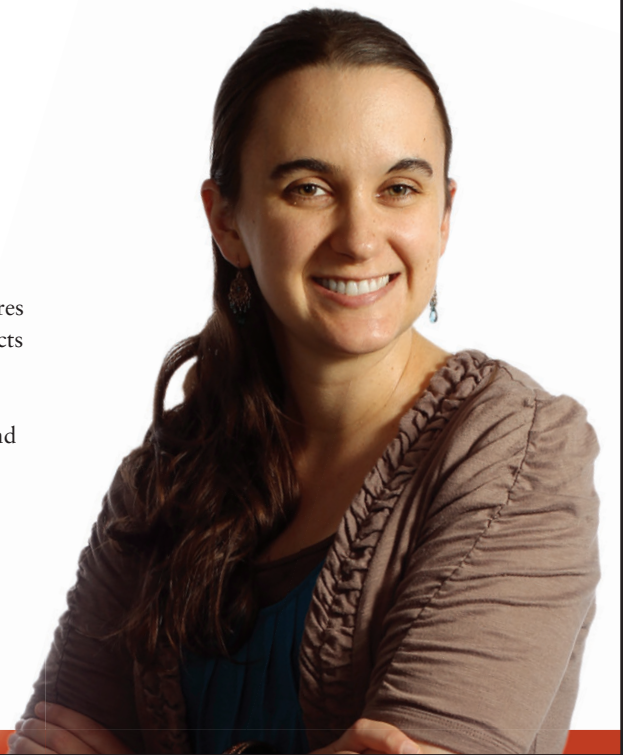

Four Factors: Boise State at Washington

Each Thursday, the *Times-News* will look at the four factors most likely to decide Boise State's fate in its upcoming game. This week, the Broncos travel to Seattle to play the Washington Huskies, widely regarded as a solid Pac-12 team, and one that will inaugurate a newly renovated home stadium.

Rookies on the Right: Redshirt sophomores Marcus Henry (guard) and Rees Odhiambo (tackle) are set to make their first career starts Saturday. Under normal circumstances that would be cause for concern. But the Broncos will be playing in an atmosphere — 70,000 fans dying to break in the new Husky Stadium properly — where visitors may not be able to hear each other as they line up for the snap, even when they're standing foot-to-foot, as Odhiambo and Henry will be on the right side of the line. The other three spots up front are filled by experienced fifth-year seniors. They'll be in sync. They won't forget their calls. But how much will they have to babysit the fresh faces to their right, and could it throw off the whole line? Against a good front seven, all it takes is one missed assignment to spell a possession's doom.

Outsized in the Secondary: Starting right cornerback Bryan Douglas, at 5-foot-9, didn't quite look 100 percent in fall camp, as he's still trying to recover the athleticism he had prior to tearing an ACL last

year. Donte Deayon will start on the opposite side. At 151 pounds, Deayon is a football flyweight, emphasis on fly, as his blazing

speed and fluid hips will allow him to keep up with most receivers this season. While the Huskies aren't excessively tall on the out-

side, all of their playmakers will have a size advantage. The Broncos' secondary also includes 5-foot-10 Jeremy Ioane, who has the

chops but will have a tough time cutting down 6-foot-5, 276-pound tight-end Austin Seferian-Jenkins, should he play. The Broncos defense features two strong-side linebackers (a position called nickel back by Broncos coaches last season) under six-foot, and the third cornerback on the depth chart, Cleshawn Page, at 5-foot-8. The secondary is the biggest unknown for the Broncos in 2013. Fans should get an idea on Saturday if the unit represents the kind of weakness that could keep what should be an otherwise excellent Broncos team out of BCS contention.

No More Average Joe: Senior quarterback Joe Southwick finished last season on a tear, ripping up the Huskies secondary, albeit on a neutral field, in what was probably his most impressive game of the season considering the competition. Last year, however, he completed less than 50 percent of his passes in the Broncos opening-season loss at Michigan State. Given his near-perfect final four games of last season and widely-raved-about showings in spring and fall camps, all indications are that Southwick is primed for a monster season. But if he isn't clicking right away, do last year's early-season struggles start to creep into his mind? Southwick struggled dealing with Broncos fans last year. Most people in Huskies stadium will be intent on rattling the second year starter. If Southwick's mastery of the offense and

physical abilities are matched with mental toughness, the Broncos can afford to suffer from poor play elsewhere at times and still keep their BCS hopes alive.

Bishop Sankey Gash and Dash, Part (no) Deuce? Washington running back Bishop Sankey got the rare honor of winning the most valuable player award in a bowl game, despite playing for the losing team. Sankey had 205 yards against the Broncos in December. Boise State figures to have a vicious pass rush this season. It starts with one who was arguably the most impressive player in fall camp, end Demarcus Lawrence, who didn't play in the bowl game. It continues with nose tackle Ricky Tjong-A-Tjoe and a host of others, at least a couple of whom will win consistent snaps and become household names. Junior college transfer "Deuce" Tutulupeatau Mataele didn't play a down for Broncos last year and likely never will, now that he has been deemed ineligible. But Mataele was looked at as a potentially key run-stopping, double-team generating inside presence. Without his 280-pound frame, the Broncos get thin up front quickly. Sophomore Armand Nance is more tank than tackle right now but will get plenty of chances to prove himself. The Broncos starting front should hold up, but defensive line is the most depth-centric unit in football. That could mean trouble early in the season, and late in the season opener.

Final BCS Season May Be Wild

The BCS farewell tour is about to begin.

Love it or hate it — we’re guessing there are far more in the hating camp — the system for determining college football’s national champion will be mothballed after this season, replaced by the new, aptly-named College Football Playoff.

As farewells go, this one has a chance to be a memorable one, filled with intriguing story lines, great players and great teams, led by two-time defending national champion Alabama.

And, because this is the BCS, we can probably expect plenty of debate about what team should be where in the rankings.

This final go-round starts on Thursday, so here’s a few things to look for:

TOP TEAMS

Alabama. All those future pros, an unflappable quarterback, one of the game’s all-time great coaches — hard to pick against the Crimson Tide making it three straight titles.

Ohio State. The Buckeyes went 12-0 in their first season under Urban Meyer, but were tattooed out of the national title game because of NCAA sanctions. They’re still loaded with talented players.

Oregon. Don’t expect any drop-off under Mark Helfrich. Chip Kelly left the cupboard plenty full before leaving for the Philadelphia Eagles.

Stanford. The defending Rose Bowl champions are eyeing the big prize this season.

Texas A&M. Johnny Manziel is good to go after the NCAA looked into whether he was paid for signing autographs.

Georgia. The Bulldogs have to replace a few players on defense, but their offense is loaded with playmakers, led by QB Aaron Murray.

TOP PLAYERS

Manziel, QB, Texas A&M. The first freshman to win the Heisman Trophy, Johnny Football may still have something to prove this year after a difficult off-season.

Jadeveon Clowney, DE, South Carolina. The most disruptive force in college football could become the first full-time defensive player to win the Heisman.

AJ McCarron, QB, Alaba-

ma. He has as many national titles (two) as losses. ‘Nuff said.

Marqise Lee, WR, Southern California. One of those threat-to-score-on-every-touch guys.

Ka’Deem Carey, RB, Arizona. Nation’s leading rusher should continue to thrive in Rich Rodriguez’s snap-before-they’re-ready offense.

De’Anthony Thomas, RB, Oregon. Possibly the most dynamic player in the country.

BEST GAMES

Alabama at Texas A&M, Sept. 14. Manziel had the signature game for his Heisman resume by handing Alabama its only loss of the season. The Crimson Tide want payback — in a bad way.

Oregon at Stanford, Nov. 7. The ultimate in contrasting styles could have a huge impact on the national championship race again this year.

LSU at Alabama, Nov. 9. Another Game of the Century? Maybe, but will have national championship implications and fun to watch no matter what.

Georgia at Clemson, Saturday. The No. 5 Bulldogs and No. 8 Tigers have two of the nation’s best quarterbacks in Murray and Tajh Boyd. The marquee game of the opening weekend should provide

plenty of fireworks in Death Valley.

Notre Dame at Stanford, Nov. 30. The Fighting Irish won last year’s game in overtime on a goal-line stand and went on to the national title game. The Cardinal had to “settle” for the Rose Bowl and will be looking for payback at home.

Wisconsin at Arizona State, Sept. 14. The Badgers’ speed vs. the Sun Devils’ power in an early-season test for teams that have BCS bowl aspirations.

HOT SEATS

A handful of coaches head into the season needing to win a few games or they could be looking for a new job. Here’s a few:

Randy Edsall, Maryland. He’s won three conference games in two seasons since taking over for popular Ralph Friedgen and it won’t get any easier with the Terps headed to the Big Ten after this season.

Lane Kiffin, USC. He’s been hamstrung through a post-season ban and limited scholarships from the Reggie Bush-related sanctions, but excuses have a limited shelf life in the land of Troy, particularly after last season’s flameout.

Mack Brown, Texas. The

Longhorns are 11-15 in the Big 12 since playing for a national title in 2009 and have been ripped by rival Oklahoma three straight years. That won’t fly in Austin for very long.

Bobby Hauck, UNLV. A highly-successful coach at Montana, he’s struggled in the move up to the FBS, winning three games in each of his three seasons.

Gary Pinkel, Missouri. A move to the SEC could be Pinkel’s undoing if the Tigers don’t start winning in their new league soon.

BEST NAMES

OK, ACC, this is your chance.

The first month or so of the college football season is as much about how conferences fare against each other as it is about which teams win.

The Atlantic Coast Conference, forever trying to shed its reputation as the fifth best of the major football leagues, gets three shots to knock off the neighborhood bully SEC during the opening weekend.

On Thursday night, North Carolina takes on No. 6 South Carolina, one of six Southeastern Conference teams ranked in the Top 12 of the AP preseason poll.

Virginia Tech can pull off a huge upset Saturday when it faces No. 1 Alabama in Atlanta.

The main event comes Saturday night in Death Valley — the one in South Carolina.

No. 8 Clemson plays No. 5 Georgia. It’s the Tigers’ third straight game against the SEC after losing to South Carolina to end last regular season and beating LSU in the Chick-fil-A bowl.

“Regardless of what conference they’re from, you’ve got the No. 5 team coming to your stadium,” Clemson coach Dabo Swinney said. “That’s all that really matters.”

Well, maybe to you coach. Aside from Clemson, the ACC went 0-5 against the SEC last season.

The ACC also gets a crack at Penn State (vs. Syracuse), BYU (at Virginia) and Louisiana Tech (at North Carolina State) during the opening weekend.

The MAC is coming off one of its most successful seasons and Toledo and Ohio are both expected to be championship contenders. ULM was an early-season darling in 2012, knocking off Arkansas and nearly beating Auburn and Baylor. Nevada’s pistol offense is potent and Pittsburgh brings a tough defense, though not much offense, to its ACC debut. Eastern Washington is one of the top FCS programs in the country.

NFL 2013: The Denver Broncos Again Class of the AFC West

Shaun Phillips joined the Denver Broncos after a decade of jawing with them as a member of the San Diego Chargers. He wants to show both his new team and his old one that he still has plenty of sacks left in him.

“I didn’t come here to be a cheerleader,” he declared.

That’s exactly what All-Pro linebacker Von Miller will have to be for the next six weeks as he serves his suspension for violating the NFL’s drug-abuse policy.

Miller kicked off the winter by guaranteeing the Broncos, 13-4 a year ago, would win the Super Bowl next February.

Now, he’s sidelined until Oct. 20, when Peyton Manning makes his much-anticipated return to Indianapolis, where he spent his first 14 NFL seasons before joining the Broncos last year.

No one can fill Miller’s enormous cleats, but how the Broncos make up for his absence might go a long way in determining whether his Super Bowl assurance was bold or just balderdash.

FIVE THINGS TO KNOW ABOUT THE AFC WEST:

SLY LIKE A FOX: This is just John Fox’s third season in Denver and already he’s the elder statesman among coaches in the division. Two of his contemporaries are former assistants: Dennis Allen in Oakland, his defensive coordinator in 2011, and San Diego’s new coach Mike

McCoy, his long-time offensive coordinator with both the Panthers and Broncos.

Kansas City’s rebuilding project got a jumpstart with the hiring of Andy Reid after his long stint in Philadelphia came to an unceremonious end. With Wes Welker teaming up with Manning after six seasons as Tom Brady’s top target in New England, Denver looks like the class of the division again. But the Broncos will be hard-pressed to go 6-0 in the West like last year, and the Chiefs don’t look anything like another 2-14 team.

MANNING’S MAD: The Broncos went 13-3 in Manning’s first season in Denver and now he’s healthy, cozy — and angry. Manning said Denver’s loss to Baltimore in the playoffs left a scar that can only be soothed by a Super Bowl title.

But the Broncos had a stormy off-season, losing Elvis Dumervil to free agency following a fax foul-up, then watching two executives get suspended for drunken driving arrests. Then came Miller’s troubles. The Broncos’ biggest obstacle to winning it all might just be themselves.

They added Welker on offense and Dominique Rodgers-Cromartie on defense in free agency, but Champ Bailey doesn’t see this season, his 15th in the NFL, as his best shot at a title. “I look at it as my ONLY

shot,” he said. “Nothing is guaranteed in this league. We can all be in different places next year.”

REID REBUILDING: Reid and new GM John Dorsey, his old pal from the Packers, dusted off the blueprints Reid used to rebuild the Eagles 15 years ago when he was plucked out of Green Bay, where he was Brett Favre’s position coach. Using that same formula, they traded for QB Alex Smith, re-signed WR Dwayne Bowe and P Dustin Colquitt, lured free agents Sean Smith and Dunta Robinson, and used the No. 1 pick on big RT Eric Fisher. At least one last-place team from the previous season has made the playoffs every year since the NFL’s realignment in ‘02, and the Chiefs look like a threat to join that list.

RECHARGED CHARGERS: San Diego fans finally got what they wanted when Norv Turner and A.J. Smith were fired in January following San Diego’s first losing season since 2003. They were replaced by rookies McCoy and GM Tom Telesco, who face a big rebuilding project behind Philip Rivers, who’s been sacked 79 times and committed 47 turnovers the last two years.

McCoy was smack dab in the middle of Tebowmania in 2011 and now he’s in the eye of the storm with rookie linebacker Manti Te’o, who might prove popular and polarizing, just like Tebow.

SAN FRANCISCO • The San Francisco 49ers and Seattle Seahawks spent the entire off-season going at each other.

Super Bowl runner-up San Francisco acquired wide receiver Anquan Boldin from the champion Baltimore Ravens. The Seahawks countered with Percy Harvin, now injured.

In June, 49ers coach Jim Harbaugh took aim at the Seahawks’ run of performance-enhancing drug infractions, only adding fuel to an already fierce rivalry between the San Francisco coach and Seattle counterpart Pete Carroll. Cornerback Richard Sherman came right back at his old college coach, saying he had no relationship with Harbaugh and wouldn’t engage in any back and forth.

Three years after the NFC West became known as the NFC Worst, when Seattle reached the playoffs with a losing record, this just might be the NFL’s tightest and most talented division.

“We’re going to be good. We’re going to be fine,” running back Frank Gore said. “Everybody in our division, we know what they are.”

FIVE THINGS TO WATCH IN THE NFC WEST:

ONE MORE WIN NEEDED: After clicking right away with top target Michael Crabtree last year when he took over as starter, Colin Kaepernick will look to es-

tablish the same type of chemistry with Boldin.

The Niners traded for Boldin, who helped Baltimore beat them 34-31 in the Super Bowl, leaving San Francisco determined to get back and win the franchise’s sixth Lombardi Trophy with Kaepernick and a stingy defense leading the way.

Boldin is eager to play with an athletic quarterback like Kaepernick, who is coming off a busy off-season.

“Everything doesn’t come overnight,” Boldin said. “The early success in practice is sign of how good the quarterback is.”

With top 2012 receiver Crabtree sidelined at least until November, Boldin will take on a greater role as Kaepernick’s No. 1 option, while tight end Vernon Davis is hoping for a better connection with Kaepernick.

“Chemistry is the most important thing,” Kaepernick said. “Anquan Boldin makes things easier on quarterbacks. He’s a savvy guy and knows the weak spots in an opposing defense.”

PACIFIC NORTHWEST CONTENDER: The Seahawks have their own young, flashy quarterback and believe Russell Wilson can get them back to the playoffs. Wilson led Seattle oh so close to the NFC title game as a rookie, and he’s back with bigger expectations and reliable running back Marshawn Lynch ready to lead the way.

Not to mention Jermaine Kearse, who called his kickoff return to Wilson before running one 107 yards for a touchdown in a 40-10 preseason whipping of the Broncos.

“I’ve been talking about Jermaine for the past couple months now,” Wilson said. “He’s something special.”

Seattle, with a deep secondary that should rank among the best in football, is poised to build on last year’s 11-5 finish — and do all it can to take down San Francisco.

“We have an elite group of DBs back there,” cornerback Richard Sherman said. “Just as we have to deal with them, they have to deal with us.”



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Venus Williams Loses 3rd-set Tiebreaker at U.S. Open

NEW YORK • After her latest early Grand Slam exit, Venus Williams was asked what the future holds for her at the U.S. Open.

In one breath, Williams brushed aside the unspoken reference to retirement, saying, “I definitely want to come back for the atmosphere.”

And in the next, she added, “I mean, next year’s Open is so far away right now.”

At 33, slowed the past couple of years by an autoimmune disease that saps energy, and hampered much of this season by a bad back, Williams knows by now that such queries are going to arrive, particularly after results such as her 6-3, 2-6, 7-6 (5) loss to 56th-ranked Zheng Jie of China on a wet Wednesday at Flushing Meadows. It is the third year in a row that the two-time champion is out of the U.S. Open after two rounds.

“If I didn’t think I had anything in the tank, I wouldn’t be here,” said Williams, who was ranked No. 1 in 2002 and is currently 60th. “I feel like I do, and that’s why I’m here.”

The American acquitted herself well for stretches, erasing deficits over and over again, until she simply ran out of solutions against Zheng, a former top-15 player and twice a major semifinalist.

“I just kept trying to fight today,” Williams said.

In what she took as an encouraging sign, Williams was out there for 3 hours, 2 minutes, tying for the fifth-longest women’s match since 1970 at the U.S. Open. The third set alone lasted 1½ hours.

“I was like, ‘Wow, this is a marathon,’” Williams said.

Near the finish line, she faltered. On the final two points, Williams missed a volley, then a return. She wound up with 44 unforced errors in all, half on forehands, in part because Zheng kept scrambling along the baseline to get to balls and block them back, making Williams hit extra shots.

During her on-court interview, Zheng addressed the partisan crowd that was raucously pulling for Williams in Louis Armstrong Stadium, saying: “First, I want to say, ‘Sorry, guys.’”

Rain began falling in the early afternoon, jumbling the schedule, and eight women’s singles matches were postponed entirely, including Williams’ younger sister Serena against Galina Voskoboeva. More than four hours of delays during the day meant 2012 champion Andy Murray did not play his first point of the tournament until 9:55 p.m., making for the third-latest start to a U.S. Open night session.

Men were playing in the first round, women in the second, and Murray’s match against Michael Llodra began in Arthur Ashe Stadium only after 2009 champion Juan Martin del Potro wrapped up

a contentious 6-3, 6-7 (5), 6-4, 7-6 (7) victory over 74th-ranked Guillermo Garcia-Lopez of Spain that stretched more than four hours.

Del Potro was irked by his opponent’s repeated calls for a trainer to treat his left leg, while Garcia-Lopez kicked a towel and got into an argument with the chair umpire over a ruling to replay a point in the closing tiebreaker.

No. 17 Kevin Anderson of South Africa, No. 20 Andreas Seppi of Italy, No. 21 Mikhail Youzhny of Russia, 2001 U.S. Open title winner Lleyton Hewitt and 109th-ranked American wild-card entry Tim Smyczek also were among the winners. No. 16 Fabio Fognini and No. 29 Jurgen Melzer lost.

Women’s winners included 2011 French Open champion Li Na, 2012 Wimbledon runner-up Agnieszka Radwanska and 30th-seeded Laura Robson of Britain. Robson beat Li last year in New York, and now they’ll have a rematch.

“I remember being so nervous when I walked on court,” the 19-year-old Robson said. “She made a lot of mistakes in the first set, which helped quite a lot. Hopefully she’ll do that again.”

Venus Williams and Zheng played all of two points before being interrupted by showers. When they resumed two hours later, Williams kept making mistakes.

“I couldn’t pray a ball in,” she said.

But in the second set, Williams more like someone who won the U.S. Open in 2000 and 2001, and five Wimbledon titles.

Every point she won, it seemed, drew clapping and screaming from on-their-feet spectators.

“I love that. I wish I could play some more for that,” Williams said. “I want to

come back here just for that, at this point.”

A drizzle halted action elsewhere, but Williams and Zheng continued.

Zheng led 4-1 in the tiebreaker, before Williams made one last stand. But at 5-all, Williams put a backhand volley into the net as she lost her footing.

“I should have made the shot,” Williams said. “I was just rushing.”

That gave Zheng her first match point, and Williams’ backhand return missed, ending her stay in the singles draw.

As she pointed out more than once during her news conference, there’s still doubles to play with her sister.

The older Williams hasn’t been ranked in the top 10 in 2½ years. The last time she made it beyond the third round at a major tournament was a fourth-round appearance at Wimbledon in 2011.

At the 2011 U.S. Open, Williams withdrew before her second-round match, announcing she had Sjogren’s syndrome, an illness that causes joint pain and fatigue.

She lost a three-setter in the second round in New York last year.

Two of her previous four trips to major tournaments ended in the first round, including at the French Open in May. Because of her back, Williams sat out Wimbledon for the only time in her career in June.

But she is not ready to say goodbye.

“I’ve had a tough set of circumstances to work through, too, especially this year, last year, and the year before. I’ve been dealt some cards that aren’t as easy to deal with, but I have to play with them. The last few months haven’t been easy, coming back from the back injury,” Williams said.

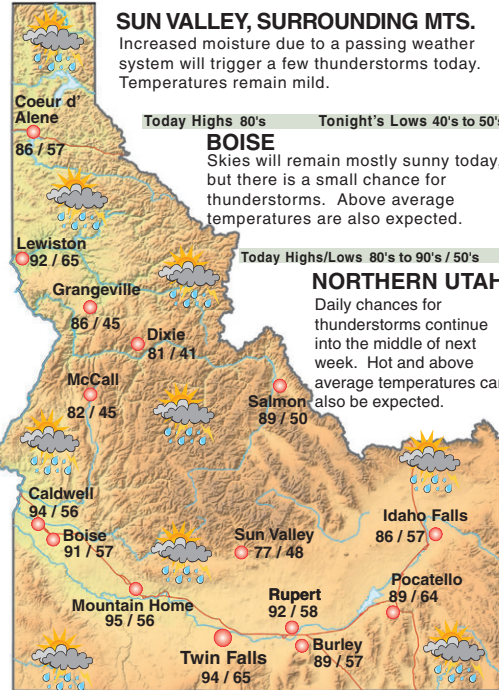

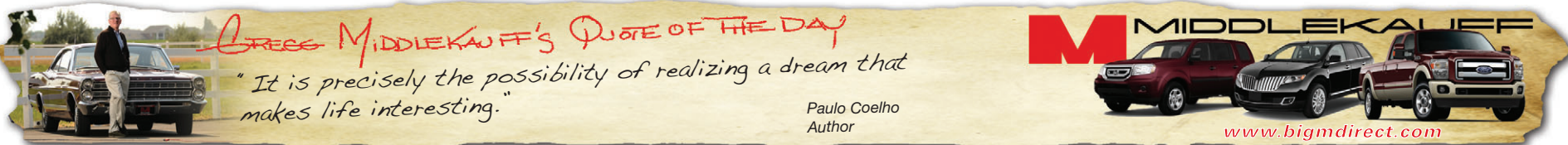

There's not a lot to like about it, maybe because it seems so inevitable and Nick Saban always seems so crabby. Root for Alabama to win a third straight national title in football? Please, let's just get it done and move on to 2014 when Saban will still be crabby but at least the BCS will be no more.

Yes, Saban is a great coach and he recruits great players. It's a tough combination to beat, and the reason Alabama has won two straight national championships and three out of the last four. It's why Las Vegas handicappers are giving this year's squad the highest power rating of any college team ever, and why all but two voters in The Associated Press Top 25 poll made the Crimson Tide No. 1 to begin the season.

Joyless, maybe. Efficient, yes. Ruthless, surely. But what if things aren't exactly what they seem for a team that could easily run the table?

HERE'S A LOOK AT HOW IT JUST MIGHT PLAY OUT:

VIRGINIA TECH: The season begins in Atlanta, for reasons known only to ESPN. It's officially the Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game because 382 postseason bowls with even dumber names are apparently not enough in college football. Expect to see commercials with cows parachuting into stadiums, and expect AJ McCarron to put up enough points on the board in the first half to easily cover the 19-point spread in this one. That will leave the second half wide open for plenty of gratuitous shots of McCarron's girlfriend, Katherine Webb, in the stands.

TEXAS A&M: A year to remember and two weeks to prepare for the SEC interloper that ruined Bama's perfect season last year. This game couldn't come quick enough on Alabama's schedule, even if it has to travel to College Station to take on the Aggies in the game of the, you pick 'em (month, season, decade). Johnny Football is off suspension for this one for some reason and he shreds the Tide defense on way to a 35-7 halftime lead that has Sa-



ban looking as if he ate some bad shellfish on the sidelines. But Manziel is caught selling his game jersey at halftime to a wealthy booster, and Alabama comes back to win 38-35.

ROLL TIDE ROLL: It's the middle of the season and the Tide does roll. Names like Arkansas, Tennessee and LSU look good on the schedule, but Saban knows better. "How dare they challenge me with their primitive skills," he crows, channeling his inner Mike Tyson.

CHATTANOOGA: The Mocs travel to Tuscaloosa for this one, trying to avoid a letdown after back-to-back big games against Wofford and Samford. They do a bit of sightseeing on the trip, and make sure they pat the 9-foot-tall statue of Saban outside Bryant-Denny Stadium for good luck. With a game against erstwhile rival Auburn the next week, Saban rests his regulars and suits up a collection of walk-ons along with the entire trombone section from the band. SOUTH CAROLINA: Alabama is still undefeated heading into in SEC title game, and with Manziel now suspended for the next two years for operating a superstore selling signed apparel, the Heisman is now a two-man race between McCarron and South Carolina's Jadeveon Clowney. The Ol' Ball Coach has a few tricks up his sleeve for the big game, but Clowney disappears like one of Manti Te'o's girlfriends in the second half and Alabama punches a ticket to its third straight BCS title game. Saban celebrates by smiling, but only once.

STANFORD: Yes, Stanford. The place where Google was invented and the only school with a tree for a mascot. Takes so many

brains to get in there that most football players don't even try and go play in the SEC instead. But in this, the most glorious football season in the history of academia, Stanford has beaten everyone and earned a spot in the BCS title game. Saban

and his assistants spend the holidays watching game film 20 hours a day and are confident they have a plan to win. But Stanford pulls a fast one, putting in a brand new playbook that takes the entire squad only two days to memorize. Saban watches

hopelessly as the Cardinal run plays he has never seen before, then is forced to watch as Stanford players dance with the tree at midfield to celebrate their national title.

Meanwhile, the bookies in Vegas close up shop. Because

even they won't give odds of that happening.

Beaver Creek Fire Damages Popular Trails

Recreationists should be prepared for closures.

KETCHUM • Firefighters may have most of the Beaver Creek Fire contained, but the flames' effects will last long after the ash settles.

Beloved hiking and biking trails — popular among Wood River Valley residents and visitors — were unfortunate casualties of the 111,400-acre fire that ignited Aug. 7. The fire's fingers reached into recreation sites in the Sawtooth National Recreation Area, U.S. Bureau of Land Management and U.S. Forest Service's

Many of the popular hiking and biking trails that burned in the Beaver Creek Fire are still closed until they can be restored. Ketchum Ranger District. "The fire was intense and it was concentrated in heavily frequented trail corri-

dors," said Jim Keating, executive director of the Blaine County Recreation District. The Beaver Creek Fire has

yet to be completely quenched, but already trail crews are assessing the damage. *Please see* **TRAILS, S8**

Sawtooth Lake: Where the World Meets the Wilderness

STANLEY • It's hard to be in Idaho long without seeing a photograph of Sawtooth Lake reflecting stately Mount Regan.

"You can see it on calendars, postcards. So everybody wants to see it in real life," Gayle Marechal said.

That view requires a round-trip hike or horseback ride of 10 miles, on a well-traveled trail through iconic Sawtooth Mountain scenery: meadows, forests and dramatic, jagged ridges.

"It is *the* trail. If you're going to spend five hours in Idaho, this is where you want to be," Bunny Marechal said. "This is it."

The Iron Creek trail to Sawtooth Lake — the largest alpine lake in the Sawtooth Mountains — draws hikers from across the country. Many feet have pounded the trail surface into fine dust. On any day of the

week you can expect to encounter particularly perky types: trail runners, Easterners having their one-day adventure of a lifetime, boisterous day hikers doing it for the Facebook updates.

Still, this wilderness trail offers solitude to backpackers who know where to look.

The Marechals, teaching school in Texas at the time, almost skipped the Sawtooths on a visit to Idaho 20 years ago. But they didn't; they took this hike.

"And it kind of changed the trajectory of our lives," Gayle said.

Today the Portland, Ore., retirees volunteer on the Sawtooth Lake trail for the U.S. Forest Service, surveying trail users, checking for wilderness permits, cutting tree branches that fall across the trail and instructing users on "leave no trace" principles.

Those lessons are needed here. On an Aug. 14-17 backpacking trip,

Find the Trailhead

To reach the Sawtooth Lake trail, drive 2.6 miles northwest of Stanley on Idaho Highway 21. Turn left on the gravel Iron Creek Road and drive another 3.2 miles to the Iron Creek Transfer Camp. This parking lot is often crowded, and it has pit toilets.

I saw strings of toilet paper under a bush a few feet off the trail, crushed cans under a lake-side tree and fire rings that hadn't been scattered.

But I also spent three nights in unmarred quiet and four days in a

particularly gorgeous piece of wilderness.

With a modest elevation gain of

1,700 feet, the five-mile hike to Sawtooth Lake offers scenic bang for the buck.

"It's an amazing hike, just because it's so beautiful," said day hiker Adam Brown, 18, of Jerome, leading his parents and siblings to meet a lake he'd already learned to love.

"It really isn't a hard trail, it's just going at *their* pace," Amy Brown said, pointing to her four teenagers, when she and her husband caught up on the tree-lined switchbacks.

Just below Sawtooth Lake is a pretty little wonderland around a pond on Iron Creek. That's where hiker Nanette Bercu of Los Angeles, carrying her baby on her back, stopped for a picnic lunch with her brother-in-law. They were guests in a Stanley-area lodge, and other family members fished that day.

age in areas they can access. Their report so far? Don’t head out without checking to see what’s open.

The fire hit hardest in Greenhorn Gulch and Deer Creek Drainage, according to the Ketchum Ranger District. This led land managers to close the areas’ trails for the foreseeable future.

Recreationists should also be prepared for trail closures near Baker Lake, Osberg Ridgeline, Castle, Place, Alden and South Fork Warm Springs.

When a fire moves through a recreation area, it does more than burn trees. Bridges connecting trails are weakened or completely lost, scorched vegetation weakens the soil and leads to erosion, and burned trees threaten to topple over trails anytime.

Trail crews must also re-

pair paths where dozers were used to build fire lines. While dozers are a popular fire management tool, it takes time and resources to properly restore damaged trails, Keating said.

The district has been working with the surrounding federal agencies to repair the trails and drainages and provide information to the public, Keating said.

“The trails are vital to the people who live here and to our visitors,” he said. “It will take time before they are all open together.”

The Beaver Creek Fire burned mainly on the west side of Idaho Highway 75, so many of the eastern trails are still intact and safe to explore. Starting from Lake Creek south, those include Trail Creek, Corral Creek, Proctor/Bear, Summit Creek, all of the East Fork trails and the Little Wood-area trails.

Fall Chinook Season Opens Sunday

JEROME • A fall Chinook salmon fishing season on parts of the Snake, Clearwater and Salmon rivers opens Sunday, Sept. 1, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game said.

The Clearwater River, from its mouth upstream to Memorial Bridge in Lewiston; and the Salmon River, from its mouth upstream about three-fourths of a

mile to Eye of the Needle Rapids, will be open from Sept. 1 until further notice or Oct. 31, whichever comes first.

The Snake River, from the Washington-Idaho border upstream to Cliff Mountain Rapids, a little less than a mile downstream of Hells Canyon Dam, will be open from Sept. 1 until notice or Oct. 31, and the section from

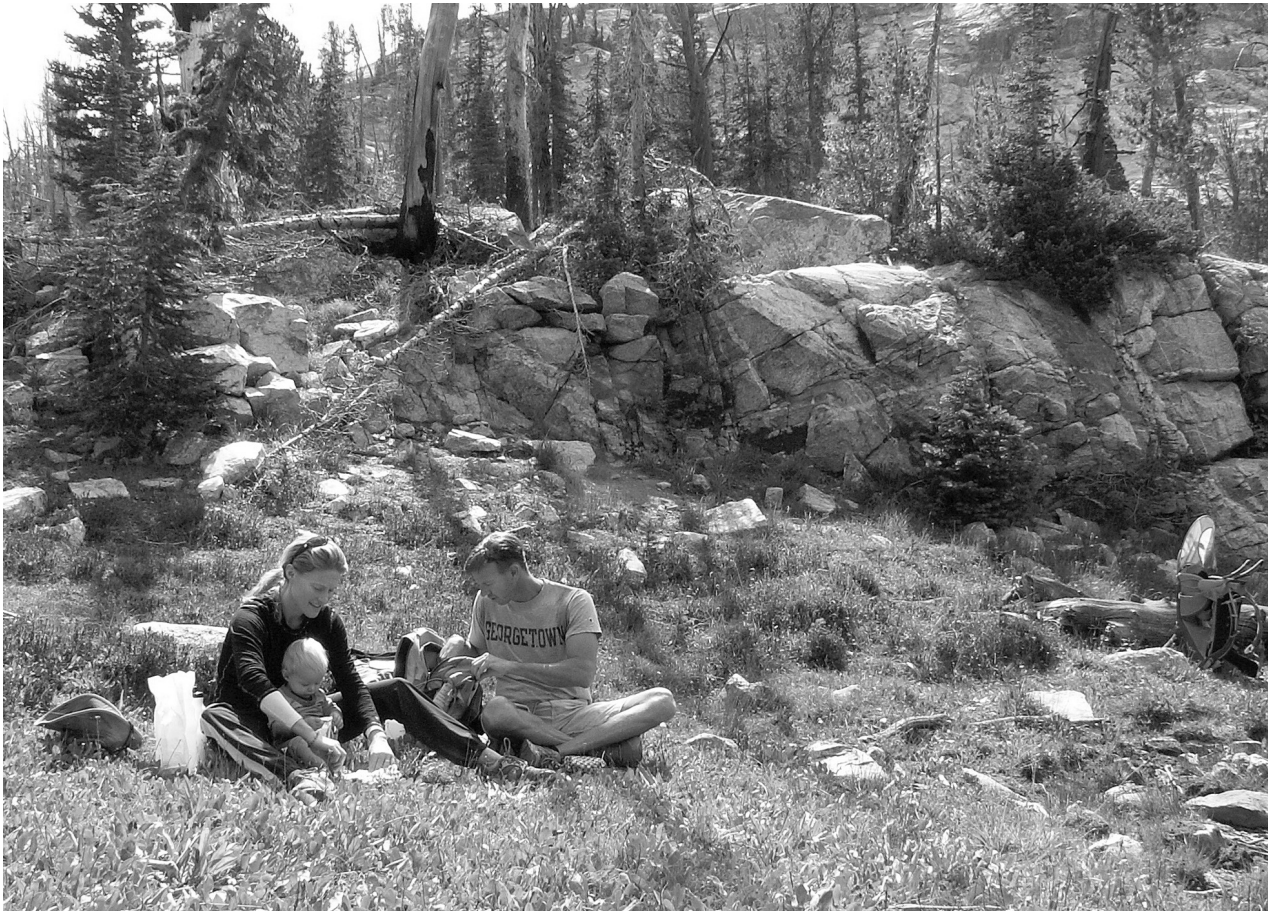
Cliff Mountain Rapids to Hells Canyon Dam will be open Sept. 1 until notice or Nov. 17.

The daily bag limit is six adult Chinook salmon, the possession limit is 18 adult Chinook, and there is no season limit on adult Chinook. Only adipose-finned salmon may be kept.

Only adult Chinook must be recorded on the angler’s

salmon permit. There are no limits on jacks, but anglers must have a valid Idaho fishing license and salmon permit to fish for salmon. Anglers who fill their salmon permit must purchase an additional permit before continuing to fish for salmon.

“We were told that if we had one day to get out and do something, this was not to be missed,” Bercu said.

Just beyond, hikers’ first view of Sawtooth Lake is the classic one: 160 acres of blue water seen from whitebark pines, with massive Mount Regan as the backdrop.

Many day hikers don’t go farther.

But walk another mile or so along the eastern edge of Sawtooth Lake and you’ll find a couple of tent sites at the base of Mount Regan, beside a small lake that drains into Sawtooth. That extra mile weeds out the casual hikers, so any who pass your tent are likely to be of a type who respect wilderness.

That’s where backpackers Alex Stoy and Monica Hartlauer of Park City, Utah, set up camp.

It was Stoy’s second visit to the Stanley area in three days, following a trip to mountain bike and paddle the Salmon River earlier that week.

“That’s 28 hours in the car, just to come here twice,” Hartlauer said.

Stoy intended to climb one of the nearby peaks that day.

“But no rush,” he said. “Why rush when everywhere’s awesome?”

Beyond that small lake at Sawtooth’s upper end you’ll find a rock-strewn, shadeless saddle beside Mount Regan, then a long descent through loose rock. But the trail is well established, and what’s to come is well worth the saddle’s exposure to wind and sun.

You’ll find a pair of small lakes — where trees begin to vary the landscape of loose rock — then, suddenly, a creek with mossy banks in a lush little canyon. For tent solitude, take your pick of pretty, secluded spots among the trees here.

That’s the North Fork of Baron Creek. For ambitious backpackers, it’s the gateway to a long shuttle hike to

Grandjean on the west side of the Sawtooths. But for catch-and-release fly fisherman David Ward, it’s a destination for prized red-band trout in no-name, off-trail lakes.

To go after those trout, you’ll have to bushwhack and carry survival gear, Ward said.

The Ketchum man was far from specific about locations, saying only that the

lakes are visible on topographical maps of the Baron Creek drainage. Still, he said, some of his buddies will be angry that he divulged what he did.

Even a lake where the world comes to play can be neighbor to a secret.

Fall Steelhead Opens on Salmon, Little Salmon, Snake

JEROME • The fall steelhead harvest season opens Sunday, Sept. 1, on the Snake, Salmon and Little Salmon rivers, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game said.

The Snake River is open from the Washington State line at the confluence of the Snake and Clearwater Rivers upstream to Hells Canyon Dam.

The Salmon River is open from its mouth upstream to the posted boundary 100 yards downstream of Sawtooth Hatchery.

The Little Salmon River is open from its mouth upstream to the U.S. Highway 95 Bridge near Smokey Boulder road.

The limits on these waters are three per day and nine in possession.

The harvest season already is open on a two-

mile stretch of the lower Clearwater River from its mouth to the U.S. Highway 12 Memorial Bridge near Lewiston.

The limits on the Clearwater are two per day and six in possession.

Rest of Clearwater and the Middle Fork, North Fork and South Fork Clearwater rivers are open for catch-and-release only until Oct. 15, when the harvest season in those sections opens.

Anglers may keep 20 steelhead for the fall season, which ends Dec. 31. Only steelhead with a clipped adipose fin, evidenced by a healed scar, may be kept. Any steelhead that has an intact adipose fin must be released unharmed.

Rule Changes for Nonresident Junior Mentored Tags

JEROME • The Idaho Fish and Game Commission approved a change in the mentor requirements for holders of the nonresident junior mentored hunt tag.

Under the new rule, the mentor is still required to have tag for same species but it doesn't have to be for the same area. The change takes effect immediately as a temporary rule, but it is subject to legislative review as a proposed rule.

The holder of a junior

mentored tag must have a junior mentored hunting license and must be accompanied by an adult license holder with a tag for the same species. The junior mentored deer and elk tags are not valid for bear, gray wolf or mountain lion.

The junior mentored hunter and the mentor must be close enough to be within normal conversation or hearing range without shouting or the aid of electronic devices.

Ask Fish and Game: Unlimited Controlled Hunts

Question: I have an unlimited archery deer tag for Unit 53. Does this limit me to this area only, or am I able to hunt the general archery hunts as well?

Answer: The unlimited archery deer tag is for a controlled hunt in Unit 53 east of U.S. Highway 93, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game said. Unlimited refers to the number of tags available in that

hunt. The tag is not good for any general season archery hunts. Anyone whose name is drawn in a controlled hunt for deer or elk is prohibited from hunting in any other hunt for the same species except hunters drawn in a controlled extra tag or depredation hunt, or if they have purchased a leftover nonresident general season tag at the nonresident price.

Yellowstone Counts 4,600 Bison in the Park

YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK, Wyo. (AP) • Yellowstone National Park has an estimated 4,600 bison roaming within its boundaries.

The park counted the bison during its annual summer bison survey.

The aerial survey found about 3,200 bison in the Northern herd and 1,400 in the Central herd this summer. There were about 700

calves-of-the-year observed in a June aerial survey.

This year's count represents an increase of 8.75 percent over last year's survey. The peak population estimate of 5,000 bison was recorded in the summer 2005.

The observed rate of population change this past year is within the natural range of expectation for wild bison.

Wolf Hunting Season Opens Statewide

JEROME • The 2013-14 wolf hunting season opens throughout the state on Friday, Aug. 30, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game said.

The season runs through March 31, except in the Lolo, Selway and Middle Fork zones and in that portion of Unit 16 in the Dworshak-Elk City Zone north of the Selway River where the season closes June 30.

The wolf hunting season is open year-round on private land only in the Panhandle Zone.

An individual may buy up to five wolf hunting tags per calendar year, but hunters may use only two wolf tags in some parts of the state in a calendar year.

No more than two gray

wolf hunting tags may be used in the Salmon, McCall Weiser, Sawtooth, Southern Mountains, Beaverhead, Island Park and Southern Idaho zone. No more than five

tags may be used in the Panhandle, Palouse-Hells Canyon, Lolo, Dworshak-Elk City, Selway and Middle Fork zones.

Tags must be validated

and securely attached immediately.

Harvest limits have been set in five zones: 45 in the Salmon Zone, 60 in the Sawtooth Zone, 40 in the Southern Mountains, 10 in the Beaverhead and 30 in the Island Park Zone. There is no statewide harvest limit.

The wolf trapping season opens Nov. 15 in all but four wolf zones, and Unit 10A of the Dworshak-Elk City Zone opens to trapping Feb. 1.

Wolf hunting tags are \$11.50 for Idaho residents and \$31.75 for nonresidents and are valid for a calendar year.

Rewards Are Aplenty in Glacier Peak Wilderness

LEAVENWORTH, Wash. (AP) • Holly Weiler was blunt in the Spokane Mountaineers calendar item about the August trip she was leading through the Glacier Peak Wilderness:

"We're hiking a loop — Trinity Trailhead (near Lake Wenatchee) to Buck Creek Pass, out to Image Lake, back past Lyman Lakes, and up and over Spider Gap to Spider Meadows. It's beautiful AND it's tough. Participants must be capable of hiking 10+ miles a day with a fully loaded pack while going up (and down ... and up again) over some tough mountain passes. Limited to six experienced backpackers. Bring the good camera equipment for this one! Also bring an ice axe for Spider Gap (and knowledge of how to use it)."

Adding to the challenge for participants was the high school English teacher's annual Hike-a-Thon commitment to log as many trail miles as possible for pledges benefiting Washington Trails Association projects.

"We'll likely do about 50 miles in four days," said Weiler, the University High School girls cross country team coach who practices the fitness she preaches: In July, she had only two no-mileage days on her running calendar.

The Glacier Peak Wilderness was made for people like Weiler.

The first day of the wilderness trek alone — with full packs up to Buck Creek Pass plus side trips to Flower Dome and Liberty Cap — would involve about 14 miles and roughly 4,000 feet of elevation gain.

Hikers signed up, but all bagged out as departure day neared except for Weiler, trip co-leader Samantha Journot, and me.

I detailed all of this the day we left to my physician wife, Meredith Heick, as I followed normal procedure in our household by writing down the trip itinerary and agency emergency contacts.

I noted that the average age of my two companions is 30 — half my age.

"Here Honey, carry this in your pocket," Meredith said after returning from the medicine cabinet with a small zipper bag. "Two aspirin — if you have chest pain, crush and put them between your lip and gum. It could save your life."

Visiting the 566,430-acre Glacier Peak Wilderness, and especially its namesake mountain, is a remote experience no matter how you approach it.

Glacier Peak, elevation 10,541 feet, is the fourth-highest mountain in Washington and the most remote of the state's five active volcanoes.

By the 1790s, Mounts Baker, Rainier and St. Helens were noted and named in the first written descriptions of the Columbia River and Puget Sound regions. Mount Adams was noted by the Lewis and Clark Expedition in 1805 and

named in the 1830s. But Glacier Peak did not appear on a published map under its current name until 1898, says the U.S. Geological Survey website detailing its volcanic history.

"(Glacier Peak) is not prominently visible from any major population center, and so its attractions, as well as its hazards, tend to be overlooked," USGS says.

The area's remote, famously rugged and diverse landscape was designated a wilderness by the U.S. Forest Service in 1960, four years before Congress secured its protected status in the Wilderness Act.

Today the Glacier Peak wilderness is sandwiched between the Henry M. Jackson, Wild Sky and Alpine Lakes wilderness areas to the south and the Lake Chelan-Sawtooth Wilderness and North Cascades National Park to the north.

Virtually any loop hike of more than three days in the wilderness will range through old-growth forest, alpine meadows, U-shaped glacial valleys and mountain cols over craggy ridges.

Huckleberries range from valley floors to as high as shrubs can be found.

Mosquitoes and black flies can be thick as fog on a calm day.

"I've been here before," Weiler said as we drove to the trailhead northwest of Leavenworth. "I'm bringing a headnet."

"Long pants are a good idea, too," I suggested, pointing to the shorts she and Journot were wearing.

They laughed.

About 100 official trails in the wilderness total 450 miles, including a rugged 60-mile stretch of the Pacific Crest Trail.

The official trails include lofty cliff-hangers and leg-numbing fords of glacial streams. Additional miles of unofficial cross-country hiking and climbing routes rise to higher levels of difficulty as they angle above treeline,

crossing snowfields, talus and scree.

The Ptarmigan Traverse, the most fabled untrailed route, combines rock climbing and glacier travel across 15 miles of the northern section of the wilderness.

The Glacier Peak Wilderness has more active glaciers than any other place in the lower 48 states, according to the Forest Service. Most of the year-round ice is on Glacier Peak but also on about a dozen other peaks in the wilderness.

More than 200 lakes dot the high country, most of them unnamed and rarely visited in untrailed cirques and basins.

The Spokane Mountaineers' trek required a mixture of onand off-trail routes facilitated by some remarkable Forest Service trail engineering. Inconspicuous culverts and berms constructed by crews on the most popular routes allow hikers and horses to cross the countless creeks and bogs of the North Cascades without breaking stride.

We noticed the rock work, such as the steps up Cloudy Pass, and the number of logs cut out from avalanche paths and the girth of the old-growth spruce and hemlock blowdowns that had been sawed off the lower forest trails — all with cross-cut saws.

Chainsaws and other motorized equipment are not allowed in the wilderness, even for the crews from the Okanogan-Wenatchee National Forests, which co-manage the wilderness with the Mount Baker-Snoqualmie National Forest.

That doesn't mean the wilderness is always peaceful and quiet.

Since the end of the last Ice Age, Glacier Peak has produced some of the largest and most explosive eruptions in the state. The most recent activity involved relatively small steam eruptions about 300 years ago.

SGS experts say Washing-

ton residents aren't likely to witness a Glacier Peak eruption in their lifetimes, although the chance of significant activity is one in a thousand in any given year.

But another sort of fiery activity raged in the wilderness on our trip.

On Friday night, after a full day of hiking and well-deserved huge meals cooked on our camp stoves, Weiler, Journot and I were admiring the stars in the clear night sky above our Buck Creek Pass campsite.

A "shooting star" blazed a long orange trail seemingly right over our heads, reminding us that the Perseid meteor showers were kicking into gear.

Clouds were building beyond the ridges around us. Bursts of light danced around the darkening skies, followed by muffled booms that gradually got louder.

The intensity of the thunderstorms closed in at midnight and again at 4 a.m. with the shock and awe of the bombing of Baghdad.

We'd camped in a basin, protected from the wind and rain by small trees but far from the largest and highest trees in the area, but the storm at one point zeroed in on us as though our tents were a target.

I put my hands over my ears. Blinding flash left me seeing a greenish yellow spot wherever I looked. My ears rang.

"Where in the hell's that aspirin," I thought, searching my pockets.

We survived, dried out the next morning and continued our trek, passing several groups of hikers that were bailing out of the wilderness after enduring wet, terrifying evenings. They had camped in exposed high-elevation sites to enjoy the view and avoid some of the bugs, but they paid a price.

"Wind blew my tent down on my face and the lighting was bouncing off the walls around us," one guy said. "It was horrible."

Fort Hood Shooter Maj. Nidal Hasan Sentenced to Death

FORT HOOD, Texas (AP) • A military jury on Wednesday sentenced Maj. Nidal Hasan to death for the 2009 shooting rampage at Fort Hood, handing the Army psychiatrist the ultimate punishment after a trial in which he seemed to be courting martyrdom by making almost no effort

to defend himself. The rare military death sentence came nearly four years after the attack that stunned even an Army hardened by more than a decade of constant war. Hasan walked into a medical building where soldiers were getting medical checkups, shouted “Allahu akbar” — Arabic for “God is great!” — and opened fire with a laser-sighted handgun.

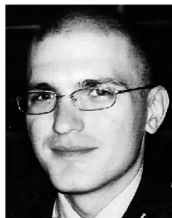

Thirteen people were killed. Hasan, who said he acted to protect Islamic insurgents abroad from American aggression, had no visible reaction when the sentence was announced, staring first at the jury forewoman and then at the judge. Some victims’ relatives were in the courtroom but none showed any reaction, which the judge had warned against. The American-born Muslim of Palestinian descent never denied his actions at the huge Texas Army post. In opening statements, he told jurors that evidence would show he was the shooter and described him-

self as a soldier who had “switched sides.” The same jurors who convicted Hasan last week needed to agree unanimously on a death sentence. The only alternative was life in prison without parole. Kathy Platoni, an Army reservist who still struggles with images of Capt. John Gaffaney bleeding to death at her feet, said she was not opposed to the punishment. Hasan wanted “to be a martyr and so many of the (victims’) families had spoken to the issue of not giving him what he wants because this is his own personal holy war,” said Platoni, who watched most of the trial from inside the courtroom.

“But on the other hand — this is from

the bottom of my heart — he doesn’t deserve to live,” she said. “I don’t know how long it takes for a death sentence to be carried out, but the world will be a better place without him.” Hasan could become the first American soldier executed in more than half a century. But because the military justice system requires a lengthy appeals process, years or even decades could pass before he is put to death. He was expected to be taken on the next available flight to the military prison at Fort Leavenworth in Kansas. In his final plea for a death sentence, the lead prosecutor assured jurors that Hasan would “never be a martyr” despite his attempt to tie the attack to religion. “He is a criminal. He is a cold-blooded murderer,” Col. Mike Mulligan said. “This is not his gift to God. This is his debt to society. This is the cost of

his murderous rampage.” Since the attack, the federal government has sought to execute Hasan, believing that any sentence short of a lethal injection would deny justice to the families of the dead and the survivors who had believed they were safe behind the gates of Fort Hood, about 70 miles north of Austin. And for just as long, Hasan seemed content to go to the death chamber for his beliefs. He fired his own attorneys to represent himself, barely mounted a defense during the three-week trial and made almost no effort to have his life spared. Mulligan reminded the jury that Hasan was a trained doctor yet opened fire on defenseless comrades. Hasan “only dealt death,” the prosecutor said, so the only appropriate sentence was death. When Hasan began shooting, soldiers were standing in long lines inside a medical building to receive immunizations and doctors’ clearance.

Twin Falls Family Reacts to Fort Hood Sentence

TWIN FALLS • The Twin Falls sister of an Army staff sergeant critically injured in the Fort Hood massacre said she cried with relief when she heard that Maj. Nidal Malik Hasan was sentenced Wednesday to die. “It’s a very good day,” Kym Lott said. “I was at work today, and I wasn’t expecting all of this to happen. When I got the news, I started crying.” A military jury deliberated for more than two hours before unanimously recommending Hasan be executed. He was earlier found guilty of 45 counts of premeditated murder and attempted premeditated murder for killing 13 people and injuring 32 on Nov. 5, 2009, at Fort Hood near Killeen, Texas. Hasan severely wounded Lott’s brother, Army Staff Sgt. Shawn Manning, a Twin Falls native. Almost four years since the shooting, Manning still lives with two bullets in his body. Manning, previously under a gag order, was not available for comment late Wednesday. Lott said she was on the fence about whether her brother’s attacker should be executed for his crimes. “That’s what he (Hasan) want-

ed,” she said. “So maybe he gets what he wanted, and then there’s people who wanted that for him too, and there are some people who weren’t sure.” Regardless, Lott said, she was glad she did not have to make the decision. “It’s a lot of closure, but I know it is not over,” she said. Lott said she has some empathy for Hasan but “all of this could have been stopped.” “If the government would have taken action (before) and even listened to him, his emails, not only could they have saved all those lives that were lost, and all these injuries ... they could have even saved his life in this,” she said. Shari Taylor, Manning’s mother, said she was pleased with the news, especially as she was preparing to fly to Washington state to attend the Boise State University game Saturday night with her son. Although Taylor said she doesn’t always agree with the death penalty, she felt it is justified for Hasan. She still has a hard time acknowledging her son’s attacker and knows it may be decades before Hasan is actually killed. “I don’t hate the man, but I don’t feel sorry for him,” she said. “He has shown no sorrow for what he’s done.”

Fort Hood Gunman Will ‘Never Be a Martyr’

FORT HOOD, Texas • The Army psychiatrist who fatally shot 13 people at Fort Hood will “never be a martyr” and deserves to be executed despite his attempt to tie his attack on unarmed soldiers to religion, a prosecutor told jurors on Wednesday. History was full of instances of death in the name of religion, but it would be “wrong and unsupportive” to tie Maj. Nidal Hasan’s actions to a wider cause, Col. Mike Mulligan told jurors in his final plea for a rare mili-

tary death sentence. “He will not now and he will never be a martyr. He is a criminal. He is a cold blooded murderer,” the lead prosecutor said. “This is not his gift to God. This is his debt to society. This is the cost of his murderous rampage.” “It was conscious decision to commit murder to serve his own needs, his own wants,” Mulligan said in his closing argument. “His attack by him was all about him. This is about his soul, for his soul he stole life from 13 others.” The Army psychiatrist has been representing himself during his trial. But his behavior has only stoked sus-

picion that his ultimate goal was martyrdom, in the form of a death sentence that would allow him to fulfill what prosecutors have described as a “jihad duty” under his Islamic faith. Hasan has done nothing to dissuade jurors from giving him a death sentence. Even when his standby lawyers pleaded in vain to argue on his behalf, he described them as “overzealous.” At the start of his trial he gave a brief opening statement, during which he said evidence would show he was the shooter and described himself as a soldier who had “switched sides.”

On this date:
In 1533, the last Incan King of Peru, Atahualpa, was executed on orders of Spanish conqueror Francisco Pizarro.
In 1862, the Bureau of Engraving and Printing began operations at the United States Treasury.
In 1877, the second president of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, Brigham Young, died in Salt Lake City at age 76.
In 1944, 15,000 American troops marched down the Champs Elysees in Paris as the French capital continued to celebrate its liberation from the Nazis.
In 1952, 4'33" ("Four Minutes, Thirty-three Seconds"), a composition by avant-garde composer John Cage, had its premiere in Woodstock, N.Y., as pianist David Tudor sat at a piano and, for a total of four minutes and 33 seconds, played... nothing.

In 1953, an early version of the animated cartoon character Speedy Gonzales made his debut in the Warner Bros. cartoon "Cat-Tails for Two."
In 1957, the Senate gave final congressional approval to a Civil Rights Act after South Carolina Sen. Strom Thurmond, then a Democrat, ended a filibuster that had lasted 24 hours.
In 1958, pop superstar Michael Jackson was born in Gary, Ind.
In 1972, swimmer Mark Spitz of the United States won the third of his seven gold medals at the Munich Olympics, finishing first in the 200-meter freestyle.
In 1982, Academy Award-winning actress Ingrid Bergman died in London on her 67th birthday.
In 1987, Academy Award-winning actor Lee Marvin died in Tucson, Ariz., at age 63.
In 2005, Hurricane Katrina hit the Gulf Coast near Buras, La., bringing floods that devastated New Orleans. More than 1,800 people in the region died.

Ten years ago: A bombing at the Imam Ali Shrine in Najaf, Iraq, killed at least 85 people, including Shiite leader Ayatollah Mohammed Baqir al-Hakim. Six nations trying to defuse a standoff over North Korea's nuclear program ended their talks in Beijing with an agreement to keep talking. South Dakota congressman Bill Janklow was charged with felony manslaughter in a car accident that claimed the life of motorcyclist Randolph E. Scott. (Janklow was later convicted and served 100 days in jail.)
Five years ago: Republican presidential nominee John McCain picked Sarah Palin, a maverick conservative who had been governor of Alaska for less than two years, to be his running mate.
One year ago: Seizing the Republican National Convention spotlight in Tampa, Fla., vice presidential candidate Paul Ryan promised Mitt Romney would "not duck the tough issues" if he were to win the White House and that their party would move forcefully to solve the nation's economic woes. Hurricane Isaac sidestepped New Orleans, sending the worst of its howling wind and heavy rain into a cluster of rural fishing villages. The NFL announced it would open the regular season with replacement officials.

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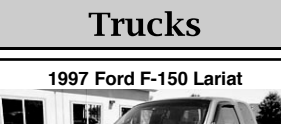


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THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

Bobby Wolff

"Ignorance of the law excuses no man; not that all men know the law, but because it is an excuse that every man will plead, and no man can tell how to refute him."

"Eight ever, nine never" reminds us that when we have eight trumps between our two hands, we should finesse for the queen, but when we have nine, we should play for the drop. This is reasonable advice, but there are sometimes good reasons for disobeying it.

At the table, declarer in six spades took the straightforward line of cashing the spade ace and king, but when the queen did not drop and the diamond finesse was also wrong, he had to go down. Can you see how he might have done better?

Declarer should see that if he can time the play accurately and lose a trick to East at the critical moment, he can ensure his contract. With this aim in mind, declarer should start eliminating his heart and club losers. He should win the heart king, cross to dummy with a club, cash the heart ace, ruff a heart, then go back to a club and ruff the fourth heart.

Now he can cash the club ace, discarding a diamond, and finally the time has come to play trump. Declarer should see that it doesn't matter if he loses a trump trick when East has a doubleton queen, as East will be endplayed. So declarer should cash the spade king and play a spade to the 10. If it holds, then all his problems are over, but if it loses to East's potential queen, then the defender will have to play a diamond into dummy's tenace or give a ruff and discard.

ANSWER: Partner's double suggests values and the unbid suits. Your choice is unpalatable: a penalty pass without a trump honor, a rebid of the spade suit with only five moderate cards, or a response in a three-card suit if you bid three clubs. Which is least offensive? I do not know, but I'd guess that even if passing is right in theory, a retreat to three clubs works out best in practice.
