Kelley Fire near Featherville 11,568 **Acres and Growing**

FEATHERVILLE • Firefighters lined the upper south fork corridor of the Boise River Sunday, laying hoses and other protective

measures to prevent the Kelley Fire from reaching homes near the north side of the river, said David Chevalier, Kelley Fire information officer. Crews were trying to prevent the wildfire from jumping across the Boise River where seven houses stand between 100 and 200 yards from the shore.

The wildfire grew more than four times its size since Friday, when it was measured at around 1,000 acres. Widespread flames


threatened the Baumgartner Campground Saturday, one of the most pristine in the area, and caused additional road closures to portions of Forest Road 166 and the Mountain Home Ranger Please see FIRE, A2

Flash Flood Watch in Effect for South-Central Idaho

TWIN FALLS • Monsoon type conditions are expected to move north from Nevada into Idaho today and Tuesday, possibly dumping up to half an inch of rain per hour in parts of south-central Idaho, said Valerie Mills, meteorologist with the National Weather Service.

A flash flood watch is in effect for southern Twin Falls County, not including the City of Twin Falls, from Monday afternoon through Tuesday afternoon. A flood watch is in effect for Cassia County through midnight Tuesday morning and parts of Elmore, Camas and Blaine counties early Tuesday morning through early Wednesday. The flood watch is in place to alert people for the possibility of a warning, said Mills.

"If you're camping, pack up and go to high ground or go home," she said. "If you're out driving and come to a flooded roadway, turn around. Don't drown. Be prepared that there is a threat coming for heavy rain and conditions could develop in a couple spots, for now it's just conditions favorable to heavy rain."

Flash flooding is not unusual for south-central Idaho, she said.

"There is a monsoon push with flash flooding every year in southern Idaho. People should watch the latest forecasts and be prepared to take action if a warning is issued."

"We saw three significant columns (Sunday) in the Deadwood Creek area. I know there was a spot west of Boardman Creek, it was picking up pretty good," Myslivy said. "Some of the areas were backing down on the south side of the Boise River. There were Hotshot crews watching that the fire didn't go over the river."

Three Type 1 Incident Management helicopters circled the wildfire, making 5,000 gallon drops of water and retardant Sunday night.

Much of the burning landscape is under a flood watch from the National Weather Service. Up to half an inch of rain per

hour Tuesday could significantly increase containment of the Kelley Fire, which was around 7 percent contained Sunday

"The rain is going to change everything and it all depends on what is going to happen. We have high expectations the rain will benefit the fire," Chevalier said. "The rain will increase the containment in an immeasurable amount. We can be hopeful because any rainfall or increased humidity is a bonus. It's like adding extra firefighters, but it might hamper air operations that would try to continue drops during rainfall."

Lightning caused the blaze Saturday, Aug. 24 seven miles southeast of Featherville. Spruce, fir, sagebrush and grass were burning as the fire spread to the east Sunday night. Firefighting efforts at times was considered "extremely difficult" as 18 mph winds spread flames over rough terrain.

Chobani Pulls Yogurt from **Store Shelves**

BOISE • Yogurt maker Chobani says it has pulled products from stores following reports of yogurt that didn't remain fresh as long as it should have.

The Idaho Statesman reports a check of Fred Meyer, Albertson's and Winco stores on Saturday in the Boise area found that Chobani yogurt had been removed.

It's unclear if the removal extends to other states, where customers reported bad yogurt.

Chobani on its website says it took action after hearing what the company called isolated quality concerns with certain cups of

The company says it's working voluntarily with retailers to remove yogurt and deliver fresh replacements.

Chobani opened a huge yogurt plant in Twin Falls late last year at a cost of \$450

The company on Sunday didn't return a request for additional information from The Associated Press.

Team to Probe Jail Death of Lawmaker's Son

POCATELLO • An eastern Idaho sheriff says the investigation into the death in jail of the 26-year-old son of an Idaho state lawmaker has been turned over to a special investigative team.

Bannock County Sheriff Lorin Nielsen tells the Idaho State Journal that the tricounty investigative team is taking over with detectives from Bingham and Jefferson counties in charge.

Bannock County Jail officials in Pocatello say Jason VanOrden of Pingree died early Friday. He's the son of Rep. Julie VanOrden of Pin-

Nielsen says the death "was consistent with sui-

Jason VanOrden was arrested last month following a standoff with police in Pocatello in which he told officers that he had a knife and a gun.

He has several previous arrests, including driving under the influence and domestic battery.

Police: No Suspect at Large in Officer Slaying

DRAPER, Utah • The shooting that killed a Draper police officer early Sunday was caused by one or both of the civilians who are hospitalized with critical injuries, police said.

Investigators do not believe any additional suspects were involved in the gunfire that killed Sgt. Derek Johnson, Draper City Police Chief Bryan Roberts said at a news conference Sunday afternoon.

The incident began around 6 a.m. when police received an unintelligible radio call from Johnson, Roberts said, followed by 911 calls from residents reporting gunshots near 13800 South and Fort Street.

Officers arriving on the scene found Johnson had been wounded, along with the man and woman.

Johnson was transported to Intermountain Medical Center, where he later died.

The man and woman, whose identities have not been released, are still in critical condition.

Roberts said 32-year-old

Johnson was a father, husband and an eight-year veteran of the Draper City Police Department.

"He was a very dedicated, devoted and highly decorated police officer," he said.

Draper City Mayor Darrell Smith, who appeared with Roberts at the news conference, said he met with Johnson's wife and family at their home earlier Sunday.

"They're wonderful people who have suffered a tremendous and tragic loss," he said.

Johnson worked in police investigations, patrols and community policing efforts and always had a positive attitude, Smith said.



TV Figure David Frost Dies

Veteran broadcaster famous for drawing post-Watergate apology from Nixon.

THE WASHINGTON POST

Sir David Frost, the veteran broadcaster who famously drew a grudging post-Watergate apology out of former President Richard Nixon, died Saturday aboard a cruise ship sailing from England to the Mediterranean. He was 74.

His death, from an apparent heart attack, was confirmed in a statement his family released to the BBC.

Known for his laid-back but probing style of interviewing, Mr. Frost gained access to an astonishing ar-ray of world figures during a fivedecade career. His subjects included seven U.S. presidents and eight British prime ministers, and his A-list included Prince Charles, Nelson Mandela, Billy Graham, Muhammad Ali, Orson Welles, Truman Capote, the Beatles, Henry Kissinger and Vladimir

Ferociously prepared but charming to the point of servility, he had a knack for getting his interviewees to relax and open up. "He could be and certainly was with me -agood friend and a fearsome inter-viewer," tweeted David Cameron, the British prime

The coup of Frost's career came in 1977, when he persuaded Nixon to sit with him (for a fee and a share of the broadcast profits) in a series of interviews over several weeks. Nearly 29 hours of taped conversation - Nixon's first interview after resigning in disgrace in 1974 — was distilled into four 90-minute programs.

At one point, Nixon said of

his Watergate machinations "that when the president does it, that means that it is not ille-

Once Frost had established a rapport with Nixon, he cannily appealed to Nixon's sense of history and remorse, telling the leader that unless he acknowledged his abuses, "you're going to be haunted for the rest of your life."

Zuma's office said the team of doctors treating Mandela, also known by his clan name Madiba, is con-vinced that he will" receive the same level of intensive care at his Houghton home that he received in Preto-ria. His home has been reconfigured to allow him to receive intensive

The statement also said: "If there are health conditions that warrant another admission to hospital in future, this will be done."

Protests Highlight Fast-Food Economics

American fast-food workers often earn about \$7.25 an hour to make the \$3 chicken sandwiches and 99-cent tacos that generate billions of dollars in profit each year for Mc-Donald's and other chains.

Thousands of the nation's many millions of fast-food workers and their supporters have been staging protests across the country in the past year to call attention to the struggles of living on or close to the federal minimum wage. The push raises the question of whether the economics of the fastfood industry allow room for a boost in pay for its workers.

The industry is built on a business model that keeps costs — including those for labor - low so compa-nies can make money while satisfying America's love of cheap, fast food.

Support for Path to Citizenship Gaining Ground

As Congress wrestles with immigration legislation, a central question is whether the 11 million immigrants already in the United States illegally should get a path to citizenship.

The answer from a small but growing number of House Republicans is "yes," just as long as it's not the "special" path advocated by Democrats and passed by the

"There should be a pathway to citizenship - not a special pathway and not no pathway," Rep. Jason Chaffetz, R-Utah, told ABC 4 Utah after speaking at a recent town hall meeting in his district. "But there has to be a legal, lawful way to go through this process that works, and right now it doesn't."

Many House Republicans say people who illegally crossed the border or overstayed their visas should not be rewarded with a special, tailor-made solution that awards them a prize of American citizenship, especially when millions are waiting in line to attempt the process through current legal channels.

It's far from clear, however, what a path to citizenship that's not a special path to citizenship might look like, or how many people it might

The phrase means different things to different people, and a large number of House Republicans oppose any approach that results in citizenship for people who now are in the country illegally.

Naval Academy Sex Assault **Case Continues**

Defense attorneys for three U.S. Naval Academy midshipmen charged with sexually assaulting a fellow student finished lengthy cross-examination of the woman on Sunday.

She testified that Midshipman Josh Tate, one of the men charged in the case, told her shortly after an April 2012 party that the two had sex after she had been drinking heavily. She says that during a subsequent phone call he said he'd only been kidding about having sex with her.

Tate, 21; Eric Graham, 21; and Tra'ves Bush, 22, are accused of sexually assaulting the woman at an alcoholfueled off-campus party.

The woman has testified that she has no memory of having sex with any of the three men, but later was told by Tate that the two had sex. She said he also told her she had a sexual encounter with Graham.

US Boosts Case for Intervention

Support in Congress split as vote to give Obama go-ahead to use military force looms.

WASHINGTON (AP) • The Obama administration geared up for the biggest foreign policy vote since the Iraq war by arguing Sunday that new physical evidence shows the Syrian government used sarin gas in a deadly August attack. With its credibility on the line, the United States must respond, the country's top diplomat said.

Members of Congress, deadlocked on just about everything these days and still on summer break, expressed sharply divergent opinions about whether to give President Barack Obama the go-ahead he re-quested to retaliate with military force against the Assad regime, and what turning down the commander in chief could mean for America's reputa-

Presenting Obama's case for military action, Secretary of State John Kerry gave a series of interviews on Sunday news shows outlining the latest information the administration has received about the Aug. 21 attack in the Damascus suburbs that the U.S. says killed 1,429 civilians, including more than 400 children. He said samples collected by first responders added to the growing body of proof that Syria's government launched a chemical weapons attack.

"Samples of hair and blood have been tested and they have reported positive for signatures of sarin," Kerry said. "Each day that goes by, this case is even stronger. We know that the regime ordered this attack. We know they prepared for it. We know where the rockets came from. We know where they landed. We know the damage that was done afterwards."

Sarin, which affects the nervous system and is toxic in liquid or gas form, can be delivered in missiles, bombs, rockets or artillery shells. The gas is outlawed under international rules of warfare. The reference to hair and blood samples were the first pieces of specific physiological evidence cited by any member of the administration, which previously spoke only about an unnamed nerve agent.

Kerry's assertion coincided with the beginning of a forceful administration appeal for congressional support, now that Obama has declared he will await approval from the House and Senate before ordering any cruise missile strikes or other action.

On Capitol Hill, senior administration officials briefed lawmakers in private to explain why the U.S. is compelled to act against President Bashar Assad's government. Obama, Vice President Joe Biden and White House Chief of Staff Denis McDonough also made calls to individual lawmakers. Further classified meetings were planned over the next three days.

Sen. John McCain of Arizona, a leading Senate hawk and the candidate Obama defeated for the presi-dency in 2008, said he'd discuss Syria with the president at the White House Monday.

Obama must convince skeptical Americans and their representatives in Congress of the need for more U.S. military action in the Muslim world after a decade of war in Iraq and Afghanistan.

He also is trying to assemble an international coalition, but finding it hard to land partners. They fear becoming involved in a conflict that has claimed more than 100,000 lives in the past $2^{1/2}$ years and dragged in terrorist groups on both sides of the battlefield.

Decision to Pull Back Tests the President's Credibility

WASHINGTON (AP) •

For more than a week, the White House had been barreling toward imminent military action against Syria. But President Barack Obama's abrupt decision to instead ask Congress for permission left him with a high-risk gamble that could devastate his credibility if no action is ultimately taken in response to a deadly chemical weapons attack that crossed his own "red line."

The stunning reversal also raises questions about the president's decisiveness and could embolden leaders in Syria, Iran, North Korea and elsewhere, leaving them with the impression of a U.S. president unwilling to back up his words with

The president, in a hastily announced statement Saturday in the White House Rose Garden, argued that he did in fact have the power to act on his own. But faced with the prospect of taking action opposed by many Americans, the commander in chief tried to shift the burden and instead round up partners on Capitol Hill to share in that responsi-

"While I believe I have the authority to carry out this military action without specific congressional authorization, I know that the country will be stronger if we take this course, and our actions will be even more effective," Obama said. "We should have this debate."

A Look at Syria **Developments Around** the World

The United States is considering launching a punitive strike against the regime of Syrian President Bashar Assad, blamed by the U.S. and the Syrian opposition for an Aug. 21 alleged chemical weapons attack in a rebel-held suburb of the Syrian capital of Damascus. The U.S. said the attack killed 1,429 people, including at least 426 children. Those numbers are significantly higher than the death toll of 355 provided by the aid group Doctors Without Borders. President Barack Obama said he has decided that the United States should take military action against Syria but will seek congressional authorization for the use of force. Here's a look at key Syria developments around the world Sunday amid heightened tensions over potential military action:

UNITED STATES:

Secretary of State John Kerry asserted the United States has evidence of sarin gas use in Syria. A day after President Barack Obama stepped back from his threat to launch an attack, Kerry said in interviews that the administration learned of the sarin use through samples of hair and blood provided to Washington by first responders in Damascus. SYRIA:

Syria's deputy foreign minister, Faysal Mikdad, claimed that Obama stepped back from his threat because his administration lacks evidence of

Syrian government involvement in purported poison gas attacks. Syria's state-run news agency SANA quoted Assad saying that his government is capable of confronting a U.S. strike, but did not carry his exact comments.

UNITED NATIONS: U.N. spokesman Martin Nesirky said that Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon asked the head of the U.N. chemical weapons inspection team to expedite the analysis of tests from samples collected from its visits to alleged chemical weapons attack sites in Syria. He said two Syrian government officials are observing the process as mandated by guidelines that safeguard the samples' chain of custody. Nesirky declined comment on when results were expected.

FRANCE:

Francois Fillon, France's ex-prime minister and leading figure in the opposition UMP party, said the French parliament should get the same privilege the U.S. Congress will have to vote on Syria intervention. France's parliament is scheduled to debate the issue Wednesday, but no vote is scheduled. President Francois Hollande backs Obama's decision for a strike. The French constitution doesn't require such a vote unless and until a French military intervention lasts longer than four months.

Pope Francis condemned the use of chemical weapons and called for a negotiated settlement to the civil war in Syria. Francis spoke with anguish about Syria: "My heart is deeply wounded by what is happening in Syria and anguished by the dramatic

developments" on the horizon, an apparent reference to the U.S. and France considering a military strike against the Syrian regime.

MEDITERRANEAN SEA:

Five U.S. Navy destroyers were in the eastern Mediterranean Sea — armed with dozens of Tomahawk cruise missiles, which have a range of about 1,000 nautical miles (1,151 miles, 1,852 kilometers) and are used for precise targeting. Obama announced Friday that "we are prepared to strike whenever we choose."

Iranian state TV said an Iranian parliamentary delegation in Damascus visited with Syrians allegedly injured in chemical weapons attacks that the Assad regime blames on rebels. They were also expected to meet with the Syrian prime minister and foreign

minister. **ISRAEL:**

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu Israel's prime minister tried to soothe a jittery nation unnerved by the standoff between the U.S. and Syria, saying Israel is "calm and selfassured" and ready for "any possible scenario." More Israelis lined up to receive free gas masks, fearing Israel could be targeted in retribution if Syria is hit by a punitive strike.

Syrian refugees continued crossing the border into Turkey, despite the delay of a possible U.S. military strike targeting Assad's government. Refugee Mohammed Yaser said arms shipments to rebels would hurt Assad more than a U.S. strike: "If they give us weapons, we can deal with it in one week."










We Should Be Mad as Heck and Not Take it Anymore

he next time you see your local legislator, in the store or at the gas station or wherever, I want you to look him or her in the eye and say,

"How the heck did this happen? And what the heck are you going to do about it?"

Don't mince words. You're upset. You should be. You just found out that in Idaho, certain lobbyists receive government pensions even though they're not government employees.

Idaho is one of 20 states that allow this practice, according to the Associated Press. Our system lets lobbyists and their organizations represent their special interests while getting to be on the same taxpayer-funded pension system as all the other government workers. They partake in and benefit from the same absurd system that lets employees retire at 50 years-old and receive a monthly check until they die.

When the pension system is underfunded, as it has been in recent years, taxpayers have to kick in more money, not only to protect the lifetime post-employment retirement benefit of ex-government workers, but to make sure the lobbyists on the state pension system do OK, too. These are the same lobbyists who spend their time and energy writing laws to benefit themselves, usually at the expense of taxpayers. So hey, why shouldn't they get a piece of the lucrative retirement system controlled by the lawmakers they're trying to influence?

The organizations that benefit from this extreme example of cronyism include the employees of the Idaho Association of Counties, Association of Idaho Cites, Idaho School Boards Association and the Idaho Education Association. Some of these organizations' lobbyists do quite well, pulling in six-figure salaries that make their pensions far more lucrative than what lesser-paid public sector pensioners receive.

This system is not news to me. My team of researchers first wrote about it in 2010.

What has me wound up about it now, apart from Associated Press story of a few days ago that exposed the issue again, is the lack of outrage among our own lawmakers about the practice, both then and now.

In 2011, state Rep. Stephen Hartgen, R-Twin Falls, proposed a bill that would require non-government pension organizations to be subject to the state's public records law. The measure was, shall I say, an uninspiring tactic. Lobbyists would get to keep their pension, in exchange for public access to their records. As milquetoast as Hartgen's proposal was, it got almost no support from the House Commerce and Human Resources Committee. Since then, lawmakers have been silent on the subject.

When IdahoReporter.com asked lawmakers a few days ago about Idaho's practice, no one jumped at the chance to right this wrong. There was certainly no outrage. Not even a little pretend righteous indignation.

State Rep. Paul Romrell, R-St. Anthony, appeared skeptical. "I would think that you'd have to draw a public salary to be on" the pension system, he said. He promised to do some more research on the subject. So did Sen. Fred Martin, a Boise Republican.

Sen. Marv Hagedorn, who has been in the Legislature for seven years, said he's been aware of the situation and believes it's something "we need to dive into." He told IdahoReporter.com that he's still trying to understand why private groups are enrolled in the public pension system.

I'm more inspired by the lawmakers in other states. The state Senate majority leader in Pennsylvania told Watchdog.org that he will work to end the practice in his state. New Jersey Republicans are also vowing to cut lobbyists from receiving the government perk. New York lawmakers are preparing to tackle the problem. A Kansas newspaper demanded lawmakers put the pension practice on ice.

Maybe Idaho's elected officials just need to hear a bit more from us.

Can Pot be Stopped at the Border?

ince Washington state and Colorado voters last year chose to create a legal marketplace for marijuana, and other nearby states like Idaho watched closely — or, like Oregon, positioned themselves to follow suit – the big question has been: What will the federal government do?

Marijuana is still banned under federal law, and nothing in the law stops federal officials and agents from swooping into Washington and Colorado and imprisoning, at least in theory, a whole lot of people for doing something their states have OK'd.

There's also this, however: Law enforcement officials, and prosecutors, always have made choices about which laws to enforce, and how. There are far too many laws on the books; too many infractions, misdemeanors, and even felonies to even consider trying to enforce them all with equal force.

Talk privately to a cop or a prosecutor, and they'll probably acknowledge a



kind of triage: usually, they enforce strenuously laws aimed at protecting people from some kind of specific harm. Murder and other violent crime, for example, are very high priority, which seems to make sense.

When Attorney General

Eric Holder on Thursday issued his department's policy on marijuana in the age of state legalization, he seemed to bear that concept in mind. As an operating principle, he said, the department would let Washington and Colorado (and other states) do their thing on "marijuana-related conduct" — but he also provided a collection of eight red flags that might draw in federal responses.

Those "enforcement priorities," listed in a "memorandum for all United States attorneys," include keeping pot from being distributed

to minors; keeping money from marijuana sales out of the hands of criminal elements; keeping pot from seeping out of smoking states to non-smoking states; keeping legal market activity from being used as a cover for illegal activity; preventing violence or use of firearms in cultivation and distribution; preventing drugged driving; avoiding grows on public lands; and barring marijuana use on federal lands.

In deciding whether the feds should jump in, the memo said, "The primary question in all cases — and in all jurisdictions — should be whether the conduct at issue implicates one or more of the enforcement priorities listed above."

The point might be made, though it wasn't explicitly by the department, that all these things already have been happening under prohibition, and that a legal market regime might be best judged not by absolute compliance, but by improvement.

Still, while the new feder-

al rule is a long way from an open free-for-all, it has set down, for the first time, a set of rules under which states could legalize without risk of federal pre-emption. That may be important.

It's likely, for example, to increase the odds that Oregon will vote for legalization next year, since the terms of federal cooperation now are a lot clearer.

And for Idaho, the question will arise: How can Washington (and maybe Oregon, and conceivably Nevada too) draw the line at their border so that legal pot doesn't cross to the Gem State? Does the border at Idaho, totally porous without any slowdowns to the west now, start to sprout checkpoints and enhanced law enforcement?

Takeaways: Five Things From Boise State-Washington



SEATTLE • As the Boise State football program vacillated between the then-Big East and Mountain West conferences last winter, some fans pondered the possibility of a future pairing with the Pac-

If Boise State academics continue to improve on its current trajectory, in five to 10 years, who is to say it absolutely couldn't happen?

Over the last decade, the Broncos have more than held their own against teams from the big five conferences.

The Pac-12 is still the premier speed conference.

In the worst loss for Boise State football in the Chris Petersen era, the Broncos, with one the fastest teams in program history, looked like an under-qualified mare in the Kentucky Derby.

Washington isn't exactly the Secretariat of the Pac-12.

Maybe the home crowd and new environment enlivened the Huskies, maybe the turbo no-huddle spread was too much too soon, but from the press box, Boise State looked outmatched, with fewer top level athletes on both sides of the ball.

What five things stood

Defensive Backs

The size of the Broncos' defensive backs posed a concern for fans going into Saturday, and the Huskies offense went out of its way to exploit Donte Deayon and Bryan Douglas, calling a bevy of bubble screens, which seemed to move the chains each time, setting up bigger plays later in the game as the Broncos safeties were forced to cheat up to help. The Broncos will face bigger receivers and better passing games this year, so this could be a recurring and possibly debilitating problem.

Conservative Offense

The Broncos played almost exclusively out of a no-huddle spread, which was bereft

of the shifting that made Boise State so recognizable before the snap. The offensive alignment was generic, and passing plays were a preponderance of underneath routes. Boise State quarterback Joe Southwick completed 25 passes for just over 150 yards, a paltry yards per completion average of about six.

Receivers Fail to Launch

Shane Williams-Rhodes, who was expected to help re-ignite an offense that lost its explosiveness last season, didn't play all that much, and was rarely in sight when he did, catching two garbage time throws. A bigger concern was that Boise State receivers struggled to beat their defenders in press coverage, disallowing the kind of separation that creates big plays downfield. Like the Broncos defensive backs, Boise State receivers lost most of their hand-battles at the line of scrimmage. Maybe it's because they practice against said small defensive backs? The receivers' vaunted speed was not apparent either.

Defense Outmatched

Washington averaged an Oregon-esque 16 seconds per snap in the first half. Broncos defenders said they were not surprised by the fast-break no-huddle spread. Linebacker Corey Bell had no response when asked whether the breakdowns were of a mental or physical nature. Was Boise State not properly conditioned? Were they outschemed or out-manned? Both?

Jay Ajayi

His line didn't scream superstar: 23 carries for 93 yards.

But give most backs those holes and they'd be lucky to crack 75. Ajayi showed why he was all the

rave this summer, as most of his yards came after initial contact. The sophomore was clearly the Broncos' best player, a relentless display of power and elusiveness. To Ajayi the Broncos may have to entrust the largest of production tote bags, but he appears more than capable of carrying it.

or queen. If he has a trump honor and uses it wisely, you can create a fourth defensive trick from nowhere. You cash the diamond queen at trick two, hoping that partner will show out, but both East and South follow suit. No matter; you next play the diamond three.

If the layout is as shown in the diagram and partner remembers to ruff in with the jack (he should, since you are known to have the diamond ace), there is no way for declarer to succeed. He must overruff, but now you will come to both a trump trick and a black

Note that if you don't try to promote a trump but exit passively with a heart at trick three, declarer draws trump and runs the diamond jack, pitching a club, after which he has the rest with the help of the spade finesse.

ANSWER: It is hard to reconstruct the full hand, but dummy rates to have short spades and both minors, and declarer to have some degree of diamond fit. Meanwhile, partner perhaps has both majors — and maybe only two or three clubs. A low-spade lead might set up tricks for our side as fast as anything, but the heart nine is far safer, if less aggressive.


