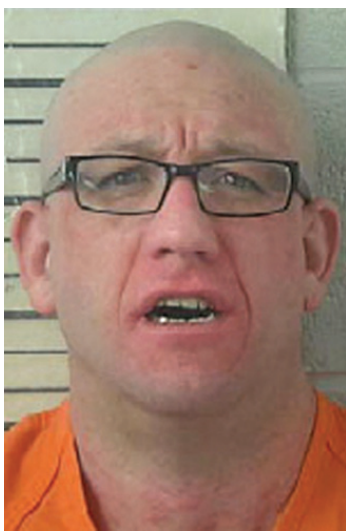

Attempt to serve warrant results in pursuit.

ELKO, Nev. • A Carlin, Nev., man who allegedly robbed a bank in Twin Falls earlier this summer was pursued by law enforcement officers Wednesday and shot after he pointed a rifle at an officer.

Twin Falls police identified Jake Rowe as the suspect in a July 9 robbery at Zions Bank. Officers from Twin Falls, Carlin, Nev., and Elko County deputies approached Rowe on Wednesday afternoon, but he fled in a Toyota 4-Runner SUV.

Twin Falls Police Sgt. John Wilson said Twin Falls police had warrants issued for Jake and Linda Rowe of Carlin, Nev. for the Twin Falls Zions Bank robbery.

"A couple detectives were down

in Elko (Wednesday) trying to get the warrants served," he said.

The officers and deputies pursued him in vehicles over dirt roads and off road for 25 to 30 miles before his car got stuck in a ravine and he abandoned it, according to Elko County Undersheriff Clair Morris.

Rowe continued to run on foot and was chased for another four miles. Morris thought the suspect was about eight miles north of the Carlin Honor Camp at that time.

Rowe eventually settled in a saddle between two mountain ridges, Morris said. A plane was used to locate him.

Rowe allegedly pointed his rifle at an officer, and the officer fired at him. Rowe was hit once in the lower abdomen.

At 5:34 p.m., Rowe was in

custody.

Summit Air airlifted him to Northeastern Nevada Regional Hospital under guard. He was conscious when he left the scene, Morris said.

July Bank Robbery

Zions Bank on North Blue Lakes Boulevard in Twin Falls was robbed by a man who opened a satchel and showed a bank teller what appeared to be the grip of a handgun.

Police would not say whether the robber got away with any money. He fled on a red dirt bike, dumped it at the Twin Falls visitor center near the Perrine Bridge and got into a blue pickup, witnesses told police at the time.

Bank surveillance photos of the

suspect were distributed, and witnesses described him as a white male, 6 feet tall with a medium build, about 40 years old, with brown hair and a goatee.

Documentary Features Top Teacher

KUNA • The past year has been surreal for Kuna Middle School math teacher Shelby Harris.

Filming started in February for the documentary "TEACH," directed by Academy Award-winning director Davis Guggenheim.

It follows the lives of four American teachers as they navigate the school year with a new learning program.

"TEACH" will air on CBS at 7 p.m. Friday with an encore presentation Sept. 14 on the new television station Pivot.

The 90-minute movie, narrated by Queen Latifah, follows Harris's journey as she implements the Khan Academy on-line pilot program in her seventh-grade math class.

In early 2013, 47 schools and more than 10,000 K-12 students across Idaho joined the nation's first statewide pilot of the Khan Academy, a free online tool that covers subjects from basic math to college-level biology and art history.

Full implementation starts this school year in several schools in south-central Idaho, including Burley Senior High School and Good-

ing Joint School.

The film "TEACH" depicts several months in Harris's class, where she and her math students implement Khan Academy into the classroom.

"At first I was a little overwhelmed," said Harris, a 14-year teacher. "But I was excited to be able to bring something new into the classroom. I'm usually that way, open to trying new things and what's best for the kids."

Harris said she initially thought the new technology would distance her from her students, but she found the opposite was true.

"I teach better now than I have in 13 years," she said. "They get more teaching time from me now than they ever did before."

Each of her students uses ChromeBooks to access online material to work one-on-one with her, independently or in groups.

Harris said her advice to teachers using Khan Academy for the first time is to prepare for a complete shift in classroom dynamics.

"It goes from a teacher-centered to a student-centered classroom," she said.

She also recommended that teachers learn to read the data, keep their eyes on the goal and use Khan to supplement classroom studies.

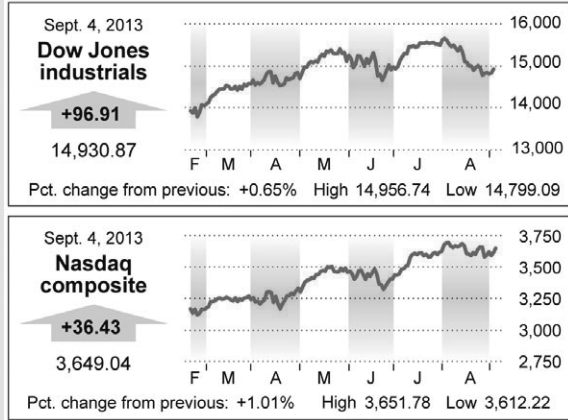

Hidden History
Rare Photos of Perrine from 1906

Hortense, the daughter of Don McKay from Shoshone, married I.B. “Burt” Perrine, in 1892, when she was 17. Her husband was 14 years her senior.

Burt Perrine, center, is seated in a chair now owned by the Twin Falls County Historical Society.

The man standing next to Burt Perrine is identified only as Mr. Clark.

Although unidentified, the photographer could have been Clarence Bisbee, who came to Twin Falls in January 1906.

“I made a few motion blur images while covering the Twin Falls County fair last week.

“Because I cover the fair every year, I felt like mixing it up a bit this time for some of my carnival ride shots. I’ve shot standard blur images of fair rides before to convey motion but I hadn’t tried much



with panning.

“For the daytime image I dropped my ISO to 50 and closed my aperture to f11 allowing me to lower my shutter speed down to 1/25th of a second. Using such a slow shutter speed allowed me to easily blur the action while I panned one particular pod, eventually getting one of the passengers in focus.”

Storms Give Way to Cooler Weather

Strong storms over the last several days dumped much-needed rain on the region and we could get more strong storms as we go through today.

As a slow moving upper-level storm comes ashore in the Pacific Northwest, more moisture will stream into southern Idaho. the front brings continued risk of strong storms and heavy rains.

Today will remain warm and muggy with a mixture of sunshine and clouds, with scattered showers and storms possible. Some of these storms will have localized heavy rain, gusty winds, possible small hail and lightning. High temperatures in the afternoon will be in the mid to upper 80s.

The good news is, we get a break from the storms and muggy weather on Friday. As the upper-level storm system comes onshore it should track to the north-northeast, bringing cooler and drier air into southern Idaho. Highs on Friday will be in the low 80s.

Sunshine and cooler weather will continue into the weekend. Highs on Saturday will be in the low to mid 80s and the low 80s on Sunday.

Bloated Chobani Yogurt Not a Health Concern, Officials Say

TWIN FALLS • Tainted Chobani yogurt cups being pulled from retail shelves nationwide don't pose a health threat, public health officials said Wednesday.

News surfaced over the weekend that 35 types of Chobani products originating from its Twin Falls facility were contaminated, causing consumer complaints throughout the United States.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has not declared a mandatory recall of Chobani's yogurt, meaning the tainted yogurt isn't a public safety issue, said Patrick Guzzle, a spokesman for the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare.

Grocers nationwide received emails from Chobani Tuesday, instructing them to pull a variety of

yogurt cups from shelves. Consumers throughout Twin Falls describe the affected cups as bulging and sour. The tainted yogurt tastes bad because it's overly cultured, Guzzle said.

"From my perspective, it's not (a health hazard)," Guzzle said. "In this, I'm speaking on a microbiological basis. The yeast in yogurt will generally out-compete any harmful bacteria in the yogurt. From a food safety perspective, it is technically not a health concern. A person, that is,

shouldn't get sick (if they eat the tainted product)." Although it is not technically dangerous to consume Chobani yogurt in the voluntary recall, don't eat it, said Melody Bowyer of the South Central Public Health District.

"If you see a yogurt container that's bulging, that's a good, tell-tale sign that it shouldn't be consumed," Bowyer said. "We should always be vigilant about what we're consuming. If you have any Chobani yogurt in your fridge, make sure it's not one of the re-

called products. If it is, you should get a full refund and discard the product."

In an email to the *Times-News* Tuesday, a Chobani spokeswoman wrote that the bad yogurt represents less than 5 percent of the company's total production. Retailers should remove containers with the code 16-012 and expiration dates Sept. 11 to Oct. 7, she wrote.

Repeated calls and emails to the company seeking additional comment Wednesday went unreturned.

Sheriff: Unknown if Safety was Engaged in Hunting Accident

BURLEY • The condition of a 10-year-old girl shot Sunday in a hunting accident remains unknown, as family members requested privacy Wednesday.

Cedar Glaesemann, who lives in the Jackson area of Cassia County, suffered a head wound after she apparently fell while carrying a .410 shotgun while hunting with family members.

Emergency personnel were called to 1450 E. 800 N. in the Jackson area. Cedar was taken to Minidoka Memorial Hospital and transferred by air ambulance to Primary Children's Medical Center in Salt Lake City.

The girl's family asked the hospital to not release the girl's condition, medical center spokeswoman Bonnie Midget said Wednesday.

"They are requesting privacy at this time, so we have to comply with their wishes," said Midget.

Cedar was dove hunting with her brother, father and grandfather in a "fan pattern," with the girl at one

end, when she apparently stumbled on some rocks and fell, causing the gun to go off, the county Sheriff's Office reported.

The girl's grandfather, Darwin Glaesemann, told deputies that he did not see the accident but thought the child stumbled on some rocks and fell.

Her father, Derick Glaesemann, described a similar scenario to a deputy.

Cassia County Sheriff Jay Heward said he did not know whether the safety lock was engaged on the child's shotgun.

"(Whether the safety) is on or off on a gun doesn't really matter," Heward said. "With the right amount of force, a gun can still go off."

Heward said he once was with someone who dropped a gun with the safety lock engaged, and the gun still fired.

The deputy reported that he examined the shotgun and found a spent shell still in the action. A large chip out of the buttstock appeared to be fresh, the report says.

The incident was ruled an accident by the sheriff's office, and the case is closed.

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House Fire in Twin Falls Out Quickly

TWIN FALLS • Firefighters extinguished a house fire in Twin Falls Wednesday in about 10 minutes.

At 5:38 p.m., Twin Falls firefighters got a call about smoke pouring from the windows of 658 Jackson Street.

Battalion Chief Jack Barnes said it appeared that the fire started within a couch inside the home.

No one was home at the time of the fire, he said.

"There's pretty heavy smoke damage throughout," Barnes said.

Barnes said firefighters had the fire under control by 5:47 p.m. Flames were contained to the couch area, Barnes said.

An investigator was on scene Wednesday evening and the investigation into the cause of the blaze remains under investigation.

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Gourmet Food for a Cause

TWIN FALLS • An Epicurean Evening returns next weekend with gourmet food and wine as St. Luke's Magic Valley's Health Foundation raises funds for an air ambulance hangar.

At the "strolling supper," attendees sample appetizers, entrees and desserts from 14 chefs and restaurants, said Terry Rowe, foundation events coordinator. They also can bid in live and silent auctions.

Epicurean Evening was started 21 years ago to support St. Luke's Health Foundation projects.

"It started out small and grew over time," Rowe said.

New chefs are on board this year, she said, and some of the most popular auction items are the chefs' desserts.

Ticketholders' names will be drawn to select six guest judges, who will decide on awards for chefs. Other attendees will vote for People's Choice awards.

Cocktail attire is recommended. "We encourage people to dress up," Rowe said.

But what's most important is raising money for the hangar, she said. The foundation began a \$500,000 campaign last November for the cause.

Those who buy event tickets will see their money at work immediately, said Alice Elwood, the foundation's major gifts and planned giving officer.

She said the hangar could be done by Dec. 1. "We need to get it done."

The 3,800-square-foot hangar would be erected on the hospital's heliport at a cost of \$492,852.

The hangar is needed to hasten response times.

Without it, the helicopter must be housed at the Jerome Airport in winter — adding at least 15 minutes to any patient transport.

Response times can be a matter of life or death, Rowe said. With the hangar project, "We figure we're saving lives."

Federal Aviation Administration rules say air ambulances can't be launched when control surfaces are covered in frost.

In south-central Idaho, that's often from October to April — or longer.

During those months, the helicopter crew stays in an apartment near the Jerome Airport. After picking up the medical crew and any needed equipment at St. Luke's Magic Valley, they head out to pick up a patient.

Even during summer, when the helicopter is at the

hospital, weather is an issue. When it gets too hot, the hospital must equip the copter with protective shades, electric air conditioning and rotor blade tie-down restraints.

Air St. Luke's serves south-central Idaho's eight counties plus northern Nevada. The flying ambulance made 473 pickups in 2012.

The St. Luke's foundation is about halfway to its hangar fundraising goal. It raised more than \$100,000 through the Festival of Trees fundraiser in December and hopes to bring in \$50,000 more by selling 300 tickets to the Epicurean Evening event.

"It is always humbling to see the inspiring work of teachers like Shelby Harris," Khan said in a news release. "Her work only increases my anticipation of seeing the 232 Idaho teachers incorporate Khan Academy into their classrooms this fall. We thank them for their commitment to improving education for students of today and tomorrow."

In August, Harris went to Los Angeles to preview the documentary with the other featured teachers, Matt Johnson, a fourth-grade instructor at McGlone Elementary in Denver; Lindsay Chinn, a ninth-grade algebra teacher at MLK Early College in Denver; and Joel Laguna, a 10th-grade AP World History teacher at Garfield High in Los Angeles.

"I loved it," Harris said. "I think it's an accurate and honest portrayal of how tough our job is."

Khan, which has 6 million users a month, provides free online materials — instructional

videos, practice exercises, dashboard analytics and teacher tools — that support personalized education for users of all ages.

The pilot program is an initiative of the J.A. and Kathryn Albertson Foundation, a private, family foundation committed to education.

Khan Academy's founder, Sal Khan, held a two-day workshop in Boise last year. Its success led the Albertson Foundation and Khan Academy to become partners on the pilot project.

The Albertson Foundation provided \$1.5 million in grants for technology, training and technical assistance and is also in partnership with Northwest Nazarene University.

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LDS Missionary in Car Crash not Expected to Live

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • A 19-year-old Mormon missionary from California who was critically injured in a car crash in Idaho is not expected to live, LDS officials said Wednesday.

Taylor Ward, of Vacaville, Calif., and another missionary with The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints were in a two-car crash Tuesday evening in southeastern Idaho, state police said. Ward was the passenger in a sedan driven by fellow missionary John Floyd, 20, of Deep Run, N.C.

Idaho state police said Floyd drove through a stop sign. The car then collided with the passenger side of a Ford F-350 pickup truck.

Ward was taken to Portneuf Medical Center in Pocatello, Idaho, where he was being kept on life support as his family makes decisions about donating his organs, hospital spokeswoman Brenda Stanley said.

The young missionary is not expected to survive, Mormon church spokesman Eric Hawkins said in a statement

Wednesday. Ward began his two-year mission in Pocatello, Idaho, in July, Hawkins said.

Church officials say there have been 10 missionary deaths this year from accident or illness. That's higher than normal: there are usually only a few deaths per year, the church said in posting on its website. The church notes, however, that there were similar death totals in 2003 and 2008, without giving the exact figures for those years.

Five of this year's deaths have made news headlines, including two that occurred the last two weeks.

On Aug. 31, Jose Daniel Encarnacion Montero, 20, of the Dominican Republic, was killed in Cali, Colombia, when he was hit by a stray bullet. Encarnacion was with three other missionaries when he was killed, but they weren't harmed.

On Aug. 25, Jason Wiberg, 19, of Roy, Utah, died after being hit by a car while on bicycle in Kuching, Malaysia. Wiberg had been on mission since October 2012.

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Idaho Poised to Open New Hatchery

BOISE (AP) • Idaho fisheries biologists are getting ready to open the doors on a new \$13.5 million hatchery they hope will bolster and help restore the population of endangered sockeye salmon.

The Springfield Hatchery is the latest byproduct of efforts in the last two decades by state, tribal and federal fisheries experts to prevent extinction of the fish. The formal dedication of the facility, located near the American Falls Reservoir in eastern Idaho is scheduled for Friday.

Once open, biologists project the hatchery will be capable of producing up to 1 million ju-

venile sockeye annually for release into the lakes of the Sawtooth Valley in central Idaho.

If all goes according to plan, the first batch of sockeye smolts could be released as early as 2015, with production increasing to 1 million by 2017 and ideally setting off the return of 10,000 adult sockeye to Idaho rivers and spawning areas as early as 2019.

“This gets us on a road to recovery,” Jeff Heindel, hatchery production coordinator for Idaho Department of Fish and Game, told *The Idaho Statesman*.

The state received funding to build the hatchery in 2008

when it, other Northwest states and most Columbia River treaty tribes signed agreements known as the Columbia River Fish Accords. The ultimate goal is to boost numbers of a fish protected under the Endangered Species Act in 1993, one year after the return of just one fish, a male dubbed Lonesome Larry in 1992. No fish made the 900-mile journey up the Columbia, Snake and Salmon rivers to Stanley Basin in 1990. The additional incubation and rearing space at the new hatchery will produce juveniles to be released each spring. Two years later, when

the adults return, a portion of those will be allowed to spawn naturally or be transplanted to Alturus, Pettit and eventually Yellowbelly and Stanley lakes to spawn.

At the same time, biologists intend to take their time with recovery. For example, if too many hatchery fish are planted in the lakes, it could set back the program to preserve the genetic diversity of naturally spawning Snake River sockeye. So, if 10,000 fish eventually return, fishermen might one day be allowed to catch up to 5,000 “surplus” fish in Sawtooth lakes and rivers.

Elk Group Gives Idaho \$50,000 for Wolf Management

BOISE (AP) — A leading wildlife group has agreed to give Idaho \$50,000 to assist with the state’s wolf management plan.

The grant from the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation will expand the radio collar program to help biologists get a better understanding of the size and territory of a wolf pack.

The *Idaho Statesman* reports the radio collars are also useful for charting home range, biological traits

and other behavior that can help shape more effective management policy.

Foundation President David Allen says to properly carry out science-based management it’s critical for states to better recognize and understand predator-prey relationships and wolf populations.

Idaho Department of Fish and Game administrator Brad Compton says the grant comes at a time when federal funding is shrinking.

credentials for the top spot, also were denied.

Idaho Code Section 9-340C(1), however, requires disclosure of a current or former employee’s or public official’s “employment history, classification, pay grade and step, longevity, gross salary and salary history, status, workplace and employing agency.”

The fire chief’s job description was provided Wednesday only after the *Times-News* agreed to submit a public records request.

Whether the city will advertise the open position or hire from within is unknown.

“None of that has been determined,” said City Administrator Polly Hulsey. “It is still all so new.”

Before resigning, Krill said he asked Mayor John Shine if he could transition into a position as an on-call deputy chief.

Krill said he had taken a job as an independent consultant and couldn’t spend as many hours as city fire chief. His solution was to revive a city program that paid deputies only when called

for service, anticipating that Hughes could take over as interim chief. Krill expected to work no more than 10 hours a month for \$16 per hour.

Krill declined to say Wednesday whether he was put on mandatory leave after submitting the transition proposal to Shine and Hulsey.

“They were receptive to it, but they were unsure how to make it work,” he said. “It wasn’t going to be easy, and there were a lot more steps than I originally anticipated.”

Krill detailed the job description in an Aug. 12 email to Shine that eventually was forwarded to several city employees and on Wednesday was obtained by the *Times-News*.

On Aug. 23, the *Times-News* requested all emails from the mayor, Krill, Monahan and Hulsey from Aug. 1-23.

Krill’s email detailing his proposal was not among those provided, though, despite City Clerk Shonna Fraser’s claim Aug. 28 that none of the emails had been redacted.

The *Times-News* since has submitted a new public records request asking for all

emails to and from the same employees, but also requesting justifications if any emails are denied. Tuesday, the city asked for a 10-day extension and said results should be ready by Sept. 12.

Krill said working for the city, overall, was a rewarding experience.

He was hired as deputy chief in 2011 and was promoted to chief in 2012 to replace Mike Hatfield.

In April, Krill and city officials were lambasted after a resident was billed \$96,700 for the department’s response to a fire in a large, downtown building. The bill eventually was retracted and labeled a mistake.

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Obama Heads to Congress without a Shark Cage

Last time around, there were a lot of known unknowns. We were told of aluminum tubes and a mushroom cloud that only National Security Adviser Condoleezza Rice could see, and shown a picture of a white van that Vice President Dick Cheney swore to Secretary of State Colin Powell was a mobile weapons lab. President George W. Bush preferred to act before knowing the knowns rather than take the risk that actual information — the findings of United Nations weapons inspectors — might thwart his dream of invading Iraq to remove Saddam Hussein.

This time, we have as much certainty as you can have that the weapons of mass destruction exist, were used by Syrian President Bashar Assad and killed 1,500 of his citizens. We have pictures of children foaming at the mouth and bodies lined up in a makeshift morgue.

And yet, in 2003, with almost nothing to go on, Congress voted in favor of invading Iraq. In 2013, with everything to go on, it’s going to be an uphill slog to get lawmakers to approve a limited punitive strike against the Syrian government.

For President Barack Obama, the next two weeks will be harder than making it from Havana to the Florida Keys, spending days and nights alone, swimming against the tide. He’s up against a House of Representatives that doesn’t take advice or follow its leader. The 2011 military action in Libya was over with-



out the House ever getting its act together to vote.

The one Republican you didn’t hear crying for a congressional vote on Syria was House Speaker John Boehner. He can’t get his caucus together to vote on things that are in its interest to pass; imagine trying to herd his cats to a vote on Syria. On Tuesday, Boehner emerged from the White House to say he would support Obama and urged his colleagues to do the same. Good luck to the speaker in bringing together his hawks, who believe the president is a wimp and that we should have bombed Syria to smithereens yesterday, with his isolationists, who can’t name a war they would fight.

Part of the problem is Obama. To hurt him, his opponents are willing to hurt themselves more. Even though they had even more to gain from immigration reform than Democrats, Republicans couldn’t get a bipartisan bill to a vote in the House. And although the public will certainly blame them, many Republicans are itching to shut down the government on any pretext — defunding Obama’s health-care law, curbing the budget, raising the debt ceiling. Stars such as Sens. Ted Cruz and Rand Paul will line up to flip off the lights at the Washington Monument.

In fact, the likes of Cruz and Paul have replaced measured, politics-stops-at-the-water’s-edge Republicans such as former senators Richard Lugar and Olympia Snowe. There’s a new breed of senator who knows everything upon arrival and is too much in a hurry to get to the Oval Office to stop and think. Obama will never get their support.

Besides ambition, add lopsided polls: A bad war has killed the tolerance of most Americans for any war. At the same time Americans overwhelmingly want Obama to consult Congress, they overwhelmingly don’t want to intervene in Syria. Taken together, you can only conclude that the public is hoping Congress stops the president.

Will there be profiles in courage — members (such as Boehner) up for re-election in 2014 who go against their constituents? It’s more likely that even in the face of life and death, the default position of opposing the president no matter what will prevail. That’s more compelling than sending a message to the Syrian regime, which has used WMDs, and others such as Iran and North Korea that may hope to.

Even those Republicans who are in favor of action can’t agree on the kind of action to take. On Sept. 1, Sen. John McCain said it would be “catastrophic” not to strike Syria but that he could only support Obama if the president committed to winning on the battlefield, forcing Assad from power and arm-

ing the Syrian rebels.

Obama wishes for those outcomes but isn’t prepared to expose U.S. troops while trying to achieve them in the terrible crossfire of a civil (and religious) war. It’s hard to see how Obama gets straight with McCain and his close ally Senator Lindsey Graham, who in any event constitute a small bloc. Go too far in their direction, and Obama risks losing his left-wing doves and anti-interventionists/isolationists, an alliance that almost curtailed the president’s domestic-surveillance authority. Don’t go far enough, and he gives succor to the too-little, too-late caucus.

By going to Congress, Obama empowers 535 would-be commanders-in-chief who see General George Patton in the mirror each morning. But there’s also the slight chance that congressional involvement will improve the response to Syria, pushing it beyond a small strike to degrading Assad’s arsenal and arming non-jihadist rebels with sophisticated weapons without exposing U.S. troops to harm or getting mired in a Middle East conflict. We’ve done that already.

Punishing Assad may not accomplish much, but not punishing him sets a terrible precedent: that we will let pass the use of chemical weapons. Even though the something to be done isn’t perfect, something is sometimes all you can get.

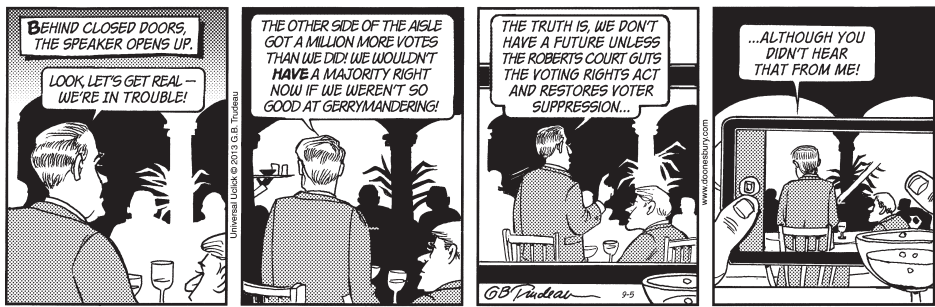

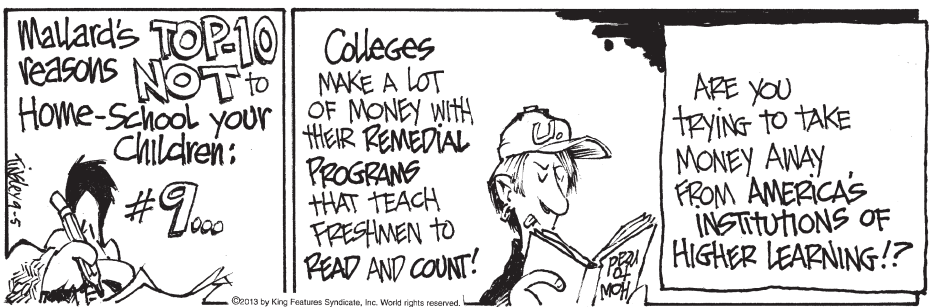

Familiar Faces Await Vandals in Laramie

MOSCOW • On Saturday afternoon in Laramie, Wyo., Paul Petrino will go for his first win as Idaho football coach. And on the other sideline, Chris Tormey and Jason Gesser will be part of a staff that will try to outwit him — after both were bypassed for the job that Petrino wound up getting.

Three of the five finalists for the Vandals head job will be at War Memorial Stadium for a nonconference matchup between Wyoming and Idaho (2 p.m., ROOT Sports Northwest).

Tormey, in his second year as Cowboys defensive coordinator, coached the Vandals from 1995 to 1999. Gesser, Wyoming's quarterbacks coach, was Idaho's interim head coach when Robb Akey was fired last October and served two years on the Vandals' staff.

Both interviewed to be Akey's full-time replacement before Petrino was selected.

"That's pretty cool," Idaho senior receiver Najee Lovett said when asked about facing Gesser's new team. "(He) was our head coach and offensive coordinator last year, and it's going to be pretty cool to play against him."

Aside from Lovett and a few other holdovers, the Vandals' roster looks far different than the one that Gesser oversaw the final month of last season. More than 30 players who had eligibility left did not return and eight freshmen are listed on Idaho's depth chart this week.

Gesser is familiar, though, with Idaho quarterback Chad Chalich. As offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach, he helped mentor Chalich last year when he red-shirted.

Now Gesser is shepherding Brett Smith, Wyoming's talented junior quarterback who had 475 total yards last week in a near-upset at No. 18 Nebraska.

Asked about Gesser's influence on this week's game, Petrino said, "Nah, he ain't playing." After pausing, he added: "Look at the quarterback. He was a good player before he ever met (Gesser)."

Offense focused on timing: Idaho offensive coordinator Kris Cinkovich expects to see a different-looking offense — and dramatic improvement — on Saturday after the Vandals unraveled in their season-opening 40-6 loss at North Texas. But the progress, he said, has to start before the ball is snapped.

"We're spending a lot of time this week in between plays, because that's what we weren't very good at," Cinkovich said. "We know what to do and we can execute during the play, but we had to make improvement there because that's really not what our offense will look like."

After executing crisply in fall camp, the Vandals were stymied by 11 penalties (three in their first two drives) and three lost fumbles. They also burned their three first-half timeouts in the first two minutes, 40 seconds of the game because of trouble relaying plays from the sideline to Chalich.

"We were always bleeding too much time off the clock," Cinkovich said. "And some of that falls on the receivers usually because they're the ones that have got to go the farthest to line up. So we're making sure we get that fixed so we're not running all the play time off the clock like we did."

Altitude indifference: Wyoming's home field sits at an elevation of 7,220 feet, the highest of any Division I stadium. But Petrino isn't concerned about how his team will operate in the thin air, just like he's not focused on the officials, weather or anything else he can't control.

"You don't talk about it. You don't worry about it," he said. "In my opinion, I think you just go play. I coached at Utah State; it was the same thing. Some teams came in and worried about it and it was a big advantage to us. But some teams didn't worry about it and I don't think it was any advantage."

Six-Man Football Returns to Southern Idaho Fields

Raft River's junior varsity tops Camas County in first six-man game in District IV in around 60 years.

MALTA • The Camas County football players weren't too concerned about making history Wednesday night.

They just wanted to play football.

And despite the Musers' 28-12 loss to Raft River's junior varsity team in the first 6-man football game played in Idaho's District IV in about 60 years, there was a feeling of pride on the visitors' sideline.

"We've mentioned in the huddle that this is in our blood; this is Camas football. We used to have a 6-man team a long time ago," said junior Isaac Simon, whose grandfather played 6-man for Camas County.

Facing dwindling enrollment and without a nearby school with which to join in a cooperative, Camas County was in danger of losing its football program until the Idaho High School Activities Association board voted last winter to pilot a 6-man league.

So far, the idea hasn't caught on with small schools across the state, with Clark County being the only other to adopt 6-man this season. That leaves Camas County to fill out its schedule with Montana teams and JV squads from Idaho's 8-man and 11-man programs, such as Raft River, to play this game with modified rules and an 80-

yard field.

"It's a lot different," said Raft River's Wacey Holtman, who scored two rushing touchdowns and recovered a Musher fumble in the end zone for another score. "It's fun, because I like a physical game. I'm used to stretching it out on the sidelines, but they made (the field narrower), so it's a lot less running room."

At its fundamental core, football at any level is tackling, blocking and ball security. Camas County struggled with that last element, fumbling the ball away seven times.

But perhaps that can be expected for a program transitioning to 6-man, where all linemen are eligible receivers, the quarterback isn't allowed to run upfield and 15 yards are required for a first down. In fact, the Musers' quarterback this season was the team's center last year.

"I'm proud of what we did tonight. Not so much the score, but what we were able to do, the good things that came out of it," said Camas coach Jason Ellingson. "With as many fumbles as we had, we didn't get beat, we lost the game tonight."

Let the record show that Simon scored southern Idaho's first 6-man touchdown in six decades. On the Musers' second possession, he took an option pitch from Erick Peterson and raced 54 yards for the initial score.

Simon added a 41-yard touchdown on another option pitch in the third quarter, giving Camas County a 12-9 lead.

But on its very next drive, Raft River answered, retaking the lead for good. The Trojans relied on their physical power running game all night, with Erickson and Braegon Erickson carrying the load. They

also took advantage of a few opportunistic passes from Koltin Hitt to Kayden Hitt.

But for the Musers, this was simply one game — albeit a historic one — in what the town of Fairfield hope is a successful season building toward a solvent football future. The Musers' next game is at Lima, Mont., on Sept. 14.

"We have some things to work on, but we did some things right, too," Simon said. "I'm really glad we're playing 6-man. It would have been terrible if we lost football as a program."

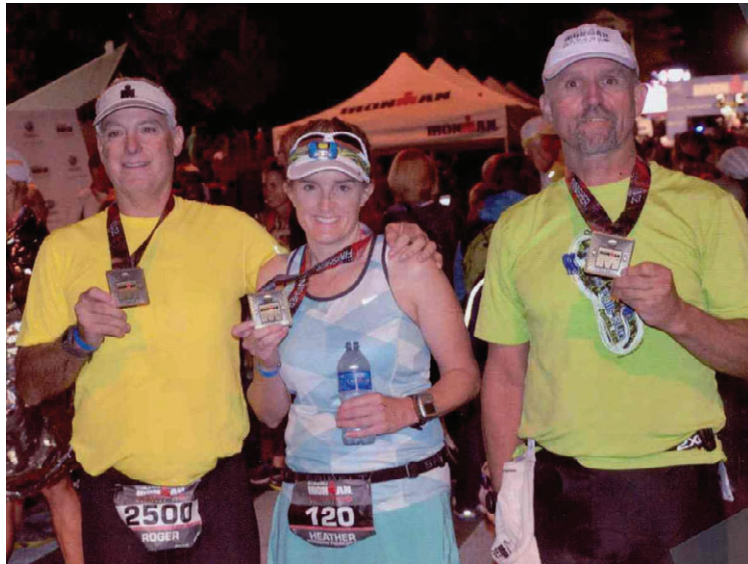

Broncos, Ravens Meet Again 8 Months Later

DENVER • John Elway has been down this lonely road before, trudging through the tunnel in deafening silence after a stunning loss at home as the AFC's prohibitive Super Bowl favorite following a 13-3 regular season.

It happened to Elway the quarter-back after the 1996 season when Denver lost to Jacksonville 30-27. It occurred again for Elway the executive in January when the Broncos were beaten 38-35 by Baltimore in the divisional round.

Elway rebounded the first time to win back-to-back Super Bowls. He said the pain of that pratfall against the Jaguars was the impetus to make them into champions.

“It was a great incentive for us to come back and have an even better year the following year,” Elway said.

After engineering a \$125 million offseason spending spree and acquiring wide receiver Wes Welker and massive right guard Louis Vasquez — to help new center Manny Ramirez fend off the likes of Ravens nose tackle Haloti Ngata — Elway is aiming for history to repeat itself after this latest heartbreak.

Five things to watch for as the Broncos kick off the season tonight against the champion Ravens:

ROADRAVENS: Joe Flacco looms larger than life in Denver, and not just because he engineered the stunning playoff upset with his 70-yard touchdown throw to Jacoby Jones that tied it at 35 with 31 seconds left in regulation.

The NFL's marketing machine put up gigantic banners of Flacco alongside Peyton Manning on the Bron-

cos' stadium to promote the league's first game of the 2013 season.

Fans are furious, Manning is miffed and Flacco is flummoxed.

Still, Flacco reasoned, “being hated is not a bad thing.”

This flag flap could have been avoided had baseball's Orioles moved their game tonight to accommodate the champs for a customary home kickoff.

“I'm not too worried about it,” Flacco said. “It's not like they're taking a home game away from us. They're just making us play on the road maybe earlier than we wanted to.”

ELVIS RETURNS: “Doom & Glowm” is what Elvis Dumervil and Von Miller called themselves in Denver, where the Pro Bowl pass rushers combined for 29½ of the Broncos'

league-leading 52 sacks in 2012.

Dumervil signed with the Ravens in free agency after his infamous fax foul-up in Denver led to his release by the Broncos.

He won't see Miller tonight because Denver's All-Pro linebacker is serving a six-game drug suspension. “He's like a younger brother,” Dumervil said. “We've spoken. We talk all the time. He's dealing with tough times and he'll fight through it.”

RAHIM'S REDEMPTION: Safety Rahim Moore is out to make amends for the most memorable mistake in Denver's playoff loss, when he mistimed his jump on Flacco's heave to Jones.

“I haven't seen it from him one snap or one second where he's dwelled on that,” Broncos secondary

coach Cory Undlin said. “If anything, he's used it as motivation.”

Veteran cornerback Champ Bailey appreciates Moore's accountability but noted there were plenty of goats in that game.

“He wasn't the guy that put us in that situation,” Bailey said. “So, we've all got to own that one.”

RAVENS REBUILT: For the first time in the Ravens' 18-year existence, Ray Lewis isn't manning middle linebacker. Daryl Smith, who signed a free agent deal in June, is the veteran replacement. He's a sure tackler entering his 10th season and could help provide some of the veteran presence the Ravens lost.

Smith was part of a Ravens defensive revamp as they also said goodbye to starters Ed Reed, Bernard Pollard, Paul Kruger and Cary Williams, and

hello to Dumervil, Chris Canty, Marcus Spears and Michael Huff.

Flacco parlayed his fantastic play-off run into a six-year, \$120.6 million contract, but also lost his two favorite targets as receiver Anquan Boldin was traded and tight end Dennis Pitta is sidelined with a fractured hip.

RECORD RETURNER: As a former special teams coordinator, Ravens coach John Harbaugh said he had “reluctant admiration” for Trindon Holliday, who piled up an NFL-record 248 yards in returns against the Ravens in January.

Denver's diminutive returner became the first NFL player to take back both a punt and a kickoff for TDs in a playoff game. Those touchdowns were the longest punt (90 yards) and kickoff (104 yards) returns for scores ever in the postseason.

Nadal Eases to U.S. Open Semis

NEW YORK • It's as though Rafael Nadal never left. If anything, he's playing better than ever.

A year after skipping the U.S. Open because of a bad knee, Nadal powered his way back to the semifinals at Flushing Meadows, overwhelming 19th-seeded Tommy Robredo 6-0, 6-2, 6-2 on Wednesday night.

"I think I played my best match at the U.S. Open this year. Great to be able to play your best match in the quarterfinals," Nadal said. "Playing a little better every day is a great feeling."

The second-seeded Nadal improved to 20-0 on hard courts in 2013, part of an overall record of 58-3 with nine titles, including his record eighth championship at the French Open in June. At the next Grand Slam tournament, though, Nadal flopped, exiting in the first round at Wimbledon.

That surprising defeat, against a guy ranked 135th, came on June 24. Feels like eons ago. Nadal hasn't lost a match to anyone since. His 12 major trophies include the 2010 U.S. Open, and he has reached at least the semifinals the past five times he entered the tournament. Nadal did not come to New York in 2012, part of about a seven-month absence due mainly to a left knee problem.

On Saturday, Nadal will face No. 8 Richard Gasquet, who edged No. 4 David Ferrer 6-3, 6-1, 4-6, 2-6, 6-3.

That one took nearly 3½ hours, and was filled with plenty of ebbs and flows, allowing Gasquet to reach his first major semifinal in six years. Nadal, meanwhile, was never challenged even the slightest bit by Robredo, who was coming off a fourth-round upset of 17-time Grand Slam champion Roger Federer. That stunning result scuttled the possibility of a Nadal-Federer showdown, which would have been the rivals' 32nd meeting on tour, but first at the U.S. Open.

Robredo had been 0-10 against Federer before finally beating him Monday. Perhaps that allowed Robredo to enter Wednesday believing he'd have a chance against Nadal, despite an 0-6 mark in their previous matches.

So much for that. This one lasted 1 hour, 40 minutes, and it really was over after 22 minutes. That's how long it took Nadal to dominate the first set, not only winning every game but also 24 of 29 points, including all seven that lasted 10 strokes or more.

It took Robredo 39 minutes to finally win a game, the ninth of the match, and some fans stood to applaud, probably hoping for a more competitive evening of tennis. At the changeover moments later, the videoboard in Arthur Ashe Stadium showed Donald Trump in his suite, and the cheers turned to boos.

With loud grunts, Nadal announced his violent, uppercut forehands, and they cut through the 20 mph wind, thick with spin, landing right near lines.

Through two sets, Nadal compiled a

19-2 edge in winners — the final tally was 28-10 — and that forehand of his also forced Robredo into plenty of errors. Actually, every aspect of Nadal's game worked. One backhand lob was curled so well, Robredo tossed his racket up in the air toward the ball, knowing he had no chance of reaching the perfectly placed shot. Nadal never faced a break point, and through five matches so far in New York this year, he has not lost serve once, a run of 67 games.

Nadal played at the French Open and Wimbledon with tape below his left knee, but not at the U.S. Open. He looks healthy as can be, covering the court well and tracking down shot after shot by his opponents. Now Nadal becomes Gasquet's problem. They've played 10 times on tour, and Nadal has won all 10.

"Last time I beat him, I was 13," Gasquet said, referring to a junior match he looked up on YouTube. "It was a long time ago." When Nadal was told about that, he smiled broadly. "Yeah, I think I lost 6-4 in the third," Nadal said. "Yeah, I remember."

The other two men's quarterfinals are Thursday, with No. 1 Novak Djokovic against No. 21 Mikhail Youzhny, and No. 3 Andy Murray against No. 9 Stanislas Wawrinka. Murray beat Djokovic in last year's U.S. Open final.

In the women's semifinals Friday, No. 1 Serena Williams faces No. 5 Li Na, and No. 2 Victoria Azarenka plays unseeded Flavia Pennetta.

Azarenka and Pennetta won their quarterfinals Wednesday.

Azarenka, a two-time Australian Open champion and last year's runner-up to Williams at Flushing Meadows, eliminated 48th-ranked Daniela Hantuchova 6-2, 6-3.

The 83rd-ranked Pennetta, who missed the 2012 U.S. Open because of right wrist surgery, reached her first Grand Slam semifinal with a 6-4, 6-1 victory over 10th-seeded Roberta Vinci.

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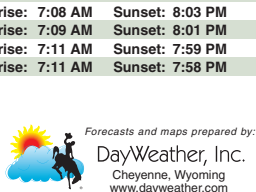

IMF Says Dynamics of Global Growth Shifting

WASHINGTON (AP) • The International Monetary Fund said Wednesday that it sees the dynamics of global growth shifting, with the major economies strengthening while developing countries slow.

The international lending agency released the assessment in advance of the Group of 20 summit of the world's largest economies, set to begin Thursday in Russia. The IMF forecast global growth will accelerate

in 2014 compared with this year.

It predicted the U.S. will be the main driver of global growth in the near term, as private demand, housing and labor markets all strengthen. European and Japanese economies recovering from a slump will also contribute.

Europe has just started to pull out of six quarters of contraction with a small expansion in the second quarter. However, Japan is expected to slow in 2014.

ALL EYES ON SYRIA

Idaho Lawmakers Wary of Strike against Syria

U.S. Sen. Jim Risch, R-Id., voted against President Barack Obama's proposed strike against Syria's chemical weapons infrastructure, underscoring skepticism among Idaho's representatives in Congress about the plan.

The measure passed 10-7 Wednesday in the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, moving it to the full Senate floor when Congress reconvenes Monday. This week, Risch and fellow Republican Sen. Mike Crapo, along with Reps. Mike Simpson and Raul Labrador, all told The Associated Press they're dubious a strike would really enhance U.S. power abroad, bring a swifter end to Syrian President Bashar Assad's regime or enhance Middle East stability.

Before voting against the measure, Risch told Secretary of State John Kerry during a hearing Tuesday that he's worried Assad could emerge a bolder, more-dangerous figure following strikes that aren't aimed at toppling his regime. "If we go in with a limited strike, and the day after, the week after, or the month after, Assad crawls out of his rat hole and says, 'Look, I stood up to the strongest power on the face of this earth and I won,'" Risch said.

The Republican senator said classified intelligence he's seen has convinced him Assad's government is "unquestionably" behind chemical weapons attacks. However, he's doubtful Obama's proposed response — not all-out war, rather surgical strikes aimed at crippling Assad's chemical weapons capacity — and its aftermath have been sufficiently calculated.

White House Praises Senate for Backing Plan

The White House is praising a Senate panel for backing President Barack Obama's call for a military strike in Syria.

White House press secretary Jay Carney says the measure approved by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee would uphold U.S. national security interests. He says it would degrade Syrian President Bashar Assad's chemical weapons capabilities and deter future use while working toward a political transition in Syria.

The resolution backing the use of force in response to a chemical weapons attack the U.S. blames on Assad's government won approval Wednesday on a 10-7 vote. The measure is expected to reach the Senate floor next

week. The vote came hours after Obama, traveling in Sweden, left open the possibility he would order a strike even if Congress withheld its approval.

Russia's Putin Calls John Kerry a Liar on Syria

Russian President Vladimir Putin on Wednesday called U.S. Secretary of State John Kerry a liar, claiming he had denied that al-Qaida was fighting with the Syrian opposition in that country's civil war. Speaking to his human rights council, Putin recalled watching a congressional debate where Kerry was asked about al-Qaida. Putin said he had denied that it was operating in Syria, even though he was aware of the al-Qaida-linked Jabhat al-Nusra group.

Putin said: "This was very unpleasant and surprising for me. We talk to them (the Americans) and we assume they are decent people, but he is lying and he knows that he is lying. This is sad."

It was unclear exactly what Putin was referencing, but Kerry was asked Tuesday while testifying before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee if the Syrian opposition had become more infiltrated by al-Qaida.

Kerry responded that that was "basically incorrect" and that the opposition has "increasingly become more defined by its moderation."

Al-Qaida-linked Syria Rebels Hit Christian Village

Al-Qaida-linked rebels launched an assault Wednesday on a regime-held Christian village in the densely populated west of Syria and new clashes erupted near the capital, Damascus — part of a brutal battle of attrition each side believes it can win despite more than two years of deadlock.

Rebels commandeered a mountaintop hotel in the village of Maaloula and shelled the community below, said a nun, speaking by phone from a convent in the village. The nun said the rebels took over the Safir hotel atop a mountain overlooking the village and fired shells at it from there.

Some 80 people from the village took refuge in the convent, which houses 13 nuns and 27 orphans, she said.

A Syrian government official confirmed the assault and said the military was trying to repel the rebels. He spoke on condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to give official statements.

A Look at Syria Developments around the World

Here's a look at key Syria developments around the world Wednesday amid heightened tensions over potential military action:

RUSSIA:

President Vladimir Putin warned the West against taking one-sided action in Syria but also said Russia "doesn't exclude" supporting a U.N. resolution on punitive military strikes if it is proved that Damascus used poison gas on its own people. In a wide-ranging interview with The Associated Press and Russia's state Channel 1 television, Putin said Moscow has provided some components of the S-300 air defense missile system to Syria but has frozen further shipments. He suggested Russia may sell the potent missile systems elsewhere if Western nations attack Syria without U.N. Security Council backing.

SYRIA:

A foreign fighter in Syria said jihadis from the Caucasus have formed an independent fighting force. In a video posted online Wednesday by the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights, a man wearing a camouflage uniform is seen standing with other fighters, who he said came to Syria from the Caucasus and Russia to wage jihad.

SWITZERLAND:

Top officials from four nations harboring more than 1.8 million Syrian refugees said they badly need outside help to care for those fleeing violence. In a joint statement issued from Geneva, the foreign ministers from Iraq, Jordan and Turkey, Lebanon's social

affairs minister and U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees Antonio Guterres urgently appealed for greater international support for the refugees.

VATICAN:

Pope Francis ramped up Vatican opposition to threatened military strikes against Syria. He urged Catholics and non-Catholics to participate in his planned day of fasting and prayer for peace on Saturday, telling more than 50,000 people gathered for his weekly general audience: "Let the cry for peace

rise up across the Earth!" In recent speeches, tweets and remarks, Francis has called for a negotiated settlement in Syria and has also condemned the use of chemical weapons.

FRANCE:

Prime Minister Jean-Marc Ayrault told parliament there is no doubt the Syrian government carried out a deadly chemical attack against civilians and that failure to react would allow Assad to launch a similar attack. He spoke during a debate to rally support for a Syria strike.

Mexican Senate Passes Major Education Reform

MEXICO CITY (AP) • Mexico's Senate overwhelmingly passed a sweeping reform of the notoriously dysfunctional public school system early Wednesday, handing President Enrique Peña Nieto an important victory in his push to remake some of his country's worst-run institutions. The Senate voted 102-22 in favor of a standardized system of test-based hiring and promotion that would give the government the tools to break teachers unions' near-total control of school staffing. That control includes the corrupt sale and inheritance of teaching jobs, and it has been widely blamed for much of the poor per-

formance of Mexican schools, which have higher relative costs and worse results than any other in the 34-nation Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development. "The inheritance and sale of jobs has ended," Education Secretary Emilio Chuayffert said on Twitter. "Merit is the ideal means of access to, and progress in, a teaching career." The late-night vote clears a path for Peña Nieto to move forward with a series of even more controversial reforms, including a measure that would violate one of modern Mexico's longest-standing taboos by allowing private

investment in the state-run oil company. But there is potential trouble ahead. Education advocates say a series of concessions to the smaller of the two main teachers unions undermined the reform's ability to create true change in the national education system. And despite those concessions, the smaller teachers union continued days of debilitating demonstrations in Mexico City, sending tens of thousands of supporters to shut down the capital's main boulevard and protest outside key government building Wednesday. Thousands attended smaller protests in cities around the country. The union also pledged to throw its support behind a weekend protest against the oil reform by leftist leader Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador. "When Congress is rendered void, the only thing that remains is the streets," leftist Sen. Mario Delgado said as a series of his Democratic Revolution Party's objections to specific measures of the reform were rejected in relatively narrow votes. The education reform initially pitted Peña Nieto against the country's main teachers union — Latin America's largest union and once one of the most important allies of his Institutional Revolutionary Party. The union, known by the Spanish acronym SNTE, fell into line after its head, Elba Esther Gordillo, was arrested on corruption charges in February. She remains jailed pend-

ing trial. A smaller, dissident union known as the National Education Workers' Coordinating Committee, or CNTE, continued protesting and eventually rallied thousands of teachers from poor southern states, paralyzing large sections of the capital for more than a week. In the end, the CNTE won a series of concessions that help protect its members. Reform advocates called the law an important first step but said much more remained to be done in order to change the system. "It's not everything we would have hoped for but it's an historic change," said David Calderon, director of the education reform advocacy group Mexicans First. "Of course it's just a change in the rules that still has to be turned into reality." Much of Mexico's educational dysfunction is attributed to the relationship formed more than a half-century ago between the Institutional Revolutionary Party and the teachers unions, which gained increasing control of the education system in exchange for throwing their strength behind the government in the voting box and on the streets. Over the years the unions developed a virtual lock on teacher hiring and promotion. Almost every new teacher must go through a union to gain a school assignment, a practice that has spawned notorious levels of corruption, including the sale and inheritance of teaching positions.



CLEVELAND MAN'S SUICIDE BRINGS LITTLE SYMPATHY

CLEVELAND (AP) • Residents in the tough Cleveland neighborhood where three women were secretly imprisoned for a decade reacted with scorn and grim satisfaction Wednesday after Ariel Castro hanged himself in his cell barely a month into a life sentence. Even the prosecutor joined in. "This man couldn't take, for even a month, a small portion of what he had dished out for more than a decade," said Cuyahoga County Prosecutor Tim McGinty. Castro, 53, was found hanging from a bedsheet Tuesday night at the state prison in Orient, corrections spokeswoman JoEllen Smith said. Prison medical staff performed CPR before Castro was taken to a hospital, where he was pronounced dead. The coroner's office said it was suicide. "He took the coward's way out," said Elsie Cintron, who lived up the street from the former school bus driver. "We're sad to hear that he's dead, but at the same time, we're happy he's gone, and now we know he can't ask for an appeal or try for one if he's acting like he's crazy."

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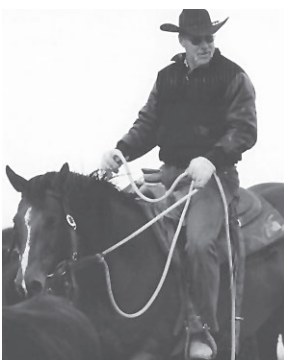
William Dean Patterson

Hired by baseball owners in 1978 following 20 years at General Electric Co., the pipe-smoking Grebey succeeded John Gaherin as the sport's chief labor negotiator. After arbitrator Peter Seitz struck down the reserve clause, Gaherin had worked out the deal in 1976 that created

free agency.

Grebey was part of a turbulent era, when baseball was shut down by eight work stoppages in a 23-year span. The 1981 strike was followed by a two-day walkout in August 1985, a 32-day spring training lockout in 1990 and a 7½-month strike in 1994-95 that wiped out the World Series for the first time in nine decades. MLB has since negotiated three straight labor deals without interruption.

"Ray was a professional who had a decorated career in labor relations, spanning challenging tasks not only in baseball but many different industries," baseball Commissioner Bud Selig said in a statement. "It is my hope that he was proud of the labor peace that the game now enjoys."

Sport Catches On in Magic Valley

TWIN FALLS • Under the intense afternoon sun, 16-year-old Riley Ballard pushed a stand-up paddleboard away from the shore at Dierkes Lake. He climbed onto it, his feet shifting for a few seconds until he found his balance.

On a recent Friday, children splashed nearby in the shallow area of the lake. Outside of the swimming area, Riley started paddling.

Stand-up paddleboarding — or SUP — has become popular in the Magic Valley, especially within the past year.

“This is the first year it’s really taken off,” said Tim Pryor, owner of Pryor Paddle Rentals, who has stocked paddleboards for about three years.

Pryor Paddle Rentals had 10 paddleboards available to rent at Centennial Waterfront Park this summer and tallied about 35 paddleboard rentals each week, Pryor said.

Some people just want to try it out, while others come back to rent paddleboards frequently.

River Rat also rents out paddleboards — both at its Twin Falls store and for most of the summer at Dierkes Lake — and has had a lot of inquiries about paddleboarding this year, said Dennis Pettygrove, president of River Rat.

Rachel Bowyer, who works at River Rat, paddled around Dierkes Lake as a friend sat on the end of her board. She brought along two friends who were giving paddle-

boarding a try.

Bowyer goes paddleboarding every couple of weeks and said it involves skill and balance.

Riley first tried stand-up paddleboarding a couple of years ago when his mother started working at River Rat. His advice for beginners: “Don’t be afraid to get out

there in the water.”

When he first started paddleboarding, Riley was a little shaky on his feet for about a minute after standing up on the board. But he quickly found his balance.

Seven Devils: Scenic Mountains and Hells Canyon

RIGGINS (AP) • I don’t have an official bucket list, but the loop around Seven Devils has been lodged in my mind since the mid-1990s when wildfires thwarted a trip I had planned.

I knew my legs weren’t getting any younger and Seven Devils were not getting any flatter, so last winter co-worker Bill Manny and I made plans to hike the 30-mile loop. Longtime friend Glenn Oakley of Boise joined us.

Overlooked Peaks

Seven Devils peaks loom between the Salmon River and Hells Canyon, and they’re what make the canyon so deep. The tallest in the range, He Devil, tops out at 9,393 feet, and the terrain plunges about 7,700 vertical feet into Hells Canyon and down to the Snake River.

Each mountain has its own hellish name: She Devil, The Ogre, The Goblin, Twin Imps, Devil’s Throne, Devil’s Tooth, etc.

And they look scary. But what they aren’t is crowded.

Unlike Idaho’s most famous mountain ranges, there’s no drive-by viewing along a highway. You have to go about 20 miles (one way) from Riggins on a twisty, mostly gravel

Forest Service Road 517.

That takes you to Windy Saddle trailhead, where you have a minimum of a 28-mile hike to complete the loop, which includes about 6,000 feet of elevation change.

To make things more challenging, the loop bypasses many of the best destinations, so you add mileage and elevation for side trips.

Around the Mountain

We opted to do the loop clockwise based on the advice of Douglas Lorain, author of “Backpacking Idaho.” He advises clockwise because it “saves the best scenery for last.”

Leaving Windy Saddle Trailhead, we descended into a cool, shady forest with numerous creek crossings. The trail was surprisingly buff.

On a strenuous scale of 1 through 10, Lorain rated this trip a 5.

The trail was mostly clear, and we arrived at a logical stopping point, Dog Creek, by midafternoon and feeling spry.

There was a nice campsite where the trail and creek intersect, but we also knew there was a mountain lake about a mile away.

Maps don’t lie, but they don’t tell the whole truth, either.

The allure of mountain lakes is hard to resist. The map showed a trail to the lake and

a 900-foot climb in elevation.

Guess which was accurate?

Dog Lake Trail went through an old burn, one of many on the loop, and the trail almost immediately disappeared into a maze of downed trees.

We picked our way through, and when Dog Creek forked, it seemed like a pretty straightforward direction to the lake: straight ahead.

I'm always curious how things get named, and my guess for Dog Lake is it's short for Dog Leg Lake, which the trail does. Unfortunately, we didn't because the trail was more of a hint than a tread.

After some discussion, I pulled out my GPS and checked. Sure enough, the lake was up the other leg of the creek.

While the map was inaccurate about the trail, the topographic lines didn't lie, and the topography pitched sharply upward for the last half-mile to the lake, where we found remnants of the trail in the last few hundred yards.

My Old Pals the Cutties

Getting to mountain lakes is typically more challenging than catching fish when you get there, and this was no exception.

I rigged my fly rod during a brief rain shower, and we sat under a tree waiting for it to dissipate when trout started rising.

I landed about a 12-inch cutty, and it was like a reunion. I was back in the mountains fly fishing, and the cutties behaved exactly as I hoped.

Horse Heaven Can Wait

The next morning, we had similar luck piecing the trail together. It took about an hour to wade through brush and downfall and get back to the main trail.

After the "trail" to Dog Lake, we welcomed the main trail, but we also knew we had a lot of landscape ahead.

We had roughly 21 miles in two more days, not including side trips. We also had nine miles before another water source.

The contrast between granite mountains, green forests and regrowing burns dotted with red, blue and yellow wildflowers was spectacular.

We rounded the southern tip of the trail and continued to the intersection with Horse Heaven Trail, which descends into Hells Canyon.

Horse Heaven Lookout loomed above, and a trail zigzagged up the mountain.

It was tempting, but risky. We needed to average at least 10 miles each day. That meant at least 11 miles that day to stay on schedule, so we skipped it.

'Trudgery'

Soon after, we got our first glimpse into Hells Canyon. The trail traversed at around 7,000 feet, and the slopes fell more than 5,000 vertical feet to the Snake River.

The trail miles seemed to stretch, and Manny coined a term for our relentless pace: trudgery.

The trail changed to a sun-baked traverse across scree fields. The heat of Hells Canyon crept up the slopes.

My water supply was dwindling, and I checked my GPS to see how far we were away from Granite Creek, which showed about a mile. No problem.

I rounded a corner and saw the trail plunge down a series of switchbacks.

"Holy —," I blurted.

I didn't mean to curse. It was a natural reaction.

Oakley came up behind me a minute later.

"Holy —," he said.

Exactly.

Five out of 10 on the strenuous scale?

I checked my GPS. The cursor had barely budged, despite hiking for several minutes.

We descended the tight switchbacks knowing every inch downward meant a

corresponding climb.

The trail skirted Hells Canyon, and it looked and felt like a different landscape. Granite Creek was a giant gash in the mountainside.

I must have checked my GPS a dozen times, but Granite Creek still wasn't getting any closer. I started wondering about weak batteries or maybe a malfunction with ... me?

Eventually, we made it. We dipped our hands into the frigid water cascading down from one of the devils. It was heavenly.

Oakley and I removed our boots and dipped our feet in the water. We could only briefly submerge them in the icy water.

I dipped my feet again and looked downstream where Manny was using his water filter to refill his bottles. I was sending liquified foot funk his way.

"Oops. Sorry, Bill."

Hope he didn't skimp on that water filter.

Are We There Yet?

There are limited campsites on the loop because of the steep country.

We wanted to reach Bernard Lakes, which was still several miles away and over an 8,000-foot pass.

We climbed from Granite Creek to a trail junction to Echo Lake. Camping at another lake was so inviting, but it would put us behind schedule.

So more trudgery.

Afternoon blurred into evening, and reaching Bernard Lakes was doubtful.

We found a closer campsite, but staying would mean a longer final day. We had just spent about eight hours hiking, and we were ready to stop.

As we discussed it, a swarm of mosquitoes buzzed our heads, and seemed to grow. Hiking suddenly seemed better than being strafed by squadrons of mosquitoes.

The guidebook described the next campsite as "horsy," but at least we would add miles before more involuntary blood donations.

We arrived at Hibbs Cow Camp, and there was a tiny stream running through camp. It wasn't bug free, but it was an improvement.

Someone made a small table from a round of wood and square of plywood. We used it for our kitchen and made our freeze-dried dinners and imbibed liquids that buoy spirits.

Topo Challenged

I seemed to have lost my knack for navigation despite having a GPS and a map.

Manny and Oakley had mostly led the way, but in the morning, we all were wondering who moved the trail.

Seemed like a pretty straightforward proposition to hike from camp and intersect it. So where did it go?

My GPS showed the trail ahead. I hiked over to find it; still no trail. Maybe one of the Twin Imps moved it.

The trail was well defined, but in a few spots, it looked like it was two weeks away from disappearing into the vege-

tation. We found one of those sections.

Diggin' the View

We cleared a pass and descended into the intersection between Bernard Lakes and Dry Diggins Lookout.

We missed Horse Heaven Lookout, but we weren't going to miss this one.

Most fire lookout have amazing views; that's the point of them, but this exceeded most others.

Dry Diggins stands at 7,800 feet on a rocky point jutting over Hells Canyon. We could see a sliver of the Snake River flowing in the bottom of the canyon. Turning 180 degrees, we could see several peaks of Seven Devils, and see all the way across Hells Canyon to Oregon's Wallowa Mountains.

We lingered at the lookout, then hiked on.

Over and Out

We hiked to Bernard Lakes and ate an early lunch there.

I'd been to Bernard Lakes on a trip in to Seven Devils nearly 20 years ago, and one thing I remembered was how brutal the hike was.

As we watched trout cruise beneath lily pads and snatch mayflies out of midair, that didn't matter. It was our final day, and we were on the most scenic stretch.

The trail zigzagged down a steep, rocky slope and into the forest, and waaaaay across the valley we saw a line traversing what was the mirror image of the steep slope we were about to descend.

"There's the trail over there," Oakley said.

It felt like we were staring at a trail on another planet. Unfortunately, there would be no rocket ride.

We descended into the forest. I told myself that wasn't the trail, it was another side trail. Nope. That was it, and when we finally reached it, we had dropped to 6,700 feet. A glance at the map showed we had to climb back to 8,000 feet.

To compound the endorphin rush, it was the hottest day of our trip.

We filled our water bottles for the final leg of the hike.

The trail was an impressive bit of engineering, considering it was blazed across an expansive mountain of loose, broken rock.

The guidebook described the climb as a "gently graded, but tiring ascent." Those nonchalant trail descriptions were annoying me. That climb is an ass-kicker.

We topped out and could see vehicles at Windy Saddle. Unfortunately, Seven Devils hadn't played its final trick.

We dropped into another canyon and climbed several hundred vertical feet back to the trailhead.

After reaching the truck, we all did the same thing: dropped our packs, exchanged our hiking boots for sandals, and grabbed a cold drink from the cooler.

That trail was a five? Remind me never to hike a six.

"One of my favorite things to do every year in mid-August is watch the Perseid meteor shower.

... This year I decided to plan a trip to Lewis and Clark Caverns in Montana. The cave and campground are about a 45-minute drive east of Butte.

"The tent site was \$15, plus \$10 to reserve it online. I'm glad we did, because a big "Campground Full" sign greeted us as we pulled in. ...

"In my research about the area, I had found that the caverns, a Montana state park, generally host some kind of hike or walk on the weekends. The weekend of Aug. 10, they hosted a meteor shower walk. ...

"The next morning we packed up camp and headed to the caverns. Summer tours cost \$10 per person (\$5 for children younger than 12) and are well worth the cost. There's a quarter-mile, fairly steep, uphill walk, but there are plenty of benches along the way if you

need to rest.

"In the winter, candlelight tours are \$15 (\$8 for children). I imagine the candlelight tour would be amazing, but maybe after you've already seen the caverns with the lights on. The colors and shapes of the stalactites and other formations are much less visible in dim candlelight. ..."

Why Try Paddleboarding?

Stand-up paddleboarding has its roots in Hawaii. More than 50 years ago, surfing instructors stood on their boards to check the waves. The idea caught on, and other people gave it a try.

Paddleboarding became a popular sport in Idaho about two or three years ago, said Stan Kolby, one of the owners at Idaho River Sports in Boise. The store's SUP center offers paddleboarding lessons every day.

Why so popular? "Paddleboarding is a sport anybody can do," Kolby said, including people of any age group or body type.

Also, it doesn't take long to learn — about an hour or so.

"It's a pretty safe watersport," Kolby said. "Just about anyone can make it work."

Unlike surfing, paddleboards stand with their feet facing forward and paddle while standing.

It's a good aerobic workout, Pryor said.

It is also a way of developing core strength and improving balance, said Teresa Ballard, sales manager at River Rat.

Another plus: It's easy to get on and off paddleboards. If you get tired of using your upper body, you can jump off the board into the river, sit down or lie on the board and enjoy the scenery.

Some paddleboards are made of materials such as fiberglass and plastic; some are inflatable.

On inflatable boards, "you have a lot less balance," Riley said, and they're not as easy to maneuver.

If you're ready to buy a paddleboard, expect to pay between \$1,000 and \$1,200. Of course, there are more and less expensive options.

New trends are emerging in larger markets — such as paddleboard yoga. That hasn't quite caught on in the Magic Valley.

When and Where to Go

If you're looking to give paddleboarding a try, two

Safety Requirements

The U.S. Coast Guard considers paddleboards to be vessels. And the Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation has safety requirements for "manually propelled vessels without motors," which include stand-up paddleboards.

In late June, a 72-year-old paddleboarder drowned in about seven feet of water on Payette Lake. The man had a life jacket on board but wasn't wearing it, according to Sgt. Jason Speer of the Valley County Sheriff's Office.

About 95 percent of paddleboarders don't wear a life jacket, said Stan Kolby, one of the owners at Idaho River Sports in Boise.

Here are the state's minimum safety requirements:

- **Life jacket:** Children 14 and younger must wear a life jacket while the vessel is underway. For older teens and adults, each person must have a flotation device on board.

- **Sound-producing device:** A device, such as a whistle or horn, must be carried on board. It must be audible for at least half a mile.

- **Lighting:** A flashlight or lantern must be on board when operating at night or in poor weather conditions.

- **Sticker:** You must purchase and display an Idaho Invasive Species Fund sticker in order to launch and operate a vessel in Idaho. This applies to paddleboards of any size.

popular locations are Centennial Waterfront Park and Dierkes Lake, both in the Snake River Canyon near Twin Falls.

On Aug. 22 at Centennial Waterfront Park, late-afternoon storm clouds started to roll in as a motorboat zipped around on the Snake River. Much farther down the river, a couple of people were out paddleboarding.

One of the best times to go is early in the morning, around 7 or 7:30 a.m., Teresa Ballard said.

Some people prefer to paddleboard in the mornings, while others like the evenings, Pryor said.

Don't go when it's too windy.

Pursuing Upland Royalty: the Ruffed Grouse

Though they are generally regarded as little more than targets of opportunity by most western hunters, ruffed grouse (*Bonasa umbellus*) are objects of considerable devotion — even revered by many as riparian royalty — in the eastern coverts the ‘paa-tridge’ calls home.

Like my brother before me, my first serious hunting endeavors centered on pursuing woodcock and ruffs through the tangled swamps, abandoned apple orchards and decaying farmsteads that they se-creted near our home in southwestern Maine.

Four decades later, we continue to pursue our transplanted passion for the grey ghost from the balmy days of late August through the snow squalls of December in the creek bottoms and aspen thickets of southeast-ern Idaho. Today I’d like to tell you about a number of shooting accessories that have consistently helped us to put birds on the ground.

With regard to hunting apparel, nothing can take the place of a good pair of lightweight waterproof hunting boots. We particu-larly like boots featuring high-traction soles and breathable Gore-Tex con-struction. Because grouse favor moist creek bottoms and hillside springs, these boots keep your feet dry



while slogging through the standing water and sucking mud of the wet areas and provide good support and traction while climbing up and down to hunt the drier hillside thickets.

Consider purchasing a pair of tight-fitting leather shooting gloves. Quality gloves will not only protect your hands as you push your way through thorny thickets, they’ll also provide a slip-resistant grip on your shotgun, even when you’re perspiring heavily.

A rugged game vest with highly visible hunter-or-ange panels, shell loops, roomy zippered pockets and game pouch is a godsend.

After years of picking thorns, weed seeds and cockleburrs out of my wool hunting trousers, I finally repented and bought a pair of Wrangler brush pants. I vow that I will never again enter a grouse thicket or pheasant field without them; they’re that good.

To protect your invaluable eyes from thrashing brush, blowing dust — and God forbid — stray shotgun pel-lets, consider investing in a pair of shooting glasses with hardened lenses. I refuse to shoot any firearm or pursue

any upland game or water-fowl unless I have mine on.

While the choice of firearms is highly subjec-tive, we have found that short, light and nimble shotguns are tailor-made for the close-quarter, snap shooting opportunities most common in grouse hunting. My brother dotes on his CZ 20 gauge side-by-

side; I usually carry a budg-et NEF 20-gauge single-shot Youth model or a slick Winchester 1300 in 20 bore. Sibling Bob is currently checking out the local pawn shops for a used Mossberg .410 pump, which he be-lieves might be the ultimate grouse getter for the type of hunting we do.

In truth, the ultimate ac-

cessory for hunting any game bird has to be a well-trained hunting dog. With-out question, Bob’s springer spaniel, Ruff, is responsible for the majority of birds lo-cated, flushed and retrieved each season.

The 2013-14 grouse sea-son runs from Aug. 30 through Dec. 31 with a daily bag limit of four birds. So

purchase your general hunting license (no special permits are required), case your shotgun and stalk the hawthorn thickets and piney hillsides this fall in pursuit of true riparian roy-alty — the ruffed grouse.

Idaho’s Upland Game Seasons Opening

JEROME • Upland game fall seasons are ramping up, with forest grouse, rabbits and hares open now.

The early fall general turkey season and seasons for chukar, quail and partridge begin Saturday, Sept. 15, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game said.

The season for forest grouse, which include ruffed, spruce and dusky grouse, opened Aug. 30 and runs through Jan. 31 in the Panhandle Region and through Dec. 31 in the rest of the state. The daily limit is four, whether all of one or mixed species, and 12 in possession after the first day. Hunters need only a valid hunting license to hunt quail, chukar, grey partridge and forest grouse.

Seasons on cottontail rabbits and snowshoe hares also opened Aug. 30. Cottontail season runs through Feb. 28, and snowshoe season runs through March 31. There is no season on pygmy rabbits.

The general fall turkey

season opens:

- Sept. 15 through Dec. 15 in game management units 1, 2 (except Farragut State Park and Farragut Wildlife Management Area) 3, 4, 4A, 5 and 6.
- Sept. 15 through Oct. 31 in game management units 73, 74, 75, 77 and 78.
- Sept. 15 through Oct. 9 in game management units 8, 8A, 10, 10A, 11, 11A, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 16A, 17, 18, 19 , 20, 22, 23, 24, 31, 32 (except that portion in Payette County) and 32A. Units 33 and 39 are closed to fall hunting.
- Nov. 21 through Dec. 31 in game management units 8, 8A, 10A, 11, 11A, 13, 14, 15 and 16. This hunt is open on private lands only.

The daily bag limit is one turkey of either sex per day in the fall. No more than three turkeys may be taken per year, except in Units 1, 2, 3 and 5, where five turkeys may be taken during the fall season. Turkey hunters will need a general or an extra tag.

General tags not used in the

spring general or controlled hunts are valid for the fall hunt. Special unit tags are valid for the fall season in Units 1, 2, 3 or 5.

Chukar and gray partridge seasons run from Sept. 15 through Jan. 31. The daily bag limit is eight chukar and eight gray partridge, and the possession limit is 24 chukar and 24 gray partridge.

Bobwhite and California quail seasons run from Sept. 15 through Jan. 31. The daily bag limit is 10 total, and the possession limit is 30 total. Area 1 in eastern Idaho is closed.

Consult the rules brochure for details and exceptions.

Sharp-tailed grouse opens Oct. 1-31, with a two-bird daily limit and six-bird possession limit. A separate permit is required for hunting sharp-tailed grouse.

All hunters need a valid 2013 Idaho hunting license. Find upland hunting rules and shooting times at <http://fishandgame.idaho.gov/public/hunt/rules/?get=Page67>.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE® Bobby Wolff

"A gentleman is simply a patient wolf."

— Lana Turner

Most bridge books have nothing but bridge deals in them. By contrast, my last book, "The Lone Wolff," has almost no deals at all in it. It mainly discusses my life and the politics of bridge at world level. As a former president of the World Bridge Federation and American Contract Bridge League, I came into contact with most of the superstars of the game, not only as an administrator but also as a member of the Dallas Aces, the team of American superstars gathered together by Ira Corn to break the Italian lock on the Bermuda Bowl.

This deal, however, is featured in the book. Against five diamonds I led the club queen. George Burns, who could have been a serious bridge player had not his illustrious show-business career as a comedian, actor and writer taken first call on his time, overtook with the ace, collecting South's king.

Burns knew from the bidding that declarer held neither three hearts nor four spades, so found the only defense to beat declarer's game — he returned a heart at trick two. Now declarer was unable to pitch losing spades on winning hearts, as Burns could ruff in.

If declarer had played a trump at trick three, Burns would have risen with his ace to return his second heart. But as I told Burns afterwards, I had played my part in the defense — by holding the diamond seven. If the diamond six and seven had been interchanged, the game could not have been defeated.
