COEUR D'ALENE • The family of a northern Idaho man who committed suicide at a state psychiatric hospital is suing the state over his death.
The Coeur d'Alene Press reports Steven Ferry Sr. was being held involuntarily at State
Hospital North in Orofino when he electrocuted himself to death on Sept. 18, 2011. Steven Ferry Jr. filed the lawsuit in Kootenai County's 1st District Court, contending that the hospital failed to provide Ferry Sr. with a safe environment and didn't adequately supervise him, resulting in his death.
According to the lawsuit, the state filed an application to have Ferry Sr. placed in involuntary treatment after he attempted suicide,

## Eating Right Vital for Diabetics

I am 45 years old and was ecently diagnosed with I eat or not eat? - Nancy, Twin Falls Eating right is really important when you are tryin A diabetes diet is a healthy eating plan which high in nutrients, low in fats and moderate in calorie intake. The primary difference in a diabetic diet is to pay more attention to some of your food choices, most that you eat.
Think of your plate and divide it into three sections Half of your plate should be filled with low carbohydrat vegetables - including broccoli, green beans, cab flower - fill a quarter of your plate with lean protein such as baked chicken, fish or pork, and the remaining quarter of your plate with a low carbohydrate choice, such as brown rice, swe potato or whole wheat add one serving of fruit, and a cup of skim milk or lowfat yogurt.
Carbohydrates have a big impact on your blood sugar levels. You don't have to need to be smart in your choices. Whole grains are the healthiest, as they max imize nutrition and break down in the blood stream slowly. Instead of white po tatoes, choose sweet potatoes or yams. Instead of wheat pasta.
Fats are also important to keep in check. Making good fat choices is important.

## Having diabetes increases

 your risk of developing heart disease and stroke by accelerating the hardeningand clogging of arteries and clogging of arteries.
Good fats - found in olive oil, canola oil, avocado, fish, flaxseed and walnuts lower your cholesterol, however, eat them sparingly because all fats are high in
calories. Bad fats include calories. Bad fats include and should be avoided as they increase cholesterol. Trans fats are found in processed foods, fast foods, chips and hard margarine. Saturated fats include red meats, bacon, butter, whole milk and high fat cheese. sports drinks and energy drinks that contain carbohydrates. Also, eat smaller meals throughout the day to avoid rises in blood sugar. It's easier to control blood
sugar when your carbohysugar when your carbohy-
drates are spread out. It is also good to eat a protein at mealtime as it promotes satiety and results in a lower blood sugar rise. Exercise is also a key component in keeping you
diabetes under control diabetes under control.
When you exercise you When you exercise, your
muscles become more sen mitive to insulin, which results in lower blood sugars. It is best to get 30 minutes of moderate exercise, five times each week. A brisk walk is a good choice.

Well, Romney may have retreated from the public eye, but it looks like another Republican
During a discussion related to the contentious topic of health care reform, Rep. Phil Gingrey, R-Ga., said he was "stuck" making \$172,000 a year as a member of Congress. Worse, Gingrey insinuated that low-paid congressional staffers are ultimately better off than representatives like himself despite the fact that the majority of congressional staffers make less than
$\$ 50,000$ annually. Gingrey's logic was that congres sional aides can simply become lobbyists later in their career and earn substantially more - an option really only open to the most seasoned and powerful aides. But making Gingrey's whining all the more offensive is that his net worth is reportedly in the neighborhood of at least $\$ 3$ million.
To put the realities of the average American in context, he median income per household, not simply per indiEven more disturbing is the fact that 15 percent of the population is living in poverty, including a plurality of children of color. But perhaps the most troubling fact of all is that the median household income was actually higher in 1989. So at a time in which most Americans are barely making half of $\$ 100,000$ and many are living in poverty, a member of Congress is complaining about his $\$ 172,000$ salary.
didi I mention he also gets benefits? In fact, it was a congressional employees that sparked Gingrey's Rom-ney-esque gaffe. Gingrey is a staunch opponent of Obama's health-care reform but, like many Republican lawmakers, he has found himself caught between an ideological rock and a hard place regarding an Affordgress and their staffs. The exemption would allow the government to continue premium payments for congressional aides and members, even as the new health care exchange requirements dictated by the law take effect.
Gingrey opposes such an exemption, which has triggered somewhat of a civilwar within conservative ranks macare strategy Younger congressional aides without the benefit of the financial cushion that Gingrey enioys, and who would benefit from the exchange option, were said to take issue with the congressman's comments and helped make thempublic.
But Gingrey's gaffe simply reinforces an ongoing probem for the GOP as it seeks to win the messaging war just a health care reform becomes not just the law of the land but
a way of life in America.
With medical bills recently deemed the No. 1 cause of bankruptcies, Americans, including Republican congres sional aides, seem ready to finally say enough is enough. This means that as long as the GOP is run by men who think elevators for their cars and making six figures embody the "problems" of the average Americans, the shrinking party.

CAN CITY (AP) • "throw-away culture" that Pope Francis offered an olive
branch of sorts to the doc-trine-minded, conservative wing of the Catholic Church on Friday as he denounced abortions as a symptom of today's "throw-away culture" and encouraged
Catholic doctors to refuse to performthem.
Francis issued a strong an-ti-abortion message and cited Vatican teaching on the need to defend the unborn during an audience with Catholic gynecologists. It came a day after he was church's obsession with "small-minded rules" that are driving the faithful away. In an interview that has sent shockwaves through the church, Francis urged it merciful and welcoming rather than insisting only on such divisive, hot-button issues as abortion, gay mar riage and contraception. Even before the interview was published, some conser pointment that Francis had shied away from restating such church rules. Francis explained his reason for doing so in the interview with the Jesuit journal La Civilta Cattolica, saying church well-known, he supports it but that he doesn't feel it necessary to repeat it constantly.
He did repeat it on Friday, however. In his comments,
Francis denounced today's justifies disposinge" that justifies disposing of lives,
and said doctors in particular had been forced into situations where they are called to "not respect life."
"Every child that isn't born, but is unjustly condemned to be aborted, has the face of Jesus Christ, has
the face of the Lord," he said. the face of the Lord, he said.
He urged the gynecologists to abide by their consciences and help bring lives into the world. "Things have a price and can be for sale, but people have a dignity that is priceless and worthfa more than things," he said.
Francis' comments Civilta Cattolica contained no change in church teaching, but they represented a radical shift in tone and stood in stark contrast to the prior ities of his two immediat John Paul II
XVI were both intellectuals for whom doctrine was paramount, an orientation that guided the selection of a generation of bishops and cardinals who, in countries
like the United States, have put themselves on the front put thes in opposing abortion and gay marriage.

Religious Tension Mounts in Holy City
High above Nazareth, an Israeli mayor wants to keep his city Jewish 'now and forever.' BY WILLIAM BOOTH \& RUTH EGLASH

NAZARETH ILLIT, Israel • This hilltop city has placid parks, broad av-
enues, low crime, afancymall and trash enues, low crime, a fancy mall and trash
collection three times a week all very nice and neat, and by design, llightly nice
dull.
But not these days.
Over the past few years, well-to-do Arab Israelis, both Muslim and Christian, drove their minivans 10 minutes up
the hill from the ancient, overcrowded nearly all-Arab city of Nazareth and snapped up some sweet but pricey fivebedroom, four-bath houses.
Many of the homes are worth a halfmillion dollars or more, and Arab citizens of Israel now count for 18 percent of the 50,000 residents in "Upper
Nazareth", as it is translated in English. They are welcome here, says the mayor, as long as they remember one very important rule.
"This is a Jewish city", said Shimon Gafsou of his adopted home town, "now and forever:
To be more specific: "I would rather cut off my right arm than build an Arab said in an interview on his terrace at city hall.
