Jury Finds Jimenez Guilty

Man who shot brother convicted of aggravated battery with a deadly weapon.

The jury found him guilty of ag-

shooting his brother.

gravated battery with a deadly weapon for shooting and injuring Jorge Alvarado on Feb. 9 in the 100 block of Tyler Street in Twin Falls.

The jury also found Jimenez to be a persistent violator, as he has been convicted of three felonies.

Jimenez was convicted of burglary in 2000 and grand theft by possession of stolen property in

Tuesday, Jimenez was arrested on new charges of aggravated assault and being a felon in possession of a firearm. Police said he used a gun to threaten three people who were trying to repossess his

In an earlier case, Jimenez is charged with three counts of lewd and lascivious conduct. Police say he raped a 14-year-old girl over several months. That trial is scheduled for December.

After Friday's conviction, District Judge Randy Stoker revoked Timenez's bond.

Wildfire finally to a close.

TWIN FALLS • This year's wildfires season ended with a sobering reminder that not only the largest fires carry the biggest threats.

Treacherous terrain, threatened homes and evacuation orders became normal terms to describe the challenges and consequences of fires that lit up most of the Gem State. Yet local fire officials are reporting fewer wildfires and less acreage burned compared with

"The fires had a longer duration, even though they might not have been as big as last year," said Chris Simonsen, fire management officer for the U.S. Bureau of Land Management's Twin Falls district. "They were complicated fires with higher costs."

Most of the 81 wildfires that burned in the Twin Falls district were started by lightning, Simonsen said. Altogether, they scorched nearly 89,000 acres.

Statewide, more than 728,900 acres in Idaho - the most of all Western states — were burned by nearly 1,320 fires ignited between May and October. The numbers vary from last year, when more than 1.6 million acres burned from 1,150 fires.

'It's low, but it wasn't a slow

season," Simonsen said. At the season's peak, the nation's top three highest priority wildfires were in Idaho. The Elk

Complex Fire destroyed nearly 80 homes and caused mandatory evacuations in Pine and Featherville. The McCann Fire seared 23,390 acres, threatened ranches north of Fairfield and killed 100 head of cattle. But it was the nearby 111,490-acre Beaver Creek Fire that forced communities such as Ketchum and Sun Valley to be under pre-evacuation alert

as it consumed beloved trails and came within inches of mutli-million dollar homes.

Up north, large blazes such as the Lodgepole and Papoose fires sparked in areas inaccessible by

most firefighting vehicles. The BLM responded to three wildfires simultaneously for 18

days, Simonsen said. "It's significant when that occurs," he said. "Anytime we have days we have multiple fires, we have fewer resources to respond to just one fire."

Budget cuts forced the BLM to reduce the crew members per engine this summer, but the agency got assistance from recently formed Rangeland Fire Protection Associations. The groups, made

RUPERT • A 73-year-old Rupert man missing since Aug. 21 was found alive Thursday morning near the Milner Dam area.

Nile Maricle was found about 9:20

a.m. after the Minidoka County Sheriff's Office received a call from Kerb's Oil, a north Burley convenient store. "We got a call from

a clerk in north Bur-Maricle

ley," said Sheriff Eric Snarr. "She told officers that she had seen Nile come in frequently for cigarettes and beer."

Maricle's family reported him missing last month.

"It is alarming that he left his dog at home because the dog is always by his side," said family member Steve Maricle.

Maricle was severely dehydrated but otherwise in good condition,

"He told the responding officers he was out there because he didn't want to be bothered," Snarr

Maricle was taken to his sister's nearby home until his children could arrive from out of state to help care for him, Snarr said.

"Apparently he'd just been out at Milner alone and was coming into town for supplies," Snarr said.

Stocks Drop as Investors Fret over Budget Fight

NEW YORK (AP) • Washington's budget fight jolted Wall Street on Friday, reminding it that the next few weeks could bring a lot of uncertainty.

Investors hate uncertainty, and stocks plunged in afternoon sell-off that wiped out all the gains from rally earlier this week, when the Federal Reserve kept its huge economic stimulus program intact.

Major indexes were mixed in morning trading, but turned lower around midday after the U.S. House of Representatives voted to defund President Barack Obama's health care law.

Tip Leads to Large Pot Bust

BOISE (AP) • Federal prosecutors say a tip hunter led to the recent seizure and arrests of five people accused of illegally growing thousands of marijuana plants on public land in Boise County.

U.S. Attorney Wendy

Olson also down-sized on Friday the total number of plants confiscated from two grow operations. Local authorities initially reported seizing an estimated 40,000 plants, but Olson said only 5,585 plants were tallied.

Four of the suspects charged in the case are Mexican nationals, while the fifth is a woman from Caldwell. All are scheduled to appear in U.S. District Court in Boise later this month.

Olson praised the hunter who came across the illegal growing operation for calling in the tip — and for avoiding a potential conflict with operators who had firearms in their remote campsite.

No Weak Link Develops in Kidney Transplant Chain

Twin Falls women's organ swap a success

TWIN FALLS • Kristy Buffington is glad to be home.

She's a little sore, missing one kidney and her gall blad-

Buffington recently donated a kidney in a threekidney-transplant chain at the University of Utah Hospital.

Her friend Brandy Burkhart – who received a kidney from a "Good Samaritan" donor — is still in the hospital and receiving anti-rejection treatments.

After she is released, Burkhart will stay close by so her doctors can keep an eye on her new kidney.

Buffington's kidney went to a 23-month-old boy named Beckham. Beckham was born with kidney dis-

"He's never been able to eat solid food and he has a feeding tube," said Buffington. "He can't walk - he can't do a lot of things that every 2-year-old should be able to do."

Beckham's father, Ari, had hoped to donate a kidney to his son, but they were not compatible. Buffington had hoped to donate a kidney to Burkhart, but they weren't compatible, either.

Bruce Garrett, a coordinator with the University of Utah Hospital's transplant program, suggested that all four register for the national

Paired Kidney Exchange pool.

A Good Samaritan donor named Ted, and Juan, a man who had waited on the kidney transplant list for three years, completed the chain.

The kidney exchange was pulled off in two days: Ted gave Burkhart a kidney. Burkhart's friend Buffington gave Beckham a kidney. And Beckham's dad Ari gave Juan a kidney.

"It's really pretty cool," Buffington said Thursday, a day returning to her home in Twin Falls.

Buffington went under the knife Sept. 11. In the operating room, her surgeon discovered gall stones, and he removed her gall bladder two days later.

"I wasn't too thrilled

about getting a double dose of anesthesia," she said, "But I'm feeling a lot better now." So is Burkhart.

Burkhart and Buffington were friends before the surgery, but now the two have a connection like no other.

"This has been a lifechanging event," Burkhart

Doctors plan to release Burkhart from the hospital Sunday. She and her husband have rented an apartment in Salt Lake until she is cleared to return to her home in Twin Falls.

Most of the six transplant patients were able to meet after the surgeries.

"It was great to put their names with faces and hear their stories," Buffingrton

Denney May Run for Secretary of State

BOISE (AP) • Republican state Rep. Lawerence Denney has filed official fundraising paperwork ahead of a potential bid to unseat Secretary of State Ben Ysursa in the GOP primary next May.

Denney, a former House speaker from Midvale, said Friday he has yet to make an official campaign announcement. But he declared a political treasurer on Thursday, allowing him to raise money for a run. Politically, Denney and Ysursa have been antagonists.

In 2012, for instance, Ysursa blocked Denney's bid to fire Republican members of a panel redrawing political boundaries for Idaho's legislative and congressional dis-

RUPERT • The Minidoka County Sheriff's Office has expanded its hours at the driver's license bureau.

The new office hours are from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Minidoka County Sheriff Eric Snarr said many residents had complained under the prior sheriff's administration about the irregular hours the driver's license bureau was open.

"We were hearing a lot of complaints coming through officers and citizens," said

ports that people would come in to renew a driver's license and a sign was up saying "back in 15 minutes." Snarr said the sign did not indicate a time when the employee would return.

"A lot of the people would sit there and wait an hour to an hour and a half," Snarr

Snarr said the previous hours were 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., but weren't actually

Alicia Daniel, who previously worked at the driver's license bureau, was criminally charged with falsifying time sheets and misusing sick leave after an Attorney General's investigation led to a charge of misuse of public funds for former sheriff, Kevin Halverson.

According to court records Daniel and Halverson were having a personal relationship.

Daniel is set for a preliminary hearing on the charge at 10:30 a.m., Oct. 18, in Minidoka County Magistrate Court.


Snarr said the current employees at the driver's license bureau are undergoing state training and the staff in the driver's license, civil service and records divisions will be cross-trained so they can cover the other offices during vacations or

Snarr said the civil service position will be the most difficult to crosstrain due to the complexity of the job, which includes processing warrants, civil protection, no-contact orders and wage garnishments along with other documents.

Snarr said the four employees in those offices will also soon be wearing uniforms similar to the department's patrol division.

"We want to give our offices a more professional appearance," Snarr said.

County dispatchers will also wear a uniform pant and polo shirt beginning early next year.

Idaho Unemployment Rate Jumps to 6.8 Percent

BOISE • Idaho's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose two-tenths of a percentage point in August to 6.8 percent.

The Department of Labor says the state's jobless rate has risen seven tenths of a percentage point since April, one of the largest rate increases among the states in the past four months. Still, the rate is down from 7 percent last August.

The number of Idaho workers without jobs was nearly 52,300, the highest total since September 2012.

Department analysts believe more Idahoans may be working multiple jobs to meet the hiring demands of employers and make ends meet. Last year, 24.2 percent of Idaho jobs were part-time, compared to 18.2 percent before the recession.

Idaho's unemployment rate remained below the national rate of 7.3 percent for August.

Prison Guard Charged with Sex with Inmate

BOISE • A former Idaho Department of Correction prison guard has been charged with having sex with an inmate at a maximum security prison south of Boise.

Forty-three-year-old Pamela Lynn Thomson was arrested Thursday after prosecutors charged her with two counts of felony sexual contact with a prisoner.

Idaho Department of Correction spokesman Jeff Ray said in a prepared statement that Thompson was hired on March 25 and was fired from the department on Sept. 6 after an investigation by the department's professional standards team.

Thompson was scheduled to appear in court Friday afternoon. She is currently being held on \$250,000 bond.

State Sued over Suicide at N. Idaho Hospital


COEUR D'ALENE • The family of a northern Idaho man who committed suicide at a state psychiatric hospital is suing the state over his death.

The Coeur d'Alene Press reports Steven Ferry Sr. was being held involuntarily at State Hospital North in Orofino when he electrocuted himself to death on Sept. 18, 2011. Steven Ferry Jr. filed the lawsuit in Kootenai County's 1st District Court, contending that the hospital failed to provide Ferry Sr. with a safe environment and didn't adequately supervise him, resulting in his death.

According to the lawsuit, the state filed an application to have Ferry Sr. placed in involuntary treatment after he attempted suicide, and examiners found him to be mentally ill, likely to injure himself and unable to make informed decisions about his own care.

Eating Right Vital for Diabetics

St. Luke's Clinic, Diabetes Man agement Center

I am 45 years old and was recently diagnosed with Type 2 diabetes. What can I eat or not eat?

— Nancy, Twin Falls Eating right is really important when you are trying to control your diabetes.

A diabetes diet is a healthy eating plan which is high in nutrients, low in fats and moderate in calorie intake. The primary difference in a diabetic diet is to pay more attention to some of your food choices, most notably the carbohydrates that you eat.

Think of your plate and divide it into three sections. Half of your plate should be filled with low carbohydrate vegetables - including broccoli, green beans, cabbage, zucchini or cauliflower – fill a quarter of your plate with lean protein, such as baked chicken, fish or pork, and the remaining quarter of your plate with a low carbohydrate choice, such as brown rice, sweet potato or whole wheat bread or pasta. You can also add one serving of fruit, and a cup of skim milk or lowfat yogurt.

Carbohydrates have a big impact on your blood sugar levels. You don't have to avoid these foods; you just need to be smart in your choices. Whole grains are the healthiest, as they maximize nutrition and break down in the blood stream slowly. Instead of white potatoes, choose sweet potatoes or yams. Instead of white pasta, choose whole wheat pasta.

Fats are also important to keep in check. Making good fat choices is important.

Having diabetes increases your risk of developing heart disease and stroke by accelerating the hardening and clogging of arteries. Good fats — found in olive oil, canola oil, avocado, fish, flaxseed and walnuts lower your cholesterol, however, eat them sparingly because all fats are high in calories. Bad fats include trans fats and saturated fats and should be avoided as they increase cholesterol. Trans fats are found in processed foods, fast foods, chips and hard margarine. Saturated fats include red meats, bacon, butter, whole milk and high fat cheese.

Avoid regular sodas, sports drinks and energy drinks that contain carbohydrates. Also, eat smaller meals throughout the day to avoid rises in blood sugar. It's easier to control blood sugar when your carbohydrates are spread out. It is also good to eat a protein at mealtime as it promotes satiety and results in a lower blood sugar rise.

Exercise is also a key component in keeping your diabetes under control. When you exercise, your muscles become more sensitive to insulin, which results in lower blood sugars. It is best to get 30 minutes of moderate exercise, five times each week. A brisk walk is a good choice.

It is important that you talk to your primary care provider about your specific condition to guide you in recent diagnosis of Type 2 diabetes.

Congressman Whines about \$172,000 Salary

epublican nominee Mitt Romney was criticized for repeatedly reinforcing the notion The Root

that the GOP was out of

His references to the "47 percent" — the percentage of Americans he believed would support President Barack Obama no matter what because they were essentially government freeloaders - not to mention the custom elevator constructed for his car collection, supported the perception that he and his party were incapable of relating to the struggles of average Americans. Well, Romney may have retreated from the public eye, but it looks like another Republican politician has stepped up to fill his out-of-touch shoes.

During a discussion related to the contentious topic of health care reform, Rep. Phil Gingrey, R-Ga., said he was "stuck" making \$172,000 a year as a member of Congress. Worse, Gingrey insinuated that low-paid congressional staffers are ultimately better off than representatives like himself despite the fact that the majority of congressional staffers make less than \$50,000 annually. Gingrey's logic was that congressional aides can simply become lobbyists later in their career and earn substantially more - an option really only open to the most seasoned and powerful aides. But making Gingrey's whining all the more offensive is that his net worth is reportedly in the neighborhood of at least \$3 million.

To put the realities of the average American in context, the median income per household, not simply per individual, was \$51,017 in 2012, which is a decrease from 2011. Even more disturbing is the fact that 15 percent of the population is living in poverty, including a plurality of children of color. But perhaps the most troubling fact of all is that the median household income was actually higher in 1989. So at a time in which most Americans are barely making half of \$100,000 and many are living in poverty, a member of Congress is complaining about his \$172,000

Did I mention he also gets benefits? In fact, it was a discussion of the benefits available to Congress and congressional employees that sparked Gingrey's Romney-esque gaffe. Gingrey is a staunch opponent of Obama's health-care reform but, like many Republican lawmakers, he has found himself caught between an ideological rock and a hard place regarding an Affordable Care Act exemption benefiting members of Congress and their staffs. The exemption would allow the government to continue premium payments for congressional aides and members, even as the new health care exchange requirements dictated by the law take

Gingrey opposes such an exemption, which has triggered somewhat of a civil war within conservative ranks struggling with formulating the next leg of their anti-Obamacare strategy. Younger congressional aides without the benefit of the financial cushion that Gingrey enjoys, and who would benefit from the exchange option, were said to take issue with the congressman's comments and helped make them public.

But Gingrey's gaffe simply reinforces an ongoing problem for the GOP as it seeks to win the messaging war just as health care reform becomes not just the law of the land but a way of life in America.

With medical bills recently deemed the No. 1 cause of bankruptcies, Americans, including Republican congressional aides, seem ready to finally say enough is enough. This means that as long as the GOP is run by men who think elevators for their cars and making six figures embody the "problems" of the average Americans, the Grand Old Party will continue to be the incredible shrinking party.

New Cassia County Courthouse Opens

BURLEY • Dozens of people turned out Friday to help Cassia County dedicate its new judicial center and tour the facility.

"I really like the way the courts are separated," said Gary Lucas of Burley. "And there's a lot of security for the judges and everybody else. That was a good idea."

The county bought the 16,000-square-foot building at the corner of Overland Avenue and 16th Street for \$600,000 in June 2011.

It had been a Safeway store.

"I think it's beautiful and very well done," said Rupert resident Dallas Stoller.

The county paid \$1.8 million to remodel the facility with three courtrooms, four conference rooms and up-

graded security for the public and court staff.

Fred McCombs of Burley said the acoustics in the new judicial center are very good, especially in the courtrooms.

"They are a lot better, especially for people who don't hear well," McCombs said.

After voters in 1998 shot down a \$3.72 million bond issue for a new judicial building, the county started saving money. It paid for the project with a combination of taxpayer money and about \$1 million from geothermal leases in the county.

"It (the judicial center) is one of those things that's not popular in the county, but it is essential for justice," said Paul Christensen, Cassia County commissioner during the dedication ceremony.

"I really like the fact that it was built to take care of our future needs," said Burley

resident Dick Huizinga.

Cassia County Commissioner Bob Kunau said Safeway Inc. constructed the building in 1962.

"When I first walked into the old grocery store it was hard to envision what they'd do," said Kunau.

The law also says a reasonable person under similar circumstances would have believed they were in danger and acted in a similar way. Jimenez must have acted only in response to the danger and no other motivation. Finally, when there's no longer a reasonable appearance of danger, the right to self-defense ends, Stoker told the jury.

In his closing argument, prosecutor Stan Holloway told the jury they must use their everyday experiences and common sense to decide what happened.

There's no question Jimenez was the shooter, Holloway said. He admitted

But Jimenez didn't grab the gun out of fear; he picked it up in Jerome hours before the confrontation with his brother, the prosecutor said.

"He went to Jerome specifically to pick up the gun," Holloway said. The shooting was not in

self-defense, because Jimenez did not exhaust his alternatives, Holloway said.

Jimenez could have called the police or gone inside the house, he said.

In his closing argument,

defense attorney George Essma said Jimenez had a legitimate legal excuse for having the gun, despite being a felon.

"The law forgives someone for being in possession of a firearm if it was necessary," Essma said.

Essma also questioned why the prosecution didn't use more forensic evidence, such as where the brothers were standing when the rounds were fired.

Most of the time law officers get it right, Essma said, but sometimes they get it wrong.

"It's hard to tell the state no," he said. "The state does not like when you tell them no. Not many people get to tell the state no. In this particular case, I'm asking you to tell the state, I'm sorry, no. You did not prove it to us beyond a reasonable doubt that this was not self-defense and Robert was not in lawful possession of a firearm."

IDAHO FALLS (AP) • An investigator with the Federal Aviation Administration is looking into why a twin-engine airplane with three people on board was forced to make an emergency landing Thursday in a farm field near Idaho Falls.

Authorities say mechanical difficulties may have led to the early landing, about a mile from the Idaho Falls Regional Airport.

Sgt. Jeff Edwards said all three occupants were out of the airplane when emergency personnel arrived. Two were able to walk. The Idaho Statesman identified one of the injured passengers as Damond Watkins, one of Idaho's three members on the Republican National Committee and an executive with Melaleuca

Authorities on Friday identified the pilot as Bradley Hone, of Idaho Falls and the third passenger as Justin Manwaring. Both were treated and released for minor injuries.

But Watkins' father, Dane Watkins, told the newspaper his son suffered a broken back in the crash and is scheduled to undergo surgery at an Idaho Falls hospital Friday.

'We just thank the Lord that he's alive," said Dane Watkins, a former state senator from Idaho Falls and former candidate for Congress. "It could have been a lot worse. We're fortunate and blessed."

Damond Watkins, 40, is the vice president of corporate relations for Melaleuca and represents the company on the board of the Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry. Watkins was returning home from Boise.

House Backs Bill to Boost Logging in National Forests

WASHINGTON (AP) • The Republican-controlled House Friday approved a bill to sharply increase logging in national forests — a measure the GOP said would create jobs in rural communities and help reduce wildfires that have devastated the West.

The bill also would add hundreds of millions of dollars in revenue from new timber sales while reviving an industry that has shed tens of thousands of jobs in the past three decades.

Opponents called the bill a giveaway to the timber industry and said it would harm water quality and habitat for fish and wildlife and jeopardize recreation areas that have become a major source of jobs in national forests.

The White House has threatened to veto the bill, which was approved on a 244-173 vote. Seventeen Democrats joined 227 Republicans to back the bill. Just one Republican, Rep. Chris Gibson of New York, opposed the bill.

The Obama administration says the measure would jeopardize habitat for endangered species, increase lawsuits and limit the president's ability to create national monuments.

The bill as passed has little chance of approval in the Democratic-controlled Senate, although senators have not ruled out adoption of a forest management bill.

Keith Chu, a spokesman for Sen. Ron Wyden, D-Ore., chairman of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee, said Wyden "agrees it's time get the (timber) harvest up, to create more jobs in the woods and make forests healthier."

Wyden plans to introduce a forest bill this fall, Chu said, but added: "It's clear

that bills that undermine bedrock environmental laws or turn large swaths of federal land over to private ownership cannot pass the Senate or be signed into law by the president."

The House bill's sponsor, Rep. Doc Hastings, R-Wash, said wildfires burned 9.3 million acres last year, while the Forest Service only harvested timber from about 200,000 acres. "We burned 44 times more acres than we've managed," Hastings said. "Imagine the carbon imprint" of those wild-fires, which are fed in part by overstocked forests.

No. 17 Huskies Get Final Tuneup vs. Idaho State

SEATTLE • Keith Price needed to be scared only one time by a lower-division opponent.

It came in the first start of his sophomore season at Washington back in 2011. Price, the Huskies quarterback, played well that day against Eastern Washington, throwing for three touchdowns, but was left watching as the Huskies needed a late interception to avoid a loss to the Eagles from the FCS.

With that history, Price is the last player on the roster of No. 17 Washington who's going to overlook Idaho State, the Huskies' opponent this afternoon.

"I'm definitely not looking past them," Price said. "I had a scare already and that's all I needed. I'm not looking past them by any means."

Today is the final tuneup for Washington (2-0) after blowing out Boise State and knocking off Illinois 34-24 last Saturday, and before beginning Pac-12 Conference play with a brutal fourgame run. The Huskies start with Arizona at home, before going to No. 5 Stanford, hosting No. 2 Oregon and closing out the run at No. 23 Arizona State.

That's all in the future

"The one thing about this game, as with every game. is it's about the process and embracing the process. It's not about who the opponent is on Saturday," Wash-

ington coach Steve Sarkisian said.

Idaho State (2-0) will at the very least test the Huskies pass rush and pass defense. The Bengals lead all of the FCS in yards passing through two games, both easy victories over Division II teams Dixie State and Western State. But making the jump from Division II opposition to a team ranked in the AP Top 25 is quite the challenge for the Bengals.

Here are five things to watch in the first meeting between the Huskies and Bengals:

SUPER SANKEY: If everything goes as desired for Washington, running back Bishop Sankey will be giving way early to his backups. The question is how many yards can Sankey possibly pile up while he's on the field. Sankey currently leads the country in rushing averaging with 184.5 yards per

game. It's doubtful he'll be

on the field long enough to pad his stats against the Bengals. "He sees holes that I know I wouldn't be able to see and he squeezes and finds a way to maneuver his body through those holes," Price said. "He's an excellent back."

RED ZONE EFFICIEN-CY: It's hard to find much fault in Washington's offensive production so far with 592 total yards vs. Boise State and 615 vs. Illinois. But Sarkisian is not satisfied with the field goals Washington has settled for at times. The Huskies are 9 of 10 this season scoring inside their opponents' 20 but three times have settled for field goals, all of them inside 35 yards.

STAY HEALTHY: When Idaho State made the trip to Nebraska last season it was a costly loss physically and mentally. The Bengals lost two players to major knee injuries in the 73-7 loss to the Cornhuskers and came out with a mental block that coach Mike Kramer said this week his team was never able to overcome. With Big Sky Conference play starting next week, the Bengals want to stay healthy. The same could be said for the Huskies. Washington middle linebacker

John Timu is already nursing a bruised shoulder suffered against Illinois and they don't need any more injury concerns before Pac-12 play.

CHUCK THE BALL: Washington's pass rush and pass defense will get challenged by the Bengals. Idaho State QB Justin Arias leads the FCS in yards passing per game at 434 and has thrown just one interception in 98 pass attempts. The Huskies were able to shut down Illinois' pass game last week and will be tested again.

NO LET DOWN: Washington realizes it has something good going. The

Huskies have not started a season 3-0 since 2001 and have a real shot at being 4-0 headed into an Oct. 5 showdown at Stanford. All the good built in two strong performances to start the season would be lost with a struggle against the Bengals. The Huskies say they're well aware of what has happened to schools like Oregon State, Kansas State and Connecticut facing FCS teams already this season. "We know they're hungry," Price said. "We know they're a very aggressive defense. We just have to do what we do minus the penalties and we'll be fine."

RUPERT • For the first time in four years, Diane Brumley could focus on what she loves most, teaching the children in her classroom.

tend St. Nicholas parish. When it was first established in 1958, St. Nicholas Catholic School had 100 students enrolled in first

But Brumley pointed out that, with a smaller school population, comes more one-on-one interaction with students. The largest class in the school is the first grade, with 14 students.

"I have said many times that the greatest vocation in the world is being a school principal," Remaley said. "It is not only my vocation, but it is also my avocation."



Pope Blasts Abortion after Decrying Focus on Rules

VATICAN CITY (AP) • Pope Francis offered an olive branch of sorts to the doctrine-minded, conservative wing of the Catholic Church on Friday as he denounced abortions as a symptom of today's "throw-away culand encouraged Catholic doctors to refuse to perform them.

Francis issued a strong anti-abortion message and cited Vatican teaching on the need to defend the unborn during an audience with Catholic gynecologists.

It came a day after he was quoted as blasting the church's obsession with "small-minded rules" that are driving the faithful away. In an interview that has sent shockwaves through the church, Francis urged its pastors to focus on being merciful and welcoming rather than insisting only on such divisive, hot-button issues as abortion, gay marriage and contraception.

Even before the interview was published, some conservatives had voiced disappointment that Francis had shied away from restating such church rules. Francis explained his reason for doing so in the interview with the Jesuit journal *La Civilta* Cattolica, saying church teaching on such issues is well-known, he supports it, but that he doesn't feel it necessary to repeat it constantly.

He did repeat it on Friday, however. In his comments, Francis denounced today's

"throw-away culture" that justifies disposing of lives, and said doctors in particular had been forced into situations where they are called to "not respect life."

"Every child that isn't born, but is unjustly condemned to be aborted, has the face of Jesus Christ, has the face of the Lord," he said.

He urged the gynecologists to abide by their consciences and help bring lives into the world. "Things have a price and can be for sale, but people have a dignity that is priceless and worth far

more than things," he said. Francis' comments to Civilta Cattolica contained no change in church teaching, but they represented a radical shift in tone and stood in stark contrast to the priorities of his two immediate

predecessors. John Paul II and Benedict XVI were both intellectuals for whom doctrine was paramount, an orientation that guided the selection of a generation of bishops and cardinals who, in countries like the United States, have put themselves on the front lines in opposing abortion and gay marriage.

GETTYSBURG, Pa. (AP) • The autograph hounds waiting expectantly in a hotel lobby weren't drawn by actors, musicians or politicians, but by a few dozen men whose rare and distinguished achievements have earned them the nation's highest military honor.

Nearly half of the 79 living recipients of Medal of Honor are attending the gathering in Gettysburg, where some of its first recipients fought 150 years ago.

The Medal of Honor Society annual convention gives the public an opportunity to collect the signatures of the men who have been honored by Congress for risking their lives beyond the call of duty in combat, and dozens of people waited Thursday for them to return from a luncheon at a nearby farm once owned by President Dwight Eisenhower.

Dave Loether, 62, a computer analyst from Pittsburgh, was hoping to add to the 55 signatures of Medal of Honor recipients he has collected on a U.S. Army flag. Loether knows many of their faces by sight - and their stories by heart.

"It's a piece of cloth with some ink on it - it's worthless," Loether said. "On the other hand, it's priceless."

The recipients' autographs sometimes end up on public auction sites, but Loether said he collects them as a hobby that began as a way to honor his sons in the military.

Recipients sat at tables ringing a hotel ballroom, including Clinton L. Romesha of Minot, N.D. President Barack Obama presented him with the honor in February for bravery in defending an Army outpost in Afghanistan four years ago.

Swiss Set to Preserve Militia Army for Now

ZURICH • Switzerland's 165year-old draft is set to withstand a third abolition attempt in two decades as voters in a Sunday referendum are seen backing a military tradition that has shaped generations of business executives.

Sixty-three percent of voters are ready to reject an initiative on Sept. 22 that would replace the current universal militia service with volunteers, while 31 percent are in favor, the latest survey by gfs.bern conducted for SRG SSR showed. While challengers are seeking to cut an annual tax bill of about \$5.1 billion for troops, opponents have argued it would leave the nation of 8 million at risk.

"The armed forces are like a fire brigade," said Philippe Hertig, an executive-search consultant at Egon Zehnder in Zurich, who has risen to the rank of captain in the Swiss air force during a career spanning almost three decades. "You never know if it will be used but without it, you don't feel se-

Swiss voters rejected attempts to abolish draft laws in 1989 and 2001. While the government plans to cut troops by 80,000 to about 100,000, those in favor of the initiative have argued the trimmed-down army would still cost an annual 4 billion francs in lost work days.

Some 6 percent of voters were undecided whether to back the initiative, according to the gfs.bern survey conducted Aug. 30 to Sept. 7 among 1,406 people. The margin of error was about 2.7 percentage points. The share of Swiss opposed to the proposal increased 6 percentage points from an August survey. Swiss voters are able to force a nationwide vote by collecting 100,000 signatures within 18 months.

Religious Tension Mounts in Holy City

High above Nazareth, an Israeli mayor wants to keep his city Jewish 'now and forever.'

NAZARETH ILLIT, Israel • This hilltop city has placid parks, broad avenues, low crime, a fancy mall and trash collection three times a week all very nice and neat, and by design, slightly

But not these days.

Over the past few years, well-to-do Arab Israelis, both Muslim and Christian, drove their minivans 10 minutes up the hill from the ancient, overcrowded nearly all-Arab city of Nazareth and snapped up some sweet but pricey fivebedroom, four-bath houses.

Many of the homes are worth a halfmillion dollars or more, and Arab citizens of Israel now count for 18 percent of the 50,000 residents in "Upper Nazareth," as it is translated in English.

They are welcome here, says the mayor, as long as they remember one very important rule.

"This is a Jewish city," said Shimon Gafsou of his adopted home town, "now and forever." To be more specific: "I would rather

cut off my right arm than build an Arab school," the mayor said in an interview on his terrace at city hall. Ditto mosques. "No, no, no. No mosques, ever," said Gafsou. Nor

churches. Or Ramadan lanterns or manger scenes. "And no Christmas trees," said the mayor of a town that abuts the largest Arab city in Israel, celebrated as the childhood home of Jesus. "Everyone can live here, that is the

law, as long as they understand this is a Jewish city," Gafsou said. "And in that way we are a microcosm of the state of

He said that "95 percent of Jewish mayors think the same thing. They're just afraid to say so out loud."

The situation here in Nazareth Illit may be a bit stark, even a little cartoonish, according to some critics of the colorful mayor, who is up for reelection next month. He has been temporarily sidelined from office after he was indicted Tuesday by the Israeli courts for allegedly accepting bribes, a charge he denies and says is politically motivated.

No matter, because he still appears to be the front-runner. And his town does reflect a central tension in Israeli society. In the current round of peace talks brokered by U.S. Secretary of State John F. Kerry, one of Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's demands is that Palestinians not only accept Israel's right to exist, but also recognize Israel as a Jewish state.

The parallel challenge is determining what Israel should do for the 21 percent of its citizens who are Arab, and what the Arab Israelis should do for Israel.

Arabs comprise large minorities in Jerusalem and in the southern Negev desert. Here in the northern district, not including the coastal metropolis of Haifa, there are more Arabs than Jews.

Israel guarantees its Arab citizens full and equal rights. But report after report documents the fact that spending for Arab citizens is lower, on average, in education, housing, business development and other areas.

Nazareth Illit is a classic Israeli "development," or new town, built with government support starting in the 1950s as a home for Jews on expropriated lands, according to historians.

But now, as elderly Jews die and young Jews move to Tel Aviv and its environs, the annual growth of the Jewish population in northern Israel has


slowed to just 3 percent, according to the government's 2010 census reports. At the same time, the Arab Israeli population was climbing 11 percent annually in the north.

"We call a place like this an 'invisible city, a kind of city within a city, here but not really seen, not recognized," said Kamli Tayoon, a project coordinator for Shatil, a group funded by the U.S.based New Israel Fund that promotes social justice and equality campaigns.

Tayoon said the group surveyed a sampling of the 9,000 Arab Israeli residents of Nazareth Illit and found the focus of their desire was a governmentfunded Arab Israeli school. There are hundreds of such schools in Israel. They teach the Israeli curriculum, including Hebrew and Israeli history, but in the students' mother tongue of Arabic. "There's an elementary school down the block, a two-minute walk, and a high school, five minutes away, but they are Jewish schools," said Sawsan Qudsi-Hamed, a teacher and mother of three, who is an Arab Israeli.

So she drives her kids to Nazareth to go to school.

Qudsi-Hamed has lived in Nazareth Illit for 20 years. She's happy here, she says. "Maybe for Jews this neighborhood is a step down, but for Arabs, it is paradise," she said.



Terrorist Attack Points to al-Qaida Surge in Yemen

Al-Qaida militants, disguised in military uniforms, launch multiple car bombings, killing 38 soldiers and police.

SANAA, Yemen (AP) • Under a heavy fog, al-Qaida militants disguised in military uniforms launched car bomb attacks on three different security and military posts in southern Yemen Friday, killing 38 soldiers in the group's biggest attack in the country since last year.

The coordinated attacks point to how al-Qaida is exploiting the continued weakness of Yemen's military to rally back here at a time when the group's branches across the region grow more assertive. More than two years after U.S. raid that killed Osama bin Laden, factions of the group he led are taking advantage of turmoil in multiple Arab nations to expand their presence and influence.

In Syria, foreign jihadis linked to or inspired by al-Qaida have become such a powerful force in the rebellion that the Syrian opposition on Friday accused them of being opportunists hijacking the uprising against President Bashar Assad. After the coup in Egypt toppled the Islamist president, al-Qaida leaders have called on sympathizers to join militants' fight there against the military. Iraq's al-Qaida branch has stepped up attacks in that country and extended operations into neighboring Syria.

Last month, the U.S. temporarily closed 19 diplomatic missions across the Middle East and North Africa after intelligence agencies intercepted a message between al-Qaida leader Ayman al-Zawahri and Nasser al-Wahishi, also a one-time confidant of bin Laden who leads the Yemen branch, known as al-Qaida in the Arabian Peninsula.

"I think there's been a promiscuous rush to write al-Qaida's obituary, and it's always been presumptuous. It's certainly had setbacks ... but its resilience has always been more formidable than we imagine," said Bruce Hoffman, director of the Center for Security Studies at Georgetown University.

Experts in extremist networks see no clear evidence of coordination between groups under the al-Qaida banner. But gains by one serve as powerful encouragement and recruiting tools for others.

"What matters perhaps more is how they may draw inspiration from each other," said Theodore Karasik, a security and political affairs analyst at the Dubaibased Institute for Near East and Gulf Military Analysis.

Mexico Looks for Landslide Victims

ACAPULCO, Mexico (AP) Mexican soldiers dug through tons of mud and dirt Friday in their continu-

ing search for landslide victims, as authorities looked for a federal police helicopter that went missing while carrying out relief operations on the flood-stricken Pacific coast.

The helicopter with three crew members on board was returning from the remote mountain village of La Pintada, where the mudslide occurred, when it went missing Thursday. There is still no sign of it, said Interior Secretary Miguel Angel Osorio Chong.

"They risked their lives all

the time," Osorio Chong said. "We are truly worried."

Search efforts continued in the town north of Acapulco, where 68 people were reported missing following Monday's slide. Two bodies have been recovered, but it was unclear if they were among those on the list of missing.

Federal police have been helping move emergency supplies and aid victims of massive flooding caused by Tropical Storm Manuel, which washed out bridges and collapsed highways throughout the area, cutting Acapulco off by land and stranding thousands of tourists

Simpson Votes, Smith Attacks

WASHINGTON, D.C. • U.S. Rep. Mike Simpson, R-Idaho, joined fellow congressional Republicans Friday in voting for a federal budget that would defund the Affordable Care

The eight-term lawmaker's vote was met with allegations from his conservative challenger that he succumbed to campaign pressure.

Tea party Republican Bryan Smith has blasted Simpson for weeks since Simpson refused to join the rest of Idaho's congressional delegation and pledge to only vote for a budget bill that axed Obamacare.

Simpson never was torn on the controversial Continuing Resolution passed Friday by a 230-189 party-line vote, said his spokeswoman, Nikki Watts. He wouldn't sign the GOP pledge because he didn't want to commit to a vote that would lead to a federal government shutdown, she said.

"He's been saying the entire time that he does not want a government shutdown," Watts said. "This bill

keeps government funded." But Smith's camp deemed Simpson's vote a flip-flop, driven by pressure from the conservative right.

Simpson's vote to "do the right thing" only followed "immense pressure from the people of the 2nd Congressional District," said Smith's campaign manager, Carrie Brown.

"We deserve a courageous conservative like Bryan Smith," Brown said, calling Smith someone who will lead the charge against big government.

Smith said in a letter to the Times-News this week that Simpson's previous 40 votes to defund or reshape Obamacare were hollow because the GOP-run House couldn't force the issue on the Democratic Senate.

Watts countered that

there's a lot more to the budget package than the ACA.

"I think some people are trying to make this all about defunding Obamacare," she

Conservatives see the ongoing budget battle, with the threat of a shutdown if a deal isn't reached by Sept. 30, as the best chance to kill the White House's 2010 health care reform bill.

The \$986 billion stopgap funding plan averts an immediate government shutdown, which could see thousands of federal employees furloughed.

But it also sets up a standoff with the Senate, especially since the House budget would scuttle Obamacare on the eve of the implementation of its most substantial pieces.

Smith's campaign is working to brand Simpson a false conservative, while lauding U.S. Rep. Raul Labrador, R-Idaho, as a true conservative.

GOP House: Keep Government Open, Hit 'Obamacare'

Charting a collision course with the White House, the Republican-controlled House approved legislation Friday to wipe out the 3-year-old health care law that President Barack Obama has vowed to preserve - and simultaneously prevent a partial government shutdown that neither party claims to want.

"The American people

don't want the government shut down, and they don't want "Obamacare," Speaker John Boehner said as members of his rank and file cheered at a celebratory rally in the Capitol moments after the 230-189 vote. He stood at a lectern bearing a slogan that read, "(hash)Senate must act."

Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid said it will - but not the way Boehner and his tea party-heavy Republican contingent want. Assured of enough Senate votes to keep the government open and the health care law in existence, the Nevada Democrat accused Republicans of attempting "to take an entire law hostage simply to appease

the tea party anarchists." Behind the rhetoric responded that Congress lay the likelihood of another in a series of complex, insidethe-Beltway brinkmanship episodes as conservative House Republicans and Obama struggle to imprint widely differing views on the U.S. government.

In addition to the threat of a partial shutdown a week from Monday, administration officials say that without passage of legislation to allow more federal borrowing, the nation faces the risk of a first-ever default sometime in the second half of next month.

House Republicans intend to vote to raise the nation's debt limit next week to prevent that from happening. But they have said they will include a one-year delay in Obamacare in the measure to reinforce their determination to eradicate the program.

The same bill will include provisions to reduce deficits and stay the administration's environmental agenda as the GOP seeks gains for its own priorities. Raising the cost of Medicare for financially better-off beneficiaries is one likely provision to be added, according to numerous officials. So, too, is a ban on federal regulations on greenhouse gas emissions.

Obama, who has said repeatedly he will not negotiate over debt limit legislation, called Boehner late in the day to tell him that directly. The speaker expressed disappointment, his office said, and

COLORADO RACES TO FIX ROADS BEFORE WINTER

BOULDER, Colo. (AP) • With snow already dusting Colorado's highest peaks, the state is racing to replace key mountain highways washed away by flooding, in some cases laying down crude, onelane gravel roads just to throw a lifeline to isolated towns before winter descends.

More than 200 miles of state highways and at least 50 bridges were damaged or destroyed across this rugged region, plus many more county roads. Fully rebuilding all of them is sure to take years. But for now, the work has to be fast, even if that means cutting corners. In the Rockies, the cold weather comes earlier, stays longer and brings with it countless dangers. The first storms could hit as soon as next month.





Declarer won the third, crossed to the diamond king, then took the percentage play when she finessed the diamond 10, unblocked the diamond ace, went to the spade king and ran diamonds, pitching a spade and a heart from hand. As the last diamond was led in what was about to be a four-card ending, declarer had produced an intriguing squeeze on West, an ending that Terence Reese has elegantly defined as a winkle.

West had to keep two spades and one club, and when she came down to the bare heart king, declarer led a heart from dummy. East could not rise with the ace and crash her partner's king, so she ducked and let West cash her heart and club. But that player then had to lead a spade into declarer's tenace and concede the rest.

It was 10 well-deserved IMPs to the Japanese team, on their way to a 24-6 win.

ANSWER: Don't be tempted to go looking for the gold at the end of the rainbow by bidding on. Here you cannot afford to invite game, facing a partner who was only able to bid one spade at his second turn. Your partner rates to have a minimum hand — and do not be surprised if he also has an awkward hand with just three spades, unsuitable for a call in no-trump.

On this date:

In 1792, the French National Convention voted to abolish the monarchy.

In 1893, one of America's first horseless carriages was taken for a short test drive in Springfield, Mass., by Frank Duryea, who had designed the vehicle with his brother, Charles.

In 1897, the New York Sun ran its famous editorial, written anonymously by Francis P. Church, which declared, "Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus."

In 1912, legendary cartoon animator Chuck Jones was born in Spokane, Wash.

In 1937, "The Hobbit," by J.R.R. Tolkien, was first published by George Allen & Unwin Ltd. of London.

In 1938, a hurricane struck parts of New York and New England, causing widespread damage and claiming some 700 lives.

In 1948, Milton Berle made his debut as permanent host of "The Texaco Star Theater" on NBC-TV.

In 1962, "The Jack Paar Program," a weekly, primetime show that followed Paar's stint on "The Tonight Show," began a three-year

In 1970, "NFL Monday Night Football" made its debut on ABC-TV as the Cleveland Browns defeated the visiting New York Jets, 31-21.

In 1982, Amin Gemayel, brother of Lebanon's assassinated president-elect, Bashir Gemayel, was himself elected president. National Football League players began a 57-day strike, their first regular-season walkout.

In 1987, NFL players called a strike, mainly over the issue of free agency. (The 24-day walkout prompted football owners to hire replacement players.)

In 1989, Hurricane Hugo rashed into Charleston, S.C. (the storm was blamed for 26 directly caused U.S. deaths). Twenty-one students in Alton, Texas, died when their school bus, involved in a collision with a soft-drink delivery truck, careened into a water-filled pit.

Ten years ago: Former Citigroup CEO John S. Reed was named temporary head of the New York Stock Exchange. Paul Martin was elected by Canada's Liberal Party to succeed Jean Chretien as prime minister. NASA's aging Galileo spacecraft deliberately plunged into Jupiter's turbulent atmosphere, bringing a fiery conclusion to a 14-year exploration of the solar system's

largest planet and its moons. Five years ago: South African President Thabo Mbeki announced his resignation. "Mad Men" became the first basic-cable show to win the top series Emmy; "30 Rock" and its stars Tina Fey and Alec Baldwin won comedy awards. The United States took back the Ryder Cup with a 16 1/2-11 1/2 victory over Europe. Baseball said farewell to the original Yankee Stadium as the Bronx Bombers defeated the Balti-

more Orioles 7-3. One year ago: No one was injured when a plane carrying Ann Romney made an emergency landing in Denver after smoke filled the cabin. The wife of the Republican presidential nominee Mitt Romney was traveling from Omaha, Neb., to Los Angeles, when an apparent electrical fire broke out. A man was bitten multiple times after leaping from a monorail into a tiger exhibit at the Bronx Zoo. People lined up to buy Apple's iPhone5 as it went on sale in the United States and several other countries.




