## We Can Grow From This'

**BURLEY** • The Dutchmen plant in Burley will close up shop by Nov. 15 and the Indianabased recreational vehicle manufacturer will take about 150 jobs with it.

The Dutchmen plant's exodus will be a blow to Burley's tax base and employment figures.

Dutchmen Manufacturing came to Burley in 2007 with the help of state and local government entities. Former Idaho governor Jim Risch presented more than \$1.5 million in state funds to help the manufacturer start producing travel trailers at its Burley site.

Dutchmen's pending closure is another chapter in the decade-long roller coaster of manufacturing in the Mini-Cassia region. It's an industrial landscape that's seen significant investment since 2004, but also lost some large-scale manufacturers.

Dutchmen's exodus - a blow to the city's tax base and employment figures - leaves behind ready-to-use infrastructure, city officials said. The buildings Dutchmen is leaving, for example, are a potentially attractive asset to would-be tenants.

"There are a lot of things that this community has done right. It's a shame to see Dutchmen go, but they are leaving a perfectly good building," said Burley Mayor Terry Greenman. "We have people coming to this state looking for an existing facility. That's just another opportunity."

From 2004 to 2012, Burley was able to bring in more than 10 notable businesses to help boost its economy, the state Department of Labor reports. Coast to Coast Carports, Mullholland Positioning Systems and Hy-Line N.A. are among the list of businesses that have bolstered the town's economy.

But a string of closures over the same period JR Simplot, Kraft Cheese and now Dutchmen - cast a shadow over the future of manufacturing in Burley.

Simplot's closure and the Great Recession in 2008 hit Cassia County especially hard. Unemployment jumped from 3.7 percent in September 2008 to 6.8 percent by September 2010, according to the Labor Department. That number has ticked down to 5.7 percent as of August, a full percentage point below the

state average.

The loss of 600 jobs at Simplot in 2003 "woke" Burley up, Greenman said.

"Since that time, 38-plus businesses have come to town to replace all of those jobs and more. Sometimes when things happen, it isn't a negative," Greenman said. "It's a wake-up call so we can see for ourselves who we really are and what we can do to invite businesses."

Greenman also cited the McCain Foods expansion that was currently in progress for

"They're going to build a new plant here and, from what I understand, it will have 140some employees with a \$54 million payroll. That's huge."

Watco LLC came to Burley in 2013 bringing with it 30 jobs and a \$2.5 million annual payroll. In addition to Watco and the McCain Foods expansion, DOT Foods is currently expanding its presence in the Mini-Cassia area.

Per-capita income in Cassia County, with its historic reliance on agriculture, has lagged well behind the state. But local earnings surpassed the state average in 2010, as the local economy evolved into a more industrial one.

And, though the occasional closure stains a decade of growth, the general trends leave local officials optimistic about the future.

"We are a strong community," Greenman said. "We can grow from this."

## Twin Falls Man Dies in Idaho 25 Crash

JEROME • A Twin Falls man died in a Tuesday evening crash on Idaho Highway 25, the Idaho State Police said Wednesday morning.

Delmis D. Beedle, 74, died of his injuries at the scene.

At about 9 p.m. Tuesday, near milepost 4 in Jerome County, Beedle was eastbound in a 2007 Pontiac G6. His vehicle struck the rear of a 2000 Kenworth driven by Jose J. Zarazua Zavala, 61, of Twin Falls, also eastbound.

Beedle was wearing his seat belt at the time of the crash, ISP said.

All lanes on Idaho 25 were blocked for about five hours. The crash is still under investigation.

## Man Arrested in Connection with Heyburn Murder

EDINBURG, Texas • Almost two months after Craig Glen Short was found dead at Christopher Cruz's residence in Heyburn, Cruz was arrested in Edinburg, Texas on Tuesday.

After the Aug. 2 shooting of Short, about 50 officers were on scene

from the Minidoka and Cassia county sheriffs offices, the Hevburn Police Department and Idaho State Police. Idaho Fish and Game officers helped secure the scene, where evidence was processed for 12 hours.



The case involved more than two homes and "a lot of evidence," Minidoka County Sheriff Eric Snarr said at the time, declining to elaborate.

Cruz, 21, was suspected of shooting Short at Cruz's residence at 423 S. 850 W., after a witness fled the scene to call 911.

A manhunt was launched and Cruz was declared "armed and dangerous."

At the time of the shooting, police were searching for Cruz and a possible accomplice, girlfriend Stephanie Pauline Juarez, 32, of Heyburn. Juarez has not been charged, but she remains a person of interest in the case.

Cruz is being held at the Hidalgo County Sheriff's Office in Edinburg, Texas on a \$1 million bond for charges of first-degree murder and Please see MURDER, A3

One Body Recovered at Craters of the Moon

## Search to resume for second missing woman.

The search will resume early today for the second of two Boise women missing after a trip to Craters of the Moon National Monument.

A body had been recovered just before dark Wednesday about two miles from a popular Craters trailhead parking lot. Butte County Sheriff Wes Collins said the dead woman is "definitely" one of the missing hikers. The identity of the dead woman will

be released this morning after family are notified, Collins said.

"It definitely looked like she had gotten lost and was trying to hike out," Collins said.

Jo Elliott-Blakeslee, 63, a physician at the Eastern Oregon Correctional Institution in Ontario, and Amelia Linkert, a retired special education teacher at Lowell Scott Middle School in Meridian who turns 70 today, were scheduled to return from Craters of the Moon on Saturday, two days after they arrived at the monument southwest

Friends and relatives described the women as experienced in the outdoors and unlikely to leave their dogs for long.

Friend and former colleague Deanna Salazar-Brown said Elliott-Blakeslee spends a lot of time outdoors and visits Hawaii each

"It doesn't surprise me that she was hiking and camping over there," Salazar-Brown said. "I'm really stunned and concerned to learn she's missing."

The two women parked their trailer at a KOA campground in Arco, about 22 miles northeast of the monument, Monument Superintendent Dan Buckley said. Their two labradoodle dogs and cellphones were found in a pickup truck parked at the Tree Molds Trailhead at the south end of the monument's popular driving loop and hiking trails.

Collins said he does not think the women were victims of a crime. Their purses and other items were still inside the truck parked at the trailhead.


"We're open to any possibility, but we don't see any signs of foul play," Collins said.

## Emergency Landing on Hwy. 93 Caused Plane, Car Collision

TWIN FALLS • Mrs. Clarence Smith knew the airplane was in trouble when she saw it, so she kept her eyes on its lights until it passed overhead.

That night in 1955, the Smith family was on its way from their home in Twin Falls to a Christmas party in Jerome. As they crossed the Perrine Memorial Bridge in their Chevrolet station wagon, they spotted the lights of a plane coming at them, barely 500 feet off the ground.

Above them, U.S. Air Force Lt. Clyde Seller was preparing to make an emergency landing on Highway 93.

Seller was flying a T33 Air Force jet from Williams Air Force Base in Arizona to Mountain Home when his instruments failed at 40,000 feet. Unable to see lights at the Twin Falls Municipal Airport, Seller looked for another place to land.

He circled his jet three times over Highway 93 north of Twin Falls before deciding to bring it down on the highway. The Smith family spotted the plane southbound on its third pass.

Seller turned and made a northbound landing on the two-lane highway north of the bridge. According to news reports, Seller flew the jet under high-powered electric lines before touching the ground.

The 100-mph landing would have been perfect, if it hadn't been for the 40-mph station wagon in the road.

Mrs. Smith knew almost immediately what had hit

"There was a flash of light, an explosion like a bomb," Mrs. Smith told the Times-News after the wreck. "The car rocked violently but while things made by man were demolished, things made by God remained intact."

Sellers tried to brake the plane. Smith - unaware of the aircraft behind him wasn't in a big hurry.

When a crash was immi-

nent, Seller tried to get airborne again, but he clipped the top of the car with a wing as he took off. The car lost its roof and rear left door, and the plane lost a wing tank.

No one in the wreck suffered serious injuries.

The photos that accompany this story were taken by KLIX-TV (Channel 11) film director Vic Graybeal a few months after the station went on the air. The new television station – a sister station to KLIX radio - was the first in Twin Falls. The KLIX stations were split in 1957, when Utah businessman Abe Glasmann bought the pair, then sold off the radio station. The television station then became KMVT - for Magic Valley Television.

## Week's Cold Temperatures Won't Last Much Longer



he cold air this week is a rude reminder that winter is just around the corner.

Many of the mountain locations across southern Idaho have seen their first snow of the season. The good news is that the cold fall weather is just a speed bump to the fall season. Higher temperatures will return by the weekend and early next week.

The raw, cold and showery weather will continue for today. Upper level storms will keep the moisture and cold temperatures in place for most of the day. The weekend will feature sunny skies and warmer temperatures, Saturday will reach the upper 60s and by Sunday we will be back into 70s.

Pocatello mental health care provider that closed its Burley and Twin Falls operations has taken the first step toward suing the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare.

The Idaho State Journal reports Seasons of Hope filed a tort claim contending the business sustained damages in excess of \$15 million after the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare suspended its Medicaid provider status amid a fraud investigation earlier this year.

A district judge found in June that Seasons of Hope didn't commit any fraud but he did order the company to pay the Department of Health and Welfare about \$94,000.

In the tort claim, Seasons of Hope says the Department of Health and Welfare was trying to put the company out of business by launching the investigation. Under state law, a party that wants to sue the state must first notify the potential defendant by filing a tort claim requesting dam-

If the state denies the tort claim or fails to respond within 180 days, a lawsuit may be filed.

Seasons of Hope once

had more than 100 employees in seven offices throughout southern and eastern Idaho. But in March, the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare notified the company its Medicaid that provider status was being suspended.

The letter also said department officials believed Seasons of Hope owed about \$449,000 for fraudulent Medicaid claims. As a result, the company closed its offices. Meanwhile, Seasons of Hope owner Heath Sommer appealed the Health and Welfare Department's actions.

After a hearing, District Judge Peter McDermott said that billing errors didn't amount to fraud and he reversed the suspension. The Department of Health and Welfare has since appealed the judge's decision, and Department Director Richard Armstrong has roughly six weeks to make a decision on the appeal.

Meanwhile, at least 19 former employees of Seasons of Hope have filed a lawsuit against the company in Pocatello's 6th District Court contending that they are owed wages and other benefits lost when the company closed its doors.

In the tort claim against the state, Seasons of Hope includes those wages and benefits as part of its claims for damages against the Department of Health and

# Finding the Balance at Auger Falls

Citizens and Twin Falls city planners meet to discuss future plans for the park.

TWIN FALLS • Striking a balance between public access and preserving a precious resource. That's the challenge that city planners face as plans move forward to develop Auger Falls.

In 2005, a group of citizens met to discuss what they wanted for the future of the near-600-acre, cityowned area around Auger

Wednesday, several original members, along with some new faces, met to see if the plan was on track.

Access to the falls was closed after Memorial Day to allow work to begin on the Auger Falls pipeline project.

At Wednesday's meeting, city engineer Lee Glaesemann said access is set to reopen mid- to late-October.

During the pipeline project, the road into the area has been widened and straightened out, getting rid of blind corners and other hazards.

But what's next for the area?

Much of Wednesday's meeting focused on how to balance the many uses for Auger Falls - hiking, bicycling, river access, bird watching and more - with the natural and historical resources that need to be protected.

Glaesemann and Dennis Bowyer, city parks and recreation director, outlined the history of the access to the area and what the future might hold.

Right now, there are no plans for restrooms or paved roads through the park, and access might be limited during certain parts of the year, like critical nesting periods

for birds, Bowyer said.

Everyone should be able to see Auger Falls, but the challenge will be keeping visitors in designated areas, he said.

"If we just swing open the gates and let people in 24 hours a day, we're afraid that they'll love it to death," Glaesemann said.

Possibilities for development include hiking trails, a mountain bike trail, historical signage and other interpretive sites, scenic lookouts, an educational day camp and river access restoring, all while restoring natural areas and preserving important historical sites like the Urie Homestead.

Wetlands filled by treated

wastewater, to support water birds and other wildlife yearround, are also in the works.

Fires in 2005 and 2010

burned black swaths through formerly green wildlife corridors.

"There was some great wildlife habitat that we lost," Glaesemann said.

Additional water features and green spaces with native plants will help reduce wildfire danger, he said.

"Perennial native or nearnative plants are less sparse and the fire doesn't like to burn through as hot or fast," he said.

City planners shouldn't rush into the restoration of the area, said Lance Bennett, with Conservation Seeding and Restoration.

"It took 150 years to degrade the area," Bennett said. "It's going to take time to get it back to native or semi-na-

Karl Ruprecht, with the Prairie Falcon chapter of the National Audubon Society, said he first walked the road between the wastewater plant and the current parking lot when he was 5-years-

Ruprecht said he was a little  $sa\bar{d}$  that the road has been widened, but in the long run, can see positive change coming to the area.

"Hopefully the ends justify the means," he said.

## What Impact Will \$73.86M School Bond Have on Twin Falls Taxpayers?

TWIN FALLS • The Twin Falls school board didn't take any action Wednesday at its meeting, but listened to an analysis of what a potential \$73.86 million bond could mean to taxpayers.

In July, a 32-member committee recommended the Twin Falls School Dis-

trict build two new elementary schools and a new middle school and suggested that a bond be taken to voters during the March 2014 elec-

Other proposed projects include adding a new classroom building on the west of Canyon Ridge High School for 480 students, building wide improvements to Twin Falls High School and increased safety and security measures such as surveillance and intrusion detec-

Eric Heringer, the district's bond adviser, said based on his estimates, the monthly tax impact on a \$150,000 home would be a monthly total of \$19.75. The monthly tax impact on a \$250,000 home would be \$44.50. A \$300,000 business' month-

"The bottom line is just about \$4.88 or \$5 a month increase," trustee Paul Mc-Clintock said Superintendent Wiley Dobbs said right now taxpayers are paying about \$15 for total school levies. In 2006, the district passed a \$49.7 million bond to build Canyon Ridge High School and in 2008 passed a plant levy authorizing annual collections of \$3.3 million for 10 years for maintenance

at the district's facilities. Scott Straubhar of Hummel Architects - the school district's facilities consultant said from Oct. 1-21 they will be polling 450 community members to gather information that may affect some of the details in the committee's facility plan. He said he also wants to get a

sense of how informed community members are of the facility committee's recommendations and the proposed bond.

# Heritage Language Programs on the Rise

**MIAMI** • Dorothy Villarreal grew up dreaming in Spanish, first in Mexico and later in South Texas, where her family moved when she was six. She excelled in school - in English. But at home, life was in Spanish, from the long afternoon chats with her grandparents to the Spanishlanguage version of Barbie magazines she eagerly awaited each month. She figured she was fluent in both languages.

Then the Harvard University junior spent last summer studying in Mexico and realized just how big the gaps in her Spanish were.

"We were talking about the presidential election, and there was so much I wanted to explain," Villarreal said. "We'd end up playing a guessing game where I'd speak in English, and my friends, they'd speak back in Spanish to guess what I was

Villarreal's experience is increasingly common in America, where one in five children grows up in a home where English isn't the sole language. To help them fill in the gaps, universities are adapting their foreign language curriculum, in part to better prepare graduates for a globalized world where it pays to be professionally fluent in more than one language.

Children in multi-lingual homes grow up a step ahead of other would-be language learners. They can easily engage in small talk or follow the latest soap opera in their families' native language. Yet when it comes to meatier topics, or reading and writing, they are stuck.

The linguistic gaps become apparent in high school, where these students can snooze through basic language classes but often drown in more advanced ones - if their heritage language is even offered. After all, how many American high schools offer Arabic or Korean?

With 37 million Spanishspeakers in America, most heritage classes are in Spanish, and courses have bloomed across campuses in California, Florida and several Southwestern states. They have also begun to take hold in schools like Harvard University, which added a course this year.

Villarreal, who hopes to work in Latin America for an international business or for the U.S. government, "and not make a fool of myself," was among the first to sign up. She jumped at the chance to beef up her formal Spanish without the pressure of an advanced class with non-Latino classmates who might have thick accents but rarely misplace an accent mark.

That pressure, and the embarrassment of not being able to read or write a language they are supposed to know, can hold students back in regular classes, said Harvard Professor Maria Luisa Parra Velasco, who created the new Spanish course. So too can the stigma of speaking "bad Spanish," or a more colloquial version of a language they learned at home, she said.

Beyond language, the heritage class offers Villarreal a rare academic space to examine topics she's less comfortable talking about with her mostly white and uppermiddleclass peers. She contrasted the heritage class with the course she runs to immediately after: an advanced, general Spanish class on cultural practices of the U.S.-Mexico border. In that class, Villareal said she is uncharacteristically quiet.

"We're talking in this abstract way about what the border is, and I'm thinking I went to school five minutes from the border. For me the border is what shuts down my school when the (Department of Homeland Security) helicopters come to find the people trying to cross," she

Heritage language programs have existed in the U.S. in some form for more than a century as a way to retain both language and culture — even as English-only movements waxed and waned. German schools were common in the late 1800s. Youth in California have long attended weekend Chinese and Japanese programs. Bilingual Spanish classes have been around for decades.

Yet the development of separate heritage language university instruction is relatively new. The University of Texas-Pan American received funding from the Department of Education in 2007 to create a minor in medical Spanish for heritage speakers, and other schools are beginning to replicate the program.

Spanish classes aren't the only heritage courses on the rise. Harvard already has heritage programs in Russian, Chinese and Korean, which the U.S. government considers strategically critical languages for diplomacy and counterintelligence.

The National Heritage Language Resource Center at the University of California, Los Angeles, funded by the U.S. Department of Education since 2006, recently conducted the first national survey of higher education heritage instruction and found specialized instruction in 34 states. Chinese, Korean, Russian and Farsi were among the most popular after Spanish.

## Feds: Vegas Police Better at Tracking Use of Force

LAS VEGAS • The head of a federal law enforcement oversight group credited Las Vegas police Wednesday with upgrading training, keeping better track of how and when officers use deadly force, and instituting a pilot program to put cameras on the uniforms of some offi-

The acting head of the U.S. Justice Department's Community Oriented Policing Services told reporters that the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department has addressed or completed all but nine of 80 reforms called for in a report the agency made public 10 months ago.

"We're talking significant progress in a matter of months, COPS Acting Director Joshua Ederheimer said at a news conference with U.S. Attorney Daniel Bogden and Clark County Sheriff Doug Gillespie.

Ederheimer noted that other police departments take years or decades to implement reforms, and said the collaborative COPS review appeared to be having an effect in Las Vegas.

"The number of officer involved shootings is gradually declining, he said.

After peaking at 25 shootings in 2010, Las Vegas police were involved in 17 officerinvolved shootings in 2011, 11  $\,$ 

in 2012 and 10 so far this year, the report said. Four people died in police shootings in 2012, and two this year, department officials said.

Ederheimer, Bogden and Gillespie said some of the nine unresolved recommendations depended on action by other agencies, such as a proposal that the Clark County district attorney dedicate resources to more fully investigate officer-involved shootings.

Other recommendations, like a call for training and evaluating Las Vegas police officers on their ability to deescalate tense confrontations, weren't assessed yet but would be made part of a final report due in February, Ederheimer said.

One, which would have police officers involved in on-duty shootings provide statements to criminal investigators, may never be implemented, the report said. It said police unions were directing Las Vegas officers involved in shootings not to cooperate with deadly force investigations.

The head of the Las Vegas Police Protective Association, Chris Collins, disputed that finding. He said officers routinely cooperate in several layers of post-shooting departmental and administrative reviews. But he said officers are advised not to provide statements in legal proceedings unless they are

granted so-called Garrity protection from criminal prosecution - meaning their words won't be used to selfincriminate them.

COPS was enlisted in January 2012 to study Las Vegas police use-of-force policies and practices aimed at cutting the number of officerinvolved shootings, after a series of high-profile police shootings and a Las Vegas Review-Journal analysis that tallied 142 people killed by Las Vegas police in a little more than a decade. The newspaper investigation concluded that Las Vegas police were quicker to the trigger than officers in other similarly sized cities.

COPS officials Wednesday termed the resulting review a "collaborative reform model.

Gillespie, the elected chief of a Las Vegas police force that includes about 3,200 sworn police and jail officers and 1,500 civilians, has announced he won't seek a third term as sheriff. But he promised the reforms would continue.

"Actions speak louder than words, Gillespie said. "We were, we are and we continue to be committed to these reforms,"

Ederheimer noted that his agency planned to use the Las Vegas experience in similar police practices reviews of departments in Philadelphia and Spokane, Wash.

## Lawyer: Manning's Gender Issues Being Assessed

BRISTOL, R.I. • The lawyer who defended Army Pvt. Chelsea Manning against charges of leaking classified information said Wednesday that his client is being assessed at a military prison for gender identity disorder, and that he's hopeful the military will allow Manning to receive hormone therapy.

Civilian attorney David Coombs spoke to more than 150 students and faculty at Roger Williams University School of Law, where he has taught. Manning, previously known as Bradley, is serving a 35-year sentence for a July conviction on espionage and other offenses for sending more than 700,000 documents and some battlefield video to the anti-secrecy website WikiLeaks. She said after she was sentenced that she wishes to live as a woman and receive hormone therapy. The military previously said it does not provide

Coombs said the military prison at Fort Leavenworth, Kan., brought in an expert, whom he would not identify, to assess Manning's overall health, including her previously diagnosed gender dysphoria – the sense that she is a woman in a man's body. Manning was diagnosed with gender dysphoria by two Army behavioral health specialists before her trial, but the Army has said prisoners must be re-evaluated when they are moved to a new facility.

"They seem to be a person with the heart in the right place. They want to make sure they get the call right and they do what is in the best interest of Chelsea," Coombs said.

"I have confidence that they're going to do an honest appraisal, so I'm hoping that when they do that, that results in that treatment," Coombs added after the talk. "I think the facility is doing all the right things at this point, looking at it and not ruling anything out."

A Fort Leavenworth spokeswoman said she forwarded questions from The Associated Press about Manning's status to the U.S. Disciplinary Barracks but did not receive an immediate re-

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## Idaho Aquarium, Workers Guilty in Fla. Fish Scheme

KEY WEST, Fla. (AP) • An Idaho aquarium and two of its workers have pleaded guilty in Florida to illegally scheming to purchase and transport marine wildlife, including sharks and rays.

Federal court records show the guilty pleas were entered Tuesday in Key West by Idaho Aquarium Inc. and two of its officers: Ammon Covino and Christopher Conk, both 40. Prosecutors say the conspiracy involved spotted eagle rays and lemon sharks that were intended for display at the aquarium.

Authorities intercepted communications in which Covino and Conk told Florida suppliers to ignore the law and make the shipments. Each faces up to five years in prison.

Under a plea agreement, the aquarium will pay a \$10,000 criminal fine, be placed on probation and make a \$50,000 donation to the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation.

## Nevada Black Bears on the Prowl for Food

CARSON CITY, Nev. • Nevada's black bears are on the prowl for high calorie comfort food to pack on pounds before winter.

The increased bear activity is keeping biologists with the Nevada Department of Wildlife busy to make sure the hungry bruins don't get into trouble by getting too close to people.

Wildlife officials also want residents to do their part by limiting easy pickings that attract foraging bears and lure them into situations that could lead to their death.

Trash is a No. 1 menace. Bears that become addicted to trash can lose a fear of hu-

mans, instead associating them with food. Such bears can become aggressive, a trait that many times leads to them being destroyed as a public safety hazard.

Garbage, bird feeders, pet food and fruit trees also provide tasty buffets for bears.

"People with fruit trees are asked to pick ripened fruit from the trees and off the ground as soon as possible in order to avoid any problems with bears," NDOW biologist Carl Lackey said Wednesday. "We need to keep people and property safe and these bears wild."

This is the time of year when bears develop a voracious appetite and increase their daily caloric intake from 3,000 calories per day to 25,000 or more.

It's a physiological change known as hyperphagia, when bears eat as much as they can to put on as much fat as possible to sustain them through winter hibernation.

"Nothing much gets in the bear's way when they are this hungry," Lackey said.

This week alone, NDOW said there has been a sharp increase in bear activity in the foothills and valleys of western Nevada, from Verdi and Reno to Topaz Ranch Estates in Douglas County and Yerington in Lyon County.

In recent days, at least five bears have been struck and killed by vehicles, another indication that they are on the move in search of food, NDOW spokesman Chris Healy said. The latest casualty was Saturday night in the Foothill Road area of Douglas County.

Game Warden Mike Mc-Cusker said the agency has four bear traps and all have been set out to capture bears that have gotten too comfortable around civilization.

"The goal is to trap these bears, perform aversion conditioning and release the bears, unharmed but chastised, back into the wild," he said.

With aversion therapy, bears are shot with rubber bullets and chased by Karelian bear dogs when they are released. The idea is to make bears uncomfortable around people and alter their behavior.

The agency has used the tactic nearly 400 times since the late 1990s.

## Change Proposed in Critical Habit for Lynx in US

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**SEATTLE (AP)** • The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has proposed a revision in the critical habitat designation for a species of lynx listed as threatened under the Endangered Species Act.

The proposal would designate more than 41,000 square miles within the states of Maine, Minnesota, Montana, Idaho, Washington and Wyoming as critical habitat for the Canada lynx.

The federal government is asking for public comment on aspects of the proposal, including whether areas where the lynx have recently moved into, including parts of New Hampshire and Vermont, should be added to the critical habitat.

The proposed revision comes after several snowmobiling groups launched unsuccessful legal challenges of the previously designated critical habitat.

As part of the proposal announced Wednesday, federal officials said they considering excluding more than 1,900 square miles of tribal lands within the states of Maine, Montana and Washington.

The new critical habitat adds some land as well, including some private timber lands in northern Maine, as well as Bureau of Land Management and National Park Service land in northeastern Wyoming. The lynx have been protected since 2000.

The Center for Biological Diversity applauded the Fish and Wildlife proposal, saying the extra space could help the rare wildcat whose population has been reduced by trapping and habitat loss.

"Like many animals, Canada lynx need quiet places free of disturbance from snowmobiles and other human activities to survive, so we're thrilled the Fish and Wildlife Service has proposed expanding their critical habitat," said Noah Greenwald, endangered species director at the Center for Biological Diversity.

The federal government has also asked the public to consider whether some lands in Colorado, New Mexico, Wyoming and Washington should be considered essential habitat, in part because they connect the places where lynx live.



## New \$100 Bill Has Ink Well, More Color, 3-D

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) • A glitzier, high-tech version of America's \$100 bill is rolling off the presses and headed for wallets soon.

Despite years of production-related delays, the updated \$100 bill has undergone a major makeover that includes a color-changing ink well, 3-D security ribbon, and more texture on Benjamin Franklin's collar.

The new, more expensive C-note is scheduled to enter circulation Oct. 8 and also has a higher calling: It aims to fight back against counterfeiters by using better printers and technology.

The modifications will help people check for fake \$100s without going to a bank or using a blacklight, said Michael Lambert, a deputy associate director at the Federal Reserve.

"We try and find security

features that can be used at a number of different levels, from more experienced cash handlers ... down to the person on the street who really needs to know the security features so they can protect themselves," Lambert said in an interview Wednesday.

The new \$100 bill still bears the image of Franklin, one of America's Founding Fathers. But it adds part of the Declaration of Independence, written in script from Franklin's left shoulder to the right edge of the bill. A quill and an ink well are printed behind the text, and a blue ribbon goes down near the center of the bill.

The ink in the well changes colors from copper to green when the bill is turned. A watermark of Franklin also appears on the right side of the bill when it's held up to light.

## 'YELLOW BRICK ROAD' LEADING TO NEW ENGLAND PIRATE BOOTY

BREWSTER, Mass. (AP) • He calls it "the yellow brick road" because it's literally sprinkled with gold dust.

This road runs along Cape Cod's shifting seafloor, and undersea explorer Barry Clifford believes it leads to undiscovered treasure from the wreck of the pirate ship Whydah

About two weeks ago, Clifford and his dive team took a previously unplanned trip back to the wreck site, and Clifford returned more convinced than ever that the road he's exploring is a path to riches.

"We think we're very, very close," Clifford said.

The Whydah sank in a brutal storm in 1717 with plunder from 50 ships on board. Clifford discovered the wreck site in 1984 off Wellfleet and has since pulled up 200,000 artifacts, including gold ornaments, sword handles, even a boy's leg.

But just this year, Clifford learned far more treasure may be resting with the Whydah, the only authenticated pirate ship wreck in U.S. waters.

Colonial-era documents discovered in April indicated the Whydah raided two vessels in the weeks before it sank. Its haul on those raids included 400,000 coins, the records said.

A Sept. 1 dive during what was supposed to be Clifford's last trip of the season uncovered evidence he was near

# Loss of Legal Aid a Social Tragedy

daho State Police respond to a domestic violence call every 88 minutes and more than 630 victims of domestic violence, primarily women, look for help each day from social programs in Idaho, according to data compiled by the Idaho Coalition Against Sexual and Domestic Violence and ISP.

The Violence Policy Center released a report Wednesday that nearly two out of every 100,000 Idaho women die at the hands of an abusive partner — the seventh highest rate in the nation.

Let that sink in for a minute.

It's with statistics like these in our minds that we groaned when Idaho Legal Aid Services informed us it will drastically reduce its representation for indigent battered women because of federal budget cuts. Hundreds of women, with nowhere else to turn, rely on the organization's attorneys to win them legal protection.

But no more.

Did we mention 18 Idahoans died in 2011 after being beaten by their partner?

Idaho Legal Aid Services has for years relied on federal and state grants to fund its open-forall legal service. The continued federal sequester cost the U.S. Department of Justice \$20 million in grant funding that had been offered to organizations such as Idaho Legal Aid Services through the Violence Against Women Act. The organization's federal funding ceases on Sept. 30, the end of the fiscal year. Other federal funding for the program, through the Legal Services Corp., precipitously dropped more than \$250,000 since 2010, said Jim Cook, ILAS' executive director.

The organization's attorneys represented 82 women in 2012 at its Twin Falls office alone. Another 475 local women were guided through finding private legal help that year.

When lawmakers faced the inconvenience of delayed airline flights earlier this year because of the sequester, they scurried to fix the issue. But victims of domestic violence aren't getting such

Cook and his board of directors used one-day furloughs and other cost-cutting measures to make it this far. But, starting Tuesday, the organization's level of representation of Idaho's beaten, raped and trapped women will be a mere shadow

Without these services, fewer women will have somewhere to turn, a hand to guide them through the complexities of the legal system.

The state and federal governments spent years in budgetary crises mode. Legislators in Washington are trapped in a battle that saw one U.S. senator stand at a podium for more than 21 hours this week, simply talking in order to delay a vote on a three-month budget bill.

The nation's eyes are focused on the Affordable Care Act, the core of the partisan squabble. If a deal isn't reached by Sept. 30, thousands of federal employees across the nation could be furloughed.

But Obamacare is serving as a distraction from the devastation leveled by the sequester and other budget cuts.

Apparently, helping our most helpless isn't "essential."

How sad.



## Obamacare Worries a Local Physician

n creating a new health clinic in Twin Falls, the physicians, nurses and others who are part of the effort are focused on one thing: providing health access to those who don't have it. It is the goal of physicians across Idaho and the country. Physicians and nurses are the ones who have to look patients in the eye and tell them difficult news.

That's why so many physicians are worried about some of the "cost saving" sections of the Affordable Care Act (ACA) which the president calls Obamacare – that would take medical decision making out of the hands of physicians and give it to the federal government.

In an effort to cut costs, ACA puts a cap on health care spending, promising to limit access if costs go above the targets. This is ironic since health care reform was sold as a way to expand access to many who do not have it.

There are several problems with this approach for physicians, but more importantly, for those who don't have access to the

health care they need.

The first way ACA attempts to cut costs is through a panel called the Independent Payment Advisory Board (IPAB), a panel that will determine what treatments to restrict in order to meet the financial targets. Decisions made by the IPAB about what types of care are restricted are based primarily on financial considerations. A new medicine that is more effective and has fewer side effects may, nonetheless, be restricted because the panel needs to find a way to cut costs. This may be a great way to cut spending, but it is a horrible way to practice medicine.

In some cases, failure to properly treat a patient results not only in ongoing illness and pain, but also can end up costing more over the long run in lost wages, visits to the emergency room and other costs of poor health.

Physicians are keenly aware of costs and we work hard to find the best treatment at a reasonable price. Finding the right balance of care and cost, however, for the patient in our care, is best left with doctors and their patients.

Second, some have argued that government should be allowed to "negotiate" with companies providing medicines or other treatments to get the lowest cost. This might indeed cut costs to the federal government. Some companies providing devices or medicines will agree to lower prices, finding a way to cut their costs.

What happens, however, if a particular treatment is unavailable because its inventor can't sell it at the government's preferred price? The only option for government negotiators is to prevent that treatment from being prescribed to anyone on Medicare. This is a heads-Iwin-tails-you-lose situation for patients. If the government is successful in negotiating a price, the government keeps the extra money. If they are unsuccessful, the patient

loses access to the care they need.

As the work of our clinic expands, we understand that budget pressures will hit us, just as they hit the federal government and everyone else involved in providing health care. We face those constraints every day and understand the need to choose effective but cost-efficient treatments.

But every patient is different and efforts to restrict a whole range of treatments is not a sound approach to medical care. That is one reason we began our work at the Mustard Seed. We believe we can offer the best care to those in need, without the many strings and difficulties imposed by government programs. We are fortunate to have the choice. Unless Congress makes important changes to Obamacare, others may not have that choice.



## Man Pleads Guilty to Manslaughter, **Burying Body**

OGDEN, Utah (AP) • As Neider, said her client was the family of the victim wept in the courtroom, a Utah pleaded guilty Wednesday to stabbing and burying a California man in a backyard.

Daniel Rivera, 33, pleaded guilty Wednesday in an Ogden courtroom to manslaughter and desecration of a human body, The Salt Lake Tribune reported. Prosecutors said that he stabbed Victor Flores, 25, after the two got into a confrontation in Rivera's car May 9, 2011.

Flores' body was not found until 10 months later, Feb. 10, 2012, when police received a tip to search the Roy, Utah, backyard of Rivera's girlfriend, Sarah Munn. Court documents say Rivera rented a tractor to dig a hole in Munn's backyard the day after Flores died. Munn was later charged with obstruction of justice, but that charge was dismissed this month when she pleaded guilty to a separate drug charge.

Rivera's attorney, Camille

acting in self-defense and does not admit guilt. But, she said he chose to plead guilty because he believes prosecutors would have been able to prove the charges to a jury.

Rivera will be sentenced Nov. 6. He could receive up to 20 years in prison. He is already serving time in prison after escaping from a jail work release program in 2011. Several of Flores' family members traveled from Los Angeles to Ogden to observe the proceedings and address the court. They said it was a grueling 10 months not knowing what happened to Flores.

"To see him just thrown in the ground, it hurts me," said his brother, Hugo Flores. "He was like my best friend."

The victim's mother, Leena Flores, said Rivera lied to them about what happened. "He not only killed my son, he killed all of us," she said through a Spanish interpreter, the Tribune reported.

## Mother of Kurt Cobain Selling Childhood Home

ABERDEEN, Wash. (AP) • This month marks the 20th anniversary of Nirvana's final studio album, and fans aren't just able to buy a new "super deluxe" box set to celebrate the occasion. They also can buy the childhood home of late frontman Kurt Cobain, complete with his mattress.

Cobain's mother, Wendy O'Connor, is putting the tired, 1.5-story bungalow two hours southwest of Seattle on the market this week.

To help sell it, the family is offering a glimpse into the early life of its tortured and talented son through photos shot at the house, including one of a chocolate-frosted birthday cake for Kurt and a shot of a teenage Cobain smiling, guitar in hand, in his messy room.

The home, last assessed at less than \$67,000, is being listed for \$500,000. It's a short walk from a riverfront park dedicated to Cobain's memory, and the family said it would welcome a partnership to make the home into a museum. His room still has the stencil-like band names -Iron Maiden, Led Zeppelin he reportedly put on the walls, as well as the holes he put in

"We've decided to sell the home to create a legacy for Kurt, and yes, there are some mixed feelings since we have all loved the home and it carries so many great memories," Cobain's sister, Kim Cobain, said in an emailed statement. "But our family has moved on from Washington, and (we) feel it's time to let go of the home."

The house, a 1923 structure with dingy carpeting, waterstained wooden shingles on some interior walls, and a recent coat of yellow paint, is on East 1st Street in Aberdeen, a gritty and struggling former timber town at the mouth of the Chehalis River near the southwest Washington coast.

Cobain's parents bought it in 1969, when Kurt was 2. He lived there until they separated when he was 9, and again with his mom during his later teen years.

heroin-addicted The Cobain committed suicide in Seattle in 1994, at age 27, after

a meteoric career that popularized the Pacific Northheavy, muddy "grunge" rock. The last of Nirvana's three studio albums, "In Utero," came out in September 1993, and Universal Music Group has released a remastered version and a 'super deluxe" box set.

Cobain described his early childhood in Aberdeen as happy. As author Charles R. Cross noted in his Cobain biography, "Heavier Than Heaven," he would ride his bike around the small yard and pound on a set of Mickey Mouse drums his parents bought him. In one event that entered family lore, Cobain's father, Don, trapped a rat in a garbage can in the garage. Don tried to spear it with a broomstick, but the rodent clambered up the handle, over Don's shoulder to the ground and across Kurt's toes to safety - prompting endless laughter from the 5-year-old.

But his parents' divorce scarred him deeply. At one point, he scrawled "I hate Mom, I hate Dad" on his bedroom wall, Cross wrote.

"It's a place where he had very fond memories, but it's the house where his parents got divorced," Cross said in an interview. "He couldn't wait to get away, but it's a place that helped shape who he be-

The home was last lived in by a family friend four years ago. According to The Agency, the Beverly Hills, Calif.-based luxury real estate firm marketing the property, it features

the dining room table and hutch from when Cobain lived there. Cobain's mattress is tucked away in a musty upstairs crawl space.

Cobain lived in about 20 houses in his life, Cross said, and this isn't the first one offered for sale based on its connection to rock history.

In 2002, an Oregon couple bought a home in nearby Montesano for \$42,500. When they learned that Cobain had lived there with his father from 11 to 15, they sold it for \$210,000.

## FBI: Navy Yard Gunman Left Note about Radio Waves

WASHINGTON (AP) • Washington Navy Yard gunman Aaron Alexis left a note saying he was driven to kill by months of bombardment with extremely low-frequency radio waves, the FBI said Wednesday in a disclosure that explains the phrase he etched on his shotgun: "My ELF Weapon!"

Alexis did not target particular individuals during the Sept. 16 attack in which he killed 12 people, and there is no indication the shooting stemmed from any workplace dispute, said Valerie Parlave, assistant director in charge of the FBI's Washington field office. Instead, authorities said, his behavior in the weeks before the shooting and evidence recovered from his hotel room, backpack and other belongings reveal a man increasingly in the throes of paranoia and

"Ultra-low frequency attack is what I've been subject to for the last 3 months, and to be perfectly honest that is what has driven me to this," read an electronic document agents recovered after the shooting.

The attack came one month after Alexis had complained to police in Rhode Island that people were talking to him through the walls and ceilings of his hotel room and sending microwave vibrations into his body to deprive him of

On his shotgun, he had scrawled "My Weapon!" - an apparent reference to extremely lowfrequency waves - along with "End to the Torment!" "Not what yall say" and "Better off this way," the FBI said.

Alexis, a 34-year-old former Navy reservist and computer technician for a government contractor, used a valid badge to get into the Navy Yard and opened fire inside a building with the Remington shotgun, which he had legally purchased in Virginia two days earlier. He also used a 9 mm handgun that he took from a security guard, a weapon found near Alexis' body. He was killed in the building by a U.S. Park Police officer following a rampage and



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## Charges: Up to \$300K Stolen from Wash. Senate Dems

**SEATTLE** • The former head of a campaign committee supporting Democratic state Senate candidates has been charged with theft after prosecutors said he admitted embezzling up to \$300,000 to feed his drinking and gambling habits.

Michael King, 32, faces eight counts of theft in King County Superior Court. Charging papers filed Tuesday say he confessed to stealing \$200,000 to \$300,000.

"I did these things and I have to accept consequences and I do," King said during a recorded interview with a prosecutor, according to a

filed in the case.

King, who had been respected in political circles for his acumen, headed the Senate Democratic Campaign Committee, which fielded donations from political action committees, companies and individuals and directed them to Democratic senators and candidates.

The financial irregularities came to light after a review discovered that King had appeared to have spent significant sums on polling after last fall's election, when there was no reason to conduct polling, Seattle police said.

His bank account showed dozens of withdrawals made at Goldie's casino in ShoreMarysville and the Silver Dollar Casino in SeaTac, a detective wrote in the probable cause statement.

King's attorney did not immediately return a call seeking comment. His arraignment has been set for Oct. 7. He faces a sentencing range of 22 to 29 months, said Dan Donohoe, a spokesman for the King County prosecutor's office, who declined to confirm whether a plea deal had been reached. The co-chairs of the committee, Sens. David Frockt, Ed Murray and Sharon Nelson, issued a statement saying the thefts began in 2011 and accelerated in February 2012, when King was given the authority to write checks

probable cause statement line, the Tulalip Casino in himself rather than request reimbursements through Argo Strategies, which served as the committee's treasurer.

Blame squarely lies with King, the senators said, but they added, "We acknowledge responsibility for a system of controls that were not sufficient when there was a trusted employee determined to exploit any gaps that, in hindsight, existed." They said they have adopted new rules to ensure greater oversight for campaign donations. Among them, the committee's executive director will no longer be able to obtain independent check-writing authority. The chairs also said they are monitoring and reviewing the financial books monthly.

## Idaho OC Fueled by Prep Experiences, Good and Tragic

MOSCOW • Ten years later, Kris Cinkovich remembers his hardworking senior safety colliding with an opposing player in a state playoff game. He remembers him getting up and looking fine. He remembers him trotting off the field.

Then he remembers seeing Edward Gomez slumped over, unconscious, on the side-

"Fundamentally, he died that night," said Cinkovich, Idaho's first-year assistant head coach and offensive coordina-

That was Nov. 21, 2003. Cinkovich's Las Vegas High School football team — a powerhouse in Nevada - was two wins from another state championship game. But any worries about football blurred into the background with Gomez on the ground and surrounded by medical personnel that night.

Gomez was taken to a Las Vegas hospital, where he died two days later after being put on a ventilator. An autopsy revealed Gomez died of blunt force trauma to the head.

"It's brutal," said Las Vegas High coach James Thurman, who was on Cinkovich's staff at the time. "You work with these kids day in, day out, year in, year out and you consider them your own. I know it tore Coach Cink up. It was heartbreaking for him. He cared about all the kids. ... It took a lot out of him."

Two days after his team lost in the state finals, an emotionally drained Cinkovich got a call from UNLV. John Robinson asked him to become his wide receivers coach, and he accepted the job after taking a few weeks to be with his team.

In 2010, he landed at Arkansas to work with Bobby Petrino, a former teammate at Carroll College. And when Paul Petrino took over at Idaho in December, Cinkovich returned to the Northwest after playing two years at Spokane Falls Community College and growing up in Federal Way, Wash.

With each move, the 52-year-old has stayed connected to Thurman and his former school. Every time he goes back to Las Vegas, he stops by Gomez's gravesite — something he started doing while at UNLV.

One visit, on the anniversary of Gomez's last game, still stands out.

"When I was coaching at UNLV, I know the day - Nov. 21," Cinkovich said from his office at the Kibbie Dome. "I saw his dad at the gravesite one day. As a coach that's an eyeopener, because how do you treat kids? What do they tell their parents about you?"

Gomez's father spoke little English, but he and Cinkovich talked briefly. The coach has since lost track of the Gomez family after they moved out of the area.

The episode still looms large for Cinkovich in his coaching career, both his nine decorated years at Las Vegas High and the decade since at the college level.

Although the Wildcats program was dominant in the 1940s and '50s, it hadn't won a playoff game in 35 years when Cinkovich achieved that feat in 1995, his first year. His teams went on to become nationally ranked in 1999 and 2000, and in 2001, Las Vegas claimed the Nevada 4A title.

"Coach Cink established an attitude of excellence, an attitude of discipline," Thurman said in a phone interview.

Cinkovich saw how structure and discipline could pay off while playing offensive guard for Bob Petrino Sr. at Carroll. Before joining Bobby at Arkansas, he remained close to the



# LSU-Georgia Highlights Week to Reshape Rankings

Finally, a college football weekend with real potential to reshape the rankings and shake up the national championship race.

The fifth Saturday of the season features four games matching ranked teams, highlighted by No. 6 LSU at No. 9 Georgia. Eight more ranked teams play road games of varying degrees of difficulty.

Last weekend's schedule produced mostly blowouts, and when it was over it was as if it never happened. The top 14 teams in the AP Top 25 held their spots from the week before, and no team moved up more than one place.

This Saturday could end with a couple of teams saying goodbye to their national championship hopes, and maybe a few new teams being taken more seriously as contenders.

Georgia wraps up the toughest September schedule in the country with its third game against a top-10 opponent.

The Bulldogs (2-1) split with Clemson and South Carolina to start the season and now face an LSU team that is yet again looking like a Southeastern Conference heavyweight, though the Tigers are getting it done a little differently this season.

For the first time in a few years, LSU's passing game is a strength instead of a question mark

Zach Mettenberger has the sixth best passer rating in the country.

"There's a big ceiling on him," Bulldogs coach Mark Richt said of Mettenberger, who originally attended Georgia but was dismissed from the team when, as a redshirt freshman, he got into legal trouble over his treatment of a woman at a bar.

LSU receivers Odell Beck-

ham and Jarvis Landry are making a case for being the top tandem not just in the SEC but in the nation.

That should lead to another increasingly common occurrence: high-scoring SEC games.

Georgia, with quarterback Aaron Murray and tailback Todd Gurley leading the way, is seventh in the nation in yards per play at 7.83. LSU is ninth at 7.53.

The other big game in the SEC takes place in Tuscaloosa, where No. 1 Alabama faces No. 21 Mississippi.

The Rebels spread it out and play fast like Texas A&M, but Ole Miss presents very different challenges.

"Even though the offenses may be similar, the philosophies are not the same," Tide coach Nick Saban said.

No. 4 Ohio State faces its first stiff test of the season when No. 24 Wisconsin comes to Ohio Stadium on Saturday night.

No. 22 Notre Dame is an underdog for the second straight season to Oklahoma. Of course, that didn't stop the Fighting Irish from beating

the Sooners in Norman last year. Any hope the Irish have of getting back to the BCS title game would be dashed with a second loss.

**SAN FRANCISCO** • The big black cat almost used up its last life at the start, burying its bows in a wave and falling behind a boatload of Kiwis.

Of course, it was only fitting in this America's Cup that Oracle Team USA would need to survive neardefeat again.

With one last spectacular push in a winner-take-all finale Wednesday, the United States managed to hang onto the Auld Mug in closing out the longest, fastest and, by far, wildest America's Cup ever with one of the greatest comebacks in sports.

Skipper Jimmy Spithill steered Oracle's space-age, 72-foot catamaran to its eighth straight victory, speeding past Dean Barker and Team New Zealand in Race 19 on a San Francisco Bay course bordered by the Golden Gate Bridge, Alcatraz and the Embarcadero.

All but defeated a week ago, the 34-year-old Australian and his international crew twice rallied from seven-point deficits to win 9-8. Owned by software billionaire Larry Ellison, Oracle Team USA was docked two points for illegally modifying boats in warmup regattas and had to win 11 races to keep the trophy.

"It really is about the team, man," Spithill said.
"On your own you're nothing, but when you've got a team like this around you, they can make you look great. They did all of that today and the whole series. I'm so proud of the boys. ... They didn't flinch."

It could have been over

It could have been over shortly after the start just inside the Golden Gate Bridge.

Oracle's hulking black

catamaran — with a giant No. 17 on each hull — buried its twin bows in a wave approaching the first mark and Barker turned his redand-black cat around the buoy with a 7-second lead.

The New Zealanders were game despite being stranded on match point for a week. Spithill and crew still had to sail their best to keep from becoming the third American loser in 30 years.

Oracle narrowed Team New Zealand's lead to 3 seconds turning onto the third leg, the only time the boats sail into the wind.

New Zealand had the lead the first time the boats crossed on opposite tacks. By the time they crossed again, the American boat — with only one American on its 11-man crew — had the lead.

As Oracle worked to stay ahead, tactician Ben Ainslie, a four-time Olympic gold medalist from Britain, implored his mates by saying, "This is it. This is it. Working your (rears) off."

It had to be a gut-wrenching moment in New Zealand — coming so close to winning the oldest trophy in international sports a week ago, only to see Oracle suddenly improve its speed.

"We knew we had a fight on our hands," Barker said. "It's really frustrating. The gains that they made were just phenomenal. They did just an amazing job of sorting out their boat. It's a good thing for us they didn't do it earlier. I am incredibly proud of our team and what we achieved. But we didn't get that last one we needed to take the cup back to New Zealand. It's just very hard to swallow."



## Are We Just Now Seeing Manning in His Prime?

ENGLEWOOD, Colo. • Peyton Manning is only getting better with age.

Those surgical scars on his neck are starting to fade like all those fears that he might never be the same quarterback - or even play again after his right arm shrank from a damaged nerve in his biceps two years ago.

After attacking his rehab as doggedly as he assails defenses, Denver's 37-year-old quarterback is making it hard to fathom and easy to forget that not so long ago he was missing an entire season and getting fired in Indianapolis.

The four-time MVP is off to the best start of his storied 16-year career.

Driven by last year's playoff pratfall, Manning is putting up historic numbers while directing an imaginative offense that's still working through some growing pains.

Here's the scary part for opponents: Even with so many footballs slipping through his teammates' hands or going through the uprights after stalled drives, the Broncos (3-0) are averaging 42 points.

"I think Peyton's playing at an all-time (high) right now," said Philadelphia coach Chip Kelly, whose Eagles (1-2) visit Denver on Sunday. "You couple him being at the top of his game and then give him the weapons that he has, it's a pretty dangerous formula to go against."

The 2013 Rocky Mountain version of the "Fearsome Foursome" is Demaryius Thomas, Eric Decker, Wes Welker and Julius Thomas, who have collected 72 catches for 943 yards and 11 TDs already.

"Usually you have a main guy as part of the offense, a star that you can load up and take him away," Eagles defensive coordinator Bill Davis said. "Peyton makes you defend the field."

Manning is the first quarterback in NFL history to collect a dozen touchdown throws in the first three weeks of the season, and his off-the-charts passer rating of 134.7 is way above the career high of 121.1 he set in his pinnacle 2004 season, when he threw for 49 TDs.

Manning was masterful Monday night in completing a career-high 86.5 percent of his passes in Denver's wipeout of Oakland.

Manning, though, finds no time in his no-nonsense schedule to contemplate just how special this start is.

"This is a new season. It's one week at a time," he said.

"I don't have a great comparison to other years. But guys are making good plays in the passing game and we are doing a good job getting yards after the catch."

Take Decker's 61-yard gain Monday night. He runs an 18-yard curl and there's a 6inch window for Manning,

for a 61-yard gain. "I was on him like a shadow," Raiders cornerback Mike Jenkins said. "I actually felt the ball go across my fin-

gers.... He's a genius." Just imagine him in his prime? Are you kidding? In many ways, it's right here, right now.

Manning's work ethic keeps him in tip-top shape and his mental mastery of the game keeps getting better.

"I'd like to think that any player would use the experience from the year before to his advantage, to learn what to do against certain defenses, to learn what not to do," Manning said. "With being able to play a lot, you certainly gain great experience."

He's putting that to use like never before, too.

"The guy is just awesome," Jenkins said. "I've never seen anything like him. It is very frustrating for you to be in the right spot and he still squeezes the ball in for a great throw. There's not too much you can do about that. Most games you play, that's your ball. But it's Peyton Manning?

Or, Peyton Manning 2.0.

He bounced back last year from a series of neck injuries and surgeries that sidelined him in 2011, an all-too-familiar ordeal for the first family of football after his older brother, Cooper, saw his football dreams dashed because of a spinal condi-

Family patriarch Archie Manning said Peyton "never took football for granted because of what happened to Cooper."

"I think he always knew he was fortunate in regard to health. But he wasn't ready for his career to be over, not like that. Not four surgeries and having to leave the place where he had been so long. He just didn't want it to end right there," Archie Manning said. "So, I think the good Lord looked down on him there and allowed him to play some more football, so we are grateful for that."

# Idaho big game hunters could see same conditions as last year.

**BOISE** • It's all about the weather. How many times have you heard that in a big game forecast?

There's a lot of truth to it, but if you want the two-second preview of the upcoming hunt, Toby Boudreau, Idaho Department of Fish and Game's deer and elk coordinator, said expect hunting like last year.

'Most likely, success rates will be similar," he said. "It will be a good hunting season." Weather is one of the biggest driving fac-

tors affecting big game herds and harvests. This summer's dry conditions have been reflected by large wildfires, but fires aren't

likely to affect statewide harvests.

We've had back-to-back dry years, which typically means light fawns, but we also had a mild winter.

Fish and Game's fawn monitoring showed about 60 percent of mule deer fawns statewide survived last winter, which is about 10 percent above average.

Those fawns from last year are now budding two-points, which make up a large part of the annual mule deer harvest.

Now let's turn to elk, which are hardier and less prone to winter kill. Winter conditions still affect them, but not as drastically as

But Fish and Game biologists see a direct correlation between early snow and elk harvests. When it snows early, harvest tends to

We were hit by snowstorms in October last year, and the deer and elk harvests ticked upward.

We've had a very hot, dry summer in much of the state, which can mean mixed things for

Drought dries up many water sources, such as small ponds, seeps and small streams, so animals tend to be concentrated near water larger water sources.

But if hot, dry weather persists into October big game seasons, hunters will face difficult conditions for stalking animals because it's noisy and game tends to hole up during hot weather.

If those early snowstorms arrive for a second year, it could tip things in the hunters'

Of course, we're talking generalities, and Idaho is a large and diverse state.

Weather conditions in the Owyhee Desert in October will be much different than rain forests of North Idaho, or the mountains of Central or eastern Idaho.

While the state's game herds are overall

healthy, they're certainly not static. Many elk hunters will continue to be frustrated if harvests continue to shift away from the traditional hunting areas and general, any-weapon seasons.

And of course we can't forget about the elephant in the elk camp — wolves, which are holding their population numbers despite several seasons of hunting and now trapping.

## IDAHO'S YOUTH PHEASANT SEASON OPENS ON OCT. 5

**JEROME** • A youth pheasant hunting season opens statewide Saturday, Oct. 5, and runs through Oct. 11 for licensed hunters 15 or younger.

The week-long hunt opens a half-hour before sunrise statewide and continues to a half-hour after sunset, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game said. Youth hunters must be accompanied by a licensed hunter 18 or older; one adult may accompany more than one youth.

The daily bag limit is three cocks, and the possession limit is six after the first day except on wildlife management areas where pheasants are stocked, where the daily limit is two cocks and four in possession.

Pheasants will be stocked on the Payette, Montour, Fort Boise, Niagara, Sterling, and Market Lake wildlife management areas before the youth hunt opening.

The regular season opens Oct. 12 through Dec. 31 in Area 1; Oct. 19 through Nov. 30 in Area 2; and Oct. 19 through Dec. 31 in Area 3. Shooting hours start a halfhour before sunrise in all three areas, except on Fort Boise, C.J. Strike, Montour and Payette River wildlife management areas, where shooting hours start at 10 a.m.

Area 1: Benewah, Bonner, Boundary, Clearwater, Idaho, Kootenai, Latah, Lewis, Nez Perce and Shoshone counties.

Area 2: Bannock, Bear Lake, Bingham, Bonneville, Butte, Caribou, Clark, Custer, Franklin, Fremont, Jefferson, Lemhi, Madison, Oneida, Power and Teton counties.

Area 3: Ada, Adams, Blaine, Boise, Camas, Canyon, Cassia, Elmore,

Gem, Gooding, Jerome, Lincoln, Minidoka, Owyhee, Payette, Twin Falls, Valley and Washington counties, including all islands in the Snake River except Patch and Porter islands.

Fish and Game releases pheasants at nine wildlife management areas in southern Idaho: Fort Boise, Payette River, Montour, C.J. Strike, Sterling, Market Lake, Mud Lake, Cartier

and Slough Niagara Springs. To hunt pheasants there, hunters 17 years old or older must have a WMA upland game bird permit. The permit allows hunters to take two pheasants per day and up to six total in possession.

## Sage Grouse Hunters, Harvest Up Slightly in Idaho

**JEROME** • Hunter numbers and harvest of sage grouse were up slightly over the opening weekend compared with the past two years, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game said Monday.

From the six check stations held throughout southern Idaho targeting sage grouse hunters, 620 hunters checked in 308 birds, a Fish and Game release said. That compares with 563 hunters with 270 birds in 2012, and 615 hunters

with 277 birds in 2011.

On average, 0.5 birds were harvested per hunter per day, and it took about 6.1 hours for a hunter to harvest one bird, Fish and Game said. Hunter success was slightly higher in the Owyhees, but otherwise was similar across southern Idaho.

Fish and Game workers queried hunters on their success, number of hours hunted, and numbers of birds observed. They also collected a wing from each bird checked.

"Although the weather was cooperative on opening weekend, biologists are hopeful that the higher numbers are a sign of good productivity this year," the Fish and Game release said.

Fish and Game biologists will gather in early December to examine wings from upland game birds collected at check stations, in wing barrels, and through a mail-in wing envelope program. By

the wing is from an adult or juvenile bird. For sage grouse, they are also able to tell the sex of the bird. The ratio of juveniles per adult is an indication of annual chick production.

ran the Soldier Mountain Ski area for two seasons before actor Bruce Willis bought the property in 1997. In October 2012, Willis donated it to a new nonprofit.

Last year the nonprofit did well despite a late start to last year's ski season, Kristi Schiermeier said, and would have broken even financially if it would've had 3,000 more skiers.

A number of changes were made last year at Soldier Mountain, including a new magic carpet, a 12-passenger snowcat for cat skiing/boarding adventures, lodge renovations and fresh paint on many buildings. Cat skiing is off-trail, downhill skiing accessed by a tracked vehicle instead of a

A variable frequency drive

was installed for a chairlift last year, which allows employees to slow the lift to accommodate beginners. This season, another will be installed, Schiermeier said.

The new snowcat includes a 47-inch television. When cat skiers and snowboarders wear head cameras, they can watch the footage of their last run as they head back up the mountain. Visitors will also be able to watch a safety video inside the cabin as they head up the mountain so they're not wasting ski time, Schiermeier said.

During the coming year, Soldier Mountain will be able to host weddings, she said.

Ski area officials also hope to offer a bike experience in the summer. Visitors would hook their bikes to a chairlift and ride to the top of the mountain.

Schiermeier said they hope to do more summer activities this year, as well as expand ski programs for schoolchildren.

The project's first phase will happen downstream of the bridge that separates the two landowners.

Crews will dredge the channel – which is expected to take 24 to 30 days - and move sediment, Gross said.

Once that's complete, water will be diverted and work will start on reconstructing the dam that forms Kilpatrick Pond and cleaning out the lower pond.

Phase two of the project with work upstream of the bridge on The Nature Conservancy's property - won't happen until next year.

During the restoration's first phase, public access will be restricted at the construction area.

Fishing from Kilpatrick Road Bridge to just downstream of the dam will be restricted for the rest of the 2013 season, as well as duck hunting.

Private property owners and organizations can restrict public access but can't close certain areas. Closures must be approved by the Idaho Fish and Game Commission.

Outdoor enthusiasts are advised to stay away from areas at Silver Creek with restricted access but aren't prohibited from entering those

"If they access it legally and didn't trespass to get there,

they still have the right to hunt and fish following rules and restrictions for that activity," said Doug Megargle, regional fisheries manager for the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

But restrictions are for public safety, he said. Why the restoration proj-

Silver Creek has long been a sacred site for fly fishers and outdoorsmen because of its insect hatches and springfed waters. But sediment buildup slowed flows and pushed up water temperatures, creating stressful conditions for trout. In Kilpatrick Pond, now shallow, water temperatures increase almost 10 degrees in a stretch of less

than a mile. Restoration plans include enhancing streamside habitats, creating a more diverse

stream channel and stabilizing existing sediments by creating wetlands. Several access points will be created along a portion of Silver Creek to improve public access.

The restoration project will also reconfigure the dam incorporating fish passage and the ability to release water from the bottom of the pond to help manage water temperature.

The Nature Conservancy plans to host a site visit in mid-October for people interested in seeing what's happening with the project. A date hasn't been set.

Weekly or bi-weekly project updates will be posted on the conservancy's website, Gross said.

Here are some more details for big game hunters.

## Deer

Last fall, deer hunters killed 49,656 deer, a 12 percent increase from the 2011 harvest of 44,328 deer.

Fish and Game also saw a bump in deer tags sales for the first time since 2008. Tags sales were up from 132,068 in 2011 to 134,232 in 2012.

That made the success rate for deer hunters in 2012 about 37 percent versus 32 percent in 2011. However, success rates both years were actually higher because not all who buy tags actually hunt.

Mule deer narrowly edged out whitetails in the 2012 harvest, 25,073 versus 24,583. While that may look close to a tie, when you look at hunter success, whitetails probably get the nod.

Predominately whitetail units dominate the top five general season hunts for harvest and hunter success.

Fish and Game offers two tags, a general tag that allows a hunter to take either species, and a whitetail tag that allows a hunter to take only a whitetail but hunt during the November rut.

General deer tags are sold at nearly three times the rate of whitetail tags, according to Fish and Game statistics.

Although general tag hunters can also shoot either species, whitetail hunters tend to have a higher success rate because there are longer seasons and generous either-sex opportunities.

## Elk

Elk hunters will probably see a similar harvest to last year, and if the last five years are an indicator, it will likely be within a couple thousand elk of last year's.

Harvest has been fairly steady since 2008, ranging from a high of 17,470 in 2010 to a low of 15,135 in

But Idaho's elk hunting is puzzling and hard to pin down due to many factors. One thing is clear, hunters killed more elk in 2012 than in 2011 – 16,369 versus 15,135.

But the number of elk hunters has been on a downward trend since

That year, Fish and Game sold 92,565 tags to hunters, compared with 80,577 elk tags last year — a drop of 11,088 tags in five years. Elk tag sales peaked at around 100,000 in the mid-1990s.

While statewide elk harvests have fluctuated in the last five years, fewer hunters means the statewide success rate has trended upward from about 17 percent in 2008 to about 23 percent last year.

So what's the deal with elk hunting?

Several factors are likely at play. The public perception that Idaho's elk herds have seen precipitous declines is out there, and it is partially

Fish and Game estimates Idaho's elk population is about 107,000 animals. The state is divided into 29 elk management zones, and most are meeting or exceeding Fish and Game's population objectives.

But the dark spots are pretty dark. There's been a steady shift of elk and hunters away from the classic elk country - the mountains and forests of Central Idaho and the Clearwater area that were traditionally popular during

the October general season bull hunts.

According to Fish and Game's draft elk plan: "Since the mid-1990s, cumulative elk populations in the Lolo, Middle Fork, Sawtooth and Selway zones have declined from more than 30,500 elk to just over 14,500 (a 52 percent decline) since the mid-1990s."

Those elk herds "continue to be suppressed by predators and habitat declines," Fish and Game said.

The plan also states that herds in southern Idaho and the prairies and agricultural areas of North Idaho are "mostly robust."

Growing elk herds are now more likely to be found in rangeland and agriculture lands where hunters can have more difficulty accessing them because of private lands or tags are limited by controlled hunts.

The news is not all bad, and adaptable hunters have found success.

Some elk hunters have shifted their efforts from general any-weapon seasons targeting bull elk to archery seasons, muzzleloader seasons, either-sex controlled hunts and other opportunities.

The number of antlerless elk tags can also have a substantial effect on the overall elk harvest. In most places, Fish and Game limits cow tags, which tend to have a higher success rate.

Antlerless elk accounted for 41 percent of the 2012 elk harvest, according to Fish and Game statistics.

Part of the decline in elk tag sales can also be attributed to fewer nonresident tags sold.

That's partially due to the quality of elk hunting, but also due to the economy. A nonresident license and tag costs \$571.50, which is more expensive than many neighboring states with comparable hunting quality.

Other states have also seen a drop-off in nonresident tags, which points to a weak economy that keeps hunters at home.

## Wolf Update

One can hardly talk about elk without wolves coming up, so here's an update on Idaho's wolf population.

Fish and Game estimated there were about 683 wolves at the end of 2012, which is down from a high of 856 in But estimates are done in

winter, and there's a spike in the population in the spring after pups are born. Despite that, wolves are

likely being held in check in parts of the state like Southern Idaho, where open terrain and conflicts with livestock mean high wolf mortality.

Hunters and trappers are also getting more effective at taking wolves.

"Hunters have made a pretty big impact;" said Jon Rachael, state big game manager for Fish and Game.

Trappers are taking a larger percentage of the harvest. During the 2012-13 season, hunters killed 195 wolves and trappers caught another 119.

There were 425 known wolf deaths last year, which includes wolves killed for preying on livestock, and those poached or killed by other causes, Rachael said. While that number may

seem high, wolf populations can easily grow by 20 percent a year or more if unchecked, which means after spring pups, Idaho's 683 estimate from winter with 20 percent growth would be 819.

Wolf season opened Aug. 30. Fish and Game has reported six wolves harvested so far this season.

## Astronomical Range of the Human Eye

ther than the exceedingly rare near-Earth miniasteroid, the moon is the closest celestial body that can be seen without a telescope. But there's actually quite a va-Sky Calendar riety of astronomical obthrough Oct. 9 jects within the range of

the naked eye. Most of the planets are sufficiently bright. Currently, Venus and Saturn are visible in the western twilight after sunset; Jupiter and Mars are in the east before dawn. Venus and Jupiter are brighter than any star; Mars and Saturn appear like moder-

ately bright stars. Of the remaining planets, only Neptune requires a telescope. Seeing Mercury is a matter of timing: Six times a year it gets far enough from the sun to pierce the glare. Uranus is for experts only, requiring a clear, dark, moonless sky, good eyes, and skill with a star chart to distinguish it from the faintest

of stars. One asteroid (Vesta) reaches naked-eye brightness around the time of its closest approach to the sun, but only if Earth is near it at the time (which happens only every three years or so; the next time will be in April).

Roughly once a decade, a comet comes close enough to be seen with the naked eye. Comet ISON may do that at the end of November.

The visible stars are all within a few thousand light years, only a few percent of the way across the

galaxy. The hazy band of the Milky Way itself comprises more distant stars, seen en masse.

Two of the Milky Way's satellite galaxies are visible, but only from south of the Tropic of Cancer. The most distant object within the eye's grasp is the Andromeda Galaxy, a tiny, oval smudge in the east around 9 p.m. At 2.5 million light years, it lies around 60 trillion times farther away than the moon.

## Hunting? Don't Spread Noxious Weeds in Idaho's Backcountry

TWIN FALLS • During Idaho's hunting seasons, thousands of people traverse Idaho's backcountry. So the threat of spreading noxious weed seeds from infested areas is at a high level, state weed officials warned.

"Most noxious weeds are now in their seed stage, and that means it's crucial for people who are traveling in Idaho's outdoor regions to be careful and not accidentally pick up and spread noxious weeds and weed seeds from one area to another," said Roger Batt, statewide coordinator for the Idaho Weed Awareness Campaign.

Even a few seeds can start a new noxious weed outbreak, the campaign's press release said.

Weeds can become lodged in ATVs, off-road vehicles, pack animals and hunting gear, then carried from one area to another. Drive pickups, ATVs and off-road vehicles only on designated roads and trails away from weed-infested areas. ATVs, vehicles, trailers, pack animals and hunting and camping gear should be cleaned before moving to a new area. Also, use only feed that is

certified as noxious-weedfree for horses and pack animals. A list of outlets selling certified weed-free hay and forage is available on the Idaho Weed Awareness Campaign's website at www.idahoweedawareness.com.

Get a free copy of Idaho's Noxious Weed Book, available via the campaign's website, to help identify noxious weeds. The book has color photos an detailed information about different species.

Have a GPS unit? You can map weed infestations and report them to local noxious weed authorities, Batt said.

State weed officials have identified 66 kinds of noxious weeds in Idaho, including infestations in wilderness and backcountry areas. These weeds choke out native vegetation which deprive deer, elk, bighorn sheep and other wildlife of their natural food sources.

## Ask Fish and Game: Hunter Orange

**Question:** Are hunters required to wear hunter

Answer: The Idaho Department of Fish and Game recommends that all upland and big game hunters wear hunter orange whenever they are hunting. But hunter orange is required only when hunting the nine Fish and Game wildlife management areas where pheasants are stocked.

The areas are Fort Boise, C.J. Strike, Payette River, Montour, Sterling, Market Lake, Mud Lake, Cartier Slough and Niagara Springs. The minimum requirement is 36 square inches of hunter orange above the waist; an orange ball cap fulfills this requirement.

Waterfowl and turkey hunters are not required to wear hunter orange.

Though the statewide hunting accident rate is low, more than 70 percent of recorded incidents are visibility related, Fish and Game said.

## FBI Agents Work in Nightmarish Scene at Mall

Working near bodies crushed by rubble in a bulletscarred, scorched mall, FBI agents began fingerprint, DNA and ballistic analysis Wednesday to help determine the identities and nationalities of victims and al-Shabab gunmen who attacked the shopping center, killing more than 60 people.

A gaping hole in the mall's roof was caused by Kenyan soldiers who fired rocketpropelled grenades inside, knocking out a support column, a government official said. The official, who insisted he not be identified because he was sharing security information, said the soldiers fired to distract a terrorist sniper so hostages could be evacuated.

The current death toll is 67 and is likely to climb with uncounted bodies remaining in the wreckage of the Nairobi mall. Another 175 people were injured, including more than 60 who remain hospitalized. At least 18 foreigners were among those killed.

Al-Shabab, the Somali Islamic extremist group which carried out the attack, said Wednesday that foreigners were a "legitimate target." Witnesses have told AP and other media that gunmen rounded up people, asked questions about Islam that a Muslim would know and told the Muslims to leave the mall. Still, some Muslims were among the victims.

## **'Forever** Grateful': Saved Mall Goers **Thank Police**

"I will be forever grateful for those three brave and selfless Kenyans," said Lyndsay Handler, a New Yorker who was among those rescued from the roof in the first hours of the siege that began Saturday. "Words cannot fully capture the depth of this gratitude, but anyone who has come close to losing a child or spouse can understand."

Undercover police officers armed only with pistols and walkie-talkies like those who rescued Handler and her husband and 2-year-old daughter helped save countless lives in the initial minutes of the attack — heroics the American and others they brought to safety say have gotten little attention.

Video from inside the mall shows how security personnel worked to save lives. In one, a man thought to be a plainclothes police officer was seen scooting on his belly across the shopping center's ground floor to coax a mother and her two children lying next to a cafe counter to standup and rush out. -AP

## Syrian Rebel Groups Break with Exiled Opposition

**BEIRUT (AP)** • Nearly a dozen of Syria's powerful rebel factions, including one linked to al-Qaida, formally broke with the main opposition group in exile Wednesday and called for Islamic law in the country, dealing a severe blow to the Westernbacked coalition.

The new alliance is a potential turning point, entrenching the schism within the rebellion and giving President Bashar Assad fuel for his long-stated contention that his regime is battling Islamic extremists in the civil

The Turkey-based Syrian National Coalition - the political arm of the Free Syrian Army rebel group has long been accused by those fighting inside Syria of being a puppet promoted by the West and Gulf Arab states supporting the Syrian rebellion.


Wednesday's public rejection of the coalition's authority will likely be extremely damaging for its future in Syria, particularly at a time when the U.S. and Russia are

pushing for peace talks. "If the groups involved stand by this statement, I think this could be a very big deal - especially if it develops into a more-structured alliance instead of just a joint position," said political ana-

lyst Aron Lund. "It basically means that some of the biggest mainstream Islamist forces within the so-called FSA are breaking up with the political leadership appointed for them by the West and Gulf states, to cast their lot with more hardline and anti-Western Islamists," he said.

In a joint statement, 11 rebel groups that are influential in Aleppo province in the north, including Jabhat al-Nusra, which is listed as a terrorist organization by the U.S. State Department, said they rejected the authority of the Syrian National Coalition as well as Touma's appointment.

## **ANTI-SHUTDOWN BILL ADVANCES;** BIG BUDGET FIGHT STILL LOOMS

**WASHINGTON** • Unanimous but far from united, the Senate advanced legislation to prevent a partial government shutdown Wednesday, the 100-0 vote certain to mark merely a brief pause in a fierce partisan struggle over the future of President Barack Obama's signature health care law.

The vote came shortly after Texas Sen. Ted Cruz held the Senate in session overnight and the Twitterverse in his thrall - with a near-22-hour speech that charmed the tea party wing of the GOP, irritated the leadership and was meant to propel fellow Republican lawmakers into an all-out struggle to extinguish

Defying one's own party leaders is survivable, he declared in pre-dawn remarks on the Senate floor. "Ultimately, it is liberating?

Legislation passed by the Republican-controlled House last week would cancel all funds for the three-year-old law, preventing its full implementation. But Senate Democrats have enough votes to restore the funds, and Majority Leader Harry Reid labeled Cruz's turn in the spotlight "a big waste of time."

Any differences between the two houses' legislation must be reconciled and the bill signed into law by next Tuesday to avert a partial shut-

down. The issue is coming to the forefront in Congress as the Obama administration works to assure a smooth launch for the health care overhaul's final major piece, a season of enrollment beginning Oct. 1 for millions who will seek coverage on socalled insurance exchanges.

Health and Human Secretary Kathleen Sebelius told reporters this week that consumers will have an average of 53 plans to choose from, and her department estimated the average individual premium for a benchmark policy known as the "second-lowest cost silver plan" would range from a low of \$192 in Minnesota to a high of \$516 in Wyoming. Tax credits will bring down the cost for many.

Republicans counter that the legislation is causing employers to defer hiring new workers, lay off existing ones and reduce the hours of still others to hold down costs as they try to ease the impact of the bill's taxes and other requirements.

"Obamacare is destroying jobs. It is driving up health care costs. It is killing health benefits. It is shattering the economy," said Cruz.



## Massive Earthquake Devastates Pakistan

Earthquake survivors struggle for food, shelter.

DALBADI, Pakistan (AP) • Survivors built makeshift shelters with sticks and bed sheets Wednesday, a day after their mud houses were flattened in an earthquake that killed 285 people in southwestern Pakistan and pushed a new island up out of the Arabian Sea.

While waiting for help to reach remote villages, hungry people dug through the rubble to find food. And the country's poorest province struggled with a dearth of medical supplies, hospitals and other aid. The quake flattened wide swathes of Awaran district, where it was centered, leaving much of the population homeless.

Almost all of the 300 mudbrick homes in the village of Dalbadi were destroyed. Noor Ahmad said he was working when the quake struck and rushed home to find his house leveled and his wife and son dead. "I'm broken," he said. "I have lost my family."

At least 373 people were also injured, according to a statement from the National Disaster Management Authority, which gave the latest



MUNICIPAL CORPORATION, **AMENDING** SECTION 8 NO. 666 BY AMENDING REGARDING THE REDEMPTION OF IMPOUNDED DOGS; ALSO AMENDING SECTION 9 BY CHANGING THE PENALTIES; PROVIDING FOR THE SEVERABILITY OF EACH SECTION OF THIS ORDINANCE AND REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH.

NOW, THEREFORE, be ordained by the City Council of the City of Gooding, State of Idaho as follows:

Sections 1, 8 and 9 of Gooding City Ordinance No. 666 shall be amended to read as follows:

Section 1: DOGS RUNNING AT LARGE. It shall be unlawful for any owner, possessor or person who keeps any dog to permit the same to run at large upon the private premises of others or upon the streets, alleys, sidewalks, highways, vacant lots, school grounds or other public places within the City of Gooding.

A dog shall be deemed to be running at large when off or away from the premises of the owner, possessor, or keeper thereof, and not under the immediate control of such owner, possessor, or keeper, or his agent or servant or a member of his immediate family, either by leash, cord or chain, provided, however, that any dog on the premises of a city park, or school grounds must be controlled by a leash not exceeding ten (10) feet in length held in the hand of the person controlling the dog. Procuring a license and tag shall not authorize the running at large of said dog

Dogs in a vehicle, whether in the front, back, on top, or on the hood shall be secured so they cannot jump out of the vehicle. Person failing to secure such dog shall be punished as set forth in Section 9 as amended.

Section 8: REDEMPTION OF IMPOUNDED DOGS. Any dog impounded may be taken from the pound by the owner, or any authorized person, upon exhibiting to the animal control officer or other authorized person having charge of said pound a receipt, from the City, showing that the license fee has been paid for such dog, and upon paying the City an impounding fee of ten dollars (\$10.00) for the first offense, forty dollars (\$40.00) for the second offense taking place within one (1) year and eighty dollars (\$80.00) for the third offense taking place within one (1) year. Any dogs committing more than three (3) offenses within one (1) years shall be disposed of in a humane manner. All impounded dogs not redeemed within seventy-two (72) hours may be offered for sale at a price not less than the costs of impoundment and keeping, or any additional sum determined to be reasonable by the animal control officer, including any license fee. Alternatively, such dog shall be turned over to an animal rescue group, that has appeared before and been approved by the Council, if adoptable.

Ordinance shall be, upon conviction or entry of a guilty plea, be guilty of an infraction and shall be fined as follows:

1. First Offense - \$50.00 plus court costs

2. Second Offense within one year - \$100.00 plus court costs

3. Third Offense, within one year and thereafter, - \$150.00 plus court costs



The point of the hand is that if the diamond finesse succeeds, you do not need to take it at once. You have enough entries to lead up to the queen-jack twice later on and get a discard for your potential club loser. Had the diamond queen held, declarer would have led a club to the ace and another diamond toward the jack. He could always fall back on the club finesse eventually if nothing else worked.

ANSWER: The safest way into the auction here is to double rather than to bid two hearts. Yes, you might miss a 5-3 fit, but equally a 4-4 club fit might play better than an eight- or seven-card heart fit. Your objective in overcalling here is not to bid game, but to hope to find a fit, or to push the opponents up. Doubling is the best way to do that.

**BURLEY** • The Dutchmen plant in Burley will close up shop by Nov. 15 and the Indianabased recreational vehicle manufacturer will take about 150 jobs with it.

The Dutchmen plant's exodus will be a blow to Burley's tax base and employment figures.

Dutchmen Manufacturing came to Burley in 2007 with the help of state and local government entities. Former Idaho governor Jim Risch presented more than \$1.5 million in state funds to help the manufacturer start producing travel trailers at its Burley site.

Dutchmen's pending closure is another chapter in the decade-long roller coaster of manufacturing in the Mini-Cassia region. It's an industrial landscape that's seen significant investment since 2004, but also lost some large-scale manufacturers.

Dutchmen's exodus - a blow to the city's tax base and employment figures - leaves behind ready-to-use infrastructure, city officials said. The buildings Dutchmen is leaving, for example, are a potentially attractive asset to would-be tenants.

"There are a lot of things that this community has done right. It's a shame to see Dutchmen go, but they are leaving a perfectly good building," said Burley Mayor Terry Greenman. "We have people coming to this state looking for an existing facility. That's just another opportunity."

From 2004 to 2012, Burley was able to bring in more than 10 notable businesses to help boost its economy, the state Department of Labor reports. Coast to Coast Carports, Mullholland Positioning Systems and Hy-Line N.A. are among the list of businesses that have bolstered the town's economy.

But a string of closures over the same period JR Simplot, Kraft Cheese and now Dutchmen - cast a shadow over the future of manufacturing in Burley.

Simplot's closure and the Great Recession in 2008 hit Cassia County especially hard. Unemployment jumped from 3.7 percent in September 2008 to 6.8 percent by September 2010, according to the Labor Department. That number has ticked down to 5.7 percent as of August, a full percentage point below the state average.

The loss of 600 jobs at Simplot in 2003 "woke" Burley up, Greenman said.

"Since that time, 38-plus businesses have come to town to replace all of those jobs and more. Sometimes when things happen, it isn't a negative," Greenman said. "It's a wake-up call so we can see for ourselves who we really are and what we can do to invite businesses."

Greenman also cited the McCain Foods expansion that was currently in progress for

"They're going to build a new plant here and, from what I understand, it will have 140some employees with a \$54 million payroll. That's huge."

Watco LLC came to Burley in 2013 bringing with it 30 jobs and a \$2.5 million annual payroll. In addition to Watco and the McCain Foods expansion, DOT Foods is currently expanding its presence in the Mini-Cassia area.

Per-capita income in Cassia County, with its historic reliance on agriculture, has lagged well behind the state. But local earnings surpassed the state average in 2010, as the local economy evolved into a more industrial one.

And, though the occasional closure stains a decade of growth, the general trends leave local officials optimistic about the future.

"We are a strong community," Greenman said. "We can grow from this."

EDINBURG, Texas • Almost two months after Craig Glen Short was found dead at Christopher Cruz's residence in Heyburn, Cruz was arrested in Edinburg, Texas on Tuesday.

After the Aug. 2 shooting of Short, about 50 officers were on scene

from the Minidoka and Cassia county sheriffs offices, the Hevburn Police Department and Idaho State Police. Idaho Fish and Game officers helped secure the scene, where evidence

said at the time, declining to elaborate. Cruz, 21, was suspected of shooting Short at Cruz's residence at 423 S. 850 W., after a witness fled the scene to call 911.

At the time of the shooting, police were searching for Cruz and a possible accomplice, girlfriend Stephanie Pauline Juarez, 32, of Heyburn. Juarez has not been charged, but she remains a person of interest in the case.

Friends and relatives described the women as experienced in the outdoors and unlikely to leave their dogs for long.

Friend and former colleague Deanna Salazar-Brown said Elliott-Blakeslee spends a lot of time outdoors and visits Hawaii each

"It doesn't surprise me that she was hiking and camping over there," Salazar-Brown said. "I'm really stunned and concerned to learn she's missing."

The two women parked their trailer at a KOA campground in Arco, about 22 miles northeast of the monument, Monument Superintendent Dan Buckley said. Their two labradoodle dogs and cellphones were found in a pickup truck parked at the Tree Molds Trailhead at the south end of the monument's popular driving loop and hiking trails.

Collins said he does not think the women were victims of a crime. Their purses and other items were still inside the truck parked at the trailhead.

"We're open to any possibility, but we don't see any signs of foul play," Collins said.
