## Mammograms Available at No Cost

**TWIN FALLS** • Women who can't afford mammograms can get plenty of help in Twin Falls, including at the free Wellness Tree Community Clinic.

"We don't want anyone to go without mammograms because of the cost," said Jonie Benson, clinic director since 2009. "If women have a concern about money, they need to come in and talk to us. There's always a way."

But the Wellness Tree, previously known as the Mustard Tree and the Mustard Seed before that, isn't the only option in town for free mammograms.

# Through Volunteering, a Strength Renewed

Local fundraisers unite to prevent breast cancer.

**TWIN FALLS** • Seven women in Bonnie Seaman's family have died of breast cancer, but she's never been diagnosed.

Pat Mai's mother died of breast cancer, but Pat survived her treatment and came out smiling.

Two women with drastically different cancer stories are joined by a common thread — early detection through mammography. Lack of it caused the death in Seaman's family. A yearly mammogram caught Mai's half-centimeter lump early.

Cancer is devastating, but it also can be uniting.

Pat and Stan Mai have joined with Seaman and others to raise money through "Tough Enough to Wear Pink," a national organization that supports local fundraising groups. The proceeds help pay for mammograms through St. Luke's Magic Valley Health Foundation.

"I can't do anything about the ones I've lost. But I can do something about the ones that are here," Seaman said.

"We were raised that community service is the rent you pay for the space you take up," Pat Mai said.

Both women said they have found strength in volunteering to fight cancer. The disease pulls them together, and fundraising keeps them together.

People volunteer with that level of passion "because you are closely affected," Seaman said. "... People that don't have a connection, until it hits them, human nature is just that way — they won't get involved unless."

### Genetics

Seaman's great grandmother, grandmother, mother and four aunts all died of breast cancer.

As a child, Seaman knew her New York aunts had been diagnosed but lost track when she and her family moved to Florida. When she moved back to New York during middle school, Seaman soon became her recently diagnosed aunt's caretaker.

"That was really my only contact with it until my mother got diagnosed," she said.

Seaman's only surviving aunt had a preventive double mastectomy. Her mother was the last in the family to be diagnosed and survived for 10 years afterward.

"I don't think she was surprised (by the diagnosis), but they don't have the genetic testing like

they have now to be able to pick up on it," she said.

Seaman gets a mammogram every year. Sitting in her Filer office, the Twin Falls County Fair office manager is surrounded by pink office accessories and inspirational sayings.

She said testing has not turned up genetic red flags so far, but that doesn't stop her from continuing to get checked and spread the word.

"Could any of the technology nowadays have saved my family? Absolutely!"

### Saved by the Mammogram

Pat Mai is a breast cancer survivor of 11 years.

Her mother was diagnosed with breast cancer in her mid-50s and died at age 73.

Having had six mammograms, Mai said, she was stunned to hear what the doctor told her one June day.

"It's the C-word," she said. "But I was really fortunate because I was at a time in my life when I knew everything was going to be OK."

She had a lumpectomy and a week later was in Santa Monica, Calif., getting a second opinion and making a treatment plan. She said she didn't struggle with the emotional weight of the diagnosis. She was on the move, staying positive.

## Bank Robbery Suspect Appears at Nevada Hearing

**ELKO, Nev.** • Before a man suspected of robbing Zions Bank in Twin Falls is returned to Idaho to face charges, he must first have his day in court in Nevada.

During an extradition hearing Wednesday, District Attorney Mark Torvinen said the State of Nevada has a right to try a defendant before releasing him to authorities in another state.

Jake Rowe of Carlin, Nev. attended the hearing wearing jail clothes and cuffs on his wrists and ankles.

In July, Rowe allegedly robbed a bank with his wife Linda in Twin Falls. Linda Rowe was returned to Idaho last week.

Jake Rowe is scheduled to stand trial mid-November

**ARCO** • Employees at Craters of the Moon National Monument in southern Idaho have received an exemption from federal furlough requirements so rangers can continue to search for a Boise woman who has been missing for nearly two weeks. Sixteen of the monu-

ment's 19 employees were to be furloughed during the federal government shutdown that started Tuesday, but the park received permission Wednesday to keep 10 additional workers under "exempted" status during the search for 63-year-old Jo Elliott-Blakeslee.

Elliott-Blakeslee's hiking partner, 69-year-old Amy Linkert, was found dead on



**Stock Market Slips as US Shutdown Continues**

**NEW YORK (AP)** • The stock market is closing slightly lower as investors weigh the possibility that political gridlock may keep the government partially closed for some time.

Investors were also discouraged by hiring last month that was weaker than many expected.

The Dow Jones industrial average fell 58 points, or 0.4 percent, to 15,133 Wednesday. It was down as much as 147 points earlier.

**Freeze Watch in Area Thursday**

**BURLEY** • The National Weather Service in Pocatello issued a freeze watch for parts of the Magic Valley and eastern Idaho.

The cities of Burley, Rupert, Shoshone, Carey, Idaho Falls, Rexburg, Rigby, Pocatello and Blackfoot are all under the freeze watch, which is in effect from late Thursday night through Friday morning.

Temperatures are expected to fall into the lower 30s on Thursday night and Friday morning.

Unprotected delicate plants may be damaged by the freeze.

A storm system is expected to bring snow to some areas Wednesday night through Thursday, according to the Weather Service.

Rain will mix with snow

in the valleys on Thursday morning before changing to all snow by Thursday afternoon.

Mountain valleys could see one to three inches of snow, while elevations above 6,500 feet could see five to 10 inches of snow.

The Stanley area, along with Hailey, Ketchum, Sun Valley, Bellevue, Carey, Arco, Challis and Mackay can expect snow.

**Hidden History  
Ezra Meeker: Father  
of the Old Oregon  
Trail**

**TWIN FALLS** • Ezra Meeker left his home in Iowa in 1852, bound for Oregon with his young bride and newborn son.

Fifty four years later, at age 76, Meeker retraced his path on the Old Oregon Trail. It was to become the most important journey of his life.

Several thousand emigrants, including Meeker, had taken the trail to find new beginnings in the West between 1843 and 1857.


Fearing that progress was erasing the trail from the American landscape, Meeker launched a campaign to protect it.

He followed the Oregon Trail, crossing the country numerous times with a wagon and team of oxen, making a spectacle of himself to bring attention to his cause.

Meeker came through Twin Falls in May 1906, June 1910, and again in August 1922.

In April 1926, Meeker appeared before a U.S. Senate committee, urging the passage of legislation to create a half-dollar coin commemorating the Oregon Trail. Congress obliged, and President Calvin Coolidge signed the bill on May 17, 1926.

Meeker visited the Magic Valley for the last time in August 1926, when he was nearly 96 years old, and

Meeker had hoped to live to 100. He almost made it. He died Dec. 3, 1928, less than a month before his 98th birthday.

**ONLINE: This Is Farm Country  
and It's Harvest. Drive Accordingly**

At the "On Assignment" blog, Times-News journalists take you behind the scenes as they work. Here's an excerpt from a Wednesday post by Mychel Matthews:

"On my way to work this morning, I came upon an accident on U.S. 30 east of

Hansen. Twin Falls County sheriff's deputies detoured traffic from the highway, so I couldn't get a good look at the wreck, but I could see a livestock trailer off the road ahead of me.

"A farm tractor was rear-ended by a 1-ton Dodge dually pulling a trailer.

"It wasn't hard to figure out. This is farm country and it's harvest season.

"I can't say why the guy driving the Dodge hit the tractor; I won't even try to speculate. But I do know the

sun was not obstructing anyone's view and the guy on the tractor had his flashers on.

"Both rigs were east-bound on the highway between 3900 East and 4000 East. The Dodge hit the tractor at between 55 mph and 60 mph. There were no skid marks, and the driver of the Dodge hit the tractor dead center, I learned later from the owner of the tractor.

"He was upset when I talked to him, and rightfully so. His employee is lucky to be alive...."

**Passing  
Storm System  
Sweeping  
Through**



Another storm system will swing through the region today, bringing with it raw, cold, damp and brisk weather conditions.

Scattered rain showers are likely through the first half of today. There could be some snow mixing in with the rain during the morning hours. While some could see snow along with the rain in the valleys little to really no accumulation is likely.

As you go above 5,500 feet in the Wood River Valley and South Hills, snow will range from a coating to 3 inches. This storm should move through quickly, so no major delays or problems are expected.

Winds will increase out of the west-northwest between 20 and 30 mph with occasional gusts over 40 mph. It will make an already cold day feel brisk with wind chills in the 40s and 30s.

We end the week drier with sunshine on Friday but it remains cold. Temperatures for Friday will be in the low 50s for afternoon highs. By Saturday and Sunday, temperatures will increase, but remain 5 to 10 degrees below average.

# Idaho News Groups Ask for Openness in Hospital Lawsuit

**BOISE** • A coalition of news organizations, including the *Times-News*, have filed a motion to intervene in a lawsuit between two major health care providers in Idaho in an effort to open court proceedings to the public and the press.

The *Idaho Statesman*, the *Times-News*, The Associated Press, the *Idaho Press-Tribune* and the *Idaho Press Club* filed the motion to intervene on Tuesday, asking U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Winmill to reverse a pretrial order he issued allowing the closure of the courtroom for some testimony and to keep the proceedings open to the public.

The case pits the Idaho attorney general's office, the Federal Trade Commission and Saint Alphonsus Health System against St. Luke's Health System and its quest to purchase the Nampa-based Saltzer Medical Group.

St. Luke's says growth and consolidation will result in better health care at lower cost, but Saint Alphonsus, Treasure Valley Hospital and state and FTC attorneys want to stop the acquisition because they say it gives St. Luke's an unfair share of the market and lead to higher prices for consumers.

The trial began last week,

and much of the testimony and proceedings have been closed to the public, purportedly to protect the trade secrets of the parties involved.

The attorney for the news organizations, Charles Brown, said in court documents that the public has a right to know what is going on behind closed courtroom doors in part because Idaho residents will be impacted by the outcome of the case.

"Drawing a curtain of secrecy behind which the parties in this matter can operate simply does not comport with the requirements of the First Amendment nor Ninth Circuit case law as to the openness required of our judicial system but also the openness required of our government," Brown wrote.

In a ruling issued before the trial began, the judge said that the press and public have a "presumptive right of access," but that right may give way if the parties involved make a convincing showing that the testimony or document contains sources of business information that could harm a litigant's competitive standing.

But Brown and the news organizations contend that the attorneys have been allowed to decide on their own whether they have a compelling reason to keep parts of the testimony and evidence secret.

"The parties in this lawsuit are using the umbrella of sensitive trade secrets, negotiating strategies, bargaining power evaluations, reimbursement policies, pricing and future plans to avoid revealing what they don't want to be revealed. Where does the interest of the medical consumer enter into this equation?" Brown asked the judge in his filing.

Brown noted that the judge appeared to rely on case law created in the criminal case against former President Richard Nixon's advisers after the Watergate scandal. But the facts of that case, Brown argues, were significantly different than the issues in the current litigation, and even then, the press and public had greater access.

"The doors of the courtroom were not closed to the public nor the press even when the President's former advisers were charged with criminal conspiracy," Brown wrote in his motion. "The Nixon case only involved access to the tapes and the scope and breadth of that access after they were admitted into evidence."

The public has a right to know the details of the case, especially given that the plaintiffs say St. Luke's actions would increase health care costs and reduce health care quality in Idaho, Brown maintained.

Pink through the Twin Falls County Fair and Rodeo, and the Diane K. Bolt Foundation.

on local charges of possession of a short-barrel shotgun, possession of stolen property and possession of methamphetamine stemming from a April 2012 incident.

Defense attorney David Lockie said Wednesday if the district attorney's office filed additional charges that could complicate extradition to Idaho.

"I'm not sure where those

charges stand," Lockie said.

Defense attorney Sherburne Macfarlan III said in district court Monday he expected a plea offer from the district attorney's office by the end of the week or the beginning of next week.

If Rowe accepts a plea offer and no further charges are filed, all local charges will be resolved after sentencing in Nevada.

At that point, he will be returned to Idaho to face charges related to the June bank robbery.

Rowe was captured in September after a pursuit by law enforcement that ended with him being chased into the mountains and shot after he pointed a rifle at an officer.

Zions Bank on North Blue Lakes Boulevard in Twin Falls was robbed by a man who opened a satchel and showed a bank teller what appeared to be the grip of a handgun.

After his arrest in Nevada, Twin Falls police identified Rowe as the suspect in the July 9 robbery.



# Developing Technologies Play Role in Detecting B

**TWIN FALLS** • One hundred of every 1,000 women who get a mammogram are called back for more mammography or ultrasound images. Twenty are recommended for a needle biopsy, and five are diagnosed with breast cancer.

Mammography has helped reduce breast cancer mortality in the U.S. by nearly one-third since 1990, says Mammography Saves Lives, a coalition of nonprofit medical associations representing a broad spectrum of breast cancer care experts.

The low-dose X-ray exam finds abnormal breast changes, records them on film or directly into a computer for a radiologist to examine.

"The detection of breast cancer is not always the end goal," said Dr. Michael Dixon, a Twin Falls radiologist. "The end goal is: Can we improve the mortality rate by detection?"

Breast X-rays started in the 1950s. Before that, breast cancer screening was done by physical examination, Dixon said.

In the 1970s and '80s, random studies were done on who received mammograms and who did not to determine the exam's effectiveness.

Digital mammography materialized in 2004, says a 2008 article on the Association of Community Cancer Centers' website.

"When they were doing those trials, we didn't have digital detectors. They used film," Dixon said.

They found that breast cancer detection is not black and white.

"People who still get mammograms will still die (of breast cancer)," Dixon said.

But annual mammograms can detect cancer early, when it is most treatable. They can show changes in the breast up to two years before a patient or physician can feel them.

"It's a combination of early detection and treatment," Dixon said.

The National Cancer Institute recommends women aged 40 or older have screening mammograms every one to two years.

Some say that's too frequent. But, Dixon said. "There's still good data to recommend a mammogram every year.

That's still my recommendation. Not everyone participates at that level. And if we lower that bar, it may diminish the perceived importance of any screening."

Employees at St. Luke's medical center in Twin Falls can get a free mammogram on their birthday, said Sandy Nuffer, an administrative assistant at St. Luke's.

Nuffer made an appointment for her exam Sept. 20. But some employees don't do so.

"Literally, it's just a few minutes," she said.

Digital mammography is offered almost everywhere, Dixon said. In February, St. Luke's Jerome received digital mammography equipment, allowing patients access to the latest technology without driving to Twin Falls.

Before digital mammography, St. Luke's Jerome saw a decline in the number of patients coming in for mammograms.

The new equipment has been well received, said Curtis Maier, administrative

director for St. Luke's Jerome.

Mammograms used to take about 30 minutes. Now they take no more than 15 minutes.

The newest technology in mammography is digital tomosynthesis, a three-dimensional picture of the breast using X-rays.

"You are scrolling through a picture instead of looking at it," Dixon said.

Digital tomosynthesis eliminates three big issues with mammograms: uncomfortable breast compression, overlapping of breast tissue that can hide cancer cells from detection and a limited image of the breast from top to bottom and side to side.

Tomosynthesis provides an image in slices, Dixon said.

It takes several pictures of the breast at different angles and reconstructs those in a series.

"It's promising, and I don't know if it's going to make a big difference," he said.

St. Luke's only tomosynthesis machine is in McCall, he said.

"Our mammogram rates have plateaued. We'd like to see more first-timers," Dixon said. "It's hard because we are asking people to do something when they are not sick. Most women will not develop breast cancer, but compared to other diseases, it's common. We diagnose breast cancer every week."

## Five Questions to Ask Before You Give

### 1. Is the charity tax-exempt?

Verify that the charity is a registered 501(c)(3) nonprofit through sites such as [charitynavigator.org](http://charitynavigator.org) for reviews and [guidestar.org](http://guidestar.org) for nonprofits' required 990 tax forms.

### 2. How much of the charity's budget is spent on services?

This can be tricky. Ideally, an organization should spend 70 percent or more of its money on programming. Finding that sum requires some math, though. Look at what the 990 form lists for total program service expenses, divide that number by the line for total expenses and multiply by 100.

If the number falls below 75, call the organization to learn why. You may find that the group's rent is extremely high or the charity is in the middle of building renovations. Whatever the reason, executives should be able to pinpoint the charity's challenges and goals with finances.

# Mammogram Myths Hinder Early Detection

**TWIN FALLS** • Doctors have heard just about every excuse from patients who try to put off or avoid having a mammogram.

Most of these excuses come from myths that Dr. David McClusky claim are "ridiculous."

Some women think they don't need a mammogram because they don't have a family history of breast cancer, McClusky said, a general surgeon at St. Luke's Magic Valley.

But according to the American Cancer Society, at least 80 percent of the women who get breast cancer have no family history of the disease.

Some sources say mammograms are ineffective and unreliable, based on a number of false positive results.

"That's just ridiculous," McClusky said. "Mammograms are the gold standard for early detection."

Mammograms can detect lumps in breasts two or three years before they can be detected in a self-exam.

Some sources claim a woman doesn't need a mammogram every year and that every other year is sufficient.

McClusky said some breast cancers spread quickly. He has seen cases where a

woman had a clean mammogram one year, developed breast cancer and was dead two years later.

"It's not real common, but I've seen it a number of times," he said.

Some sources recommend waiting until age 50 to have a mammogram.

McClusky recommends women start self-exams at age 30, and have baseline mammograms at 40 and 45. Yearly mammograms should begin at age 50.

Some sources say mammograms cause cancer.

"There is no great evidence that shows that mammograms cause cancer," Mc-

Clusky said. Mammograms require very low doses of radiation, and the risk of harm from a mammogram — especially with new technology — is much lower than it used to be.

Some women say they don't have time for a mammogram.

A mammogram screening itself takes only 15 to 30 minutes.

Some women say they can't afford a mammogram.

Mammograms will be free under the Affordable Care Act, with no deductibles and no co-pays. Medicare also covers mammograms. A number of state and non-profit agencies fund free or reduced-cost mammogram screenings.

Early detection is all about knowing your risks for breast cancer and discussing them with your doctor, McClusky said. "Early detection is the key to saving lives."

Ignoring doctors' recommendations and putting off mammograms "will save money, but it won't save lives," he said.

Context is everything when looking at an executive's salary, said Lynn Hoffmann, who oversees the Idaho Nonprofit Center.

"It's important to look at the ratios. If the budget is \$250,000 and the chief was making \$150,000, that would be a real cause for concern."

A nonprofit's CEO should receive a "reasonable" compensation, the IRS says, but the tax code is vague on how much is unacceptable.

The IRS only requires nonprofits to report salaries of executives making more than \$100,000. In the Magic Valley, many local nonprofits provide salary information of CEOs making much less.

## 4. Are board members compensated?

Individuals who participate on a nonprofit board of directors should do so for the public good, not for a salary, Hoffman said.

"If board members are getting more than just reimbursements for travel to meetings, then that's a red flag. It's not illegal, but it is a concern."

## 5. What impact does the charity have?

Have you visited the organization? Met the executives? Talked to someone who benefited from one of its programs? Doing so can provide powerful insights on how the charity meets its goals and how the community benefits.

## Worried about Cancer? Ask Someone to Marry You

When I mentioned my bout with breast cancer to a new acquaintance, his first question was, "Are you married?"

It was an unusual reaction — a more common query is whether I have kids. Later he told me that his daughter-in-law had been diagnosed with breast cancer while still in graduate school and that she and his son had moved in with him. He understood better than most people that being married makes it easier to cope with cancer.

The very next day the Journal of Clinical Oncology released a study offering more than anecdotal evidence that marriage is good for cancer patients.

Controlling for demographic factors such as age, race, education and household income, researchers who analyzed records of more than 730,000 cancer patients found that married patients did significantly better than single people. They lived longer, received better treatment and were more likely to be diagnosed before metastatic cancers developed.

It didn't matter whether

the unmarried patients were lifelong singles, divorced, widowed or separated. All did worse than demographically similar married patients.

"This study is the first to show a consistent and significant benefit of marriage on survival among each of the ten leading causes of cancer-related death in the United States — lung, colorectal, breast, pancreatic, prostate, liver/bile duct, non-Hodgkin lymphoma, head and neck, ovarian, and esophageal cancer," the American Society of Clinical Oncology noted in its news release.

The study doesn't explain exactly why marriage makes a difference. It's possible that married patients just have better health insurance. But, the authors note, "even in nations with universal access to free care, such as Denmark, sociodemographic factors affect outcome in a multitude of health conditions." (Insurance differences also wouldn't do much to explain the disadvantage of widowhood, because widows tend to be covered by Medicare.)

"The most likely reason," the authors conclude, "is that married patients have better adherence with prescribed treatments than unmarried patients." They have someone to watch over them.

What about couples who

aren't formally married but in long-term relationships? What about widows with supportive kids? What about people with great friends? And what about unhappy marriages?

The study didn't leave these people out. If it had — if it had measured only the difference between ideal marriages and lonely, miserable singles — the differences would presumably be even more distinct. In the big picture, marriage makes a difference.

Marriage is increasingly the big sociological divide in American life. Getting and staying married makes you part of a privileged elite.

As Charles Murray documents in his 2012 book "Coming Apart," that divide tracks the income divide, with low-income whites much less likely to be married than their high-income counterparts. (I criticized a different aspect of Murray's book in this column.) The causality is debatable. Maybe poorer people have a harder time getting married. Maybe being married makes it easier to earn more. Maybe some third factor causes both phenomena. But what is clear is that you're most likely to have a better life if you're married — even if, it turns out, you get cancer. Friends are nice, but they

are rarely equivalent to a spouse. The level of on-call commitment and intimacy is simply different. Your spouse knows you in a 24/7 way that few if any others do, especially in a society organized around the nuclear family rather than the extended one. (A spouse also multiplies your extended family by two.) As my economist husband likes to put it, being married also creates a "joint utility function." Your happiness becomes entwined with your spouse's, giving you strong incentives to make an extra effort.

Recalling how the "epidemic of care giving" in response to AIDS helped make the case for same-sex marriage, the writer Jonathan Rauch argued that by "assuming the burdens of marriage at its

that patients who are not married should reach out to friends, cancer support or faith-based groups, and their doctors to obtain

adequate social support," lead author Ayal Aizer, chief resident in radiation oncology at Harvard Medical School, said in the oncology society's news release. But trying to turn the study's findings into a general call for "social support" ignores its stark result. Single people aren't, of course, doomed to die of cancer. Their friends and family can in fact help them do better. But we shouldn't pretend that marriage isn't a huge advantage.

## Genetic Testing 'A Gift' for MSTI Cancer Patient

Gene mutations that put women at higher risk for breast cancer have been major news this year.

In May, actress Angelina Jolie announced that she had undergone a double mastectomy to reduce her risk of breast cancer because she carried a mutation in the BRCA1 gene. In June, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that naturally occurring human genes cannot be patented, breaking the hold a single genetic testing company had on testing for BRCA1 and BRCA2 mutations.

Jolie could afford the \$4,000 test, but many women could not. Within hours of the Supreme Court ruling, five companies announced their own versions of the same BRCA test, at about \$2,000 less, and many insurance companies — including Idaho Medicaid — agreed to cover testing. More patients now have access to the test, as do more researchers, increasing opportunities for scientific collaboration in the complex field of human genetics and cancer.

About 232,340 people, primarily women, are diagnosed with breast cancer each year in the United States. An estimated 5 percent to 10 percent carry a BRCA1 or BRCA2 gene mutation.

Sarah Syndergaard, with St. Luke's Mountain States Tumor Institute (MSTI), is a registered dietitian who works with cancer patients every day, offering nutritional education, guidance, and support. Syndergaard was 30-years-old when she found a lump during a self-exam and, because she was so young, genetic testing was indicated.

Her BRCA2 mutation puts her at

high risk not only for breast cancer but also for ovarian cancer. Armed with this information, she decided to undergo a double

mastectomy, and she is currently receiving chemotherapy.

These steps reduce her risk of breast cancer coming back by 90 percent to 95 percent, according to Heather Hussey, a certified genetic counselor with St. Luke's MSTI.

"The estrogen blocker tamoxifen will further reduce her risk, as will removing her ovaries down the road," Hussey said.

"I feel good about getting the testing done," Syndergaard said. "It's a gift I can give to my family, so they can have pre-emptive treatment if necessary."

Although most women will not have a mutation in the BRCA genes, it's important to know if you're at higher risk for breast cancer, so you can take steps to reduce that risk.

Please talk with your doctor about a referral to a genetic counselor if you have one or more of these risk factors:

- A prior history of breast cancer before age 50
- A family member diagnosed with breast cancer before the age of 50
- A prior history of ovarian cancer at any age
- Multiple family members diagnosed with breast, ovarian, prostate, or pancreatic cancer
- Atypical cells detected during a biopsy of the breast
- A male relative with breast cancer
- Ashkenazi Jewish ancestry
- A positive test for a known breast cancer mutation such as BRCA1 or BRCA2 in yourself or a family member.

## Survivor Finds Power in Sharing Cancer Story

Cancer can be a long, scary journey, but no one has to walk it alone. Sharing with family members, friends, and care providers can help to remove some of the fear and anxiety.

Over the years, many people have shared their cancer stories with St. Luke's Mountain States Tumor Institute (MSTI), and we've seen the resilience, courage, love, fear, and hope of some amazing people.

Twin Falls resident Luree Evans is one of them. Luree is facing breast cancer for the third time since 2007, and her experience has taught her how important it is to talk about it.

"I'm not a public speaker, but I have no problem speaking out about cancer," she said. "Anything I can say to help someone else going through this is good. And it helps me, too."

It's important to have a second set of ears at your appointments, especially early on, Luree said.

"You're just inundated with new information," she said. "You can't keep track of everything yourself—it's overwhelming."

Sharing the experience with those she trusts and recording her cancer treatment and information in a journal help Luree keep track of the details that now cover more than six years.

Opening up to family, friends, and co-workers allows them to offer help when Luree needs it, and to understand what she's going through.

"I have excellent support from my family and at work and awesome friends," she said. "I couldn't have made it the way I have without them."

Sharing concerns and joys

with caregivers has been vital. Luree relies on her team at St. Luke's MSTI to be honest and straightforward with her and to answer her questions, and they have become her friends.

"They become part of your family—the doctors, nurses, receptionists, everyone," she said. "They're attentive to your every need, your privacy, and your dignity. I have total faith in them."



Luree believes her ability to share her experience with others, her strong support system, and her positive attitude are why she is still here. From her first diagnosis, she said, "I wasn't going to let it get me down. "I was determined to laugh about it instead of cry. I always had a smile. 

# Jerome Man Dies in House Fire

## Man Gets Life Sentence in Grave-digging Death

**CALDWELL (AP)** • A Nampa man convicted of making a 27-year-old man dig his own grave before shooting him to death has been sentenced to life in prison without the possibility of parole.

District Judge Molley Huskey sentenced 33-year-old Gregory Raymond Higgins Jr. on Wednesday for the August 2012 killing of James Groat of Nampa.

Authorities said Higgins and two other men lured Groat to Lake Lowell just west of Nampa for a supposed drug deal.

Prosecutors say Higgins wrongly believed Groat was a police informant and forced him to dig his own grave before shooting him five times.

through the significant stressors that come with a cancer diagnosis, Rowe said.

Doctors and dieticians will visit the group, too.

As an oncology social worker, Thomas said, one of her primary roles is to support and counsel patients and their families.

She also refers patients to online resources and outside organizations, and

she helps them find transportation to and from medical appointments.

Social workers are available if patients have just been diagnosed with cancer and need to talk with someone.

Social workers also provide more frequent sessions with patients and crisis interventions.

Sometimes, patients "feel like their lives are falling apart," Thomas said, and social workers can serve as an advocate for them.

"Everyone I talked to said, 'Surround yourself with positive people, and it'll pull you through this,'" she said.

At the time, she was single.

Later she married Stan, whose previous wife had died of cancer. If Pat hadn't had a mammogram, Stan said, he may have never met her.

"I'm glad she made it," he said with a smile.

Now Pat stays current with checkups and eats healthily.

"It makes you more able to put things into perspective," she said. "Keep the small things small because they really are. You get to the big picture really quick."

"It has made her a nicer person," Stan said.

"You can only hope," Pat said with a chuckle.

## Making a Difference Locally

Seaman helped bring Tough Enough to Wear Pink to Twin Falls in 2006. She and Stan Mai headed the event's board until she had to step away recently for personal reasons.

The group has grown a lit-

tle each year, and Seaman said she likely won't ever completely stop helping it. Volunteers raise money through the Magic Valley Stampede rodeo night and "Ladies Night Out," a dinner held by cowboys clad in pink shirts. The group took in about \$16,000 this year, Seaman said.

She and the Mais said they stand behind the organization because it makes a difference locally, unlike those that send money out of the community.

They hope to raise Idaho's low preventive screening numbers.

Idaho was last nationally in mammographies in 2011, the state Department of Health and Welfare reported.

More than one-third of women over 40 had not received a screening over the prior two years.

The group spends a lot of time trying to get the word out, handing out business cards with phone numbers for women who need a mammogram to call.

"Know anybody who can't afford a mammogram? Here, call this number," Pat said. "That's all it takes is a phone call."

Through funding prevention, Seaman and the Mais say they can stretch their dollars further. If they tried to fund treatment, Stan said, they'd spend all their money on one person.

"That's the thing about it — a mammogram costs \$300 now," Stan said. "Once you get into treatment, you are looking at many more zeros behind it immediately."

## Giving Back

Seaman and the Mais said it is fulfilling to hear survivor stories and to meet those who have been helped.

"It seems like I eat, breathe and sleep it," Seaman said. "But when you have so much of it, you just want to be a big part of it and make a difference for people."

Seaman wants others to

get involved — donate, give back, be there for someone and "encourage wherever you can encourage." She said doing so has given her much in return.

"I hope that if it is ever my turn, that I could draw strength from what I have experienced, what I've heard, what I know everyone else has gone through," she said. "I would hope to have that strength."

Pat agreed. Know your family history, talk to your health provider regularly, and know your support group. She was amazed by the nice things people did for her during treatment — mowing her lawn, shoveling her sidewalk and taking her to dinner.

"You see a kinder side of people that you don't see every day," she said. "To me it was kind of an eye-opener."

When she went to chemotherapy the first time, a friend insisted she couldn't go alone. Later, she returned the favor to a recently diagnosed friend.

The experience brought the women closer and helped Pat see the survivors network that cancer can create.

"You've got to have hope, and that's your hope," she said.

# Idaho Health Exchange Website Working Out Bugs

**BOISE** • The Idaho health insurance exchange has been open for business for several days, but due to the high traffic, the online application process is operating slower than expected.

The state exchange — called Your Health Idaho — was created by the Idaho Legislature to provide an online marketplace where Idaho families and small businesses can go to compare and purchase health insurance, as mandated by the Affordable Care Act.

Amy Dowd, executive director of the exchange, remains optimistic that the website will up to speed soon.

"This is a marathon, not a sprint," Dowd said. "Open enrollment ... continues until March 31, 2014. As long as you complete your application by Dec. 15, 2013, coverage will be effective on Jan. 1, 2014."

According to the U.S.

Census Bureau, 18.9 percent of Idahoans under the age of 65 didn't have health insurance in 2011. That marks a decline in the share of uninsured Idahoans since 2010 when the rate was 20.3 percent.

Dowd encourages insurance consumers to contact agents, brokers and in-person assisters — called Consumer Connectors — to help navigate the process. Consumer Connectors can be found at [www.yourhealthidaho.org/consumerassistancelocator](http://www.yourhealthidaho.org/consumerassistancelocator).

The Consumer Resource Center is open and representatives are available to take calls and questions at 855-YH-Idaho (855-944-3246) or [customerservice@yourhealthidaho.org](mailto:customerservice@yourhealthidaho.org).

The exchange will not be affected by the recent federal government shutdown, Dowd said. "All functions of Your Health Idaho will remain operational regardless of federal government status."

Sept. 25. The women were last seen near Arco on Sept. 19.

On Monday, Elliott-Blakeslee's family members asked for experienced hikers to help with the search.

Park spokesman Ted Stout says the 10 rangers working the search are in top physical condition.

Elliott-Blakeslee is believed to have headed out from the Tree Molds trailhead for a short hike without food, water, or protective clothing on Sept. 19. Her hiking partner Linkert was discovered on Wednesday, Sept. 25. Officials be-

lieve dehydration and hypothermia likely led to her death.

"After last weekend's big effort to locate Dr. Jo, we had intended to scale back search operations given the environmental conditions we have been experiencing," said Park Superintendent Dan Buckley.

"The probability of finding her alive has diminished, but we are committed to continuing the search until we find Dr. Jo and bring closure to her family, friends and all those who have been involved in this

search," he stated.

Park staff, along with the Butte County Sheriff's Office, are working with the family of the missing hiker to organize a volunteer search operation beginning this Friday. The family has set up a web page at [www.facebook.com/SearchForDrJo](http://www.facebook.com/SearchForDrJo) for those who would like to learn more about the on-going search effort and how to help.

According to the page, the family is requesting donations to help searchers.

"We are urgently in need of donations to help with logistical challenges such as (to name a few) outfitting volunteers with the appropriate tools and safety gear, assisting with

lodging for volunteers coming in from out of state, and providing on the ground critical support to searchers in the form of food, water and whatever else is needed. All donations go directly to support the search effort," the page says.

"Donations should be made through the Craters of the Moon Natural History Association, which is a 501(c)(3) association. Please do not send money directly to persons claiming to be family members and do not respond to outside solicitations which may be scams."

*When the Leaves Change, Fishermen Must Renew*

Your skin is soothed by the balmy winds.



in. Well, you get what I mean.

The morning hatches tingle your senses and relax your mood.

Your boots skip through the sagebrush potpourri and over the dust that smells like a good conversation.

Summer fishing is sensory overload. While inside, we forget and become desensitized. When we are outside, in the shoulder seasons, we wonder where it went. That glory that met us each day, each trout.

And before you know it, baseball season becomes football season. Blooming mornings seem to crawl and creep. The sun, once leaping up and shouting for God's glory, now rolls out of bed yawning.

This is fall.

Take a moment and smell it. Really think about what's going on here when the leaves put on nature's annual burlesque dance. What annual splendor.

Think about what you've done, where you've been and — for the love of monofilament — go and do it again before it's too late. Somewhere in the distance winter snarls.

Have you been lulled into complacency by the summer's yawn? Have you forgotten your watery duties? Has the monkey on your back been on vacation dancing the hula?

Some fishermen retreat and head for a heated blanket this time of year. But the virtues of fall fishing are dispensed by crisp air, skinny rivers and starry mornings. Like a good alarm clock, the seasonal changes should give new life to summer-worn fishermen.

So find the gusto and get out there. Buy some fingerless wool gloves, a beanie with one of those frilly balls on top, get some socks thicker than a mammoth's underbelly and dive

See, fall is like the feeling you get after you release a fish. You've fought it, netted it, unhooked it. That's May, June and July. In August, you put your hand into the water and feel its wriggling life return.

You let go and it darts away. You look around, take a deep breath and remember all that's good and beautiful. September. October.

But, there's more out there. Last year, I fished through October into November. The mornings were cold. The frosty crunch under your boots, the way the sun hits the cold air.

Those, more than some of my best summer days, were what I remembered best. A thin line of snow on the hills, a hot coffee tucked in my waders.

One trout I nabbed was fat — he had been feasting all summer and looked at me with the same summer daze I think I had a few months earlier. He was ready for his winter retreat, but not I.

When the lakes freeze, don't give up either. Many rivers are still fishable. Often the lack of fishing pressure on an area will turn to your favor. Fish who didn't get their fill could be less discerning. And then there's the steelhead fishing to think about.

When you wring that seasonal sponge for every last drop, the winter seems bearable.

Sure, it comes with nostalgia. But in the deep, dark nights and through the frosty mornings, what will you wish you had done when the leaves fell?

**Cancer Survivor Finds Comfort in Fly Fishing, Dirt Biking**

**HAZELTON** • Last year, 32-year-old Carrie Morgan was busy teaching and taking care of her two daughters. But a startling diagnosis came on Aug. 8, 2012: breast cancer.

She learned she had an aggressive cancer — often the case for women who are diagnosed at a young age. Morgan caught it early before it spread.

Over the course of her treatment at Huntsman Cancer Institute in Salt Lake City, she had a single mastectomy, chemotherapy treatments and reconstructive surgery. Now, the 33-year-old teacher at Hazelton's Valley Elementary School goes to appointments every three months. And she'll have to take Tamoxifen — a hormone therapy that helps prevent the recurrence of breast cancer — for the next 10 years.

During her cancer treatment, Morgan heard about Casting for Recovery, a national program for breast cancer survivors that provides free fly fishing retreats. Morgan and a co-worker applied and were selected to participate.

"We were pretty lucky to get in," she said, nothing that others have waited for years.


Morgan had never been fly fishing before the Casting for Recovery retreat. Now, she plans to get a fly rod so she can go steelhead fishing.

Fishing is time to reflect. "It's so peaceful," Morgan said.

Earlier this month, she went on a weekend reunion with Casting for Recovery.

When Morgan got involved, it was one of the first times she could truly connect with other women dealing with breast cancer.

**Deer Season Opens in Most of Idaho**

**JEROME** • The regular deer season opens Oct. 10 in most regions of Idaho.

In some areas, a regular deer tag allows hunters to take either mule deer or white-tailed deer. A white-tailed deer tag allows a hunter to take only a white-tailed, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game said.

Many areas across Idaho also offer antlerless youth hunt opportunities, but check the 2013 big game rules brochure for those areas.

To hunt deer during the regular season, a hunter must have valid 2013 Idaho hunting license and a

deer tag.

Fish and Game officials ask that hunters report any poaching or suspicious activities they encounter or hear about while hunting. Most serious poaching cases are cracked and won only with the help of hunters or others who report crimes, Fish and Game said.

Hunters with information about a wildlife crime may call the Citizens Against Poaching hotline at 1-800-632-5999, 24 hours a day. Callers may remain anonymous. Or they may call the nearest Fish and Game office or lo-

cal law enforcement.

Hunters may pick up a free copy of Fish and Game's backcountry game meat care guide. It has tips to ensure proper handling of game to avoid wasting meat. The guide is available at Fish and Game offices and license vendors, or at <http://fishandgame.idaho.gov/public/hunt/rules/?getPage61>.

For help planning your hunt, use the hunt planner at <http://fishandgame.idaho.gov/ifwis/huntplanner>.

Ask first before hunting on private land.

## Battle of the Budget Bolt Actions

Without question, the Ruger American Rifle is one of the slickest bolt actions to come down the pike in some time.

Though priced and categorized as an entry-level firearm, the AR boasts many of the same ergonomic niceties and standard features as the firm's carriage-class Hawkeye line, but it retails for hundreds less. When viewed beside its price-point competitors (the Savage Axis, Marlin X7, Remington 783, Mossberg ATR and Howa GameKing) only the T/C Venture stands shoulder-to-shoulder with the American Rifle, in my opinion.

So what characteristics does the AR possess that have me feeling so warm and fuzzy as I pen these lines?

Like the Thompson Center Venture, the Ruger is stocked in a rigid black synthetic handle. For consistent accuracy, metallic pillar bedding blocks ensure wiggle-free seating of their barreled actions. Hogue

rubber forearm and pistol grip inserts provide slip-free traction on the T/C's stock, but I find that the Ruger's sculpted and stippled ridges molded into the stock fit my hands better.

Conveniently, both models are available in a compact version with an abbreviated barrel (18-inch and 20-inch) and a shortened 12.5-inch length of pull generally considered ideal for most youth and smaller-framed shooters of both sexes. Both are reamed for an extensive line of short- and long-action cartridges suitable for any game or application imaginable.

Personally, I find that the more slender dimensions of the AR allow for a more comfortable off-the-sling hand carry and quicker access to the safety catch and trigger. I also find that the AR's tang-mounted safety easily trumps the T/C's

side-mounted safety tab — not only for its ease of access, but also for its more positive engagement and release. This is one trigger that won't get accidentally snicked off during a hunt allowing the possibility of an accidental discharge. That's great life insurance indeed.

Capacity-wise, both feature 3+1 synthetic detachable box magazines that positively lock up and release with engagement tabs on the front of the magazines. While the AR utilizes the company's marvelously smooth rotary cartridge feeding system, the T/C's staggered arrangement is decidedly more difficult to load. It may also prove less reliable over time as the compressed leaf spring fatigues with continued use; the jury's still out on that one because both models are relative newcomers to the market.

After more than 100 years of design refinement, even bargain bolt action rifles like these sport excellent crisp, user-adjustable triggers and smoothly cycling bolts. But

here again, with its newly designed dual cocking cams, the AR definitely provides a smoother bolt cycle and would offer faster follow shots if needed.

The barreled actions are non-reflective matte blue and boast precise hammer-forged tubes; the T/C features the accuracy-enhancing 5R rifling style. Each is MOA-capable and will shoot better than most of us can hold. The sculpted receivers are drilled and tapped and come furnished with Weaver-style scope bases.

These are robust, accurate and 100 percent American-made rifles. With real world prices set right around \$360 to \$400, both offer carriage-class performance at entry-level costs; the only real difficulty will be deciding which one you prefer. For me, it's the Ruger American Rifle, *Field and Stream's* "Best of the Best" for 2012. I couldn't be happier.

## Some Waterfowl Seasons Open Saturday

**JEROME** • The waterfowl season opens Saturday, Oct. 5, in the area around the American Falls Reservoir.

It opens in the rest of the state on Oct. 12, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game said.

The daily bag limits will be seven ducks — but no more than two female mallards, two redheads, three scaup, two pintails and two canvasbacks — and four Canada geese and six white-fronted geese.

In the southwest area, white-fronted geese will open Nov. 11.

The season for light geese — snow and Ross's geese — will be open from Nov. 26 to March 10 in the southwest area. The daily bag limit is 20 light geese.

During the time the white-fronted goose and light-geese seasons occur at the same time, the use of electronic calls and unplugged shotguns is not allowed.

A split season for light geese opens in part of the American Falls Reservoir area on Feb. 15.

## New Summer Trails Planned at Galena Lodge

**KETCHUM** • The Sawtooth National Recreation Area and Blaine County Recreation District said they'll begin to develop and construct a 47-mile summer trails system at Galena Lodge for hiking biking and equestrian use.

The project includes 30 miles of new non-motorized single-track trail, 17 miles of existing routes and 18 bridges.

Development will start with beginner trails closest to Galena Lodge, then intermediate trails, then advanced trails. Plans also include expansion of the parking area at Galena Lodge and placement of new restroom facilities. A trailhead facility, including a restroom, will be developed at an existing site on the southwest side of Idaho Highway 75, across from Galena Lodge.

The SNRA and recreation district promise high-quality beginner and intermediate terrain and a "stacked loop" system of trail around historic Galena Lodge. The two entities will work with community and volunteer groups.

The recreation district owns Galena Lodge on Sawtooth National Forest land and operates under a permit from the SNRA.

"We are extremely excited to begin work on this

project in partnership with the SNRA," Jim Keating, executive director for the recreation district, said in a press release. "The summer trail system will enable healthy, active access in the outdoors in all seasons in the Galena area and further celebrate the history, ecology and stewardship of this amazing place in our valley."

Public involvement for this project began in July 2012, and the environmental assessment was signed July 1, 2013, the Forest Service release said. The final trail plans incorporate community feedback.

For the protection of wildlife, 11.8 miles of trail will be closed each year.

"These seasonal closures will be from May 1 through June 25 to lessen the disturbance to elk calving and deer fawning in the project area. Signage will be used to alert hikers to the presence of sheep grazing activities, and we will work with permittees and BCRD to provide the public information about sheep and sheep dogs," said Joby Timm, area ranger for the SNRA.

## Sharp-tailed Grouse Season Opens This Week

**JEROME** • Idaho's sharp-tailed grouse season opened this week and runs through Oct. 31, with a daily bag limit of two birds and a possession limit of six.

The season is open only in eastern Idaho in these areas: Bingham and Clark counties east of Interstate 15; Franklin, Fremont and Jefferson counties east of Interstate 15; Madison and Teton counties; Bonneville County east of Interstate 15; Bannock County east of Interstate 15 and south of Interstate 86; Bear Lake, Caribou and Cassia counties east of Interstate 84 and that portion west of Interstate 84, south of the Malta-Sublett Road and east of the Malta-Strevell Road; and Franklin, Oneida and Power County south of Interstate 86.

The rest of the state is closed.

Columbian sharp-tailed grouse were once distributed in grassland-mountain brush habitats throughout southern and western Idaho north to the Palouse Prairie. Habitat changes have reduced this grouse's range to areas mostly in southeastern Idaho, the Idaho Depart-

ment of Fish and Game said.

Agricultural lands enrolled in the USDA's Conservation Reserve Program provide important habitat for this species and have led to increased populations since 1986, Fish and Game said. Good populations still exist from Fremont County south to Utah in grasslands associated with chokecherry, sagebrush, hawthorn, serviceberry, bitterbrush and other brushy cover.

Sharp-tailed grouse have been introduced into historical range in southern Twin Falls County and southeastern Owyhee County. Twin Falls County, Owyhee County and most of Cassia County are closed to the hunting of sharp-tailed grouse. Sharp-tailed grouse also occur around Split Butte area in Minidoka County, where hunting is closed.

Hunters need a valid 2013 Idaho hunting license with a sage/sharp-tailed grouse permit validation at \$4.75.

# Take an Idaho Backcountry Adventure on the Grangeville-Salmon Road

Viridescent mountain ridges, carpeted in pine and fir and spiced with gray-white granite outcroppings, go in all directions along the Grangeville-Salmon Road in Central Idaho.

It's amazing country. The road leads to vistas where you can see the Salmon River canyon, the Seven Devils, Camas Prairie and the 206,053-acre Gospel Hump Wilderness.

It's ridge running Idaho-style in the comfort of your rig, whether it's a pickup truck or SUV. And what's even better, the road is paved for the first 35 miles south of Grangeville.

My wife and I would have never discovered this country if it hadn't been for countless trips up and down Idaho's famed White Bird Hill on U.S. 95 and a nagging question.

Looking east from U.S. 95, we'd always wonder what was on the other side of those ridges.

Well, lots and lots of ridges. Hungry Ridge. Tamarack Ridge. Dentist Parlor Ridge. Telephone Ridge.

You get the picture. Miles and miles of ridges. Ridges as far as the eye can see.

We answered the question on a mid-August drive where we discovered the scenic Forest Road 221 — the Grangeville-Salmon Road.

## Backcountry Pavement

The recreation highway goes from Grangeville south to the Salmon River and then about 10 miles downstream to Riggins.

In the old days, it was a main route between the two towns. It was also a toll road and part of the Milner Trail, which was a supply line from Mount Idaho to the historic mining town of Florence.

It's paved and a gateway to some of Idaho's most remote backcountry, including hiking and ATV trails, trout-filled alpine lakes, mountain meadows and old fire lookouts.

Depending on what route you take to get to the Grangeville-Salmon Road, you'll be driving in a mountainous region with elevations ranging from about 1,800 feet on the Salmon River to 8,940 feet at the summit of Buffalo Hump.

The road and spur roads will take you through the heart of the 2.2 million-acre Nez Perce National Forest with a diversity of terrain

from rugged dry canyons to moist cedar forests.

## Let's Get Going

There are several ways to get to, and drive, the Grangeville-Salmon Road.

We chose to go north to south with the beautiful canyon of the Salmon River as the finale in scenery.

OK, let's head north out of Riggins on U.S. 95.

- You can drive all the way to Grangeville and take off out of town toward Snow Haven Ski Area and Fish Creek Campground. They are located along the Grangeville-Salmon Road. From there you continue on Forest Road 221 all the way to the Salmon River.

- You can go north out of Riggins to the Slate Creek Ranger Station and take Slate Creek Road 354 to connect with Road 221 and then head south. The U.S. Forest Service says this road gets really rough near the top and you don't want to pull a trailer.

- You can head out of White Bird and take Free Use Road 243 and connect with the Grangeville-Salmon Road.

(With the Slate Creek and White Bird routes, you miss more than 15 miles of the Grangeville-Salmon Road from Grangeville south, but they are shorter loops for a two-day weekend.)

- You can do the road south to north by driving to Riggins and heading east on the Salmon River Road to Allison Creek and turning north on the Allison Creek Road, which turns into Road 221. Then head north to Grangeville.

We didn't want to drive all the way to Grangeville but wanted to come out of the canyon opposite White Bird Hill to see the area we had been wondering about all these years. We still wanted to do the road from north to south.

So we took Free Use Road (243) out of White Bird, but not before stopping at the Canyon House in White Bird for a chocolate milk shake. (Now you get the excuse for picking this route.)

We headed out of White Bird on the old White Bird Grade into the land of the Battle of White Bird Canyon, which was fought on June 17, 1877, in Idaho Territory.

White Bird Canyon was the opening battle of the Nez Perce War between the Nez Perce Indians and the United States. We had visited the historic battleground site on a previous trip, so we opted to immediately turn off on

the Free Use Road and head to the top of the ridge.

Within 11 miles we had climbed from 1,700 feet in elevation to 5,000 feet.

The road wound its way through dry rangeland and along rugged canyons to lush forests.

We camped the first night in an undeveloped campsite in the forest just before hitting the top of the ridge.

The next morning, we continued on Free Use Road until we reached its intersection with Road 221 (the Grangeville-Salmon Road), which was a surprise. Pavement! After coming off a dusty gravel road, Road 221 was a luxury in driving.

We were in a timbered hallway with occasional views of ridges in the distance.

It isn't long before you have to make some decisions about exploring spur roads. Some of the roads spaghetti their way down to Idaho 14, which ends up in Elk City. Save that for another day.

Should we check out Hungry Ridge? It sounded good, but then we saw the sign saying Gospel Hump. Off we went up steep and narrow Forest Service Road 444.

It was worth it because of the lush patches of huckleberries and magnificent views.

We drove along an open ridge where you could see where we had come from in the canyon at White Bird and a ridge off in the distance overlooking Hells Canyon. Pittsburgh Saddle was out

there somewhere.

"We refer to this area as the Gospels," said Crystal Dannar of Grangeville, who was driving the road in her Jeep with friends Kyle Nelson and Julia Workman.

The 11-mile road took us up 3,000 feet in elevation past meadows, near trailheads to alpine lakes and along a finger going into the Gospel Hump Wilderness.

Along the way there were dropoffs of thousands of feet that left you hugging the inside bank of the road.

It wasn't long before we arrived at Square Mountain Lookout with a panorama of the Gospel Hump Wilderness. There were six cars and trucks parked near the lookout. It's a popular place.

We camped the next night near a meadow be-

tween 7,000 and 8,000 feet in elevation on the way down the mountain.

The next day we headed back to Road 221 and south with a turn off to the historic site of the mining town of Florence.

It's eerie to stand in the forest and try to imagine that 9,000 people lived there during the mining heyday of the mid-1800s. The forest has reclaimed the town site, but the cemetery remains. It's interesting to read signs that explain the gray, weathered grave markers and people who lived and passed through the area.

On Road 221 again, we headed south to the Salmon River canyon, where you come out of the forest and are greeted with another incredible panorama of the

mountains, canyon and river below.

The road, laced with hair-pin turns, drops from about 6,200 feet in elevation to 1,800 feet at the Salmon River. It keeps you on your toes. No, make that your toes on the brake pedal, hoping not to smoke the brakes.

It was a downhill ride in low gear crawling around blind curves.

As we arrived at the bottom of the Allison Creek canyon and the Salmon River, we looked at the highway sign. It said Grangeville was 67 miles on the road we had just come down.

That's 67 miles of beautiful mountain ridges, remote backcountry and forever views.

The Grangeville-Salmon Road is one of those places you can visit many times to take in all the beauty.

"I met women who knew exactly what I was going through," she said. They jokingly refer to the group as "the club."

In conversations, it was hard to get past the point that she had breast cancer. It was the elephant in the room, Morgan said.

Casting for Recovery allows participants to "skip that whole part and get on with having a good time," she said.

Morgan — like her husband and two girls — enjoys a variety of outdoor activities, including skiing and snowmobiling. They especially enjoy going to Riggins and Challis.

They also take dirt bikes out on trails; Morgan recently got started on that activity. Unlike fly fishing, it's not exactly calming. But it gives her a sense of empowerment.

For breast cancer patients, "control" is a big word, Morgan said. Many who are going through treatment and recovery don't feel like they have any control. With dirt biking, "you have control over that."

Women who have breast cancer can benefit from both the therapeutic nature and physical motion of fly fishing, said Whitney Milhoan,

yet, Milhoan said.

Participants in the retreat range in age from early 30s to 90s. Some have been recently

diagnosed, while others have

been in remission for years. They're in different stages in their journeys with breast

cancer and recovery, Milhoan said, which is an "important and helpful dynamic in the program."

"The physical motion of casting a rod helps to stretch soft tissues in the arm and shoulder region," Milhoan said. It's an area that may be affected by radiation and reconstructive surgery.


Fly fishing is an activity encouraged by a lot of doctors and physical therapists because it's a good range-of-

motion exercise, she said.

Casting for Recovery (castingforrecovery.org) operates in 35 states and offers 43 weekend retreats. Breast cancer patients of any age or disease stage can apply; they're accepted through a lottery system.

# U.S. Government Shuttered with No Quick End Seen Amid Discord

**WASHINGTON** • The partial shutdown of the U.S. government showed no signs of ending quickly as lawmakers stiffened their positions and sought to shift blame to the other side.

Day One of the first shutdown since 1996 wrapped up with no talks scheduled between the White House and Congress, making it more likely the standoff would merge with the fight over raising the U.S. debt limit later this month to make sure the government can pay all its bills.

"You have to now let this play out," said Rep. Devin Nunes, R-Calif., who has criticized his party's hard-liners for dictating its strategy. "We're this far, so you have to let it play out."

Market reaction was muted Tuesday as up to 800,000 federal workers were sent home with no paychecks and parks and other services were shuttered across the country. U.S. stocks rose, after the Standard & Poor's 500 Index had fallen Sept. 30 to a three-week low, as investors speculated that the economic effects of the partial government shutdown would be limited.

House Republicans sought a way out of the impasse, flinging proposals at the Democrats

and seeking to engage the Senate and President Obama in direct talks.

"The president isn't telling the whole story when it comes to the government shutdown," House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, wrote in USA Today. "The fact is that Washington Democrats have slammed the door on reopening

the government by refusing to engage in bipartisan talks."

Senate Democrats kept sending back the plans, rejecting the ideas as political theater and insisting that Republicans fund the whole government temporarily and stop demanding major changes in Obama's Affordable Care Act.

Obama had harsh words for the Republicans, saying they had "demanded ransom just for doing their job" of passing a budget.

The shutdown coincided with the first day of enrollment for the health-care law, as new exchanges tried to handle a flood of consumer interest. Republicans called computer glitches a sign the measure, passed in 2010, isn't workable. Obama said the demand is evidence the law which House Republicans have sought to defund or delay is important and popular.

On the House floor, Republicans offered three bills Tuesday that would reopen parks and the Department of Veterans Affairs and allow Washington's city government to spend its money. The move was designed to blunt some of the most visible effects of the shutdown and force Democrats to choose between popular programs and their insistence on a full resumption of government funding.

After all three failed under an expedited procedure that required bipartisan support, Republicans said they would keep pressing similar efforts that Obama and the Democratic-controlled Senate have consistently rejected.

"We're going to stay here and keep working, putting more options on the table to continue funding government, while also ending the sweetheart deals in Obamacare," said Rep. Steve Scalise, R-La.

## BUDGET BATTLE

### CEOs Say Government Shutdown Threatens Economic Rebound

Chief executive officers at companies ranging from Honeywell International to JetBlue Airways said that a prolonged shutdown of the U.S. government has the potential to jeopardize the economic rebound.

The government Tuesday began idling as many as 800,000 federal employees after Congress failed to break a partisan deadlock over whether to tie any changes to President Barack Obama's health-care law to an extension of government funding.

Even Foot Locker CEO Ken Hicks, who has lamented aspects of the 2010 health-care legislation, saying it won't curb rising costs, said the government shouldn't be shut down over the dispute. It could hurt a fragile recovery in what he calls challenging times. "Am I happy about the higher cost and lower level of care that people will get because of the Affordable Care Act? No," Hicks said in a phone interview this week. "But is it worth shutting down the government over? No."

The first partial shutdown in 17 years may subtract as much as 1.4 percentage points from economic growth, depending on its

length, according to Guy LeBas, chief fixed income strategist at Janney Montgomery Scott LLC in Philadelphia. A lengthy budget fight risks dampening consumer sentiment, cooling the auto market, restraining sales of luxury goods and hurting travel.

### Dollar Seen as Shutdown Loser as Growth Hit Spurs QE

The first U.S. government shutdown in 17 years is stoking speculation that the longer it lasts, the more likely the Federal Reserve will delay reducing its monetary stimulus program, boosting emerging-market currencies at the expense of the dollar.

At least \$300 million a day in economic output will initially be lost because lawmakers can't agree on a budget, according to IHS Inc. A two-week shutdown starting Oct. 1 could cut growth by 0.3 percentage point to a 2.3 percent rate, according to St. Louis-based Macroeconomic Advisers. The Fed's stimulus programs have weighed on the greenback, with the Bloomberg Dollar Index falling 0.8 percent since Sept. 17. That was the day before the central bank decided to keep printing cash to buy \$85 billion of bonds a month because it has yet to see signs of sustained economic growth. The Bloomberg JPMorgan Asia Dollar Index is up 0.2 percent in that period.

### U.S. Seeks Delay of Civil Cases as Federal Shutdown Begins

U.S. Justice Department lawyers



from New York to San Francisco are asking judges to delay civil cases as the government partially shuts down, and in Manhattan already won a halt to litigation except one trial.

The Justice Department made the requests Tuesday in prominent cases including its bid to block the merger of US Airways and AMR in Washington and others including an antitrust suit in San Francisco pressing Bazaar-voice to sell assets. Federal attorneys are seeking delays in cases including the Depository Trust and Clearing Corp.'s suit against the Commodity Fu-

tures Trading Commission over rules for swaps data.

The scope of delays sought by the department is laid out on its website, which says criminal litigation will continue without interruption while civil litigation will be curtailed or postponed as much as possible without significantly compromising "the safety of human life or the protection of property."

**Myanmar Muslims Hide Amid Deadly Sectarian Clashes**

**THANDWE, Myanmar** • Terrified Muslim families hid in forests in western Myanmar, Wednesday, one day after fleeing a new round of deadly sectarian violence that erupted even as the president toured the divided region.

Tuesday's unrest near the coastal town of Thandwe saw Buddhist mobs kill a 94-year-old woman and four other Muslims and burn dozens of homes. The violence, underscored the government's persistent failure to stop the sectarian violence from spreading since it first erupted last year, costing hundreds of people their lives and many thousands their homes.

Some rights groups accuse the government of tolerating, or even abetting, what they describe as ethnic cleansing directed against the Muslim Rohingya minority in Myanmar, also known as Burma.

They say President Thein Sein, visiting the region for the first time since clashes flared there last year, has done little to crack down on religious intolerance and failed to bridge a divide that has left hundreds of thousands of Muslims marginalized and segregated, many of them confined by security forces in inadequately equipped camps for those who fled their homes.

**Davis Takes National Stage with Gubernatorial Bid**


**AUSTIN** • When Wendy Davis walks into the coliseum where she received her high school diploma on Thursday to announce a bid to become Texas governor, she will also walk onto a national stage from which she'll call on Democrats from across the country to help finance her long-shot bid.

Davis staged a nearly 13-hour filibuster in June to stop a law imposing strict new restrictions on how, where and when a woman can obtain an abortion. The live stream of her standing next to her desk and speaking — and the roaring crowd that disrupted the Senate debate for the last 15 minutes of the special legislative session — made her a political celebrity. In the following weeks, Democratic fundraisers feted her at parties in Washington, New York and San Francisco.

No Democrat has won statewide office in Texas since 1994, but supporters say the single teenage mother turned successful Harvard-trained lawyer has the charisma and progressive politics to break

**\$1M Bail for Suspect in Fla. Airport Bomb Threat**

**JACKSONVILLE** • A judge set bail at \$1 million Wednesday for a man accused of telling security screeners at the Jacksonville International Airport he had a bomb in his backpack, prompting the evacuation of the airport. Authorities did not find any explosives.

Zeljko Causevic, 39, remained silent during his brief hearing before Duval County Court Judge Russell Healey on charges of making a false report about planting a bomb and possessing a hoax bomb.

According to a Jacksonville Sheriff's Office arrest report, Causevic, a U.S. citizen who is originally from Bosnia, approached a Transportation Security Administration agent Tuesday, saying he had a device in his camouflage backpack that was "supposed to be a bomb, but it's not." Inside the backpack, officials found a small luggage scale with two batteries and a microchip. He told authorities he had a "detonator," which was a remote control device, and his bag also contained a cellphone.

The Joint Terrorism Task Force interviewed Causevic and he was arrested.

The threat shut down the airport for about five hours Tuesday night, delaying out-bound flights and stranding

passengers on planes on the tarmac.

**Health Care Exchange in Wash. Has More Problems**

**SEATTLE** • Washington state's new health insurance exchange experienced more problems on Wednesday, its second day of operation.

The website wahealthplanfinder.org offers visitors a friendly, bright green welcome page, but the internal workings were plagued by glitches.

Still, some people were able to sign up for health insurance as part of the nation's new health care law, according to officials with the Washington Health Benefit Exchange.

Others encountered slow loading times and trouble

completing online applications.

More than 170,000 people visited the site on Tuesday and more than 6,000 accounts have been created. Data on how many people have signed up for insurance won't be available until Friday.

A call to a help line reached a friendly operator telling people the site was experiencing difficulties and to try back in an hour or so.

Richard Onizuka, CEO for the Washington Health Benefit Exchange, thanked people for their patience.

"While we have experienced some expected bumps in the road, the corrections made last night and continued enhancements to the site over time will ensure a smooth application process for those seeking and enrolling in health coverage," he wrote in a statement. —AP

# New Recycling Plant Rolls in Pink 18-Wheeler for Breast Cancer Awareness

**TWIN FALLS** • She is a “Survivor” on the inside and a hot pink, 40-ton, 18-wheel semi truck on the outside.

When United Metal Recycling set its sights on Twin Falls for a sixth location, owner Rod Ekart wanted to send a message that he cares about the community, said plant manager Bret Buxton. “Cancer affects us all,” Buxton said. “We all end up knowing someone with cancer down the line, and Rod is just one of those guys who picks out a charity to focus on.”

The pink truck travels the state, raising awareness about breast cancer and gathering donations from businesses, Ekart said. All proceeds are donated to St. Luke’s hospitals in Idaho. Ekart is humble about his pink machine and hesitates to elaborate on his charitable efforts, but he said

he chose to focus on breast cancer awareness because Idaho performs the fewest mammograms of any state.

“I wanted to build something I could show and do some advertising for my business associates and customers ... Nobody gets paid, and all the money goes to the hospital.”

When the pink truck rolls into Twin Falls for the plant’s grand opening Friday, visitors can admire its hot pink exterior and commemorate its uniquely decorated interior.

The inside resembles an electronic dance party bus but has a sobering message.

On one side are signatures of breast cancer survivors, penned during the truck’s many appearances around the state. On the other side is a reflection of a growing economy, Buxton said. The company’s stronghold has been in the Boise/Nampa area since

“Survivor” is stenciled in a cursive Cutout font between neon lights where passersby

are frequently seen taking pictures with their phones.

“When you see a pink truck and trailer, you’re going to notice it,” Buxton said. “Then you figure out what it is all about, and it’s pretty neat.”

The regional recycling chain’s move to Twin Falls is a reflection of a growing economy, Buxton said. The company’s stronghold has been in the Boise/Nampa area since

the 1970s, but things are changing. The Magic Valley was the next logical area for expansion, he said.

“We set up in Twin Falls for opportunity,” he said. “Our goal is to spread our wings a little bit and start giving ourselves the opportunity to buy materials in this area. Retailers, manufacturers and local businesses are going to generate scrap in Twin Falls, and

that gives us the ability to get processing out. It’s probably a maturation of not only the city, but our business as well.”

Acknowledging other recycling plants in the area, Buxton said he realizes the move will be competitive. Cleanliness is part of what will set them apart, he said.

“Scrap yards kind of have this reputation as being a dirty junk yard, and you pull in and

you might get a flat tire and you got all these piles of junk basically sitting around,” he said. “People kind of have that picture in their head, and we’re trying to change that. We make it a clean facility where people aren’t afraid to drive.”

The grand opening will be at noon Friday with barbecued Falls Brand meats and plenty of pink to go around.

## BEST-SELLING NOVELIST TOM CLANCY DIES

**NEW YORK (AP)** • In 1985, a year after the Cold War thriller "The Hunt for Red October" came out, author Tom Clancy was invited to lunch at the Reagan White House, where he was questioned by Navy Secretary John Lehman.

Who, the secretary wanted to know, gave Clancy access to all that secret material?

Clancy, the best-selling novelist who died Tuesday in Baltimore at 66, insisted then, and after, that his information was strictly unclassified: books, interviews and papers that were easily obtained. Also, two submarine officers reviewed the final manuscript.

In an interview with *The New York Times* in 1987, he explained that unclassified information can lead to insights about state secrets.

"One of the reasons we are so successful is that we have a free society with open access to information," he said. "If you change that, if you try to close off the channels of information, we'll end up just like the Russians, and their society does not work."

Government officials may have worried how Clancy knew that a Russian submarine spent only about 15 percent of its time at sea or how many SS-N-20 Seahawk missiles it carried. But his extreme attention to technical detail and accuracy earned him respect inside the intelligence community and beyond and helped make Clancy the most widely read and influential military novelist of his time, one who seemed to capture a shift in the country's mood away from the CIA misdeeds that were exposed in the 1970s to the heroic feats of Clancy's most famous creation, CIA analyst Jack Ryan.

"Thrillers, like all art, are always a reflection of the culture," said fellow author Brad Meltzer. "No one captured that Cold War fear — and that uniquely American perspective — like Clancy. Jack Ryan wasn't just a character. He was us. He was every American in those days when we were a push-of-the-button

away from nuclear war"

Fans couldn't turn the pages fast enough and a number of his high-tech, geopolitical thrillers, including "The Hunt for Red October," "Patriot Games" and "Clear and Present Danger," were made into blockbuster movies, with another, "Jack Ryan," set for release on Christmas.

"Fundamentally, I think of myself as a storyteller, not a writer," Clancy once said. "I think about the characters I've created, and then I sit down and start typing and see what they will do. There's a lot of subconscious thought that goes on. It amazes me to find out, a few chapters later, why I put someone in a certain place when I did. It's spooky."

A tall, trim figure given to wearing sunglasses that made him look like a fighter pilot, Clancy had such a sure grasp of defense technology and spy craft that many readers were convinced he served in the military. But his experience was limited to college ROTC classes. Myopia kept him out of active duty.

He was a political conservative who backed the Vietnam War as a college student and once referred to Ronald Reagan as "my president." Clancy broke through commercially during a tense period of the Cold War, and with the help of Reagan himself.

In 1982, he began working on "The Hunt for Red October," drawing inspiration from a real-life 1975 mutiny aboard a Soviet missile frigate. Someone thought enough of the novel to give it to Reagan as a Christmas gift. The president quipped at a dinner that he was losing sleep because he couldn't put the book down — a statement Clancy later said helped put him on the *New York Times* best-seller list.

"What happened to me was pure dumb luck. I'm not the new Hemingway," Clancy later said in an interview. "Of course, fortune does favor the brave. In battle, you forgive a man anything except an unwillingness to take risks."

## Lee Thornton, Pioneering Television Journalist, Dies

Lee Thornton, who in 1977 became the first black woman to cover the White House regularly for CBS and later taught journalism and was an administrator at the University of Maryland, died Sept. 25 at her home in Bethesda, Md. She was 71.

The cause was pancreatic cancer, said her sister, Marilyn Thornton.

Thornton, whose degree was in radio, television and film studies, began her career in academia before entering broadcast journalism in the early 1970s. She joined CBS News in 1974 and, from 1977 to 1981, covered the Carter White House.

In "Women of the Washington Press," a book by journalism scholar Maurine H. Beasley, Thornton described herself as "fourth in line" among the White House correspondents and was often assigned stories about the first lady.

In the newsroom hierarchy of the era, she said her reporting was often relegated to the weekend news report. Nevertheless, it was a demanding job that required

"physical health and stamina to meet unbelievable demands," she told Beasley, "such as working six nights a week for six months with two overnights (midnight to 8 a.m.) each week."

Thornton worked for the CBS affiliate in Detroit before joining National Public Radio's "All Things Considered" program in 1982 as a weekend host. Two years later, she became a Washington-based reporter, producer and news anchor for the American Business Network, a cable news network run by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce.

She began teaching journalism at Howard University in the 1980s and took a sabbatical in the early 1990s to produce public affairs shows at CNN, including "Both Sides With Jesse Jackson."

In 1997, she joined the University of Maryland's journalism school to teach broadcast reporting. She created, wrote, produced and hosted "Front and Center," a show that aired on the school's cable station, UMTV.

She was interim dean of the journalism school in 2008-09 and later served as interim associate provost for equity and diversity at the university.



Moore's mom wiped water off her shirt and felt a lump. She battled breast cancer for 18 months before leaving her daughter as a sophomore in high school, her son as a senior.

"She stuck it out for as long as she could," Moore said. "I struggle each day. One day I will be fun, happy, and the next day something will trigger it, even a smell, or like her perfume or something she would wear, or even if someone looks like her, that really gets me."

Moore's affirmations from watching her mother: "To live every day like it is your last, be a fighter, be courageous, be the best you can be because people will watch you some day and your actions will reflect you. Be true to yourself and your family!"

Part of Moore's inexorable reality, just like all those directly affected by breast cancer, is that she is both the personification and carrier of an urgent message, every day, everywhere she goes.

"She had no symptoms," Moore said. "It can happen to anyone, so everyone should be aware and get tested!"

From the school across the bridge but of the same team

fighting cancer, Twin Falls sophomore Hailey Wright's grandmother, Lois Fitzloft, is a survivor. She made a quilt for the Bruins and was surprised with a gift in return — a pink volleyball signed by all the Bruins players.

"I just love it," Fitzloft said. Surprise is part of the gift of life Fitzloft cherishes so much.

"They need to have more of these events," Fitzloft said. "You stop and look like at your life and think, 'boy, I'm lucky to be here. I could not be! I look at my granddaughter and the achievements that she has made and my kids have made and I don't know what I'd do if I could have lost that and not seen it!"

Fitzloft lost her mother, aunt, and two sisters to breast cancer.

"If you are afraid to have a mammogram, don't be," Fitzloft said. "It hurts, but c'mon. The little bit of pain you go through is well worth it. Don't skip mammograms."

Starley had a mentor on the Dig Pink senior project — O'Leary drama teacher Kelly Ramirez, who recalled being diagnosed with breast cancer in 2005.

The odds were long she'd make it to 2010, doctors said.

"The first thing I thought was I was tough, I can handle this ... and then about a week

after that I lost it," Ramirez said. "That is when I did the 'what if, would I be able to see my girls grow up?' You ask yourself those kinds of questions, and that is when it hit me super hard."

But Ramirez was even stronger than she imagined, returning to O'Leary after the summer break to teach every day the next year.

She not only beat cancer, she turned it on its head while giving it the boot.

"When you are diagnosed with such a life-changing thing, people get wrapped up in the disease and treating the disease and 'oh, poor you, poor you,' but the thing that stuck with me was don't forget to laugh, humor is a big part of it," Ramirez said.

Ramirez said she was first concerned about making the best of her fight with breast cancer for her kids and family, and then herself.

They killed it with smiles.

"When I got to big obstacles, I would try to find something that would make us laugh. I would take that experience and turn it into something fun," Ramirez said. "When my hair started falling out, instead of being sad that my hair was falling out, my daughters shaved my head in to a Mohawk. We had a head shaving party, and my stu-

dents designed creative masquerades and painted my bald head with stage makeup."

Ramirez, who is now in her eighth year of survival and says all signs are currently positive, recently discovered through genetic testing that she has a gene mutation which predisposed her to breast cancer. She was able to warn her sister, who persisted with doctors to take extra tests and was eventually diagnosed with the disease before it was too late.

All five of Ramirez's grandmother's sisters died of breast cancer. She speaks openly about her and their disease with her students.

"I tell them the truth even when it is unpleasant," Ramirez said.

One of Ramirez' favorite phrases on Tuesday was 'knowledge is power,' and she can testify. She teaches more than drama.

One of her seventh-grade students recently asked her what chemotherapy feels like.

"I thought she was just doing a report and I said, 'I will be happy to sit down and talk with you,'" Ramirez said. "I asked if it was for a report and she said, 'No, I start chemotherapy next week!'"

Ramirez gave her student the advice she got from her surgeon: "You can't swallow a whale in one bite!"

That student is winning. "She is doing great," Ramirez said.

Inspiration giving life to knowledge, Ramirez is doing the part of many.

But she can only hope her story and stories like hers aren't quickly forgotten, which is perhaps why she's taken a fighting strategy and turned it into philosophy.

Tuesday night was about breast cancer awareness — prevention and early detection — and raising funds for research in aims to find a cure.

Currently the odds dictate some in Bruins gymnasium Tuesday night will be diagnosed with the disease. In such case, the stories offered by the 11 survivors, Moore included, weren't just a rallying call for donations, but perhaps insights into the very meaning of life itself, and through it a way to minimize the damage the disease seeks to inflict.

With her cancer in remission, Ramirez maintains the life approach she developed from her days in chemotherapy. Day-to-day isn't just a sports cliché.

"I never miss the opportunity to try something new," Ramirez said. "I have gone zip-lining, parasailing, anything, because you only live once and you might as well have fun while you're here!"



**BILL NO. 600**

**AN ORDINANCE OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JEROME AMENDING TITLE 17 CHAPTER 18.050 OF THE JEROME MUNICIPAL CODE PROVIDING FOR CHICKEN, POULTRY AND FOWL REGULATIONS IN CERTAIN ZONES IN THE CITY OF JEROME PER THE OFFICIAL SCHEDULE OF DISTRICT REGULATIONS AND REORGANIZING THE ORDER OF SOME CHAPTER SUBHEADINGS; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.**

WHEREAS, the Jerome Municipal Code does not address regulation for the allowance of chickens, poultry and fowl within certain zones in the City of Jerome; and

WHEREAS, regulating the number and care of chickens, poultry and fowl within certain zones of the City of Jerome promotes the public health and welfare, is necessary for the quiet enjoyment of property by owners, and is conducive to residential and economic development; and

WHEREAS, reorganizing the respective subsections of Title 17 Chapter 18.050 of the Jerome Municipal Code provides for greater clarity; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing was held before the Planning and Zoning Commission pursuant to notice on the 25th day of June, 2013; IT IS THEREFORE ORDAINED by the Mayor and the City Council of Jerome, Idaho, as follows:

**Section 1.** Certain unique land uses pose special problems that may have detrimental influences on surrounding land uses. The following performance standards for such unique land uses shall be adhered to in addition to all other provisions of this title:

**A. Accessory Building:**

1. Will not be located in any required front or street side yard area;
2. Accessory buildings less than one hundred twenty (120) square feet in area and less than seven feet (7') in height are permitted in any rear or interior side yard area meeting the required setback of three feet (3') from rear and side property lines and does not require a building permit.
3. Accessory buildings one hundred twenty (120) square feet in area or larger shall comply with the minimum setbacks of three feet (3') from property lines and shall be limited to a maximum height of twenty five feet (25') or no higher than the primary structure, whichever is less and shall require a building permit. All accessory buildings shall utilize siding materials that are similar in type (vinyl, wood, etc.), color, hue, tone as the primary, existing structure.
4. Accessory buildings shall be constructed with building materials that are similar and harmonious with the existing structures on the property in which the building is being proposed.

**B. Animal Clinic, Animal Hospital, Veterinary Office and Kennel:**

1. Will be located at least three hundred feet (300') from any residence including motels and hotels, except for an owner's residence. The administrator may modify these requirements if the animals are completely housed in soundproof structures that completely screen them from view of the abutting residential property; and
2. Will comply with all state and local regulations relative to such an operation and maintain adequate housekeeping practices designed to prevent the creation of a nuisance and to reduce to a minimum the factors of noise and odor.

**C. Slaughterhouses or Stockyards:**

~~1. No slaughterhouse or stockyard shall be permitted, or be allowed by special use permit, within the city limits.~~

**D. C. Bulk Storage of Flammable Liquids and Gases Aboveground and For Resale:**

1. Will be located at least five hundred feet (500') from a residential zone, a residence, motel or hotel, except for an owner's residence;
2. Will be erected subject to the approval of the fire chief; and
3. Will have suitable loading and unloading spaces and off street parking facilities subject to the approval of the fire chief.

**E. D. Chemicals, Pesticide and Fertilizer Storage; and Manufacturing:** Will have adequate fire protection, storage area, handling and disposal as approved by the fire chief.

**E. Chickens, Poultry and Fowl**

1. No household or parcel of property shall keep more than six (6) chickens, poultry or fowl.

2. Roosters are prohibited.

3. The chickens, poultry or fowl shall be contained to the site or the site shall be fenced.

4. Any chicken coop or accessory structure associated with the chickens, poultry or fowl shall be placed in accordance with the accessory structure setback requirements.

5. Chickens, poultry or fowl shall not be kept in the front yard.

6. Special use permits shall be allowed for up to two (2) years and renewed on a biennial basis.

**F. Contractor's Yard:**

1. Will be located a minimum distance of three hundred feet (300') from any residence, except for an owner's residence;
2. Will have screening fence around areas utilized for storage of equipment; and
3. Will be limited to storage, maintenance and processing incidental to contracting work. There shall be no general industrial or commercial uses.

**G. Drive-In Restaurant:**

1. Will be enclosed on the property line with landscaping and fencing, except for ingress and egress, to prevent trash from moving onto other properties;
2. Will have at least a six foot (6') high sight obscuring fence along the property lines that adjoin a residence;
3. Will provide for adequate trash receptacles; and
4. Will avoid the direction of night lighting toward any residence.

**H. Home Occupation:**

1. No more than one person other than members of the family residing on the premises shall be engaged in such occupation;
2. The use of the dwelling unit for the home occupation shall be clearly incidental and subordinate to its use for residential purposes by its occupants, and not more than four hundred (400) square feet of the floor area of the dwelling unit shall be used in the conduct of the home occupation;
3. There shall be no change in the outside appearance of the building or premises, or other visible evidence of the conduct of such home occupation;
4. No significant traffic shall be generated by such home occupation and any need for parking generated by the conduct of such home occupation shall meet the off street parking requirements as specified in section 17.26.050 of this title, and shall not be located in a required front yard;
5. No equipment or process shall be used in such home occupation which creates noise, vibration, glare, fumes, odors, or electrical interference detectable or objectionable to the normal senses off the lot, if the occupation is conducted in a single-family residence, or outside the dwelling unit if conducted in other than a single-family residence. In the case of electrical interference, no equipment or process shall be used which creates visual or audible interference in any radio or television receivers off the premises or cause fluctuations in line voltage off the premises;
6. No storage of materials or supplies outdoors; and
7. Home occupation shall not involve the use of signs and/or structures other than those permitted in the district of which it is a part.

**I. Horses, Cattle And Sheep:**

~~1. Horses, cattle and sheep quartered within the city limits prior to May 5, 1983, may remain without the necessity of a special use permit being issued. If the real property upon which the animals are located is sold, or leased, should the number of horses, cattle or sheep be increased, or should no such animals at all be on the real property for a period of at least one year, then a special use permit shall be required before any such animals may be quartered on the real property. Nothing contained in this subsection shall be construed to allow by implication the quartering of any other livestock within the city limits, by special use permit, by right, or by any other means.~~

**J. Manufactured Home Park:**

1. Will be designed, constructed, operated and maintained so as to be harmonious and appropriate in appearance with the existing or intended character of the general vicinity and that such use will not change the essential character of the same area;
2. All manufactured home parks will be required to install curb, gutter and sidewalks on the exterior of the development and the interior lots of the development; streets and walkways designed for the general use of the mobile home park residents shall be lighted during all hours of darkness. Such lighting shall not be under the control of the manufactured home occupant. Each manufactured home site shall be marked for identification by number. Such marker shall be with three inch (3") or larger numbers and must be easily readable from the park street serving the lot.
3. Will not be hazardous or detrimental to existing or future neighboring uses;
4. Will be served adequately by essential public facilities and services such as highways, streets, police and fire protection, drainage, refuse disposal and schools; or that the persons or agencies responsible for the establishment of the proposed park shall be able to provide adequately any such service;
5. Will be consistent with the intent and purpose of this title;
6. Will have vehicular approaches to the property which shall be so designed as not to create an interference with traffic on surrounding public streets or roads;
7. Will not result in the destruction, loss or damage of natural, scenic or historic features of major importance;
8. Will meet the minimum health standards as set forth by the Idaho state department of health and welfare; and
9. Will have a minimum total area for the manufactured home park of five (5) acres. A manufactured home shall not be located closer than fifteen feet (15') from any other manufactured home or permanent building within the manufactured home park. A manufactured home accessory building shall not be closer than five feet (5') from a mobile home or building on an adjacent site.

**J. Outdoor Storage of Commercial and Industrial Materials:**

1. Will be screened from view from any existing, adjoining residence or residentially zoned area, whether or not such property is separated by an alleyway or street; and
2. Will not be located in any front yard setback area.

**L. K. Riding Stables and Schools:**

1. All stables or loafing sheds will be located not nearer than three hundred feet (300') from any residence, except for an owner's residence. All facilities shall be set back a distance of thirty feet (30') from any property line;
2. Will be designed and located with full consideration being given to their proximity to adjacent uses and their effect upon adjacent and surrounding properties, as to the storage of horse trailers, and the factors of noise and odor; and
3. Will require that the owner or operator of such use shall have a continuous obligation to maintain adequate sanitary practices and to prevent the creation of a nuisance.

**L. Slaughterhouses Or Stockyards:**

1. No slaughterhouse or stockyard shall be permitted, or be allowed by special use permit, within the city limits.

**M. Wrecking Yard:**

1. Will be completely enclosed by a solid six foot (6') high or higher site obscuring fence;
2. Will not result in the storage of automobile, junk or salvage material that is visible from any public right of way;
3. Will not result in the storage of automobiles that exceed the height of the fence; and
4. Will have such landscaping that is appropriate with the surrounding area.

**Section 2.** This ordinance shall become effective upon its passage and publication as required by law.



**THE ACES ON BRIDGE®** Bobby Wolff

Declaring four hearts, South can count eight top tricks, and hopes that the other two will come from ruffing two spades in dummy. But if West has the diamond ace, South might score the diamond king and need only one ruff in dummy.

It looks like normal technique for declarer to duck the first club, then take the club jack with the ace and lead the diamond 10 to the jack, king and ace. East now has a choice of defenses. If he plays a club, then West will win the trick and exit with a top spade. Now if declarer wins and tries to ruff a spade in dummy without drawing any trump, East will be able to overruff dummy and the contract goes down a trick.

But it costs South nothing to play the heart ace and king before ruffing a spade. As the cards lie, this means that East has no trumps left to overruff dummy, so declarer ruffs a diamond back to hand before ruffing his last spade on the table. He makes two spades, two spade ruffs, five trumps and the club ace.

Declarer can (and probably should) play precisely one round of trumps at trick three before leading a diamond to the king. But it is also worth noting that if declarer erroneously draws two rounds of trumps before playing on diamonds, then West can win the third club and play a third trump, killing the second ruff in dummy.

**ANSWER:** Your decision as to how much to bid should be influenced by the vulnerability. Vulnerable, you could content yourself with a simple overcall, since it makes little sense to expose yourself to a big penalty by playing weak jump overcalls facing a passed partner. When nonvulnerable, you might pre-empt all the way to three diamonds to make the opponents' lives that much harder.
