Annual Main St. Parade Bolsters Damaged Sun Valley Economy

KETCHUM • Poor Congress. With public opinion at an all-time low, people were even blaming them for the 1,500 sheep that were late for their annual parade on Main Street in Ketchum Sunday.

"They must be federal sheep. They're going to wait for back pay before they come through town," quipped one man as he and hundreds of other people awaited the stars of the 17th Annual Trailing of the Sheep Parade.

On their way home from summer pastures in the mountain, the sheep seemed as confused as Congress, running around in circles before rancher John Faulkner and others finally got them to go straight.

"Although they were slow, they were well-behaved," said the Rev. Ken Brannon, who stood in the

middle of Main Street, his shepherd's staff in hand blessing the sheep as they ran around him.

The temporary delay in the parade was the only hitch in a four-day festival, which enjoyed com-

fortable temperatures and fiery red and golden fall foliage despite a dusting of snow that topped Bald Mountain early Sunday morning.

Business owners had hoped the festival would bring people back to the valley after August's Beaver Creek fire, which brought business in the valley to an abrupt halt.

And it did.

Long lines of people turned out for the Love of Lamb tastings on Friday night — Cristina Cook estimated Cristina's Restaurant served more than 1,000 people that night.

Festival Director Mary Austin Crofts estimated the Sheep Folklife Fair on Saturday drew its largest crowd ever. And other events, including a sheep rancher's talk featuring Castleford sheep rancher Michael Garroguerricaechevarria and

Will Luna Run for Re-election?

Prospective challengers may be waiting for announcement.

BOISE • Less than 13 months before Election Day, the race for state schools superintendent seems frozen in time.

Republican incumbent Tom Luna is sending public signals that he plans to seek a third term. But Luna has made no formal announcement, and his campaign fundraising has been sluggish.

Meanwhile, no other candidate has come forward — either on the Republican or Democratic ticket — perhaps because other prospective candidates are waiting for Luna to make the first move.

Luna is in no hurry to make that first move.

"If I had to make the decision today, there is no doubt in my mind I would run again," Luna told Idaho Education News last week. "But it's still early."

Interpreting the Signs

This isn't the first time Luna has indicated his 2014 intentions.

In April, Luna said he would be more likely to run if Gov. Butch Otter also seeks a third term; Otter hasn't formally announced his plans, but recently hired business lobbyist Jayson Ronk to manage his campaign. In late July, Luna said he would like to run again.

The fundraising signals, however, are mixed.

In the first six months of 2013, and in the aftermath of the repeal of his Students Come First education laws, Luna raised only \$4,750. By comparison, Otter raised \$215,368.95 for a prospective third term, although that sum includes a \$131,000 writeoff of personal campaign loans, and Lt. Gov. Brad Little raised \$38,818.16.

But Luna's \$4,750 in contributions suggest that he still has support in key GOP circles; some of these contributions came from Little and five members of GOP legislative leadership, including House Speaker Scott Bedke and Senate President Pro Tem Brent Hill. And Luna actually raised

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Spending Stumbling Block to Deal on Federal Budget

WASHINGTON (AP) • Senate Republicans and Democrats hit an impasse Sunday over spending in their last-ditch struggle to avoid an economy-jarring default in just four days and end a partial government shutdown that's entering its third week.

After inconclusive talks between President Barack Obama and House Republicans, Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., and Minority Leader Mitch McConnell, R-Ky., took charge in

trying to end the crises, although a conversation Sunday afternoon failed to break the stalemate.

"I'm optimistic about the prospects for a positive conclusion to the issues before this country today," Reid said as the

Senate wrapped up a rare Sunday session.

The two cagy negotiators are at loggerheads over Democratic demands to undo or change the automatic, across-the-board spending

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30-year Search Unites Utah Woman with Family in Nevada

FALLON, Nev. (AP) • A Utah woman has published a book about a three-decade search for her family roots that culminated in Nevada this week with a meeting with a half-brother and half-sister she never knew she had.

Perline Porter of Ogden said she had always wondered who her biological father was because she had a baby book “with a different guy’s name on it.”

Throughout her childhood, Porter said her mother had denied she had another dad but finally fessed up when she was 17 years old.

“That’s when I started searching, way back then,” said Porter, whose book is titled “My DNA Search for My Roots.”

“When you don’t know who your other half is, you’re just missing something,” she told KTVN-TV in Reno.

In recent years she joined websites specializing in DNA information, which led her to Dr. Kathryn Johnston, a genetic genealogist who helped her with the search.

“They were able to work their way to a first cousin, and then a half-sibling,” Johnston said. “That’s how they were actually able to identify a half-brother.”

It wasn’t easy given his common name, John Collins Jr., and the fact he lives in the sprawling San Diego area.

“After calling, like, 50 numbers, getting discouraged, I’m just like, ‘oh, this is not going to work,’” Porter said.

But eventually she found herself on the phone with him and ultimately he agreed to take a DNA test.

“She started asking me a bunch of questions,” Collins recalled. “I’m like, ‘yeah... okay... uh huh... Who are you?’”

He took the DNA test in March, which came back positive, and when they met for the first time, both could tell they were related.

Collins traveled to Utah this week to pick up Porter to meet his sister, Carey Collins, in Fallon, about 60 miles east of Reno.

“When the DNA results came back positive, I was elated,” Carey Collins said. “I’ve been so excited for this, I can’t believe it.

“I’m so happy I have a sister because I was raised with my cousin. But she wasn’t my sister, you know what I mean?” she added.

The three sat down and shared family photos while John and Carey Collins filled Porter in on their family history.

“I was telling stories, and they would look at each other and go, ‘Wow, that’s something dad would say or do,’” Porter said.

Their father passed away a number of years ago, but both John and Carey Collins agreed he was the type of man who would have wanted to be included in Porter’s life if he had known.

“I don’t think he knew at all because he wasn’t that kind of person where he would’ve abandoned a child, or not help raise it if he would’ve known,” John Collins said.

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An Artist, Friend and Employee Who was ‘Always Smiling’

TWIN FALLS • When Peggy McBride wasn’t at work, chances are she’d have a paintbrush in hand.

She mostly created oil paintings, from portraits to scenery. And she often gave away those paintings as gifts for holidays and weddings. But her love was tole painting and she spent years painting on wood, daughter Manon Andreason said.

After Peggy died, her family picked out a wood casket. Andreason said her father jokingly said someone should paint on it. That idea became a reality.

Peggy was a member of the Magic Valley Decorative Artists for many years. And just about everyone from the group came together to paint on the casket.

They put out a tarp on the floor at Reynolds Funeral Chapel and then got to work painting flowers.

Peggy’s family members also each painted a flower on the casket – even those who aren’t an artist.

“Everyone had an input on it, which was kind of fun,” Andreason said.

During the viewing, attendees were also encouraged to sign their name on Peggy’s casket.

As we talked last week, Andreason pulled out a few pictures of the finished casket, which is covered in blue and purple flowers. She said it was a fitting tribute to her mother’s life.

McBride, 75, died Sept. 25. Andreason described her mother’s personality as “always smiling and happy.” Peggy also helped others frequently and often took meals to those in need, she said.

Peggy was a friend to many.

“I don’t know if she had an enemy, to be honest,” Andreason said.

Peggy served many callings in The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, where she was an influential voice, Andreason said.

As a child, Peggy’s family moved from Nebraska to Twin Falls. They lived in a house near the Amalgamated Sugar Co. factory, where her father worked.

Peggy worked at Arctic Circle, which was a good turn-around place for teenagers who spent hours cruising in cars with their friends along Main Street.

She also worked at Amalgamated Sugar Co. for a few years.

Then, she started a 36-year career at Jensen Jewelers, beginning as a jewelry duster and working her way up to becoming purchasing manager until she retired in 2001.

Andreason recalls riding her bike to Jensen Jewelers as a child to watch her mother work.

Purchasing manager was a great fit for Peggy because she loved shopping, Andreason said.

Brad Siegel, chief operations officer for Jensen Jewelers, met Peggy in 1978 when

they were both working on the sales floor.

When Peggy started working in the buying offices, her office was next to Brad’s until she retired.

When they traveled to do inventory, Peggy often wouldn’t use her lunch break and would go shopping with a friend instead.

Siegel said he used to joke that they were power shoppers. And sometimes, they had to ship purchases back home because there wasn’t enough room in the car.

Siegel described Peggy as outgoing, friendly and someone who had an enormous amount of patience.

“She was just one of those folks who just always, always had a smile and a friendly demeanor,” he said.

Outside of work, Peggy was active with the Belle Lettres Guild and Magic Valley Decorative Artists.

When Peggy went to a weeklong painting convention in Las Vegas, she’d fill up each day with classes from morning to night.

She’d paint all day for the whole week and then took special classes on the weekend, said Patty Lincoln, whose husband is Peggy’s nephew.

Peggy also loved reading and was a member of a literary club.

Andreason said if her mother was engaged with what she was reading, she’d stay up most of the night to finish.

Another one of Peggy’s interests was candy. She stashed sugary treats in drawers around the house and put Snickers in the freezer.

“You could find candy everywhere in the house,” Andreason said.

And Peggy loved camping. She and her husband, Ray, had just recently gone on a six-week camping trip along

the Pacific coast.

Andreason recalls her parents packing up on Friday nights to take the family off on a weekend or weeklong camping trip.

Once Peggy retired, she didn’t slow down.

“She did, up to the end, what she loved doing,” Andreason said.

Muir was ejected from the motorcycle and died at the scene.

New Tactics Emerge in Battle over Bears

LAKE TAHOE, Calif. (AP) • It's not your average bear battle.

After years of trying to keep the region's black bears from being captured and possibly killed, animal rights activists in Lake Tahoe are using increasingly aggressive strategies to keep California and Nevada game wardens from trapping bears that break into homes, businesses and campsites in search of food.

Members of the Bear League, a grass-roots group that tries to educate people not to fear the animals and to

keep better tabs on their trash, have started keeping vigils by traps and booing the game wardens who set and check on them, *The Sacramento Bee* reported.

"They are just gorgeous creatures, and they are so misunderstood," said Carolyn Stark, a Bear League board member. She helped maintain a round-the-clock vigil at a trap recently set at an Incline Village home where a female bear had twice broken into the garage. "It's so unfair. I want to help protect them."

Other activists have coated the devices with Pine-Sol to deter bears and even used teddy bears as decoys, the newspaper said. And a Facebook page called the Lake Tahoe Wall of Shame prints the addresses of places that have been careless with garbage bins or where traps are rumored to be imminent.

Residents and business owners who have called wildlife officials to report bears on their property also have been caught in the crosshairs with anonymous threats and online slurs, The

Bee said.

John Brissenden, manager of Sorensen's Resort, said employees were threatened after two bears were killed there last year.

"We were branded as murderers and executioners," Brissenden said. "It was alarming, discouraging, given our 40 years of protecting wildlife habitat, including bear habitat."

Bear League Executive Director Ann Bryant says her group only intervenes legally and does not endorse threats or trap-tampering.

even less money, a scant \$3,500, in the first half of 2009, in the runup to his first re-election bid.

Luna ended the first half of 2013 with a \$24,500 campaign debt, but that's not an unfamiliar spot. That's exactly where he stood, to the dollar, in midyear 2009.

The Parties' Waiting Game

There is "a lot of interest" in the superintendent's race, Idaho Democratic Party spokesman Dean Ferguson said this week.

But that interest hasn't translated into a campaign announcement, and there are several reasons for that. Ferguson is "absolutely sure" that some prospective Democratic candidates are waiting on word from Luna — because they specifically want to run against him. Meanwhile, said Ferguson, other would-be candidates have to decide whether they have the "personal bandwidth" for a statewide campaign.

For Idaho Democrats — who haven't won a statewide race since 2002, when incumbent state superintendent Marilyn Howard stood a challenge from Luna — this is a key race. It reflects their best chance for a breakthrough, said Jasper LiCalzi, a professor of political economy at the College of Idaho.

"If they can't get a quality candidate to run for this, I can't see who'll they'll get to run for anything else," he said.

At this point, said Ferguson, the Democrats aren't ready to name names. Nor

are they ready to talk about whether they've done polling on the superintendent's race.

The same goes for Republicans. Executive Director Trevor Thorpe did not respond to questions about internal polling or other potential GOP candidates.

As for Luna's plans, Thorpe said, "That's a decision for the superintendent and his family."

Delay Tactics?

Last week, as Luna proposed a 5.9 percent budget increase for K-12 in 2014-15, he hinted that he'd like to see the reaction to his proposal before discussing his political future.

But there can be a strategic advantage to holding off. It's easier for an incumbent to crank up a political apparatus quickly, LiCalzi said; meanwhile, potential opponents may be held at bay.

And if Luna decides not to run, he said, a Republican heir apparent would likely benefit from a later announcement.

Democrats have "plenty of time" to put together a campaign, Ferguson said. Whether Luna runs or not, voters will be engaged in the superintendent's election.

"You're already entering a race that has high interest," he said. "People are going to come to you."

Four years ago, Luna cranked up his re-election campaign and fundraising efforts slowly, but decisively outtraised and outpolled Democratic challenger and former Boise district superintendent Stan Olson. Incumbents generally enjoy a fundraising advantage, but this time around, Luna will have to convince potential donors that he can win.

"It's going to be harder to raise money this time," LiCalzi said.

Auction Set for Defunct Hoku Plant in Pocatello

POCATELLO (AP) • An auction for the Hoku Materials Plant is set for Oct. 23 and 24 in eastern Idaho.

The *Idaho State Journal* reported in a story on Friday that San Diego, Calif.-based Heritage Global Partners has been contracted as the seller for the auction.

The company on its website touts global interest in the \$600 million facility that can either be purchased by the piece or in its entirety.

"The Hoku Materials Plant is a complete, world-class production facility that is virtually brand new, and never saw real production of any sort," the company says on its website. "The site is approximately 67 acres and comprised of over 35,400 cubic yards of concrete, 9,488 tons of steel, 246,894 lineal feet of process and utility piping. This sale features an amazing inventory of brand new and never-used equipment, and consists of assets to suit a host of industries."

Hoku, which filed for bankruptcy protection in July, began building what was supposed to be a \$370 million plant in 2007 to make polysilicon material destined to be used in solar panels. But the plant never opened.

U.S. Bankruptcy Judge Jim Pappas last week issued the order approving the sale.

The auction is being handled online, but prospective buyers can tour the plant from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Oct. 21 and 22.

On another front involving the defunct plant, North Carolina company is making additional steps to get TIANWEI New Energy Holdings, a Chinese company that is the majority holder in Hoku, to pay off debts related to construction of the Pocatello facility.

Industrial Piping Inc. filed a trade complaint with the U.S. Trade Representative asking the agency to look into the millions of dollars owed by TIANWEI to U.S. companies.

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Two More LDS Missionaries Die in Accidents, 12th in Year

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) • A pair of Mormon missionaries died last week — bringing the total number of deaths of proselyting members of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints to 12 this year.

Last week's deaths came on consecutive days, one in Mexico and the other in California.

On Wednesday, Daniel Kunz, 20 of Victor, Idaho, was electrocuted while on mission on the gulf coast of Mexico in the city of Tampico. Kunz arrived just a month ago to begin his two-year mission. Kunz was walking back inside a building along a second-story ledge when he brushed against a live wire and fell to his death, his brother, Burke Kunz, told the Deseret News.

He is the second missionary to die from electrocution in Latin America this year.

On Thursday, Andrew Edward Page, 18, from Charlotte, N.C., died when he was struck by a car while on his bike in California. He started his mission in Arcadia, Calif., in August. Page is the third missionary to be fatally struck by car while riding a bicycle.

“Every Church member

is deeply saddened and grieves at the death of a missionary,” said church spokesman Eric Hawkins in a statement.

There are usually only a few deaths of missionaries each year, but Hawkins said there have been two recent years similar to this one: in 2003 there were nine missionary deaths and in 2008 there were eight.

Including Kunz and Page, eight of this year's missionary deaths have been accidents. Four others have died from illnesses, such as an aneurysm, heart attack and tuberculosis meningitis. The only missionary death that wasn't an accident or from health problems was Jose Daniel Encarnacion Montero, 20, of the Dominican Republic, who was struck by stray bullet in August while on mission in Colombia.

Eleven have been men, and one was a woman. Six have occurred in the United States, and six in foreign countries.

Spurred by an historic lowering of the minimum age for missionaries, the Utah-based faith has more ambassadors serving around the world than at any time in the church's history.

The 80,000 missionaries are a 32 percent increase from about 58,000 a year ago. The church expects the number to swell to 85,000 by year's end.

Last October, the church announced men could begin serving at 18, instead of 19, and women at 19, instead of 21. That's led to new, younger missionaries joining older ones already planning to go.

Church officials said they continue to do everything possible to keep missionaries safe, including training them have to stay safe in cars and on bicycles. Missionaries always work in pairs, and are given tips on which parts of their mission areas are more dangerous than others.

Burke Kunz told the *Deseret News* that his brother, Daniel Kunz, was a great sibling, uncle and son who was the youngest of 10 children. He loved sports, participating in cross-country, basketball, track and baseball, his brother said.

“He was our hero,” Burke Kunz told the *Deseret News*. “Even though he was the youngest, every one of us looked up to him and he was our example of what a Christ-like life should be.”

Ruby Cole Session, Criminal Justice Reformer, Dies at 77

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) • Ruby Cole Session, who championed the cause of the wrongfully convicted in Texas after her son was sent to prison for a rape he didn't commit, has died. She was 77.

Session died of an aneurysm Thursday at home in Fort Worth, another of her sons, Cory Session, said Saturday. He said Gov. Rick Perry reached out to offer his condolences, describing his mother as a “genuine” and “spirited” woman.

Session lobbied Perry to sign the Tim Cole Act in 2009, which provides compensation for wrongfully

convicted inmates to help rebuild their lives after they are freed.

Tim Cole was Session's eldest son and a U.S. Army veteran studying at Texas Tech University when he was convicted of raping a fellow student in 1985. He died in prison from asthma complications in 1999, when he was 39 years old. Throughout his ordeal, he maintained his innocence, even though he could have gotten parole had he confessed.

Cory Session said his mother was a “tireless” advocate for his half-brother and over the years met regularly with lawmakers and

others to get Cole freed. Nine years after Cole's death, DNA testing cleared him in the rape and implicated a convicted rapist, Jerry Wayne Johnson, who had confessed to the attack in several letters to court officials that date back to 1995, four years before Cole died.

The DNA results prompted Perry to pardon Cole posthumously in 2010.

“Only the love of a mother has that steadfastness and tenacity to never give up,” said Session, policy director for the Lubbock-based Innocence Project of Texas, which campaigned for Cole's release.

Pulitzer-winning Novelist Hijuelos Dies

NEW YORK (AP) • Oscar Hijuelos, a Cuban-American novelist who won a Pulitzer Prize for his 1989 novel “The Mambo Kings Play Songs of Love” and whose work often captured the loss and triumphs of the Cuban immigrant experience, has died. He was 62.

Hijuelos died of a heart attack in Manhattan on Saturday while playing tennis, according to his agent, Jennifer Lyons.

“The Mambo Kings Play Songs of Love” became a best seller and earned him international acclaim. He won the Pulitzer for fiction in 1990, making him the first Hispanic writer to receive that honor.

The novel tells the story of two Cuban brothers who journey from Havana to New York to start an orchestra. At one point in the story, the brothers appear on the television sitcom “I Love Lucy,” which starred Lucille Ball and her Cuban band-leader husband, Desi Arnaz. The book was eventually turned into a movie starring

Armand Assante and Antonio Banderas.

In his 2011 memoir, “Thoughts Without Cigarettes,” Hijuelos writes of how he struggled against being labeled an “ethnic” writer and notes that even today there are few other Latinos whose work, despite the considerable number of talented authors, has been awarded the same recognition.

After a trip with his mother to Cuba as a young child, he became ill with a kidney disease and was hospitalized for a year, during which he loses his Spanish-speaking ability, and never truly recovers it.

“For the longest time, all I would know was that I had gotten sick in Cuba, from Cuban microbes, that the illness had blossomed in the land of my forebears, the country where I had once been loved and whose language fell as music on my ears,” Hijuelos writes. “Of course, diseases happen anywhere, and children get sick under any circumstances, but what I would hear for years afterward from

my mother was that something Cuban had nearly killed me and, in the process of my healing, would turn my own ‘Cubanness’ into air.”

It was an experience of displacement and a never-ending inability to reach an identity he inherits that many Cubans of his generation can understand. It also defined much of his development as a writer, as he initially hesitated to embrace his story and that of his family as a source of inspiration for his fictional characters — too ashamed to put them on paper, believing the world was indifferent to his tale.

Hijuelos was born and raised in New York City and enrolled in local community colleges where an array of early writing teachers — Susan Sontag, Donald Barthelme, and Frederic Tuten — encouraged him to continue to pursue his craft. He was also exposed to Cuban and Latin American writers including Jose Lezama Lima, Gabriel Garcia Marquez and Carlos Fuentes, whose work inspired him.

WASHINGTON (AP) • A crowd converged on the World War II Memorial on the National Mall on Sunday, pushing past barriers to protest the memorial’s closing under the government shutdown.

Republican Sens. Ted Cruz of Texas and Mike Lee of Utah, along with former Alaska Gov. Sarah Palin, were part of the demonstrators.

Cruz and Lee are among the tea party-backed lawmakers who refused to keep the government operating unless President Barack Obama agreed to defund the nation’s health care overhaul.

“Let me ask a simple question,” Cruz told the crowd of hundreds that gathered beginning at 9 a.m. “Why is the federal government spending money to erect barricades to keep veterans out of this memorial?”

Black metal barricades have lined the front of the memorial since the government closed Oct. 1. That’s when more than 300 National Park Service workers who staff and maintain the National Mall were furloughed.

As the crowd entered the memorial plaza, they chanted “Tear down these walls” and “You work for us.” They sang “God bless America” and other songs.

“Our vets have proven that they have not been timid, so we will not be timid in calling out any who would use our military, our vets, as pawns in a political game,” Palin told the crowd.

The memorial has become a political symbol

in the bitter fight between Democrats and Republicans over who is to blame for the shutdown. Earlier rallies have focused on allowing access for World War II veterans visiting from across the country.

Sunday’s rally was more political. A protest by truckers converged with a rally by a group called the Million Vet March at the memorial. Participants cut the plastic links between metal barriers at the National Park Service site and pushed them aside.

Later, some protesters carried metal barricades that look like bicycle racks from the memorial to the White House and stacked them up outside the gates, confronting police in riot gear. Some protesters carried signs reading “Impeach Obama.”

Police moved the protesters back to set up barricades between the crowd and the White House gate. Some protesters chanted “shame on you” at the officers.

Two in Custody After 5 are Shot at Tulsa Event

TULSA, Okla. (AP) • Gunfire that erupted and left five people injured at a traditional Hmong New Year’s festival followed by the prompt arrest of two men suspected in the shooting have rattled this peaceful, tight-knit community of about 4,000 in east Tulsa, and some feared Sunday the rampage could deter other Hmong from attending upcoming cultural celebrations, including one set later this month.

“It’s really sad because a lot of people do not feel safe to go to the other New Year’s celebrations. I know there are people who don’t want to attend that anymore,” said Joua Xiong, who attended Saturday’s celebration along with hundreds of other Hmong people and heard the gunfire break out. “It’s very sad because this is the only time we really get to embrace our culture and unite as one.

“And I know a lot of other people will not come (to the Oct. 26-27 event) because of that,” she said.

Hmong are an Asian ethnic group mainly from Laos and number between 3,000 and 4,000 in Tulsa. Many

have traveled to Tulsa from across the country during recent years seeking jobs.

Two men have been taken into custody and face multiple charges in the shooting of five people at Saturday’s festival, authorities said Sunday. Authorities were holding 21-year-old Boon-mlee Lee and 19-year-old Meng Lee, both of Tulsa. Each faces five counts of shooting with intent to kill plus firearms charges.

It was not clear from jail records whether each had an attorney.

Tulsa police spokesman Capt. Steve Odom said a gun was recovered but that it will have to be tested to see if it is linked to the Saturday night shooting. Odom said the alleged shooters and the victims were all Hmong and that there was “probably a relationship” between the men charged and the victims.

The suspects were arrested shortly after the attack, which happened about 8 p.m. A police helicopter that was in the area spotted a car driving away from the scene with its headlights off and notified officers on the ground, who pulled it over.

US Rep. Gabby Giffords Attends NY Gun Show

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N.Y. (AP) • A smiling Gabrielle Giffords toured rows of tables loaded with rifles and handguns Sunday in her first visit to a gun show since surviving a 2011 shooting, and pleaded afterward for people to come together to stop gun violence.

The former Arizona congresswoman visited the New EastCoast Arms Collectors Associates arms fair with her astronaut husband, Mark Kelly and New York Attorney General Eric Schneiderman to highlight a voluntary agreement that closely monitors gun show sales in New York.

The trio mixed with a gun show crowd that was mostly welcoming — with a few hostile undertones — before calling for people to build on the cooperative effort.

“We must never stop fighting,” Giffords said at a post-tour news conference, her fist in the air. “Fight! Fight! Fight! Be bold! Be courageous!”

Giffords, a face of the national gun control effort, slowly walked hand-in-hand with Kelly through the large room where Winchester rifles, muzzle-loaders, antique knives and other weapons were on display and “Don’t Tread on Me”

flags hung from poles.

They stopped at display tables, Kelly asked dealers questions about the weapons, and Giffords shook hands and smiled when people greeted her. “Good to see you looking good!” some said. Kelly bought a book on Colt revolvers, and said later he probably would have bought a gun if he had had more time. He said both he and his wife are gun owners.

The trio was greeted by light applause when intro-

duced at the news conference, but some people booed from across the room. Many at the show said the couple made a good impression.

Dealer Joe Albano, who chatted with Kelly about his muzzle-loaders, said the couple was nice. But he also said he was against New York’s recent gun control law, which is separate from the Schneiderman initiative.

“If she can help us, fine,” Albano said. “We’re doing everything right here. We’re legal.”

Under the agreements worked out by Schneiderman, all firearms are tagged at the entrances to gun shows. Operators must provide computer stations for sellers to do national background checks.

As they are taken away through a limited number of exits, guns are checked to make sure background checks were performed. No buyers can leave a show without documentation of a proper sale.

Schneiderman, who has worked with all 35 gun show operators in New York, showed the couple how the process worked.


“It’s great to see government and licensed firearms dealers working together to solve a problem,” Kelly said.

Giffords was shot in the head while meeting with constituents in Tucson. Six people died.

Though it was mostly smiles inside, about a dozen protesters rallied outside the gun show holding signs critical of New York’s new law that expanded a ban on military-style weapons, among other things. The law was passed not long after the December school massacre at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Connecticut.

Simpson Must Lead, Not Follow

He's waffled, back-tracked and ultimately stayed in the shadows as the federal shut-down lurches in- to its third week. Now it's time for U.S. Rep. Mike Simpson to step up and lead. Idaho's senior House Republi- can is in the mid- dle of a primary battle with tea party challenger Bryan Smith. The prospect of an in- district tea party insurgency is the greatest fear of any Republican member of congress.

But Simpson is misreading the tea leaves. He as- sumes that, because many of the calls and emails his office receives are supportive of a doomed plan to defund the Affordable Care Act, he's representing his district.

Simpson has built a career as a reasonable conser- vative. But his continued support of the take-no-pris- oners plan engineered by a handful of hardline con- servatives has, in one fell swoop, eroded that image.

The nation and Idaho need a leader. House Repub- licans need to show Americans that they're com- posed of more than fire-and-brimstone, race-baiting ideologues. House Speaker John Boehner is backed into a corner by the likes of Rep. Raul Labrador and Texas Sen. Ted Cruz.

A few days after the Oct. 1 shutdown, Simpson was quoted in a tweet by a Washington reporter that the tea party strategy is doomed. His office scurried to back-peddle, issuing a statement indicating that Simpson was taken out of context. He "supports the House majority" plan. Simpson is running scared.

In the last few days, more and more centrist mem- bers of the House majority have come out blasting the absurdity of their right flank.

Simpson remains silent. Most of those moderate Republicans are opening themselves up to a tea party primary in the 2014 midterms because they have the gall to break rank with the purists.

Simpson, though, already faces the dreaded pri- mary. He's already targeted. His continued support only works to deprive Smith's campaign more am- munition.

But, if Simpson took a strong stand, he could run as a reasonable leader, not a member of a blind herd. He would further build his brand as a reasonable man, a stand attractive to the growing number of centrist Republicans and independents disgusted by the undemocratic methods engineered by a political fringe.

Simpson has already damaged his reputation. But moderate Senate Republicans, led by Maine's Susan Collins, are working on a promising plan to end this ordeal. Collins is daring the tea party.

It's time for Simpson to do the same. It's time for Simpson to take a stand and show us what leader- ship really looks like. It's a risk worth taking.

Federal Shutdown is Simpson's Moment of Truth

H ere soon: The likeli- hood of a career- defining moment of truth for Rep. Mike Simpson. What he does, or doesn't do, in coming days on the federal shutdown and prospective default will be the key to reading his many years of service in public office.

This goes singularly to Simpson because of the shut- down dynamics. If the peri- odic and regular votes, for the "continuing resolution" (on the budget) and the debt ceil- ing increase had been done in the usual fashion of obscure housekeeping, they would have been "clean" — with no special conditions for passage attached — and supported by both parties. The president and the Senate (with a super- majority including significant members of both parties) support that. The Republican majority in the House has de- termined to add conditions before approving either measure. The shutdown re- sults of no agreement on the "CR" are significant and growing; failure to raise the debt ceiling, in which the United States would welsh on



debts it already has incurred, would be damaging and could be catastrophic.

Idaho's senators, Mike Crapo and Jim Risch, have opposed the measures, but in the Senate they are part of too small a group to impose their will; bluntly, their opposition hasn't mattered. And you could say that Rep. Raul Labrador's opposition has been baked in, as an early-on Tea Party-backed House member.

Simpson is a more subtle story. Last week, the Capitol Hill newspaper Roll Call quoted Simpson: "I'd vote for a clean CR, because I don't think this is a strategy that works. I think the strategy that works is on the debt ceil- ing." That led to Simpson's placement on a list of House Republicans who would vote for such a "clean" CR if it got to the House floor — and maybe to those who would

vote for forcibly pulling it to the floor, which could be done if 17 Republicans plus all House Democrats voted in fa- vor.

Simpson quickly replied that he had no such plans: "I am going to continue to sup- port the position of our Re- publican Caucus in the ongo- ing shutdown dispute. Hav- ing said that, similar to Sena- tor Rand Paul, I could support a very, short-term, clean CR, perhaps one or two weeks, while we continue to negoti- ate on a longer-term bill that addresses priorities we be- lieve are important."

What those priorities are, is unclear to say the least. They seemed to start with repeal of the Affordable Care Act (Obamacare), then with its defunding, then with a delay, but as of Wednesday, accord- ing to one House Republican spokesman, it's off the table completely. Sundry other items, including the Keystone XL pipeline, energy regula- tion, Wall Street regulation and other topics, seem to have been placed on and taken off the table, too. At this writing, what seems to remain is a de-

sire for "negotiation" — or is it just saving face? Or is it worry about possible Tea Par- ty revenge for waffling?

While that goes on, unem- ployment increases, services go unmet, people are going hungry and the financial markets are getting extremely nervous about a possible fed- eral default.

Simpson is pivotal here. He and a handful of other House Republicans could play a cen- tral, even demanding, role in ending the crisis. Or he, and they, could follow instead of lead. But if the shutdown continues, and particularly if a default happens, and the country falls into deep trou- ble, Idahoans as well as peo- ple from far away may ask where he was, and what he did, when the moment of truth came.

Governor, Legislature Must Own Good, Bad News

O ne week after the less-than-stellar launch of Obama- care and its in- surance exchanges, we are learning that a key selling point behind the Idaho im- plementation of the health care law may not come to fruition.

We were all told in Janu- ary that the state insurance exchange would assess a 1.5 percent surcharge on insur- ance premiums. Supporters of the state exchange said Idaho ownership of the ex- change was better, in large part because Idaho could beat the federal govern- ment's proposed 3.5 percent surcharge on premiums.

But the Associated Press reported Thursday that the state insurance exchange is now reconsidering its fig- ures, saying its 1.5 percent rate may not be sustainable. According to emails ob- tained by the news agency, the exchange's finance di- rector says the rate will probably need to go up to 2.6 percent.

And, get this: exchange board members were sup-

posed to hear about the is- sue in September, but a presentation on the subject was cancelled. So was a PR campaign intended to blunt the shock of the exchange's broken promise.

Exchange executive di- rector Amy Dowd told the AP that a projection of a higher rate was too specula- tive for public consump- tion.

"The reason we weren't comfortable publishing 2.6 percent is, we have no clue what the number is going to be," Dowd told the AP. "We've done some model- ing, we've got some data, but as far as our comfort level, putting a number out today is not a wise deci- sion."

But certainly the horrible national rollout of the ex- changes will impact the Idaho state exchange's abil- ity to be self-sustaining as required by federal law. Mil-

lions of people logged on, we are told, but the federal government isn't saying how many people actually managed to sign up.

The government's metric for success is the number of Web hits. Any marketplace that uses Web hits as a measure of success would go out of business. Think of the store CEO who says, "I can't tell you how many sales we had, but we had 60,000 Web hits today."

The point is, the impact for each individual health insurance exchange is po- tentially dire. The fewer who sign up, the higher the per patient, per month costs will be. Someone has to pay the price for the exchange's big salaries.

The Idaho Legislature won't be able to stop the fee increases, either, because the Legislature walked away from any meaningful over- sight of the exchange, in- cluding what fees it charges. Fees will go up or down without approval by your elected officials.

I suspect the exchange's problems are just begin-

ning. The so-called state exchange is really a creature of the federal government. Go to the state exchange website to sign up, and you'll be redirected to the federal government's mon- strosity, the one that is no- torious now for an error message. So notorious that the Daily Show's Jon Stew- art challenged Health and Human Services Secretary Kathy Sebelius to sign up for Obamacare or download a movie from the Internet and see which happens first.

I've said it before, and I'll say it again: The lawmakers who voted for the exchange and the governor who signed it into law have to own it. They wanted to own the policy that resulted in lower insurance exchange fees than the feds.

Now, they need to own it when the fees end up being higher than projected and the sign-up process makes an IRS audit look good.

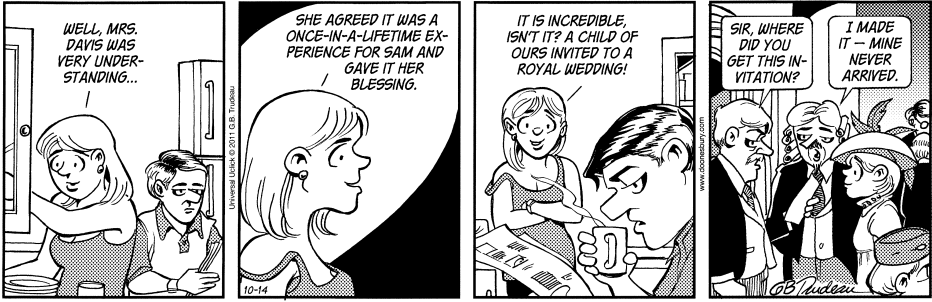
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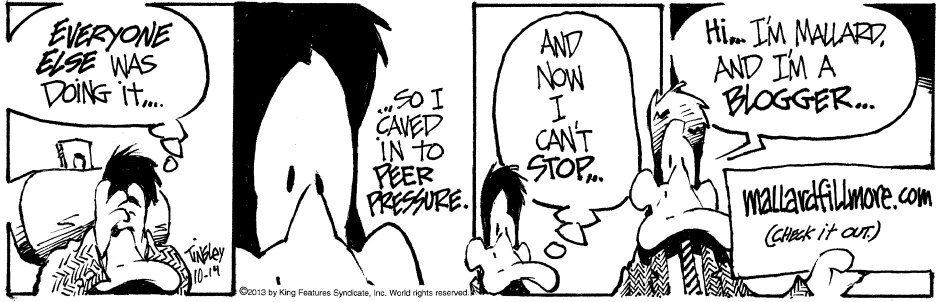

cuts to domestic and defense programs that the GOP see as crucial to reducing the nation's deficit.

McConnell insisted a solution was readily available in the proposal from a bipartisan group of 12 senators, led by Sens. Susan Collins, R-Maine, and Joe Manchin, D-W.Va., that would re-open the government and fund it at current levels for six months while raising the debt limit through Jan. 31.

"It's time for Democrat leaders to take 'yes' for an answer," McConnell said in a statement.

But six Democrats in the group and a spokesman for Collins said that while negotiations continued this weekend, there was no agreement.

The latest snag comes as 350,000 federal workers remain idle, hundreds of thousands more work without pay and an array of government services, from home loan applications to environmental inspections, were on hold on the 13th day of the shutdown.

Many parks and monuments remain closed, drawing a protest at the National World War II Memorial on Sunday that included tea party-backed lawmakers who had unsuccessfully demanded defunding of Obama's 3-year-old health care law in exchange for keeping the government open.

Unnerving to world economies is the prospect of the United States defaulting on its financial obligations on Thursday if Congress fails to raise the borrowing authority above the \$16.7 trillion debt limit.

Christine Lagarde, the International Monetary Fund's managing director, spoke fearfully about the disruption and uncertainty, warning of a "risk of tipping, yet again, into recession" after the fitful recovery from 2008. The reaction of world financial markets and the Dow Jones on Monday will influence any congressional talks.

Congress is racing the clock to get a deal done, faced with time-consuming Senate procedures that could slow legislation, likely opposition from tea partiers and certain resistance in the Republican-led House before a bill gets to Obama.

Politically, Republicans are reeling, bearing a substantial amount of the blame for the government shutdown and stalemate.

"We're in a free-fall as Republicans, but Democrats are not far behind," said Sen. Lindsey Graham, R-S.C., in warning Democrats about seizing on the GOP's bruised brand as leverage to extract more concessions.

McConnell and Republicans want to continue current spending at \$986.7 billion and leave untouched the new round of cuts in January, commonly known as sequester, that would reduce the amount to \$967 billion. Democrats want to figure out a way to undo the reductions, plus a long-term extension of the debt limit increase and a short-term spending bill to reopen the government.

"Republicans want to do it with entitlement cuts," said Sen. Chuck Schumer, D-N.Y. "Democrats want to do it with a mix of mandatory cuts, some entitlements and revenues. And so how do you

overcome that dilemma? We're not going to overcome it in the next day or two."

He suggested keeping the government running through mid-January.

Sen. Dick Durbin of Illinois, the No. 2 Democrat in the Senate, told reporters the two sides are roughly \$70 billion apart, the difference between the \$1.058 trillion Senate budget amount and the \$988 billion envisioned by House Budget Committee Chairman Paul Ryan, R-Wis.

"We haven't picked a number, but clearly we need to negotiate between those two," Durbin said.

Republicans dismiss the latest request as Reid moving the goalposts in negotiations as they were getting closer to resolving the stalemate that has paralyzed Washington. They also argue that it is disingenuous for Democrats to resist any changes in the 3-year-old health care law while trying to undo the 2011 budget law that put the cuts on track.

"I think the Democrats are on the verge of being one tick too cute as they see the House possibly in disarray — they now are overreaching, and I think that what we've got to do is get this back in the middle of the road, act like adults," said Sen. Bob Corker, R-Tenn.

Graham and Sen. Rand Paul, R-Ky., said they would not support any deal that upends the spending limits imposed by the 2011 law, and predicted that their Senate GOP colleagues would oppose it as well.

Out of play, for now, was the Republican-led House, where Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio, told GOP lawmakers early Saturday that his talks with the president had ground to a halt. Obama telephoned House Democratic leader Nancy Pelosi on Sunday, focusing on the need for any increase in the debt limit without concessions.

Also sidelined, at least for now, was the plan forged by Collins and a bipartisan coalition to briefly fund the government and extend the \$16.7 trillion debt limit, in exchange for steps like temporarily delaying the medical device tax that helps fund the health care law.

Democrats said Collins' plan curbed spending too tightly, and Reid announced Saturday it was going nowhere.

Collins said Sunday that both Democrats and Republicans continue to offer ideas and say they want to be part of the group working to reopen the government and address the debt ceiling before Thursday's deadline.

Reid: Soft-spoken, Combative Obama Partner vs Republicans

WASHINGTON (AP) •

Harry Reid, the soft-spoken but pugilistic Senate majority leader, didn't wait for White House officials to declare their view of high-stakes talks over the government shutdown and debt.

Standing just outside the West Wing, the 73-year-old Nevadan gave reporters his assessment of a key House Republican offer last week: "Not going to happen."

That blunt defiance caught administration officials off guard and contrasted with their vague statements later about the GOP's bid to extend the nation's borrowing powers for six weeks without fully reopening the government.

But it was in keeping with Reid's status as President Barack Obama's top congressional supporter in efforts to force Republicans to drop demands for budget and health care changes in exchange for keeping the government running.

Not surprisingly, Reid served up a much sharper jab over the weekend than any White House official would dare. Congressional Republicans, Reid said, initially hoped to block the president's health care law, but now they merely want "to divert attention from the fools they've made of themselves on Obamacare."

Obama and others largely sidelined Reid during major bipartisan talks in 2011 and 2012. Reid quietly simmered, associates say, believing Vice President Joe Biden, a former Senate colleague, and other Obama team members were yielding too much to Republicans who would take but not give.

Nowadays, Obama consults closely with Reid on strategy in the budget stalemate.

The former amateur boxer shares almost none of Obama's smooth oratory and outward charm. But the two appear bound by a conviction that irresponsible, tea party-backed Republicans now dominate the GOP's con-

gressional members and must be confronted forcefully.

White House aides say Obama talks more frequently with Reid than with any other senator, and they call one another several times a week. The calls have even ended with Obama caught off guard and calling into the phone, "Harry? Harry?"

The majority leader is known for abruptly ending conversations without saying "goodbye."

Obama has forged an alliance with Reid through shared Democratic ideology and a mutual dependence to get anything accomplished in a legislative environment that's become defined by partisan gridlock.

They have different styles and are of different generations. But they recognize that they need each other to make progress on their agenda.

Obama needs Reid to whip up 60 votes in the Senate — the threshold needed to overcome the

conservatives' aggressive use of a filibuster to block votes. Reid needs Obama to promote their ideals as the public face of the nation and the Democrats' most vital and high-profile decision-maker.

"They have always had as good of a relationship as two men who are not par-

ticularly socially outgoing or backslappers can have," said Rodell Mollineau, a former Reid aide who now runs a Democratic super political action committee. "I don't think it has changed at all. They've always known what each brings to the table and what their strengths are."

Salmonella Prompts California Recall of Rotisserie Chicken Products

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif. • Costco’s El Camino Real store in South San Francisco, Calif., is recalling 9,043 units, approximately 39,755 pounds, of rotisserie chicken products that may be contaminated with a strain of Salmonella Heidelberg, the U.S. Department of Agriculture’s Food Safety and Inspection Service, FSIS, announced Sunday.

The products subject to

recall are:

- 8,730 “Kirkland Signature Foster Farms” rotisserie chickens
- 313 total units of “Kirkland Farm” rotisserie chicken soup, rotisserie chicken leg quarters and rotisserie chicken salad

The products were sold directly to consumers in a Costco located at 1600 El Camino Real, South San Francisco, Calif., between Sept. 11 and Sep. 23 said Elizabeth Boody, USDA public

affairs officer.

The recall was initiated due to concerns about a group of Salmonella Heidelberg illnesses that may be associated with the consumption of rotisserie chicken products prepared in and purchased at the Costco El Camino Real store, Boody said. The PFGE pattern (0258) associated with this outbreak is reported rarely in the United States. FSIS, working with the Centers for Disease Control and

Prevention, CDC, the California Department of Public Health and the County of San Mateo Public Health Department, determined through epidemiologic and traceback investigations that there is a link between the Costco El Camino Real rotisserie chicken products and this illness outbreak, Boody said. FSIS is continuing to work with CDC, public health partners in California and Costco on the investigation.

Lewiston Port Seeks to Boost Container Volume

LEWISTON • Officials at the Port of Lewiston in northern Idaho want to increase the number of shipping containers that move through the most inland seaport on the West Coast.

The Lewiston Tribune reported that a draft strategic plan recently released calls for an increase to 433 containers a month.

The average for the first nine months of this year was 356. The 21-page draft doesn’t make clear how the increase would be obtained.

Port officials also want to increase the number businesses near the port and grow a fiber optic network.

MERIDIAN • A Meridian Police Officer says students shouldn’t use social media until age 16 and have no more than 200 Facebook friends to reduce the chances of cyber bullying and predators.

School Resource Officer Dave Gomez told the Meridian Press that internet bullying is one of the biggest problems students face.

He says the second biggest problem is students sending naked photos of themselves to other students.

Gomez recently gave a presentation to sixth-graders at Lewis and Clark Middle School.

One of his methods for teaching students is to set up fake Facebook accounts. One appears to belong to a 13-year-old girl.

He says thousands of students across the school district have “friended” him on the fake account. He says students should never friend someone they don’t personally know.

Amber Alert Remains for 5 Boys from New Mexico Youth Camp

HILLSBORO, N.M. • An Amber Alert remains in effect Sunday for five teenage boys reported missing from a rural New Mexico ranch for troubled youth.

New Mexico state police have said four other boys they were searching for are back with their parents.

Authorities say they think the five boys are in danger, while an attorney for the ranch says all are safely with their parents.

A spokesman for the State Children, Youth and Families Department said Sunday that the agency can’t take the attorney’s word on the teenagers. Henry Varela says authorities won’t consider the boys safe until they see them.

Authorities were executing a search warrant at the Tierra Blanca High Country Youth Program near Hillsboro last week when they discovered the teens weren’t there. Authorities are investigating claims of abuse at the ranch.

Deer Disease Leads to Hunting Restrictions

GREAT FALLS, Mont. • Deer hunters in five north-central Montana hunting districts between Great Falls and the Canadian border won’t be allowed to use their general deer license to take antlerless deer.

The Great Falls Tribune reports that the Fish and Wildlife Commission made the decision Thursday.

Officials said an outbreak of epizootic hemorrhagic disease has taken a toll on the whitetail population. Wildlife biologists said the disease hits whitetail deer populations harder.

With 49 seconds remaining before halftime, BSU had the ball on its own 12-yard line with two timeouts. But instead of trying to work some offense down the field, the Broncos were content with a 24-10 lead and chose to take a knee and run out the clock.

But Utah State coach Matt Wells made an astute move, using his two timeouts and forcing BSU's fourth-down punt – which USU's Devin Centers blocked.

The Aggies got the ball on the 12-yard line. They took two shots at the end zone, but both were defended by Boise State cornerback Bryan Douglas.

"It gave us a huge momentum swing," Douglas said. "Any momentum swing in game is good for us."

With time expiring, Utah State attempted a 29-yard field goal but it was blocked by Charles Leno.

If Utah State had scored a touchdown in that sequence, it would have gone into the locker room down by only a touchdown. The Aggies also received the second-half kickoff, and if their momentum had carried over and they scored again, the complexion of the game could have been much different.

Afterwards, BSU coach Chris Petersen claimed blame for the poor clock management.

"I think it was good because (Utah State) got the momentum, and I think it's important at halftime it's neutral or the other team doesn't have the momentum. So our guys took it right back. They did a great job kind of covering up for me not being aggressive enough."

Baltazar out with a season-ending knee injury, pickle juice-drinking Jay Ajayi picked up a bigger load and collected his second 100-yard rushing game of the season.

Ajayi had been averaging 17.8 carries per game, but ended up with 22 carries vs. Utah State. Derrick Thomas, who is expected to play a larger role going forward in the place of Baltazar, had 13 yards on five carries.

All BSU running backs were excellent in pass protection, allowing senior quarterback Joe Southwick time to pass for a career-high 335 yards.

CAN'T RUN? SCREEN

Utah State entered the game ranked No. 1 in the Mountain West in rushing defense. Southwick said that didn't affect Boise State's game plan.

"We were going to do what we normally do and try to establish that run game, it's really important for us to get the run game going," said Southwick. "That defense is legit, there's no doubt about it."

But BSU, which had been averaging 209.8 rushing yards per game, was held to 112 yards on the ground on Saturday. The Broncos ran about eight fewer running plays (40) than they had been averaging per game (47.4). Instead, BSU utilized a quick screen pass to the

edges 13 times against the aggressive Aggie defense. **STOP THE RUN**

Utah State running back Joey DeMartino entered Saturday's game averaging 6.7 yards per carry and totaled 200 yards in his previous two games.

But Boise State's defensive front bottled him up, holding DeMartino to just 37 yards with a 3.4-yards-per-carry average. Linebackers Ben Weaver and Corey Bell led the charge with 12 tackles apiece. For Bell, a junior, it was his best defensive production of the season.

Weaver, a freshman from Klein, Texas, leads the team with 49 tackles. "They did great," Southwick said of BSU's defense. "From my standpoint they shut down the run game, made that kid (USU's quarterbacks) make some throws, they did an outstanding job."

IT'S UP, IT'S GOOD

Junior placekicker Dan Goodale booted field goals of 35 and 39 yards. The 39-yarder was his career long. On the season, Goodale is 8-of-9 on field goals; the only miss was the blocked attempt in the season opener at Washington. Six of his eight makes are 30 yards or longer.

Goodale was also instrumental in keeping Utah State's explosive kickoff returners at bay with six touchbacks. He already has

22 touchbacks this season, the most since Tyler Jones had 36 in 2004. **TIME TO PREPARE**

Boise State had a bye week before the Utah State game. Not counting season openers and bowl games, the Broncos are 17-0 under Petersen when they have 10 or more days between games. BSU has one more bye week this season, on Nov. 9, ahead of its home game vs. Wyoming (4-2 overall, 2-0 MWC). **SAVE THE DATE**

Playing Utah State on the road figured to be the Broncos' biggest remaining obstacle en route to representing the Mountain Division in the inaugural Mountain West Conference championship game on Dec. 7. BSU will be favored in all of its remaining conference games (vs. Nevada, at Colorado State, vs. Wyoming, at San Diego State, vs. New Mexico).

Fresno State, the leader of the West Division and the only team to hand Boise State a conference loss this season, appears comfortably in the driver's seat to win its division and host the MW title tilt. Hosting honors are given to the team ranked higher in the BCS rankings.

The Bulldogs squeaked by Boise State 41-40 on Sept 20. A rematch in Fresno, Calif., for the MW championship would be a highly-anticipated and nationally-televvised rematch.

Ortiz, Red Sox Sting Tigers 6-5, Tie ALCS at 1

BOSTON (AP) • David Ortiz revived the Red Sox with a tying grand slam in the eighth inning, then Jarrod Saltalamacchia hit a winning single in the ninth that sent Boston past the Detroit Tigers 6-5 Sunday night to even the AL championship series at 1-all.

The Tigers were cruising to their second straight win at Fenway Park, with starter Max Scherzer taking a no-hitter and a 5-0 lead into the sixth inning.

But with one swing, Big Papi changed everything. Ortiz hit a two-out shot that sent right fielder Torii Hunter jack-knifing into the Boston

bullpen in a futile attempt to catch the ball, making it 5-up.

Saltalamacchia's single came after a series of Tigers misplays in the ninth. A wild throw, a wild pitch and a missed catch by first baseman Prince Fielder on a foul ball set up the game-ending hit.

The teams head to Detroit for Game 3 on Tuesday. Justin Verlander will face Boston's John Lackey.

A day after Anibal Sanchez and the Detroit staff combined on a one-hitter for a 1-0 win, Scherzer excelled. He fanned 13 while allowing two hits in seven innings, and was pulled after 108 pitches.

"It's playoff baseball," Tigers manager Jim Leyland said. "Looked like we had one in hand and we let one get

away, there's no question about that. But there have been two great games."

Miguel Cabrera and Alex Avila homered off Clay Buchholz in Detroit's four-run sixth inning.

Boston scored once in the bottom of the sixth and then loaded the bases against three relievers in the eighth before closer Joaquin Benoit came in to face Ortiz.

On his first pitch, Ortiz hit a line drive into the glove of the Red Sox bullpen catcher, with Hunter flopping head-first over the chest-high wall in pursuit.

The fans waited until the trainers verified that Hunter was OK to start chanting, "Papi!" and call the Red Sox slugger out of the dugout for a curtain call.

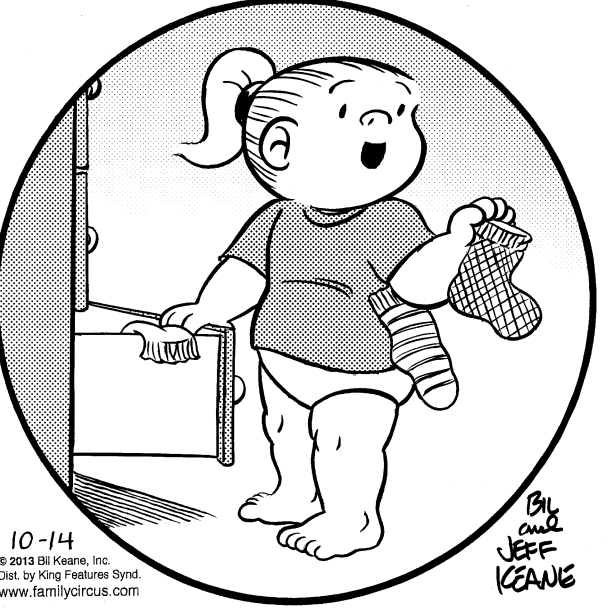

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

A few years ago a charity bridge event was held at Mosimann's Restaurant in London to aid the Variety Club. The total raised for the charity was 30,000 pounds.

On the morning of the event, Zia Mahmood was sick and couldn't play. His replacement, Nicola Smith, filled in, and she and her partner won their section. Today's slam caused her no problem. Although the play should be straightforward, it floored a number of players.

Although South has only 10 high-card points, his hand is strong in distribution and well worth an opening bid. (A two-diamond opening would be wildly misleading.) After that start, there would be no stopping North, and the final contract would be six diamonds after the obligatory use of Blackwood.

On the spade-king lead, declarer needs to set up dummy's hearts, using trumps as entries. The simplest line is to win the lead, play a trump to dummy, ruff a heart, play another trump to dummy, and ruff another heart. Now ruff a spade and try the ace and king of hearts (discarding a spade and a club). If hearts break, declarer can claim the rest. On the actual layout declarer ruffs another heart, setting up dummy's 10, which he can reach with a second spade ruff. The remaining heart winner allows declarer to discard a second club, and the slam is made without needing to guess which opponent holds the club ace.

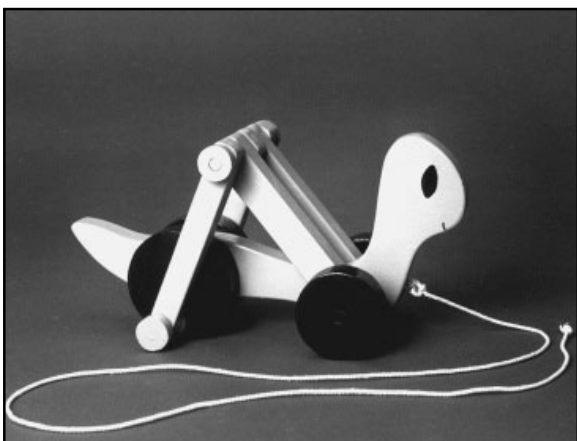

Schrank. Despite the wound, Roosevelt went ahead with a scheduled speech, declaring, "It takes more than one bullet to kill a bull moose."

On this date:

In 1890, Dwight D. Eisenhower, 34th president of the United States, was born in Denison, Texas.

In 1908, the E.M. Forster novel "A Room With a View" was first published by Edward Arnold of London.

In 1939, a German U-boat torpedoed and sank the HMS Royal Oak, a British battleship anchored at Scapa Flow in Scotland's Orkney Islands; 833 of the more than 1,200 men aboard were killed.

In 1944, German Field Marshal Erwin Rommel committed suicide rather than face execution for allegedly conspiring against Adolf Hitler.

In 1947, Air Force test pilot Charles E. ("Chuck") Yeager broke the sound barrier as he flew the experimental Bell XS-1 (later X-1) rocket plane over Muroc Dry Lake in California.

In 1960, Democratic presidential candidate John F. Kennedy suggested the idea of a Peace Corps while addressing an audience of students at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor.

In 1964, civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr. was named winner of the Nobel Peace Prize.

In 1977, singer Bing Crosby died outside Madrid, Spain, at age 74.

In 1987, a 58-hour drama began in Midland, Texas, as 18-month-old Jessica McClure slid 22 feet down an abandoned well at a private day care center; she was rescued on Oct. 16.

Ten years ago: John Allen Muhammad pleaded not guilty to murder as the first trial in the deadly Washington-area sniper rampage got under way in Virginia Beach, Va. (Muhammad was later convicted of killing Dean Harold Meyers and executed in 2009.) The United States vetoed a U.N. Security Council resolution that would have condemned Israel for building a barrier that cut into the West Bank.

Five years ago: Big banks started falling in line behind a revised bailout plan that was fast becoming more of a buy-in; the Bush administration announced it would fork over as much as \$250 billion in exchange for partial ownership. A grand jury in Orlando, Fla. returned charges of first-degree murder, aggravated child abuse and aggravated manslaughter against Casey Anthony in the death of her 2-year-old daughter, Caylee. (She was acquitted in July 2011.) Syria formally recognized Lebanon for the first time by establishing diplomatic relations with its neighbor. Canada's Conservative Party won in national elections but fell short of a parliamentary majority.

One year ago: Former Sen. Arlen Specter died at 82 of complications from non-Hodgkins lymphoma. For most of his 30 years representing Pennsylvania in the U.S. Senate, Specter was a Republican, though he began his political career as a Democrat and returned to that party in 2009. Daredevil skydiver Felix Baumgartner became the first man to shatter the sound barrier without traveling in a jet or a spacecraft, jumping from a balloon 24 miles above the New Mexico desert. Sixty-five years after becoming the first human to fly faster than the speed of sound, 89-year-old retired Air Force Brig. Gen. Chuck Yeager commemorated the event by smashing through the sound barrier again, this time in the backseat of an F-15.
