Simpson Only Idaho Lawmaker to Back Funding Bill

WASHINGTON, D.C. • Only one Idaho lawmaker voted to approve the congressional bill passed Wednesday to avoid a financial default and reopen the federal government after a 16-day shutdown.

The bill, which passed 81-18 in the Senate and 285-144 in the House would allow the U.S. Treasury to continue borrowing through Feb. 7 and reopen the U.S. government through Jan. 15.

vor of the bill. "I would vote no on the (deal) because the deal raises the debt limit without any substantial cuts in spending and no major changes to Obamacare," Smith said. The anti-tax group, Club for Growth which has taken credit for persuading Smith to run for office announced Wednesday that lawmakers should not vote for the deal. The organization is known for finding extremely conservative candidates to run against Republicans that break from their agenda. They warned lawmakers voting in favor of the bill would reflect poorly on their annual scorecard. opposed the deal because it did nothing to rein in government spending.

U.S. Rep. Mike Simpson, R-Idaho, voted in favor of the measure while U.S. Sens. Mike Crapo, Jim Risch and Rep. Raul Labrador opposed it.

Simpson acknowledged that his approval of the bill might be unpopular with some of his Idaho constituents, but he said the potential economic consequences of the congressional stalemate outweighed the politics of his decision.

"The easiest, most politically expedient thing for me to do would have been to vote no and protect my political right flank," Simpson said. "Doing so, however, would have Simpson also said that the bill contains flaws, but it would prevent future unnecessary strain on Idaho's economy.

"This bill, while far from perfect, preserves the progress Republicans have made in reducing spending and moving toward a balanced budget," he said. "The fight over Obamacare may now move to another venue, but the fight is far from over. While I strongly believe we should continue working to delay the entire law for one year, I also tend to believe that Obamacare may collapse of its own weight. I don't think it will work."

"It does almost nothing to address our long-term mandatory spending and debt problems or correct the still-unfolding problems with the president's health care law," Crapo said in a news release.

The stop-gap funding measure all but assures another standoff in January, said U.S. Sen. Jim Risch, R-Idaho, adding that the federal government continues to over spend.

"The United States faces serious longterm debt and spending challenges that we must confront now," Risch said. "Sadly this deal kicks the can down the road for three months and I could not support it."

Fruit Processing Company to Build Plant in Rupert; 100 Jobs Expected

RUPERT • A Portugal-based fruit processing company chose Rupert to house its first U.S. plant, city and company officials announced Wednesday.

Frulact Group plans to build a 200,000-square-foot fruit preparation and processing plant south of the Minidoka Irrigation District office.

The plant is slated to break ground this year and open during the fourth quarter of 2014, according to a press release issued by the company and Southern Idaho Economic Development Organization.

"This is historic for Rupert. It's been many decades since we've had a business this size locate in Rupert," said Kelly Anthon, Ru-

The candidates include two incumbents and two first time political hopefuls.


The most experienced out of the group is Councilman Burke Richman. After serving one term on the city council, Richman said he wants to continue working on the progress he and the council have made over the past four years.



Stocks Surge After Senate Reaches Deal on US Debt

NEW YORK (AP) • Wall Street finally got the deal it's been waiting for.

A last-minute agreement to keep the U.S. from defaulting on its debt and reopen the government sent the stock market soaring Wednesday, pushing the Standard & Poor's 500 index close to a record high.

On Wednesday, Senate leaders agreed to fund the government through Jan. 15 and extend government borrowing through Feb. 7.

Hidden History Wilbur Hubbell: Buhl's National League Hero

BUHL • Baseball pitcher Wilbur William Hubbell believed he had found the rainbow's end.

Hubbell was considered one of the best athletes in Idaho. Hubbell played on Buhl's 1914 Idaho State Champion high school foot ball team, and excelled at baseball, basketball, track and swimming.

In 1919, the 22-year-old right-handed pitcher from Buhl jumped right to the majors. The 6-foot 2-inch hurler was touted as a coming star when he signed with the New York Giants.

But real success eluded him.


At the end of his rookie year, the Giants traded Hubbell to the Philadelphia Phillies.

In 1920, Hubbell won 9 of the 18 games that he pitched, and 9 of the 16 games he pitched in 1921.

In May 1922, the Phillies the Brooklyn played Dodgers in front of 2,500 fans at Shibe Park in Philadelphia.

In the opening inning, Hubble pitched to Tom Griffith, and Griffith drove a line drive, striking Hubble's head.

"The ball flew like a projectile from a gun," wrote The New York Times that day.

The result was a severe concussion and a fractured skull. The fracture radiated in three directions above Hubbell's right ear, the paper reported.

"Hubbell is at the Stetson Hospital fighting for his life," the Times wrote. "The injury is probably fatal."

Phillies owner William Baker telegraphed Mrs. Hubbell in Buhl, telling her to come to Philidelphia immediately.

But Hubbell didn't die, and after recovering, he continued to play - albeit poorly - for the Phillies.

Several years later, he seemed to regain his confidence.

In 1924, the Times Herald of Cattaraugus, N.Y., wrote that Hubbell five years before, "had started in search of the end of the pitching rainbow. He made an exhaustive study of baseball, the Einstein theory, ragtime playing and Mah Jong in his efforts to locate the baseball pot of gold. But until the '24 season, his search seemed fruitless."

The season started well, but fizzled. The Phillies traded Hubbell to the Brooklyn Dodgers - the Brooklyn Robins, as the team was known then. In 1925, Hubble was traded to the minors.

He went on to play for the Minneapolis Millers, the Reading Keystones, the Seattle Indians, the Oakland Oaks, the Sacramento Senators, and finally, at the age of 35, the Portland Beavers in 1932

Hubble died in Lakewood, Colo., in 1980, at the age of 83.

Electronic Medical Records System in Spotlight at St. Luke's Trial

St. Luke's Health System says it will spend \$200 million on a new electronic medical records system. The system will be fully launched sometime after 2017.

The launch of the Epic system is under the spotlight in a U.S. District Court trial against St. Luke's. The cost of electronic medical records systems is frequently cited as a major reason for independent doctors to seek employment with larger health systems.

St. Luke's is defending its purchase of Nampa's Saltzer Medical Group – a buyout that Saint Alphonsus Health System, Treasure Valley Hospital, the Federal Trade Commission and the Idaho

attorney general say broke antitrust laws and gave St. Luke's too many primary care physicians in the area.

St. Luke's argues that its electronic medical records system is superior to other systems now in use. Healthcare providers who use the St. Luke's system can share data and patient records more easily, and their patients can participate more actively in their care, St. Luke's officials have said in court.

But it will be years before St. Luke's is using the system throughout its hospitals and clinics. St. Luke's Chief Medical Information Officer Marc Chasin testified Wednesday that St. Luke's is still using old systems for nursing, hospital and emergency-room care. A patient who saw doctors at Saltzer, St. Luke's in Boise and St. Luke's in the Magic Valley would use three different portals to access his medical record online, Chasin said.

The Boise-based health system plans to start an "affiliate" program that will allow independent doctors to use the Epic system. St. Luke's will cover 85 percent of the cost – the most St. Luke's can pay under the law - for those doctors to be hooked up with Epic's software.

The first practice to jump in is Women's Health Associates, a six-doctor group located in a St. Luke's medical office building in Downtown Boise.

Chasin said St. Luke's will spend about \$1.4 million on the pilot launch for Women's Health Associates. The independent group will bear about \$100,000 of the cost of the Epic software, he said.

That doesn't count ongoing support, which will cost St. Luke's \$20,000 to \$24,000 per doctor per year, he said.

Other hospital systems have reportedly spent anywhere from \$80 million in New Hampshire to \$1 billion in California on Epic, the system St. Luke's is adopting.

Gunshots Fired after Argument over Trailer Tires, Police Say

BUHL • An argument about backhoe trailer tires led to gunshots, police say.

Just before 3 p.m. Saturday, Buhl police went to a home near the intersection of 4200 North and Carter Back Road in Buhl for a disturbance.

A woman there said her brother-in-law, James Lloyd Harral, had been in a fight with Paul Edwin Arnold and that Arnold had tried to shoot Harral at his house near 1200 E. 4300 N.

On Tuesday, Arnold, 57, was arraigned on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon and two battery charges. His bond was set at \$100,000. A preliminary hearing is scheduled Oct. 25.

Officers found a gun magazine and a Barreta single-action pistol with one .22-caliber spent shell casing still in the chamber. Six unfired rounds were still in the magazine.

Police found Harral lying

according to a police report. Harral told Arnold he

didn't want to hear it and continued driving up the lane to his house, but Harral followed.

When Harral got out of the pickup, Arnold pulled a gun out of his back pocket and told Harral he could "not hesitate in killing him right there."

"If you pull a gun on somebody you better use it," Harral said he told Arnold.

As Harral walked away, Arnold fired two shots, he said. Harral told police he kept walking away when Arnold came up behind him and hit him in the head, possibly with the gun, then tried to throw him to the ground.

The two began to wrestle. Harral eventually got on top and told Arnold they were "too old for this s--? After he let Arnold up, Harral said, Arnold hit him again in the head, the two began to wrestle and it appeared Arnold reached for the pistol again. Harral said he was "fighting for his life, praying the gun did not go off in his face," the report says.

Harral told police he eventually wrestled the gun away and ran to his pickup, locking the doors.



Perez Pleads Not Guilty in Immigration Scam

BOISE • Celia Perez, 40, of Jerome, pleaded not guilty to 12 counts of mail fraud during an appearance Wednesday before U.S. Magistrate Candy Dale in Boise.

Perez is accused of cheating Mexican immigrants seeking legal status in the United States out of thousands of dollars after posing as an immigration attorney. She offered her clients help in submitting applications to help "fix their immigration problems" and "make the immigration process go faster," according to court documents.

Perez is not listed as an attorney in Idaho, according to an online directory maintained by the Idaho State Bar.

Dale agreed Wednesday to release Perez from custody, but banned her from using a computer or accessing the Internet. She was also ordered to surrender her passport and to have no contact with witnesses in the case. She must remain in Idaho and wear a monitoring device.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Justin Whatcott told the judge such stringent measures were necessary to ensure no other people are victimized.

"There is concern this defendant, if released, would return to the criminal activity that led to this indictment," Whatcott said. Additional charges are under consideration, Whatcott told the judge. Outside of court, he declined to say whether there may be more victims.

Dick Rubin, the chief Boise federal defender, said Perez has lived nearly her entire life in Idaho and is not a flight risk. He said she knew she was under investigation and could be apprehended, and that she gave herself up when she was indicted.

Rubin told the judge she would not have any trouble abiding by the prohibition against computer use because the government confiscated all of her computers as part of the investigation.

The government alleges that Perez's scheme began in

December 2006, when she contacted a family in Mexico and said she could help them obtain permanent resident status for their daughter, who was living in the Los Angeles area.

Perez allegedly wrote back and forth to the woman for more than six years, collecting fees for services and to supposedly pay application fees to the U.S. government. In all, the family paid her \$11,300, the government alleges.

Prosecutors contend Perez promised another family in Arizona to help a woman with an immigrant visa. That family paid her \$19,365 between 2012 and earlier this year.

Perez is scheduled to go to trial Dec. 9.

Heyburn Man Arraigned on Murder Charge

RUPERT • The Heyburn man accused of killing Craig Glen Short and fleeing to Texas appeared Tuesday for the first time in a local court.

Christopher Cruz, 21, appeared by video feed from Cassia County's jail for his arraignment in Minidoka County District Magistrate Court.

20 Years Later, Man Completes Final Home on Toner Drive

PAUL • There was no easy chair waiting for George Toner when he hit age 65.

"I needed something to do," said Toner, now 84.

A mechanic by trade, he changed careers in 1972 and founded Toner Construction.

His legacy - 14 townhomes that it took him nearly 20 years to build now lines both sides of a cul-de-sac street in Paul.

"I knew better than to think he would really retire," said his son, Dan Toner, who does construction work for his father.

"It was only four rooms but when we moved in, we owned it," Rosie said.

He built four other homes for his family over the years, including a home in Paul, not far from Toner Drive.

Each one, he said, taught him new lessons.

Many of the features he enjoys in his own home, including top-of-the-line cabinetry and an electrical system with master lightcontrol panels in the master bedrooms and garages, he incorporated into some of the townhomes.

"Once you have them, you just can't live without them," Toner said. He also designed the homes to require no external maintenance.

Toner's small crew performs all the construction work, except laying marble and taping the drywall.

"It just takes us too darn long to tape drywall," he said.

Most of the time, Rosie said, he had two employees

helping him. Maxine Becker purchased the first home Toner completed, nearly 20 years ago.

"All of the homes are very nice because George is very fussy about his work," Becker said. "It was his dream to live long enough to finish all of the houses."

Becker said Toner often helps residents on the street by performing light maintenance duties at their homes, including changing lightbulbs.

Jim and LaVon Tuckness are thrilled with the home they moved into a couple weeks ago.

"It's gorgeous," said LaVon Tuckness.

Two County Employees Chided over 'Ghost Camera'

BUTTE, Mont. (AP) • Two county employees in Montana have been reprimanded after a motion-activated camera was installed in a little-used room in the health department in the hopes of capturing paranormal activity.

An internal investigation found that no crimes had been committed, The Montana Standard reported. Butte-Silver Bow County Chief Executive Matt Vincent said he could see the humorous side of the situation, but questioned the judgment of the employees involved.

"Whenever you're talking about ghosts it's off the wall," he said. "But it's serious in that the public gives trust in us and we need to take that seriously, and setting up cameras in public buildings to catch paranormal activity, I don't think that is gaining the public's trust."



Incredibly, this kind of thing has become such a common occurrence that there is now a detailed Wikipedia page dedicated to "Israel-related animal conspiracy theories." There was, of course, the great Mossad shark attack wave in the Red Sea in 2010, but birds have been the most frequent targets.

Egyptian fishermen carried out a citizens' arrest on a stork in September. The bird was eventually released but was killed and eaten shortly after. Turkish authorities released a kestrel in July after X-rays proved it was not embedded with surveillance equipment. An alleged Israeli bee-eater caused alarm in a southeast ern Turkish village in May, 2012. Vultures have been detained on suspicion of spying for Israel in Sudan in 2012 and Saudi Arabia in 2011.

In all these cases, the birds were part of scientific studies by Israeli universities and wearing tags or electronic monitors with Hebrew lettering or references to institutions like Tel Aviv University. For the sake of their test subjects, Israeli scientists might want to design some less conspicuous tags.

Dear House Republicans: Can You Take 'Yes' for an Answer?

The following editorial appears on Bloomberg View:

When a government shutdown enters its third week, the United States is two days from defaulting on some of its obligations and markets around the world begin to show signs of panic, it's time to take "yes" for an answer.

This advice is especially germane to House Republicans as the budget showdown enters its final face-saving and horse- trading stages. The Senate leadership has cobbled together a budget deal that, while wholly unsatisfactory from a fiscal-policy standpoint, at least avoids economic catastrophe. Speaker John Boehner should allow the package to come to the floor, where it stands a very good chance of passage, so we can all move on to the next chapter in this crisis.

The Senate deal, worked out between Majority Leader Harry Reid and Minority Leader Mitch Mc-Connell, would reopen the government by funding it through Jan. 15 and extend borrowing authority to Feb. 7. It includes two minor Affordable Care Act- related proposals, one favored by labor and one favored by House Republicans.

The Senate offer would try to prevent another round of shutdowns and default threats by imposing a mid-December deadline for the two sides to draw up a true budget that replaces the automatic spending cuts known as sequestration.

Sound reasonable? Or at least acceptable? To most lawmakers, yes. But not to the Ted Cruz faction of the Republican Party. The Texas senator, who met with about 20 House Republicans last night to plot strategy, has reverted to his default position of trying to destroy Obamacare.

The latest ultimatum from House Republicans amounts to a confused and confusing demand that lawmakers eliminate employer-based healthcare contributions for themselves, the president and his Cabinet. They also want to strengthen their leverage in any future battles over the debt limit by barring the Treasury Department from using so-called extraordinary measures to postpone hitting the ceiling.

Both provisions are bad policy and bad politics. It's not enough, however, to just say "no."

In the meantime, the costs of their actions are mounting. Short-term U.S. Treasuries have gone from haven to risky instrument - one that banks and fund managers are dumping as fast as they can.

Most of the misinforma-

partisan politics with their back-handed defense of Rep. Simpson against his primary challenger, Bryan Smith, a tea party candidate they say from the "fringe" element. The hate speech used in their recent editorial would, in other forums, have led to calls for an investigation by the NAACP or the ACLU.

The editor's words only fulfill the objective of further polarizing a divided nation, great for newspaper sales but sad for the profession of journalism. Their giddiness is on display as they report their bias over the fiscal deficit and the Affordable Health Care Act. Nowhere in their analysis is any alarm for the spending spree Washington has embarked upon over the last decade or the social engineering experiment that will affect every American's health care in ways immeasurable. No, the editors of this paper are playing the piper's tune sent down from their comrades in journalism school. The "fire and brimstone, race-baiting ideologues" in the tea party are mucking up a peaceful transformation of this country's socialized future and they're not happy about it.

Say it isn't so. The "fringe" element considers the rejection of this government's promise of never-ending debt





Second University of Idaho Presidential **Finalist Visits Twin Falls**

TWIN FALLS • The second of five finalists for the president of the University of Idaho met with the public Wednesday in Twin Falls.

Jack Payne, senior vice president for agriculture and natural resources and and administrative head for the Institute of Food and Agricultural Science at the University of Florida, told the audience it was great being back in the west.

Payne has a Ph.D. in wildlife ecology and a master's degree in aquatic ecology from Utah State University.

He said during the 15 years he lived in Utah, he often visited Idaho to pheasant hunt. He described himself as an outdoor enthusiast.

"Will this guy stick around long enough to make a difference?" Payne said. "I will promise you I will remain in this position as long as the trustees and the people of Idaho want me to stay."

Payne shared how he left academia for a time to work for Ducks Unlimited, a wetlands and waterfowl conser-

tional director of conservation from 1996 - 2001.

He has been at the University of Florida for three years and said his work there has prepared him for the University of Idaho leadership post.

"I have a faculty of 3,000, a \$340 million budget and 13 research stations. I mention all that to let you know that this experience has prepared me to take this next step," Payne said.

He also said the university's land grant mission is crucial.

"What you are doing in Twin Falls, what I saw in Idaho Falls and what I will see in Boise is very, very important," Payne said. "Land grant universities built this country and continue to build this country?

Two challenges Payne said he would tackle are faculty and staff salaries and enrollment.

The next visit will be by James Applegate, a consultant for higher education and philanthropy. He will meet the community at 12:30 p.m. Oct. 23 at the Stonehouse Event Center, 330 Fourth Ave. S., in Twin Falls.

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Idaho Prison Board Gives Corizon Medical Contract

BOISE • The Idaho Board of Correction has awarded Corizon Health Inc. a new contract to continue providing medical and mental health care to the state's prison inmates.

The Department of Correction and Corizon have had a rocky relationship. The state has been under pressure from a decades-old lawsuit filed by inmates to improve medical care, and a courtappointed expert concluded more than a year ago that Corizon's medical care at one Idaho prison amounted to cruel and unusual punishment. Corizon countered that it was meeting national prison standards and commissioned its own report backing that claim.

Idaho has since reached a settlement with inmates that calls for increased medical staffing and other major changes to the way medical and mental health care is provided in state prisons. The fine details of the settlement are still being polished, but it should go into effect in the coming months, and if the Idaho Department of Correction fulfills the terms for two years with no problems, the three-decades-old lawsuit will officially close.

Four companies submitted bids to take over the prison health care contract, and the proposals were scored based on technical details and overall cost. Corizon's bid had the highest overall score, though it was also the most expensive proposal at nearly \$41 million a year. The other three companies — Centurion, a joint venture of MHM Services Inc. and Centene Corp.; Correctional Healthcare Companies Inc.; and NaphCare Inc. — have until Oct. 23 to appeal the award.

The two proposals with the highest overall scores were presented to the Idaho Board of Correction on Tuesday in a "blind bid," which means the names of the companies weren't re-

vealed to board members or others at the meeting until a decision was made.

Corizon's new contract will cost the state \$15.31 per offender, per day — for an annualized cost of about \$40.9 million. The Brentwood, Tenn., company's technical evaluation score was 600, about 40 points higher than Centurion, which had the next-highest score.

Naphcare had the best score for cost at 400 points – about 40 points higher than Corizon – but Naphcare came in 60 points lower than Corizon on the technical evaluation score.

Corizon's current contract with IDOC give the company a per-inmate, per-day rate of \$14.52. The contract also allows the state to assess a fine of sorts — called "liquidated damages" — if Corizon fails to meet some of the contractual requirements. So far this year, IDOC has assessed nearly \$27,000 in liquidated damages against Corizon, according to records provided by the agency.

Pocatello Father Gets 15 Years for Son's Death

POCATELLO • A Pocatello man convicted of voluntary manslaughter in the death of his son has been ordered to spend at least seven years in prison.

Anthony Blake Viles was sentenced Tuesday by 6th District Judge Stephen Dunn. Viles was originally charged with first-degree murder in the death of 6-year-old Afton Allison in April 2012, but later the charged was reduced.

During the sentencing hearing, Viles apologized and said he thinks of his son every day.

Dunn said imposing punishment in the case was difficult and pointed to testimony that Viles didn't intend to kill his son when he struck him. Still, Dunn said it's important to send a message about the care of children.

Man Charged with Raping Woman He Met Online

BOISE • Bail was set at \$1 million for a 26year-old Meridian man charged with raping a woman he met online.

The *Idaho Statesman* reports Jeremy E. Threatt made an initial appearance before 4th District Magistrate Judge Theresa Gardunia on Tuesday on charges of sexual intercourse without consent and forcible penetration with a foreign object. Gardunia ordered a mental evaluation to determine if Threatt is competent to stand trial.

The woman reported she had met Threatt online and agreed to meet him at his house on Sunday. She said he raped her shortly after she arrived at his house.

Meridian Police Lt. Jamie Leslie says the woman escaped the house, went to the hospital and called police. Threatt was arrested Sunday.

Idaho Gets \$1.29M from Feds to Fight Teen Suicide

BOISE • Idaho programs to reduce the state's

high suicide rate among young people are getting a financial boost from the federal government. The State Department of Education announced

Tuesday it's received a \$1.29 million grant for suicide-reduction efforts over three years.

This will provide the seed money for the Idaho Lives Project, a partnership with groups including the Idaho Suicide Prevent Action Network.

Idaho ranks among the top five states for teen suicides and in the top 10 states for overall suicides.

One reason: Young people in the state's rural hinterlands may not have access to prevention and mental health services.

Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna aims to use this federal grant to equip schools and communities with the resources necessary to keep kids from taking their own lives.

Man Pleads Guilty in Deputy Shooting Case

NAMPA • A southwestern Idaho man who shot two Canyon County sheriff's deputies has reversed course and pleaded guilty to aggravated assault.

After initially pleading not guilty, Kyle Alan Batt pleaded guilty on Wednesday in 3rd District Court to two counts of aggravated battery on a law enforcement officer.

Batt, who is 28, faces a sentence requiring him to spend at least 30 years in prison.

He's already been sentenced to 15 years in prison in federal court.

In exchange for Batt's plea, Canyon County Prosecutor Brian Taylor agreed to drop sentencing enhancements for inflicting great bodily harm.

Prosecutors say Batt fled when deputies tried to arrest him last October and that he then lured them into an ambush, shooting both multiple times.

Both deputies survived.

Batt's sentencing is set for December. — *The Associated Press*

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



BOISE • In Boise State's win last Saturday at Utah State, the Aggies had a chance to steal momentum heading into halftime after blocking a BSU punt.

Utah State tried to fade routes to the left corner of the end zone, going right at junior cornerback Bryan Douglas.

He played picture-perfect coverage and denied both passes, the Broncos blocked the ensuing field goal attempt and went into halftime and the second half riding high on adrenaline.

The play of Douglas, who collected his team-best fourth interception against the Aggies, is just one example of the young Bronco defense growing into its cleats.

"We're definitely playing much like a defense as a whole now, where everybody is playing on a string," Douglas said.

Statistically, Boise State's defense has improved immensely in its last two games, sandwiched around a bye week. Through their first four games, the Broncos hovered around 100th in the nation in total defense. Today they're ranked 60th.

Douglas said a lot of credit goes to the defensive line and linebackers, who have eight quarterback sacks the last two games combined. Coach Chris Petersen called those sacks "critical."

"We count on those guys," Douglas said. "Everybody's job is to make everybody else's job easier on defense, whether it's the D-line getting pressure on the quarterback or us having great coverage."

The No. 1-ranked rushing defense in the Mountain West was on the field Saturday at Romney Stadium. That's

Utah State. But an uninformed observer would have told you the superior defense in that game was the Broncos, besides a few breakdowns.

It starts with senior nose guard Ricky Tjong-A-Tjoe, the leader of the defense according to safety Darian Thompson. Defensive tackle Armand Nance and end Demarcus Lawrence are among the top four team leaders

in tackles.

"It starts in the lines, like we always say, and we're proud of those guys for progressing," Petersen said. "I think our defense in general is getting better. We talk about Bryan Douglas in that secondary playing good and then you get your D-line to put a little pressure."

But where is the Bronco defense's biggest area of improvement?

"Our confidence is up," said Douglas. "Everything we emphasize in practice, we execute it on the field."



UCLA Tries to Rearrange Pac-12 Game of Year Plans

The Pac-12's game of the year has been tentatively scheduled for Nov. 7 between Stanford and Oregon on The Farm.

Stanford's loss at Utah last week put a dent in those plans. No. 9 UCLA can totally blow them up Saturday by handing the 13th-ranked Cardinal a second straight loss.

That would turn the Oregon-UCLA game Oct. 26 into a top-10 - maybe eventop-five – Pac-12 matchup, and make the Bruins a national championship contender in late October for the first time in a while.

"We're only thinking about this week and playing Stanford," UCLA coach Jim Mora said. "It's an opportunity for us to go on the road and play a very, very good football team. A team that beat us in the Pac-12 championship game. A team that we have a ton of respect for."

A Bruins victory could also send quarterback Brett Hundley surging up those Heisman Trophy watch lists.

The last time UCLA was ranked higher than this was 2001. Those Bruins reached No. 4, and then dropped four straight, starting with a late October loss to Stanford.

The Atlantic Coast Conference game of the year came off as planned. No. 5 Florida State at No. 3 Clemson on Saturday, the first top-five matchup of ACC teams since 2005 (No. 5 Miami 27, No. 3 Virginia Tech 7) and only the fourth in league history.

"It's great for our conference," Clemson coach Dabo Swinney said. "We're the only league that's got three undefeated teams."

No. 10 Miami will try to stay that way tonight at North Carolina.

Barring some big upsets down the road, Clemson-Florida State should settle the Atlantic Division race.

Florida State does play Miami in a couple weeks, which could be an old-school 'Canes-'Noles game, featuring two top-10 teams. Neither the Tigers nor Seminoles have No. 19 Virginia Tech on the schedule.

If a game of the year does exist in the American Athletic Conference, it could very well be Friday night at Louisville. Teddy Bridgewater and the eighth-ranked Cardinals face Central Florida (4-1). The Knights are probably the most talented team on Louisville's schedule, led by quarterback Blake Bortles and linebacker Terrance Plummer. If they can't derail the Cardinals' perfect season, who can?





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Congress Votes to End Shutdown, Avoid US Default

BY DAVID ESPO AP Special Correspondent

WASHINGTON • Up against a deadline, Congress passed and sent a waiting President Barack Obama legislation late Wednesday night to avoid a threatened national default and end the 16-day partial government shutdown, the culmination of an epic political drama that placed the U.S. economy at risk.

The Senate voted first, a bipartisan 81-18 at midevening. That cleared the way for a final 285-144 vote in the Republican-controlled House about two hours later on the legislation, which hewed strictly to the terms Obama laid down when the twin crises erupted more than three weeks ago

The legislation would permit the Treasury to borrow normally through Feb. 7 or perhaps a month longer, and fund the government through Jan. 15. More than 2 million federal workers would be paid_those who had remained on the job and those who had been furloughed.

After the Senate approved the measure, Obama hailed the vote and said he would sign it immediately after it reached his desk. "We'll begin reopening our government immediately and we can begin to lift this cloud of uncertainty from our businesses and the American people."

Later, in the House, Rep. Harold Rogers, R-Ky., said, "After two long weeks, it is time to end this govern-

Highlights of Government Shutdown, Debt Limit Bill

GOVERNMENT SHUTDOWN: Ends it immediately, finances federal agencies through Jan. 15. Workers furloughed without pay when the shutdown began Oct. 1 receive back pay.

DEBT CEILING: Government's authority to borrow money extended until Feb. 7. Using streamlined procedures, Congress could vote to block the debt-limit extension, but that effort was certain to fail. No constraints on Treasury Department's ability to move funds among accounts once debt limit is reached, in effect extending government's ability to avoid default several weeks beyond Feb. 7 if needed.

HEALTH CARE LAW: Department of Health and Human Services must certify it can verify income eligibility of people applying for government subsidies for health insurance. By next July 1, the department's

OTHER ITEMS: No pay raise for members of Congress in 2014; \$636 million for firefighting for the Interior Department and the Forest Service; allows work to continue on Olmstead lock in the Ohio River between Kentucky and Illinois; lets Federal Highway Administration reimburse Colorado up to \$450 million for flood-damaged roads, exceeding usual \$100 million cap; extra \$294 million for Department of Veterans Affairs to reduce backlogs of benefits claims; funds for National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration to continue work on two weather satellites; extends expired authority for Defense Department to support African forces hunting warlord Joseph Kony, leader of rebel group Lord's Resistance Army.

Philippine Quake **Damages Historic** Churches

LOON, Philippines • The earthquake that struck the central Philippines and killed at least 144 people also dealt a serious blow to the region's historical and religious legacy by heavily damaging a dozen or more churches, some of them hundreds of years old.

As rescuers reached some of the hardest-hit areas on Wednesday and the death toll from the quake a day earlier continued to rise, images of the wrecked religious buildings resonated across a nation

where 80 percent of the population is Roman Catholic.

The bell tower toppled from Cebu city's 16th-century Basilica of the Holy Child_a remnant of the Spanish colonial era and the country's oldest church building_becoming a pile of rubble in the courtyard. Other churches on the neighboring island of Bohol, epicenter of the quake and a popular tourist destination known for its beaches, were also damaged, some beyond repair.

"The heritage old churches are also very close to the hearts of the Boholanos," said Bohol Gov. Edgardo Chatto, using the term for residents of the island.

He said authorities would attempt to restore the historic churches, but some may never return to their former state.

49 Believed **Dead in Plane** Crash in Laos

BANGKOK • A Lao Airlines flight crashed Wednesday in the Southeast Asian nation, apparently killing all 49 people aboard, including passengers from 11 countries, the Lao government said.

The Ministry of Public Works and Transport, which

operates the airline as a state enterprise, said 44 passengers and five crew members were aboard flight QV301 from the Lao capital, Vientiane, to Pakse in the country's south. Earlier reports had said there were 39 passengers on board.

"Upon preparing to land at Pakse Airport the aircraft ran into extreme bad weather conditions and was reportedly crashed into the Mekong River," the ministry said in a statement. It said there was no word of survivors. The airline flies an ATR 72-600 twin-engine turboprop plane on the 290-mile route. The aircraft is configured with 68-74 seats, said maker ATR.

Typhoon, **Mudslides Kill** 17 in Japan; 50 Missing

TOKYO • A typhoon caused deadly mudslides that buried people and destroyed homes on a Japanese island Wednesday before sweeping up the Pacific coast, grounding hundreds of flights and disrupt ing Tokyo's transportation during the morning rush. At least 17 deaths were reported and nearly 50 people were missing.

Hardest hit from Typhoon Wipha was Izu Oshima island, which is about 75 miles south of Tokyo. Rescuers found 16 bodies, most of them buried by mudslides, police and town officials said.

Dozens of homes were destroyed, and about 45 people were missing.

A woman from Tokyo died after falling into a river and being washed 6 miles downriver to Yokohama, police said. Two sixth-grade boys and another person were missing on Japan's main island, Honshu, the Fire and Disaster Management Agency said.

More than 350 homes were

damaged or destroyed, including 283 on Izu Oshima, it said.

The typhoon, which stayed offshore in the Pacific, had sustained winds of 78 miles per hour, with gusts up to 110 mph, before it was downgraded to a tropical storm Wednesday evening. The storm was moving northeast, off the northern Japanese island of Hokkaido.



Hirschfeld Exhibition Opens in New York City

NEW YORK (AP) • A new exhibition on caricaturist Al Hirschfeld begins with a video of Whoopi Goldberg talking about his wicked sense of humor.

Goldberg tells how Hirschfeld embedded the word "NI-NA" 40 times into a poster of her 1984 one-woman Broadway show after she complained of not being able to find the signature trademark he began inserting into his line drawings after the birth of his daughter Nina in 1945.

"The Line King's Library" opens at The New York Public Library for the Performing Arts at Lincoln Center on Thursday. The exhibition, on the 10th anniversary of Hirschfeld's death and 110 years since his birth, was compiled from the library's extensive collection of Hirschfeld material.

Hirschfeld, who died in 2003 at the age of 99, was celebrated for his linear calligraphic caricatures of theater, dance and film personalities. The drawings appeared on album covers, film posters, magazines and in *The New York Times* for 75 years.

Being "Hirschfelded" was "akin to getting a Tony we're going to make an exhibition from King Tut's tomb," Leopold said. "You know you're going to find gold in every drawer and every shelf and then you get to decide which gold is the best."

The exhibition also focuses on his influences, including Balinese shadow puppets that he saw while on a 10month trip to the Indonesian island in 1932. A painter at the time, Hirschfeld noticed how the bright Balinese sun bleached out all the color.

The exhibition is a crosssection of his well-known theater drawings and lesserknown works, such as his early movie and advertising posters, she said, adding: "It's fun to look at the kind of work that you don't always associate with Al Hirschfeld."








ON TARGET: YOUR WEEKLY HUNTING REPORT

We are now full swing into the Idaho hunting season. General and controlled hunts for deer are underway with hunters having much better success after the recent weather systems passed though southern Idaho. With recent snowfalls in the higher elevations, coupled with colder temperatures, hunters are seeing more game throughout the day.

The past week: Good numbers of deer were taken last week. Reports from Units 48 and 49 have been favorable, with a few incidental bears being seen by deer hunters. Hunters are still struggling a bit in the border Units 54, 55 and 47 seeing large bucks, but that should get better as the season continues.

Antelope: Antelope hunters are still having steady success, with a good number of exceptional trophies being taken this year. Elk: Elk season opened this week for general and controlled hunts. Units 54 and 47 generate some of the best elk trophies, not only in Idaho but in the entire West. The muzzleloader season in those units this year did not produce elk, so the rifle

Walleye Netting Probes Salmon Falls Fishery

ROGERSON • Scott Stanton steers a small motorboat into a cliff-lined corner of Salmon Falls Creek Reservoir — close enough to the southern end to hear the honking on Goose Island — and stops beside a buoy marked "scientific sampling gear."

As bio-aide Damian Hainer hauls up a long gill net, fish after fish flop into his tubs: trout, suckers, northern pikeminnows and finally the walleye these men are after.

"Be careful with him, because he's barely hanging and he's on small mesh," the regional fisheries biologist tells Hainer.

On shore at Greys Landing, south of Rogerson, wait the Idaho Department of Fish and Game colleagues who will measure, weigh and dissect each walleye caught in their six gill nets. This Oct. 8 research will provide data on the sport fishery's health and condition – data meant to compare Salmon Falls Creek Reservoir's walleye with fisheries elsewhere in the U.S. and Canada. Their standardized protocol: "fall walleye index netting."

Idaho walleye anglers asked for this monitoring. Almost a decade ago, they suspected overharvest and feared a collapse of the walleye fishery here — one of only three in Idaho.

So Doug Megargle, regional fisheries manager, initiated three years of baseline index netting at Salmon Falls Creek and Oakley reservoirs. (One immediate finding: The walleye were still plentiful at Salmon Falls. They just had plenty to eat that year and weren't biting for anglers.) Now, five years later, the fall walleye index netting is beginning its twice-adecade schedule at Salmon Falls.

Five years is long enough to forget.

"It's kind of like having a second kid: 'Oh, now I remember,'" says Regan Berkley, kneeling in the cold sand of Greys Landing with a small pick. She's freeing fish from a gill net.


...

As Stanton and Hainer return in the boat with more heavy tubs, Fish and Game workers spread long nets on the sand. Each with a net pick like Berkley's, they kneel in a line of bent backs. It's laborious work.

"We often get volunteers one year. Not so much the second year," Megargle says.

On the back of each pick is a "frustration blade," and the dozen pickers have Megargle's permission to use it.

The crew's numbered tubs track which sand-coated trout and suckers came from which randomly selected location in the reservoir. But walleye are counted and dropped into wet burlap sacks, to wait underwater at the reservoir's edge.

Among the pickers in waders and gloves is Lisa Lam, a seasonal employee of the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare. She'll take some of the walleye, when today's researchers finish with them, for Health and Welfare to test for mercury and other bio-accumulated substances.

The mercury cited in Health and Welfare's fish-consumption advisories builds up in the tissues of big fish that eat smaller fish in this reservoir. After they switch from eating insects and plankton, Salmon Falls walleye begin a diet of yellow perch, juvenile sucker, northern pikeminnow, spottail shiner, redside dace, crappie, juvenile walleye and stocked rainbow trout.

Fish and Game reservist Derek Thomas of Burley plucks a northern pikeminnow from the teeth-lined mouth of a walleye, and Megargle lays the pikeminnow on the walleye to compare their sizes. The eaten is half the length of the eater. state fisheries manager from Fish and Game's headquarters. He and Megargle talk quietly about the sizes of walleye they're seeing in the nets.

Anglers lately have reported catching smaller walleye, Megargle says. The explanation might be a big spawning year in 2009 or 2010, and fish of that age might be more abundant in the reservoir.

He's hoping to see most age years represented in this day's catch — one indication of a healthy fishery. Today's measurements also consider annual mortality, a fish's length at age, its condition (reasonable weight for length), proportion of males to females, age at sexual maturity, physical deformities and fat weight. Fat tells biologists something about the forage availability in Salmon Falls Creek Reservoir.

...

Idaho Walleye Unlimited is particularly interested in this data, to draw anglers to its tournaments on the reservoir.

Its classic, the Father's Day walleye tournament, attracts 40 to 60 boats, says club member David Keever of Twin Falls. He's at Greys Landing today to wait for the walleye not claimed by the Health and Welfare representative. Their destination: club coolers, then a fish feed.

The Father's Day tournament used to draw competitors from as far away as the Dakotas. But in harder economic times, most out-ofstaters are from Utah now, Keever says.

The local club uses its conservation budget from a national walleye federation to plant habitat in the reservoir — dead junipers, cabled together and anchored.

As Keever talks and the research crew folds empty nets, a chilling wind kicks up sand and whips a pair of tents. Gulls circle above Greys Landing. Fish and Game employee Jennifer Posey holds up a big walleye for her colleagues' camera phones.

"He's probably an original planter, back in 73," Keever says.

Fish and Game imported and released walleye in three Idaho reservoirs, the state's only sanctioned walleye fisheries. Fish and Game will do its fall walleye index netting next year on Oakley Reservoir, also called Goose Creek Reservoir. The third and less important walleye fishery is Oneida Reservoir near Pocatello.

Keever didn't know what walleye were when he moved to Twin Falls in 1974. He remembers a puzzled trout fisherman in the '70s bringing a walleye into Blue Lake Sporting Goods to get it identified.

Idaho anglers aren't puzzled anymore. "We quit eating trout when I got onto these a Please see WALLEYE, O2

ventional copper-jacketed lead core projectiles, it is their 100 percent homogenous copper TSX (triple shock X) and TTSX (tipped triple shock X) lines that are the belles of the ball.

Some have equaled their double-diameter expansion and near 100 percent weight retention, but none have surpassed the X bullets' lethality in our experience.

pulling coolers out of a truck beside the re-searchers' tents.

Treat walleye right and it tastes like lobster, adds club member Terry Reeves of Twin Falls.

. . .

Fisheries technician Joan Harding, the note taker of today's fall walleye index netting, needs to log 200 walleye in her field notebook with the yellow waterproof cover. Her penciled figures total only 172, so the men on the boat will reset two gill nets and the researchers will be back tomorrow.

But today's catch can't wait – at least not longer than it takes for Harding to feed the crew a lunch of pulled pork sandwiches on paper plates.

Stanton divides the crew into two teams: one for walleye, one for everything else.

In the non-walleye tent, regional wildlife biologist Brad Lowe lays one fish at a time into measuring trays manned by Berkley, another regional wildlife biologist, and Randy Smith, regional wildlife manager. Berkley and Smith announce species and lengths to Megargle, who types them into a handheld computer. "RBT 406" is a rainbow trout, in millimeters. "LSS 540" is a largescale sucker.

"They'll all be rounded anyway," Megargle says, getting a reaction – and laughter – from Smith and Berkley.

Smith has been killing his eyes trying to read millimeters, he says. But he keeps announcing exact measurements anyway: RBT 347. Chiselmouth chub 171.

As Lowe quickly empties tub after tub, Hainer's tubs fill. He's at Megargle's elbow, puncturing the air bladder of each sucker, trout or chub with a knife. It's a job descriptively dubbed "fizzing."

These non-walleye will be recycled – their carcasses dumped into the water to be eaten, returning their nutrients to the reservoir's ecosystem. The fizzing ensures they'll sink. Fish and Game doesn't want anglers reporting a fish kill.

. . .

Work in the walleye tent is slower and more deliberate. Blowing sand accumulates on the scales, and everyone squints as Stanton hands out the jobs.

Dillon washes the sand off each walleye in a bucket, measures its length and holds it in the weighing pan for Lam to lodge a tiny, numbered scrap of paper in the corner of its mouth. Sally Rose, a Fish and Game administrative assistant, reads off the walleye's weight for Harding, who records everything in a handheld computer.

Stanton takes the job he calls "crackin' backs."

He slits open each fish and piles the fat from its body cavity onto a paper plate on the scale in front of wildlife biologist Bruce Palmer. While teaching Rose how to determine walleye sex and maturity, Stanton extracts each walleye's gonads and skeins for a separate weighing.

Then Stanton does something more precise than it appears: With pliers, he cracks the walleye's spine at just the right point and pops open its head cavity to reveal the two otoliths. He picks out each tiny otolith with forceps and smears away its mucus

on the back of his glove.

Those bonelike plates from each walleye ear will be stored in vials for now. Later they'll be cut, sanded and examined under a high-resolution microscope to determine the fish's age. Scientists read otoliths like tree rings – one new ring a year.

Stanton's back cracking also reveals something that nobody measures but everybody respects: the walleye's teeth.

Translucent, sharp and numerous, they're the terror of Salmon Falls Creek Reservoir.

Crapo, Jim Risch and Rep. Raul Labrador opposed it.

Simpson acknowledged that his approval of the bill might be unpopular with some of his Idaho constituents, but he said the potential economic consequences of the congressional stalemate outweighed the politics of his decision.

"The easiest, most politically expedient thing for me to do would have been to vote no and protect my political right flank," Simpson said. "Doing so, however, would have been the wrong thing to do for my constituents and our economy." The eight-term congressman is facing a tea party challenger, Bryan Smith, in his 2014 re-election bid.

Simpson also said that the bill contains flaws, but it would prevent future unnecessary strain on Idaho's economy.

"This bill, while far from perfect, preserves the progress Republicans have made in reducing spending and moving toward a balanced budget," he said. "The fight over Obamacare may now move to another venue, but the fight is far from over. While I strongly believe we should continue working to delay the entire law for one year, I also tend to believe that Obamacare may collapse of its own weight. I

Moose hunting is closely regulated in Utah and limited to bulls. The season runs from Sept. 14 to Oct. 17 across a dozen hunting units, but none of the five moose was taken legally — one was a cow and another a calf. No tags were left with any of the moose.
