# Doctors Hired to Provide Inmate Care

T.F. County finds replacements after physician retires.

TWIN FALLS • Finding a doctor who is willing to go to jail for \$100 a day isn't easy.

It's a struggle Twin Falls County officials faced after Dr. Randy Slickers retired this summer, ending his 35 years of service as the county jail's physician. After struggling to find a replacement, the county hired two part-time physicians to share the duties of inmate care.

County officials say they keep health care costs down working with local medical provides, in-

stead of contracting with outside correctional health care providers. However, finding doctors willing to work with inmates at the jail that requires taking time away from their own practice is challenging, said County Commissioner Terry Kramer.

"They are not beating on the door to do this," Kramer said. "We have to seek them out."

Twin Falls doctors Joseph Ippolito and Rick Miranda will now serve as the county's physicians. They will take turns selecting days to be on call and visiting the inmates, said Lou Probasco, the jail's nursing director.

The physicians are paid \$100 a day when they are on duty.

Ippolito and Miranda did not return phone calls when contacted by the Times-News for com-

Probasco oversees a staff of two registered nurses, two licensed practical nurses and one medical assistance. Along with a physician, the jail also contracts with a

## Kimberly **Schools Enrollment Sees** Unprecedented Increase

**Growth outpaces** numbers in Twin Falls.

KIMBERLY • Kimberly School District is experiencing a never-before seen boost in students enrollment.

The district has 1,690 students this year, a two-year gain of 220 new students, or 8 percent.

It's growth that outpaces even the neighboring Twin Falls School District, which has had an 8 percent increase in the past over that time pe-

The most growth has been in the middle school. Two years ago the Kimberly Middle School had 330 students. Now there are 410 students, an increase of more than 20 percent.

Luke Schroeder, superintendent of Kimberly School District, said it has hired two half-time paraprofessionals and an additional seventh grade teacher. The district is now on the last year of a \$600,000 supplemental levy approved in 2011 by voters.

"We have all the data since 1991. The trend since then was whenever we had a year of five percent growth or higher it was usually followed by a negative or very little growth," Schroeder said. "This is not typical. We've never had more than five percent two years in a row."


Other schools in the Magic Valley are also seeing similar jumps in student population.

In September, the Twin Falls School District's board approved a \$1.4 million emergency levy to hire 10 paraeducators, one part-time kindergarten teacher and to pay for additional curriculum and supplies. At the time of the decision, the district had grown by 726 students over the past two years, including 376 more students this year.

The district has 8,633 students, gaining 41 students since the school year began.

Wiley Dobbs predicted that number will only continue to grow, after it was announced Thursday that Clif Bar will expand to Twin Falls. About 250 full-time jobs are expected to be created and if the market conditions allow, that number could swell to 450, company officials said.

# A Veteran's Sacrifices

### 60 Years Later, Man Gets Medal for Service

TWIN FALLS • Korean War and World War II disabled combat veteran Abb Richie of Wendell does not remember the details of his military service from more than a decade of fighting.

He doesn't remember being a teenage Marine Corps infantryman in the Pacific Theatre.

The details of how Richie trained soldiers to use rockets against the enemy during the Korean War are hazy.

But what is certain: the amount of love, support and gratitude a cheering room full of family and friends had for Richie at a ceremony Sunday in Twin Falls, honoring the 87-year-old's sacrifices between 1943 and 1954.

What was slated to be a routine district VFW meeting between state veteran affairs officials and local VFW reps, became one of the most memorable days in Richie's military career.

# Richfield Man Dies after Crashing ATV into Pickup Truck

RICHFIELD • Donald Riley, 92, of Richfield, was driving a Kawasaki Mule ATV eastbound on 720 North, crossed Highway 26 and crashed head-on with a 2005 Ford F-150, said Keith Thompson, Idaho State Police sergeant.

Riley was found dead at the scene around 2:30 p.m. Sunday, Thompson said.

Juan Linares Nava, 19, of Richfield, was driving the Ford southbound on US-26 and was not injured, Thompson said.

Both lanes of traffic on U.S. 26 were blocked for about two and a half hours, ISP reported.

"The ATV failed to yield. The guy (Riley) wasn't wearing a helmet or anything like that. It appeared he tried to turn northbound on U.S. 26," Thompson said. "I talked to the driver of the F-150. He tried to avoid the guy but didn't swerve far enough."

The crash happened about a mile south of Richfield, at milepost 181, near where 720 North and 1150 East merge, Thompson said.

The man driving the truck was not under the inof alcohol, fluence Thompson said.

Riley's family has been notified.

# Drone Might Help Find Woman Missing at Craters of Moon

BOISE (AP) • Officials at Craters of the Moon National Monument in south-central Idaho are requesting an unmanned military drone to find a woman missing since Sept.

Monument Superintendent Dan Buckley tells the *Idaho Statesman* the drone would snap high-resolution photos that could be examined for signs of 63year-old Jo Elliott-Blakeslee.

Elliott-Blakeslee's hiking partner, 69-year-old Amy Linkert, was found dead in the monument on Sept. 25. The women were

# Twin Falls Resident Enjoys Life of a Professional BASE Jumper

TWIN FALLS • Sean Chuma said his dream a long time ago was "being able to travel around the world, jump off of things and get paid for it."

Now, he's living his dream. The Twin Falls resident is one of a handful of people around the world who get paid to BASE jump.

He does it by teaching BASE jumping lessons, attending BASE jumping festivals in the U.S. and abroad, doing BASE jumping and skydiving demonstrations, and participating in filming for commercials or television shows.

And he started a company, Tandem BASE, a few years ago. He provides tandem BASE jumps from the Perrine Bridge, where customers are harnessed to the front of an experienced i nstructor.

Chuma, 34, moved to Twin Falls seven years ago from San Diego, Calif.

He was in Malaysia for a couple of weeks from September to early October. In total, he completed about 75 jumps at two separate events, he said.

Chuma kicked off his Malaysian trip in the island town of Sibu.

He took Rudy Anoi, Sibu executive of the Sarawak Tourism Board, on a tandem BASE jump from a nearly 400-foot-tall building.

"It's a pretty big building for them," Chuma said about the Sanyan Building,

which is located in the town

It was the world's first tandem BASE jump off a building, Chuma said.

Then, he continued on to the KL Tower International Jump in late September in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia. Chuma described the Kuala Lumpur Tower – which is more than 1,000 feet tall as being similar to the Space Needle in Seattle. But it's much taller.

Jumpers must have completed more than 120 BASE jumps and have at least two years of experience to be considered for the KL Tower International Jump.

Chuma is one of the most skilled aerials BASE jumpers in the world, event organizer Gary Cunningham wrote in an email to the Times-News.

"It was really great to have him at the event this year," Cunningham wrote, adding that Chuma shared his knowledge and offered ad-

vice to participants. Back in the United States, Chuma participated in Bridge Day on Saturday in Fayetteville, W.Va. For customers, it cost about \$1,000 to go on a tandem BASE jump with Chuma.

And on Sunday, he did a wingsuit demonstration at a car show and expo in Pomona, Calif.

Once he returns home to Twin Falls, he'll be here long enough to teach a four-day BASE jumping class.

Then, he leaves again in early November - this time, for Amsterdam, where he'll instruct a BASE jumping aerials class.

"We teach people about body awareness as it applies to BASE jumping," Chuma

After two weeks in Amsterdam, he'll continue to travel the world for more events and demonstrations and more of living his dream of being a professional BASE jumper.

# T.F. Council Members to Consider Speed Zone

TWIN FALLS • The unposted speed limit along Minidoka Avenue may finally get a speed zone.

The Twin Falls City Council will consider posting a 35-mph speed zone at Minidoka Ave. from Shoshone Street to Second Ave. South during tonight's meeting.

The road currently does not have a speed limit posted, meaning drivers must drive 25 mph, under local law.

Mayor Greg Lanting requested city engineers to study the road in June. After studying five years of data, city staff concluded drivers could safely travel 35 mph.

The council will also approving consider \$3.5 million to Performance Systems Inc. for the city's wastewater treatment plant dewatering improvement project. The project began in 2011 when the city received judicial confirmation to borrow funds to rehabilitate the aging dewatering ...... Attend the Meeting

system at the city's wastewater treatment plant.

In 2013, the council awarded a pre-selection bid for two belt presses to be included in the dewatering improvement design.

City voters backed a special bond election in May to fund additional improvements and expand the plant, which included an installation of a third belt press.

Using the rest of the judicial confirmation funds along with some of the bond, the city agreed that it would be cheaper to install all three presses at once.

Finally, the council will consider waiving a permit process for the expansion of a non-conforming building at 539 Briarcliff Drive.

# Man Pleads Guilty to Shooting Golfer who Hit Home

RENO, Nev. (AP) • A Nevada man accused of shooting a golfer who broke a window at his home with an errant ball has pleaded guilty to a felony charge.

Jeff Fleming of Reno entered the plea to battery with a deadly weapon on Thursday in Washoe County District Court. He faces from probation to 10 years in prison and a \$10,000 fine when he's sentenced Dec. 12.

The golfer was unable to find his ball and was doing a drop shot on the 16th hole of the Lakeridge Golf Course in September 2012 when Fleming approached and fired a single shot at him with a shotgun, prosecutors said. The golfer was treated for minor injuries to an arm and both legs at a hospital.

Deputy District Attorney Sean Neahusan said neighbors along the golf course were stunned as it's common for stray golf balls to hit their homes.

"Live on a golf course and you got to expect your house to get hit every once in a while," he told The Associated Press. "This (shooting) is one of those stories that you just can't make it up." Neahusan said he's unshooting and referred queries about Fleming's mental state to his lawyer, Larry Dunn.

Dunn did not immediately return phone calls.



### **Utah Issues** Record Number of Concealed **Gun Permits**

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)

Utah is issuing a record-number of concealed gun permits this year, spurred by a spike in applications in early 2013 that state officials believe was triggered by mass shootings across the country last year and talk of more gun control measures.

Utah has already issued more concealed gun permits this year than any of the previous nine years, show state figures from the Utah Bureau of Criminal Identification. They expect to issue more than 135,000 by the end of the year \_up from an average of about 75,000 the previous four years.

The spike in applications began in January when they doubled from the previous month. It continued for the next three months when more than 18,000 applications each month more than double the monthly totals from the same time the year before. Only a tiny percentage of applicants are denied.

"We had bins and bins of applications during those three months," said Alice Moffat, chief of the Bureau of Criminal Identification told a Utah legislative committee this

Moffat believes the mass shootings in 2012\_ at Colorado movie theater in July and a Connecticut elementary school in December\_and the talk of possible gun control measures spurred people from around country to seek out Utah's concealed

weapons permit. "We feel that's why we got those numbers there," said Moffat this week, while adding, "And then there was the talk of gun control and that seems to spur people getting their concealed firearm per-

About two-thirds of the permits Utah has issued since 1994 have been to resident from other states. In 2011 and 2012, about eight in 10 concealed weapons permits went to out-of-staters.

Thirty-five other states recognize conceal weapons permits issued in Utah, Moffat said.

Adam Eaton, co-owner of Joe Firearms in Sandy, Utah, told the Deseret News that he also see his business pick up when the public believes gun control laws could change. His store sold 200 so far this year, up from 50 the year before.

# Online Game Cited in Severing of Parental Rights in Idaho Case

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) • A woman who lost parental rights to her three children due to her addiction to an online role playing game has had her request to regain parental rights rejected by the Idaho Court of Appeals.

The Coeur d'Alene Press reported in a story on Sunday the Court of Appeals upheld a northern Idaho First District Court judge's decision.

Police in December 2010 responded to a noise complaint and found problems, including one child with severe tooth decay. The woman is referred to as "Jane Doe" in court document.

"There was insufficient food in the home and an unsecured butcher knife was found on the floor next to a children's toy," the ruling by the Court of Appeals says. "In addition to observing conditions which the police believed endangered the children, police heard from Doe's children that she was playing video games rather than caring for them."

The woman, authorities said, chose to play "World of Warcraft" six to eight hours a day instead of taking care of her children. Police said she spent so much time online that she didn't take breaks to check on her children.

"Rather, she chose to play with groups of other players who depended upon her maintaining a sufficient level of attention to the game in order to meet group objectives," the ruling states.

Before the district court severed her parental rights, the woman had the opportunity to keep her children by following a plan that involved meeting with a specialist in video game addiction and complete various evaluations.

Court records said the woman complied at first, but then refused treatment and opted instead for faith-based counseling at her church. Authorities said that counseling didn't meet the requirements for her to maintain her parental rights.

# 2 Indicted on Sex Trafficking Charges in Las Vegas

LAS VEGAS (AP) • Two people have been indicted on sex trafficking charges related to three teenage girls in Las Vegas.

# Study: 15 Percent of UŠ Youth out of School, Work

WASHINGTON (AP) • Almost 6 million young people are neither in school nor working, according to a study released Monday.

That's almost 15 percent of those aged 16 to 24 who have neither desk nor job, according to The Opportunity Nation coalition, which wrote the report.

Other studies have shown that idle young adults are missing out on a window to build skills they will need later in life or use the knowledge they acquired in college. Without those experiences, they are less likely to command higher salaries and more likely to be an economic drain on their communi-

"This is not a group that we can write off. They just need a chance," said Mark Edwards, executive director of the coalition of businesses, advocacy groups, policy wonks and nonprofit organizations dedicated to increasing economic mobility. "The tendency is to see them as lost souls and see them as unsavable. They are not."

# Wilderness Designation Eyed for Montana Peaks

**HERON, Mont. (AP)** • In the often-divisive arena of wilderness policy, the Scotchman Peaks straddle many boundaries.

The scenic mountain range between the Clark Fork and Bull rivers has more geopolitical lines dotting its map than a United Nations seating chart. About 20,000 of Scotchman's 88,000 roadless acres lie in the Panhandle National Forest on the Idaho side of the border. The Kootenai National Forest in Montana has the rest. Three counties in two states have jurisdiction of the

The Friends of Scotchman Peaks hope to change that. In the process, they hope to reframe the wilderness debate in the United States.

"We're wondering can we do this? Can we identify a place as an inspiring, appealing candidate for wilderness and make it go?" asked Doug Ferrell, a Trout Creek construction designer and founding member of Friends of Scotchman Peaks. "A lot of the wilderness community is wondering if we can pass a true wilderness bill anymore. Scotchman is a great candidate. It's rugged, wellsupported and needs protection."

The 135-square-mile area has a major copper/silver mine on its eastern border, whose owners publicly support its wilderness qualities. All three county commissions have backed it, and members of Idaho's Republican congressional delegation and Montana's Democratic senators have backed it. Nevertheless, it hasn't yet made it into any draft legislation.

"What's enlightening is how much we have in common," said Philip Hough, a Friends of Scotchman member from Sandpoint, Idaho. "We live here for the same reasons they live here. We don't want the timber industry to go away."

Latent political inertia still makes it productive to frame arguments "wilderness vs. timber," Hough said. But a bigger divide may lie within the old "wilderness" community, as it tries to accommodate mountain bikers who want to ride into roadless areas and old-school activists who won't support new protections that include concessions to industry.

Ferrell also sits on the board of the Montana Wilderness Association. The organization has drawn criticism from former allies who accuse it of selling out the movement by pushing for Montana Democratic Sen. Jon Tester's Forest Jobs and Recreation Act a bill that designates 660,000 acres of new wilderness (not including the Scotchmans), but also mandates annual logging and thinning work on national forests.

Some of those opponents, such as the Alliance for the Wild Rockies, regularly challenge the Forest Service in court over presumed failures to protect threatened animals and landscapes.

"I think all the litigation is killing the positive image of conservation in the public mind," Ferrell said. "Around 10 years ago, some people started thinking there had to be a better way. Wildland protection wasn't a threat to getting the cut

# Mont. County Officials See Huge Increase in Child Abuse, Neglect Cases

MISSOULA, Mont. (AP) • The number of child neglect and abuse cases in Missoula County has more than

tripled since 2011. The Missoula Office of the Public Defender says there has been a total of 357 open child neglect and abuse cases in fiscal year 2013.

Officials told the Missoulian that's up from 283 open cases in 2012 and 95 open cases in 2011.

Regional Deputy Public Defender Dave Stenerson says the increase is denting the agency's financial resources and overwhelming staff.

"It's been a big drain on our organization statewide for the last two or three years," Stenerson said.

The public defender's office in 2013 spent more than \$700,000 on child neglect and abuse cases, adding up to nearly 17 percent of the total amount spent by the

Officials said the office is required to hire outside attorneys to represent all the individuals in each case. That means the mother and father have separate attorneys. Sometimes children

may also need an attorney.

Stenerson said child neglect cases weren't considered in the budget when the public defender's office became a statewide agency in 2006.

"Every two years, we go back and say, 'Look this wasn't included in the original budget, we need more money and we need more people," Stenerson said. "The Legislature looks at it and says, 'Well, if we increase your agency by this percentage, then it's going to look bad like we are growing government:"

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# Concerns Mount for Health of Eastern Snake River Plain Aquifer

REXBURG (AP) • Beneath the soil of eastern Idaho is one of its greatest assets: The Eastern Snake River Plain Aquifer.

One of the largest in the Northwest, the aquifer curves south from Ashton to Twin Falls, then west to Hagerman. The water flow is the size of Lake Erie, with an estimated volume of 200 billion cubic feet, according to the Idaho Water Resource Board.

The resource was a major catalyst in turning the region from a high-tundra desert to acres of farmland. For more than a century, it has provided water to growers, fish farms and eastern and southern Idaho communities.

But it's shrinking at a steadily increasing pace, according to a study by the U.S. Geological Survey released in

While there remains more than enough water in the short-term, state and national water experts estimate that unless action is taken, the aquifer could reach dangerous lows within several decades, threatening agriculture and Idaho communities.

"One of the biggest problems we have — that most people don't realize - is that municipal wells are not going to be able to handle increased population growth," said state Rep. Dell Raybould, R-Rexburg. "We have to have more surface storage to recharge the aquifer and cover that increased need (from) municipalities."

Raybould, a longtime water advocate, sits on the House Resource and Conservation Committee.

"Currently, it is nearly impossible to get a well water permit from the state. But unless they give us more water permits, we'll run out of water."

The aquifer's continued decline has come into sharper focus this year because of an extended drought.

This spring, the Idaho Water Resource Board and local canal companies could only spare some 3,600 acre-feet of excess water to recharge the aquifer, said Brian Patton, state bureau chief of the

One acre-foot of water is enough to fill half of an Olympic-sized swimming

That's a far cry from the average 100,000 acre-feet of water the partnership has poured into the aquifer annually since 2009.

But even during good recharge years, the amount of water returning to the aquifer is less than half of the average 214,000 acre-feet that has been lost from storage annually since 1952, Patton said.

Aquifer recharge and the effects of groundwater depletion is a frequent discussion in the Legislature. But what is less talked about is how aquifer depletion will affect rapidly growing cities.

One of the fastest growing communities in eastern Idaho is Rexburg, where city officials already are experiencing an overused aquifer.

The last time Rexburg expanded its groundwater usage was in 1991, when the city had a population of about 12,000. Today, with a population exceeding 30,000, Rexburg, on hot July days, expends all of its allocated pumped water and 3 million gallons of its 4.25 million gallon surface storage in a single day. Within 18 months, city officials expect growth of about 5,000 peo-

"The volume we can maintain on a peak day is less and less each year, and when our tanks go down, we are immediately out of water," Public Works Director John Millar said.

The answer is to pump more water, but that requires obtaining a new water right from the Idaho Water Resource Board, something that since the early 1990s has been difficult. Rexburg applied three years ago and is still waiting.

"Currently, it is nearly impossible to get a well water permit from the state," Mayor Richard Woodland said. "But unless they give us more water permits, we'll run out of water."

The problem is twofold. First, the board has upheld a moratorium on issuing new water rights in the Snake River Basin since 1992 in an effort to limit the depletion of the aquifer, as well as protect the rights of senior water users, according to board

The other issue is downstream, where growers and irrigators are concerned issuing additional groundwater rights will limit their ground and surface water. A group of Twin Falls canal companies, called the Sur-Water Coalition, protested Rexburg's request, resulting in several years of negotiation.

The issue was resolved after Rexburg developed a mitigation plan, which was met with the coalition's approval.

By law, Rexburg would be required to mitigate any new water taken from the aquifer, either through diverting its surface water rights downstream or participating in managed aquifer recharge and returning the water underground.

Despite the resolution, Rexburg is still not approved.

The issue, according to Lynn Tominaga, executive director of Idaho Ground Water Appropriators, is that both Rexburg and southern cities such as Twin Falls have senior water rights. Between the two cities, however, are many users with junior water rights, who may use the water before it gets to Twin Falls, despite its senior water right.

Tominaga suggested Rexburg purchase an established water right from an Upper Valley farmer, to avoid infringing on the water rights of downstream users. But that process is far more expensive because the city would have to purchase the land attached to the water right.

# Feds to Listen to Audio in SF Bay Area Rail Deaths

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) • The commuter train that struck and killed two San Francisco Bay Area transit workers didn't have a front-facing recorder, but interviews, inspections, audio recordings and camera footage from the train's cab should provide enough evidence to determine a cause, a federal investigator said Sun-

Jim Southworth, the Na-Transportation tional Safety Board's railroad accident investigator-incharge, confirmed that Saturday's accident involved a Bay Area Rapid Transit train that wasn't carrying any passengers because of the labor strike that has shut down the system since Friday.

But whether the work stoppage by members of the system's two largest unions or the way BART management deployed non-striking workers during the shutdown played a role in the fatalities will not be known for weeks or months, Southworth said.

"My concern coming out here, as it is for every investigation, is to find out what happened, to gather the facts," he said. "Whether the strike plays a role in that I can't say at this time."

BART officials said on Sunday that they could no

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longer discuss the accident because of the ongoing NTSB investigation.

BART's assistant general manager has said that the four-car train with several employees aboard was returning from a routine maintenance trip and was being run in automatic mode under computer control when it struck the workers who were inspecting a section of track in the East Bay city of Walnut Creek.

Neither BART nor the county coroner has released the names and ages of the victims\_one a BART employee and the other a contractor. They were the sixth and seventh workers to die on the job in the system's 41-year history.

Southworth said it is too early to know how fast the train was going or if workers saw or heard it coming. He and a colleague hope to interview the person who was operating the train and BART dispatchers as soon as Monday.

Even if the strike ended immediately, the ongoing investigation at the collision site means it would probably take a few days before trains could run on those specific tracks, he said.

"These accidents occur in an instant, but they take very long to investigate," he said.

# Mother Antonia, Lauded for Work with Prisoners, Dies

Mary Clarke grew up in the luxury of Beverly Hills, Calif., where movie stars, such as William Powell, Hedy Lamarr and Dinah Shore, were among her neighbors. She spent weekends at a roomy beach house overlooking the Pacific and once had closets filled with mink coats and ball gowns.

She was married two times, raised seven children and managed her father's office-supply business after his death. In the midst of this busy life, she devoted more and more time to charity, which she considered a crucial part of her Catholic faith.

In 1965, she accompanied a priest on a mission to deliver medicine and other supplies to Tijuana, Mexico. After several other stops, they ended up at the gate of one of the country's most notorious prisons, a state penitentiary called La Mesa. The warden invited them inside to drop off their donations at the infirmary.

She began to visit the prison more often, attending to the needs of the inmates, guards and police, and the transformation of Mary Clarke Brenner had begun. In 1977, when most of her children were grown,

she moved to La Mesa.

Although she had no formal religious training, she sewed her own nun's habit and slept in a bunk in the women's wing of the prison. She later lived for years in a 10-by-10-foot cell, with the walls painted pink.

She made it her vocation to attend to the needs of some of the most destitute and dangerous people in Mexico. She brought them medicine, bedding, clothing and food. She invited doctors and dentists from California to provide medical care. She worked with Mexican officials to improve conditions in La Mesa and other prisons.

When she walked through the halls, prisoners kissed her hand, and she kissed theirs. Notorious criminals confessed to her and pledged to change their lives.

In Tijuana and throughout all of Mexico, she was known as "Madre Antonia" Mother Antonia.

She received the blessings of a Mexican bishop of the Catholic Church, was greeted by Pope John Paul II and was commended by Mexican President Vicente Fox. She went on to found a religious order for older women seeking to help the

# Former First Lady of Yugoslavia Dies

• Jovanka Broz, who was married to Yugoslavia's dictator, Josip Broz Tito, for nearly 30 years but lived in isolation as the federation he had built broke apart,

died Sunday. She was 88.
Broz died of heart failure at Belgrade's emergency hospital, where she had been receiving care since August, said Zlatibor Loncar, its director.

"With Broz's death, we are left without one of the last most reliable witnesses of our former country's history," Prime Minister Ivica Dacic of Serbia said in a message of condolence.

Tito led the Partisan communist resistance movement that fought the Nazi occupiers of Yugoslavia during World War II. He first met Broz when she fought in the first female brigade of the guerrilla group.

After the war, Tito, an ethnic Croat, took power and ruled the multiethnic federation of Yugoslavia with a heavy hand. But he also kept close relations with the West and gave Yugoslavia's citizens liberties such as free travel that were not allowed in other communist nations at the time.

After Tito came to power, Broz, an ethnic Serb, was assigned to work with the communist leader. They began a relationship and married in 1952. Over the

next two decades, Broz accompanied Tito during his many international trips and at meetings with foreign leaders and celebrities, including British royals, U.S. President Richard Nixon and Hollywood stars.

The couple started having problems and drifted apart in the 1970s.

Tito died in 1980, and the six-member federation fell apart in early 1990s in a series of ethnic conflicts. Seven independent nations emerged after warfare that left about 100,000 people dead and millions homeless.

Following Tito's death,

his successors accused Broz of ambitions to take over the country and placed her under house arrest. Broz said she was kicked out of her residence, which was ransacked and her personal belongings impounded. Later, as Tito's personality cult crumbled and his once-glorified role in Yugoslavia's history came under scrutiny, Broz mostly remained in isolation.

In a rare interview in 2001, she told the *Blic* newspaper that she lived in a Belgrade house without heating and often no electricity, and that she had no income or property to sup-

port herself.

"I'm totally deprived of any rights," Broz said at the time.

She did not hold valid Serbian identity documents until 2009, when a prodemocracy Serbian government moved to improve her status.

On Sunday, Serbian premier Dacic said in his message that "unfortunately the historic injustice has just started to be undone at the end of her life." He said his government supports burying Broz at the same complex where Tito's tomb is located in a residential area of Belgrade.

# Former Washington Football Coach James Dies

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SEATTLE (AP) • Don James, the longtime University of Washington football coach who led the Huskies to a share of the national championship in 1991, died Sunday. He was 80.

The university said James died at his home from the effects of pancreatic cancer. He had been receiving treatment for the disease since late September.

James was 176-78-3 as a head coach at Kent State and Washington. He went 153-58-2 with the Huskies from 1975-92 and led the school to a six-pack of Rose Bowl appearances. His crowning moment came in 1991 when Washington had the most dominant defense in the country, and beat Michigan in the Rose Bowl to finish 12-

gave the nod to Washington.

James played quarterback at the Miami (Fla.), graduating in 1954 with a degree in education.

He was an unknown when he arrived in Seattle in 1975, taking over for Jim Owens. He came from Kent State, where he led the Golden Flashes to the Mid-American Conference title in 1972. While at Kent State, James coached future Hall of Famer Jack Lambert and future college coaches Nick Saban and Gary Pinkel.

"(I) can't tell him how much we appreciate all that he's done for us and our career. So, thanks," Saban said in September after learning of James' illness.

It didn't take long for Washington to become a contender. The Huskies went 6-5 in his first year. By 1977, led by quarterback Warren Moon, they beat Michigan in the Rose Bowl. It was the first of James' six Rose Bowl trips, topped by the 34-14 win over Michigan in 1991.

James gave his annual preseason speech to the current Washington squad in August and attending the first game at the renovated Husky Stadium on Aug. 31 against Boise State. It was shortly after that his health took a significant turn.

James had two surgical procedures in September at Virginia Mason Medical Center for what was called a gastro-intestinal issue. James' family issued a statement after the surgeries announcing that he was resting comfortable following the hospital stay but would be beginning chemotherapy treatment for a malignant tumor on his pancreas and asked for privacy.

"Coach James set the standard for this program and for all of us. It's the reason you all are sitting here. It's the reason I'm here," Washington coach Steve Sarkisian said recently. "Husky football and what it all stands for is what he created..."

# Politicians say Shutdown not to be Repeated, but Alterative Elusive

WASHINGTON (AP) • Leaders from both parties insist a sequel to the government shutdown must be avoided although a plan to dodge it is still elusive.

"This can never happen again," Treasury Secretary Jacob Lew said.

Added Senate Republican Leader Mitch Mc-Connell: "There'll not be another government shutdown, you can count on

The 16-day partial shutdown ended last week although a possible repeat may be on the horizon. Lawmakers approved a budget that keeps the lights on through Jan. 15 and lets Treasury continue to pay its bills through Feb. 7.

That's not to say there is a solution at hand, and no one is rushing forward with alternatives to a potential repeat of the gridlock that shuttered parts of government and pushed the nation toward a default on its debt. The political price has been high ahead of 2014's midterm elections, especially for Republicans.

"I think there was some ground lost from the political point of view," said former Florida Gov. Jeb Bush, a potential 2016 presiden-

tial contender for the GOP. Democratic House Leader Nancy Pelosi of California reiterated the public's reaction to the partisan gamesmanship that played out over more than two weeks: "I join the American people in their disgust at what happened in terms of the shutdown of government."

But there's no real way forward to dodge a repeat and its chief architect, Republican Sen. Ted of Cruz, is urging one. Hundreds of thousands of government workers were sent home amid the shutdown and national parks were barricaded while politicians negotiated. The whole situation could be repeated combined with economic consequences \_ early next year, perhaps with more severe consequences.

"The deal this week was a lousy deal for the American people," Cruz said.

It's not ideal, but no one has a tangible way to avoid

"We just went through an awful period for our country," said Sen. Lindsey Graham, R-S.C.

A standoff between President Barack Obama and a group of Republicans over spending for the budget year beginning Oct. 1 and defunding the nation's health care overhaul led to the shutdown. Lawmakers also pushed the country to the edge of economic default by threatening the Treasury Department's authority to continue borrowing the money needed to pay the nation's

# Confusion over Longdelayed Syria Conference

**BEIRUT (AP)** • Reflecting confusion in efforts to convene an international conference to end Syria's civil war, the Arab League chief announced on Sunday that talks will take place next month in Geneva, only to have the U.N. envoy flatly

deny a date has been set. The bizarre diplomatic two-step between Arab League chief Nabil Elaraby and the U.N. envoy for Syria, Lakhdar Brahimi, at a joint news conference added to the uncertainty surrounding the proposed peace talks. A decision over whether the long-delayed negotiations will happen at all could come at a meeting of the Syrian opposition early next month that will focus on whether to sit down with President Bashar Assad's regime.

The United States and Russia, who support opposing sides in the conflict that has killed more than 100,000 people, have been trying for months to bring the Damascus government and Syria's divided opposition to the table for a peace conference. But with the war deadlocked, neither the regime nor the rebels showed any interest in compromise, forcing the meeting to be repeatedly postponed.

Even now, it remains unclear whether either side is willing to negotiate.

The main Westernbacked opposition umbrella group, the Syrian National Coalition, is scheduled to meet Nov. 1-2 in Istanbul to decide whether to take part in the proposed Geneva conference.

# Republicans Open New Line of Attack on Obamacare

WASHINGTON (AP) •

"Obamacare" escaped unharmed from the government shutdown Republicans hoped would stop it, but just as quickly they have opened a new line of attack - one handed to them by the administration itself.

While Congress was arguing, President Barack Obama's plan to expand coverage for the uninsured suffered a self-inflicted wound. A computer system seemingly designed by gremlins gummed up the first open enrollment season. After nearly three weeks, it's still not fixed.

Republicans hope to ride that and other defects they see in the law into the 2014 congressional elections. Four Democratic senators are facing re-election for the first time since they voted for the Affordable Care Act, and their defeat is critical to GOP aspirations for a Senate majority.

Democrats say that's just more wishful thinking, if not

obsession. Although Obama's law remains divisive, only 29 percent of the public favors its complete repeal, according to a recent Gallup poll. The business-oriented wing of the Republican party wants to move on to other issues. Americans may be growing weary of the health care

"This is the law of the land at this point," said Michael Weaver, a self-employed photographer from rural southern Illinois who's been uninsured for about a year. "We need to stop the arguing and move forward to make it

work." It took him about a week and half, but Weaver kept going back to the healthcare.gov website until he was able to open an account and apply for a tax credit that will reduce his premiums. He's not completely finished because he hasn't selected an insurance plan, but he's been able to browse options.

It beats providing page after page of personal health information to insurance companies, Weaver said.

Under the new law, insurers have to accept people with health problems. Weaver is in his mid-50s, with high blood pressure and high cholesterol, but otherwise in good health. He says those common conditions made it hard for him to get coverage before.

Although Weaver seems to have gotten past the major website obstacles, he's still finding shortcomings. There's no place to type in his medications and find out what plans cover them. "I wish there was more detail, so you could really figure it out," he said.

Such a nuanced critique appears to be lost on con-

gressional Republicans. "#TrainWreck: Skyrocketing Prices, Blank Screens,

& Error Messages," screamed the headline on a press release Friday from House Speaker John Boehner, R-Ohio. A House hearing on the "botched Obamacare rollout" is scheduled for this coming week. GOP lawmakers want Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius to resign.

Administration officials, in their most detailed accounting yet of the early rollout, said Saturday that about 476,000 health insurance applications have been filed through federal and state exchanges. But the officials continue to refuse say how many people have enrolled in the insurance

markets. Without enrollment figures, it's unclear whether the program is on track to reach the 7 million people projecting by the Congressional Budget Office to gain coverage during the six-month sign-up period.

Republicans are intent on making the health law an uncomfortable anchor around the neck of four Democratic senators seeking re-election in GOP-leaning states, weighing them down as they try to unseat them. Republicans need to gain six seats to seize the majority in the Senate, and any formula for control includes flipping the four seats.

Sens. Mark Pryor of Arkansas, Mary Landrieu of Louisiana, Mark Begich of Alaska and Kay Hagan of North Carolina will be facing voters for the first time since they were among the 60 Democrats who voted for the health law in 2009.

More than a year before the election, Republican Rep. Tom Cotton is airing an ad that criticizes Pryor for his vote, telling Arkansans that Pryor "cast the deciding vote to make you live under Obamacare." The commercial's final image shows Pryor with Obama, who took a drubbing in Arkansas last

"The bottom line is these candidates will have to answer for why they voted for this bill," said Rob Engstrom, senior vice president and national political director for the U.S. Chamber of Com-

If the website gets fixed, other problems may emerge. Republicans can still try linking 'Obamacare' to rising premiums, anemic job growth and broader economic worries.

Will the strategy work?

The chamber spent millions on ads in 2012 criticizing Senate incumbents such as Jon Tester of Montana and Bill Nelson of Florida for their health care votes, yet many of those candidates overcame the criticism and won re-election.

The economy, not health care, remains the top concern of voters. By putting opposition to the health care law ahead of all other priorities, economist Douglas Holtz-Eakin says tea-party conservatives may have overdone it.

### For Obama, a Frustrating **Health Care** Rollout

Last week, President Barack Obama gathered some of his top advisers in the Oval Office to discuss the problem-plagued rollout of his health care legislation. He told his team the administration had to own up to the fact that there were no excuses for not having the health care website ready to operate on Day One.

The admonition from a frustrated president came amid the embarrassing start to sign-ups for the health care insurance exchanges. The president is expected to address the cascade of computer problems Monday during an

event at the White House. Administration officials say more than 476,000 health insurance applications have been filed through federal and state exchanges. The figures mark the most detailed measure yet of the problem-plagued rollout of the insurance market place.

However, the officials continue to refuse to say how many people have actually enrolled in the insurance markets. And without enrollment figures, it's unclear whether the program is on track to reach the 7 million people projected by the Congressional Budget Office to gain coverage during the six-month signup period.

The first three weeks of sign-ups have been marred by a cascade of computer problems, which the administration says it is working around the clock to correct. The rough rollout has been a black eye for Obama, who invested significant time and political capital in getting the law passed during his first

The officials said technology experts from inside and outside the government are being brought in to work on the glitches, though they did not say how many workers were being added.

Officials did say staffing has been increased at call centers by about 50 percent. As problems persist on the federally run website, the administration is encouraging more people to sign up for insurance over the phone.

The officials would not discuss the health insurance rollout by name and were granted anonymity.

Despite the widespread problems, the White House has yet to fully explain what went wrong with the online system consumers were supposed to use to sign up for coverage.








# Gap Grows Between Simpson, Labrador

he setup to Idaho politics 2014, on the congressional level, hardly could be more clear after the Oct. 16 round of votes ending (for now) the federal government shutdown and the threat of federal debt default, not just because of the congressional votes but because of the markers it set.

Both of Idaho's senators were in the small group (about one-fifth of the Senate) who opposed the bill ending the shutdown, but in their chamber it was too small a group to much affect the outcome. Most Senate Republicans voted in favor.

The House was different. There, the crisis-ending bill passed with only a minority of Republicans plus all the Democrats; most House Republicans voted against. And unlike the Republicans in the delegations of Washington (all voting in favor) or Oregon (voting against), Idaho's two House members split their votes. Raul Labrador of the first district voted against, and Mike Simpson of the second in favor.

This expands the gap between the two (Labrador has declined to back Simpson in his primary contest), and could point up contrasting



types of races.

Simpson's press release immediately after the vote got right into that, acknowledging explicitly (this is actually unusual) the politics of the vote. The second paragraph said, "While acknowledging his vote in favor of the bill might be unpopular with some of his constituents, Simpson said the potential economic consequences of continued stalemate outweighed any political consideration."

In the next paragraph: "The easiest, most politically expedient thing for me to do would have been to vote NO and protect my political right flank. Doing so, however, would have been the wrong thing to do for my constituents and our economy. My vote today was about the thousands of people facing layoffs at INL, the multitude of businesses across Idaho that have told me their livelihoods are at stake, and the millions of folks across the country who can't afford the devastating impacts of default on their investments and retirements. There has to be a way to address our nation's fiscal problems without making them worse in the process."

There's his campaign argument for next year.

It's gutsier than it first seems, because here's what Simpson is implicitly saying about the other three members of the Idaho delegation: That they did the wrong thing for their constituents, that they cast aside the people whose lives and livelihoods were at stake, that they would make the nation's future worse by their actions. It's quite a critique, but implicit in any self-defense Simpson would offer.

The statement in Labrador's release that most nearly serves as a counterpoint says this: "Like nearly all of my colleagues, I promised my constituents in 2010 and 2012 that I would fight Obamacare – not just cast symbolic, meaningless votes but work hard to roll it back whenever and wherever possible. I also promised that I would oppose raising the debt ceiling without meaningful cuts to government spending." The reference to politics here was implicit, but just as clear.

Simpson's "right flank" already is alive with a serious primary challenge, in the form of Idaho Falls attorney Bryan Smith, newly boosted last week with endorsements from Republican state legislators. Simpson is keenly aware that his vote would make that contest all the hotter.

And Labrador? He has a Democratic challenger, but within the Republican Party primary only a university student is challenging him. If there's a substantial group of first district Republicans who think Simpson rather than Labrador had the right approach here, their window to mount a serious challenge won't be open much longer. If a serious primary candidate from the direction of the center does surface, the mirror-image races in the two districts next year would make for quite a spectacle.

# Land Board Has No Business Competing with Private Sector

orgive me if I don't take a lot of comfort in the Land Board's decision a few days ago to reject a plan to exchange 69 cottage sites on Priest and Payette lakes for \$25.5 million in commercial property. The Land Board's decision is great.

But the underlying problem remains: Our government, for all its hooting and hollering about supporting conservative values, can't help but be an integral, if unwelcome, part of the marketplace. Heck, the state of Idaho owns commercial real estate throughout Idaho, including a storage business, and has poured tons of money into a downtown Boise bar. The state wants desperately to

acquire more land.

I'll be convinced the
Land Board—which includes the governor, secretary of state, superintendent of public instruction, controller and attorney general—are sincere
when the board swears off
the notion that it's OK for
the government to own
business enterprises. It

hasn't done so to date. The Department of Lands wanted to swap the cottage site properties for commercial buildings in Idaho Falls and an office building in Nampa. The agency said the land trades would mean more money for Idaho's public schools. But critics, me included, have argued that purchases would take the property off the tax rolls, resulting in added pressure on other taxpayers to make up the loss in revenue.

Other criticism involves whether the appraisals for the building being swapped were on the up and up. And that seems to be where the Land Board choked on the deal.

The Department of Lands has not backed away from its belief that engagement in the marketplace—being a landlord and business owner—is not a bad thing. Printed on all the department's land swap documents are these words: "The state will not undercut the commercial real estate

market with its rental rates because the IDL must charge market driven rents. Like state endowment owned forestlands that compete with privately owned lands in the sale of timber, the IDL must charge a market price for the use of the as-

It's that kind of warped thinking that gets us in trouble, and should terrify anyone in business. The government—the state government, lauded for its sense of conservatism-believes that by charging "market-driven rates" that it will not undercut its competitors. So, as long as the state charges the same prices for automobiles, hotel rooms and cans of beans—the state can enter any line of business without harm to the private sector, whether they are car dealers, hoteliers or grocers. That's clearly a bucket of bull.

If government participation in parts of the economy is good for Idaho and its schoolchildren, clearly we should be doing more of it. Considerably more. The state is only limited by its availability of money and imagination. Of imagination, the government has plenty, including the concept that the state's ownership of commercial real estate isn't truly "government ownership," it's "endowment" or "trust" ownership. Those be two separate things, don't ya know.

Such impaired thinking makes me believe the land exchange proposal in due time will be back before the Land Board. The appraisals will be validated, and our so-called conservative executive branch officials will dive in. Idaho businesses will lose, taxpayers will lose and another vestige of free market capitalism will be destroyed, right here in "conservative" Idaho.



# Argentines Blame Health Woes on Agrochemicals

# Country booms agriculturally, but chemical misuse prevalent.

BASAVILBASO, Argentina

• Argentine farmworker Fabian Tomasi was never trained to handle pesticides. His job was to keep the crop-dusters flying by filling their tanks as quickly as possible, although it often meant getting drenched in poison.

Now, at 47, he's a living skeleton, so weak he can hardly leave his house in Entre Rios province.

Schoolteacher Andrea Druetta lives in Santa Fe Province, the heart of Argentina's soy country, where agrochemical spraying is banned within 550 yards of populated areas. But soy is planted just 33 yards from her back door. Her boys were showered in chemicals recently while swimming in the backyard pool.

After Sofia Gatica lost her newborn to kidney failure, she filed a complaint that led to Argentina's first criminal convictions for illegal spraying. But last year's verdict came too late for many of her 5,300 neighbors in Ituzaingo Annex. A government study there found alarming levels of agrochemical contamination in the soil and drinking water, and 80 percent of the children surveyed carried traces of pesticide in their blood.

American biotechnology has turned Argentina into the world's third-largest soybean producer, but the chemicals powering the boom aren't confined to soy and cotton and corn fields.

The Associated Press documented dozens of cases around the country where poisons are applied in ways unanticipated by regulatory science or specifically banned by existing law. The spray drifts into schools and homes and settles over water sources; farmworkers mix poisons with no protective gear; villagers store water in pesticide containers that should have been destroyed.

Now doctors are warning that uncontrolled pesticide applications could be the cause of growing health problems among the 12 million people who live in the South American nation's vast farm belt.

In Santa Fe, cancer rates are two times to four times higher than the national average. In Chaco, birth defects quadrupled in the decade after biotechnology dramatically expanded farming in Argentina.

"The change in how agriculture is produced has brought, frankly, a change in the profile of diseases," says Dr. Medardo Avila Vazquez, a pediatrician and neonatologist who co-founded Doctors of Fumigated Towns,

"I think we have to publicize the commitment that Argentina has to being a food producer. Our model as an exporting nation has been called into question. We need to defend our model."

In a written statement, Monsanto spokesman Thomas Helscher said the company "does not condone the misuse of pesticides or the violation of any pesticide law, regulation, or court ruling."

"Monsanto takes the stewardship of products seriously and we communicate regularly with our customers regarding proper use of our products," Helscher said.

# Officials: Cyanide Killed Potential Bulger Witness

**BOSTON** • The Massachusetts medical examiner's office determined that cyanide poisoning killed an alleged extortion victim of Boston gangster James "Whitey" Bulger who had hoped to testify at Bulger's trial, prosecutors said Sunday.

The medical examiner's office concluded that Stephen Rakes, 59, of Quincy, died of acute cyanide toxicity in July and ruled his death a homicide, according to MaryBeth Long, a spokeswoman for the Middlesex district attorney's office.

Authorities said Rakes' death wasn't related to the Bulger case.

Rakes' business associate, William Camuti, 69, of Sudbury, is charged with attempted murder and other crimes for allegedly poisoning Rakes' iced coffee. Camuti has pleaded not guilty.

Prosecutors said Camuti owed Rakes money and lured him to a meeting where he poisoned his drink then drove Rakes around for hours before dumping his body.

Long said the district attorney's office intends to file additional charges against Camuti based on the new findings by the medical examiner.

A phone message for Camuti's attorney, Stanley Norkunas, was not immediately returned Sunday.

### **Hurricane Raymond Threatens** Soaked Mexico Coast

MEXICO CITY • Newly formed Hurricane Raymond strengthened rapidly Sunday night as it swirled toward Mexico's southern Pacific coast, an area already devastated by rains and mudslides from Tropical Storm Manuel

The U.S. National Hurricane Center predicted Raymond would take a sharp westward turn and head out to sea before reaching land, but warned that the Category 2 storm still might get as close as 50 miles, bringing the threat of heavy and possibly dangerous rains. The center said the storm was expected to strengthen more over the

In a region where 10,000 people were still living away from their homes one month after Manuel caused widespread flooding and left landslide risks, officials hurried to get emergency teams in place and weighed possible further evacuations.

Mexican authorities pinned their hopes on a cold front moving from the north that could help force Raymond to turn away from the coast, said the head of Mexico's National Water Commission, David Korenfeld.

# Officials Grill Recaptured Prisoners

PANAMA CITY BEACH, Fla. (AP) • Back in custody after using forged documents to escape their life sentences, two convicted killers were being grilled on Sunday by law enforcement authorities who said they expect to make more arrests in a case that has given both court and corrections officials in Florida a black eye.

Among the questions being posed to Joseph Jenkins and Charles Walker: Who forged the papers? Who helped you run from police? What other prisoners have gotten away with this? Who was coming from Atlanta to whisk you out of

"I can tell you, there will be more arrests," Florida Department of Law Enforcement Commissioner Gerald Bailey told a news conference Sunday, hours after Jenkins and Walker, both 34, were arrested without incident at a motel in Panama City.

"We will be backtracking to those who helped carry out this fraud and along the way we will be looking closely at anyone who may have helped harbor these fugitives," Bailey said.

Jenkins and Walker, both 34, were captured Saturday night at the Coconut Grove Motor Inn in Panama City Beach, a touristy area of putt-putt courses and gokart tracks. Hours earlier, their families had held a news conference in Orlando - 350 miles away urging them to surrender.

The men, who had fled the Orlando area after word of their ruse became public, did not know law enforcement was on the way to Panama City. They were waiting in the motel for someone to arrive from Atlanta to take them out of state, Bailey said, adding that authorities don't yet know who that person was or where the convicts planned to go. The Florida Department of Law Enforcement is working with Georgia authorities to an-

Bailey's department is pursuing a tip that someone was offering to forge documents for prisoners for \$8,000. He said there are at least two other recent cases where prisoners were thwarted trying to use fake documents to escape.

"The documents themselves looked good, they looked official," Bailey said, although they contained the signatures of people who normally don't deal with release documents, something that maybe should have raised questions, he said.

Meanwhile, Corrections Secretary Michael Crews scheduled a meeting with court clerks on Monday to find ways to prevent future escapes through bogus documents.

# MCMURRAY WINS AT TALLADEGA

TALLADEGA, Ala. (AP) • Everyone expects the big one to happen at Talladega Superspeedway.

For some reason, it never occurred Sunday.

Oh sure, there was a wreck on the final lap, which allowed Jamie McMurray to coast to the victory under caution.

But by the standards of this place, it was about as clean as

"Once you get toward the end, it usually gets more intense and everybody starts taking bigger risks," McMurray said. "I was listening to my spotter and he would say, 'A line is forming, but it's not very organized and they're not making up any ground? I'm really surprised they couldn't put something together to make more of a run. I'm shocked by that, actually. I thought guys would take bigger chances at the end."

McMurray won for the first time in the NASCAR Sprint Cup Series since 2010, snapping a 108-race winless streak, and didn't even have to worry about a planned lastlap charge from Dale Earnhardt Jr. after Dillon spun coming out of the second

The only other driver collected in the crash was Casey Mears, who slammed into Dillon's car and sent it flying into the air before it came back down upright. Everyone was

"I was trying to go for the win there," said Dillon, who was filling in for injured Tony Stewart in the No. 14 car and competing in just his 12th Sprint Cup race. "A wild ride. I just have to thank NASCAR for everything they have done for safety. That hit was fine. I got to drive the car back" to the garage, though he settled for 26th after going to the final lap in third.

A race known for massive crashes was essentially trouble free. There was a minor wreck early on when Marcos Ambrose got loose in front of the main grandstand and took out Juan Pablo Montoya, and 103 consecutive laps under green until the vellow and checkered flags waved together at the end.

Earnhardt settled for second, followed by Ricky Stenhouse Jr., Paul Menard and Kyle Busch.

"For some reason," Earnhardt said, "it was a lot calmer the last few laps."

"I guess if we're in that situation next time," Earnhardt said with a shrug, "we'll try to go a lap sooner."

Johnson wound up leading 47 laps, Earnhardt 38 and Kenseth 32.

McMurray led only one lap until he got to the front with 15 to go. He held that spot the rest of the way, showing again his knack for restrictor-plate racing. He has won twice each at Daytona and Talladega, accounting for more than half of

his seven career victories. Three drivers — Johnson, Earnhardt and Kenseth dominated the race until Mc-Murray claimed the top spot after the final round of pit stops began with 25 laps to go. The typical Talladega pack — 25 cars running within 3 seconds of each other - formed at the front and began plotting ways to make a move without causing the massive wreck that always seems to occur at the 2.66-mile trioval.

There was a bit of two and three-wide jockeying before the leaders lined up single file, settling in for what turned out to be a relatively comfortable ride to the finish for McMurray.

Even if the caution had not come out, Earnhardt wasn't sure if he had enough momentum to pass the leader.

### Earnhardt Settles for Another 2nd at Talladega

TALLADEGA, Ala. (AP) — Dale Earnhardt Jr.'s initial reaction to another runner-up finish is a smile and the feeling that second's not so bad.

The what-ifs don't really play through his mind until later, when he ponders everything he might have done differently to finish that one tantalizing spot higher.

Earnhardt had to settle for his fourth second-place finish this year Sunday at Talladega Superspeedway when Jamie McMurray captured the victory in a race finished under caution after a last-lap

# Indy Capitalizes on Denver Miscues for 39-33 Win

Manning sacked four times as Broncos lose for first time.

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) • Andrew Luck and the Colts ruined Peyton Manning's return to Indianapolis and handed the Denver Broncos

their first loss of the season. Luck, who replaced Manning as quarterback of the Colts, threw for 228 yards and three touchdowns, ran for another score and didn't even need a fourth-quarter comeback to end Denver's 17-game regular-season streak with a 39-33 victory

Sunday night. While Luck was terrific in prime time, completing 21 of 38 passes, his predecessor was not himself. Manning finished 29 of 49 for 386 yards with three TDs, one interception and was sacked four times, leaving the Kansas City Chiefs as the NFL's only unbeaten team.

Passes sailed high, passes fluttered and the man who usually escapes trouble with his quick thinking and quick release was sacked twice and lost a fumble near the goal line. Robert Mathis, one of the few holdovers from the Manning Era, got one of his trademark strip sacks in the second quarter – a mistake that led to nine points for Indianapolis (5-2).

"This is a game we need to learn from," Manning said. "We, I guess, had four turnovers and still somehow had a chance to win that game. I certainly would have liked to have seen it go to a 2point game down at the end, but we never got there. We certainly have to improve because we weren't as sharp execution-wise as we would like to be."

The offense that was on a record scoring pace and seemed virtually unstoppable over the first six weeks managed only two first-half touchdowns and opened the third quarter with three straight three-and-outs.

Kick returner Trindon Holliday twice fumbled the ball, with one leading to an Indianapolis touchdown, and the defense of the Broncos (6-1) that spent nearly three-fourths of the season playing with the lead came unglued in the third quarter with penalty after penalty aiding Colts drives.

It was not the evening Manning had planned after making the long journey

### Colts Fete Manning Pregame

If Peyton Manning wanted a preview of what retirement might look and feel like, the Indianapolis Colts gave him a brief glimpse Sunday night.

That ceremony turned out to be about the only bit of hospitality his former team extended, handing Manning and the previously unbeaten Denver Broncos a 39-33 de-

Before the game, though, it was a different story. More than 67,000 Colts fans got to their feet before kickoff to salute the player who brought the city a Super Bowl and more during his 14 years here.

What began as boos for the Broncos quickly turned to cheers once Manning was spotted coming out of the tunnel. The roar inside Lucas Oil Stadium — built in no small part thanks to Manning's contributions to the Colts' franchise — built steadily for much of a 90-second highlight reel of Manning's career in Indianapolis.

The 37-year-old quarterback acknowledged the cheers while standing along the visitors' sideline. He took off his helmet and turned to face the different sections, grinning sheepishly and waving on occasion.

back to Lucas Oil Stadium, the retractable-roof house he helped build by turning the Colts from an afterthought into a perennial powerhouse.

But then this was no typical game.

The weekend's marquee matchup was the NFL's most anticipated homecoming since Brett Favre went back to Green Bay with the dreaded Minnesota Vikings — in 2009.

Manning, long a fan favorite in Indianapolis, had hoped to join Favre as the only quarterbacks to beat all 32 NFL teams and he received a warm welcome.

When Manning first ran onto the field, some sections in the lower bowl looked like a checkerboard of Colts blue

and Broncos orange. They roared for No. 18 throughout a 90-second video tribute featuring some of his most memorable moments with the Colts including the record-breaking pass to Marvin Harrison for most TDs by a quarterback-receiver duo, the AFC championship comeback against New England and, of course, the evening when he finally hoisted the Lombardi Trophy in rainy Miami.

It was a far cry from this week's big controversy spurred by the recent comments by Colts owner Jim Irsay saying he regretted the Colts won only one Super

Bowl under Manning. Manning responded to the standing ovation by stopping his warm-up throws, taking off his helmet, waving to the fans and mouthing the words "Thank you."

The large video screen then cut to a fan holding a sign that that read "Thanks Peyton But Tonight I'm A Colts Fan."

"I hope we get a chance to play these guys and maybe if there is a next time, it might be a little easier because it certainly was an emotionally draining week, there's no doubt about that," Manning

Indianapolis took advantage of Holliday's fumbled punt return, Mathis' sack that resulted in a safety and a 20-yard TD pass from Luck to Stanley Havili on the ensuing drive to take a 26-14 lead.

"That's my job, that's how I help my team," Mathis said. "It felt good."

Luck padded the lead with a 10-yard scramble for a score in the third quarter to make 33-14.

Then Manning tried to work his old magic in his old stomping grounds. After the teams traded field goals, he threw a touchdown pass to Demaryius Thomas early in the fourth to make it 36-23 and the Broncos got within 36-30 on Knowshon Moreno's 1-yard TD run after the Colts lost a fumble.

But Manning's lone interception with 6:59 to go set up Adam Vinatieri with the sealing field goal.

Indianapolis, which lost Monday night at San Diego, has not dropped two straight since Luck arrived.





I'm scared our relationship isn't as strong as I thought. My son deserves a family, but it's falling apart. What should



I suspect many of my readers have never tried to make a contract on a squeeze — especially one where the count has not been rectified (an arcane way of saying that a trick still has to be lost after the squeeze has bitten). It is time to rectify that position.

In today's deal South has done well to avoid making the weak spade suit trump, and instead has to play the hand in six clubs, against which West leads the heart queen.

With 11 top tricks, South should see no reason to delay drawing trumps. After this, he might feel a need to improve his chances of a potential squeeze by conceding an early spade trick. Clearly he must lose one spade trick whatever he does, and it is almost always easier to execute a squeeze if you need the rest of the tricks, rather than the rest but one.

However, closer analysis should reveal the futility of ducking a spade, since if given the lead, East or West can play another heart and thus remove the last entry to dummy. So, instead, after playing the two top spades to ascertain that the suit will not break, South plays off all his remaining trumps.

In the four-card ending, West is down to two spades and two hearts, as is dummy. But what does West pitch on the diamond ace? If a heart, dummy's nine is good. If a spade, declarer pitches the heart nine from dummy and sets up the long spade.

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


