Culver's Restaurant Hopes to Hire 60 in T.F.

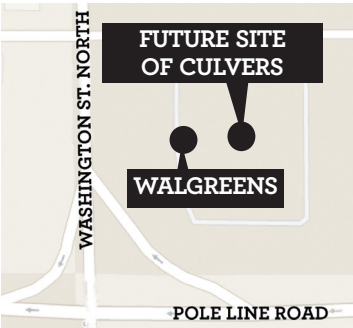
TWIN FALLS • Wisconsin-based cheese curd and frozen custard restaurant chain Culver's has its sights on Twin Falls. When it opens this spring next to Walgreens, at the intersection of Washington Avenue and Pole Line

Road, franchiser Eugene Smith said he will hire between 55 and 60 employees. "That's a good chunk of employment for Twin Falls," said Melinda Anderson, city economic development director. "They'll certainly have visibility on Pole Line. ...The city's reaction is very positive. It will be a great fit to this area."

Culver's is known for its Wisconsin-made frozen custard, Butter Burgers and cheddar cheese curds. "Our fresh, frozen custard is a premium ice cream that we make fresh throughout the day and it's served fresh," Smith said. "The Butter Burger is made with never-frozen beef. The crown of the bun

is lightly buttered and toasted and made to order." Custard is similar to ice cream, Smith said, but is creamier. "Ice cream has to be frozen, chilled to below zero," he said. "The temperature of custard is around 20 degrees and has a difference in texture"

Missing Hiker's Body Recovered at Craters of the Moon

ARCO • The body of a hiker missing since September was recovered Tuesday evening at Craters of the Moon National Monument, officials at the monument announced. Park rangers spotted the body of Dr. Jodean "Jo" Elliott-Blakeslee from a helicopter northwest of the Tree Molds Trail, about a mile from the site where searchers found the body of her hiking companion, Amelia "Amy" Linkert, on Sept. 25. Elliott-Blakeslee had been seen last on Sept. 19. She is believed to have headed out from the Tree Molds trailhead for a short

hike without food, water or protective clothing. She was reported missing Sept. 24, and the search began that day. Elliott-Blakeslee, 63, worked as a physician in the Boise area. Linkert, 69, was retired from the Meridian School District. "We hope that this will bring closure to her family, friends and all those who have been involved in the search," Park Superintendent Dan Buckley said in a Wednesday news release.

Buhl Father Testifies in Injured Infant Case

Verdict expected today.

TWIN FALLS • A father accused of squeezing his infant daughter until she stopped breathing testified in court Wednesday. Cory Karlinsey, 31, of Buhl, was charged with felony injury to a child in the May 3 case.

The jury began deliberating Wednesday but went home after about two hours. Jurors are expected to begin deliberating again this morning. The Idaho Department of Health and Welfare had contacted Buhl police May 9, requesting they investigate a possible attempted strangulation of a baby a week earlier. St. Luke's

Gooding Mayoral Candidates Address Need for Growth

GOODING • Four Gooding mayoral candidates shared their thoughts during a forum Tuesday night on how to attract businesses and address the city's water issues.

Mayor Walter Nelson faces three challengers Nov. 5: Alfred Eichholz, Enos (Paul) Waddoups and Jennifer Wheeler. More than 60 people attended the candidate forum at Gooding High School, submitting questions to the candidates.

Nelson, a retired banker and financial adviser, said he is a lifelong Gooding resident who raised four children here. He was appointed mayor in September to replace William Duke Morton, who died in June. Morton, 71, had been mayor since 2006.

Nelson said he wants people who drive into Gooding to have a good impression of the city. If re-elected, he said, he will address the building code and clean up the city, including its weeds. Eichholz said he decided to run for mayor at the funeral for his

friend Morton, who was doing a good job. Residents need a mayor who will listen, he said. Eichholz said he's not afraid to get dirty and will repair a sidewalk himself, if needed.

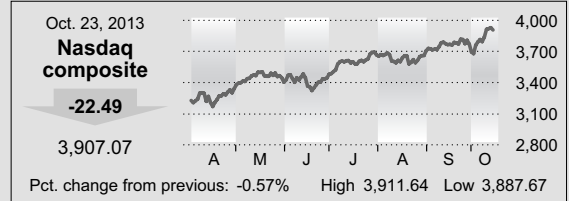
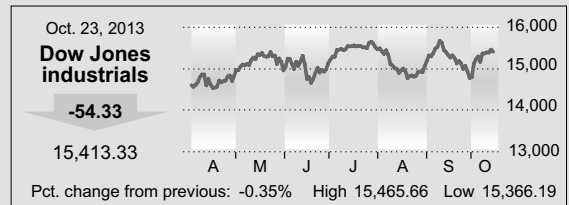

THE MARKET AT A GLANCE

S&P 500 Index Falls after Four Days of Record Closes

NEW YORK (AP) • A four-day streak of record closes ended for the Standard & Poor's 500 index Wednesday after Caterpillar reported weak earnings and falling oil prices hurt energy stocks.

Caterpillar, which makes mining and construction equipment, is considered an important barometer of the global economy. The plunge in Caterpillar's third-quarter profit discouraged investors and stalled a two-week surge in the stock market. Energy stocks dropped as the price of oil fell to its lowest in almost four months.

Preparing for Winter Weather Part Two

Winter Weather Awareness week across the Pacific Northwest, including Idaho, continues the rest of this week.

Earlier, we addressed some dangers of being exposed to the elements, how to stay safe and to know the forecast and any weather warnings or advisories before you go. But what are the common warnings and advisories we may encounter across Southern Idaho.

All warnings, watches and advisories are issued by the local National Weather Service offices out of Boise for the western Magic Valley, including the counties of Gooding, Jerome and Twin Falls. For the eastern Magic Valley and Wood River region, the National Weather Service in Pocatello will issue advisories for Lincoln, Cassia, Minidoka, Blaine and all counties in the eastern part of the state. Once winter warnings or advisories are



issued, it is the job of the media and the Weather Authority team to get that information to the public.

Typically, winter storms are forecast days in advance. If a storm looks as if it could cause widespread travel problems or hazardous conditions, a winter storm watch will be issued. Once the storm starts to develop and shows more of what it can do, then a watch will be upgraded to either a winter weather advisory or a winter storm warning.

A winter weather advisory means the storm will be more of a nuisance than a real hazard or danger. Accidents can and will happen during a winter weather advisory, but it typically means winter conditions are possible and could cause minor problems.

If the storm looks more severe, then either a winter storm warning or, in the worst case, a blizzard warning will be issued. During the week of Nov. 3-7, the Weather Authority team will take a closer look at winter preparedness and will release our winter weather outlook.

Incomplete Recipe

An incomplete recipe for kuchen, traditional German coffee cake, was published Wednesday. Here is the missing part of the recipe written by Darlene Moser of Acequia:

Heat gently until the mixture thickens. Cut off a chunk of dough big enough to spread in the bottom of a pie pan. Smooth it across the bottom and halfway up the sides. Open a quart of home-canned or store-bought apricots, sweetened to taste, and pour onto the dough. Spoon a thin layer of custard over the top. (Optional: Sprinkle cinnamon on top.) Bake at 350 degrees for about 20 minutes or until cooked through and lightly browned.

Third University of Idaho
Presidential Finalist Visits T.F.

TWIN FALLS • University of Idaho presidential finalist James Applegate met with community members and extension faculty Wednesday in Twin Falls.

Applegate recently left his position as vice president of the Indiana-based Lumina Foundation, which works to increase the proportion of Americans with high-quality, college-level learning. He credited his five years there with helping him understand the “big picture” of education, including international experience.


Applegate said he is very passionate about education and excited for the opportunity to lead the University of Idaho.

He said land grant universities succeed when they treat the whole state as their campus. The role of the university’s extensions is to figure out the community’s needs, and the university’s role is to cater to those needs, Applegate said.

more valuable today than it has ever been,” he said, “but we are not yet managing to get that education to those who need it.”

The University of Idaho’s enrollment dropped by nearly 5.2 percent over the past year, from 12,493 to 11,844.

Applegate said he would boost that number by tapping into various “markets,” such as community colleges, non-traditional K-12 students and maintaining students already at the university.

Asked what a successful athletic program means to him, he said it’s one that builds alumni commitment, attracts donors and students, and graduates athletes.

Asked about his background with agriculture, Applegate said he does not have deep experience but would work closely with the dean of agriculture and extension staff.

Twin Falls Man and 5 Others
Injured in Ambulance-Car Crash

INDIAN VALLEY • Six people, including a Twin Falls man, were taken to the hospital Tuesday after a car crashed head-on into an ambulance on U.S. 95, the Idaho State Police reported.

Charles Penninger, 66, of Council, was driving the ambulance southbound on U.S. 95 near Indian Valley at 1:19 p.m., transporting a patient to Weiser Memorial Hospital. Two EMTs were helping the patient in the back of the ambulance.

Samuel McCartney, 36, of Twin Falls, was driving northbound in a 98 Mitsubishi Eclipse. The vehicle in front of McCartney yielded to the oncoming ambulance, which had on its emergency lights. McCartney braked and swerved into the southbound lane to avoid rear-ending the vehicle and instead hit the ambulance head-on, the

State Police reported.

Penninger and the patient in the ambulance were transported by ground ambulance to Weiser Memorial hospital. The EMTs, Sandra Sova, 62, of Mesa, and Jonathon Dickinson, 70, of Council, were flown to St. Alphonsus in Boise. The EMTs were not wearing

seatbelts, but all others in the crash were.

McCartney and his passenger, Heather Hetzel, 37, of Boise, were transported to Weiser Memorial by personal vehicle.

Both lanes of travel were closed for about five hours. ISP continues to investigate the crash.

If elected, he said, he will talk with residents to gauge the priority issues.

Wheeler, who has owned a business for 29 years, said she loves Gooding and, “I really want to hear what you (residents) want to say.”

If elected, Wheeler said, she will create a town Facebook page, put a phone in her house to be more accessible and go out into the community.

She also said she’d meet with department heads to find out what they want.

“I want to continue what Gooding’s tradition has always been – family and community,” she said.

Asked Wednesday about her two misdemeanor convictions for driving under the influence, Wheeler said those occurred during a difficult period when she was going through divorces and financial difficulties.

She said she’s very sorry for “horrible choices I made.” Wheeler said she learned from those experiences and is proud of how she evolved. “It’s never going to happen again; I know that,” she said.

In 2003, she was convicted by a jury of misdemeanor DUI. A withheld judgment was entered, but the paperwork wasn’t filed, according to Gooding County Magistrate Court. Wheeler paid \$313.50 in fines and was ordered to one year of probation but was discharged early, court records show.

In 2009, Wheeler again was found guilty of misde-

meanor DUI. She paid \$535.30 in fines, was ordered to complete one year of probation and had a temporarily restricted driving permit, court records show.

In 2005, she was found guilty of a misdemeanor false report to 911. She paid \$172.50 in fines and was ordered to six months of probation.

During the forum, Waddoups said, “I’ve lived here for 50 years, and all I’ve seen is Gooding go downhill.”

He said he wants new businesses and updated ordinances, as some have been on the books since the 1940s.

If elected, Waddoups said, he’d implement monthly town hall meetings to take residents’ suggestions and help them stay informed, and he would meet with all the city departments to get informed.

Waddoups was convicted in 2002 of misdemeanor petit theft, according to Gooding County Magistrate Court records.

He told the Times-News

that he went to King’s to get medicine, picked up a can of paint, forgot he was holding it and accidentally walked out of the store with it. Waddoups completed three months of probation and paid \$272.50 in fines, online court records show.

Candidates at the forum also addressed the \$5 million ballot measure to update the city’s 70-year-old irrigation system.

City officials had sought approval to take on \$9.45 million in long-term debt for the project, but a District Court judge ruled in February that Gooding must seek voter approval.

Waddoups said the project is essential, but the Nov. 5 ballot proposal doesn’t address the whole issue.

The city “let our irrigation system go to crap,” he said.

Nelson said the city was looking at a few options for the system, but bringing the bond to voters is the best solution.

Eichholz said the bond election is the only way to go. The water system now is “patched with bubble gum and rubber, pretty much,” he said.

Wheeler said no one wants their water bill to go up, but if a bond issue isn’t passed now, improvements will only cost more later.

“Without water, we all leave,” she said. “There’s nothing left.”

Audience members also asked about luring new businesses and shopping locally.

Waddoups said he’d get with bigger companies and wants to see a Walmart in

town.

Wheeler said education is the key. When parents take their children shopping in Twin Falls, the children don’t learn to shop locally.

She said teaching children to start their own businesses in town is better than bringing in a Walmart.

“When you shop in Twin, you rob our town,” Wheeler said.

Eichholz agreed, saying, “There are a lot of good shops here in town.” He questioned whether residents save money by driving to Twin Falls to shop. He said he lives on a small disability check and still can afford to shop in Gooding.

Vacant lots near the Maverik gas station would be a good place to put small businesses, he said, “but how’s that going to help downtown?”

Later, Eichholz said the city needs a big company that will hire 200 to 250 people.

Waddoups said he wants to see more small businesses. Elderly residents on a fixed income find it especially hard to shop locally, he said.

Nelson said people need to support existing businesses, and the city needs to attract more businesses appropriate for Gooding.

“A Walmart would be great, but it’s not going to happen here in Gooding,” he said, and neither is a large company such as Chobani.

The town needs “mom-and-pop stores,” Nelson said, and if each hired five to 10 people, that would be great.

Magic Valley Medical Center had alerted Health and Welfare, a police report says.

The 10-month-old’s mother had taken the infant to a clinic May 4 because she had tiny red dots (petechia) on her face.

The mother, Jessica Karlinsey, testified Wednesday that as she was rushing out the door to the clinic, her husband was upset and having a harder time than usual saying what happened.

“He said, ‘Last night I squeezed her,’” Jessica testified. “I couldn’t pull anything else out of him because he was so upset.”

Under cross-examination, deputy prosecutor Rosemary Emory asked Jessica about a statement she’d made to her husband in the recorded police interview.

“You asked Cory, ‘But after the other two times you squeezed the kids, you said you wouldn’t again. What makes this one different?’”

Jessica said her husband never denied squeezing their other two children.

After more discussion with her husband, Jessica testified, she believed he didn’t intend to hurt their daughter, and the things he told police weren’t the whole story.

Buhl police Officer Bill Deetz testified Tuesday that Karlinsey said he had spinal meningitis as a child and a seizure disorder that resulted in a “dead spot” in his brain behind his eyes, making it hard for him to articulate his thoughts.

Karlinsey testified that he had been worried in May about finances, car trouble and problems at work. Jessica asked him to help their baby get to sleep and went to bed early.

Karlinsey testified that he got the baby a bottle and set her on his knee. The baby was crying, but the sound was just “background noise,” he said, and wasn’t angering him.

He said he broke through his fog of worried thoughts when he realized the baby had stopped crying.

“Was there a point when you realized you’d been squeezing?” Nelson asked.

No, Karlinsey said, he just realized something was wrong when he looked down at the baby and began trying to help her.

At the time, Karlinsey told police, his daughter had stopped breathing. Wednesday on the stand, he said he wasn’t sure.

“I looked down at her body, and I assumed the worst,” he said.

Karlinsey said he didn’t know he was squeezing the

baby, didn’t intend to harm her and hadn’t been trying to quiet her.

Under cross-examination, deputy prosecutor Rosemary Emory asked Karlinsey how long he’d spent preparing his testimony.

“I don’t do the same thing twice,” Karlinsey said repeatedly.

Practicing his testimony wouldn’t have helped, he said, though he did go over the events

repeatedly asked Karlinsey why his court testimony differed from what he told police.

“I was feeling anxious,” he said. “I didn’t know how to give them the right answer.”

“Wouldn’t the right answer have been the truth?” Emory asked.

“Yes,” Karlinsey said.

Karlinsey’s story to his wife also changed from what he said on the stand, Emory said.

“I fumbled over my words and, with a chance to explain myself, I am clarifying those words,” he said. “I’m trying to clear things up.”

During questioning by Nelson, Karlinsey said his disability makes it difficult for him to articulate his thoughts.

“It’s hard for me to explain myself to other people,” he said.

Karlinsey said he often thinks he’s said something clearly, but the point doesn’t get across, causing him to feel anxious and frustrated.

“It’s not what I said; it’s not what they understood; it’s not what I meant to say,” he said.

Jessica testified that her husband misses certain social cues and has a hard time explaining things.

In his closing argument, Nelson said Karlinsey’s court version of events augmented but didn’t totally contradict what he said in May.

Karlinsey never intended to hurt or squeeze his daughter, Nelson said. He also questioned whether the baby actually stopped breathing.

“He was off in la-la land thinking about his life,” Nelson said. “The next thing he knew, she wasn’t crying.”

In her closing argument, Emory said she believes Karlinsey loves his daughter, and that’s why he expressed remorse.

Emory played the taped police interview again and asked the jury to think about why Karlinsey changed his story.

For the past 30 years, Eugene Smith and his wife Shawn Smith have run a 160-acre dairy farm in Clinton, Wis. For the past 12 years, they wanted to sell their farm and open a Culver’s, but wanted to give their four children a chance to buy the farm.

“When they decided not to take over the farm, that’s when we started pursuing the restaurant business more,” Eugene Smith said.

Culver’s started in Sauk City, Wis. in 1984 and has since expanded to more than 450 locations, mostly in the Midwest. Once open, Twin Falls will be the farthest west location with the chain and will mark the 22nd state with a Culver’s.

Idaho’s Tax Burden Lower than Nearly All States

BOISE (AP) • When it comes to their taxes, Idahoans can count their blessings, according to a new report that concludes the state’s tax burden is lower than all but two states.

Only Alabama and South Carolina have a lower per capita tax burden.

In an annual report delivered on Wednesday, the Idaho State Tax Commission says Idaho also has the lowest tax burden among Western states. The calcu-

lations are based on tax revenue in 2011.

Property Tax Policy Bureau Chief Alan Dornfest says Idaho’s overall tax burden rose slightly from 2010, a development largely the result of improved economic activity following the end of the Great Recession.

Idaho’s per capita tax burden was \$2,975 in 2011, compared to \$4,296 for the national average and \$3,648 for the median of 11 western states.



Community Asked to Donate Used Physical Therapy Equipment

TWIN FALLS • Two-year-old Emily Kuyper was born with cerebral palsy, and is deaf and blind.

Taking care of Emily is a full-time job for her mother Darlene. Emily's father Mike feeds cattle at a local dairy.

Affording Emily's special needs is beyond the Buhl family's ability. Without help, Emily's future would be ... well, Darlene wouldn't like to imagine what that would be.

The palsy affects Emily's left side more than her right, Darlene said. She wears a brace on her left arm to keep it mobile and working. Otherwise, her muscles would stiffen and atrophy would set in.

If she didn't wear the brace, Emily would need surgery to straighten her arm in the future, her mother said.

Emily is learning to walk. She wears braces on her feet to keep her toes pointed in the right direction. She also uses a special walker called a gait trainer that supports her body and enables her to stand. The gait trainer also ensures that her legs grow correctly, so she can eventually walk on her own.

Physical devices such as these can prevent much bigger problems in the future, said Trish Howard, physical therapist with Primary

Therapy Source in Twin Falls.

Howard said she sees the difference every day that physical therapy equipment can make in a child's life. Sadly, many children are not as lucky as Emily to have this equipment, she said.

There is an untapped source out there that Howard hopes to mine. Valuable devices — orthotics, braces, splints,

walkers and wheelchairs — are stashed away in closets everywhere. During the month of October — Physical Therapy Month — Primary Therapy Source is gathering used devices to send to earthquake-ravaged Haiti. Larger equipment, such as wheelchairs, will be sent to Mexico.

Adults benefit from donations too, especially stroke victims and those with range

of motion issues, Howard said.

But the need is greatest in growing children, said Frank Power, store manager of Norco Medical in Twin Falls.

Children grow out of these devices as fast as they grow out of their clothes, Power said.

Norco is collecting used equipment from customers to donate to the cause.

Used equipment — even if it isn't in working condition — can be dropped off at Norco, he said. His employees can tweak the devices into shape.

Primary Therapy Source is accepting donations at 254 River Vista Place in Twin Falls and at 1259 Overland Ave. in Burley.

"The donations make such a huge difference in the quality of life for the kids — and for their families," Howard said.

Prescription Drug Take-Back Set for Saturday

The safe disposal of such drugs — totaling nearly 1,409 tons in the six previous Take-Back Days — is sponsored by the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration across the nation.

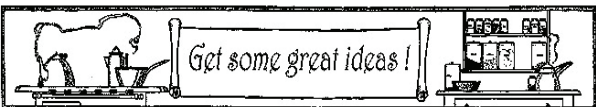
Idaho will have 24 collection sites open from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. The Twin Falls Police Department will accept prescription drugs at the KMTV parking lot, 1100 Blue Lakes Blvd. N., and the Buhl Police Department will receive the drugs at 201 Broadway Ave. N. in Buhl.

Last April, Idaho residents turned in 2.1 tons of

prescription medications. The service is free and anonymous — no questions asked.

Prescription drugs that languish in medicine cabinets create a public health and safety concern because they are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse and abuse. Almost twice as many Americans (6.8 million) abuse prescription drugs as the number of those abusing cocaine, hallucinogens, heroin and inhalants combined, says the 2012 National Survey on Drug Use and Health. Most abused prescription drugs are obtained from family and friends, including from the home medicine cabinet.

Idaho: State of Political Favors

Situations like this are too often the norm in Idaho, and that is infuriating.

Idaho state government and technology contracts don't mix.

Yet another instance of cronyism surfaced last week, exposing the state's broken system of insider favor and political gift giving.

It's the worst form of government, one that gives favor and taxpayer cash to the well connected and influential.

Boise erupted in controversy last week when news broke that Your Health Idaho board member Frank Chan resigned from his post to accept a \$375,000 consulting gig with the state health exchange. Executive Director Amy Dowd personally approved the deal with Chan, without submitting it to a formal bidding process by the health exchange.

State House of Representatives Speaker Scott Bedke called the deal "indefensible" and state senators demanded the contract's repeal.

Chan suddenly withdrew from the agreement Monday as lawmakers lined up against him. The health exchange board responded Tuesday by gutting Dowd's power to unilaterally dole out contracts, ruling that anything costing more than \$15,000 must survive board vetting.

Both are right-minded moves and we're shocked the health exchange board permitted Dowd to have such power over the purse strings in the first place.

But the real issue is that this sad story happened at all.

Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter's office was aware of Chan's contract, Otter's office told us this week. But instead of demanding an open bidding process, Otter and his staff were merely concerned with making sure Chan tendered his resignation from the exchange board.

This situation follows other allegations of cronyism earlier this year, when state Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Luna was beaten up after awarding a broadband contract to a political ally's firm.

Dowd defended her move by arguing that the glitch-ridden Your Health Idaho website had to be updated as soon as possible in order to comply with the federal Affordable Care Act. Transparent government is apparently too clunky when things really need to get done, by her logic.

Dowd built her defense while the buggy federal website was getting attacked from all sides and President Obama was trying to muster the nation's best programmers to fix it. The White House wouldn't have cared too much had the overhaul of Idaho's state site been a little late.

It is unnerving that Otter and his staff didn't sink this from the outset. The fact that Dowd still remains in her six-figure job is upsetting. Situations like this are too often the norm in Idaho, and that is infuriating. It's becoming increasingly clear that Idaho needs an independent oversight body that reviews state contracts and other ethical issues. Picking such a powerful oversight body wouldn't be easy, especially if it's to have any semblance of untainted credibility. Perhaps a representative of the majority and minority caucuses from both legislative houses and the Governor's Office could staff the powerful oversight body we propose. That way, it would be composed of disparate political factions weighing in and keeping the public informed of the questionable deals weaving through Boise.

Most states have public integrity or ethics commissions. Idaho — one of the few without such an oversight body — desperately needs one.

Idaho is clearly the land of political favor. It's time for those who have promulgated this farce to do their jobs and fix it.

How sad to see our tech-savvy commander in chief, who blew billions on a website that is worse than any state's DMV, direct frustrated consumers to a 1-800 number, like an infomercial host on late-night cable.

His speech in the White House Rose Garden this week was supposed to stop the unhelpful weeks of hemming and hawing by his staff over the HealthCare.gov debacle.

They had made light of the catastrophe, saying they were "scrubbing the site" of "glitches," which is like calling the Grand Canyon a hole in the ground. Not being able to access the website was "a good problem to have," and one that proved its popularity. They like it, Mr. President, they really like it.

"Nobody's madder than me," Obama claimed. We

don't need him to get mad, we need him to fix it. Leave the anger to the American public to whom he has promised to deliver health care for three years and who are now drowning in error messages, even in the middle of the night, when traffic is supposedly light.

He reverted to singing his own praises in getting the health-care law passed at all. "We did not wage this long and contentious battle just around a website," Obama said. "That's not what this was about."

The rollout of Obamacare had to be absolutely perfect. Obama needed to treat it like a 21st-century Manhattan Project, full of 20-something geeks pulling all-nighters and managed by geniuses from Apple and Google who can fill in that blind spot between the techies and end users. Instead, he took the pedestrian route and spent \$400 billion on a

Canadian company that our Good Neighbors to the North once fired for incompetence.

That brings us to those determined to stop Obamacare and, by extension, Obama himself (that's why they call it Obamacare). They're happy to watch the president making excuses. They're gloating now, just a few days after the president did his own gloating over Republican incompetence during the government shutdown.

The website failure gives credence to those who warn that government can't be trusted to get big things right, and that the market, not bureaucrats, should fix health care. It's not just the crazies who doubt government now. According to the Pew Research Center, the competence of officialdom is on shaky ground, with only 19 percent of Americans saying they trust in government "just about always" or "most of the time."

There are many things Obama can't control — the Middle East, the World Series, Sen. Ted Cruz — but he can control practical matters. We

set him up as royalty, despite fighting the British to have a democracy. The other two branches of government still have to worry about the basement flooding and the lawn growing weedy, but the Leader of the Free World has to floss and not much else. He lives in a palace. He has an Air Force to fly him around. We want our presidents to be superheroes who can send a man to the moon and Osama bin Laden to his grave.

Republicans may yet get their delay, not because they shut down the government, but because the president didn't use his power to make his hard-fought legislation work. After this, is there anything Obama wants government to do that can sail through Congress?

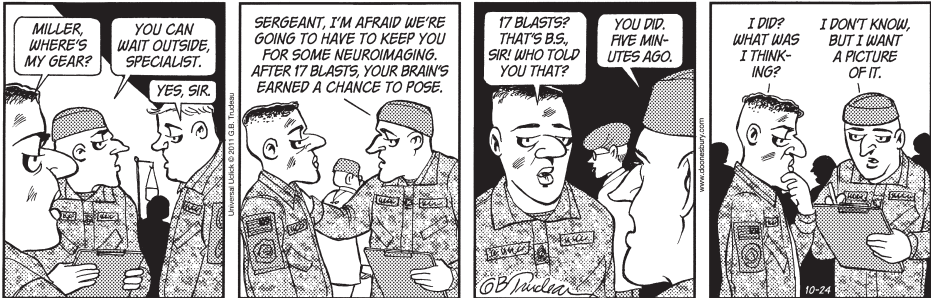

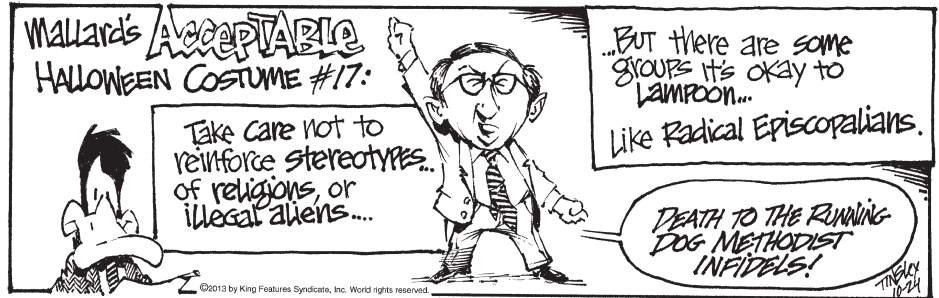

Staffing Issues Known for Years at Prison

New details about the state's oversight of CCA come to light.

BOISE • Administrators and staff at Idaho's prison agency knew since at least 2010 that private prison contractor Corrections Corporation of America was understaffing the state's largest prison in violation of the state contract.

Idaho Department of Corrections officials and CCA eventually came to an agreement about staffing levels, according to documents obtained by The Associated Press, but inmates and advocates continued to complain about inadequate staffing and its impact on prisoners' safety.

The new details about the state's oversight of CCA come as Idaho State Police investigators are looking into allegations that the nation's largest private prison company defrauded taxpayers by filing reports that showed vacant positions were fully staffed.

That investigation is expected to be completed sometime in the next several weeks. The probe was launched after an AP public records request raised questions among officials about payroll reports and staff rosters from the CCA-run Idaho Correctional Center.

Idaho corrections officials say they are proud of the departments' efforts to oversee CCA — efforts which included adding more employees to check on the prison and lengthening CCA's contract from 30 pages to 450 in an effort to better spell out the company's responsibilities.

But the agency never fact-checked CCA's staffing reports against payroll records.

"Now, looking back on this, I think we'd all have done it differently," Idaho Department of Correction Director Brent Reinke said. "I think our staff has done an incredible job. When you start looking at the staffing fraud ... it's really complicated to get to the bottom of that."

When Reinke became director in 2007, only one part-time employee was responsible for monitoring the private prison.

Reinke began adding staffers to the job immediately and now 24 of IDOC's 1,570 employees oversee eight different contracts worth about \$80 million a year. CCA, based in Nashville, Tenn., gets \$29 million of that total.

CCA spokesman Steven Owen said in a prepared statement that the months of falsified reports were an isolated incident. He said the company has cooperated with the state's investigation, is working to correct the issues and is "fully committed to making taxpayers whole for any unverified hours."

CCA has said it won't bid on the next contract to run the Idaho prison when its current contract expires next summer.

Still, as the Idaho Board of Correction prepares to hand the prison over to another private company, department officials are looking back to see where they could have done a better job.

"Never in a million years did we think they were lying to us," said IDOC quality assurance manager Natalie Warner. "...You know, the thing about fraud is we just can't ever assume the worst intent, otherwise that's all we're

ever looking for."

IDOC officials say that back in 2010 they thought the agency was taking all the necessary steps to make CCA compliant. Still, the warning signs were there, with lawsuits from prison inmates alleging violence and understaffing filling the court docket.

The prison had roughly three times the number of inmate-on-inmate assaults than other state prisons. And IDOC's own contract monitor, Matthew Vallard, detailed more than 500 vacant mandatory security posts between April and the end of August in memos to supervisors.

Idaho officials warned CCA leaders in 2010 and again in January 2011 that the understaffing needed to be fixed.

But in March 2011, Vallard tallied nearly 300 more vacancies. That prompted the department to issue a "Breach of Contract Notice" to CCA, advising the company it had 30 days to make things right or face a type of fine called "liquidated damages" under the contract.

CCA agreed to fix some of the understaffing but countered some posts simply weren't needed. After negotiations IDOC agreed to take those posts of the mandatory list, effectively remedying many of the vacancies.

The company was never fined, nor did IDOC push for a price cut in exchange for the staffing reductions.

By the end of 2011, CCA reached a settlement agreement in a lawsuit brought by inmates and the American Civil Liberties Union that alleged understaffing and rampant violence at the prison.

The terms of that settlement called for increased staffing levels and other

changes, including stopping inmates from covering the windows in their cell doors and improving management of the prison's housing units. IDOC was tasked with helping to ensure the settlement terms were being met, prompting the contract monitors to switch their focus from total staffing numbers to settlement issues.

Meanwhile, CCA's monthly reports to the state showed the mandatory positions were nearly always fully staffed.

Inmates and some outside attorneys thought otherwise. In 2012, rumors began circulating that CCA was falsifying staffing reports given to IDOC by using "ghost workers," employees who were listed as working a post even when they weren't in the facility at all, and another group of inmates sued over the alleged scheme.

At the start of 2013, the AP requested the staffing and payroll records from the prison.

The next week, CCA's regional director Kevin Myers told an IDOC official for the first time that the company had begun its own investigation several months earlier after an employee reported allegations of staffing fraud, according to court documents.

Reinke said the new contract will eliminate enforcement loopholes and new reporting requirements will make it easier to spot potential fraud.

Stephen Pevar, the ACLU attorney who represented inmates in the 2010 lawsuit, said the state shares the blame for the problems at ICC. Pevar said he's happy the department has taken aggressive steps since the suspected fraud came to light, but the final outcome remains to be seen.

ER Physician Says Doctor offered \$10K to Save Wife

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) •

A Utah doctor accused of killing his wife offered money to an emergency room physician to keep trying to save his wife, the physician testified Wednesday.

"He offered me \$10,000 to continue my resuscitation and not quit," Scott Vanwagoner said during the murder trial of Martin MacNeill.

Vanwagoner said he was already working furiously to revive Michele MacNeill, and the defendant must have known his wife was already dead.

He called MacNeill's remark "off-the-wall" and the oddest experience of his medical career.

"I'm not sure how to answer that question, or why he would make that offer," Vanwagoner told a jury in Provo.

It was the latest testimony about MacNeill's bizarre behavior on the day his wife died.

Police and paramedics have testified that he had cursed his 50-year-old wife after they arrived for insisting on getting a face-lift then taking too much medication and falling into a bathtub.

Idaho Tribal Officer Acquitted of Lying to FBI About Motorist Shooting Incident

LEWISTON (AP) • A federal jury acquitted a Nez Perce Tribal police officer of lying to the FBI in a case linked to the 2011 fatal shooting of a motorist.

The *Lewiston Tribune* reported Wednesday that Officer Trevor M. Garrett was found innocent in U.S. District Court in Coeur d'Alene of making false statements during the investigation into Jeffrey A. Flinn's death.

Following a low-speed chase Nov. 12, 2011, Flinn exited his truck and stood with his hands in the air for three to five seconds before he was killed by tribal Officer Robert Wall. The Federal Bureau of Investigation contended that Garrett misled the agency during its probe of the incident.

Defense attorney James Siebe of Moscow, who represented Garrett, said his client failed to recall details, but never lied about the shooting.

"He didn't send anybody on a wild goose chase," Siebe said.

FBI agents interviewed Garrett on three separate occasions.

Aaron Lucoff, chief of the criminal division at the U.S. Attorney's Office in Boise, said agents testified that Garrett told them he didn't remember who fired the shot that killed Flinn during the first two interviews.

In the third interview, however, Lucoff contends that Garrett gave investigators details of the shooting — and

then allegedly apologized to them for lying.

Siebe said Garrett never apologized for lying, only for not remembering details of the incident.

One obstacle federal prosecutors faced: No one taped the FBI's interviews with Garrett, so Siebe said the crux of the case amounted to their word against his.

"The whole thing is a colossal waste of taxpayer money," Siebe said.

Lucoff said it wasn't unusual for the FBI not to document such question-

ing on video.

Earlier this year, a state judge dismissed a voluntary manslaughter with a deadly weapon charge against Wall. Prosecutors opted not to

refile the case.

Wall was placed on administrative leave following the shooting, but has since returned to work with the tribal law enforcement agency.

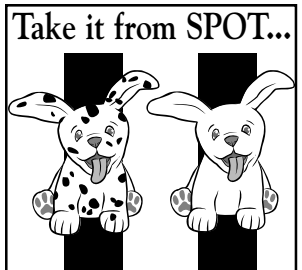

Idaho Brokers Sentenced in Mail Fraud Case

POCATELLO • A father and son who operated a Rexburg insurance brokerage have each been ordered to spend four months in prison and together pay \$1.6 million in restitution for their role in a federal mail fraud case.

On Tuesday, U.S. District Judge B. Lynn Winmill sentenced Adrian Rand Robison, 67, of Rigby, and his son, Adrian Russell Robison, 38, of Idaho Falls.

They pleaded guilty this summer to charges that stemmed from an investigation into allegations they misled clients in the sale of life insurance policies. Adrian Rand Robison pleaded guilty to mail fraud, while his son pleaded guilty to making false tax returns.

The father founded The Legacy Network, which brokered the sale of life insurance policies between the companies that provided the policies and independent agents selling directly to clients. In return, the brokerage earned a commission paid by carriers for each policy sold.

Under a plea agreement, the father admitted encouraging wealthy clients to apply for high face-value life insurance policies with the promise of rebating all or part of the first-year premiums. He also admitted to misrepresenting in agent reports and other documents that he had no intention of rebating the entire value of the premiums.

In turn, the company got commission payments from insurance carriers valued at 105 to 138 percent of the first-year premium.

Federal investigators say from 2006 to 2009, the brokerage received more than \$1.3 million in commissions, while rebating \$923,000 and keeping \$448,000.

The son admitted to filing false returns for tax years 2007, 2008 and 2009.

After prison, the father

must serve 18 months of supervised release and eight months home detention. The son also must serve 12 months of supervised release.

BSU, UI Report Declining Enrollments

BOISE • Two of Idaho's largest universities reported enrollment declines this year.

Boise State University saw its total students during the fall semester sag to 22,003 from 22,678 last year, a drop of 3 percent.

Meanwhile, the University of Idaho said its overall enrollment plunged nearly 5.2 percent to 11,844, from 12,493.

Both schools sought to put a positive spin on declining enrollments.

BSU, the state's largest public university by enrollment, says its new freshman class is smaller than last year, but better prepared and more focused on earning a degree than ever before.

It says the students it lost were largely nondegree and part-timers.

The University of Idaho says it saw increases in freshman students and new graduate students, as well as more students from countries other than the United States.

Utah Police ID Man Who Drove up Capitol Steps

SALT LAKE CITY • Utah state troopers have identified a Layton man who drove his pickup truck up the steps of the state Capitol building and was subdued with a punch in the face.

Utah Highway Patrol officials say 36-year-old Gerald Weston Green was taken to the hospital for injuries to his mouth and for a mental evaluation after the incident Tuesday afternoon.

Authorities say troopers watching security cameras saw Green's truck climb about two dozen steps and

park outside the building. He then left his vehicle and tried to enter the historic Supreme Court room on the third floor.

UHP Capt. Barton Blair says Green claimed Capitol was his home and he had the right to be there.

Officials say a Taser failed to subdue Green, so an officer punched him.

Ex-Utah Gov. Huntsman Hosting Weekly Radio Show

SALT LAKE CITY • Former Republican Utah Gov. Jon Huntsman, a 2012 presidential candidate, will host a new weekly radio talk show on SiriusXM satellite radio aimed at promoting bipartisan politics.

Huntsman helped launch a similar program in May, but that show was monthly and Huntsman only served as an occasional host.

SiriusXM says in a statement the company felt the monthly show was a success and decided to expand it to a weekly program with Huntsman.

The new venture, an hour-

long program called "No Labels Radio With Jon Huntsman," will air on Saturdays, starting Oct. 26.

Huntsman is a co-chair of a group of 87 members of Congress called No Labels, which calls for an end to dys-

functional politics and more problem-solving in Washington, D.C.

Winners Blister Field at Scorching Districts

GOODING • Rachel Youren isn’t the biggest fan of running, despite being pretty good at it.

The Gooding senior is especially not fond of running in conditions like those on Wednesday afternoon at Gooding Country Club.

In a word, they were perfect: no wind and almost unseasonably warm for late October. While she won yet another 3A District IV cross country title in 19 minutes, 40 seconds, she wasn’t all that

thrilled with the day or the performance.

Part of that was the weather, and part of that was because she’s lost time over the past two weeks to defending 3A champion Olivia Redd of Sugar-Salem, who almost broke into the 17-minute plateau last week.

“I’m not a warm-weather runner; I’m just not built for that. It just drains me faster than others,” said Youren. “I don’t like my time, because it was slower than last week. Hopefully I can get faster and at least close the gap on (Redd). It’ll be tough because mentally I know I’m not there (time-wise) but I’ll try because I

want to be there.”

Youren won by more than 90 seconds, setting a tone for the overall meet. In the four races, the closest margin of victory was 28 seconds.

That was Filer senior Gage Moore’s win over Gooding’s Eliseo Garcia, giving the Wildcat final district bragging rights in a battle that’s been going on the last few years.

Taking on the Empire

How a Burley coach is a force to be reckoned with.

BURLEY • A long time ago on a football field far, far away....

(Actually, it was only around the block at the old Budge Field)...

Jed Thomas was a legendary running back and linebacker who helped the Burley Empire win galactic gridiron battles....

The one they call “Jedi” graduated in 2003 and went on to win NAIA national championships on the planet of Carroll College....

Meanwhile, the Burley Empire began to crumble under four different head coaches in nine years, despite construction of a new football facility that cost slightly more than the actual Death Star....

But now, Jed Thomas has returned as head coach of his alma mater in an attempt to rescue this small band of Bobcats from the clutches of the vile basement of the 4A Great Basin Conference, and restore wins to the Green Galaxy....

Regardless of the result of Burley’s final regular season games — at Twin Falls this Friday and at Jerome next week — the Bobcats (5-2) are guaranteed their first winning season since 2002, when Thomas was a senior.

The five wins match Burley’s best win total in 19 years.

“He’s a stud,” senior quarterback Zander Cook said of his coach. “He knows the game well and he can teach the players well and motivate us. The vibe is totally different. It’s a lot more fun to win games. The vibe is great these days.”

Burley’s eight wins in Thomas’ first two seasons are more than his three predecessors combined for in six years.

“He teaches us what we need to know and he has high expectations for us, but he teaches us well enough that we can live up to it,” said Scott Pilling, a senior wide receiver and linebacker. “We’re more disciplined. Our coaches require more of us than in past years.”

Scheduling has aided the turnaround. Starting in 2009, Burley dropped out-of-district nonconference 4A opponents such as Pocatello, Blackfoot and Preston to pick up 3A competition with District IV’s Kimberly and Filer.

The schedule-down strategy is building some positive momentum for a program trying to recover from only three winning seasons in two decades.

Thomas has surrounded himself with trustworthy assistant coaches like Eric Mabry, Gary Elsensohn, Matt Cook and Wayne Davids. Mabry was one of Thomas’ coaches in high school. Now the pupil has become the teacher.

“The kid knows his stuff,” said Mabry, who serves as defensive coordinator. “When he came back from Carroll, you could tell he was going to be a coach. I’ve been learning from him. He

Declo Three-peat Hornets Earn Third Straight 2A District IV Title

DECLO • The Declo High volleyball domination continued Wednesday evening as the Hornets won another 2A District IV volleyball tournament championship and punched their ticket to the state tournament.

It’s Declo’s third consecutive district title, and with only one senior on the roster, the streak might not be finished yet.

Krissy Coats, the lone senior, had seven kills to help Declo defeat Oakley 25-14, 25-17, 25-11.

“It’s so exciting,” Coats said. “How many schools get the chance to go (to state)? How many people get the sweat-shirt? It’s just great that we can put it all together and just take care of business and get there.”

Declo, which also earned the 2A state academic state championship with a

team GPA of 3.8, advances to the state tournament, Nov. 1-2 at Lakeland High School. The Hornets’ first-round match will be at 10 a.m. that Friday against the runner-up from District III.

Rachel Moore was the match-leader in kills with 15 for Declo, which graduated four seniors from last year’s district title team.

“It’s been a challenge, but it’s definitely been fun and we’ve grown so much from where we started,” Moore said.

Declo scored 14 aces, led by Sidney Wilson and Malorie Bowen. Kambrie Clark contributed 26 digs and Aubrey Garner had eight kills.

The best all-around contributor of the night was Bowen, who tallied 11 kills and 19 digs. Wilson facilitated the attack with 38 aces.

“Sidney is a great setter, she takes care of all of us,” Coats said. “We’re so in-tune, we can pass and set every-

where. We can take advantage of the whole court.”

For Oakley, Haley Critchfield had seven digs, Stormi Justesen had three kills and Abbey Jones led the team in assists. It’s been a remarkable season for the Oakley Hornets to finish district runner-up, as they are a 1A-sized school playing in a 2A conference against schools with double their enrollment.

But Oakley’s season isn’t finished. The Hornets have a chance to qualify for state via play-in match against District III’s third-place team at 5 p.m. Saturday at Mountain Home High School. Oakley’s last state tournament berth was in 2005.

Health Care Sign-up Snags, Fix-it Efforts Detailed

WASHINGTON (AP) • On the defensive, the Obama administration acknowledged Wednesday its problem-plagued health insurance website didn't get enough testing before going live. It said technicians were deep into the job of fixing major computer snags but provided no timetable.

Democratic unhappiness with the situation began grow-

ing louder _ including one call for President Barack Obama to "man up" and fire someone _ as the president's allies began to fret about the political fallout. Democrats hoped to run for re-election touting the benefits of the health care law for millions of uninsured Americans, but the computer problems are keeping many people from signing up.

And Republican sniping continued unabated, with House Speaker John Boehner declaring, "We've got the whole threat of Obamacare continuing to hang over our economy like a wet blanket."

Obama himself, though strongly defending the health care overhaul, has been

It had been a massive, four-story building that had withstood air strikes and artillery — now reduced to a mountain of rubble. Enormous chunks of concrete, their twisted steel reinforcements ripped bare, balanced precariously on piles of debris. Only cracked concrete frames on the ground floor bore any semblance to what had stood there before.

As I watched crews struggle to remove wreckage from what remained of the U.S. Marine barracks in Beirut, I thought to myself, "My God. How did anyone survive?"

The Oct. 23, 1983 truck bombing that leveled the barracks near Beirut's airport claimed the lives of 241 American service members in the deadliest attack on U.S. forces abroad since World War II. The attack, amid Lebanon's civil war, was one of the United States' first experiences with the suicide bombings that over the past 30 years have become a trademark of Islamic militants.

By the time I arrived, the bodies were gone, and survivors evacuated. The day of the blast, I was in Cairo, where I was The Associated Press' bureau chief, and I traveled to Beirut in the im-

mediate aftermath.

For me the shock was all the more intense because I had known that building _ and doubtless some of the Marines who had perished inside. During repeated assignments in Lebanon, I spent hours on the barracks' roof, along with other journalists, observing militias on the hills above hit their rivals and sometimes the Marines with artillery fire.

I recall watching visiting Marine generals scurrying for cover one afternoon when militias lobbed mortar shells near their convoy — to the amusement of some younger Marines.

The roof was also the site of the Marines' link to a radio network with the French and British to exchange information about battles around Beirut. If you could tolerate the blazing sun and long periods of boredom, it was a great place to track the fighting.

The structure — once an administrative building for the airport — was rock-solid. It had survived hits by Israeli air and artillery fire in 1982, well before the Marines moved in.

Yet it was pulverized by a truck bomb that exploded with the force of 21,000 pounds of TNT just before 6:30 a.m. on a Sunday. Min-

utes later, a second suicide bomber blasted the French military barracks a few miles north, killing 58 paratroopers and the wife and four children of the Lebanese janitor.

Shiite militias that were just starting to coalesce into what is now Hezbollah were behind the attacks.

The Marines, along with French and British troops, arrived in Beirut in August 1982. The Marines were to supervise the evacuation of Palestinian guerrillas under a deal to end Israel's invasion of Lebanon.

Instead, the experience became a textbook example of "mission creep."

After the Palestinians departed, the Marines did as well. But they were ordered back about two weeks later when the assassination of Lebanon's new Christian president sparked new fighting among the country's factions.

Syrian-backed militias frequently fired on the Marines' base and barracks, about 10 miles from downtown Beirut, to pressure the United States, which supported the Lebanese government.

Within months after the bombing, the U.S. Marines were out of Lebanon. The civil war raged for another seven years.

Boston Marathon Suspect May Pin Blame on Brother

BOSTON (AP) • Dzhokhar Tsarnaev's lawyers may try to save him from the death penalty in the Boston Marathon bombing by arguing he fell under the murderous influence of his older brother, legal experts say.

The outlines of a possible defense came into focus this week when it was learned that Tsarnaev's attorneys are trying to get access to investigative records implicating the now-dead brother in a grisly triple slaying com-

mitted in 2011.

In court papers Monday, federal prosecutors acknowledged publicly for the first time that a friend of Tamerlan Tsarnaev told investigators that Tamerlan participated in the unsolved killings of three men who were found in a Waltham apartment with their throats slit, marijuana sprinkled over their bodies.

The younger Tsarnaev's lawyers argued in court papers that any evidence of Tamerlan's

involvement is "mitigating information" that is critical as they prepare Dzhokhar's defense. They asked a judge to force prosecutors to turn over the records.

Dzhokhar Tsarnaev, 20, faces 30 federal charges, including using a weapon of mass destruction, in the twin bombings April 15 that killed three people and injured more than 260. Tamerlan Tsarnaev, 26, died in a gun battle with police days later.

increasingly willing to acknowledge extensive problems with the sign-up through online markets. Amid all that, the Health and Human Services Department on Wednesday provided its most specific accounting yet of the troubles with HealthCare.gov — an issue that is also about to get a lengthy, even-less-forgiving airing on Capitol Hill.

The first of several hearings is set for Thursday in the Republican-led House, with lawmakers ready to pounce on the contractors who built the balky online enrollment system.

Acknowledging what's been obvious to many outside experts, the administration said Wednesday that the system didn't get enough testing, especially at a high user volume. It blamed a compressed time frame for meeting the Oct. 1 deadline to open the insurance markets. Basic "alpha and user testing" are now completed, but that's supposed to happen before a launch, not after.

The Health and Human Services explanation identified some bugs that have gotten little outside attention. For example, technical problems have surfaced that are making it hard for people to complete the application and plan-shopping functions. That's a big concern because those stages are further along in the sign-up process than the initial registration, where many consumers have been getting tripped up. The problems are being analyzed and fixes are planned, the department said.

The explanation, posted online in a department blog and accompanying graphic, identified other broad areas of problems and outlined

fixes underway but in most cases incomplete:

- Unexpectedly high consumer interest that overwhelmed the system in its initial days. Equipment has been added to handle the load and system design has been improved. More fixes are in progress.

- Lack of a way for consumers to browse their health plan options without first having to set up a user account. A partial fix is in place.

- Incorrect or duplicate information in enrollments is being delivered to insurance companies. Some software fixes that should help address the issue have been completed, others are underway.

- Difficulties for consumers trying to create user accounts, including drop-down menus that didn't work. Design changes and software fixes should address the situation.

The new markets are supposed to be the portal to coverage for people who don't get health insurance on the job. Middle-class people are to pick from subsidized private insurance plans, while low-income people are steered to Medicaid in states that agreed to expand that safety-net program. The federal government is running the online markets in 36 states, and its website has had more than its share of problems.

As a result, even Obama has urged consumers to revert to low-tech approaches, by applying through the mail, telephoning federal call centers, or seeking in-person assistance.

Today, the House Energy and Commerce Committee will line up contractors, including CGI Federal, the lead developer of the website, and QSSI, which designed a back-room operation known as the federal data services hub.

Russia Drops Piracy Claims vs. Greenpeace Activists

MOSCOW • Russia's main investigative agency said Wednesday that it has dropped piracy charges against jailed Greenpeace activists and charged them instead with hooliganism, which could still mean years in prison. The Investigative Committee's statement follows a comment by Russian President Vladimir Putin, who said last month that he doesn't think that the Greenpeace activists were pirates.

Piracy is punishable by a prison term of up to 15 years, while the specific hooliganism charge being applied now carries a maximum sentence of seven years. The Investigative Committee also warned that it could file additional charges against the Greenpeace activists, including violence against authorities — punishable by up to 10 years in prison.

The 28 Greenpeace activists, a Russian photographer and a British videographer have been held since their ship, the "Arctic Sunrise" was seized by the Russian coast guard after protesting outside the oil rig belonging to Russia's Gazprom state energy giant on Sept. 18.

The Investigative Committee said that the detainees' refusal to testify has impeded the investigation. "That prompts the investigators to thoroughly check all possible versions, including the seizure of the platform for financial benefit, terrorist motives, the conduct of illegal scientific research and espionage," the agency added.

It dismissed the Greenpeace claim that the protest was peaceful, saying it was a crime under an international law to try to seize an oil rig.

China, India Sign Border Cooperation Agreement

BEIJING • China and India sounded a new optimistic tone in their relationship Wednesday as they signed an agreement to boost meetings between their militaries to avoid any repeat of this year's tense standoff along their disputed Himalayan border.

The accord followed a meeting in Beijing between Chinese Premier Li Keqiang and visiting Indian Prime Minister Manmohan Singh, who also had trade ties on the agenda as India seeks to gain greater access to Chinese markets and readjust a trade balance tilted heavily toward China.

The two sides agreed to

boost communication about border maneuvers, hold periodic meetings at designated crossing points, and have patrols refrain from any provocations. They agreed that patrols should not follow or "tail" patrols of the other side in contested areas.

"I am sure it will help to maintain peace, tranquility and stability in our border areas," Li said of the accord.

Li, who said the meeting injected "new vitality" into China-India relations, said the two sides also agreed to hold joint counterterrorism training in southwest China at an early date, strengthen cooperation in international and regional affairs, and work together to tackle terrorism.

Calif. Sheriff's Deputies Shoot, Kill 13-year-old

SANTA ROSA, Calif. • Northern California sheriff's deputies have shot and killed a 13-year-old boy after repeatedly telling him to drop what turned out to be a replica assault rifle, sheriff's officials and family members said.

Two Sonoma County deputies on patrol saw the boy walking with what appeared to be a high-powered weapon Tuesday afternoon in Santa Rosa, sheriff's Lt. Dennis O'Leary said. The replica gun resembled an AK-47 with a black magazine cartridge and brown butt, according to a photograph released by the sheriff's office. Deputies would only learn after the shooting that it wasn't an actual firearm.

Rodrigo Lopez identified the boy as his son, Andy, to a newspaper and said the young teen was carrying a toy gun that belonged to a friend.

After spotting the boy, the deputies called for backup and repeatedly ordered him to drop the gun, O'Leary said in a news release. It wasn't clear whether he pointed the replica assault rifle at the deputies or made any type of threatening gesture. The sheriff's office referred calls to the Santa Rosa Police Department, which did not immediately return a call for comment. O'Leary said the deputies fired several rounds from their handguns immediately after issuing the orders to drop the rifle.

The boy fell to the ground on top of the rifle, according to O'Leary. He said the deputies ordered him to move away before approaching him and putting him in handcuffs.

They began administering first aid and called for paramedics, who pronounced him dead at the scene. Deputies also found a plastic handgun in the boy's waistband. The deputies, who have not been identified, have been placed on administrative leave,

Prince George is Christened in London

LONDON • Dressed in a lace and satin gown designed in the 1840s, Britain's 3-month-old future monarch, Prince George, was christened Wednesday with water from the River Jordan at a rare gathering of four generations of the royal family.

The occasion had historic overtones: the presence of Britain's 87-year-old monarch and three future kings, Princes Charles, William and, of course, little George.

The private affair at the Chapel Royal at St. James's Palace was also attended by Prince Charles, next in line to the throne, and the queen's 92-year-old husband, Prince Philip, who has shown remarkable stamina since returning to the public eye after a two-month convalescence following serious abdominal surgery.

All told, it was an exceptional day for a monarchy that seems to be basking in public affection since the 2011 wedding of William and Kate Middleton and the maturing of Prince Harry, who appears to have put his playboy days behind him. The infant, who will head the Church of England when he becomes king, was christened with water from the River Jordan by Archbishop of Canterbury Justin Welby.

The silver baptismal font — known as the Lily Font — dates to 1840 when it was commissioned by Queen Victoria and Prince Albert for their first child's birth, and has

Moms: Wounded Sons Weren't Targets in NV Shooting

SPARKS, Nev. • The parents of the two boys wounded by a seventh-grader who fatally shot their teacher before turning a semi-automatic handgun on himself said Wednesday they don't believe their children were targeted in the schoolyard rampage.

Police were interviewing dozens of students who witnessed the shooting as investigators continued to try to unravel the mystery of what motivated the shooter, whom they still have not identified two days after he took his own life on an asphalt basketball court outside Sparks Middle School.

Sparks police Lt. Erick Thomas said investigators still don't know whether the shooting spree 15 minutes before the start of school Monday morning was random or targeted specific individuals.

But parents of the two 12-year-olds recovering from gunshot wounds said they don't think they were singled out. One said her son was trying to help the dying teacher, Michael Landsberry, when he was shot in the abdomen with a bullet that exited his back. "We do not believe he was in any way the target in this shooting," Jennifer Davis told reporters outside Renown Regional Medical Center, where she said her son Mason was "doing well ... in good spirits, although saddened by the loss of his friend, Mr. Landsberry." —AP

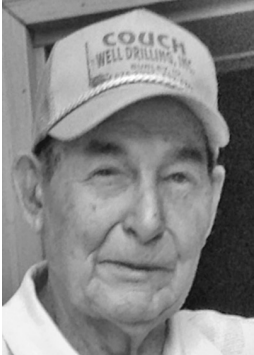

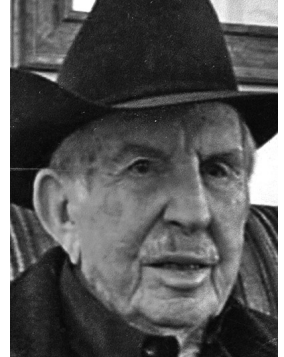

Lurking Steelhead a Fall Salmon River Creature Feature

SALMON • Where will you be this Halloween?

Perhaps you'll be spooked by ghoulish costumes, thrilled by a good slasher flick and delighted with handfuls of candy corn.

If you're a fisherman, perhaps you'd prefer a different creature feature.

On Allhallows Eve, you too could be spooked by lurking steelhead, be thrilled by the oncorhynchus mykiss' aerobic strikes and gorge on the delight of snagging one of the most sought-after fish in the Northwest.

"Halloween at the North Fork is perfect," said Dale Quigley, Twin Falls steelhead fly fishing enthusiast.

Steelhead, which are sea-run rainbow trout, arrive in the upper reaches of the Salmon River in late October and early November.

"Usually it's kind of a slow ooze," said Jon Hansen, an Idaho Department of Fish and Game regional fishery biologist. "The fish will start coming up this time of year, and it'll slowly start to build."

One of the best places to fish — opportunity and access considered equally — is the stretch of the river from its confluence of the Lemhi River at the city of Salmon downstream beyond the North Fork to the confluence of the Middle Fork.

The Salmon River's fall

Steelhead Fishing Report:

Steelhead fishing in the upper Salmon River from the Middle Fork up past the North Fork to the confluence of the Lemhi River has been slow, said Jon Hansen, an Idaho Department of Fish and Game regional fishery biologist.

But more fish are quickly on the way.

By Oct. 17, 85,539 steelhead had come over Lower Granite dam, according to Fish and Game counts. That's up from 79,531 the same time last year.

Despite more steelhead entering the system than last year, the run has been delayed about two weeks, Hansen said. Fish counts and angler surveys near the town of Salmon are what Fish and Game staff usually see during the first week of October.

This year's flood events and landslides caused by a fire last year are to blame, he said. The good news is that the water near the North Fork is clear, slightly higher than last year and very fishable.

"It seems like everything is starting to line up nicely," he said. "The steelhead are just starting to get here now."

3 Deer Tales from the Check Station

HILL CITY • Some of the trucks pouring out of the mountains on Oct. 13 hauled horse trailers. Some carried ATVs. All announced success or failure by choosing a lane of traffic cones.

One lane for hunters who harvested deer on the opening weekend of Idaho's regular deer season. One lane for those who didn't.

But even in the latter was a lot of satisfaction.

"I saw some big bucks in (Unit) 44," California hunter David Woolley told a conservation officer at the Idaho Department of Fish and Game check station north of Gooding. Admiration colored Woolley's voice as he described a deer. "That's what you come to Idaho for. He was a big boy."

On Oct. 12-13, Fish and Game's Magic Valley office set up three check stations — north of Gooding, west of Fairfield and at the Timmerman junction — where biologists and conservation officers checked more than 500 hunters and 190 deer.

They collected biological data, measured hunter success and surveyed opinions on game tags for landowners.

"The greatest benefit to us is being able to hear from many of the hunters we don't communicate with regularly," said Randy Smith, regional wildlife manager.

The lanes of traffic cones were rarely empty at his check station — the one just off U.S. Highway 20, west of Fairfield and Hill City — on the afternoon of Oct. 13. Here, three tales from that check station:

1) The Brag Board

Outside the camp trailer that served as check station headquarters, a small table held survey clipboards, data sheets, knives, vials, rule books and boxes of disposable gloves. Propped among all that was a pinboard of snapshots — hunters with their harvested deer.

K.C. Hills of Jerome stopped by to see whether his hunting buddy's buck was on the brag board. It was.

"Is that the biggest one so far?" Hills asked, showing more photos on his cell-phone to Jerome Hansen, Fish and Game regional supervisor.

Hills and his buddy spotted the buck during archery season. So when the regular deer season opened, they knew right where to be.

"We popped him on opening morning and couldn't believe it," Hills told Hansen. "That's a lot of nice deer."

Minutes later, Hansen photographed Kayla Brown of Jerome holding the head of her first deer. In that snapshot, her camouflage sweat shirt is paired with a

Peterson proposed at Grouse Creek, Brown said. He told her to watch wood-

peckers through their binoculars, and when she turned around he was on his knee.

Hansen disappeared briefly into the camp trailer,

Tribe Seeks Clues to Trout Struggle in Idaho Lake

PLUMMER • Years of restoration work have turned Benewah Creek into ideal habitat for Idaho’s state fish, the cutthroat trout.

This fall, the Coeur d’Alene Tribe’s fisheries technicians counted 120 juvenile westslope cutthroat in a short stretch of the meandering stream, which is packed with the deep pools and insects that the trout like.

Despite the high counts, the youngsters’ outlook is relatively grim. Most of the cutthroat will migrate to Lake Coeur d’Alene when they reach two years of age. Out of the group of 120, only two or three fish will return to Benewah Creek as adults to spawn.

The tribal fisheries department is trying to figure out why cutthroat survival is so low in the lake. Ongoing research indicates that northern pike, a non-native predator in Lake Coeur d’Alene, is quelling cutthroat populations. What the study reveals could help other populations of Idaho’s iconic fish.

Sleek and speckled, cutthroat are named for two slash-like indentations under their jaw. The fish are a favorite of anglers because of their readiness to bite. Their beauty is also part of their draw.

“It’s hard to find a critter prettier than a cutthroat when they’re colored up” for spawning, said Chip Corsi, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game’s regional supervisor. “They’re red and gold and speckled. They’re fun to look at.”

Historically abundant, cutthroat provided an important food source for the early settlers and the Coeur d’Alene Tribe, whose ancestors harvested the trout they call elutmish in Lake Coeur d’Alene’s tributaries for hundreds, perhaps thousands, of years.

Early accounts describe tribal members setting fish traps across the St. Joe and Spokane rivers to catch cutthroat, said Angelo Vitale, the tribe’s fisheries program manager.

As late as the early 1980s, thousands of cutthroat returned to the lake’s tributary streams. After the runs dwindled, the tribe closed cutthroat-bearing creeks on the Coeur d’Alene Reservation to fishing. Statewide, fishing for cutthroat is primarily catch-and-release,

with some limited harvest.

Cutthroat need clean, cold water to thrive, which makes the fish an indicator of watershed health. Over the past century, Idaho’s cutthroat runs have been diminished by blocked access to spawning grounds, agricultural development of flood plains, industrial pollution and introduced species that compete with cutthroat for food.

For local runs, what happens in Lake Coeur d’Alene is also critical.

Only about 2 percent of cutthroat are returning to their natal streams on the Coeur d’Alene Reservation to spawn, said Jon Firehammer, the tribe’s research fisheries biologist. Based on healthy populations in other areas, the figure should be closer to 15 percent, he said.

At this point, the evidence points to northern pike as a culprit. Pike, which can reach 35 pounds, were illegally planted in Lake Coeur d’Alene during the 1970s. They spawn in the lake’s weedy, shallow bays, intercepting the young cutthroat moving down from the tributaries.

The tribe is contracting with the University of Idaho to evaluate how many cutthroat the northern pike consume. The pike are caught and forced to regurgitate so their stomach contents can be studied, Firehammer said. Then the pike are tagged and released back into the lake.

By December, results from the two-year study will be available. The study should reveal how large a role pike play in depressing cutthroat runs in the lake, said Vitale,

the tribe’s fisheries program manager.

Even if pike are large consumers of cutthroat, there may not be a simple solution, Corsi cautioned.

In an effort to keep the non-native predator in check, Idaho Fish and Game has lifted bag limits on northern pike. And in Northeastern Washington, members of the Kalispell Tribe and the state Department of Fish and Wildlife are gillnetting northern pike to reduce numbers on the Box Canyon Reservoir stretch of the Pend Oreille River. But once they’re introduced into ecosystems, nonnative species are nearly impossible to eradicate, Corsi said.

This fall, tribal fisheries technicians ran mild electrical currents through Benewah Creek, shocking the waters so they could net young cutthroat. The fish were measured, weighed and outfitted with a transmitter the size of a grain of rice be-

fore being released into the creek.

Each transmitter has a unique code, which allows the tribal fisheries department to track the cutthroats’ movements, including how many adults return to spawn.

Members of the Coeur d’Alene Tribe regularly asked Vitale when the runs will be strong enough to reopen a fishing season. Many recall trout-filled streams during the spring spawning season. Despite the complications of a changing ecosystem, Vitale’s hopeful that day will come.

Cutthroat are quite resilient, he said. Unlike salmon, they don’t die after laying and fertilizing eggs. Cutthroat can live for about a decade, spawning multiple times.

If the tribe can find a way to make the lake more hospitable to cutthroat, a centuries old fishery could be revived, Vitale said.

ON TARGET: JEFF FROST’S WEEKLY HUNTING REPORT



We are a little more than halfway through Idaho’s main hunting season. Last week’s full moon, which allows most game to be active at night, hampered hunting a bit, but numbers of game taken are now increasing.

Units 48 and 49 have been especially good this season, with hunters taking good numbers of deer and elk and seeing a fair amount of both while out hunting. Elk hunting in Unit 36 has been producing a surprising amount of large bulls this year. Elk hunting in the southern border units remains a little stagnant, with a few nice trophies taken so far.

Deer numbers taken in Unit 54 are finally starting to rally after a slow start, while Units 47 and 55 remain very tough for deer hunters. General hunt for deer in Unit 46 has been producing a steady number of deer, especially in the northern portion. Antelope harvest numbers have slowed this week, and most antelope hunts end today.

Unit 45 has been another success story this year, with incredible elk and deer trophies being taken.

13 Years of Change in the Solar System

This column debuted Dec. 24, 2000, with tips for watching the next day’s partial solar eclipse. Five hundred installments later, much has happened in the world of astronomy. Four partial solar eclipses, eight total lunar eclipses and 13 partial lunar eclipses (many too subtle for all but the most skilled observer to notice) have graced Idaho skies. Last year, Venus transited the sun’s face for the final time this century. Mercury has transited twice — in 2003 and 2006 — but only the latter was above our horizon.

Mercury has circled the sun more than 53 times since late 2000. More than 20 Venus years have transpired, but only 40 Venus days, due to its slowest-in-the-solar-system, backwards rotation on its axis. Almost seven Mars years have gone by, barely a Jupiter year, less than half a Saturn year, less than a sixth of a Uranus year, and less than a 12th of a Neptune year. Pluto has completed scarcely a 20th of an orbit, lost its planetary status (in 2006) and gained four moons (discovered between 2005 and 2012) to bring its total to five.

Bright comets, typically appearing roughly once a decade, have been lacking since 2000. But inbound Comet ISON may still perform well, late next month.

Planetary exploration since the dawn of the Third Millennium has included Deep Impact’s spectacular 2005 collision with a comet, the astounding longevity of Opportunity (about to begin its second decade of roving on Mars), the first Mercury orbiter (since March 2011), and Cassini delivering the most distant surface lander ever (on Saturn’s moon Titan) and now in its ninth year of orbiting the ringed planet. The New Horizons probe, nearly eight years after launch, is still streaking towards its first Pluto flyby, in August 2015.

Fall Chinook Harvest Season Ends Next Week, Mostly

JEROME • Chinook salmon fishing will end on the Snake and Clearwater rivers Thursday, Oct. 31 — except on a short reach of the Snake River below Hells Canyon Dam, which closes Nov. 17.

The season opened Sept. 1 on the Snake River between Lewiston and Hells Canyon Dam, in the lower Clearwater River downstream of the U.S. Highway 12 Memorial Bridge in

Lewiston, and in the Salmon River from its mouth upstream to Eye of the Needle Rapids.

The Snake River from Cliff Mountain Rapids to Hells Canyon Dam remains open until further notice or Nov. 17, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game said.

The daily bag limit is six adult Chinook salmon, the possession limit is 18 adult Chinook and there is no fall

season limit on adult Chinook. Only hatchery salmon, marked with a clipped adipose fin, may be kept.

Only adult Chinook must be recorded on the angler's salmon permit. There are no limits on jacks, but anglers must have a valid Idaho fishing license and salmon permit to fish for salmon.

As of Oct. 21, anglers had caught 267 marked adults and 161 jacks fall Chinook

and caught and released 1,142 unmarked fish in the lower Clearwater River, Fish and Game said. They caught and kept 861 adults and 671 jacks in the Snake River, for a total of 1,532 fish.

This year, almost 54,812 adult fall hatchery-origin Chinook and about 21,366 jacks crossed Lower Granite Dam; many of them returned to the Snake River above Lewiston.

which Fish and Game stocks with a photo printer and a pot of chili, then emerged with two copies of the photo. One for the brag board, and one for Brown.

She's not likely to forget that hunting trip.

2) Lymph Nodes and Bio Data

In a world of pickups, the Nissan Altima looked out of place.

But in the trunk, coolers packed with ice held the meat from two bucks — shot within an hour of each other in Unit 43 by Jennifer Sturgill of Mountain Home and her 14-year-old daughter, Caitlin Sturgill.

Caitlin made her shot from 137 yards, her mom said. “She did an awesome job.”

The bucks’ heads were wrapped in plastic and well taped. But mother and daughter unwrapped them for wildlife veterinarian Mark Drew to cut out the lymph nodes. Stored in vials, the lymph nodes would be tested later for chronic wasting disease —

which has never been detected in Idaho, Drew said.

That day, Fish and Game workers also measured antler lengths and the depth of fat at sternum. If deer were only field dressed and not cut up, biologists weighed them too. The data help to quantify nutrition and the deer population's condition going into winter, Smith said.

When Oregon 14-year-old Austin Stallard shot a very thin deer that hadn't shed the velvet on his antlers, his hunting companions knew something was wrong. They called a conservation officer who advised them to bring out the buck whole, or with as many organs as possible.

When the hunting party pulled into the check station Oct. 13, Drew was ready.

On a tarp in the parking lot, Drew pulled back the dead buck's skin and opened the body for a necropsy. As colleagues and hunters watched, Drew swiftly lifted out organs, cutting open some of them and occasionally sharpening his knife on a steel.

The lungs held the secret: pneumonia.

Offered a duplicate deer

tag and another chance to harvest, Austin opted instead to go home with the antlers of his buck. The deciding factor was a misshapen point on the antlers.

Saying little, Austin pointed to the strange 90-degree angle, still covered in velvet.

3) Mistakes and Warnings

Jeff Conant of Nampa shot a doe this month. And he tagged it — but not with his 2013 deer tag.

He'd mistakenly thrown away that one, along with his 2013 hunting license, thinking he was discarding his 2012 license and tag.

At the check station, regional conservation officer Josh Royse verified the 2013 purchases then decided Conant's mistake was an honest one. Conant voluntarily came through the check station and wasn't trying to hide anything, Royse said.

So Royse gave Conant a warning instead of a citation.

“I want to make sure it's very clear that you're done hunting this year,” Royse said.

Fish and Game officers “are afforded a significant

amount of discretion,” he explained later. “We're out here to catch the people who are breaking the rules on purpose.”

The day before, a hunter who shot a small buck instead of a doe had driven out of his way to turn himself in at the check station. Royse gave him a warning and confiscated the antlers.

“In hunting, honest mistakes happen,” he said. “And we reward honesty.”

When Chad Marx's Ford pulled into the check station Oct. 13, three deer lay among the hay bales on the Ford: a doe shot by the Nampa man's wife, his son's buck and his own buck.

“It's the first time we've tagged out in four or five years,” Laurie Marx said. Taking horses this year made that easier.

But when the Marxes quartered the deer to pack them out on horseback, they forgot to leave evidence of sex attached to the carcasses. They, too, got a warning from Royse — and brief anatomical instructions.

“I can guarantee you they'll be attached next year,” Chad Marx said.

Ask Fish and Game: Proxy Statements

Question: If I am transporting game for a friend, do I need a proxy statement?

Answer: Yes. Any person who transports any wildlife for another person or receives any wildlife for cleaning, processing, as a gift or for storage must have a written proxy statement signed by the person who killed the animal. The statement must specify

the numbers and kinds of wildlife, date taken, hunter's name and address, license, tag and permit numbers, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game said.

The tag should remain attached to the carcass.

A proxy form is available on Page 90 of the Big Game Seasons and Rules or on the Fish and Game website: <http://fishandgame.idaho.gov/>.

steelhead spend the winter scattered throughout the system waiting for spring spawning when they'll make a beeline for their native hatcheries.

“They'll catch fish all winter down by Riggins even, and some of those fish are probably from our upper-river hatcheries at Pahsimeroi and Stanley,” Hansen said.

Although the majority of fish winter below the North Fork, that doesn't necessarily translate into angler success. Hansen said the aforementioned river section is one of the more successfully fished and increasingly popular portions of the river. That has lead to more fishing pressure and a trend toward more fly fishermen (more and more using the two-handed spey rod) along its banks and in drift boats, he said.

‘Make Them Mad’

There is no right or wrong way to catch steelhead, but traditional spin reel methods are being challenged by the influx of crafty fly fishermen.

“It is an interesting fishery in that people will throw a lot of things at the fish and it's amazing what they'll catch them on,” Hansen said. “They'll use some gaudy-looking flies — that'll be a chartreuse woolly bugger — spinners and there are some anglers that'll just fish with gobs and gobs of worms.”

For Quigley and fellow fly fisherman Les Reitz, there's one “magic” steelhead fly: the green-buttet skunk.

The pattern, which Reitz demonstrated at a recent meeting of the Magic Valley Fly Fishers, looks a little wacky, kind of like something Walt Disney might dream up.

Its red tail and neon green plastic butt wrapped over silver tinsel sparkle underwater, he said. A collar of dyed guinea feathers and some prominent white hair wings set the rest of the fly. Reitz prefers to tie the pattern on a size four hook but ties it “short” so it will fish like a size six fly.

Although some steelhead can reach 40 inches in length, don't think you have to fish large patterns to get their attention, especially this time of year. As the winter progresses, steelhead will find a deep, dark hole to hunker down in and wait for the spring.

“Big is not better,” Quigley said.

“The great big flies are what you use in the really cold water when you have to put them on their nose.”

In the fall, as steelhead are still salty and full of life, your fishing should appeal to their aggressive, almost salmon-like behavior.

“You are trying to draw their attention,” Reitz said. “They are not eating. You are trying to make them mad.”

As you work down the river and swing your fly, the fish either has to slide back giving up its territory or draw a line in the sand and strike, Quigley said.

“What you are looking for is a player — somebody that'll say, 'I've had enough and I'm going to get you out of my way,’” he said.

At the end of your swing, Reitz suggested slowly stripping the line in on the dangle.

“When it gets down there (to the dangle), I'll let it pause and I'll drop my rod tip and let it go back again in case something is behind it,” he said. “Then, the first couple of strips I'll go slow with it before I really start ripping.”

Seek Soft Water

Reitz said the North Fork area sports some wonderful water. The rule of thumb is water, flowing at a pace similar to a relaxed walk, two to six feet deep. Don't wade out too far as steel-

head sometimes like to hug the banks.

“Fly fishers are going to know the water and tell by the width, depth and speed,” he said. “You are looking for soft water that they'll pull into.”

Reitz said 45 degrees is a good water temperature — if it's much colder, fish tend to slow.

“If I can find 50 - degree water, those fish are hot,” he said.

Look for an outside bend, where two current seams converge or near some structure, he said. Don't target deep holes because you'll need a split shot weight and an indicator to reach deep enough to interest the fish.

Reitz said he also covets gravel bars.

“If you get a nice, big, long gravel bar, I'll fish it all day long,” he said. “Normally what you have on a gravel bar is that you are going to be on the bend of the river or someplace where you are going to find that two- to six-foot - deep water.”

Steelhead in the Salmon River range from 20 to 40 inches and weigh anywhere from 3 pounds to 20 pounds, Hansen said.

The bag limit is three per day with nine in possession. Those fish must be hatchery fish, which are marked by a clipped adipose fin. Natural steelhead must be released immediately.

Anglers should make sure their fishing license is current and check Fish and Game regulations before heading out.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE®

The following example of a double throw-in is not especially complex, but the satisfaction that derives from being able to offer both opponents an unpalatable choice is a rich one.

If you had reached three no-trump after West's weak-two opening bid, there would have been no story of course, since nine tricks are easy enough. But in four hearts on a spade lead, you win in hand and play a heart to the ace, then take two more rounds of trumps. West exits with another top spade, which you take in dummy. What now?

Since West has nine cards in the majors, you are actually guaranteed to make your contract in very straightforward fashion. The solution is very simple: just cash the ace-king in both minor suits. If West follows twice in both minors, you can take your choice of plain-suit cards to lead now — they all work. But if, as here, West turns up with a singleton club, you exit by leading a diamond (and vice versa).

If West is allowed to score his diamond jack, he can also cash a spade trick, but must then play another spade and allow your club loser to vanish. If East overtakes the diamond jack to cash a club, then he is left with only minor-suit cards to play, and the defenders never get their spade winner. Either way, one opponent is going to be left feeling very irritated!

ORDINANCE NO. 564

AN ORDINANCE OF THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HEYBURN, IDAHO, AMENDING HEYBURN CODE TITLE 2 BY ADDING A NEW CHAPTER 5 PROVIDING FOR PROTECTION AND USE OF PUBLIC EASEMENTS; AND PROVIDING FOR SUSPENSION OF RULES AS TO THREE READINGS AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HEYBURN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: Title 2 of the Heyburn Code shall be amended to provide for a new Chapter 5 as follows:
Chapter 5

USE AND PROTECTION OF PUBLIC EASEMENTS

- 2-5-1: DEFINITIONS:
A. City. City means the City of Heyburn, Minidoka County, Idaho, or its authorized designees.
B. Easement. The word easement, as used in this Chapter and in Chapters 8 and 9 of this Code, shall mean an easement granted to or reserved by the City for municipal or public purposes, including, but not limited to: access to City property; use of land for access by the City to City utilities or use of land to place City utilities upon; or access to utilities or use of land by franchises or use by other authorized third party utility providers, as provided in Idaho Code Section 50-329 A or otherwise provided by law.
C. Encroachment. Encroachment is any impermissible or unlawful use of an easement. It includes any unauthorized use of an easement, including but not limited to: construction of unauthorized structures upon an easement; unauthorized blocking of any easement or unauthorized restriction of access or use of same; an expansion of use beyond the grant of use; use of the easement for purposes not granted or reserved by the City; or any other improper use or any misuse of the easement as defined by law.
2-5-2: CONTROL AND USE OF EASEMENTS.
A. Exclusive Control. All City easements are and at all times hereafter remain under the exclusive control of the City, unless otherwise herein provided. The City's consent or other permission to any party to use an easement does not negate the City's continuing right of control or supervision of the easement and its use.
B. Use. No structure use restriction of any kind is permitted upon a City easement except as herein provided. Access over a City easement shall be only as permitted by the City as herein provided or as established by policy of the City.
C. Storage Sheds, Dog Houses, Fences etc. Not Requiring a Building Permit. Storage sheds, dog houses, fences and other similar structures, which do not require a building permit, may be placed on a City easement upon the following conditions:
i. Such sheds, dog houses, etc. must be placed on skids or are otherwise not permanently affixed or anchored to the ground or to a concrete or other permanent foundation.
ii. Any fence constructed on an easement must, in the opinion of the City Superintendent, not be burdensome for the City to negotiate around to use or access the easement and also, must have an unlocked access gate or doorway to the easement of the size and type approved by the City Superintendent.
iii. The owner of the encroaching structure must sign an agreement with the City, in the form approved by the City, that provides for a hold harmless covenant in favor of the City in the event that the City, in its discretion, decides that the shed or structure must be moved or destroyed in order to make use of the easement. Such agreement shall cover the items stored in or with the structure as well. The agreement will also provide for the removal of the structure by the City, will occur at the cost of the owner and, in case of emergency, could occur without prior notice.
iv. The structure must be used for a lawful purpose and may not constitute a private or public nuisance.
v. The structure cannot store hazardous or toxic substances or any other substance, the intentional or inadvertent release of such would violate any environmental protection laws.
vi. The structure cannot be used for human occupancy.
vii. Consent to allow a structure to be placed on an easement lies in the sole discretion of the City and can be revoked at any time.
D. Structures or Fences Requiring a Building Permit. Unless otherwise herein permitted, a structure which requires a building permit to be built or which is placed on or attached to a foundation or otherwise anchored to the ground or any other encroaching structures not described in subsection C. above, may not be placed on a City easement. If the encroaching structure is not removed voluntarily by the land owner, then the City will undertake legal proceedings to have it removed, unless an emergency occurs which, in the City's opinion, requires its immediate removal, at which point the City will accomplish the removal without notice and at the expense of the owner of the structure.
E. Fencing of Easements. Any owner of land on which a City or other public easement exists may not fence any portion of the easement, except as herein provided. However, if the City agrees an owner can fence part or all of an easement or otherwise restrict access to the easement, such can only be done with the prior written consent of the City Council and only upon such terms as the City deems appropriate. In any event, the owner permitted to fence all or part of an easement must provide reasonable access to the City and emergency service providers, to any fenced or other portion of an easement where public access is otherwise restricted. The reasonableness of the access shall be determined by the City in its sole discretion. This restriction applies to all land owners or users of City easements.
F. Public Utility Structures.
i. Public utilities or other utility providers, as contemplated in Idaho Code Section 50-329A or otherwise, are granted access to the City's easements as herein provided.
ii. Multiple Uses. Easements can, as the City permits, be used for multiple utility uses, such as for access and also to provide for more than one buried or overhead utilities services or other facilities. In the case of multiple uses, consent for uses will generally be on a "first come, first served" basis, unless determined otherwise by the City, in its sole discretion, as to the needs of the City. Multiple users of utility easements are expected to use the facilities cooperatively and with due consideration to other users and to make accommodations as needed to permit multiple use of an easement.
iv. Access to facilities in the easement. Unless otherwise provided herein, public utilities will provide unrestricted access to the City to any easements they use in the City. Permission by the City to a public utility to fence any part or all of an easement shall be obtained only as provided above.
v. Application for use. Prior to use, public utilities or other utility providers must make application to the City Superintendent in order to place utility structures in a City easement. He shall determine exact location of use by the utility and what restrictions may be imposed upon use. A party aggrieved at the decision of the Superintendent may apply to the City Council for clarification or modification of the Superintendent's decision within 14 days of the Superintendent's decision.
vi. The City is the sole arbiter of use of the easement and also as to questions of joint use between lawful users.
G. No Prescriptive Rights. No party may gain prescriptive rights as to the use or occupancy of an easement nor any change or use or expansion of use.
H. Consent Not Implied. Consent to use or encroach upon an easement shall not be implied. All use of an easement must be by consent or other permission or grant of use, and must be made in writing and approved by the City Council.
I. Agreement for Use. Other than use of an easement by the City itself, use of an easement must be by written Agreement approved by the City. Abandonment of use of an easement for more than two (2) years shall require a new written Agreement to reestablish use.
J. Consent to Permit Encroachments. On occasion the City, in its sole discretion, may consent to an encroachment on an easement. The following minimum considerations will apply:
i. The structure must have been in continuous use for at least the last 10 years.
ii. The structure must be in good repair and not otherwise abandoned.
iii. If the structure is either destroyed or becomes dilapidated, it must be removed and replacement structure cannot be erected in its place unless the replacement structure is qualified for use under Sections 2C and 2D above.
iv. At the end of the useful life of the structure, no replacement structure may erected in its place.
K. Existing Uses. Existing lawful uses of easements for public utility purposes shall be deemed to be uses consented to by the City and no new written application is required. However, all other preexisting uses are subject to this Chapter and shall be abated unless a written Agreement with the City is obtained for continued use. So-called "grandfather" rights or any "preexisting lawful use" exemptions as defined in Heyburn Code Title 8, Chapter 10 shall not be applicable to the Chapter.

- 2-5-3: PROTECTION OF EASEMENTS AND PENALTIES AND REMEDIES
A. Encroachments or Other Misuse of Easements Declared to be a Nuisance. An encroachment upon a City easement is declared to be a public nuisance and may be abated by the City in any manner permitted by law.
B. Penalties and Remedies.
I. To enforce the provisions of this Chapter, the City shall have and does have and does reserve to itself all civil and other remedies available to it by statute, common law, and the other remedies and procedures set forth in this title or otherwise available in this code, all of which remedies shall be considered cumulative to the degree allowed by law.
II. These remedies include, but are not limited to, injunctive action to prohibit or curtail continued encroachment or prohibit the unlawful or unauthorized use of any easement.
III. Further, the City has the right of self help. In the event of the City's need to make full use of an easement or in its determination that the easement must otherwise be cleared of an encroachment, it can remove the encroachment at the cost of the landowner.
IV. Intentional encroachment upon a City easement, for which no consent is granted by the City, is punishable as an infraction.
Section 2: The City Council having by authorizing motion and vote waived the rule of requiring three separate readings of this Ordinance, by title and in full, therefore this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its first and only reading, passage, approval and publication.

Magic Valley Medical Center had alerted Health and Welfare, a police report says.

The 10-month-old's mother had taken the infant to a clinic May 4 because she had tiny red dots (petechia) on her face.

The mother, Jessica Karlinsey, testified Wednesday that as she was rushing out the door to the clinic, her husband was upset and having a harder time than usual saying what happened.

"He said, 'Last night I squeezed her,'" Jessica testified. "I couldn't pull anything else out of him because he was so upset."

Under cross-examination, deputy prosecutor Rosemary Emory asked Jessica about a statement she'd made to her husband in the recorded police interview.

"You asked Cory, 'But after the other two times you squeezed the kids, you said you wouldn't again. What makes this one different?'"

Jessica said her husband never denied squeezing their other two children.

After more discussion with her husband, Jessica testified, she believed he didn't intend to hurt their daughter, and the things he told police weren't the whole story.

Buhl police Officer Bill Deetz testified Tuesday that Karlinsey said he had spinal meningitis as a child and a seizure disorder that resulted in a "dead spot" in his brain behind his eyes, making it hard for him to articulate his thoughts.

Karlinsey testified that he had been worried in May about finances, car trouble and problems at work. Jessica asked him to help their baby get to sleep and went to bed early.

Karlinsey testified that he got the baby a bottle and set

her on his knee. The baby was crying, but the sound was just "background noise," he said, and wasn't angering him.

He said he broke through his fog of worried thoughts when he realized the baby had stopped crying.

"Was there a point when you realized you'd been squeezing?" Nelson asked.

No, Karlinsey said, he just realized something was wrong when he looked down at the baby and began trying to help her.

At the time, Karlinsey told police, his daughter had stopped breathing. Wednesday on the stand, he said he wasn't sure.

"I looked down at her body, and I assumed the worst," he said.

Karlinsey said he didn't know he was squeezing the baby, didn't intend to harm her and hadn't been trying to quiet her.

Under cross-examination, deputy prosecutor Rosemary Emory asked Karlinsey how long he'd spent preparing his testimony.

"I don't do the same thing twice," Karlinsey said repeatedly.

Practicing his testimony wouldn't have helped, he said, though he did go over the events with his attorney and listened to the recorded police interview.

Emory repeatedly asked Karlinsey why his court testimony differed from what he told police.

"I was feeling anxious," he said. "I didn't know how to give them the right answer."

"Wouldn't the right answer have been the truth?" Emory asked.

"Yes," Karlinsey said.

Karlinsey's story to his wife also changed from what he said on the stand, Emory said.

"I fumbled over my words and, with a chance to explain myself, I am clarifying those words," he said. "I'm trying to clear things up."

During questioning by Nelson, Karlinsey said his disability makes it difficult for him to articulate his thoughts.

"It's hard for me to explain myself to other people," he said.

Karlinsey said he often thinks he's said something clearly, but the point doesn't get across, causing him to feel anxious and frustrated.

"It's not what I said; it's not what they understood; it's not what I meant to say," he said.

Jessica testified that her husband misses certain social cues and has a hard time explaining things.

In his closing argument, Nelson said Karlinsey's court version of events augmented but didn't totally contradict what he said in May.

Karlinsey never intended to hurt or squeeze his daughter, Nelson said. He also questioned whether the baby actually stopped breathing.

"He was off in la-la land thinking about his life," Nelson said. "The next thing he knew, she wasn't crying."

In her closing argument, Emory said she believes Karlinsey loves his daughter, and that's why he expressed remorse.

Emory played the taped police interview again and asked the jury to think about why Karlinsey changed his story.

If elected, he said, he will talk with residents to gauge the priority issues.

Wheeler, who has owned a business for 29 years, said she loves Gooding and, "I really want to hear what you (residents) want to say."

If elected, Wheeler said, she will create a town Facebook page, put a phone in her house to be more accessible and go out into the community.

She also said she'd meet with department heads to find out what they want.

"I want to continue what Gooding's tradition has always been — family and community," she said.

Asked Wednesday about her two misdemeanor convictions for driving under the influence, Wheeler said those occurred during a difficult period when she was going through divorces and financial difficulties.

She said she's very sorry for "horrible choices I made." Wheeler said she learned from those experiences and is proud of how she evolved. "It's never going to happen again; I know that," she said.

In 2003, she was convicted by a jury of misdemeanor DUI. A withheld judgment was entered, but the paperwork wasn't filed,

according to Gooding County Magistrate Court. Wheeler paid \$313.50 in fines and was ordered to one year of probation but was discharged early, court records show.

In 2009, Wheeler again was found guilty of misdemeanor DUI. She paid \$535.30 in fines, was ordered to complete one year of probation and had a temporarily restricted driving permit, court records show.

In 2005, she was found guilty of a misdemeanor false report to 911. She paid \$172.50 in fines and was ordered to six months of probation.

During the forum, Waddoups said, "I've lived here for 50 years, and all I've seen is Gooding go downhill."

He said he wants new businesses and updated ordinances, as some have been on the books since the 1940s.

If elected, Waddoups said, he'd implement monthly town hall meetings to take residents' suggestions and help them stay informed, and he would meet with all the city departments to get informed.

Waddoups was convicted in 2002 of misdemeanor petit theft, according to Gooding County Magistrate Court records.

He told the *Times-News*

that he went to King's to get medicine, picked up a can of paint, forgot he was holding it and accidentally walked out of the store with it. Waddoups completed three months of probation and paid \$272.50 in fines, online court records show.

Candidates at the forum also addressed the \$5 million ballot measure to update the city's 70-year-old irrigation system.

City officials had sought approval to take on \$9.45 million in long-term debt for the project, but a District Court judge ruled In February that Gooding must seek voter approval.

Waddoups said the project is essential, but the Nov. 5 ballot proposal doesn't address the whole issue.

The city "let our irrigation system go to crap," he said.

Nelson said the city was looking at a few options for the system, but bringing the bond to voters is the best solution.

Eichholz said the bond election is the only way to go. The water system now is "patched with bubble gum and rubber, pretty much," he said.

Wheeler said no one wants their water bill to go up, but if a bond issue isn't passed now, improvements will only cost more later.

Thursday. "I think our police need to have some authority over things like this."

Minidoka County Sheriff Eric Snarr said multiple arrests were made during the festival for vehicle burglaries and marijuana use.

Kasota Park owners Billie and Vicki Vandever said the potential regulation would be

an unnecessary government overreach.

The draft ordinance mirrors those already in place in Twin Falls and Ada counties, said Minidoka County Prosecutor Lance Stevenson.

Similar local laws around the country have been accused of limiting citizens' constitutional rights to assembly. Proponents of similar ordinances typically argue that the move is about addressing a quality of life issue.

Mass Gathering Ordinance

- Mass gatherings are defined as 500 or more people.
- Application must be submitted to Minidoka County commissioners at least 60 days before the assembly.
- Separate licenses required for each location in which 500 or more people will assemble.
- Ticket sales are restricted to the maximum number of people stated in license.
- No license will be issued to any anticipated assembly of 500 or more people if the proposed location is within a quarter mile of the mean high water mark of the Snake River or if location may be hazardous, dangerous or detrimental to the public health, safety and welfare unless appropriate safety provisions have been met.
- Mass Gathering Ordinance shall not apply to any regular established, permanent place of worship, stadium, athletic field, arena, auditorium, coliseum, schools or other similar permanently established place of assembly.

- Mass Gathering Ordinance shall not apply to government-sponsored fairs on established fairgrounds or to assemblies required to be licensed by other county ordinances and regulations, or to assemblies within any incorporated municipality.
- Applicant for a mass gathering license must determine the maximum number of people to be assembled or admitted to the assembly site.
- Potable water, meeting all federal and state requirements for purity, sufficient to provide drinking water for the maximum number of people to be assembled at the rate of at least 1 gallon per person per day and water for bathing at the rate of at least 10 gallons per person per day.
- Separate enclosed toilets for males and females must be provided.
- License may be revoked by the county at any time if license compliance is not complete.
