Internment to Insight

Magic Valley writers tour Minidoka Japanese camp, pen thoughts.

EDEN • A group of writers sat on benches scribbling into their notebooks.

The damp buzz of cluster flies echoed against the window panes.

Beyond the walls were fields of lush southern Idaho farmland. Sugar beet trucks scooted down the road, flinging their guts into the basalt-speckled landscape.

A former cage, all of it. Minidoka National Historic Site — 33,000 acres where the phrase “Land of the Free” did not apply from August 1942 to October 1945. Now farmland, the site once was a prison for about 13,000 Japanese-Americans forced out of their homes in response to the attack on Pearl Harbor and the start of World War II.

“Fear is powerful,” said Kasey Heward, a Declo High School English teacher.

Heward was one of the writers who walked through Minidoka last Thursday, soaking in details, reflecting on what it means to be gathered and fenced, and drawing comparisons to modern society.

The session was led by Judy Grigg Hansen, College of Southern Idaho professor of English and Language Arts. It was one of three writing expeditions Hansen has led to link students and writers with Idaho’s historical inspiration.

Minidoka was the seventh-largest city in Idaho when the camp was active, said Carol Ash, chief of interpretation and education for the National Parks Service at Hagerman Fossil Beds National Monument and Minidoka.

Also known as Hunt Camp, it was one of 10 Japanese internment camps set up across the nation. First- and second-generation Japanese-Americans were forced out of their homes and assigned a family number — “bagged and tagged like baggage,” Ash said.

“These sites are incredibly important to our nation’s history to make sure that the infringement of

civil liberties that happened here at Minidoka does not happen again,” she said.

Ash pointed to dusty, dead hunks of land where one of eight watch towers stood, guards pointing loaded guns inward.

She pointed to where the “welfare office” stood and to

where a Japanese garden was planted.

At that moment, inspiration struck English student Joseph Wayment. He called it a “victory garden” — a symbol of Americans’ strength in the opposition of oppression.

“It’s a ‘V,’” he said of the basalt

stepping stones outlining the garden. “It could be symbolic of victory or valor. It was a traditional Japanese garden, which to me symbolizes defiance against tyranny. This very country was founded on defiance against tyranny.”

TWIN FALLS • Deputies say 21 cows died when a cattle truck rolled Tuesday afternoon south of Twin Falls.

Kenneth Womack, 48, was driving the truck southbound about 3 p.m. on 2600 East at 2900 North in Twin Falls County when the truck missed a curve and rolled onto its passenger side, said Lori Stewart, spokeswoman for the Twin Falls County Sheriff’s Office.

Each cow was worth \$1,000 to \$1,500, she said.

The truck was hauling 55 cows, she said. Womack was cited for driving too fast for conditions.

The area of the crash was blocked for four hours, she said.

Heyburn Hopefuls Vie for City Council

HEYBURN • Six candidates are jockeying for two seats on the Heyburn City Council.

Incumbents Joanne Justesen and Leann Smith are challenged by Brian Duncan, Dick Galbraith, Sherman “Dusty” Galliher and Daniel Jensen in next week’s vote on Nov. 5.

City Council members are annually paid \$3,600.

Each challenger said they feel that Heyburn officials are engaging in irresponsible fiscal practices and making poor decisions with taxpayers’ money.

“Some spending choices have been questionable,” said Galbraith, citing the city’s police dispatch contract and garbage removal contract. “They spent more money to make a contract for dispatching services with Minidoka County rather than staying with Cassia County.”

In 2012, City Council members approved a garbage removal bid to PSI Environmental Systems that was 21 percent than the lowest bid offered. The council also declared PSI as the city’s only contractor for garbage removal, drawing criticism from citizens and other waste management companies.

“We’re now getting a lesser quality service for more money,” Jensen said of the new dispatching contract. “Cassia was doing a better job.”

Galliher said he would be able to provide a leveled approach to the city finances. Galliher said that his 32-years of experience as a 32-year a waste water operator proves that he has the ability to handle financial decisions facing the city.

Other areas of concern for candidates include economic development and improving the city’s infrastructure.

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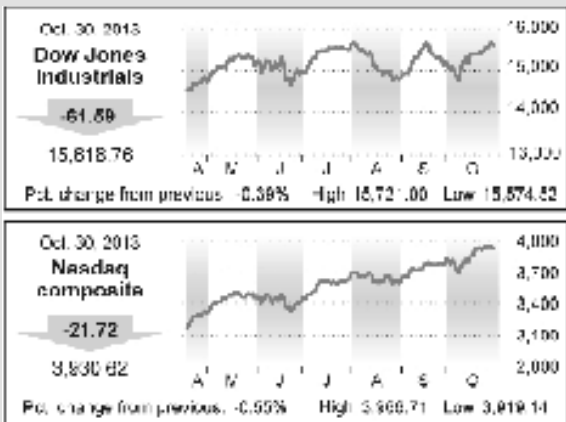

Stocks Fall after Fed Says US Still Needs Support

NEW YORK (AP) • The stock market retreated from all-time highs Wednesday after the Federal Reserve said the U.S. economy still needed help from its stimulus program.

In its latest policy statement, the nation's central bank said it will continue buying \$85 billion in bonds every month and keep its benchmark short-term interest rate near zero. The bond purchases are designed to keep borrowing costs low to encourage hiring and investment.

Hidden History
The Battle of Bear River

FRANKLIN • Nearly 151 years ago, the worst single slaughter of American Indians in U.S. history occurred along the Bear River just north of the Utah border.

Franklin is the oldest permanent settlement in Idaho and was settled by 13 Mormon families in 1860. The area was also the winter home of the Northwestern Band of the Shoshone Nation, led by Chief Sagwitch and War Chief Bear Hunter.

Friction between early settlers and the Shoshone developed and Utah Governor Frank Fuller asked the U.S. Secretary of War to provide a temporary regiment of mounted rangers to protect the settlers along the Utah-Idaho border.

Col. Patrick E. Connor — who was known for his belief that Indians were violent savages who needed to be destroyed at all costs — and his California Volunteers were ordered to Fort Douglas, Utah.

After an incident in which several settlers were killed, Connor sent a small infantry north from the fort with artillery and supply wagons. Four days later, Connor and his cavalry set out in deep snow and freezing temperatures to attack the winter camp the Shoshone called Boa Ogoi, 140 miles away.

As he left the fort, Connor promised to take no prisoners.

The group travelled at night to conceal their approach, but a white friend warned Sagwitch that Connor was coming in search of revenge.

Connor and 200 of his men arrived at the camp at 6 a.m. on Jan. 29, 1863. Sagwitch expected Connor, but the camp was not ready to do battle, said his granddaughter Mae Parry.

“He thought that perhaps this military man was a wise and just man,” said Parry. “He thought the colonel

would ask for the guilty men, whom he would immediately have handed over.”

But Connor didn't ask any questions. His men began firing when the sun rose.

The Boa Ogoi camp sat in a protected ravine above the Bear River and was easily defended. But the well-armed military force was too much for the 400 or 500 Shoshoni. Some jumped into the freezing river and drowned. Some swam to safety and joined other Shoshone bands.

But most — men, women and children — were killed. Bear Hunter was tortured and eventually killed. Sag-

witch escaped during the four-hour battle and survived.

A small number of children were spared and adopted to by Mormon families.

In all, the Shoshone death toll is estimated at 350. Connor lost two dozen men.

ONLINE: Did Almo Creek Massacre Really Happen?

At the “On Assignment” blog, Times-News journalists take you behind the scenes as they work. Here's an excerpt from a post by Mychel Matthews:

“According to locals, Northern Shoshone warriors under Chief Pocatello attacked a wagon train in 1861 and

killed nearly 300 west-bound settlers near Almo.

There's a monument honoring those killed in the massacre next to the Almo schoolhouse on Main Street.

“Most historians completely dismiss the so-called massacre, saying that it never happened. Some have called for the removal of the monument, which was erected more than 75 years ago by the ‘Sons and Daughters of Idaho Pioneers.’ “Other historians are

more forgiving, saying several small skirmishes happened in the 1850s and 1860s, which, over time, have melded into one in the collective memory of the town.

“Almo is a town lost in time. And that's the way the residents like it. ...

“I grew up knowing about the California Trail and the Almo Creek Massacre, and I had no reason to question the monument. But as I studied local history, I realized how controversial the so-called massacre is. ...”

It's Halloween and as parents and their little ones prepare for trick-or-treating tonight, there aren't any major weather concerns to get in the way of the traditional night of candy gathering.

Your weather forecast for today will feature more sunshine than we saw on Wednesday. Skies should be mostly sunny across southern Idaho and afternoon temperatures will be warmer, reaching the mid-to-upper 50s. Winds will be gusty once again, possible reaching 30 to 35 mph out of the west. These strong winds could linger into this evening while everyone is out trick-or-treating.

Former physical education instructor brings laughter yoga to Twin Falls.

TWIN FALLS • Laughter is healing. Laughter is contagious. And now, “laughter yoga” is sweeping the world. Mary Martinat, a former physical education instructor, is bringing the health craze to Twin Falls. Martinat, 76, retired three years ago from a lifetime of teaching. But she soon found herself coasting through her days with no purpose and she didn’t like it. Then she discovered laughter yoga and discovered a new passion. “It’s life changing,” she said. “It changes a person’s whole outlook.”

Laughter yoga is fun. It’s lively. But don’t worry; practitioners don’t have to stand on their heads. Laughter yoga combines laughter exercises with yoga breathing, and increases blood flow to the body and brain. “When you laugh, you change and when you change, the whole world changes around you,” Martinat said, quoting laughter yoga founder Dr. Madan Kataria. Kataria started the first laughter yoga club in 1995. It has now spread to 65 countries.

“Adding laughter to your life will boost self-confidence, promotes compassion and deepens creativity,” said Mary’s daughter, Karen Martinat, a Licensed Clinical Social Worker in Twin Falls, who specializes in depression, anxiety, and grief and loss issues. Laughter relieves stress; reduces anxiety, fear and depression; enhances the immune system; improves res-

piratory and cardiovascular systems; relieves pain; and encourages relaxation of muscles and mind, she said. “Our world needs this,” said Mary Martinat, who was recently certified as a laughter yoga instructor. A handful of federal and academic studies suggest laughter yoga results in lower blood pressure and im-

proved mental well-being among participants. In addition to leading a laughter yoga club in Twin Falls, Martinat is a life coach, who guides people through life transitions. “So many people aren’t doing what they love to do in life,” she said. “They have lost their purpose and passion.” Martinat is opening her new wellness business “Laugh to Live” in November. Jan Mittleider, a retired College of Southern Idaho physical education professor, said Martinat is an inspiration and exemplifies the adage that age is just a number. “She is exactly the kind of role model we need at any age,” Mittleider said. Martinat is opening her

Final University of Idaho Presidential Candidate Visits T.F.

TWIN FALLS • The last of the five finalists competing to be the next president of the University of Idaho met with community members and extension faculty Wednesday in Twin Falls. Laurie Stenberg-Nichols, provost and vice president for academic affairs at South Dakota State University, made a brief statement before fielding questions from an audience of about 20 people. In 2008, Stenberg-Nichols served for nearly a year as interim president at Northern State University in South Dakota. “That was really great experience and what I found was that I really liked it,” she said.

Stenberg-Nichols said she believes she can contribute the most to a land grant university such as the University of Idaho. Stenberg-Nichols was an associate professor in the School of Family and Consumer Sciences at the University of Idaho in 1994 and served as an assistant professor from 1988 to 1994. “A lot has changed in 20 years. There’s a few things that were not so positive such as budgets, cutbacks — but I think a good leader could take care of them,” she said. “Every state needs a strong land grant university.” One aspect Stenberg-Nichols said she would like to grow, if selected, is online education and con-

ducting a market analysis of what people in Idaho want. Stenberg-Nichols shared how SDSU currently has 20 degree programs that are completely online, and many are master’s programs. “We have students in every state but one,” she said.

But she stressed that face to face education is always key with online serving as an enhancement. “We still need those great teachers,” Stenberg-Nichols said. And while traditional students are still “the bread and butter,” she said universities need to start looking at new emerging markets, such as online professional master’s degrees. “What are the professional developments you need in the state?” she said. Another market Stenberg-Nichols mentioned was international students and creating English as a second language (ESL) programs that could get students prepared to enroll in degree programs. “We just need to be more entrepreneurial in what we do with higher education. What can we do that we haven’t done in the past?” Stenberg-Nichols said. The State Board of Education hopes to announce the new University of Idaho President in November.

Man Made Threats, Demanded Wallet, Twin Falls Police Say

TWIN FALLS • A 23-year-old man has been charged with robbery after demanding a man’s wallet and making threats outside a Twin Falls grocery store, police say. Juan M. Cervantes-Vazquez, of Twin Falls, was arraigned Monday in Twin Falls County Court on charges of robbery and driving under the influence. At about 6:40 p.m. Sunday, police were called to Albertson’s at 1221 Addison Ave. in Twin Falls, said city spokesman Joshua Palmer.

The victim told police Cervantes-Vazquez and a young boy approached him just inside the store and Cervantes-Vazquez told him it “wasn’t cool,” for him to point guns at his young cousin, Palmer said. The man said he’d never seen Cervantes-Vazquez before but recognized the boy from a children’s party the week before. The two men stepped outside to talk when Cervantes-Vazquez became threatening and demanded the man’s wallet, Palmer said. Out of fear, the man handed over his wallet, then headed to his car.

Palmer said Cervantes-Vazquez followed him and told the man he knew the man’s address. The man then drove home and called police. Cervantes-Vazquez never displayed a weapon, Palmer said. Palmer said officers met up with Cervantes-Vazquez in a driveway. Police said he smelled of alcohol after exiting his vehicle, and officers gave him field sobriety tests, which he failed. Cervantes-Vazquez is being held in the Twin Falls county jail in lieu of a \$50,000 bond. A preliminary hearing is scheduled for Nov. 8.

Construction at Minidoka began in June 1942, and the first prisoners arrived in August. No one tried to escape and, for an internment camp, Minidoka was “benign,” Ash said. Children played in the guard towers. Internees helped harvest the area’s sugar beets due to a labor shortage. Some even helped build the camp.

“They put the barbed-wire fence up ... in November,” she said. “And so when they did, they said, ‘Why? We’ve been here for months; we haven’t gone anywhere. Where are we going to go even if we leave?’”

Each of the 36 residential blocks had 12 barracks, a dining hall, a laundry and sanitation building and recreation hall. Built without insulation, the 20-by-120-foot barracks held six small apartments.

“Having been registered and everything, they would walk in, there would be a bare light bulb in the center of the ceiling, a pot-bellied stove and Army-issued cots, and that was it,” Ash said.

For some, it wasn’t all that bad. One woman told Ash she “had a ball” as a kid at Minidoka. Only when children internees grew up and talked to their parents did they realize how difficult it was. Two people drowned in the canal trying to escape the summer heat.

“For kids, they had other kids, they didn’t have chores like they did back home ... they had a great time, and they provided Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts and all sorts of activities for them,” Ash said.

Those details struck creative writing student Zandra Edwards. As a grandmother, she said, she was inspired to write about what it would be like as a child brought to the camp.

“I think about my 12-year-old grandson being put in a situation like that, and it’s unbelievable that something like that could happen,” she said.

After the tour, Hansen asked the group to think about walls and fences, to consider and write about what freedoms Americans give up and what concessions are made because of fear.

Writers discussed the National Security Agency’s spy-

ing, immigration, voter rights, hysteria surrounding the recent federal government shutdown and more.

“When we were at the post office area, we were talking about how internees had their letters chopped up or scribbled out and their letters read by the government,” said Wayment, an Army veteran who fought in Operation Iraqi Freedom.

“Now we have the Patriot Act and the scare from 9/11.”

Perhaps, he reasoned, the camp isn’t so different from other things in American history.

“Is this really outside of what America is at heart? Boxing people in when we are afraid of them, segregating people who are different from us? That’s kind of been a part of America’s history as

well,” he said.

Heward wondered what she would have thought about the camp if she were alive in 1942. Could she write about that? She worries about her safety in today’s world of terrorism, but is profiling a “necessary evil?”

“Is it something that needs to be done?” she asked. “But being here, putting it in perspective, is this what we want? I just have a ton of ideas floating in my head.”

That’s what Hansen said she wanted. When she wandered around Minidoka on her own, reading signs and mulling the site’s history, she was inspired to write a poem.

Hansen also led students to Ritter Island in Thousand Springs State Park to reflect on nature and to Rock Creek Station and the Sticker Homesite to write about connections and intersections. She had been wanting to do the excursions for years but never found the time.

It helps the process when a writer has a firm understanding of a subject, Hansen said. Some of the more interesting pieces she’s read have come from developing writing students who wrote about what they knew intimately — working in a machine shop or the family tradition of branding cattle.

“As I’ve really been focusing on Idaho places, I’ve been thinking about how my students oftentimes don’t appreciate the really cool history, geography and nat-

Board Puts Controls on Health Exchange Work

BOISE (AP) • Idaho’s insurance exchange board backed new rules Wednesday meant to keep insiders from profiting inappropriately from ties to the Internet health care marketplace — a response to a no-bid contract worth up to \$375,000 awarded to a former board member.

The board decided that members who leave the volunteer panel appointed by Gov. C.L. “Butch” Otter must wait at least 12 months before securing paid work with the exchange unless two-thirds of the panel votes to waive that restriction.

“I think it’s appropriate,” state Sen. Jim Rice, R-Caldwell and an exchange board member, said after the four-hour meeting.

“That removes the temptation completely,” Rice added. “It allows the public to feel confident in the integrity of the exchange.”

Earlier this month, Your Health Idaho exchange director Amy Dowd struck a \$180 an hour deal with former board member Frank Chan without board approval or competition from other bidders. Amid criticism of the contract, the board later curtailed Dowd’s contracting powers.

Last week, Chan canceled the contract that called for him to oversee the building of a state-based exchange enrollment system to replace the glitch-plagued federal software the state is currently using to implement President Barack Obama’s Internet-

based plan.

Still, the exchange board has hired Frederick Mack, a private corporate governance lawyer, to review how the pact between Dowd and Chan materialized.

Mack told Your Health Idaho board members the bill for his investigation won’t exceed \$15,000 and he should be finished within a week.

He didn’t return a phone call from The Associated Press seeking comment on the scope of his probe. Chan also didn’t return a phone call.

Since the Oct. 1 rollout, insurance exchanges across the U.S. have been dogged by enormous problems. Idaho has been no exception, with problems fueling a

big worry among exchange leaders: People who really need and want health insurance coverage may become so disenchanted that they’ll simply give up.

For instance, it could be weeks before Your Health Idaho includes an online tool to allow prospective insurance seekers to easily compare and shop for policies, while determining their potential income-based federal subsidy.

Additionally, some prospective buyers have been turned away from federal call centers, said Your Health Idaho operations manager Alberto Gonzalez, adding that the state’s own 10-person call center in Boise has become “sort of our crisis center” to field complaints.

Given the hurdles, Gonzalez told

the board, he’s advising people now seeking coverage to first call an insurance agent, decide on the appropriate policy that fits their needs, and only then contact a federal call center by telephone to complete the transaction — hopefully with somebody willing to take the call, he said.

“They’re going to go pre-Internet,” Gonzalez said, conceding it’s a solution that harkens back to an era before the Web.

In the meantime, Idaho has delayed its initial \$3.5 million marketing campaign for the exchange. It’s now being evaluated on a weekly basis until many of the problems have been remedied, exchange spokeswoman Ysabel Bilbao said.

Pet Tips For Halloween and the Holidays — Plus One Plea

TWIN FALLS • With a chill in the air, ghouls and goblins out tonight and the holidays fast approaching, your friendly local animal shelter director has some tips for pet owners.

Freezing weather, tempting treats and scary costumes all can be difficult for pets this time of year, said Debbie Blackwood, director of the Twin Falls Animal Shelter.

- Here are her tips:
- Chocolate and raisins are poisonous to dogs. After trick-or-treating, be sure to keep candy tucked away where Fido and Fluffy can't reach it. Many plants make pets sick too, so keep that in mind when the poinsettias start to show up.
 - Cats, especially black cats, are more likely to be targeted by hooligans around Halloween, Blackwood said, so it's best to keep outdoor cats in tonight. "Cats are targets anyway, but black ones are more susceptible to cruelty on Halloween," she said.
 - It's probably best to keep dogs away from the front door as trick-or-treaters arrive. Even dogs that are normally OK with strangers can get spooked

by costumes.

- Even though the heat of summer is gone, pets still need plenty of water.
- The paw pads and ears of pets are especially sensitive to cold and frostbite. "Heavy frost or ice can be damaging (to pads)," Blackwood said. The tips of cat ears are easily damaged by cold, too, she said. "Once they're frostbitten, the tissue dies," she said.
- Adequate outside shelter in winter is important. Adequate is the key word, Blackwood said. A plastic kennel isn't good enough. Make sure the animal's shelter is insulated and warm. If you do add insulation, make sure it's pet friendly and won't make your pet sick. But it's best to keep pets indoors when it's cold outside.
- Now is a good time of year to make sure no dripping anti-freeze is pooling in a shop or driveway. Animals are attracted to the sweet-tasting liquid, which is deadly. So if your dog likes to accompany you while you work in an outbuilding, make sure to provide water and keep that canine away from dangerous liquids.
- Make sure decorations, from rubber skeletons to Christmas balls,

are away from pets. "Cats like to eat tinsel," Blackwood said, a dangerous snack.

If your dog rides in the back of your pickup, the winter wind is harsh on its ear tips. Many protective kennels are available to make riding in the truck safer. But if the average person saw what veterinarians see from animals riding in the backs of pickups, they wouldn't do it, she said.

And the plea: People for Pets, which runs the Magic Valley Humane Society, is looking for pet food donations for its pet food pantry.

"We're out," Blackwood said.

The food helps pet owners who can't afford pet food for a period of time. Many people surrender animals to the shelter when a job is lost, simply because they can't afford pet food. Donating pet food to the shelter helps keep new animals from being brought in.

Any amount can help, she said, even an opened bag that your pet didn't like.

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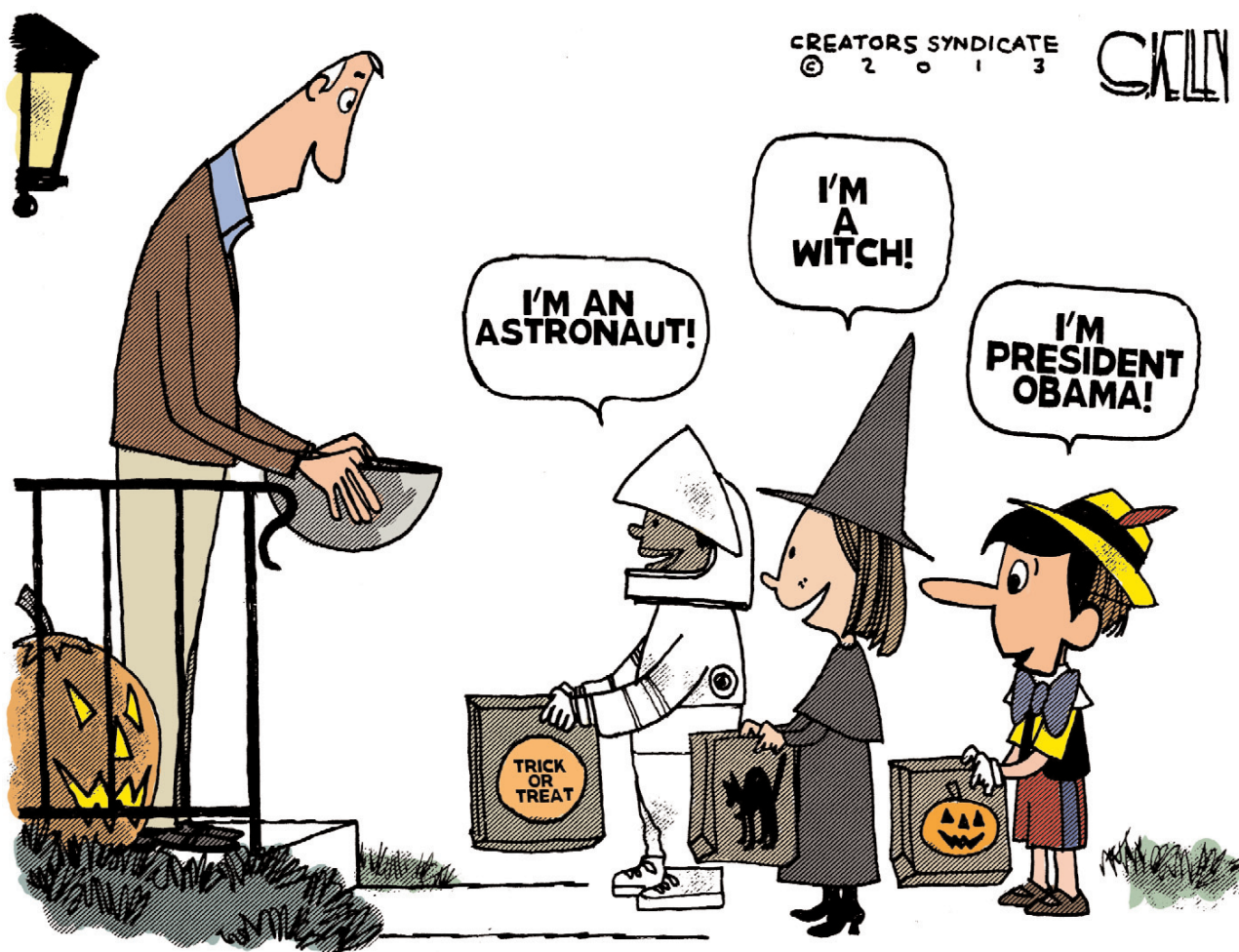

GOP Now Fighting Obamacare the Right Way

The following editorial appears on Bloomberg View:

When House Republicans direct their opposition to Obamacare toward aggressive oversight rather than apocalyptic budget shenanigans, they can do themselves and the country a lot of good. That was obvious when the House Ways and Means Committee posed some smart, tough questions about HealthCare.gov to Marilyn Tavenner, who, as the administrator of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, is perhaps the person most directly responsible for the fiasco. Many of them went unanswered, unfortunately, but here are some important questions they should press again:

- What happened to President Barack Obama's promise that Americans would be able to keep their doctors and their insurance plans?
- How big is the gap between current enrollment and the level that's needed to make the exchanges work?

Tavenner failed to even acknowledge the frustration felt by people whose plans are now being canceled, and whose insurers are blaming it on the law. She said the government can't stop doctors from leaving a given insurer or insurers from changing their plans. In that case, the president had no business making the pledge in the first place.

- How will the government prevent people from inadvertently getting subsidies they're not entitled to?

Republicans pressed Tavenner not only to provide the raw numbers but also to say how many of those who sign up are eligible for Medicaid, how many are young and healthy, and how many are in fact covered by their employers, making them ineligible. To be transparent, CMS will have to include that data in its first enrollment report next month. If it does, Republicans can share some of the credit.

- Can CMS claw back some of the money it has paid to the contractors most responsible for the website's problems?

Tavenner said only that she would provide information after the hearing, not that she intended to get some of the government's money back. Asking hard, practical questions aimed at steering Obamacare back on course may not be as satisfying as endlessly voting to repeal the law, or obsessing over what the president knew and when he knew it. But it's far more enlightening, and it may end up making the health-care law work better.

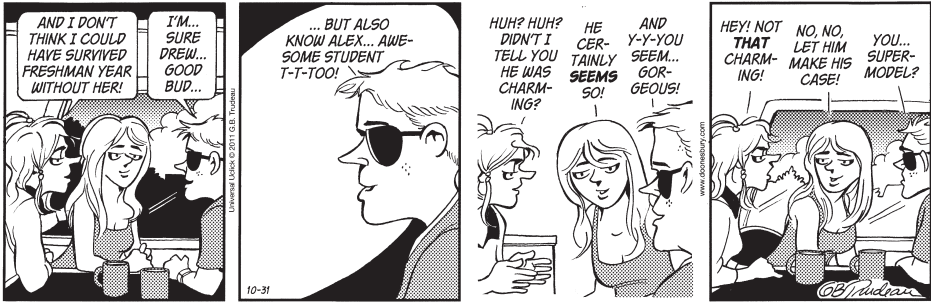

Gooding Takes \$5M Bond to Voters for Water System Improvements

GOODING • Gooding voters will decide on a \$5 million bond next month for improvements to the city's water system.

The bond measure will be on the ballots Nov. 5. City officials say a project to upgrade the water system is long overdue.

Gooding city clerk Morri Hall said they're seeking a vote in order to address water issues so that "when irrigation collapses, it doesn't affect the water supply."

"We're just trying to make sure we don't go upside down," she said.

City Councilman Mel Magnelli said city officials will have go back to study what they can do and see how to make things work, should the ballot measure fail.

The current water system has rotting pipes and high sediment levels, former mayor Duke Morton told the *Times-News* last year. It has caused poor water movement and flooding into some basements.

If passed, the bond would allow for a water improvement project – drilling additional wells and upgrading the distribution system.

Also, the current irrigation system would be abandoned. The city plans to provide irrigation water through the existing drinking water infrastructure.

Construction would begin in fall 2014 with expected completion in for summer 2015, if the measure passes.

Gooding residents can expect a \$9.81 estimated monthly rate increase if the bond passes, starting next spring.

But the project would eliminate a yearly \$39.91 per-lot gravity irrigation charge.

The city has been trying to address water issues since 2009, Hall said.

Engineers from Keller Associates have worked

If passed, the bond would allow the city to upgrade the system to meet DEQ standards and provide sufficient capacity.

City officials are planning to address the need to recharge the Eastern Snake River Plain Aquifer – the Lake Erie-sized underground body of water – to accommodate the new wells.

"That way, we won't deplete the aquifer by taking additional water out," Gooding mayor Walt Nelson said.

City officials also plan to apply for a \$350,000 Department of Commerce block grant for the water project.

The application is due by the end of November.

Nelson said they'll find out this spring if the state funding has been approved.

If the city receives the grant, they can either reduce the amount the bond money tagged for the water project or use the money to make additional improvements, Mullen said.

Hall said the water issues came to a head last year.

The DEQ offered the city a \$7 million loan at a 1 percent interest rate, she said, and city officials tried to move forward with a water improvement project.

Gooding officials sought a district judge's approval to take on \$9.45 million in long-term debt, using a provision of Idaho law that allows "ordinary and necessary" expenses to skirt a public vote.

A group of residents successfully challenged the move, sending the bond to the voters.

MOSCOW (AP) • Idaho authorities are looking for a convicted forgery artist who absconded from parole in northcentral Idaho.

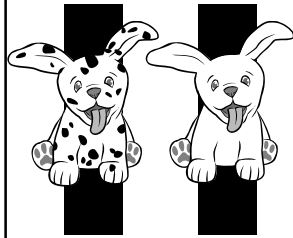

Seasons of Hope Files for Bankruptcy

POCATELLO (AP) • A former mental health care services provider accused of fraud by the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare has filed for bankruptcy.

Seasons of Hope, LLC and its owner, Heath Sommer, released a statement Tuesday announcing the bankruptcy filing.

Seasons of Hope had seven offices in southern and eastern Idaho with more than 100 employees. In March, Health and Welfare suspended its Medicaid provider status, saying it owed about \$449,000 in Medicaid payments for fraudulent claims. The clinics closed.

After a June hearing, Senior District Judge Peter McDermott determined Sea-

sons of Hope had not committed any fraud and reinstated its Medicaid provider status. However, the judge ruled Seasons owed \$94,000 to Health and Welfare and set \$10,000 in civil penalties and \$8,000 in fines. The agency's appeal is pending before Health and Welfare Director Richard Armstrong.

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Campaign of Burley Mayor Raises \$500 More than Challenger Smedley

BURLEY • Mayor Terry Greenman is locked in a financial slugfest with challenger Merlin Smedley as both campaigns work into the election season home stretch.

Greenman's campaign raised \$2,435 through Oct. 20, a financial disclosure statement filed Monday said. Smedley's war chest had tak-

en in \$1,913 in mostly small contributions throughout the 2013 campaign cycle.

The final push is on as Tuesday's election creeps closer, Greenman said Wednesday.

"The money is still coming in," he said.

Burley Firefighters Local 3308 didn't back Greenman's first bid in 2009. But the union tossed \$100 into his coffers this year.

"It's because I'm such a good mayor," Greenman quipped when asked about

the union's switch.

Smedley out-raised Greenman by \$400 to \$350 between Oct. 1 and Oct. 20, including \$200 from the Cosmetology School of Burley.

Calls to Smedley seeking comment Wednesday weren't immediately returned.

Campaign signs line local highways and mailers fill mailboxes with Election Day around the corner. Greenman appears to have the advantage in sheer volume of campaign

signs posted throughout the community.

Smedley has challenged Greenman's handling of police negotiations with Cassia County and blasted a proposed airport expansion touted by the mayor.

Greenman contends the airport expansion is a needed economic development initiative.

Mark Fillmore, a challenger for one of the three City Council seats up for grabs, doubled all other contenders, so far raising \$1,510.

Otter to HHS Head: Delay Insurance Mandate

BOISE (AP) • Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter wants the requirement for everybody to have insurance by 2014 delayed 12 months amid glitches in Internet health care exchanges across the nation, including Idaho.

Idaho is currently relying on federal software to enroll people in coverage via its Your Health Idaho insurance exchange.

In a letter Wednesday, Otter told U.S. Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius that problems with the federal software are of such magnitude,

many Idaho residents likely won't be able to complete enrollment before March 31, when they'll face a fine under President Obama's

health care overhaul.

Otter insists another year will allow exchange officials here to complete Idaho's own enrollment system —

one he hopes won't be plagued by the enormous troubles that have dogged 36 states using federal exchanges.

On his feet: green cleats. "You've got to keep some kind of identity," said the Hansen High senior.

That identity has evolved over the past 11 weeks as Murtaugh and Hansen high schools have merged their football programs in a cooperative, a measure taken to ensure the survival of football in these small rural towns.

And now the whole has proven to be greater than the sum of its parts. Murtaugh (which took on Hansen's 1A Division I 8-man schedule) finished fourth in the Snake River Conference and earned a berth in the play-in round of the state playoffs. The Red Devils will play at Idaho City on Friday.

At practice this week, the energy was up even though temperatures were down in the mid-40s. The players didn't seem to mind the extra preparation.

It's better than the alternative. Individually, Hansen and Murtaugh likely wouldn't have made the postseason.

"We probably wouldn't even have a team," said Hansen senior Devon Fitzsimmons.

Conflicting color schemes — "I bought these (green cleats) before the season even started, so it was kind of too late to go buy some new ones," Stimpson said. — was the least of Murtaugh and Hansen's concerns.

First, the players had to embrace teamwork with their rivals.

"There was a lot of controversy on our team, mostly with the players because we didn't want to wear (red) because it's our senior year," said Fitzsimmons. "But since we know we can do better and have a winning record, then we were glad to give it up to play a sport that we love."

Second, the communities, located 10 miles apart, faced the challenge of uniting traditions. They set aside pride to do what's best for the student-athletes.

"Now I actually haven't heard as many complaints," said Stimpson. "I mean, we made it to playoffs, that's a big accomplishment for both schools, so I'm sure everybody is happy about that."

Over the past four years, Hansen and Murtaugh had a 23-45 combined record with one winning season and zero state playoff appearances between them.

Idaho's Diminutive Epps Putting Up Giant Numbers

MOSCOW • On a sunny morning in August, just after he had given his coaches and teammates of sign of things to come with 10 catches in Idaho's first scrimmage of fall camp, Dezmon Epps was asked about his game-altering speed.

The small wide receiver from Sacramento told reporters, matter of factly, how he and teammate Richard Montgomery consistently run 4.3-second 40-yard dashes. He even had done it in 4.29 seconds.

"I might run a 4.4 on an off day," he said.

Epps wasn't going out of his way to draw attention to himself. He was just stating facts. And the

fact is, during a mostly dreary rebuilding season for the Vandals, Epps has been a breakout skill-position player that's traditionally been hard for Idaho to find.

He leads Idaho with 51 catches and 582 receiving yards, and he's tied for 31st in the FBS with 6.4 catches per game.

Last week against an Ole Miss defense with blue chip recruits at almost every position, Epps looked like he would fit in just fine in the SEC — or any other elite FBS conference. He had five catches for 89 yards, and his 62-yard touchdown catch was an offensive highlight in a game with few of them for the Vandals (1-7).

To Epps, it was just another opportunity to showcase his quickness and knack for finding spots

on the field to get open. But to coach Paul Petrino, Epps' performance last week and throughout the season has been a revelation.

"We've got to find a couple more of guys like him this year in recruiting," Petrino said. "That's a guy (who) definitely can probably play at any level he wanted to and just got lost in the shuffle, and I'm glad we found him."

If Epps were 2 inches taller or 20 pounds bigger, Petrino and his staff would likely have had no chance in netting him this offseason from the City College of San Francisco. He's listed at 5-foot-10 and 170 pounds, but he's closer to 5-9, and 170 pounds might be generous, too.

His size, though, was a nonfac-

tor to Idaho's first-year coaches.

"He's short, and some programs won't touch short receivers," Vandals offensive coordinator and receivers coach Kris Cinkovich said. "Here, we'll take them if they have that speed and elusiveness that he has, like Richard Montgomery has."

Epps said he had offers from Fresno State, Illinois, Bowling Green, Utah State and others. Yet after a number of schools that were pursuing him fired their receivers coaches, he felt comfortable with Cinkovich and signed with UI.

He didn't arrive in Moscow until just before fall camp in early August, meaning he missed spring camp and summer workouts and

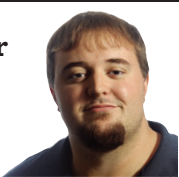

Red Sox Win WS Title, Beat Cards 6-1 in Game 6

BOSTON • There hasn't been a party like this in New England for nearly a century. Turmoil to triumph. Worst to first. David Ortiz and the Boston Red Sox, baseball's bearded wonders, capped their remarkable turnaround by beating the St. Louis Cardinals 6-1 in Game 6 on Wednesday night to win their third World Series championship in 10 seasons. Shane Victorino, symbolic of these resilient Sox, returned from a stiff back and got Boston rolling with a three-run double off the Green Monster against rookie sensation Michael Wacha. John Lackey became the first pitcher to start and win a Series clincher for two different teams, allowing one run over 6 2-3 innings 11 years after his Game 7 victory as an

Angels rookie in 2002. With fans roaring on every pitch and cameras flashing, Koji Uehara struck out Matt Carpenter for the final out. The Japanese pitcher jumped into the arms of catcher David Ross while Red Sox players rushed from the dugout and bullpen as the Boston theme "Dirty Water" played on the public-address system. And the Red Sox didn't have to fly the trophy home. For the first time since Babe Ruth's team back in 1918, Boston won the title at Fenway Park. The 101-year-old ballpark, oldest in the majors, was packed with 38,447 singing, shouting fans anticipating a celebration 95 years in the making. There wasn't the cowboy-up comeback charm of "The Idiots" from 2004, who swept St. Louis to end an 86-year title drought. There wasn't that cool efficiency of

the 2007 team that swept Colorado. This time, they were Boston Strong — playing for a city shaken by the marathon bombings in April. After late-season slumps in 2010 and 2011, the embarrassing revelations of a chicken-and-beer clubhouse culture that contributed to the ouster of manager Terry Francona, and the daily tumult of Bobby Valentine's one-year flop, these Red Sox grew on fans. Just like the long whiskers on the players' faces, starting with Jonny Gomes' scruffy spring training beard. Across the Northeast, from Connecticut's Housatonic River up to the Aroostook in Maine, Boston's eighth championship will be remembered for all the beard-yanking bonding. Ortiz, the only player remaining from the 2004 champs, had a Ruthian

World Series. He batted .688 (11 for 16) with two homers, six RBIs and eight walks — including four in the finale — for a .760 on-base percentage in 25 plate appearances. Even slumping Stephen Drew delivered a big hit in Game 6, sending Wacha's first pitch of the fourth into the right-center bullpen. By the time the inning was over, RBI singles by Mike Napoli and Victorino had made it 6-0, and the Red Sox were on their way. The win capped an emotional season for the Red Sox, one heavy with the memory of the events that unfolded on Patriots Day, when three people were killed and more than 260 wounded in bombing attacks at the Boston Marathon. The Red Sox wore "Boston Strong" logos on their left sleeves and erected a large emblem on the Green Monster as a constant reminder.

"I think that bringing both schools together has made us one successful unit," said Murtaugh senior Kodey Baynes. According to head coach Adam Johnson, the only negative has been not agreeing on the co-op sooner. The merge hasn't come without sacrifice as players have shared playing time, and in some cases changed positions. Senior Riley VanLeeuwen would have been Murtaugh's starting quarterback, but he gave up his spot to Hansen's Stimpson. "I'm glad to give it up. I just want what's best for my team," said VanLeeuwen, who moved to running back. Murtaugh's success this season has truly been a joint effort. The offensive starters are four Hansen students and four Murtaugh students. The starting defense consists of five Hansen kids and three from Murtaugh. "We've merged like one big family," Baynes said.

Goodell Teaches Moms to Tackle 'Safely'

LAKE FOREST, ILL. • NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell came to town to teach mothers how to tackle safely. I am not making this up. The event, sponsored by the league and the Chicago Bears, was titled "Football Safety Clinic for Moms." The intent, no doubt, was to ease fears about letting their sons play the game. The timing was nothing if not fortuitous. Last month, studies by researchers at the Virginia Tech-Wake Forest University School of Biomedical Engineering and Sciences concluded that football players as young as 7 suffer hits to the head every bit as traumatic as those suffered by high school and adult players. Last week, an HBO Real Sports-Marist poll headlined "Youth Football Takes Hard Hit" found that 56 percent of respondents said the risk of long-term brain injury would be an important factor in deciding whether to allow their son to play football. Five kids aged 16 or younger have died playing high school football since August, two from brain injuries and a third suffered a broken neck. More than 25,000 football players from 8 to 19 years old seek treatment for concussions at emergency rooms every year. None of that was mentioned during the breezy, 80-minute clinic. It began with an introduction from Goodell, followed by remarks from TV talk show host Dr. Mehmet Oz, who's a heart surgeon by training but needed no coaching on how to sell the



game. Maybe because he's already featured in an NFL promotional campaign that aired during last weekend's games called "Together We Make Football." Oz was followed by athletic trainers who stressed the importance of properly feeding and hydrating young football players, and they were followed by Dr. Elizabeth Pieroth, who is the Bears neuropsychological consultant, but not a medical doctor. She presented checklists for recognizing concussion symptoms and recommendations for treatment, but suggested on balance that "boys like to hit things" and without proper channels for their aggression, they might do other things like drive too fast or drink too much. It made me wonder how much more havoc NFL players might wreak if they weren't playing, but then came time for the 200 or so moms to line up and learn the tackling techniques taught as part of USA Football's "Heads Up Football" program. "I line up my front foot right in the middle of my target, and why?" one of the instructors said during a demonstration, without waiting for an answer. "So I can put my head to the side and make the tackle safely?" Never mind that the improving science on concussions increasingly suggests all those measures above

combined and applied at every level will reduce the numbers only so much, let alone the way the game is played in the NFL. At one point, I walked up to Goodell and tried to ask how much safer he believed football could actually be made. Instead of answering, he looked away and a burly member of his security detail inserted himself between us and said "No questions." Fortunately, though, Goodell had time for the moms. And after 20 minutes of practice, they were stoked. When they returned to their seats for a final 20-minute question-and-answer session with a panel that included the commissioner, Pieroth and several former Bears, one of the first questions was: "My son is 5 years old. I see linebacker in his future. When is too soon for him to start playing?" Understandingly, several panel members assumed she was asking about flag football. When people in the crowd made clear there were tackle football leagues in the area for kids that young, the consensus on the panel was that each family had to make its own determination. Suffice it to say that more than one expert would disagree. Dr. Robert Cantu, who is co-director of the Boston University Center for the Study of Traumatic Encephalopathy where researchers have found CTE in 49 of the 50 brains of deceased NFL players they've autopsied, argues against youngsters starting contact sports like tackle football and hockey before age 14.

A year ago, Cantu co-authored a book laying out the case for young kids to play flag instead of tackle football. He said with enough information, parents would come around. "They haven't understood the dangers their kids are being subjected to," he said at the time. "Once they do — and it won't happen in weeks, or months, maybe even years — they'll demand changes." What they got Tuesday night instead was slickly packaged, celebrity-packed reassurances that if they keep their eyes open and fingers crossed, football is less risky than riding a bike. That's statistically true, except you'd have to keep crashing the bike over and over to simulate the multiple hits to the head that every football player compiles the longer he plays, and too many go unreported and untreated. Barely two months ago, the NFL settled a lawsuit involving 4,500 former players for \$765 million, a sum many observers considered paltry given the terrible and irreversible mental decline many of those players suffered. You might think, in the wake of that and after the suicides of popular former players Junior Seau and Dave Duerson, the league would lay low on the concussion issue for a little while. But credit Goodell withchutzpah. He's already out recruiting the next generation and tackling the safety concerns the same way the NFL conducts all of its business. Head on.

all the advantages that come with an early arrival. Nonetheless, Epps was an immediate upgrade because of his speed and play-making ability, and he's been the Vandals' most consistent performer on offense. Epps was added to Biletnikoff Award watch list after just three games. His goal is to be one of the top 25 receivers in the country over the next two years. And he wants to lead the Sun Belt in receiving when the Vandals rejoin the conference next season. That's what we've got to get — 11 of those on both sides of the ball. And when you get that, that's when you're a really good team." Cinkovich still sees parts of Epps' game that he can improve — his route running, his ball skills on intermediate and deep routes and, most noticeably, his strength. "But I think he's got the work ethic that he'll make the strides necessary to be a great, dominant receiver," Cinkovich said. "He's not quite there yet, but I think he's going to get there."

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Saying Goodbye: Allen Iverson Retires from NBA

PHILADELPHIA • Allen Iverson's highlights played one more time on the big screen, diehard Philadelphia 76ers fans and Julius Erving all part of the crowd catching one more glimpse of No. 3 in his prime.

His killer crossover in his rookie season that dusted Michael Jordan.

The jumper he buried over Tyronn Lue, then the high-step over the fallen Lakers defender in Game 1 of the 2001 NBA Finals.

All there. All as much part of Iverson's DNA as the rants about practice, the cornrows, the controversy.

All in the past.

This was time for A.I. to say goodbye.

Iverson officially called it quits _ though, in truth, it was the NBA that gave up on him _ nearly four years after he played his final game.

He did it in typical A.I. flair, eschewing a suit fit for an elder statesman for a black, leather hoodie, askew black cap and a gold chain around his neck.

"I always felt like it was cool being me," Iverson said.

Iverson retired Wednesday at the Wells Fargo Center, the site of so many of the moments he crafted into a Hall of Fame worthy career. Iverson led the Sixers to the 2001 NBA finals, won four scoring titles, clashed with former coach Larry Brown, and was an All-Star game fixture. Winning a championship is the lone void in a bio sheet that forever stamps him among the league's greats.

The undersized guard with the supersized heart was a perfect match in a city that prizes authenticity and hustle as much as production.

"I'm going to always be a Sixer til I die," he said.

And his number will always hang in the rafters. Iverson's No. 3 will be retired on March 1 against Washington.

The 38-year-old Iverson had not played an NBA game since Feb. 20, 2010, in his second, short-lived stint with the Sixers. The 6-foot, 165-pound guard also played for Denver, Detroit and Memphis over a 14-year career that has him 19th on the career scoring list with 24,368 points.

He also played in Turkey

before realizing the NBA doors would not open for him again.

"I thought that once this day came, it would be basically a tragic day," Iverson said. "I never imagined the day coming, but I knew it would come. I feel proud and happy to say that I'm happy with my decision and I feel great."

Iverson always proclaimed his love of Philly, the fans and the Sixers and swore he wanted to end his career with the franchise that made him the No. 1 overall pick in the 1996 draft.

He fearlessly crashed the lane against players nearly a foot taller than him, played through countless injuries and added the pizzazz that was missing in what was a staid franchise. He transformed the 76ers from lottery losers to contenders, though he couldn't bring home an NBA title to this championship-starved city. He came close in 2001, when the 76ers lost to the Lakers.

Iverson was arguably one of the four greatest Sixers, compiling a sparkling resume that put him in the mix with Erving, Wilt Chamberlain, and Charles Barkley. His No. 3 jersey was a best seller around the globe, the headband wrapped snugly

around his cornrows, and the tattoos were as much a part of his image as the way he ricochets around the court. Play every game like it was his last was more than a catchphrase, it was a lifestyle.

"My whole thing was, just being me," Iverson said. "Now, you look around the NBA and all of them have tattoos, guys wearing cornrows. You used to think the suspect was the guy with the cornrows, now you see the police officers with the cornrows. You know what I'm saying? I took a beating for those types of things."

From the throwback jerseys to the bling in his ears, Iverson shaped a generation of kids that star in today's NBA.

"He made it cool to be a hip kid," Heat guard Dwyane Wade said.

Iverson's years in Philadelphia were marred by arrests in 1997 for carrying a concealed weapon and for possession of marijuana and in 2002 over a domestic dispute with his wife. He was sentenced to community service in 1997 and all charges were dropped against him five years later.

Then there was the never-released rap album, which drew criticism from civil

rights groups and got Iverson a reprimand from NBA commissioner David Stern because of its offensive lyrics.

"I made a lot of mistakes, a lot of things I'm not proud of," he said. "But it's only for other people to learn from."

Iverson and Brown were a volatile combination during the six seasons they spent together in Philly. Brown criticized Iverson for taking too many shots and accused him of being selfish at times.

Iverson often arrived late for practice or missed them entirely. In one infamous blowup at the end of the 2002 season he repeated the word "practice" nearly 20 times during a rambling monologue. Iverson said he had no regrets about what he said, or any part of his career, including his beefs with Brown.

Brown and Iverson eventually reconciled and the coach made his former guard co-captain of the 2004 Olympic men's basketball team.

Iverson was a recent guest speaker at SMU practice, where Brown is starting his second season.

"I'm sick that he's going to retire. I don't think he's ready," Brown said. "I think he still could play. He came to speak to our team, and it

was phenomenal. And he didn't sound like a guy to me that was ready to retire, and I didn't feel like he should.

"He had an unbelievable career. I don't think any little

player in the history of our game impacted the game like him, like he did. I don't know if many players impacted the game like he did. I can't go anywhere where people don't stop me and ask me about Allen."

Iverson credited Brown, and his Georgetown coach John Thompson, who was at the ceremony, for turning him into a man. He had a catch in his voice taking about his deep relationship with former Sixer Aaron McKie. He called Jordan was an inspiration.

But Iverson's post-NBA career has been marred by divorce and stories of financial ruin and alcohol abuse. Iverson was flanked on the podium by three of his children, and said he couldn't let every rumor about his personal life upset him.

Brown said he wasn't worried about Iverson adjusting life without a uniform and an adoring crowd chanting his name.

"I hope Philly gives him a job in the front office like he deserves," Brown said. "That would be a great step, keep him involved with basketball. He needs that, and kids need that because so many kids admire him and want to be just like him and it'd be nice that they'd see him involved in the game."

ANGER AND BLAME OVER OBAMACARE

Feds Proving Internet-adept and Inept at Same Time

When it comes to computers, the Obama administration appears simultaneously to be a bungling amateur and a stealthy wizard. The same government that reportedly intercepted the communications of America’s leading consumer technology firms, Google and Yahoo, without leaving a trace is scorned because it can’t build a working federal website for health insurance.

In a single day in the nation’s capital, extremes of the

impressive successes and stunning failures of the Internet age were on full display.

Computer professionals said the government can be both adept and inept at the same time because the tasks are so different and for reasons involving who is doing it, for how much money, how long it takes and how publicly it is done.

Under a classified project called MUSCULAR, the National Security Agency has secretly broken into the main communications links that connect Google and Yahoo data centers around the world, *The Washington Post* reported

Wednesday, citing documents obtained from former NSA systems analyst Edward Snowden. In the past 30 days, the NSA swept up and processed more than 180 million new records, including metadata indicating who sent and received emails and when it happened, the *Post* reported. New documents obtained by The Associated Press showed that officials had worried that a lack of website testing posed a potentially high security risk.

The NSA’s annual budget was just over \$7 billion in fiscal 2013, according to budget documents leaked by Snowden. The budget

for the entire Health and Human Services Department was less than \$1 trillion, and it spent \$118 million on the website plus about \$56 million on other IT to support the website, Sebelius said Wednesday.

The NSA is famous for employing small focused teams of highly talented, highly recruited experts with special skills, said Chris Wysopal, a former hacker who is chief technology officer for Veracode in Burlington, Mass. But the Health and Human Services Department’s website designers? “They are sort of your average developers,” he said.

Motivation is important too. Patriotic hacking on behalf of the NSA is exciting, especially among the mostly young and mostly male demographic. It’s also widely understood to be easier to break something down than to build it.

Kathleen Sebelius on Website Breakdown: ‘I am Responsible’

Defending President Barack Obama’s much-maligned health care law in Congress, Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius was confronted Wednesday with a government memo that raised security concerns about the website consumers are using to enroll.

The document, obtained by The Associated Press, shows that administration officials at the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services

were concerned that a lack of testing posed a potentially “high” security risk for the HealthCare.gov website serving 36 states.

“Hold me accountable for the debacle,” Sebelius said during a contentious hearing before the powerful House Energy and Commerce Committee. “I’m responsible.”

Sebelius is promising to have the problems fixed by Nov. 30, even as Republicans opposed to Obama’s health care law are calling in chorus for her resignation. She told the committee that the technical issues that led to frozen screens and error messages are being cleared up on a daily basis.

New Security Issues Surface for Website

President Barack Obama claimed “full responsibility” Wednesday for fixing his administration’s much-maligned health insurance website as a new concern surfaced: a government memo pointing to security worries, laid out just days before the launch.

Obama underscored the administration’s unhappiness with the problems so far: “There’s no excuse for it,” he said during a Boston speech to promote his signature domestic policy achievement. “And I take full responsibility for making sure it gets fixed ASAP.”

Security issues raise major new concerns on top of the long list of

technical problems the administration is grappling with.

“You accepted a risk on behalf of every user ... that put their personal financial information at risk,” Rep. Mike Rogers, R-Mich., told Sebelius, citing the memo. “Amazon would never do this. ProFlowers would never do this. Kayak would never do this. This is completely an unacceptable level of security.”

Sebelius countered that the system is secure, even though the site’s certificate, known in government parlance as an “authority to operate,” is of a temporary nature. A permanent certificate will be issued only when all security issues are addressed, she stressed.

Spokeswoman Joanne Peters added separately: “When consumers fill out their online ... applications, they can trust that the information they’re providing is protected by stringent security standards and that the technology underlying the application process has been tested and is secure. Security testing happens on an ongoing basis using industry best practices.”

The security certificate is required under longstanding federal policy before any government computer system can process, store or transmit agency data. The temporary certificate was approved by Medicare chief Marilyn Tavenner, the senior HHS official closest to the rollout. No major security breaches have been reported. -AP

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Enjoy All-season Trails In Southwest Idaho

Weather in late fall and winter can drown plans for hiking, trail running and mountain biking — if you don't know where to go.

Trail users can always find places in the Treasure Valley and Southwest Idaho that aren't overly affected by rain and snow.

"We don't have any trails that I would bill as all-weather," said David Gordon, Ridge to Rivers trails coordinator. "We have a number of trails that have much sandier bases, and thus are decent bets on wet days."

Boise mountain bikers such as Gary Balch ride every day because they know what trails are available.

He likes the Boise area because "you can get up on the hills really quickly."

Because of the geology of the Boise Foothills and the Owyhees, with sandy and granitic soils in some areas, you can find trails and drainages that can be hiked and biked throughout winter.

But you'll also find trails where there is a lot of clay, and they can be a real mess when wet. Trails in the Camel's Back-Hulls Gulch area are recommended in wet weather because of the sandy soils that tend to dry quickly, Gordon said.

However, he warns that even sandy trails can eventually get soggy and shouldn't be used during very wet conditions.

When the weather gets damp, here are some places that might be good bets for hiking, running or mountain biking:

Boise Foothills

- Toll Road (No. 27A) — Located in Military Reserve, it's an easy trail that is just over a half-mile one way. Get access off Reserve Street in Boise.
- Red Fox (No. 36) and Lower Hulls Gulch (No. 29) — Four miles one-way route; moderately difficult; start behind Camel's Back Park in Boise.
- Camel's Back Trail (No. 40) — Up to 1.4 miles; considered easy; get access at Camel's Back Park.

- Combine Red Fox (No. 36), Owls Roost (No. 37), Gold Finch (No. 35) and Hulls Pond (No. 34) — A loop of about 2.8 miles; get access at Camel's Back Park or off upper 8th Street.
- Bob's Trail — Located between Crane Gulch and Hulls Gulch, the trail quickly becomes rideable after rain or snow. Get access off Hearthstone Drive in Boise.
- Rocky Canyon Road — It's mostly gravel and you can go up to 6 miles to the top of the ridge, depending on where you hit snow. Get access off Reserve Street by continuing up Shaw Mountain Road.
- Eagle Bike Park — Located at the sports complex off Old Horseshoe Bend Road, the park is a good place for cycling because trails dry out fast; but avoid it right after a storm.

Boise Greenbelt

- The entire Greenbelt from Discovery Park to Glenwood Bridge is ideal for riding, running or walking in the winter. The pathway from Lucky Peak Reservoir to Eagle is more than 25 miles com-

- Combine Red Fox (No. 36), Owls Roost (No. 37), Gold Finch (No. 35) and Hulls Pond (No. 34) — A loop of about 2.8 miles; get access at Camel's Back Park or off upper 8th Street.
- Bob's Trail — Located between Crane Gulch and Hulls Gulch, the trail quickly becomes rideable after rain or snow. Get access off Hearthstone Drive in Boise.
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- Eagle Bike Park — Located at the sports complex off Old Horseshoe Bend Road, the park is a good place for cycling because trails dry out fast; but avoid it right after a storm.

Owyhees

There's a large, mostly nonmotorized area with a variety of riding or hiking trails in the Wilson Creek region, southwest of Walters Ferry.

The area is recommended for intermediate and expert riders, and bikers should have some good navigation skills because it's easy to get turned around.

Get there from Nampa by going south on Idaho 45 and crossing the Snake River. Go west on Idaho 78 to Wilson Creek Road and south to the parking areas.

Gravel roads off U.S. 95 from Marsing to the Oregon border offer a lot of hiking and biking possibilities in the winter.

Fall Fishing in Idaho Is Cool and Productive

BOISE • If you think fall is time to trade the fishing rod for a gun, you're missing out on some great fishing.

Fall is a transitional time, and you never know what kind of weather you might get. It might be 70 degrees one day and snowing the next, or vice versa.

But fish know winter is coming, so they tend to feed aggressively, especially when the water temperatures drop back into the 60-degree range, which all fish seem to love.

You also have the steelhead returning from the ocean to give you an opportunity for some really big fish, as well as a nice fillet for the grill or broiler.

Even so-called warmwater fish are available for the taking in rivers and reservoirs, so don't let a little rain or frost stop you from making another fishing trip. Here are some places to go.

Snake River

The Snake is Southwest Idaho's most overlooked river. It has ridiculous bass and catfish populations and a few surprises, like sturgeon and trout.

The river offers good-to-excellent bass fishing that will extend well into the fall.

"I think we're at the start of some great late-season smallie fishing," said Dave Gourley in early fall. He's been fishing the river all summer and taking big smallmouth bass.

The Snake rewards those who adapt to different seasons. The river can be weedy after the hot summer, but the bass are still there.

Smallmouths like current and rocks, and where you find those things, you will often find fish. But the key is to always keep searching until you hook a fish. Then you will usually catch several because they tend to be in schools.

Boat fishing is typically the best option for the Snake, but there's a lot of bank access and good fishing from Swan Falls Dam downstream.

It's difficult to talk about the Snake without including its reservoirs because there's a chain of them all through the system.

Although much of the fish are of the "warmwater" variety, don't take that too literally. Bass, crappie and perch are caught nearly year-round.

South Fork of the Snake River

This Eastern Idaho river has an entirely different character in the fall.

It's fished mostly from boats during spring and summer because of higher flows for irrigation, which makes wading difficult.

But when flows decrease in the fall, waders return to take advantage of the excellent cutthroat, rainbow and brown trout fishing.

"It's a lot more accessible for wading fishermen, and you can almost always float the South Fork," said Jonathan Lancaster, head of outfitting for Natural Retreats, which owns South Fork Lodge at Swan Valley.

You can also still fish the river from a boat; just allow much longer to get between launches because the river is flowing much slower.

Fall brings abundant blue-wing olive and mahogany dun hatches, and fly anglers also entice the river's brown trout with streamers.

The South Fork is an easy road trip because it's freeway most of the way, and there are cool campgrounds along the river. Just expect cold weather because the river is at about 5,000-foot elevation and at the base of the Teton. You will also get some amazing scenery when the cottonwoods and aspens turn gold and the Teton gets a dusting of snow.

The South Fork is a big river and can be intimidating, but guided trips are available. "We will do guided trips year-round if people want to go," Lancaster said.

Duck Valley Indian Reservation

The three reservoirs on the reservation — Mountain View, Billy Shaw and Sheep Creek — are often overlooked because people think of them as spring fisheries.

But the trout are still there, and the tribe's fisheries managers have been working to reduce the weed growth during summer.

That means the fish are more accessible to anglers during summer than fall.

Trolling, bank fishing with bait and fly fishing are all good ways to fish, but Billy Shaw is restricted to fly fishing only.

All three lakes are owned and operated by the Shoshone Paiute Tribe, so make sure you buy your tribal license before fishing. They're available on the reservation at Our Store and also at the Fishin' Hole in

Bruneau.

If you want to take fish home, stick to Mountain View and Sheep Creek reservoirs because you can keep five fish per day, but only one between 16 and 19 inches from Billy Shaw.

Fishing season ends Oct. 31 at Billy Shaw and Sheep Creek, but Mountain View is open year-round.

Mountain Lakes

Don't fool yourself. Fishing season doesn't end with the first dusting of snow in the mountains. You can still catch a lot of fish there.

McCall and Stanley are the most popular destinations for mountain lakes, so let's do this prize-fight style.

In this corner, we have McCall. It has lots of mountain lakes you can drive to or within a short hike. Hit the Goose Lake Road, aka the road to Brundage Mountain, and you can drive to several of them — including Brundage Reservoir, Goose Lake, Granite Lake, Hazard Lake — and hike to several others. As a bonus, you're a short drive to the Salmon River and Little Salmon River for steelhead.

In the opposing corner is Stanley, which also has lots of lakes you can drive to, including Redfish, Stanley, Pettit and Alturas lakes. Unlike McCall's lakes that are accessed by miles of washboard gravel roads, most around Stanley are accessible by paved roads or with short sections of gravel.

There's also the Upper Salmon River available for trout anglers, as well as several other streams nearby.

Snowstorms are common, but fishing remains good.

Everest Climber to Speak in Sun Valley

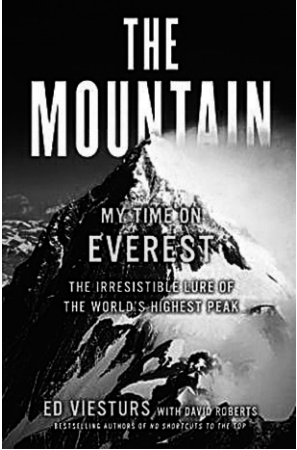

Comment on Mountain Bike Trail Proposal on Bald Mountain

KETCHUM • What do you think of new trail construction on Bald Mountain?

The Bureau of Land Management's Shoshone Field Office is proposing to authorize Sun Valley Co. to construct about 7.8 miles of new non-motorized mountain biking trails over three to six years on the BLM portion of the Bald Mountain Ski Area.

Sun Valley Co. wants to expand its novice, intermediate and advanced mountain bike terrain below Bald Mountain's Roundhouse Restaurant. It proposes a "flow" design and construction techniques that link banked turns, sections of uphill gradients and other natural and man-made features to manage downhill bike speeds.

Examples of "flow" design and construction within the Wood River Valley include the Punchline Trail in the Croy Creek Trail network and the U.S. Forest Service's Forbidden Fruit Trail No. 159 in Eve's Gulch, a BLM press release said.

If approved, trail con-

struction could begin during summer 2014. Sun Valley Co. would patrol and maintain the new trails.

The Forest Service's Ketchum Ranger District on June 10 authorized 11.2 miles of trail on the Forest Service portion of the Bald Mountain Ski Area, connecting the Roundhouse Restaurant to the top of Bald Mountain. This project on the BLM portion connects the River Run base area to the Roundhouse.

Answer: In general, the answer is one deer per hunter per year. But a few controlled

hunts and depredation hunts offer the opportunity for hunters to harvest additional deer, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game said.

Deer hunters also may buy

one unsold nonresident general season deer and elk tag at the nonresident price starting Aug. 1 to be used as a second tag. And if the hunter is lucky, he or she may win a

Super Hunt tag for a deer. That all adds to the possibility of buying up to five deer tags. But a hunter may take only one deer per valid legal tag in his or her possession.

chances are we can afford just one or two dogs.

That's exactly how the concept of the versatile hunting dog came to be. As the middle classes developed in Europe, leisure time became available and a new class of hunters arose, having the affluence to hunt but not the wealth needed for a kennel full of dogs. They desired one dog that could perform a variety of tasks: point both feather and fur, retrieve from land and water, and even track and hold at bay a wounded deer or wild boar. Producing such a dog was a tall order, and there were several new dog breeds created in the mid to late 19th century.

One of the earliest was the wirehaired pointing griffon, created by the somewhat tragic figure E.K. Korthals. While Korthals died early at age 44, he left behind both a breed of dog and a system of testing versatile hunting dogs that is still used. Korthals' system formed the basis of the Wirehaired Pointing Griffon Club of America hunt tests and those of the North American Versatile Hunting Dog Association.

Unlike in field trials, dogs are judged against a standard, not against each other. Dogs perform a series of tests designed to simulate actual hunting situations: pointing, retrieving from land and water, searching for game, use and quality of nose, tracking game, temperament, attitude toward work, obedience and cooperation with the handler. Point totals are computed and prizes awarded.

Age and hunting experience are taken into account by classifying dogs into one of four groups: natural ability, for dogs 6 to 16 months old; intermediate, for dogs 12 to 24 months; older intermediate, for dogs older than 24 months; and utility, for dogs older than 18 months and deemed ready by their handler. The utility tests the fully trained versatile hunting dog in numerous situations and field conditions, and it's considered the hardest for both dog and handler. All of the tests evaluate the dog's coat, conformation and temperament; particular attention is paid to the natural ability and intermediate tests as an evaluation of potential breeding stock.

The Magic Valley can lay claim to a group of these dedicated dog enthusiasts who have tried to remain true to the European tradition of the wirehaired pointing griffon: a dog that can perform a variety of tasks, such as waterfowl retrieving in the cold Snake River or chukar hunting in the South Hills.

One of five regional chapters of the Wirehaired Pointing Griffon Club of America, the Rocky Mountain Griffon Club hosts its annual spring test at Niagara Springs Wildlife Management Area every March. Close to 100 people were at last year's test — testing a dog, judging the dogs or helping the test run smoothly. Clearly, this group of bird hunters and dog trainers are serious about their endeavors.

Unlike most other dog clubs, the griffon club can be described more as a cooperative. Breeding decisions are made by a breeding committee, on the basis of test scores and the results of past litters, rather than by one individual owner. National WPGCA president and long-time griffon owner Gary Pool of Jerome explained the club's reasoning: "Everyone is a little blind to their own dog's faults; by using a scoring system that evaluates the dog's hunting ability, coat and cooperation, we can maximize the number of solid hunting dogs produced."

A great deal of emphasis is placed upon the cooperation score, or how well the dog takes direction and works

with the hunter, instead of self-hunting.

How calm and biddable the dogs were was evident to me. At a pre-test conference on club issues, owners were allowed to bring their dogs into the conference center, and all were well behaved. All of the dogs just curled up at their masters' feet, just as if they were at home in the den. An occasional bathroom break was all that was needed.

As another example of the cooperative nature of these dogs, none of the owners I interviewed used a shock collar, which is quite rare for bird hunters these days.

"I don't own one, and never saw a use for one," said Bob Matsuoka of Twin Falls, a longtime griffon owner and apprentice field test judge. "I attend a snake-breaking seminar in the Boise Valley, where they teach snake avoidance by administering a shock to the dog, but I personally have never felt the need for a shock collar for training."

Senior field judge Vic Jaro, a griffon owner and co-founder of the local chapter, echoed the sentiment: "I've never needed to go beyond traditional training methods with these dogs. You don't need to use harsh methods."

Conformation and coat scoring are also deemed important in selecting dogs as potential breeding stock. It may seem a bit odd to the average bird hunter or dog breeder to place so much weight on coat and conformation. Senior hunt test judge John Pitlo of Bellevue,

Iowa, explained: "Function follows form ... if you breed without regard to the skeletal structure of the dog, problems will begin to crop up."

Pitlo continued: "We select dogs for breeding that will be free of skeletal problems ... A good wirehaired coat, harsh and stiff on the outside with a good insulating undercoat, is of the utmost importance, and the first thing that will slip away if controlled breeding isn't practiced."

A proper coat will shed most burrs and resist water, he said.

So what do the club members hunt? All of the hunters I chatted with hunted upland birds, and most hunted waterfowl as well.

One of the field judges, Rick Molt, of Bristol, Maine, uses his griffons for sea duck hunting. This is tough duty, and usually reserved for the hardest of the pure retriever breeds. "My dog does fine; he has a good, water-repelling coat and seemed to handle the surf well," Molt said. He uses the same dog for ruffed grouse and woodcock hunting.

After spending the day with the Rocky Mountain Griffon Club, I came away impressed with both the dogs and the club members.

ON TARGET: JEFF FROST'S WEEKLY HUNTING REPORT

Our general season is coming to a close, along with most controlled hunts. Hunters have enjoyed another great year of hunting in Idaho. There was a significant increase in the number of deer trophies taken in the latter part of the season.

Unit 54 and 45 stand out with several nice trophies taken in those areas. Units 47 and 46 remained a little stagnant toward the end of the season, with hunters not seeing many trophy-size deer. The northern units 48 and 49, along with parts of unit 43, provided great opportunity this year for deer hunters. But unit 55 has not had the showing of exceptional trophies that it had over the past few years.

The numbers of elk trophies taken in the northern and desert units in the upper Magic Valley were some of the best I have seen in recent years. Archery hunters took some amazing elk this year in these areas.

Hunters reported more wolf sightings and sign in units 43, 44, and 48 than in units 49 and 50.

If you were fortunate to draw one of the late-season tags, I wish you good luck as those hunts are soon to open up.

What Can Idaho Waterfowl Hunters Expect This Year?

JEROME • Hunters in the waterfowl blinds this season can expect to see a fall flight similar to last year's, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game said.

Continental waterfowl populations are strong, and habitat conditions have been above average in the Canadian provinces where Idaho's birds are produced. Mallards are by far the most abundant ducks in hunters' bags in Idaho. And more than 60 percent of the mallards harvested here come from Alberta, the Northwest Territories, British Columbia and Alaska, Fish and Game said.

Despite a delayed spring over most of the survey area, habitat conditions during the 2013 Waterfowl Breeding Population and Habitat Survey were improved or similar to last year in many areas because of average or above average annual precipitation.

The estimated mallard abundance was 10.4 million, similar to the 2012 estimate, which is 36 percent

above the long-term average. Population estimates for wigeon, green-winged teal, gadwalls and common goldeneyes — also commonly taken in Idaho — were similar to or above 2012 estimates in 2013.

In the traditional survey area, the total duck population estimate was about 45.6 million birds — a 6 percent decrease from last year's estimate of about 48.6 million. But it is still 33 percent higher than the long-term average from 1955 through 2012.

Last year's success: In 2012, Fish and Game said, about 16,200 Idaho duck hunters spent a collective 120,700 days in the field and harvested 351,600 ducks. This was a 68 percent increase in harvest from 2011 and well above the long-term average of 235,600 ducks.

Idaho hunters also harvested about 72,600 Canada geese in 2012. This was a 44 percent increase from 2011 and above the long-term average of 64,900 geese.

So far only the Sawtooth Society has formally come out questioning the effort,

expressing worries about "unintended consequences" that could come from a monument designation.

"We've been waiting nearly a decade for Congress to preserve our hunting and fishing opportunities in the Boulder-White Clouds, but after years of broken stalemate politics in Washington D.C., it's clear that our 'do-nothing' Congress can't get the job done," Caywood said.

TODAY IN HISTORY

On this date:

In 1795, English poet John Keats was born in London.

In 1864, Nevada became the 36th state.

In 1887, Nationalist Chinese leader Chiang Kai-shek was born in Zhejiang Province.

In 1926, magician Harry Houdini died in Detroit of gangrene and peritonitis resulting from a ruptured appendix.

In 1938, the day after his "War of the Worlds" broadcast had panicked radio listeners, Orson Welles expressed "deep regret" but also bewilderment that anyone had thought the simulated Martian invasion was real.

In 1941, the Navy destroyer USS Reuben James was torpedoed by a German U-boat off Iceland with the loss of some 100 lives, even though the United States had not yet entered World War II. Work was completed on the Mount Rushmore National Memorial in South Dakota, begun in 1927.

In 1959, a former U.S. Marine showed up at the U.S. Embassy in Moscow to declare he was renouncing his American citizenship so he could live in the Soviet Union. His name: Lee Harvey Oswald.

In 1961, the body of Josef Stalin was removed from Lenin's Tomb as part of the Soviet Union's "de-Stalinization" drive.

In 1968, President Lyndon B. Johnson ordered a halt to all U.S. bombing of North Vietnam, saying he hoped for fruitful peace negotiations.

In 1984, Indian Prime Minister Indira Gandhi was assassinated by two Sikh security guards.

In 1992, Pope John Paul II formally proclaimed that the Roman Catholic Church had erred in condemning the astronomer Galileo for holding that the Earth was not the center of the universe.

In 1994, a Chicago-bound American Eagle ATR-72 crashed in northern Indiana, killing all 68 people aboard.

Chris Christie for a tour of damage along the New Jersey coast from Superstorm Sandy; Christie said he "can't thank the president enough" for his concern and compassion. Wall Street was back in business after a two-day shutdown caused by the storm; stocks finished mixed. With New York's subways shut down, parts of the city were paralyzed by traffic gridlock; New York Gov. Andrew Cuomo announced that limited subway service would resume the next day. National Guard troops delivered meals and other supplies and evacuated stranded residents in Hoboken, N.J., amid complaints that relief efforts had been slow.

With such excellent fits in hearts and clubs, East-West had little difficulty in reaching their heart slam when South relayed for shape and found first extra shape, then a spade control. The auction was accurate and efficient; the play, less so.

When West led the spade 10, declarer won in dummy and crossed to a trump to ruff a spade, crossed to a top club to ruff a second spade, then took a second top trump and found the bad news.

With no tricks available to him, he could do little but exit with two more rounds of trumps, hoping West had started with only three spades. But that player could win and cash out the spades to set the slam.

When in with the spade ace, declarer can count 13 tricks without a finesse if trumps split 3-2, but he should take precautions against a 4-1 break — after all, that happens frequently enough to make it worthwhile to give up on the chances of an overtrick.

By leading a trump from dummy and ducking East's nine, South then has sufficient entries and trumps to win 12 tricks without having to risk playing on diamonds. After a diamond return, South wins and ruffs a spade in dummy, comes to the club king to ruff a second spade, then draws trump, pitching diamonds from the board. He can now run the clubs and score his three top trumps, two aces, five clubs and two spade ruffs for his 12 tricks.

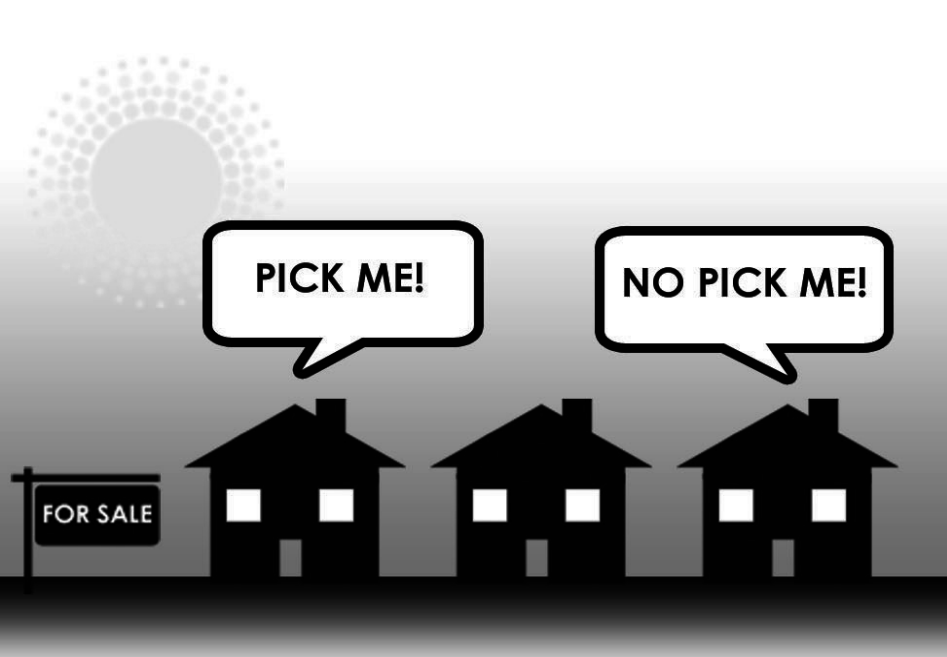

ANSWER: A two-club rebid is acceptable, given the quality of the clubs. That call suggests six clubs rather than five, but in an emergency the bid can be made with five. However, when you hold a singleton honor in partner's suit, an argument can be made for rebidding one no-trump. Even if partner opts to play spades with a chunky five-card suit, the bare ace is as good support as a small doubleton.

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New CSI Coach Forging Impressions

Quick transition from assistant to coach taken in stride by seasoned, versatile Jeremy Cox, a man who has served as right-hand to some of college basketball’s best.

TWIN FALLS • Days after Steve Gosar shockingly resigned and minutes after Jeremy Cox replaced him, the newly hired, quickly promoted assistant stepped away from the podium and sat, one long arm sprawled across a table, one elbow boxing out a running digital microphone and the other on his leg, his chin resting on his fist.

It had all happened so quickly.

This, a man who over the past five years had served stints at Kentucky and Texas A&M, who has a national championship trophy and NJCAA Coach of the Year award, who has coached NBA all-stars and served as right-hand man to some of college basketball’s best.

You know, guys who are on ESPN a lot.

“ESPN is not giving us love, but we need to see that spirit. You need to get that out there and help us,” Cox urged fans at his introductory news conference.

What was he doing in southern Idaho?

He thought, leaned over and spoke again, this time

without Gosar, players, supporters, administrators and boosters intently tuned to this new frequency, sounding just right. Not saying the right things – creating the new right things to say on the spot.

“If I was told CSI would be my ceiling, that it would be my destination at the age of 44, I would have taken that and run because this is not a big community college job, junior college job, small college job. This is a good college basketball job,” Cox said.

Who is coach Cox? Players say he is intense. They say he cares – a lot.

“He challenges us,” Hofstra transfer point guard Dallas Anglin said. “He wants us to figure it out on the basketball court and in life. He is hard on us and doesn’t play favorites because he doesn’t want us to fail. The young guys might not understand it now, but it’s going to be good for all of us.”

Guard Trevor Bamgartner served his mission in Russia after playing for USU-Eastern. He faced Pierre Jackson and saw how CSI played under Gosar before being recruited by the former coach

and signing with the Golden Eagles.

His respect for Gosar and the program is what brought him to CSI. He says he was “shocked” when Gosar re-signed.

He chose to stay, buying into Cox’s program over the summer. Now he is trying to win his teammates’ respect so he can be leader. And he’s playing through an injured toe.

After two years without basketball, though, it’s been a grueling October in Cox’s first camp.

“Coach Cox has been an adjustment,” Bamgartner said. “It has been adjustment in style of play and his intensity level. He is the most intense I have ever seen. (The late) coach Brad Barton (of USU-Eastern) was intense, but he doesn’t compare. At times, I’ll be honest, it’s hard and tough and frustrating because I’ve been out of basketball for a while and don’t have the legs yet.”

Gosar was known for driving a hard bargain, too.

Returning marksman James Reid says the transition from Gosar to Cox “has been easy.”

“To be honest, there is not much difference,” Reid said. “They are both very intense guys; they know what they want. At the end of the day, it comes down to playing hard and playing together. We stress it just as much if not more than we did with coach Gosar. They grew up together in Wyoming, and you can see that they are very similar coaches.”

Assistant Coach Colby Blaine, who spent four years under Gosar, attests to that Wyoming mold.

“Coach Cox has been awesome to be with because he generally cares about these guys, figuring it out on the basketball court and in life,” Blaine said. “He demands that they are good in the classroom and commu-

nity and continue to grow.”

But the Golden Eagles will play differently under Cox. They might be more entertaining.

The goal is to increase possessions by about 10 from last year. They’ll run in disguised battle formation, hoping to catch defenses trying to match in transition. A wide crossover fast break could cause chaos, opening the middle of the lane for the Golden Eagles athletic ball-handlers. If not, they’ll likely have advantageous cross-matches in the half-court.

Cox wants them to emulate the national champions — a bird a couple of coops up.

“We are getting up and down more,” Reid said. “Coach Cox calls it a wide break. We get wide, cross and try to put pressure on rim and confuse the defense. Defensively, we are really getting out, trying to create turnovers and run-outs and force teams to start their offense further out. He wants us to play like a Louisville, getting in passing lanes, screening offense, playing hard and playing together.”

When healthy, the Golden Eagles will have more athleticism than last season. The system wouldn’t work without it.

“We will see more fast-break opportunities with the way we defend,” Blaine said. “We step into passing lanes, and we make it tougher for people to pass. We will see more transition from that, and we like to run four guys out wide. They cross inside 3-point line to create havoc and confusion and allow for Montigo (Alford) and Dallas, guys who can really score with big time athleticism, to make plays in the middle of the floor when other guys are distracted.”

Alford was one of CSI’s most efficient and productive players last year, averaging 11 points a game on 46 percent shooting (54 percent from the 3-point line). Going into his third year in the pro-

gram, Alford could surpass last year’s numbers if he can stay healthy (he’s still battling shoulder problems) and get minutes. In the new system, the Golden Eagles should have multiple players in double figures each game. “It’s more screens, moving instead of standing there, instead of specific plays and sets,” Alford said. “He lets us play a lot. It is a lot of running and gunning.”

CSI Women Back in the Spotlight

Will the Highly Touted Golden Eagles Shine or Smolder?

TWIN FALLS • From October 2011 to February 2013, the College of Southern Idaho women’s basket-ball team vanished from the NJCAA Division I poll.

Over about 18 months, the Golden Eagles went 24-26. And a 17-point loss to Pima College in late December put the team back under 500 in 2012.

While CSI logged a few hard-fought victories, there were no clear harbingers of a 2013 turn-around.

Yet without any set-in-stone resolutions, as soon as the calendar flipped, the CSI women transformed into a power. The Golden Eagles won 14 of 17 games in 2013, defeating previously No.1 ranked North Idaho three times in a month – an inconceivable accomplishment just months prior.

The Golden Eagles won the Scenic West Athletic Conference co-championship and the No.1 seed in the Region 18 tournament, where they advanced past Snow College and escaped the Georgia Striton-led Cardinals by two points. CSI’s run would end in Salina, Kan., where they were defeated by Chipola College in the first round of the NJCAA national tournament.

From the outside, their momentum has only accelerated. Last year’s run and its ensuing recruiting class have left quite the impression.

After losing their best player and vocal leader, point guard Adriana “Shorty” Dent (now playing at Alaska Anchorage), the Golden Eagles came in at No. 5 in the pre-season poll.

They are the only team in the top 14 with more than 10 losses from the previous season, a tip of the cap to the SWAC and head coach Randy Rogers’ 13-’14 class.

Where does this year’s team rank on paper for Rogers, now in his eighth season?

“We are somewhere in the mid-

dle from the very best teams,” the often understated Rogers said. “Last year’s team overachieved, but this team has more talent than last year’s team. But we have to have

someone like Shorty step in and defend for us.”

Striton is back for North Idaho, and the conference reloaded as it normally does.

And while the Golden Eagles search for their next Dent (they have some candidates), there’s plenty for other teams to worry about.

CSI got significantly bigger in the off-season, adding 6-foot-4 center Kayla Stephens, who has turned heads and swatted ovals in training camp.

“In practice she destroys the boards,” said CSI freshman guard Holly Blades, a former Meridian forward. “We are trying to get her to dunk.”

Rogers said he’s been surprised by the speed with which Stephens has developed over the past two months. She was an underutilized player in her last year of high school after moving from California.

She’s now one of the team’s biggest personalities.

“It is weird, going up against her in practice,” sophomore Julia Dufurrena said. “I hate it because my shots get blocked all the time, and you run into her and it’s like a brick wall. It’s nice when you go and scrimmage because she is on our team. She is a presence physically. She walks into the gym with her Afro and loud voice, and she is there.”

Stephens’ addition creates a domino effect on the roster – each position has gotten taller, bigger.

To Rogers and some sophomores, there’s a buzz to this squad that wasn’t present at the same time last year.

Coach Rogers has handed out more plaudits than he did last October, and he’s been especially effusive when talking about 6-foot-1 sophomore post Stephanie Tournson, who received little playing time last year.

“She put in the work this summer, and it is night and day from last season,” Rogers said.

Returners Tournson, Brittany Wirth, Sarah Larson (last year Viehweg) and Spanish freshman Elisabet Lopez Sagrera will play both forward and center, taking the minutes of departed Jessie Saint-Felix.

“We are really loaded inside; even our guards are bigger,” Larson said. “I feel bad for (opposing teams).”

New hairstyles? Nope. Two Golden Eagles sophomores changed their names; they each got married in July.

“I don’t think it has changed me on the court much, but I have to make sure I give myself time to put into the team because it’s harder not being with them 24-7 like last year,” said guard Cassidy Jones (last year Cassidy Skidmore). “Building those relationships with them is a little bit harder. It is definitely a different dynamic.”

Sarah Larson (last year Viehweg) said it was entirely coincidental that she and Jones both married in the same month. It’s the only time they could fit it in.

Both players say teammates have been supportive, but probably not as much as their husbands.

“He has told me over and over that he will follow me wherever I want to go,” Larson said.

SHOOTING LICENSE

CSI won the SWAC on the strength of its rebounding and turnover differential. It created more possessions than other teams, largely through extra effort.

Coach Randy Rogers would like to give his team a greater margin for error.

The Golden Eagles shot 26 percent on 3-pointers last year, fifth among the six conference teams.

Now there will be strict rules on who gets to shoot from behind the arc.

Players will have to earn a license.

“I thought it was the best idea (Rogers) has ever had,” Larson said. “Our shooting has improved 1,000 times.”

In order to pass, players have to make 60 of 100 shots

coming from five different angles.

They’re allowed unlimited tests but must take 500 shots

between tests.

If a player doesn’t pass, and many already have, they’ll expect to get pulled

from a game if they take a 3-pointer.

“I hate it,” Julia Dufurrena said. “But I can understand

the idea. I just get nervous.”

Dufurrena has yet to test. She made one of 12 3-point shots last season.

So big, the Golden Eagles could play the 6-foot Dufurrena at small forward, and she led the team in rebounds per minute last year.

“I try really hard for rebounds,” Dufurrena said. “I’ll try to guard whoever they tell me to, because I’m not as solid as most posts.”

Dufurrena (co-captain) brings versatile defense and extra possessions, but the Golden Eagles expect to get most of their scoring from their guards.

Shooting guard Patrice Toston (co-captain) returns for her sophomore year after leading the conference in scoring (13.8 points per game.)

“I think she can score around 18 for us this season,” Rogers said.

Toston could share the floor or rotate with another sharp-shooting lefty, Blades, an Idaho high school star who says she has a newly developed floor game to go with her marksmanship. Blades could develop into a Division I player at CSI. She said she would consider Boise State if things go well and the feelings are mutual.

“I need to have ball-handling and post moves,” Blades said. “I’m a tall guard. I can push the ball, take an outlet, but I have to have everything pieced together, not just shooting.”

Last year’s best 3-point shooter, Cassidy Jones (last year Skidmore) and Alli Furniss also should get time on a roster as deep as Rogers has had at CSI.

The big question is at point guard. Rogers and the sophomores accept that no one can replace Dent.

Freshman McClain Williams (Eagle High) is the front-runner to start the season. Returner Zulieka Grinsell is one of the team’s best pure passers, and Carson, Calif., recruit Rachelle Owens has the most defensive potential and could develop into a key rotation player later in the year. She could be asked to slow

down Striton when conference plays heats up.

For now, the challenge is finding enough playing time for each candidate to see who could provide the most at both ends of the floor.

Rogers may try a point guard by committee approach early, at least until last year’s 4A second team point guard Celeste Pantoja (Middleton) returns from injury. But Pantoja will have to win the job.

“It’s like last year, kids are fighting to play,” Rogers said.

Even with familiar faces, and minute battles at each position, there are few resemblances to last year’s squad.

“My philosophy was different last year. We looked awful at times early, but I liked how hard my kids practiced,” Rogers said. “I kind of approached it more as, ‘Hey, don’t worry about it, let’s keep improving.’”

“This year I approached it differently. We are the team to beat right now. Whether we are or not, we have eight kids back from last year’s team, the league’s leading scorer, a pretty good recruiting class, so teams are going to say we are the team to beat. The target is going to be a lot tougher on our kids, a brighter spotlight, so my approach is, ‘Guys, this is not good enough; we are not going to win like this!’”

They’ll have to reach the new heights without “Shorty,” who so often raised the team above expectations last year.

Losing Dent’s harassing defense and spirit are two things, but how the Golden Eagles replace her voice will likely determine whether they underachieve or approach the place Dent took them last year – where team play superseded on-paper talent. If they do, their potential is considerably greater.

“We have to be careful comparing ourselves to last year’s team because we are different,” said Dufurrena, team captain and one of its vocal leaders. “We have high expectations, and we need to rise to them. We have a lot of talent, but we are just getting started.”

Injuries Cast Early Doubts on Talented Group

TWIN FALLS • You might have an injury problem when you can't scrimmage until your volunteer assistant coach is fully stretched out.

"We are looking for guys in the intramural leagues right now, and it's challenging to practice as hard and physical as we do with just eight or nine guys," said head coach Jeremy Cox.

He may not have been joking about picking up a player from intramurals. (Dan Hawkins is confused.)

How severely has the CSI men's basketball team been hit with injuries in Cox's first pre-season?

The Golden Eagles had to cancel their annual trip to the Salt Lake Jamboree.

"It has been brutal," Cox said.

And yet, missing six players, the Golden Eagles won their first preseason game against NAIA's Eastern Oregon, which went 28-5 last year. CSI won by more than 50 points — 112 to 60.

"We want to win a national championship and be remembered as one of the greatest at CSI, but we need to stay healthy," Alford said.

After a disappointing 20-12 season in which CSI missed the national tournament, having lost six of their eight top rebounders and scorers as well as their coach in the off-season, the Golden Eagles likely won't be ranked in the preseason, and no one can seem to pinpoint when that last happened.

"There is less expectation going in because of the year we had last year," said returning guard/forward James Reid. "We don't mind that; we don't have a ton of big name guys. Last year we had a couple of guys come from some pretty big D-I schools. This year we don't have that, not a lot of name guys. We don't mind flying under the radar to start.

"No one is talking about us, and so the initial reaction is that is not what we want; we want CSI to be big. And then we take a step back and realize it's not bad to be under the radar. Sooner or later the bulls-eye will be there, so we have to be thankful when it is not on us to start the year."

While CSI doesn't have as many former Division I players, when it does get healthy,

it appears to have more talent than last year — certainly enough to make a big move.

Lassen College transfer Charles Jackson broke his leg early in camp and could return in a few weeks. He was named the 20th best junior college player in the country by Sporting News.

Athletic 6-foot-9 freshman forward Cullen Russo and 6-foot-4 forward Brant

Mecham have bad backs. A lean left-tackle with a 3-point stroke, 6-foot-7, 250-pound Dorian Cason has battled Achilles tendinitis and just recently returned to the floor. Returner Detwon Rogers, an explosive, 3-point shooting power forward who was all the rage after losing weight and recovering from an Achilles injury, has missed time with a bad ankle. And

exciting recruit Shaquille Jones hadn't stepped on the floor through late October since getting his knee cleaned out upon arriving in Twin Falls.

The players on the MASH unit would make for an imposing lineup in the Scenic West Conference.

The guys on the floor (many battling minor injuries and sickness) have impressed Cox with their character and work ethic and wowed CSI fans during the basketball bash dunk contest, which was a bit of a dud in 2012.

Dallas Anglin, a transfer from Hofstra, is a combo guard in the athletic mold of Montigo Alford. Alford and Anglin are working to become better point guards, but each can create for himself and others, and they could form an even more potent two-point guard lineup than what Alford and Kareem Storey did last season.

"Our backcourt is solid," Cox said. "We have plenty of handlers; we can shoot the ball pretty well; good intelligence, maturity and character."

And then there's the freshman who led the state of Michigan in scoring last year. Assistant coach Colby Blaine recently compared Fredrick Edmond with former CSI great Fabyon Harris, who averaged 12 points a game at Texas A&M last year.

"He reminds me of a bigger Fabyon Harris, actually," Blaine said. "Fabyon has had a lot of success, and Fred has to earn that, but he works extremely hard and can really score it at the rim. He has to learn technique and how to play weakside defense, but he brings a positive energy to the floor like Fabyon did."

Reid, who made 62 of 167 3-point shots last year (37 percent) and will be a key rotation player, sees Edmond having a big impact.

"Fred is special — unbelievable athlete, but the best thing about him is his motor. He is a killer," Reid said. "He wants to beat you every single time out there."

Edmond's roommate, Anglin, interviewed separately, used the exact same words to describe Edmond: "special" and "motor."

In CSI's basketball bash and in his first appearance before fans, Edmond made a few plays that would have ranked near the top of last year's highlight reel.

Cox, who compared Edmond's rebounding and basket-attacks with those of Dwayne Wade, knew what to expect from Edmond on the floor.

Edmond still has managed to surprise.

"We need to talk about Edmond a little more because he has been an unbelievable freshman," Cox said. "His leadership, great leader, his approach to learning has been unbelievable, his approach off the floor. For a guy recruited as highly as he was, and had opportunities to play D-I to come to Southern Idaho and embrace what we are trying to do, I can't be more you take Edmond, his approach for as highly recruited and touted as he was, was a surprise."

But the Golden Eagles don't want to put too much pressure on their prized recruit. Edmond has to prove himself on the floor before he can speak with media.

Besides, other freshman with considerably high ceilings should have an immediate impact.

Six-foot-9 lefty Darnell Tillman has quickly lost weight he needed to lose — with one of the best work ethics on the team according to Cox — and could earn significant minutes early on. Hard-nosed Chicago point guard Jamal McDowell has perhaps been the team's best floor leader and decision-making point guard, which in combination with his pressure defense will allow him to complement most lineups. Clifton Harrell and walk-on Osamudiamen Igodan are athletic energy players who have changed the tempo and urgency of practice.

If the Golden Eagles can get healthy ...

Construction at Minidoka began in June 1942, and the first prisoners arrived in August. No one tried to escape and, for an internment camp, Minidoka was “benign,” Ash said. Children played in the guard towers. Internees helped harvest the area’s sugar beets due to a labor shortage. Some even helped build the camp.

“They put the barbed-wire fence up ... in November,” she said. “And so when they did, they said, ‘Why? We’ve been here for months; we haven’t gone anywhere. Where are we going to go even if we leave?’”

Each of the 36 residential blocks had 12 barracks, a dining hall, a laundry and sanitation building and recreation hall. Built without insulation, the 20-by-120-foot barracks held six small apartments.

“Having been registered and everything, they would walk in, there would be a bare light bulb in the center of the ceiling, a pot-bellied stove and Army-issued cots, and that was it,” Ash said.

For some, it wasn’t all that bad. One woman told Ash she “had a ball” as a kid at Minidoka. Only when children internees grew up and talked to their parents did they realize how difficult it was. Two people drowned in the canal trying to escape the summer heat.

“For kids, they had other kids, they didn’t have chores like they did back home ... they had a great time, and

they provided Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts and all sorts of activities for them,” Ash said.

Those details struck creative writing student Zandra Edwards. As a grandmother, she said, she was inspired to write about what it would be like as a child brought to the camp.

“I think about my 12-year-old grandson being put in a situation like that, and it’s unbelievable that something like that could happen,” she said.

After the tour, Hansen asked the group to think about walls and fences, to consider and write about what freedoms Americans give up and what concessions are made because of fear.

Writers discussed the National Security Agency’s spy-

ing, immigration, voter rights, hysteria surrounding the recent federal government shutdown and more.

“When we were at the post office area, we were talking about how internees had their letters chopped up or scribbled out and their letters read by the government,” said Waymunt, an Army veteran who fought in Operation Iraqi Freedom. “Now we have the Patriot Act and the scare from 9/11.”

Perhaps, he reasoned, the camp isn’t so different from other things in American history.

“Is this really outside of what America is at heart? Boxing people in when we are afraid of them, segregating people who are different from us? That’s kind of been a part

of America’s history as well,” he said.

Heward wondered what she would have thought about the camp if she were alive in 1942. Could she write about that? She worries about her safety in today’s

world of terrorism, but is profiling a “necessary evil?”

“Is it something that needs to be done?” she asked. “But being here, putting it in perspective, is this what we want? I just have a ton of ideas floating in my head.”

That’s what Hansen said she wanted. When she wandered around Minidoka on her own, reading signs and mulling the site’s history, she was inspired to write a poem.

Hansen also led students to Ritter Island in Thousand Springs State Park to reflect on nature and to Rock Creek Station and the Sticker Homesite to write about connections and intersections. She had been wanting to do the excursions for years but never found the time.

It helps the process when a writer has a firm understanding of a subject, Hansen said. Some of the more interesting pieces she’s read have come from developing writing students who wrote about what they knew intimately – working in a machine shop or the family tradition of brand-

ing cattle.

“As I’ve really been focusing on Idaho places, I’ve been thinking about how my students oftentimes don’t appreciate the really cool history, geography and natural beauty that we are surrounded with here,” she said. “Sometimes we think of ourselves as kind of a hick place – like we are just known for our potatoes and our mountains.”

Heward said she and a DeCelo history teacher planned to bring a group of students to the site to talk about making race an issue and what happens when society lets fear motivate.

“I keep finding parallels with what’s happening today,” she said moments after finishing a rough draft of her Minidoka-inspired writing. “At the time this happened, it was OK. Maybe it was protection for them or it seemed like it would be OK. I wonder what are we going to slide in to that (category).”

“Is it going to happen again?”
