

Wickard May Ask Discontinuance of Quotas on Sugar

WASHINGTON, March 6 (AP)—Secretary Wickard soon may recommend to the White House that marketing and import quotas on sugar be suspended during the war emergency because of short supplies, it was learned today.

Department sugar authorities explained that quotas, imposed for the first time in 1939, were designed to promote stability in the sugar industry during periods when supplies were excessive and prices otherwise would be disastrously low from the producers' standpoint.

The quotas give various domestic territorial and foreign producing areas a share in the American market on the basis of a formula set up in sugar control legislation. The war has changed the supply situation. In recent years supplies available to the American market were much larger than the requirements. Thus they have been reduced to a point requiring restricted consumption.

Loss of Supply This change has been brought about by loss of the Philippine supply and possibly a part of the Hawaiian supply, indicating a part of the western hemisphere production with Great Britain and other nations.

Obviously, the situation which presents above quotas does not now exist, an official said. Quotas can be suspended only by legislative action. Sugar authorities emphasized, however, that suspension of the quotas might be necessary in making any material increase in supplies available to this country.

Marketing Possibility This possibility was present quite recently when the present quota of 3,022,074 tons this year. This quota is the maximum of 6,890,000 tons a year. The war production boom, which reached its peak in 1941, has exceeded 5,300,000 tons. The only effect, that suspension of quotas might be necessary, officials said, would be to make available possibly a very small quantity in excess of the quota which do not have quotas.

ARMY SETS UP 2 RECEPTION UNITS FOR COAST JAPS

Death Ends Hectic Tom Mooney Career

SAN FRANCISCO, March 6 (AP)—Death today ended the long and militant career of Thomas J. Mooney, who served 22½ years in prison for a crime he claimed he never committed—the dynamiting of the 1916 Preparedness day parade in San Francisco.

Mooney died after undergoing a serious abdominal operation, his fourth since he was hounded on Jan. 7, 1939, by Gov. Culbert L. Olson.

For 16 months he had not set foot on the floor; except for his first six months of freedom, he had been in San Quentin prison. 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U. S. Bombers Taken off Java for Lack of Help

MELBOURNE, Australia, March 6 (AP)—United States heavy bomber squadrons were removed from the island of Java last week-end by American airmen because lack of fighter protection made it impossible to continue the punishing blows they had dealt the Japanese throughout the East Indies campaign.

The Japanese, smashing into allied defenses as I left Java shortly after the end of the war, were making every effort to speed up conquest of Eastern Territory in order to reach the Malay Peninsula and the South Sea Islands.

These are the outstanding impressions I carried from Java after weeks of reporting the day-by-day advance of enemy forces down the Malay Peninsula and across the rich Dutch East Indies.

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JAPANESE ORDER FILIPINOS TO GIVE UP ALL WEAPONS

BY EVERETT R. HOLLES WASHINGTON, March 6 (AP)—Apparently fearful of the uprisings against them, the Japanese have ordered all Filipinos in occupied areas to surrender every weapon and tool which might conceivably be employed as a weapon in the war department reported today.

A copy of the Japanese order, which demanded even the folding knife, the Filipino's tool of all work, has reached Gen. Douglas MacArthur's headquarters, the department's communique said.

This order is interpreted by Gen. MacArthur as indicating that the invaders fear that the increasing resistance of the natives may develop into a general uprising against the Japanese, the communique continued.

No Jap Offensive Meanwhile, the communique said, the success of MacArthur's air operations in the Luzon campaign in Subic Bay on March 4 has dislocated enemy plans for resumption of their offensive in the Philippines.

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Drive Japs From Plains but Eoes Split Java Island

Dutch troops, in a terrific frontal assault, were reported today to have driven the invading Japanese from a section of the plains of Bandonee, headquarters of the NEI command, but in most other areas the flaming battle for Java was turning in favor of the rising sun.

Dutch headquarters acknowledged that allied troops had abandoned the wrecked capital city of Batavia and that the defenders were tired from days of savage fighting.

A Reuters news agency dispatch said the invaders who reached the plains of Bandonee retreated to the north when the Dutch attacked. The invaders rounded with artillery fire.

Reuters also reported the Japanese had been driven back from some sectors of eastern Java, where the enemy was driving toward the great Soerabaya bay and material about five to one.

Official military sources said United Nations forces near Bandung were fighting a stiff up-and-down battle against the advancing Japanese who, they estimated, outnumbered us in men and material about five to one.

Unofficially the Japanese force was estimated at about 100,000 men. But the official and unofficial statistics did not fit well together. The news agency said that the Japanese force was as low as 20,000.

Bandavia was said to have been declared an open city by the Japanese. The Japanese are now smashing at the defense area north of Bandung and it was reported there that the Dutch still held the foe at bay. The city is now in the front line of defense, besieged, and under constant attack.

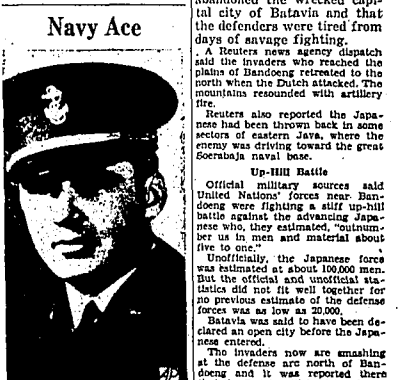

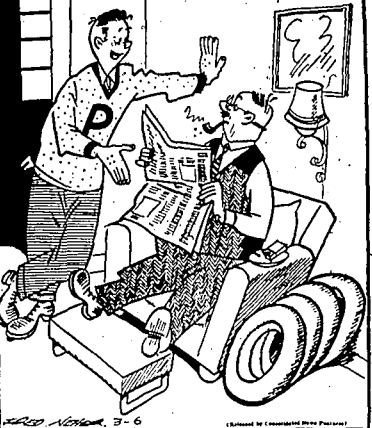

SENAATE GROUP MAY INSIST ON GENERAL SALES LEVY

PLAN IMMEDIATE TAX COLLECTION

WASHINGTON, March 6 (AP)—Several members of the senate and means committee indicated today they would insist upon immediate collection of a general sales tax if it is decided to separate proposed new excise taxes from the estimated \$7,600,000,000 tax program.

The senate finance committee made the separation proposal, contending that by immediate enactment of new excise taxes—higher levies on whisky, cigarettes, beer, gasoline, etc.—collections could start almost at once.

Chairman Robert L. Doughton, D. N. C., of the ways and means committee said he was not personally impressed by the senate suggestion because of the relation of excise taxes to the whole tax program. He said he would not pass final judgment until his committee has considered the proposal.

Hearings Researed

The house committee has recessed tax hearings until Monday to consider today the bill which would raise the national debt limit from \$65,000,000 to \$125,000,000.

The treasury's new tax program would not impose income levies on persons of persons who are not subject to them at present. The changes would be in the amount of levies on those who are already subject to income taxes.

The treasury program would roughly double the tax on income in the low brackets and would provide increases all along the line.

The point at which income taxes begin is determined by the personal exemptions granted. The present exemption is \$20 for a single person, \$1,500 for a married couple and \$400 for each dependent—would not be changed under the treasury plan.

These Limitations

Under both present and proposed plans, individuals are theoretically subject to income tax if their income for these categories exceeds \$1,250 a year—equal to \$143.33 a week.

Married, no children—\$1,500 a year, \$225 a week.

Married, one child—\$1,000 a year, \$155 a week.

Married, two children—\$2,000 a year, \$43.33 a week.

The "whichever point" at which tax liability begins is somewhat higher because many individuals have allowed deductions for charity, state and local taxes and interest payments. These vary greatly.

JAPAN TELLS OF HAWAIIAN ATTACK

TOKYO, March 6 — Japanese broadcast recorded by UP in San Francisco—The navy ministry and imperial headquarters today issued a long communique detailing how an attack force of "special submarines" raided Pearl harbor on Dec. 7, made a second surprise attack the same night and, escaped with only nine men lost.

The communique intimated the submarines were of the "two-ton" variety, one of which was beached during the attack and recovered by American military authorities.

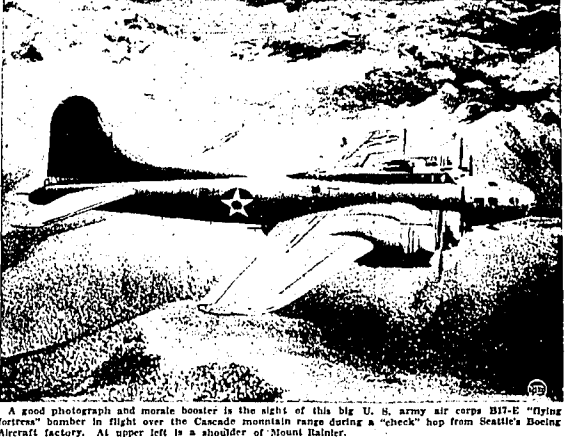
The second attack, the communique said, was made by submarines that had remained submerged during daylight, risking destruction by bombs and aerial torpedoes dropped by Japanese naval air force planes.

In the second, attack, vessels which had been confirmed to have sunk in the initial damage in the initial attack, were again assaulted, it added.

The U. S. B. Arizona, the communique added, was a victim in the night attack.

A young lieutenant, Iwano, who was promoted posthumously to command, was credited with driving the plan for attack, which cost the Japs only nine casualties.

"It think it is a pity that since he was freed, he spent more than two-thirds of his time in hospitals. Even so, his mind was active and keen all the time, and his ideas following events in the world just as though he were there. He watched the war keenly, especially the war against Fascism. In fact, the struggle of the world against Fascism was his great interest in his last hours of consciousness."

From George T. Davis, another of his counsel, came the word that none of Mooney's lawyers ever was paid a fee. They were satisfied to receive expenses.

"Frank J. Walsh, famed Washington attorney, once told me he had spent more than \$50,000 out of his own pocket on Mooney's behalf which he never expected to be repaid. He considered it a contribution to mankind in general," said Davis.

"The world will mourn his passing as I do, because he was a warm friend to those who knew him well and an inspiration to all in his courageous fight for freedom and justice. Even in his long and dreary illness, Tom's spirit never waned. It was the spirit of a world character, and such a spirit can never die."

Mooney's greatest disappointment, Davis revealed, was that Gov. Olson did not live up to his promise to grant a full and unconditional pardon to Billings.

"It was always Tom's view that since both he and Billings were innocent, each was entitled to the same treatment and the failure of Olson in this respect was forgiven by Tom, even though he was personally grieved for the government's consideration of his own case," said Davis.

"I regretted the fact that as soon as the election pressure was over, Olson cooled off."

Olson had promised to pardon both men in his campaign talks. Friends, principally from the labor movement, press today to devote special funeral arrangements. They will

be no religious ceremony for Mooney, was an adherent to the church. The AFL and the CIO and the railroad brotherhoods forgat their differences to do him honors.

Mooney said his companion, Warren K. Billings, was regarded by labor as "martyr." All were fully convinced the men were "framed."

The bombing of the preparedness day parade on July 22, 1918, was the culmination of much trouble for both men who had been active in organizing labor.

Almost before the bomb smoke had drifted away, and authorities were creating the bodies of 10 victims and treating 40 others moved down by the blast. Mooney was captured into the front pages of the nation.

Known as an associate of anarchists Emma Goldman and Alexander Berkman, he was a known advocate of dynamite as a weapon of industrial warfare.

Opposed War Entrance

He also was known to oppose American participation in the World war. Thus he was an immediate suspect.

Within a short time Mooney, his wife, Rena, Billings, Edward Nolan, an officer of the machinists' union, and Frank Weibner, a taxi driver, were taken into custody.

District Attorney Charles Pickett, was told that a man identified as Mooney had planted a suitcase against a wall at the corner of Stewart and Market streets shortly before the explosion. Billings was identified as his companion. The five were indicted for murder.

Billings was tried first. He was convicted of second degree murder and sent to Prison prison for life.

Mrs. Mooney Acquitted

Mrs. Mooney was acquitted in July, 1917. In October of the same year Weibner was acquitted. Nolan was freed without further trial.

Mooney went to trial in January, 1917, and despite defective evidence showing photographically Mooney was watching the parade a mile away at the time of the blast, was found guilty of first degree murder and sentenced to hang by Judge Franklin A. Griffin.

Only the intervention of President Woodrow Wilson saved him. A presidential commutation reported Mooney had not been given a fair trial. Gov. William D. Stephens then commuted Mooney's sentence to life imprisonment.

Stop Bickering and Unite to Win War, Businessman Pleads

America must abandon its bickering, unite uselessly in the face of war and demand positive leadership to replace "procrastination and irresponsibility."

Those are some of the major calls to the nation voiced by Claude J. Detweiler, Twin Falls businessman, in his address "Wake Up, America," being held tonight for the general distribution by the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce. The address was heard at the radio station, copies are being mailed to legislators and transcriptionists to be made available to other radio stations and Chambers of Commerce.

Local Small Problems

In the address, Mr. Detweiler is concerned more with disorders, selfishness and inefficiency here than with military setbacks in the Pacific. Warning that America can't compete to be made available to "compare the attitude of our labor leaders and government officials; the bickering, jealousy, greed, waste and extravagance which distract the nation from the very problem which is before us."

Urging all-out purchase of U. S. defense bonds and stamps and bonds, Detweiler said, "Either we overwhelm our enemies or they conquer us. If our own will, you and I will have our undivided attention."

"Our leadership has been pitifully deficient," Detweiler charged. "Indecision, procrastination and irresponsibility have led to national catastrophe."

He said examples are the Normandy debacle, the Pearl Harbor fiasco, the national labor disgrace, approval of the 40-hour work week, and the closed shop racket when soldiers fight for \$21 a month.

He asserted "These labor leaders have such a stronghold on our government that congress is afraid to vote them in the place of the labor leaders, conciliators and liaison men are exempt from military service."

Detweiler pleaded for all Americans to write their congressmen, force a week if possible; to "compare more than anything else to clear up all the present confusion. We must have our congress assume its responsibilities."

"Surely if our boys can face death seven days a week it is not a sacrifice for us to take one-half hour a week to demand of our leaders that they prosecute war, instead of bickering over Donald Duck, fancying bedroom manners, and which labor gang gets the grab on which government job."

Battles With Nation

His battles for freedom stirred America as no other case since the Dred Scott decision by the United States supreme court before the Civil war.

Mooney's champions publicized his case as "America's Dreyfus case," and the "most colossal frame-up in U. S. history."

But it was not until Olson took office in 1929 that he saw freedom ahead.

Mooney and Billings contended they were victims of perjured evidence. That pre-war hysteria in San Francisco forced the prosecution to find a "gun" for the affair, and that they became the victims.

Billings had a previous conviction on record, in an such as was in Prison prison with no hope of pardon or parole.

Their fight was vindicated on Jan. 7, 1932, when Olson pardoned Mooney and a short time later commuted Billings' sentence to time served.
