LONDON, March 10 (AP)—Allied intelligence agents are investigating reports that the French government has handed over to Germany about 40 French warships which were incomplete when France collapsed, and both the British and American governments are watching developments closely, it was understood today.

FARM BACKERS URGED TO DROP PARITY DEMAND

WASHINGTON, March 10 (AP)—Administration leaders in the house pointed today to a warning by President Roosevelt against inflation and profiteering as one good reason why the farm bloc should agree to abandon farm price restrictions in an agriculture appropriation bill.

Shortly before Russia made its charge, the Italian radio, quoting the official Italian news agency in a London dispatch, had reported that "London political circles believe that a break in diplomatic relations between the United States and Italy is imminent."

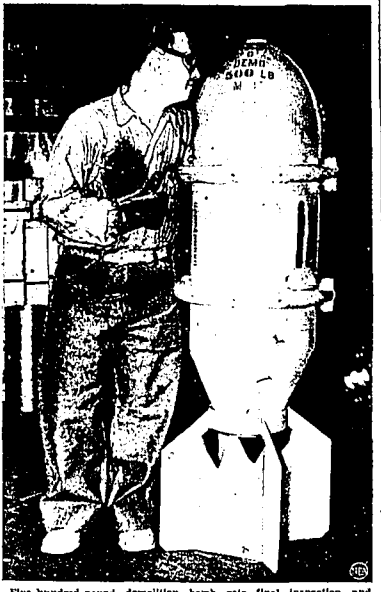

PLANT WORK FOR NATION'S WOMEN

An enormous amount of manpower will be needed for replacing workers withdrawn from the armed forces and for expanding the output of war materials. It stated.

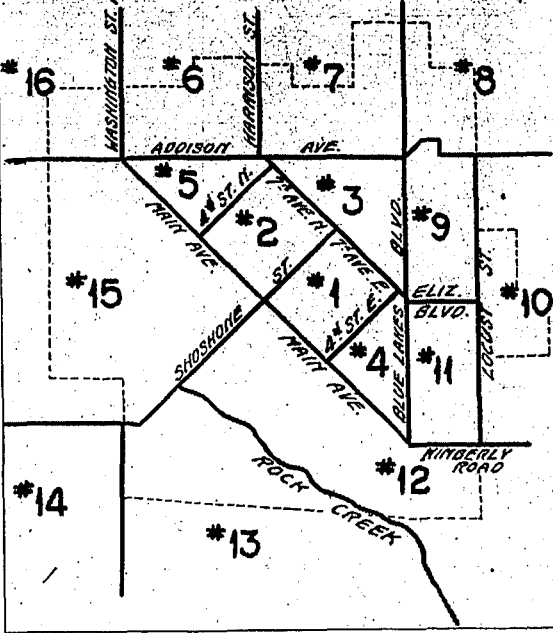
These needs can be met by utilizing the workers who are still unemployed, by lengthening working hours and by shifting workers from nonessential civilian industries.

In the future, however, such measures will not be sufficient. As in World War I, millions of people who are not ordinarily workers must be drawn into the labor force.

Jap Successes in Java, Burma Increase Threat Against India

By DEWITT MACKENZIE An Asia World War Analyst The Japanese successes in Java and Burma have increased the threat to India to the point where one wonders whether the allies are about to write another disastrous chapter in their military history.

With the release of naval and air forces from the conquest of Java, the Japanese are first themselves in a position to strike a quick blow at Hindustan. There is no definite indication, thus far, whether their strategy provides for such a move right now.

Freedom is the price which the nationalists ask for cooperation with England in the war. The British government every once of defensive strength and internal cohesion which can be mastered, and the British government a few days ago was reported to be ready to make concessions in dominion status.

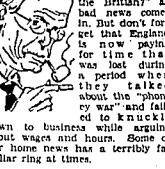

RABBIT FUR NOW CAREY INDUSTRY

CAREY, March 10 (AP)—All jack-rabbits formerly were considered good for was target practice. They also ruined crops. Farmers organized drives to rid saccharin lands adjoining their fields of the hated, high-hopping crop-devourers.

When Australia, principal supplier of rabbit-fur industry, was cut off by the war the price of pelts began to jump like the animals the skins once covered.

New industry. New men and boys in the little town along the edges of the sheep-widespread acre and chest grass wastes—favorite home of the jack-rabbit—are bringing out a daily haul that promises an estimated annual million-dollar profit for the state.

The pelts, once virtually worthless, now bring 60 to 75 cents per pound. The supply is virtually unlimited because hares are only prime during the winter, leaving about eight months for the prolific jackrabbits to replenish their ranks.

Killing is almost entirely by shooting. Poisoning is too dangerous for a day. A rabbit at Mackay has been operating on a small scale for five years.

In the first two weeks after the Richfield branch was opened Carey and Richfield bought 30,000 dead rabbits, at an average of 100,000 pounds a week.

The rabbits feed late in the day, so the biggest kill is between 5 and 6 p. m.

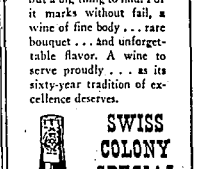

STRIKES STILL

An audience of 130 million sits in on the War Labor board's fact finding hearings on the "little steel" dispute involving 175,000 workers. That audience grants the nominal importance to both sides of "union security" and a \$1 a day wage increase.

After Japan struck, labor pledged: no strikes. Industry pledged: no lockouts. The conflict in the war department statistics indicate man-days lost in strikes on Army work orders will total 32,700 for the first 26 days of February.

The 32,700 man-days lost last month may not seem important compared with hundreds of thousands of man-days lost each month before Pearl harbor. But they are important to that audience of 130 million. And the fact that time lost increased over January—when "only" 8,000 man-days on Army contracts were wasted—does not ease the situation.

Perhaps failure to obtain \$1 more a day would work hardship on employees. Perhaps granting of "union security" demands would work hardship on employer.

Heavy defeat of the attempt in the house to suspend extra overtime payment above 40 hours a week "for the duration" indicates government attitude is clear: labor policy must be an immediate reality.

They want this "little steel" dispute settled quickly and clearly. They want a definite government labor policy that will stop—somehow—the flow of wasted man-days.

They want industry to honor its promise: no lockouts. They want employer and employer to realize this is war—slowly the 130 million are coming to know this themselves.

ISN'T IT CONFUSING?

Within three months approximately one United States will be drawing a federal pay check under the auspices of the Civil Service Commission. This figure does not include soldiers, sailors, marines or recipients of money from the War Relocation Authority.

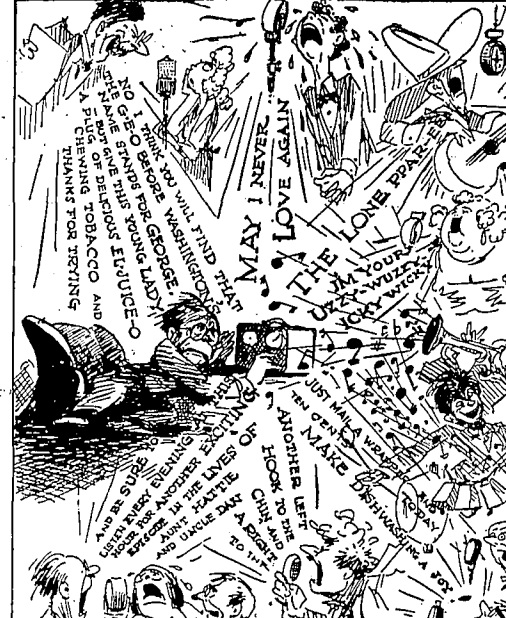

AAA STARTS NEW FARMER SERVICE

A new U. S. department of agriculture farmer service office was established today in Twin Falls by the soil conservation service to assist farmers with production and conservation problems in south central Idaho, according to Jack Taylor, newly assigned soil conservationist.

The personnel will consist of a soil conservationist and an irrigation engineer who will work closely with the county war boards and other department of agriculture personnel in rendering every possible assistance to farmers with their production and conservation problems.

The new service is being made available because of the department of agriculture recognition of some of the evils which occurred during the following years of the world war from increased production. In many cases, possible long time land use damages resulting from increased production were not recognized in time to avert the land.

The service, in cooperation with other agencies, will make advice available on practically every crop rotation to maintain fertility, prevent erosion, control wire worms, and render engineering assistance to provide the greatest efficiency of water for maximum production and prevention of erosion.

Taylor advised farmers to request assistance through their county war board or write directly to the office in Twin Falls.

VANCE PREDICTS ADDED REVERSES

EDEM, March 10.—The United States probably will suffer more reverses before the tide of war turns, predicted Sam E. Vance, Jr., Idaho department commander of the American Legion, at the fifth district meeting here.

We feel chagrin and disappointment at these reverses, but we can study history and take courage," he explained, pointing to Valley Forge, burning of the national capital in 1814, the Civil war and first World war.

"We must deny ourselves many things and devote time, energy, ability and money to the cause of victory. For a time, no doubt, we may have to forego some of our liberties."

Declaring that all sections and citizens will be affected by coming events, Vance said "the sacrifice of brave men during the past three months is but a small portion of the sacrifices we may yet be called upon to witness."

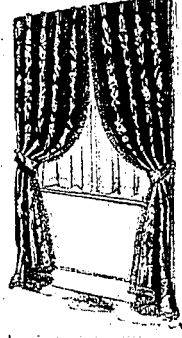

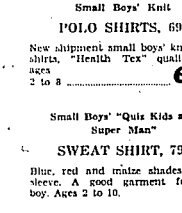
