

GAIN LOOMS IN BOMB PRODUCING

PITTSBURGH, March 21 (AP)—Increased production of explosive eggs for Uncle Sam's warbirds by use of a direct hookup of an act of the ancients with modern methods was predicted today by a Pittsburgh industrialist.

E. F. Harris, president of the National Tube company, where bombs are produced for the army and navy in what the workers call "bomb bay," disclosed the new method which he described as a "spinning" method, "revolutionary in character."

The new technique, Harris explained, has taken, "a leaf from the book of the ancients" and utilizes, "the modern machinery of the craft of the potter and his wheel."

Developed and perfected at National Tube's plants, the technique now can be utilized at other plants. Bomb production will be increased, Harris declared.

The process, a pre-heated steel tube, turned at a high rate of speed, is fashioned quickly and precisely into the new and main body of the bomb by a huge arm which swings into position and molds the reaction tube into the desired shape. Other machines, by the same method, shape the tail portion of the bomb body, Harris said, "with the ease of an old potter forming his whirling clay."

Bombs of all sizes are made by the new process. After they are given the "finishing treatment" the bombs have carrying legs welded, are normalized, threaded, painted and shipped to loading plants.

Buhl, Jerome Rap at 40-Hour Week, War Industry Strikes

Buhl and Jerome Chambers of Commerce were on record today with resolutions condemning the 40-hour week and strikes in war industries. The resolutions call for the immediate resumption of the 48-hour week and no increase in basic rate of pay over time and holiday work. (2) protesting such contractors against loss based on unavoidable increase in cost after contracts are let. (3) all out production, 24 hours a day, seven days a week. (4) freezing prices, including wages, immediately. and (5) absolute curtailment of spending for non-essential government activities.

"We want aggressive leadership and honesty," said O. A. Power, secretary. "We don't want palliatives. Emphatically we do not want the middle class or anything like it. Give us action. Let us know the truth, we can take it."

WAR DETRIMENT

Buhl, March 21—The Buhl resolution declares a 40-hour week in crucial industries is not in the best interest of our war effort, and asserts "the President has yielded and continues to yield to the demands of organized labor."

The Buhl chamber warns that "this is not the time to play politics or defer to powerful groups of voters."

The resolution recommends "that strikes in all war industries should be suspended and outlawed for duration of the war, and urges Idaho congressmen, 'to strive for legislation that will suspend all right to strike and that will make the workers cooperate with our war effort."

The west end businessmen urge "that no funds used for the war effort be used to pay fan dancers, coordinators of bowling, baby golf courses, ping pong and similar non-essential activities."

JEROME STAND

JEROME, March 21—Five condemnations and five resolutions are made in the resolution endorsed by the Jerome Chamber of Commerce.

It condemns (1) the 40-hour week in wartime; (2) excessive profits made on war contracts; (3) labor's insistence on a "closed shop"; (4) further expenditures of tax money for non-essential government activities; and (5) the continuance of political chicanery.

JEROME, March 21—Mr. and Mrs. George Ballew, Jerome, have been informed that their son, James Leitch Ballew, has been reported as missing following action in Java.

The telegram, informing his parents of the matter, was the first word they have received from him since he sent them a letter from Manila, Jan. 2.

James Ballew enlisted in the United States navy, Dec. 17, 1940. He later was assigned to a ship in the Pacific fleet. At the time he was reported as missing he was a second class seaman, assigned to gunner. He was 17 at the time of enlistment.

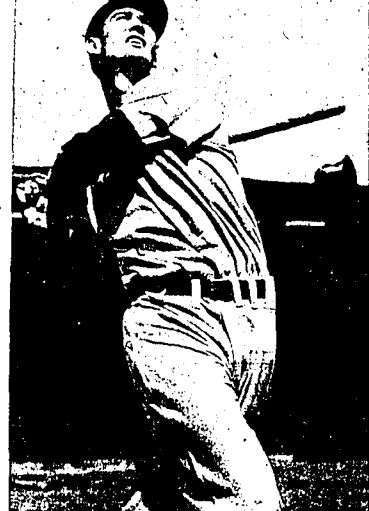

JEROME, March 21—A mobile farm labor camp, starting with approximately 75 family units, will be set up in Jerome. It was announced today following a session of county commissioners Friday evening, when the body allotted a six-acre piece of ground at the east end of the county fairgrounds for such a site.

The session which concluded late Friday evening in the court room, with the county commissioner, was attended by Chamber of Commerce members, heads of the various county organizations, officials of the beet growers' associations, war board, fair board officers, and other interested persons who desired such a camp for this agricultural community.

Starts in May

O. A. Power, secretary of the Jerome Chamber of Commerce, said that the camp will begin operation shortly after establishment in May starting with approximately 75 farm families. Later in the season progresses, the camp will probably house some 100 families.

The camp will be in operation until November, at the close of the harvesting season here.

Since early last fall the problem of farm help has been a source of worry in many agricultural families in this section, and the farm security administration came to the aid of the area by announcing that there were several mobile camps which would be set up in the Pacific area. If requirements, such as adequate housing, schools, etc., could be met, early last week W. T. Geurin, superintendent of the farm security mobile camp program, met here with various civic and business organizations and directed the city to designate the required space for such a camp.

Facilities Assured

It was explained that school facilities, as well as adequate housing, electricity and telephone service, together with a suitable tract of land made available before a site could be located in any particular section.

With assurance by the commissioners and other officials that such facilities exist here in Jerome, the camp was not difficult to obtain.

Twin Falls householders have joined so thoroughly in the waste-paper drive that dealers are flooded, it was announced last night by Scout Executive Gordon A. Day.

FBI SMASHES BIG LOTTERY OUTFIT

WASHINGTON, March 21 (AP)—Director J. Edgar Hoover of the federal bureau of investigation said today that leaders of the \$500,000 lottery ring smashed by his agents had escaped prosecution by state and local authorities because of their "considerable wealth and political influence."

Sixty members of the ring, including one woman, were arrested yesterday by FBI agents in simultaneous raids in 35 cities stretching from the Canadian border to Miami, Fla.

Hoover said that Louis Cohen of Miami, Fla., and his four brothers headed the ring. They and their chief associates, "because of their considerable wealth and influence have been able to remain in business despite numerous attempts by local law enforcement agencies to enforce local statutes barring lottery activities," Hoover said.

Records of the combine showed, he said, that their annual "take" had grown from \$2,000,000 in 1933 to \$10,000,000 last year.

The brothers, he said, organized a lottery business in Philadelphia, Pa., in 1925, and enlarged it by organizing new lotteries and purchasing rights from other operators. He said they covered their operations by moving their headquarters as often as twice a year.

Considerable critical war material was seized in raids on plants where the lottery tickets were printed. More than 60 tons of steel wire were in the plants' possession or on order and, in anticipation of shortages, members had obtained more than 500 tons of rubber and a two-year supply of paper.

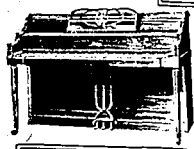

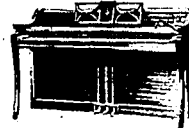
