

RUSSIANS BATTER AT GERMAN DEFENSES IN SPRING DRIVE

NAZIS BEAT OFF HEAVY ATTACKS

 Russian armies, pressing a relentless spring offensive amid the driving snows of winter, were reported battering heavily at German defenses in the East. Soviet tanks and heavy artillery were reported to have broken through German lines in several places, and the Russian high command claimed aerial successes and the destruction of 15 Soviet tanks between March 23 and March 30.

German field headquarters acknowledged severe Russian pressure in the Ukraine, on the central (Mogor) front and in the far north, but stated that Nazi dive-bombers had "frustrated" a tank-led Soviet attack in the critical battle around Lake Ilmen.

The high command described the dive-bombing assault as taking place "northwest of Lake Ilmen," presumably referring to the Staraya Russa sector where the German 16th army was trapped for weeks.

Soviet front-line dispatches said they were capturing, attacking and destroying Russian positions in the same region. A stiff German attack forced the Nazis to retreat and secured an important populated place.

A bulletin from Adolf Hitler's headquarters in Berlin said the Nazis again attacked the Soviet Army supply port of Murmansk, and claimed three British bombers were shot down "in an attempt to fly by night into occupied Norwegian territory."

Northern Battle
 Other dispatches indicated a Soviet offensive in the Baltic region. The United Nations far north supply route to Russia.

The British correspondent of the Swiss newspaper La Suisse said the German fleet and air force were making serious probes in Norway and Finland, and that a United States-British convoy had been able to continue its voyage to the west coast of Norway.

The increased protection of these convoys has immobilized a large number of German air units in Norway, and has necessitated the redeployment of the army in the region in Norway and the air force in Finland.

German high command said U-boats continued attacks against a convoy carrying supplies to the United States via the far north route, sinking to "heavily laden transports totaling 10,000 tons at the homecoming of the bay." A third ship was torpedoed in heavy seas as the approaches to the port of the British Isles.

DNB, the German news agency, declared earlier that four allied submarines had been sunk in the Baltic sea in the southern part of the Baltic sea—presumably en route to the United States.

Nazi admit losses.
 Today's Berlin communiqué acknowledged the loss of a submarine commanded by Lieut. Endrahe, who was reported to have been sunk.

"This outstanding U-boat commander together with his brave crew," the communiqué added, "were killed in action."

An Italian fighter dropped incendiary bombs on British troop encampments at Tobruk and destroyed 10 vehicles, and damaged more than 100 in a daring night raid on that British-held Libyan port, the Italian high command reported.

Exchange Telegraph reported in London that the British had lost more than 300,000 officers and men in eight months of war.

PHILIPPINES—A war department bulletin reported that Japanese planes attacked a base here in American-occupied Davao peninsula, inflicting a number of casualties. The hospital was plainly marked.

The communiqué said heavy aerial bombardment of Manila by forces, accompanied by fire from enemy shore batteries, continued day and night, causing little damage.

On Bataan, sharp patrol clashes were reported but they were of minor significance. The Japanese offensive against long-island of Luzon, Philippines.

INDIA—British negotiations to mobilize Indian troops for a fighting force on the side of the allies met serious new difficulties. The loss of one United Nations fighting planes in aerial combat, alone and sinking or damaging 47 enemy transports and 15 warships up to March 1.

The blows were inflicted in the battles of the Dutch East Indies and the Philippines.

United Nations aircraft fired bombs, damaged Japanese and reached runways of the airbase at Japanese-occupied Luz. New Guinean aircraft also bombed Japanese air base.

It announced that seven Japanese planes had dropped from 25 to 30 bombs on the airbase of the north Australian port, but said "no casualties or damage were reported."

The Dutch island of Sumatra came under attack on March 27 when 200 Netherlands East Indies troops led by a major general and a colonel were ordered. Domb news agency reported.

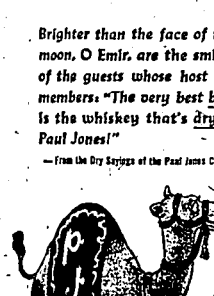
\$600 Price Given For Gooding Bull

Alphabetical list of 1,500 persons interned in Manila, mostly Americans, has been made available to the public by the American Red Cross through its association with the Red Cross.

It includes names from all parts of the United States. Printing of the list is impracticable because home addresses are not specified.

Since it is alphabetically arranged, however, any designated name can be found quickly.

The list is available at Times-News offices for anyone wishing to consult it.

 The name of C. L. Weinzheimer, son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Roy A. Read, Twin Falls pioneer now interned in Manila, was included by the Red Cross today as being interned in Manila.

The list word that Mr. and Mrs. Read received from the Coast Weinzheimer was a radiogram in January, the day before Manila fell. The radiogram read "Both families in Manila," and referred to the Coast Weinzheimer and his children, and the Walter Weinzheimer and their three children.

Mr. Read has been in communication with the Red Cross in California, the day before Manila fell. Information concerning the Weinzheimer family, formerly residents of a large plantation several miles from Manila.

RETAILERS WILL SCAN WAR SETUP

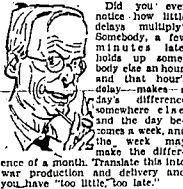
