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LAVAL CONFERS WITH GEN. PETAIN

VICHY, April 16 (AP)—Pierre Laval, newly returned to power from political exile, came back today from Paris and conferred for nearly an hour with Marshal Petain, presumably on the make-up of an altered French cabinet.

Reports resulting from the meeting were not made public until today.

Laval, once chief delegate to chief of state Petain, is strong advocate of cooperation with Hitler, arrived shortly before noon after having spent his time since Tuesday in the German-occupied former capital, where he had conferred with several of his fellow collaborators.

His large black limousine drove up before the government hotel and a silent crowd of 2000 Frenchmen who had gathered throughout the morning.

Without halting or turning his head, the short, swarthy Laval entered the building accompanied by Fernand de Brion, French representative in Paris.

Both were escorted immediately with Petain. They left little less than an hour later.

Here's a Test to Determine How Much You Aid War Effort

PALO ALTO, Calif., April 16 (AP)—How close are you coming to a personal all-out effort to help the war program?

A test designed to enable civilians to rate themselves in this respect was made by three Stanford University faculty members and made public today. Here it is.

First, take a look at Mr. Hypocrite, all-out.

He spends around five per cent of his income for war bonds and stamps, always cleans his plate, eating no food, never drives faster than 40. He is an air raid warden, and has some volunteer defense job, writes regularly to a man in the armed forces abroad, administers others not to repeat rumors, or military information, tries to keep full with hikes or other exercises. He never hears about work stoppages, he digs into his own job a little harder. He contributed to the USO last month and this month. The Red Cross is on his list.

Now the test questions rate your idea of how well you are:

1. Avoiding waste of all kind, in the kitchen, factory, on the highway, everywhere.
2. Buying war bonds and stamps with every penny you can spare.
3. Taking part in civilian defense. Red Cross other voluntary work.
4. Serving in advance, guarding your self and information and suppressing and refusing to pass on wild rumors.
5. Extending assistance and hospitality to our armed forces at home, cheering our fighters on the home.



OOD REORGANIZED WITH ARMY, NAVY

WASHINGTON, April 16 (UP)—President Roosevelt today reorganized the office of civilian defense in a manner that will give the army and navy an active voice in the operation of the civilian defense program.

Under the new setup, James M. Landis continues as OGD director. But Mr. Roosevelt created within OGD a "civilian defense board" headed by the director, who shall serve as chairman; the secretary of war, the attorney general, the secretary of the navy, the director of the office of defense health and welfare services, and such other members as the President may designate.

The reorganization, according to a White House statement, was designed to integrate OGD activities more closely with those of the war agencies and to gear its program to the war effort.

Under FBI supervision Landis, under the reorganization order, will perform his duties "under the direction and supervision of the President."

Other board members designated by the President were Major Maurice J. Quinn of the War Relocation Authority, executive director of the American Municipal Association; Nathan Reed, chief of the Federal Bureau of Investigation; Major H. Davis, and Gov. Harold D. Stinson of Minnesota, now on duty in the navy as a lieutenant commander.

New Functions The White House said the new operating functions of the agency are two-fold: 1. To work out plans and programs for the protection of life and property against war hazards, such as floods, including the operation of state and local authorities in the recruiting and training of civilian auxiliaries.

2. To mobilize a maximum civilian effort in the prosecution of the war by making the civilian population cooperate with state and local authorities of volunteers to assist in carrying forward the total program.

RATIONERS MUST STICK TO QUOTAS

Twin Falls county ration board must not exceed its applicable quota for the entire month—and is restricted by the weekly quota limitations applicable to the granting of certificates for rereading or recapping tires or rereading or recapping services—and Chairman Carl Anderson today.

He said the board may grant rereading or recapping certificates to passenger cars eligible under list A only if the board has exhausted its entire monthly quota of new tires for such vehicles. Exhaustion of a weekly sub-quota only does not allow the board to grant rereading or recapping certificates.

The board may grant rereading or recapping certificates to list A trucks at any time during the month, he said.
