MAZED BATTLE IN SEVASTOPOL ENTERS 6TH DAY

By The Associated Press. Adolf Hitler's field headquarters asserted today that German troops had stormed into Sevastopol, but Soviet strongholds in the Crimea, while the Russians said they had held the battle with 2,500 men dead in yesterday's fighting alone.

Today marked the sixth day of furious assault by German forces which have bagged the great Black sea naval base for more than seven months.

Bomb Some Points. In the air, Moscow experts added, German planes have broken through Soviet defenses at some points to bomb Sevastopol.

On the Volkhov front, northeast of Lake Tzipen, it said that "concentric" attacks were being made on a line bridged over the river and the German line was being pushed back to the east.

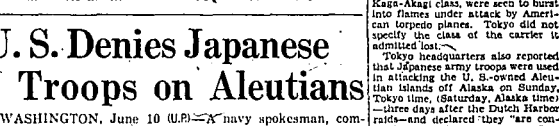

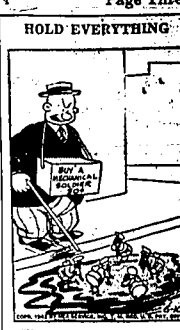

Briefly, if the county buys \$300,000 worth of war bonds between June 1 and July 31, the United States army air corps will officially dedicate and name one of its new long range bombers after the county.

Not only is this a sporting proposition in every way, but it gives us added incentive—that of meeting our monthly quotas in the purchase of war bonds and stamps.

Twin Falls county—and all other counties in Magic Valley for that matter—has set its sights on Idaho in the purchase of these war time securities. During May, these counties exceeded their quotas by \$120,875!

But that is no reason for us to rest on our laurels in our all-out support of the war effort. Our quotas for June have not been met. And unless we purchase war bonds even more liberally than we have in the past, we may fall short of our allotted goals.

SUB SINKS SHIP OFF WEST COAST

A WEST COAST PORT, June 10 (AP)—The sinking of an American merchant ship brought the war close to the west coast of the United States again today after a three-month lull in submarine activity.

Fifty-three survivors of the ship landed here yesterday. They revealed the vessel was torpedoed by an enemy submarine, presumed to be Japanese, at 2:20 p. m. Sunday, six months to the day after the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor.

The vessel was the second sunk off the west coast since the outbreak of war. Ten ships were attacked off the California coast between Dec. 18 and Dec. 24, but only the steamer *Minnicello* was sunk. No submarine activity has been announced off the west coast since March when a tanker was shelled four days after a submarine lobbed shells at an oil refinery at Ocala, Calif.

The sinking was disclosed after rumors swept the west coast that one or more American naval vessels had been sunk off the coast while American and Japanese naval units were battling near Alaska and Midway Island.

CHINESE LAUNCH COUNTER-ATTACK

CHUNGKING, June 10 (AP)—Chinese guerrillas and regulars have launched a strong counter-attack near Nanchang, provincial capital of Kiangsu, and in central Anhwei province to offset the mounting pressure of twin Japanese drives along the vital Chungking-Hangchow railway, military dispatches reported today.

The official central news agency said the Chinese had recaptured strategic points near Wenhochung, 12 miles west of Nanchang, and were pressing forward in a drive aimed at the provincial capital.

Observers here believed this drive, directed at Nanchang from the west, might divert a substantial force of Japanese troops now concentrating on seizing the 150-mile stretch of the Nanchang-Hangchow railway still in Chinese hands.

Along the railway in western Chekiang, the key city of Chuhsien (Chushan) was in danger of siege. There were no new reports from the beleaguered air and rail base only 70 miles west of Japan, but it was believed the Chinese garrison still was holding out behind the city's walled defenses.

Central said a Chinese drive in central Anhwei province, northeast of Kiangsu, was in developing. The Chinese were said to have captured the town of Hsien east of Hsien on Sunday. Another Chinese column, central said, was only 10 miles northwest of Hsien, a strategic Japanese rail supply and communications base.

Announces Action

Sen. Homer T. Bone, D., Wash., to quote the rumors, released a statement at Washington, D. C., announcing that a freighter was sunk Sunday night and that the action "did not involve any of our naval units."

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JAPS FINALLY ADMIT BATTLE IN PACIFIC; CLAIM SUCCESS

REPORT 2 U. S. CARRIERS SUNK

A full week after its attack on Dutch Harbor and six days after its attack on Midway Island, Japan has admitted the loss of two United States carriers, heavy damage to a second carrier, damage to one cruiser and the loss of 35 planes.

It is reported that the United States had lost two aircraft carriers, one of the enterprise and Hornet. Hornet was sunk and the destruction of 120 United States planes at Midway and 4 at Dutch Harbor.

The communiqué asserted that the Japanese in a joint navy and army action destroyed numerous American positions in the Aleutian Islands, including Dutch Harbor, the chief base, and said that operations continued.

General reports claimed that the Japanese had "occupied" points in the Aleutians, but the text of the communiqué said:

Not until the imperial headquarters communiqué was so belatedly issued did any news agency so much as admit that a great battle had been fought in the Midway zone, and it was evident that they were attempting a "propaganda" build-up which would cushion the bad news for their people.

As part of the build-up, Berlin broadcast a message from Shanghai, which stated that the Japanese had "occupied" points in the Aleutians, but the text of the communiqué said:

A few hours before Tokyo issued its belated communiqué Berlin got so far as to say that rumors that a battle "was being fought" may be accorded a certain probability.

The Berlin broadcast, remarkable in its evasions and deliberate falsifications, tried to make it appear that a battle was developing in which Japan had thrown 50 per cent of its entire fleet—with the loss in doubt.

The broadcast, in which a German official news agency dispatch from Stockholm was cited, said:

According to London reports in the (Stockholm) newspaper Socialdemokraten both Japanese and United States forces have been reinforced considerably. Also that Japan has now 50 per cent of its entire fleet thrown into the battle.

ALLIES BEAT OFF AXIS IN AFRICA

CAIRO, Egypt, June 10 (AP)—British headquarters announced today that they have beaten off an Axis attack on the British Libyan line, and have driven it back.

British armored and motorized forces assailed the Free French partition of the French in the region of the Mareth line, which was used as an increased number of tanks and dive-bombers, an all-out infantry and artillery, and a "Car mobile column," it reported.

In the cauldron area—where the desert army of Marshal Erwin Rommel rolled back British detachments west of Knightbridge—gunners of tanks and armored cars were reported to have engaged Axis armored forces in long range duels.
