HOUSE TO STUDY LIMIT ON INCOME

WASHINGTON, June 16 (AP)—The house today and means committee today renewed consideration of President Roosevelt's proposal to limit individual income to \$25,000 a year after taxes, now modified to make the family income ceiling \$50,000.

The modification was presented to the committee in a detailed treasury recommendation for a war "supertax" which would confiscate all of a single person's net income in excess of \$25,000 and all net family income after \$50,000.

In addition to the \$25,000 and \$50,000 personal supertax exemptions, the treasury proposal would allow these deductions from the income ceiling:

1. Charitable contributions in the amount of 15 per cent of income remaining after federal and state taxes are paid.
 2. Debt liquidation of 15 per cent of this net income.
 3. The taxes now being paid on 1941 income.
- If the taxpayer is not in debt he could apply his 15 per cent debt liquidation allowance to payment of insurance premiums or purchase of government securities, such as war bonds. Only current income taxes would be deductible. After this, the treasury said, the taxpayer would be on warning to lay away the money to meet his obligations to the government.

Subject to Supertax

All income, including that from federal securities issued before 1941 and from state and municipal securities, which is now exempt from ordinary Federal income taxes, would be subject to the supertax. Meanwhile, Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau, Jr., by implication withdrew from his campaign to push the new tax bill up to the administration's figure of \$8,000,000,000 without adoption of a sales tax.

The treasury is still opposed to a sales tax, he told a press conference, but was not "excluding" because the committee's bill is still \$2,000,000,000 short of the administration goal.

The treasury only makes recommendations, Morgenthau said.

6 SINKINGS BRING LOSSES TO 271

By The Associated Press

SIX newly announced ship sinkings in the submarine-dotted western Atlantic put the war total of destroyed allied and neutral vessels in that area at 271 today while the navy counted the fate of an American freighter missing four months.

Navy and other reports of the recent sinkings said that the ever-active U-boats had picked off two American merchantmen in the Gulf waters, a large Panamanian cargo vessel in the Gulf of Mexico, a Norwegian tanker off South America, an unidentified ship in the Atlantic and a British schooner off the British Isles.

Naval and shipping circles were discussing the disappearance without a trace of the New Orleans freighter Miraflores of the Standard Fruit and Steamship company, last sighted Feb. 15.

Neither the ship nor its crew has been reported since last seen off the Haitian coast, the navy revealed yesterday. The Miraflores, a vessel of 2,158 gross tons, sailed from New Orleans Feb. 6 with a crew of 34 on a routine voyage to Haiti, and departed from Haiti for New York Feb. 14.

The mystery of its disappearance was deepened by the fact that at that time the anti-submarine campaign had not been extended into the waters for which the Miraflores was sailing.

NATION'S SCRAP PILE INCREASES

WASHINGTON, June 16 (AP)—America's scrap rubber pile mounted steadily today as deflated beach ball-like, discarded tires and punctured football bladders dropped in size by as uncounted thousands of tons.

Specific reports indicated the total that might be collected in the full two weeks of the President's drive were lacking, but the general comment across the country on the second day of the campaign was that it was off to a good start.

Undersecretary of War Patterson gave it an official push with a statement that the army itself was cutting its use of rubber in clothing and equipment by 25 per cent. Army tires will have 12 per cent less rubber; tanks will be made with one-third the rubber formerly used; army vehicles will carry only one spare tire and soldiers will wear oil-treated instead of rubber raincoats.

Patterson warned that rubber for civilian use would not be available until 1943 at least.

One thing that slowed the collection in many points was the lack of scales in filling stations to weigh the rubber citizens offered. However, filling station operators reported that in many cases this reduced to accept the stipulated penny a pound.

ITALY BOASTS OF ALLIED SINKINGS

ROME (from Italian broadcast) June 16 (AP)—The Italian high command announced today the loss of a heavy Italian cruiser, destruction of an allied cruiser and two destroyers, the sinking or setting afire of five other allied vessels, and damage to 12 more allied ships in a series of heavy naval and air battles in the central Mediterranean on Monday.

(There was no confirmation of the Italian report from any other source. The Italian communique indicated that at least some of the list of allied losses were in addition to the announcement yesterday that seven allied ships were sunk, al-

though it was not clear on this point.)

The fighting centered around two large British convoys, one east-bound, the other west-bound. Without explaining whether it referred to the sea fights, the communique said also that the British had lost 27 planes in operations in the western Mediterranean on Sunday and another 17 yesterday, with four Italian planes missing.

It added that a Russian submarine had been sunk in the Black sea by Italian motor torpedo boats.

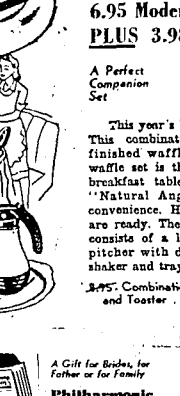

NUCLEAR PLAN BELIEVED TAKING SHAPE IN EAST

NAZIS' FOES MAY HIT FROM 2 SIDES

BY KIRK R. SIMPSON
A new world war analyst on the heels of a disclosure that American 10th Air Force bombing planes are being sent to the Mediterranean war theater reports that the Mediterranean convoys have been spotted and bombed while moving eastward in that sea.

Whether these reports create an impression that some sort of a nuclear operation fraught with second-front possibilities might be slung up against the axis in the east as well as the west.

Forced landing of some of the American planes in Libya for internment revealed their presence. Nothing is known as to their actual mission, but the planes they operated or the size of the force from any British-held area in the eastern Mediterranean.

Size of Convoys Impressive
So far British convoys alleged to have been intercepted and badly knocked about in the Mediterranean western area are the impressive aspect of the Italian reports in the latest size and composition of the naval escort. Damage to British battleships and plane carriers as well as cruisers and destroyers, strongly flanked by warships, were said to have been spotted moving eastward through relatively narrow and dangerous waters somewhere in the triangle formed by Sardinia, Sicily and French Tunisia.

Only a major movement would seem to justify naval protection of that character. Just why heavy convoys of British troops or supplies should be transmitted in those waters is difficult to see in any case. The Italian fleet is said to have been spotted on the east side of the Mediterranean westline between Sardinia and Sicily, instead of off the African coast.

Route Not Logical
The situation which has been sufficiently dominated by axis air power to be used to ferry reinforcements to Libya for Germany's new offensive, would not seem to be the logical route for bolstering imperial forces in eastern Libya. It seems hardly possible that as huge a sea movement as Rome indicates could have been expected to slip through undetected.

There is no doubt, however, that a furious sea-air battle of some sort has been fought in Italian waters, so to speak. Rome admits the loss of 21 mines, while claiming 15 British aircraft downed, seven British naval and supply ships sunk and many other vessels badly damaged.

There is at least a suggestion of a British attempt to seize a shore base somewhere in Italy or Tunisia to land forces in western Libya in rear of Rommel's fully exposed axis armies trying to break through to Tobruk, hundreds of miles to the east. Success in either case would virtually cut Rommel off from his supply lines since the British navy and air force controls the eastern Mediterranean.

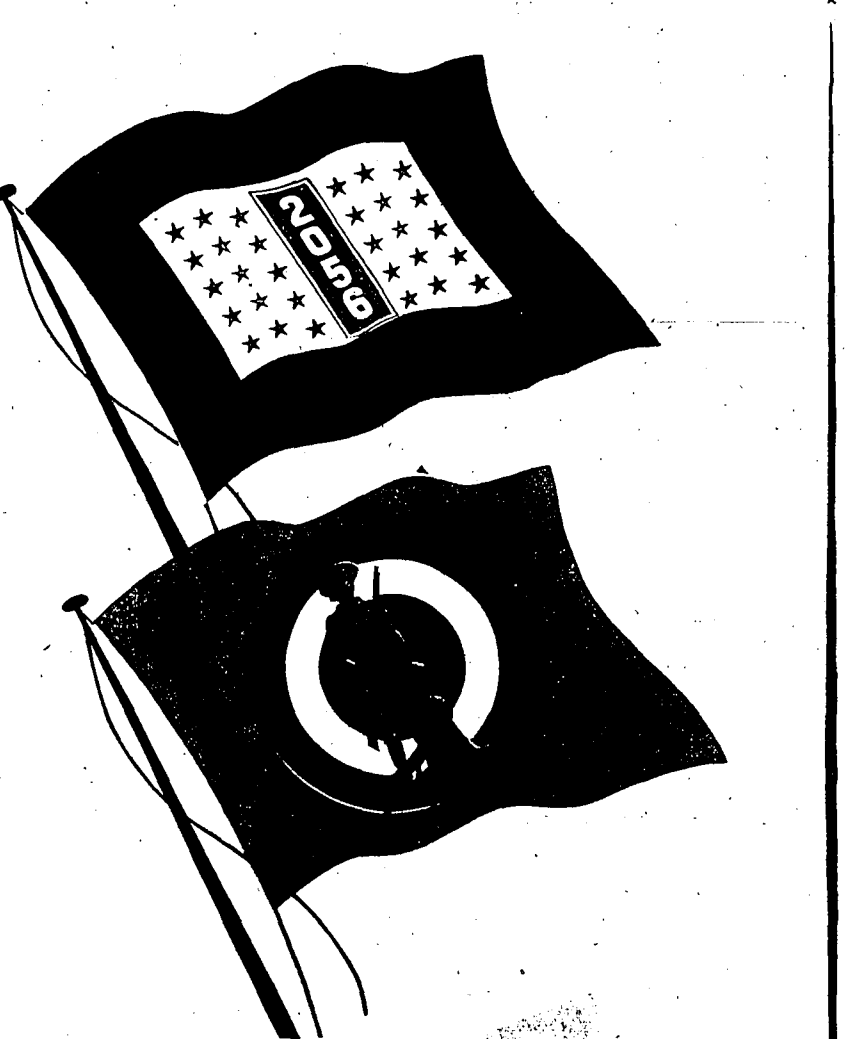
