FAIL OF TOBRUK BRINGS VENGEANCE

Wide World War Analyst
Major General Rommel's failure at Tobruk, and the precarious position of Hitler's great naval base of Benghazi, are furthering German assault operations vitally linked with Hitler's attempt to break into the Caucasus and Middle East, bringing us appreciably nearer the moment when the final blow will unleash his full power and rage for Europe.

Our immediate concern is with the Middle East. The British now are back on Egyptian soil, preparing to defend their mighty base at Alexandria, the block road to the Suez canal. Obviously the position is serious.

London Angry
The London press, surprised and angered at this defeat, demands that there have been a blunder. That's a legitimate question, but pending further information we are entitled to say more than that Rommel again has demonstrated that he is a master strategist and is perhaps even greater a tactician on the actual battlefield.

Still, while the British certainly must inquire into the circumstances of the defeat, the problem now is to defend Egypt and the canal, for the British are held at a cost which they don't know how much the British have suffered the loss of completely new armor which was operating in Libya, though a considerable force withdrew to the border, and the rest, there are the Egyptian army of 40,000 well-trained men and 100,000 reservists.

As far as concerns land forces, it's doubtful whether Rommel could afford to attempt a direct assault on the defense appears to have, although he is superior in tanks. However, it seems to me that the battle for Egypt is likely to turn on air power, in which case the British would have a decided advantage.

May Cut Loose
This may be the time when Hitler will cut loose the forces which he has been accumulating for so many months. The message contained "a renewed expression of our admiration for the magnificent feats of your armed forces, guerrilla bands and saboteurs, and the conviction that 'those achievements will be equalled and surpassed in months'."

EGYPT ANNIHILATED BY FALL OF TOBRUK.

25,000 CAPTURED BY AXIS SMASH

CAIRO, June 22 (AP)—Egypt and the whole of the Middle East were menaced today by the capitulation of Tobruk under a smashing Axis attack which has inflicted incalculable damage to Lt. Gen. Neil M. Ritchie's weary eighth army, which has been driven to the Egyptian border. The British garrison of the bloody Libyan campaign worked feverishly to strengthen the Egyptian border, military quarters conceded the probably truth of axis claims that the British garrison of Tobruk had been captured by the combined German-Italian forces which completed occupation of Tobruk yesterday.

No Denial
There was no denial either of official reports from Berlin that German troops had captured the town of Tobruk to capture El Gobi, a desert tract extending 40 miles to the southeast, and the port of El Gobi, only eight miles from the Egyptian border.

A fifth communique reported that an axis column was moving toward Port Capuzzo, which is just 100 miles from the Libyan coast. The force was contacted yesterday near Sid Aziz, 12 miles northward from Port Capuzzo, by mobile British forces operating in front of the Egyptian border defense line, the communique said.

While some British forces were still operating west of the Egyptian border, it is believed that the British forces were presumed to be in axis hands. It was expected that Field Marshal Erwin Rommel would attempt to capitalize on his successes by striking a blow for Egypt in the desert before they could be regrouped.

Loss Tank Strength
Military strategists were vague as to the factors counting for the fall of Tobruk. It appeared the British had lost 20,000 tanks and 25,000 men, their armored strength in the savage desert fighting which preceded the fall of Tobruk.

Dispatches from the front gave no indication of any attempt to remove the Tobruk garrison by sea during the furious 24-hour battle that ended in its fall.

It seemed probable that in addition to large numbers of prisoners, most of the equipment which the British conveyed to Tobruk only a few days ago at great cost had been captured by the Axis.

While the portion of Ritchie's forces which escaped this debacle were added to the British units along the Egyptian frontier, there was no disposition to minimize the importance of the situation.

The fall of Tobruk, which the British had held since Jan. 27, 1941, and which had withstood a seven-month siege last year, gives Rommel an important supply port close to the Egyptian frontier and thereby vastly improves his chances for a successful advance toward Suez.
