

Defenders of Sevastopol Wipe out German Wedge; Women, Children Leave

By HENRY SHAPIRO MOSCOW, June 22 (AP) — Many women and children of Sevastopol have been evacuated from the besieged Crimean fortress whose defenders, sworn to fight to the last drop of blood, have wiped out a German wedge pointed at the heart of the city, the newspaper Pravda announced today.

The Long and Short of It



While the battle for the Crimean stronghold rages on the southern front, the German army approaches the Crimea from the north, in an effort to hold open a narrow gateway to the Caucasus. Hurried back in repeated attempts to storm across the Dnieper estuary, the Germans were repulsed by fresh mechanized and infantry forces and unleashed a smashing attack after intense aerial bombing of the red army's positions.

VICHY PREPARES ANTI-BOLSHEVIK LEGION FOR DUTY

VICHY, June 22 (AP) — The Vichy press announced today the transformation of the "non-Soviet" French expeditionary force into a legion for "service everywhere" following the capture of the city of Marseilles. The legion will be called the "Triboulet" legion instead of the Legion of Volunteers Against Bolshevism, and will have government recognition. They will consist of "Francophone units which may be sent everywhere where French interest are involved," it was announced.

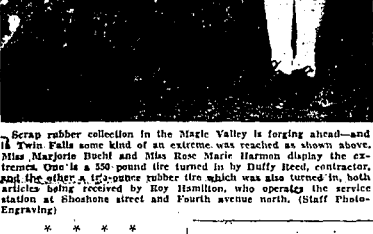

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# HARRY HOPKINS PROMISES MASS BOMBING OF GERMANY

## REDS IN DANGER, AMERICANS TOLD

**By Lyle C. Wilson**  
Unless there is a correspondent in Washington, the Joint Russian-Churchill statement, buttressed by Harry L. Hopkins' words, has detailed how the Russian army is in danger of being annihilated. The statement in Great Britain soon would bomb Germany in force.

Hopkins spoke last night at a New York mass meeting commemorating the Soviet union's entry into the war. He warned that "Russia and the Russian army are in danger" and was confident that ultimately they would drive the Germans from the soil.

He promised a second front, and a third and fourth if necessary, to junk the axis but said that for us "dark days are ahead."

## NAVY CONQUERING ATLANTIC CRAFT

## SURVIVORS TELL 'SUB-PACK' TALE

Survivors reaching an east coast port today told how a pack of three submarine hunters fired two torpedoes into their freight and passenger vessel on June 15, sinking the 75-ton ship off the New England coast with a probable loss of 83 lives.

Eighty-one crew members and passengers said that many persons undoubtedly were trapped below decks when the first torpedo struck the vessel amidships. The medium-sized American vessel rolled heavily to port after the first explosion.

A second torpedo launched a few minutes later struck the ship's stern, listing heavily—high in the forecastle, Arthur E. Buck, 41, operator pilot of New York City.

Rescue craft picked up the survivors three hours after the sinking of the ship. 23 out of 41 were saved, but only one member of the crew was lost.
