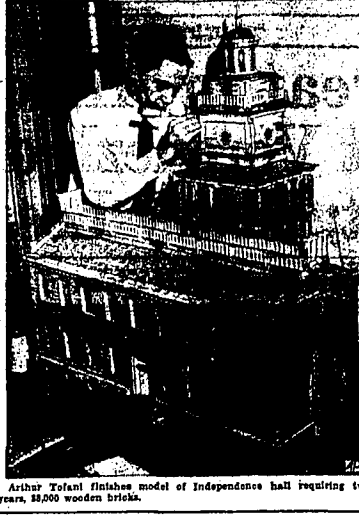


GERRILLA WARFARE SPREADS THROUGH OCCUPIED FRANCE

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"NEW WORLD" IS CALLED U.S. GOAL

CHARLOTTEVILLE, Va., July 7 (AP)—What Americans want is not for lend-lease aid to their allies. American Secretary of State Dean Acheson said here last night is not gold or weapons or other things that are needed in the world in which men can "live fully and in peace."

Speaking before the institute of public affairs at the University of Virginia, Acheson recalled the failure of international settlements after the last war and emphasized the determination of the United States government to avoid similar economic mistakes after this one.

U. S. to Give Most "The American life in this war no doubt will be greater than the aid they receive, he conceded, because American resources are greater and the drain upon them less. "I don't see how it can be otherwise," he added.

Do you wish to set on one side the value of a tank, its guns and ammunition, and on the other side an appraisal of those who died in it under a desert sun? What is the value of a bomber that flies over Russia and those figures in the snow before Leningrad and Moscow?

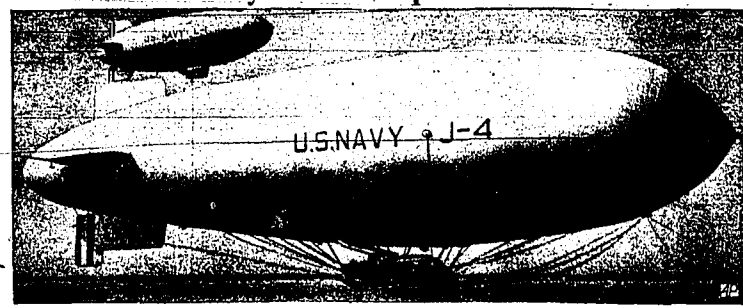
Americans do not want that sort of accounting, he said, or even to think about it very much. "What Americans want is for the world to be a better place than it is now."

What is it, then, that Americans want is for the world to be a better place than it is now. "If you ask yourselves and your neighbors," Acheson said, "the answer will not be money, or to get back the guns you have sent abroad, or to get back, except in the course of trade, the answer will be that you want a chance to live fully and in peace."

CHINA PROMISED U. S. AID IN WAR

WASHINGTON, July 7 (AP)—Secretary of War Henry Stimson and Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox, in the first joint order of the day of this war, today promised China that American armed forces would fight until the Japanese are expelled from every foot of Chinese soil.

The order, addressed to the armed forces, said: "Five years ago today the Imperial Japanese government launched a brutal and unprovoked attack on the people of China."

Lacking adequate arms and other equipment, the soldiers of China have nevertheless continued their gallant resistance for five years. Today they are fighting with tenacity and a courage that are an inspiration for all defenders of democracy on every foot of Chinese soil.

U. S. Salutes China "Today the members of the army and navy of the United States again salute the gallant Chinese soldiers in China and join with them in the firm determination to expel the aggressor from every foot of Chinese soil."

An order of the day, the war department explained, which cannot be placed conveniently in the columns of operations or routine orders.

Hull, FRN Pledge Aid The House-Senators order followed a message from President Roosevelt to Chinese Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek promising that the United Nations would fight "with China until peace, justice and freedom are established throughout the world, and a message from Secretary of State Cordell Hull asserting that the United States will continue to aid China in its military operations."

Mr. Roosevelt's message was sent yesterday, the anniversary of the Marco Polo bridge incident near Peking which touched off the present Sino-Japanese war.

Daily Mail Asks Secret for New Anti-Air Device

LONDON, July 7 (AP)—The Daily Mail changed its usual course last night and asked the war office not to allow it to print a story on a new, powerful anti-aircraft device which is scheduled to be introduced Wednesday.

The newspaper explained its position in a front page article addressed to the war office which had announced that details of the new apparatus would be made public.

"In the interests of national safety," the Mail requested that the military publicity agents "change their minds at this 11th hour."

The whole affair has been "a hoax," the Mail declared, "that the British and American scientific experts were sent to tropical island to work on it but it will remain secret only a few hours more."

334,293 Tons of Rubber Gathered WASHINGTON, July 7 (AP)—Scraper rubber collectors totaled 334,293 tons up to July 3, President Roosevelt said today.

The report was submitted by William R. Boyd, Jr., chairman of the petroleum industry war council. A week ago when the total collections had amounted to only 218,700 tons, Mr. Roosevelt called the results disappointing and ordered it continued for 10 days. It will close Friday.

Worn-out Part Needed to Get Car Repairing WASHINGTON, July 7 (AP)—Motorists will be required after July 15 to turn in a worn-out auto part before accepting a new part, the war production board has ruled.

The provision was part of an order imposing new blanket restrictions on the manufacture of spare parts for all types of automotive equipment, covering the last half of the year, and affecting 400 makers of replacement parts.

The new terms in requirement is intended to add to the national stockpile a quantity of scrap metals almost equal to the amount consumed in 1941 parts production, WPA explained.

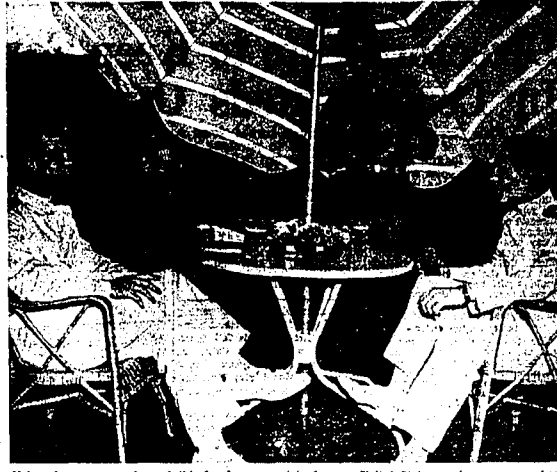
Mrs. Alice Scott, Greens Park, whose home was the greatest distance away and circle guest yesterday, was elected new president.

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HITLER DRAFTING JEWS IN SERVICE

By RICHARD D. McHILLAN
(Copyright, 1942, by United Press)

WITH THE BRITISH ARTILLERY, Lt. Alonzo Lane, Egypt, July 6.—As a U.S. Army German prisoner, aged 30 and 31, told me today that they just had been conscripted so I asked them why the Germans had waited so long to call them.

"We are Jews," one of them said. "They have just begun conscripting Jews in Germany."

For 48 hours now the British and German guns have fired day and night in a ceaseless artillery duel.

The Germans have brought up heavy pieces which are concentrating on British dug-in positions.

SHIFT WITH GUNS
The British 30-mile front is stiff with guns, in the words of a headquarters officer, and for days I have been watching more guns being rolled into the lines at racing speed to reinforce our batteries.

A German told me that he had never fired so many shells in his life, though he had fought in France and Italy, and a German prisoner said: "It has been hell, day and night."

The thunder of the guns fills the desert air in a crashing symphony. At night the bursts light up the sky and mingle with the flashes of signal rockets and explosions of the bombs dropped by the British planes.

It is still a complete mystery why the German air force is so weak in the desert, in view of the only planes we see are those of the royal air force, German planes seen.

It may be that the Germans have lost so many planes over Malta and earlier planes were destroyed by the combined British and United States air forces.

If the British could get a few hundred more bombers and fighters from India or elsewhere immediately they could smash the German lines in this battle for the Nile.

The enemy is using a type of tracked wheel-and-tractor type machine gun. It resembles the British Vickers but is much more powerful. It is added evidence of the variety of weapons the Nazis supply their front-line men in contrast to the narrow range of types of fighting tools the British get.

"GRAIN" RUBBER PROGRAM URGED

WASHINGTON, July 7 (AP)—Contending that months could be saved, Senator Gillette, D. Ia., proposed today that the government cancel some of its plans to produce synthetic rubber from petroleum and build new facilities for production from grain.

Gillette made this suggestion after hearing testimony by Chairman Donald M. Nelson of the War Production Administration that the need for copper and other vital materials precluded the construction of new grain alcohol plants at this time.

Gillette said he believes that if the condition existed, there was no other reason why the government should shift its emphasis away from the petroleum process to what he said was the more simplified process of producing synthetic rubber by adrene from grain alcohol.

"These grain alcohol plants can be built with one-tenth of the critical materials and in from one-third to one-fourth of the time it takes to construct a petroleum-process plant," he declared.

"If we could get some of these grain alcohol plants built, I believe we could save months of time in the production of synthetic rubber and possibly increase the total amount obtained so that there would be some for civilian uses within a year or two."

Of a total potential annual production of 1,000,000 tons of synthetic rubber, approximately 200,000 tons has been allocated by the War Production Administration to the grain alcohol process.

President Roosevelt was informed meanwhile that the program had been approved and he issued a proclamation which ends Friday had yielded 32,250 tons up to the report was delivered by William H. Boyd, Jr., chairman of the petroleum industry war council.

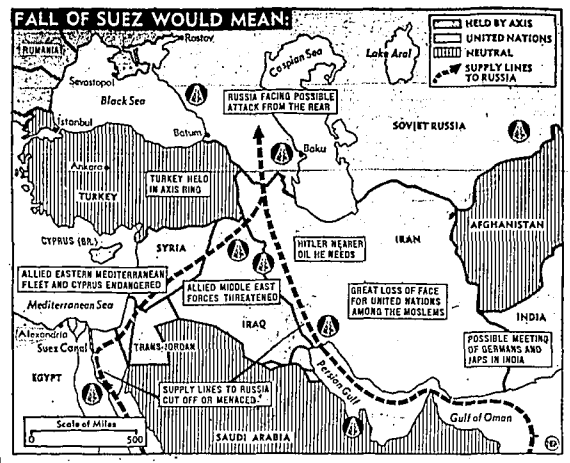

Speaking for the Chinese government, Major General Chu Shih-ting, military attaché, declared the United States and China could knock out the Japanese this year, if all American power were concentrated in the Pacific.

MUSSOLINI WANTS GUERRILLA CHIEF

LONDON, July 7 (AP)—One of the most important divisions in searching Montenegro's air and mountains for the Chetnik leader, General Mihailovic, has been reported to have killed more than 2,000 Italians and captured several hundred officers, private and officers.

It was reported that Italian military units had offered \$100,000 reward for Dusa's capture and that an entire Italian punitive expedition had been offered \$100,000 for his capture.

Two Rupert Men Held in Shanghai

RUPERT, July 7 (AP)—Two Rupert men are now prisoners of the Japs at Shanghai, China, according to word received here.

Through the Red Cross, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Mason, parents of Merle Mason, a Red Cross volunteer employed by Morrison-Knudsen in defense work on Wake Island and who was held by the Japs when the island was attacked by Japanese. This is the first word received of him since he was captured.

Gun Jammed—Barrel Yields Nippon Bullet

MELBOURNE, July 7 (Australian broadcast received by UP in San Francisco)—An Australian correspondent tells it, and awards it's been authenticated.

Guo, Walter M. Frick of the U.S. military corps was firing from the rear turret of a B-25 bomber when his gun jammed. Nothing he could do would make it fire.

Later the gun was dismantled and a small caliber Japanese bullet found inside the barrel. There was no damage among the crew, so the entire barrel was sent in for proof.

NAZIS CLAIM U.S. WAR CRAFT SUNK

BERLIN (From German Broadcasts), July 7 (AP)—The Germans today claimed the sinking of an American heavy cruiser and 28 merchantmen out of a convoy in Arctic waters between Spitzbergen and the Norwegian north cape.

(There was no confirmation of the German claim from any other source. In the last previous big Arctic convoy battle the Germans said they sunk 18 allied ships, when actually six were sunk.)

A special announcement from Hitler's headquarters today said the convoy consisted of 38 merchant ship carrying planes, tanks, ammunition and food supplies bound for Archangel with a heavy escort of allied warships.

Boy's Eye Hurt By Firecracker

JEROME, July 7—Eddie Spoffard, eight-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. N. A. Spoffard, Jerome, suffered an injury to his right eye when a firecracker exploded in the child's face as he was playing with a group of other children.

Eddie is receiving medical treatment and it is not yet determined whether he will lose the sight of the eye. The cracker" burst two pieces on the eyelid just above the pupil.

FURY OF HITLER ATTACK SERIOUS

The weight and fierceness of Hitler's summer offensive against the Russians in the Kursk-Khar'kov sector give us blunt warning of the dangers which the allies must expect to encounter during the next few crucial months.

If, of course, a matter of grave concern that the Nazis have bludgeoned their way 120 miles eastward to the Don river, and are looking toward the Caucasus. But this great advance, which carries the invaders 50 miles deeper into Soviet territory than they got in their all-out drive last year, should cause Hitler surprise, not despair.

SOCIAL SECURITY NOT FOR FARMER

SAN FRANCISCO, July 7 (AP)—Employees defend farm work employees whether or not their employer is the owner or tenant of the land, and the employer cannot be forced to pay federal social security taxes, the U. S. circuit court of appeals ruled yesterday.

Under rulings which represented a legal first for the federal collector of internal revenue and the state of California, that had intervened as a friend of the court on the side of the government, Jack S. Kline, Fresno, will receive a tax refund of \$2,188.
