British Squeeze Rommel Forces; Aim at Supplies

CAIRO, July 10 (AP)—British mobile columns southwest of El Alamein squeezed Field Marshal Erwin Rommel's right flank back toward the sea today while United States bombers and British submarines sought to cut his Mediterranean supply line.

A British broadcast quoted reports from Ankara that the Germans were moving reinforcements to north Africa from the Balkans, pulling German troops from Yugoslavia and even Crete in an effort to restore Rommel's striking power.

The change in Rommel's line eliminated a sharp angle where the German front turned back to the west. Now the line forms an arc extending from the coast westward to the desert some 30 miles south of El Daba.

British planes apparently were a continuation of the tactics which had hit the German front lines, but they were kept on the defensive and thereby postponed a showdown in the desert.

British bombers and fighter bombers, meanwhile, were reported blasting the sea landing grounds and communication and were credited with destroying more than 50 German transport trucks in the desert.

Rommel's communications were being cut off by British submarines. The British movements have been confined almost entirely to countering the German advance.

TIRPITZ JOINS IN NORTHERN FIGHT

LONDON, July 10 (AP)—An air and sea battle in which the German warships Tirpitz, Zeuthen, Hopper and Scheer attempted to intervene may still be raging as a convoy of American, British and Russian ships fight through the Barents sea toward Murmansk, reliable sources reported today.

The battle, fought in the 64-hour daylight of the Arctic began on Saturday north and east of Bear Island, was understood, and reported in these developments:

Germans Smash 90 Miles Inside Soviet Defenses

MOSCOW, July 10 (AP)—German tank forces which crossed the upper Don bit into the Soviet defenses before Voronezh today within 90 miles to the south in a second furious battle fought by the approaches to Rostov where reinforced German troops had driven a new salient 90 miles into the Russian line.

Red Star, organ of the Soviet army, said conditions were of Voronezh were becoming "more complicated" and those near Rostov "very serious" with combat close to the city.

An important red army counter-attack designed to relieve pressure on Voronezh was reported threatening the German flank, however, and the Red Star reported that there may have a serious influence over the position near Voronezh.

The Russian reported they withdrew in great order toward Rostov after several days of steadily increasing German pressure.

The invaders advanced within 25 miles of Stalingrad, where units of 35,000 men on the lower Volga, they were in the line of the Rostov last fall.

Thousands of thousands of Russian soldiers and reserves were marshaled in the defense effort.

Volga manufacturing centers and Caucasus oil were described officially as the main objectives of the Soviet soldiers to hold their ground at any cost.

The main supply line of Marshal Shermans' army, the Don, was in front of the Moscow-Voronezh-Rostov railway, apparently was impeded through the approaches to Rostov by German bombardments or demolition attacks in the Rostov region.

Rostov (pop. 200,000) lies on the railway about 20 miles west of the curve which starts the Don's way sweep to the southeast. The river, a 1,250-mile waterline of defense, cuts through the approaches within 40 miles of Stalingrad and Volga before turning southward to empty into the Azov sea below Rostov.

Rostov is 200 miles due north of Rostov and 100 miles below Voronezh. It is 150 miles east of Kharkov, the old steel center converted by the Germans into a munitions headquarters of the southern front.

WASHINGTON, July 10 (AP)—The navy reported today that Admiral Nimitz, commander in chief of the Pacific fleet, recently "escaped serious injury" in an airplane crash on the west coast which cost the life of the plane's co-pilot.

The navy said that several passengers were "slightly injured" and described Nimitz's injuries as minor and insufficient to cause any interruption of his journey.

Nimitz, 57, who has been commander in chief of the Pacific fleet since the relief from that assignment in January, 1941, was flying over the north side of Snake river canyon.

For exceptionally meritorious service as commander in chief of the Pacific fleet, he was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross by the War Department.

OPEN RACE SEEN FOR DEMOCRATIC SENATE NOMINATION

GOSSET TO RUN; BOSS UNDECIDED

BOISE, July 10 (AP)—Lieut. Gov. C. Gossett is one of the candidates for the Democratic nomination for United States senator.

The Nampa man made an informal announcement last night that he would contest in the primaries on Thursday and possibly five other party promulgations.

Four have announced but C. Ben Rosen who served six years' governor and who has indicated he is considering running for the senate, does not seem to be connected into a declaration of candidacy.

In his informal statement, Gossett said, if elected "I will put forth every effort and all my energy to bring about an early conclusion of the war and the permanent peace—so that Americans can continue to live the American way of life and protect and preserve the greatest institution in the world today—the American home."

REDS RAVIN NAZIS
IN BAL TIC REGION

MOSCOW, July 10 (AP)—Bombing German aircraft on the Baltic region and Finland, the red air force has inflicted heavy new damage on Russia from which the German planes have been raiding ports and shipping of the Arctic supply line to the war front dispatches reported today.

The raids followed the Russian testimony of the German battleship Tirpitz as it led a cruiser and destroyer force in an attempted attack on an allied base bringing Russia supplies from England and the United States, the Russian accounts said.

A strong German air fleet based in northern Norway and Finland repeatedly has struck at such convoys and at Murmansk and other cities of the Kola peninsula through which American and British arms are flowing to the red army.

German aircraft in a number of northern districts were attacked in an effort to cripple such operations, the Russians said.

One force of Russian planes, striking simultaneously at several airports, was said to have destroyed 30 German bombers and fighters, damaged 27 others, burned a hangar and damaged a warehouse.

NORRIS REQUESTS "WATCH" ON AXIS

WASHINGTON, July 10 (AP)—Sen. George W. Norris, Ind., veteran liberal member of congress, proposed today on the eve of his sixtieth birthday that the United Nations prepare to watch Germany, Italy and Japan for "at least 50 years" after this war to guarantee security, rearmist.

Norris, one of the "little group" of liberal men who opposed United States entrance into World War I, said in an interview:

"The peace terms of this war must include complete and total disarmament of Germany, Italy and Japan. Every vestige of armaments in nations must be destroyed, including the factories that are capable of producing these armaments."

"For a period of at least 50 years these countries should be watched to guarantee that they make no new weapons. A committee should be established which would have the authority to visit and report on any plant where it is suspected that they are making munitions."

"When the terms of the axis have been destroyed, only the common people will be left. I am confident that they will be enough to fulfill Hitler's dream to 'lick us'."

Norris predicted that the axis would go down to a crushing defeat. But should it win, he said, Adolf Hitler will turn on Italy and Japan and "lick his allies."

"It will not be enough to fulfill Hitler's dream to 'lick us,'" he said. "He has said that the German people will rule the world and that must include Italy and Japan."

Norris believes that the resulting peace will be a new and better world in which to live.

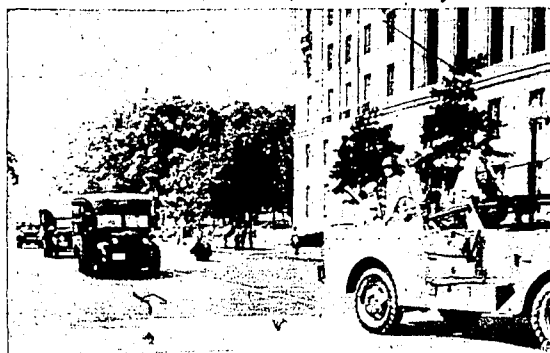

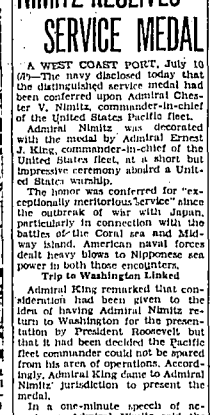
