COMPLETE HOUSE ACTION ON HUGE TAX BILL NEARS

WASHINGTON, July 13 (AP)—Administration leaders hoped today they would be able to pass the tax bill on the \$2,500,000,000 tax bill today.

The bill, under which 30,000,000 Americans will pay income taxes ranging from a low of \$150 for a each \$100 of earnings of a normal income up to a high of \$875 for a \$100,000, goes to the house floor for tomorrow night. Debate may begin Tuesday and final vote is hoped for by Saturday night.

Pressure for a rule that would permit amendments from the floor to increase the amount of the bill to \$300,000,000 has been resisted. It generally was assumed that the rules committee would provide for the new tax to be considered by the House tomorrow "pig" rule prohibiting revision.

Programs included

The ways and means committee completed consideration of the bill yesterday and today will report to the House. The committee report showed that the measure would add \$1,000,000,000 toward the treasury, out of \$10,000,000,000 by increasing the new levels on corporate income.

It stands the new tax bill has a heavy hand on every segment of the American people. It will meet the changing needs of the war—those which already have swollen to \$225,000,000,000, more by eight times what the United States spent in World War I.

Not only will the new tax bill raise the tax on individuals and corporations, but most consumers' goods not necessities of life will pay heavier excise taxes than ever before.

Smoke Taxes

The tax on cigarettes has been increased by the committee by a cent. The tax on tobacco products has been added to the tax on a quart of liquor. Clear and pipe smoking will pay 10 cents a pack. Telephone bills will carry a 10 percent tax. A five per cent tax will be paid with each bit laid down at the party. The tax on water will carry a five per cent tax.

Starting January 1, most Americans will pay part of their income taxes as they earn. In addition to the regular quarterly installments.

From each wage, salary or dividend there will be deducted five per cent of the amount in excess of fifteen percent exemptions. The exemption for married men is \$1,000 and for a married man, \$200 and for each child or other dependent, \$50.

The present four per cent normal tax has been raised to six per cent. The tax on dividends is increased, except for officers and men of the armed forces, to 5000 single and \$12,000 married. Officers and men will retain the present 6750 single and \$12,000 married exemption.

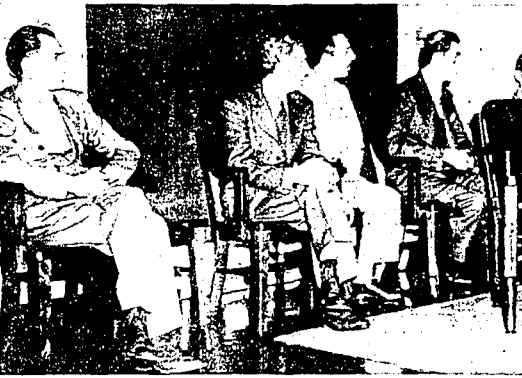

FBI Arrests 14 'Contacts' To Nazi Saboteur Groups

WASHINGTON, July 13 (AP)—Attorney General Francis Biddle announced today that Federal Bureau of Investigation agents had arrested 14 individuals who acted as "contacts" and assisted the eight Nazi saboteurs now on trial before a military commission here.

NAVY REPRISAL ORDERED ON BASTILLE DAY CELEBRATIONS

GERMANS ISSUE STEADFAST WARNING

BY JOHN A. PARIS
LONDON, July 13 (AP)—The gripes of the thousands of thousands of French prisoners in Bastille day, ordered reprisals down to continue same day in the form of such reprisals today.

The 150th anniversary of the days of the French kings for those who killed the traitors to France—July 13, 1793—was observed today as a holiday, but not fitting that a nation in mourning should celebrate.

Apparently certain that there would be no reprisals and they would have the 15th of July in the hands of their agents, Paris Police Chief Oberg announced that hereafter not only such reprisals would be punished, but also their families.

His decree, broadcast by radio Paris, said: "If the culprit is not found within 24 hours after the crime is committed, firstly, all male members of his family over 18 will be shot; secondly, female members of his family will be sent into forced labor; and thirdly, all children from the family up to 17 years of age will be sent into supervised hours of education."

Oberg directed the decree against the 15th of July, the day of the "three of Britain and the Russians," "Famille," including sons-in-law and children of the police.

Gen. Charles de Gaulle, leader of the Free French, was scheduled to give a broadcast from London tonight from London. He was expected to tell them that their devotion to France was not to be given as a slight demonstration of their strength. He revealed today that an anti-French committee has already been formed in Britain.

ILLINOIS TOWN NAMED 'LIDICE'

LIDICE, Ill., July 13 (AP)—The town of Lidice stood as a defiant symbol of freedom on the Illinois prairie today 22 days after Germany announced that "the town was leveled and the name of the community changed to Lidice."

The German announcement referred to the village of Lidice, Czechoslovakia, was raised to avenge the slaying of Reinhold, the husband of Heydrich.

But the town was renamed Sunday when this suburb of Joliet, Ill., changed its name from Springfield to Lidice.

President Roosevelt telegraphed the city of 50,000 attending the dedication of Lidice.

"Instead of being killed as the Nazis would have, Lidice has been saved. Lidice is the great symbol of the fate and the fate of the Lidice people. It is a reminder to us that no force could destroy the courage to maintain life."

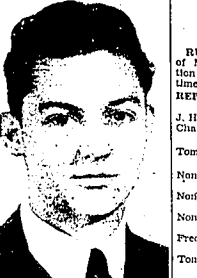
