YUGOSLAV GUERRILLAS REPORTEDLY KILL 6 NAZI CHIEFS

WOMEN SLAIN IN FRENCH MEETING

LONDON, July 15 (AP)—Yugoslav guerrillas are reported to have killed six high Nazi officials in addition to 35 Italian officers and men, in a meeting held in heavily-censored dispatches from Vichy indicated widespread patriotic outbursts celebrating the anniversary of the storming of the battle, in both occupied and unoccupied France. Two women patriots were killed and five wounded in Marseilles, when Jacques Doriot's fascist organization tried to break up a demonstration.

A spokesman for the Yugoslav government in Belgrade revealed the new successes of guerrillas in his homeland, said one of the slain officials was Gen. Paul Evrard, chief of the army of occupation in northern Herzegovina. He was killed when guerrillas attacked a motor column between Mostar and Neveleski.

Henry Kisseloff, a prominent French newspaper editor, said that the Yugoslav government had received a report that the new successes of guerrillas in his homeland, said one of the slain officials was Gen. 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DRIVE FOR FIRE AIDES REOPENED

A renewed effort to recruit volunteer fire fighters will be begun this afternoon or tomorrow morning by the Junior Chamber of Commerce, Russ Thomas, president, indicated today.

The registration of men to volunteer to fight the forest fires in case of emergency has been very slow, he indicated, and efforts will be pushed soon to increase the total.

Mr. Clyde Williams, manager of the U. S. employment service, reported today that one more volunteer had registered at the employment office during the past week.

"With the forest fire season rapidly approaching, we want to get a large surplus of volunteers in case the emergency should arise," Thomas said.

Mr. Williams today indicated that men signing up for the forest fire brigade would be expected to submit brush fires which they got out of control and were threatening farm homes or crops.

"The volunteer sign-up of forest fighters is designed primarily for the control of brush fires and water sheds," he said.

Thomas warned that with the warm weather the danger of forest fires is increased. The forest fire season usually peaks in August, he pointed out.

Marine Officer Dived Plane Into Jap Smokestack

WASHINGTON, July 15 (AP)—The navy today disclosed that a marine corps aviator, Maj. Alfred H. Henderson, Gary, Ind., dived his biplane down the smokestack of a Japanese aircraft carrier during the battle of Midway.

Henderson and his group of scout bombers arrived over the Japanese fleet and launched the marines' first attack on the main body.

"Japanese fighters swarmed off their carrier decks and slashed into the marine squadron," the navy said.

Henderson's plane was the first one hit and it burst into flames. Corp. Eugene T. Card, Oakland, Calif., a marine gunner, said he was convinced Maj. Henderson's action was deliberate.

Washington officials, pleased by the Scouts' record in collecting almost 30,000,000 pounds of scrap metal, have asked the boys to locate scrap metal sources so that local salvage committees could meet war needs for 1,000,000 tons of it.

The Scout national council said the government expected boys to discover in cellars and attics such forgotten or discarded articles as iron beds, door knobs, keys, toys, tools and in fact anything made of iron, steel or non-ferrous metals.

NEW TANKS AND PLANES WILL AID

LONDON, July 14 (AP)—A new type of American-British tank and a new British fighter plane, both described as equal to or better than any axis machine—will give the allies superiority in ground and air, government spokesmen told the house of commons today during debate on production.

Capt. Oliver Litchton, production minister, and Col. J. J. Llewellyn, director of production, opened the government a two-day debate on the empire's production, a program for the future, and regarded as secondary, to the grave shipping situation set for secret debate on production.

Llewellyn said that a new British fighter plane is in production which is "in nearly every respect better than and in any respect as good as the latest German fighters."

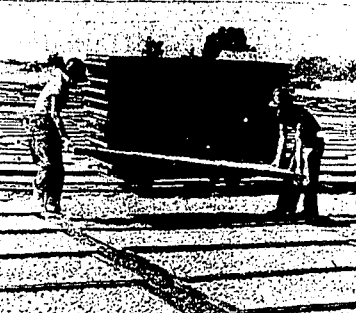
Mr. Marlatt later moved to Boise and later to Nampa, Idaho. There he lived since with his son who owns a cattle ranch in that community.

ANTI-JEW DECREE HITS IN FRANCE

VICHY, July 15 (AP)—The Vichy government published a sweeping decree today taking over the management of all Jewish-controlled property and businesses, leases and rights in French colonies.

INDIA CONGRESS ASKS IMMEDIATE END OF BRITISH RULE

ALLIED FORCE IN NATION APPROVED

By JOHN E. MORRIS
WARDHA, India, July 14 (AP)—The executive of the national All-India congress has passed a resolution agreeing to the retention of allied forces in India until the end of the British rule in India, it was reported today.

The resolution, which is an appeal for home rule, failed to utilize all the "re-entitled" strength it might have gathered since 1920, informants said.

It called a meeting of the All-India congress committee August 7 at Bombay to give a final decision on the resolution.

In its resolution, agreed on in final form after days of discussion, the working committee of the congress or executive, defied any intention of jeopardizing the defense capacity of the allied powers and in the statement of allied forces in India to ward off aggression and protect China.

Asks End of British Rule
But, informants said, it then emphatically expressed the opinion, in the name of the congress, that British rule in India must end at once. It concluded, it was said, "should, however, this appeal fail, the congress will be reluctantly compelled to utilize all the non-violent strength it might have gathered since 1920."

Such a wide-spread struggle and the non-violent approach under the leadership of Mohandas K. Gandhi.

The issues raised are most vital and most far-reaching to the people of India, as well as to the people of the United Nations, the working committee refers them to the All-India congress committee for final decision.

"For this purpose the All-India congress committee will meet at Wardha August 7."

Gandhi, spiritual leader of the nationalist movement, said at a news conference that no room was left for negotiations with Britain regarding independence.

Other resolutions regarding the independence of India, or not, he said, "many other things can be included in the negotiations regarding what follows."

But he added, a free India would be free to function on the day Britain relinquished its rule.

Gandhi would not speculate on the likelihood of British acceptance except to comment that the British were human beings and that there was always hope.

But the alternative to acceptance of Gandhi's demands, he said, would be the mass struggle on the widest possible scale, although without bloodshed and without the participants courting arrest.

Water Bonds at Gooding Will Be Retired by 1945

GOODING, July 15 (AP)—The audit of the Gooding city bonds for the fiscal year 1941-1942, made recently by Fred E. Ring, Idaho Falls accountant, showed that the water bonds issue of \$40,000 would be retired in 1943 and that the water receipts were \$25,547.35.

The report shows the city's operating cost the past year to have been \$33,701.81. Beginning with the 1942-43 fiscal year, the operating costs per year were \$27,407.33 and \$20,000.

In the analysis of the municipal waterworks cash operations the audit revealed receipts of \$25,547.35, which included \$2,118.75 in bond and interest redemption.

Of the \$20,000 waterworks refunding bond issue of 1935 there is now outstanding \$20,000. This will be retired by Nov. 1, 1945 with three annual payments of \$7,000 and a final payment of \$8,000 in 1945. When this bond is paid off, taxpayers will enjoy a considerably reduced tax rate unless other improvements are made in the waterworks.

For the past several years up loss has been suffered by the city through non-collection of charges from users. The report stated that on April 30, 1942, approximately \$755 was charged out of the records as uncollectible. Roughly 80 per cent of this charge-off resulted in the liquidation of the out-crediting collection account for which the city obtained 12 lots in settlement.

REDS PRESS FOR SECOND FRONT

LONDON, July 15 (AP)—Soviet Russia was reported by qualified London sources today as pressing anew for the prompt opening of a second, American-British European front which would divert the main German armaments at the gates of the vital Caucasus.

Three sources, who insisted on anonymity, pointed out the eventual result that Japan might open a second front in Siberia to distract the harassed red army if the Nazis can set the stage for it.

A smashing victory for the Germans in the battle for the Caucasian approach, they predicted, would be followed by a Japanese attack on Siberian Russia. Japan was said to have massed at least 200,000 men in Manchukuo with air reinforcements from home.

Best Months
August and September are the best months for campaigning in Siberia, according to military sources.

Whether the Japanese and cons, public sympathy for the reported red invasion of Soviet Russia, was demonstrated in mass meetings at Glasgow and Liverpool which demanded both a new front and all aid for Russia.

Soviet strategists say they are not satisfied that the British air offensive, hampered lately by bad weather, is a heavy enough threat to divert German troops from the eastern front.

See Big Front
On the other hand, military sources foresee a second front more than just a big hit-and-run affair—one requiring a long preparation. And they do not believe, they say, that the situation in southern Russia has reached a point where an American-British invasion of the continent is essential to save Russia's armies from being overrun.

Although the Russians are being driven back by the Axis, there is no indication that any of the main Soviet armies has been broken or surrounded by the advancing Germans.
