

GOVERNOR UNFAIRLY CRITICIZED

There is no justification for non-essential spending by either state or mational government in times like these, because the cost of the war alone will mean a staggering tax load which we will be called upon to carry for years to come.

Shortly after the United States became involved in the war, we minced no words in advocating that the state forego all unnecessary expenditures, in anticipation of what the people of Idaho would be required to contribute to the war effort in increased taxes.

One of these projects was the reconstructed highway from Twin Falls to the rim-to-rimbridge. As originally planned, this project included an improved highway, curbs and sidewalks. It was decided that the sidewalks were unnecessary, but that the road to the bridge—a section of an important trans-continental highway—was in such deplorable condition that reconstruction was essential.






