NATIONAL WASTE SCRAP RUBBER BRINGS 454,155 TONS

YEAR'S WORK FOR RECLAIM PLANTS

By WILLIE KRUEHBAUM WASHINGTON, July 22 (UP)—The nationwide scrap rubber salvage collection which yielded 454,155 tons will keep reclaim plants operating at capacity for more than a year, a public relations official announced today.

Arthur B. Newhall, rubber coordinator, estimated that approximately 70 percent of the scrap could be converted into reclaimed rubber for military or essential civilian use. Reclaim plants annually handle some 350,000 tons.

President Roosevelt, announcing the results of the rubber drive, said the latest work on the rubber situation, he decided to amplify the nature of the statement, which apparently will be issued by the White House.

Study Plan

WEB officials, meanwhile, were re-examining rubber commitments to the forces which would require 232 tons of crude and 97,420 tons of reclaimed rubber for a plan which the manufacturers say will keep all essential motor cars running for the next two years.

FLORIDA GUARDS AGAINST ENEMY

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., July 22 (AP)—The state Florida army that welcomed Ponce de Leon and offered escape to the fleeing Confederate cabinet are closely patrolled today to make certain they will not be a launch for more German spies and saboteurs.

Confusion of four FBI-apprehended state agents that they attacked into the United States via a submarine and rubber boat landing on the beaches near here has resulted in stepped-up land, sea and air activity on the part of Uncle Sam.

Virtually unimpeded from the exclusive seashore resorts of Ponte Vedra Beach to St. Augustine, the 30-mile gently shelving beach is ideal for beach landings. It was until military and civilian defense forces increased their patrols.

Close highways along the shore have been closed to traffic from sun down to sunrise. Expanded almost measure to prohibit car lights from illuminating ships at sea, this also serves in preventing auto from picking up enemy agents and their tools of destruction.

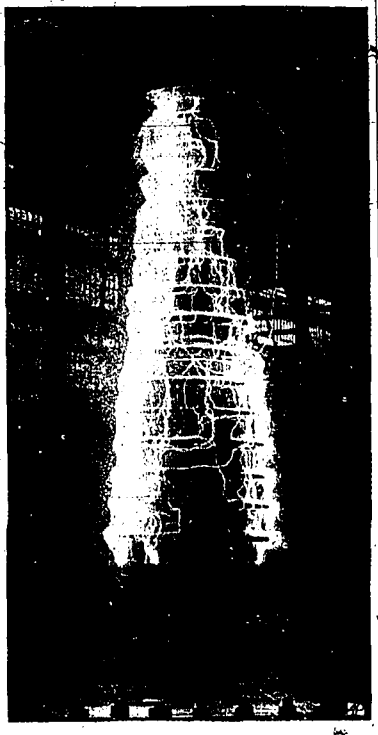
Three bridges afford access to the mainland, one on the four-lane highway to Jacksonville, another at rural Palm Valley, and the third, the North River bridge at St. Augustine.

Long Uninhabited Stretch Main inhabited area is on the northern end of the island and includes the riverfront community of Mayport, and the four seaside resorts of Atlantic Beach, Neptune Beach, Jacksonville Beach and Ponte Vedra Beach.

A fishing pier just south of Ponte Vedra is the last sign of life until one reaches Wilano Beach at St. Augustine. In between is nothing but the swelling surf, gently sloping beach, dunes and dunes with their swaying sea oats and the road itself.

Most of the time the sea is hidden behind the dunes, while off to the westward lie the grassy-saltwater marshes teeming with wildlife. There are grass, half-wild cattle, and "marsh-jacks"—wild pony remnants of early Spanish mounts.

300,000 WOMEN ON U.S. PAYROLL

WASHINGTON, July 22 (AP)—More than 300,000 women are on the government payroll throughout the country.

Nearly doubling their number since 1939, Uncle Sam's "favorite girls" would number now a city equal to Seattle, Houston, Denver, or Atlanta. The women's bureau of the U. S. department of labor estimated that federal feminine workers in the District of Columbia alone totaled 118,000 in May, 1942, compared to 70,000 in 1941.

So many problems confront these young women that the U. S. department of labor recently published a handbook to guide them. Mary Anderson, director of the women's bureau, supervised the publication.

Needs of community adjustment at this time are acute. Miss Anderson said. She pointed out that women being recruited into the war production program must have physical and mental health to maintain efficiency on their job.

The booklet attempts to solve the problems of girls who migrate from one locality to another to secure jobs in factories, offices, or service trades. To assist these newcomers is a challenge to the community in the opinion of Miss Anderson.

Primary problem of the war-working girl in Washington is housing. Living quarters should be up to standards as to light, for health, privacy, cleanliness and comfort. Room rents should not exceed 32 per cent of a woman's income and her bathing, eating, and laundry facilities must be planned for normal living.

Reason for war employe, according to the women's bureau, is money. The three-fold pressure of strange surroundings, overcrowding, and speeding up of job duties makes a need for financial self-expression.

Recommendations for a health program include education along lines of disease prevention, first aid, and supplying adequate medical care.

Here Is Break-Down on U. S. Casualties Since War Start

WASHINGTON, July 22 (AP)—United States forces have suffered 44,143 casualties since the war began — 4,801 dead, 32,118 wounded and 36,124 missing.

A joint office of war information statement last night said that since most of the missing were at Bataan and Corregidor and in the Philippines are believed to be prisoners of war. No definite report as to their status has been received from the International Red Cross.

The casualties by services: Army — Killed—602, wounded—1,413, missing—17,623. Philippine Scouts — Killed—479, wounded—754, missing—11,000.

Navy — Killed—3,420, wounded—1,051, missing—7,072. Known prisoners of war: Marine Corps — Officers—52, enlisted men—240. Navy — Officers—40, enlisted men—681.

RUSSIANS MASS RESERVES ON DON

ANKARA, July 21 (AP) (Delayed)—Neutral sources received reports from Russia today that Marshal Kliment Voroshilov has ordered a large Russian reserve army along the Don and Volga rivers to meet the German threat, to the Caucasus.

(Sisibochin heard similar reports that Gen. Glikor K. Zhukov, commanding on the central front, also was preparing to strike the Germans from the north with a new army equipped with "impressive" quantities of American war materiel.)

It was assumed by informants here that Marshal Semyon Timoshenko, the Russian commander in chief on the southern front, would send Voroshilov's army into action, striking toward the south, when the Germans approached to Volga with their communication lines extending 400 miles westward to Kharkov.

Voroshilov, a former Russian war command, was detached from his command on the Russian front last year at the moment when the high command sent him out into Asiatic Russia to train a reserve force of newly trained men.

The Moscow reports indicated that the army might now be ready for action.

According to informants, Voroshilov's army was massed northward of the line running from Voronezh on the upper Don through Stalingrad on the Volga to Astrakhan, where the Volga runs into the Caspian sea.

Thus it would be in position to strike a possibly decisive blow at the German flank.

SLAV GUERRILLAS MAKE BIG RAIDS

LONDON, July 21 (AP)—Private advice said today that one of Gen. Draja Mihailovich's three Jugoslav guerrilla armies had killed 600 Axis troops, taken 400 prisoners and occupied several localities on the railway between Mostar and Arajevo, in southwest Yugoslavia.

Gen. Mihailovich's forces were reported to have killed at least 7,000 Axis troops and captured several thousand more in May. Reliable sources said they had fought a major battle with Axis troops and that Hungarian battalions sent to fight had participated. The guerrillas succeeded in disrupting the vital oil traffic on the Danube.

His forces, now engaged in actions out of the guerrilla stage, also were reported to have heavily bombed the main railway line between Serbia and Bulgaria, disrupting traffic to the Kosovo mountains. His forces were fighting a big battle with Axis troops. Locals were reported to have killed 400 Axis troops and claimed 1,000 prisoners had been killed.

Pressure Increased

Another of Gen. Mihailovich's armies, engaged in an offensive against the coast of Belgrade, was reported to have increased its pressure against Axis forces in the Danubian forests.

The Yugoslavs captured a large amount of war material, which now will be turned against the Axis, from the railway stations of Gradiska and Brjdani, the private advice said. Gen. Mihailovich, however, was said to have paid a comparatively heavy price for his successes between Sarajevo and Mostar.

The Axis, proclaiming the "defeat" of the army, claimed the Yugoslavs had killed 3,500 "rebels," taken 500 prisoners and seized large amounts of arms, munition and food.

Gustav Bleigardt, the German underground radio, said that the Yugoslavs had killed 67,000 foreigners into the past six weeks in combat, a lack of discipline in the army and growing resistance in occupied territories.

SS Strength Boosted

Radio GSE, supposedly operated by rebellious German officers, said the strength of the SS was now 700,000 men. Its broadcast was interrupted by airtels and hovers, apparently from Nazi officials in London.

Not only would Himmler find the increase in strength of the SS useful in case of rebellion inside Germany, GSE said; he also needed it because there was "shaking" in the hinterland, a lack of discipline among German soldiers at the front, particularly of the infantry, and increasing guerrilla and resistance in occupied territories.

If true, Himmler had broken an SS precedent. While its ranks from the beginning have been filled with the criminal and hoodlum element, all have been Germans and supposedly devout Nazis.

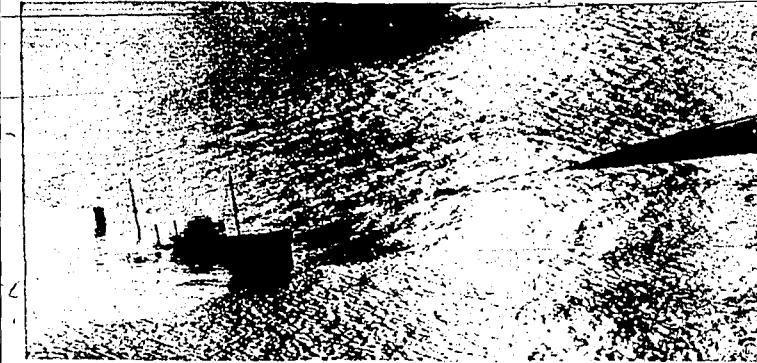

REDS LODGE NEW PLEA FOR FRONT

WASHINGTON, July 21 (AP)—Soviet Ambassador Maxim Litvinov has lodged new and urgent pleas for immediate opening of a second front in Europe. It was learned today.

The Soviet Union's situation is so dangerous, sources close to the Soviet embassy said, that the United Nations face the greatest crisis since Dunkirk. If the Soviet army is knocked out, they contended, it may be possible to win the war or it may take years and millions of lives to do so.

Litvinov is said to believe that if the United Nations want to win the war with the smallest cost of lives and in the shortest possible time, a second front now is imperative.

Don't Hide Concern W. Soviet circles here have not hidden their concern about the tempo among some of the United Nations groups in Washington to look complacently upon the Russian situation.

Similar plans for quick action to divert German strength from the Russian front were said to have been made in London, and are presumed to be an important factor in numerous recent conferences Prime Minister Winston Churchill has held with the American military and supply officials.

The report that Litvinov has appealed again to officials here was confirmed by sources close to the embassy. Presumably his appeal was made directly to President Roosevelt.

Steady Pressure

Litvinov ever since his arrival here on the morning Pearl Harbor was attacked, never has ceased to urge publicly the opening of a second front by Great Britain and the United States.

Now, however, it is reported by reliable sources, he is not insisting upon a large-scale invasion of western Europe.

U. S. SHIP LOSSES "GREATLY EXCEED" NEW CONSTRUCTION

4 MORE VESSELS ADDED TO TOLL

By The Associated Press

War-time sinkings of allied and neutral merchantmen in the western Atlantic reached the 400-mark today, grimly accentuated by disclosure that losses "have greatly exceeded new construction."

While the war shipping administration was making its sombre announcement and revealing that the United Nations were pooling their ships and limiting cargoes to essential war materials, the navy yesterday reported the sinking of four more vessels by axis submarines.

These included two American merchantmen, a small British cargo carrier and a Portuguese fishing craft, shelled in the daylight despite the fact it flew flags attesting to its neutral registry and bore others painted on its sides.

Total list:

The newly-announced sinkings raised to 394 the unofficial Associated Press tabulation of announced or reported western Atlantic submarine victims since Pearl Harbor. The navy said the sinking of the Portuguese vessel in the north Atlantic June 5 was the first submarine attack on a craft of that neutral country.

Two of the crew were known dead and 34 others missing. Capt. Ellis Marshall and seven other survivors reported on reaching a New England port.

Survivors sailed 400 miles in 11 days in lifeboats before they were picked up by a coast guard vessel.

Two British ships

Three axis submarines trapped the small British ship some 650 miles off the Atlantic coast six weeks ago by shelling it from three angles. It took three hours and 20 minutes to sink it.

The men, including the master, were killed and 28 were rescued.

In the Gulf of Mexico, eight of the crew of 52 aboard the U. S. G. merchantmen were lost July 13 when a torpedo-brought explosion broke and then sank their ship, and one of the survivors hospitalized ashore died Monday to make the casualty list.

The other American loss announced yesterday occurred June 3 in the Caribbean. Fifteen seamen still are missing from the 45-man crew.

CCC PLAN DRAWN FOR AFTER WAR

WASHINGTON, July 22 (AP)—Forecasting possible need of the civilian conservation corps' revival after the war for employment of youths and demobilized servicemen, the government has drafted a four-year conservation program to employ 4,000,000 men.

The plan, it was disclosed today, has been filed with the national resources and planning board. It was drawn by CCC Director J. M. Conner as the director of Federal Security Administrator Paul V. McNutt.

McNutt, who is supervising liquidation of the corps, said in report of a past war CCC the plan could be revised to utilize 3,000,000 men for eight years or 1,000,000 men for 24 years to "take care of whatever emergency may exist."

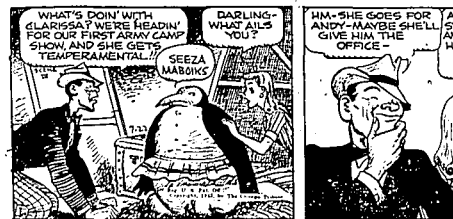

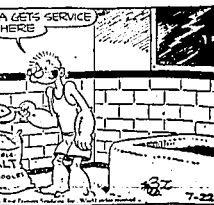

Must Be Willing to Pay as Much for Peace as War, Speaker Tells Institute

A world of peace will come "when we are willing to pay as much for peace as we are paying for war," Dr. James Miller, Portland, field executive for the Presbyterian board of Christian education, told those gathered here yesterday, for the annual women's vacation camp of the south-central district.

Usually the camp lasts several days and is held at Easley but this year, because of war conditions, it was held at the Twin Falls high school auditorium and was limited to afternoon and evening sessions with eight addresses being held.

Presiding was Miss Marion Hepworth, state home demonstration leader. Assisting in arrangements for the camp was Mrs. Margaret Hill Carter, district home demonstration agent.

Dr. Miller, during his afternoon address, laid blame for the war on the shoulders of the isolationists.

Need Men of Vision "If you please," he said, "it was our isolationists who got us into this fix. We must have statesmen, men of vision, rather than politicians to lead us now."

He declared that there are "no new problems" in the world today, only the old ones presented in a new way.

He pointed out, along this line, that 3,000 years ago, according to the Bible, provisions were made for the poor and the aged and steps taken against too great an accumulation of wealth by any one individual.

He said that the New Dealers read the Bible and the Republicans didn't, "and also that the New Dealers were the Bible one better by not only providing for people but also bringing it to them."

No Simple Answer He said that the present time there is no "simple solution" for this complex world and that anyone who says there is, "is doing the simple thing and everyone will be fine" doesn't know what he is talking about.
