

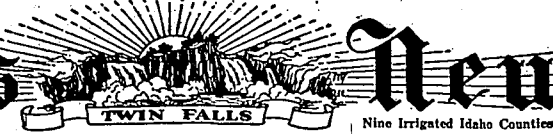

Hull Sees Big Sacrifices Necessary to Win Battle

WASHINGTON, July 24 (AP)—Secretary of State Cordell Hull warned last night that every one of the 28 United Nations, including the United States, must sacrifice "time and substance and life itself to an extent unprecedented in past history" to defeat the axis powers.

He voiced the grave warning in a 45-minute radio speech which was the country's entry into war and one which President Roosevelt had recommended to every man, woman and child in the world as a summary of what the world faces now and in the future.

Must Use Force "International desperados, like the bandits of the international outlawry voluntarily. They will only be stopped by force."

Secretary Hull "Liberty is truly won only when it is guarded by the same watchfulness and vigilance that were used to win it."

See Prosperity He predicted that prosperity, including the same economic life that war if the nations of the world work together on a program such as he has outlined.

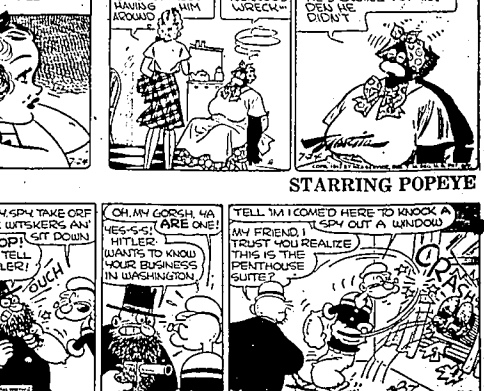

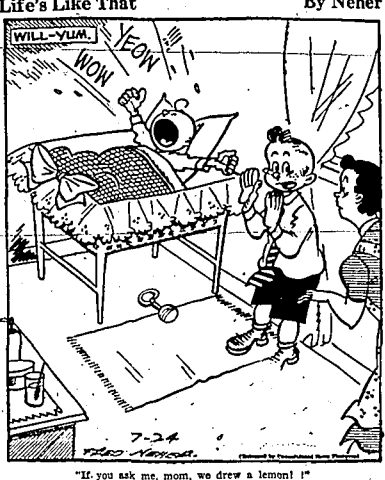
