

Maybe it is fatuous to assume that the United-Nations will win the war and will therefore have the dictating of the peace. But people have always speculated about Heaven, So what's the harm?

In building was new sources of raw materials for war production, this country is letting itself in for economic revolutions of first magnitude, and to assume that peace will end all our troubles is nothing short of folly.

For instance, with the production of nylon, rayon and other synthetic fibers stepped up, will this country go back to a Japanese or Chinese-dominated raw slik industry?

With a synthetic rubber industry capable of producing 860,000 tons a year, shall it be scrapped to go back to native rubber from the Netherlands East Indies and Malaya?

the Netheriands East Indies and Malaya?
Or with new sources for up to 100,000 tons
of native rubber developed in Latin America,
shall this new hemisphere industry be permitted to die just to revive Dutch and British plantations?
With production of the light metals, alumnum and magnesium, stepped up tremendously, shall it be allowed to lapse to prewar proportions, or shall there be a structural
revolution in which these metals will comnet, with the alise-evanated steel production

war proportions, or shall there be a structural revolution in which these metals will compete with the also-expanded steel production capacity of the country?

Or, getting closer to home, with beet augar production stepped up, shall it be wheel out over the protests of the growers, including those in Idaho, to-save the ścane sugar men of Hawaii, Cuba and the Fullippines?

With new sources of fast shat folls developed through increased plantings of soybeans and peanuts and increased profificacy of pigs, shall the acres go unplanted and the hogs be slaughtered to revive the foreign producers from which this country imported fats and oils before the war?

And what about our own domestic labor, mow getting from two to three times its normal wage on government defense work? Will it not, what will be the effore war scales, and the cost of consumer goods?
