'42 COLE CIRCUS IS GIANT SHOW

The last word in tent show entertainment, horses, wire walkers, jugglers, acrobats, equestrians, aerialists and animals will descend on Twin Falls early tomorrow morning, when the Cole Brothers circus arrives here.

The big show, traveling on a million train of double length railroad cars, will come to town loaded with new features. The first section should arrive around 7 a. m. Friday and be spotted at the Union Pacific railroad crossing near the passenger depot. Immediately the bepackaged folk, the hundreds of animals, the rumbling red wagons, floats, dens and cages and the 250 horses and ponies, plus the three herds of performing elephants will be unloaded and the building of the acres of tents will soon get underway at the circus grounds located at Lake Lakes and Highland View avenues.

A total of 20 tents of varying sizes will be raised, including the gigantic big top, including in color, which seats nearly 10,000 people.

Thumb-Nail View

And here's the thumb-nail sketch of the circus at a glance:

One thousand people, scores of wild animals, including elephants, train a mile long.

Performance: Afternoon only at 2 p. m., sides open at 1 p. m.

Physical night: 20 tents, including giant big top of indigo-blue canvas. Dining tents to serve 2,600 meals a day; 250 horses and ponies; fleet of powerful motor trucks; three electric lighting plants on seven special wagons.

Grand horse show under separate four-pole tent. Over 100 horses, many of them blue ribbon winners.

Menagerie: Large traveling zoo of wild animals including the elephants.

Sideline: A congress of human oddities and weird people.

Music: Concert by Cole Brothers circus band, Victor Hestlin, director, precedes the performance.

Special Animal Star

One special attraction of the menagerie is "Joe Daniels III," 320-pound chimpanzee who has appeared in pictures with Dorothy Lamour and in "Our Girls" comedies.

A circus would hardly be complete without lions, so the Cole show brings an army of 50 of the fun makers.

Following the afternoon performance the big show will move to Boise where it exhibits Saturday.

PAY RAISED FOR TEACHER "SUBS"

In keeping with the trend of the times, substitute teachers in the Twin Falls schools will work under a higher pay schedule during the coming term.

The elementary instructors will receive \$4 a day instead of \$3.20, while high school teachers will get \$5, one dollar more per day than last year.

Supt. A. W. Morgan said that, while he has had no trouble in the

past securing substitute teachers, he believes that the \$4-a-day scale is fitting in keeping with the wages paid in other schools.

The schools will open Aug. 24 with a holiday on Labor day and a recess during the harvest season in October.

The school board election will be held on Sept. 1 with the last day of filing on Aug. 20. The terms of two directors expire this year. They are Directors Edgar H. Olmstead and Frank L. Stephan.

The school census will start as soon as E. F. Stettler, the board clerk who will be in charge, can secure census-takers. The start will be much earlier than last year.

NAZI SUB TAKEN BY CANADA SHIP

HALIFAX, Aug. 13 (AP)—The capture of a Nazi submarine by a Canadian warship after it had been disabled by aircraft was described last night in a broadcast by a royal Canadian navy seaman from Ingersoll, Ont.

Without disclosing the area or time of the capture, James Kay Crotty, a petty officer leading torpedo operator, told how his ship captured the U-boat and then took

it in tow. He spoke over station WGIN here.

His ship was in port, he said, when it got an emergency order to proceed to sea, soon the worst war on board that the vessel was after a U-boat that had been attacked from the air.

"Finally, we picked up the sub," he continued. "Apparently it couldn't dive, for it was still on the surface. Our planes were still overhead, waiting for us to go to work. Of course, our job was to seize the submarine and take the crew off."

"It would have been easy to sink it, but we were there to keep it afloat."

"By that time, more ships had arrived, and they helped to screen us from other U-boats that might have

been in the neighborhood while we got a line to the surface."

"Grotty said his ship took off 'all that were alive.'"

"We got 22 prisoners, including the captain," he went on. "He had an iron cross and was quite a duffer. We took them on board our ship and fed them. I don't think they had much to eat for 4 days or so, for they were hungry as wolves. They seemed very surprised that he had a cross and canned milk. They'd pass the butter around and look at it as if they'd never seen anything like it before."

Pre-War Values Urged by Clark To Keep Tax Low

BOISE, Aug. 13 (AP)—Declaring "assessed valuations must be held down along with pre-war valuations, and the tax levy must be low to relieve every possible burden on the taxpayer," Gov. Clark summarized briefly yesterday the aims of the state board of equalization now in session.

"It will be necessary in the present emergency to lower the tax to the lowest possible point, and see to it that state expenditures do not exceed the levy. In other words, we must cut to the bone, and then live within our means," the governor said.

The board will set the ad valorem tax levy probably sometime this week. Today county assessors met with the board to discuss valuation assessments.

LAMB POOL NETS \$4,071 RECEIPTS

Five hundred and twenty-eight lambs and ewes brought a net total of \$4,071.57 to members of the Twin Falls Livestock Marketing association who participated in a pool on July 31, County Agent Bert Holmgren announced today.

The shipment consisted of two carloads of lambs, most of which were sold on their individual brands because several raisers were making a cleanup of lambs they had left on the farms. A few top lamb sold for \$12.50, some for \$13 and the remainder for \$12.40.

The shrinkage was 60 per cent and the shipping expense 1.10 per hundredweight. The net top on lambs was \$10.91 on full home weight. Pockets brought \$2.81, fat ewes \$3.61, medium ewes \$2.64 and canner ewes \$1.64.

LETTERS COMMITTEE SENDS SABOTEUR LETTER TO WHITE HOUSE

LIST OF 17,000 NAZI AIDES GIVEN

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13 (AP)—The Dies committee, it was learned authoritatively today, will send to President Roosevelt this week a copy of a confidential list culled out from Germany to trusted Nazi sympathizers in the United States advising them that Walter Kapp had been appointed to head a fifth column front in this country and paving the way for his work.

The FBI is seeking Kapp in connection with its investigation of a spy sabotage ring and has charged he was associated with six saboteurs executed here last September after a military conviction trial.

Along with the letter, it was learned, the committee will send to the White House a list of names of approximately 17,000 persons whose past activities indicated spy sympathies.

How the letter came into the committee's possession was not disclosed. It was dated at Stuttgart, Germany, and bore an admonition that those who received it were to keep it confidential.

After describing the obstacles confronted in the United States by the group, the letter said that investigations by the Dies committee, Kapp's letter said:

"It would be a mistake, however, to conclude from what has been said in this report that the American line in this fateful hour entirely failed. However, it lacks the national strength it lacks discipline, but in their hearts the Germans of America experience very deeply the powerful revolution in Europe.

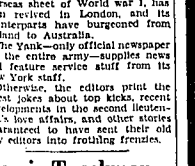

WHEAT RESERVE CONTINUES GAIN

By FRANKLIN MULLIN
CHICAGO, Aug. 13 (AP)—Uncle Sam's hoard of wheat, piled up for the day when a world clamoring for bread can be satisfied in large quantities is swelling by millions of bushels weekly as fast as farmers can find suitable storage space, grain trade statistics showed today.

Farmers are putting up their grain as collateral for government loans even though market prices are the highest for August since 1929. Lending operations are running far ahead of last year's total of 2,000,000 bushels was stored. Up to Aug. 1, loans had been granted on 21,000,000 bushels, compared with less than 4,000,000 at that date a year ago.

The government's lending is not to accumulate more wheat, because Uncle Sam already owns more grain than at any time since the start of the normal grainary program came into being several years ago, the total being nearly 300,000,000 bushel grown.



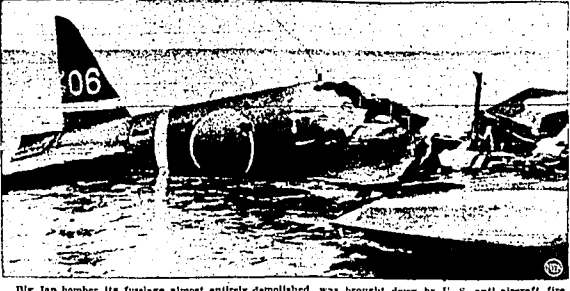

COMMENTATOR AT WORK ON BIBLE

NEW YORK, Aug. 13 (AP)—Booker Carter, radio commentator and newspaper columnist, said today that he had embraced a "Biblical Hebraic faith" and was hard at work with David Horowitz, a Biblical student of Wilkes-Barre, Pa., on a new translation of the Old Testament.

Carter declared that while Horowitz was on a visit to Jerusalem in 1927 he had come across a hermit, described by some persons as "The New Testament" living in caves along the route of the Biblical exodus.

The hermit, Carter said, told Horowitz that after years of scientific research he had found that all versions and translations of the Bible, whether of Christian, Jewish or any other origin, had done grave injustice to the original Hebrew text.

He believes, Carter said, that the Hebrew Bible should be translated into the language of the present day. He has been studying Hebrew for several years and has prepared a new translation of the Old Testament as far as he is able.

Carter said he had observed most of the "rites of Judaism" since his conversion a year ago, but did not follow orthodox or "rabbinical" Judaism, an organized religion.

Voinitsky, ex-head of the national fascist party, Dr. Wilhelm Kuntz, physician, and Kuntz have pleaded guilty to charges of espionage during government tour of five years in federal prison, the other three are awaiting their punishment. Voinitsky, 37, said he was the pastor's three-week old trial.
