

When work of rebuilding the stretch of road was completed several months ago, the question arose as to the advisability of additional work on the project, such as putting in curbs, driveways and sidewalks.
After considerable discussion, the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce went on record as opposing expenditures for all non-essential improvements for the duration of the war, and recommended that the governor and the highway department follow this point only on projects in this violatify, but throughout the state.
After due consideration, and particularly on the advice of engineers, it was decided to install the curbing along the new road. Because of inadequate drainage, it was generally agreed, the shoulders on the new road would otherwise break down, causing general damage to the highway and impairing the

the highway and impairing the stment. That decision seemed

total investment. That decision seemed logical.
When the curbing work was completed recently and the issue of sidewalks and driveways came up, the chamber's highway committee, in adhering to the organization's original policy, recommended that the high-way department forego these additional improvements until after the war. This recommendation is now being held in abeyance, however, on the objection that "if the improvement is refused now the money set aside for this purpose by the state might be affilted to some other section."
This objection has a familiar ring, but it's nothing more than a carry-over from the heyday of WPA and lavish government spending. Such arguments make little sense in our present wartime emergency, when all spending for non-essentials should be knocked in the head.

Unless it can be definitely established that the sidewalks and driveways are necessary, either from the standpoint of military expedience or from protecting the investment already made on the main highway project, there seems little logical reason why the Chamber of Commerce should now deviate from the policy it endorsed several months ago—a policy which during these times is fundamentally sound.






