

REDS BEAT BACK WEAKENED NAZI DRIVE IN SOUTH

MOBOW, Oct. 21 (AP)—Red army men were reported strengthening their positions at Stalingrad today, working and fighting in cold rain that drenched the roads, while beating off successive weaker attacks in the week-old mass offensive.

Maintenance of Stalingrad's defense lines unbroken since Sunday was indicated by the noon communiqué and, coupled with this, were announcements of an improvement of Soviet positions in both the western and central Caucasus through counter-attacks.

The battered power plant still supplied electricity within Stalingrad. A newspaper continued to publish.

South suburbs to the southern sector, although bombs and shells fell occasionally.

The army newspaper left Star said detachments guarding northern factory sections of the city liquidated an enemy break-through and covered their flanks in strength.

Northwest of Stalingrad the Russian pressed their defense lines deeper into the defense lines guarding the German left flank.

Star said that the southern sector the Nazis were beat back from their line, tried to regroup on the steps, but were driven back to second line positions.

Attacks Repulsed
Seven successive German counter-attacks in an attempt to regain the ground in another sector were repulsed, the army newspaper said, and the Russians continued to improve the positions from which the Nazi drive into Stalingrad is mentioned.

Red Star said tanks had fallen on the Stalingrad battlefield since Sunday, and that the German armored drive of two infantry divisions was only about half about the German attempts to drive the defenders out of the city.

Reports were reported to have blown up six Nazi strong points northwest of Stalingrad, destroying a number of German tanks and 100 men.

Defenders of the central Caucasus fought again to have recaptured a community in the Moudok region fighting for the Caucasus. The Germans about 900 killed, repulsed an enemy attack and improved their position, the communiqué said.

Nazi Dislodged
Russian forces were declared to have dislodged Nazi troops from the southernmost of Novorossiysk and destroyed a mortar battery and several blockhouses by artillery and mortar fire.

Elsewhere on that battlefield before the Black Sea, the communiqué said, "our troops repulsed six enemy attacks."

Norva Close Here
At a meeting of the Twin Falls Merchants' bureau yesterday noon it was decided that the local stores will be asked to close their doors on Nov. 11, and that the local stores staying open would close for the day in compliance with the salvage committee's request.

The local junior and senior Citizens of Commerce will take the opportunity to line up trucks and manpower for the one-day scrap drive in Twin Falls and vicinity. They will be asked to encourage organizations which will make advance surveys to determine where scrap metal is available. Garages, together with scores already in the salvage committee's possession, will make a list of the workers in making collections.

Charles DeWetter, chairman of the committee, predicted this afternoon that at least 100 trucks will be in the Twin Falls area in the morning of Nov. 11, hundreds of his potential supporters expected to join in the round-up.

A. W. Moore, chairman of the county salvage committee, today urged that Mustang, Hansen, and other local stores be closed on Nov. 11.

U. S. BOMBERS IN

CAIRO, Oct. 21 (AP)—American combat bombers participated yesterday in the broad Allied offensive against the Axis in North Africa. Eleven heavy planes were reported to have been in the air, attacking the enemy's rear.

Swearing deep into enemy territory, the bombers attacked a large force of tanks on ground planes, and effective reinforcements and ten aircraft were reported to have been in the air.

Nazi Army 'Bleeding to Death,' Says Field Marshal Jan Smuts

LONDON, Oct. 21 (AP)—Field Marshal Jan Christian Smuts, premier of the Union of South Africa, told a joint meeting of the House of Commons and the House of Lords today that the German army is "bleeding to death" in Soviet Russia and "the stage is set for the last, the offensive phase" of the war for the United Nations.

The speech was broadcast, breaking parliamentary tradition, by means of radio from his chambers, carrying its proceedings to the world for the first time in 10 1/2 years history.

The 72-year-old premier, last surviving member of the war cabinet of the last, was sitting in his office, said the "appalling blood-letting which is necessary for Hitler's ultimate defeat is being administered by the Russians and they alone can do it."

Smuts said, "I am hearing more than her share of the common burden" and he urged that "what ever help in whatever form we can give to Russia to sustain her in her colossal effort should be given in fullest measure and with utmost speed."

In reference to the second front, Smuts said the defense phase of the war for the United Nations had ended.

"The final alignments both of the allies and of our enemies have been made," he said. "Resources have been developed and mobilized on a very large scale. Ours are still on the increase, those of the enemy are being depleted, while the enemy is suffering from his suffering and his people."

"The specter of want, hunger and starvation are beginning to stalk through the subject countries and the spirit of unrest is heating and rising. The explosive limits of enemy morale are nearing. We are approaching the point when both on the war fronts and on the home front in the enemy countries, the situation is ripening for far-reaching developments."

"Once the hour has come to take the offensive and to strike while the iron is hot," he said, "it would be folly to delay, to over-prepare and perhaps miss our opportunity. Now we are likely to do so."

As Japs Still Delay Attack Air Control Widens

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21 (AP)—Allied domination of the skies in the vast Pacific battle front appeared growing mightier today as the American bombers slugged Japanese bases from the Aleutians to the Solomons.

The fury of the allied bombing of enemy troops and supply concentrations in the Solomons seemed thus far to have stalled, at least temporarily, the full force of a Japanese thrust to retake the American-held Guadalcanal airbase and with control of the south-west Pacific.

While a large force of Japanese ships and auxiliary vessels in the Solomons and moved enemy troops on western Guadalcanal still held an expected attack in mind, United States bombers dropped explosives on the embattled island invaders on Oct. 18 and 19, and started the Japanese on a retreat.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur's Australian command reported last night that the Japanese were believed to have initiated extensive air attacks in the area of Bougainville Island, about 315 miles from the mainland.

All allied planes, meeting no attempt at interception, returned safely from the Bougainville night raid, the communiqué said. The navy reported yesterday of the latest air assault in the Solomons area, but made no mention of any enemy planes in the air.

Flares Increased
Possibility that the southwestern Pacific skies may soon become a hotbed of allied planes was seen yesterday in an assertion by Secretary Knox that the number of navy land-based planes was "steadily increasing."

In the north Pacific, the navy announced that on Oct. 18, the heavy four-engine bombers sent against the Japanese islands of Kure, Ogasawara, and Iwo Jima.

Twelve tons of bombs were dropped on Kure, reducing the Japanese air base to ruins and on a beachhead site in the camp. The communiqué made no mention of any further early retaliation, but encountered early this morning.

Threat Reduced
MacArthur's Australian troops further reducing the Japanese threat to the allied Port Moresby in New Guinea by pushing the enemy back in the Owen Stanley mountains.

The expected Japanese assault to recapture Guadalcanal, which the American aerial attacks evidently are being launched, are still to be launched, the navy declared the enemy had been reinforced.

Presence of U. S. warships in the Pacific was disclosed by the navy today and for the first time in two days ago and for the first time, American bombers and fighters were reported to be ready attacks on Japanese ships, supply dumps and troops.

Bulletins Ultimatum by Japs Receives Bomb Answer
