

WAR BULLETIN CAIRO, Nov. 4 (AP)—Marshal Erwin Rommel's Afrika corps retreated westward tonight along the coastal road under bombardment of British American air squadrons which have just been reinforced with the arrival of 7,000 U. S. troops of various combat units.

ROMMEL ABANDONS LINES, STARTS WESTWARD RETREAT

CAIRO, Nov. 4 (AP)—Front reports late today said Marshal Erwin Rommel is abandoning his Alam el Halfa positions and retreating westward along the coastal road under an all-out air attack which the entire British and American bomber and fighter strength was employed.

Dispatches from the fighting scene said that Rommel started his withdrawal several hours ago. The reports indicated that the axis forces have given up their fighting in the forward desert area, presumably as a result of heavy losses suffered in the fighting which British armored attack of the past three days.

Military experts in London reserved judgment on Rommel's retreat but indicated that a major allied victory may be in the making. High formations of British and American bombers have been continuously over the coastal road west of El Al Bahari, dropping tons of bombs on the jammed columns of axis trucks and troops transporting them to the west.

United States and British squadrons were thrown into the battle, and the British and American forces were attacking every day in an effort to provide an aerial cover for the retreating infantry.

The Germans, front reports said, abandoned scores of broken and damaged tanks on the battle front at El Al Bahari, where the British armored forces fought Rommel's last major battle.

Plan killing blow The imperial army was driving with full power in an effort to get in a killing blow at Rommel's forces before the bad general could retreat from the forward area.

U.S. MARINES TO OPEN NEW DRIVE ON ISLAND JAPS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4 (AP)—American forces on Guadalcanal today were expected to strike quickly to eliminate the threat of Japanese troops who have landed east of the island.

The main landing on the island appeared to represent the first move of a comeback which Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox has warned will come.

Other Troops The Japanese may be planning a counter-attack against the American forces, or even three sides, since they still have troops in the mountains to the south of the island.

American forces who have been blasting enemy forces on the west end of the island almost continuously for several days, were expected to play a major role in hunting out the new troops and in trying to make their position untenable.

RUSSIAN FORCES RETAIN IMPROVED VOLGA POSITIONS

By HENRY C. CASSIDY MOSCOW, Nov. 4 (AP)—Soviet forces hold improved positions against German attacks on the Volga by night were reported to have landed in the German rear.

AFRICAN BATTLE RATED IMPORTANT

Wide World War
LONDON, Nov. 4 — With Luck Gen. B. L. Montgomery's break through Marshal Rommel's left wing the battle of Egypt is drifting rapidly toward the crisis of what may be the decisive engagement in the campaign for control of the Mediterranean area.

This is no time for prophecy but the nature of Montgomery's attack and the strength apparently must be such that it warrants the belief that he is aiming at the big target—destruction of the axis in northern Africa. Keep your eye on this battle. We should watch the slowest movement in the opening days of this great struggle blind us to the fact that it represents one of the major conflicts of the whole war.

Hard Way
The British commander is going about his task the direct and the hard way. However, his method is calculated to bring him the best results and his immediate objective is the destruction of Marshal Rommel's tank corps.

These steel monsters are the Nazi marshal's locks of Samson. Once he is shorn of them, his strength will be largely reduced.

True, if Montgomery's drive goes well—and it appears to be proceeding satisfactorily thus far—we may expect sensational developments.

Expect Aid
One of these is likely to be a desperate effort by Hitler to save his army by rushing air reinforcements to him.

And it may be assumed that the allied high command has not just thrown Montgomery into this whirlwind and left him to sink or swim without further aid.

However, the battle still is in its early stages and we need to see more before we start counting chickens.

Should things go well with the allied attack, a break-through may develop into flank movements which will result in the encirclement and annihilation of large forces of the enemy unless Rommel can avoid such traps.

Here we shouldn't forget that the Nazi marshal is one of the shrewdest captains in the war. You can't say that he is beaten until you have his scalp actually at your belt.

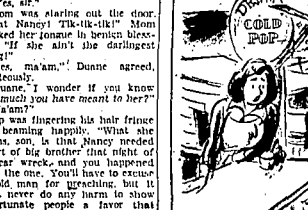

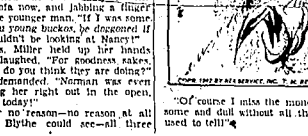

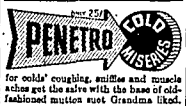
