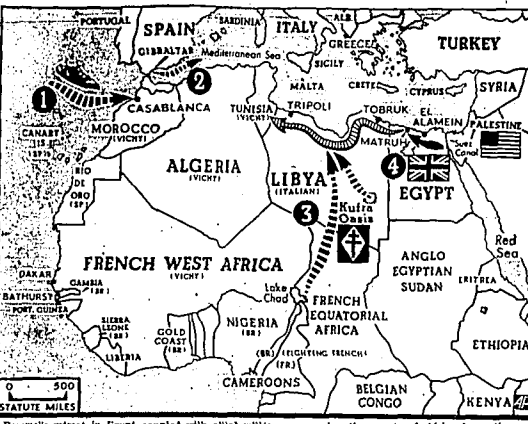

ROMMEL MAKES LAST STAND AT LIBYAN BORDER

CAIRO, Nov. 10 (AP)—The army of the desert continued today at the last stand of the Libyan border. British searching parties found numerous groups of dead Italians who perished under the blazing African sun after being abandoned without sufficient food and water by their German allies.

American Troops Land in Africa



Rommel's retreat in Egypt coupled with allied military moves in other parts of Africa have the axis routed. Powerful American forces landed on Mediterranean and Atlantic coasts of the French colonies in Africa and were smashing toward Tunis. Cities in the news included Casablanca, Gibraltar, Oa, Oa, Oa (3). The British drive in Egypt has apparently passed Matruh (4, black arrow), and would have to carry to Tunisia (broken arrow), to destroy Rommel's force completely. Algeria has already capitulated to the American force.

Oran Captured as American Troops Start Mop-up Work

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, Nov. 10 (5 p. m.)—(AP)—Lieut. Gen. Dwight Eisenhower announced today that American troops had captured Oran, the major Algerian center of French resistance, and had left the 35,000-ton French battleship, Jean Bart, a blazing hulk in a blow which crushed French naval resistance at Casablanca.

(A communique issued in London simultaneously with Eisenhower's announcement said that the cities of Saffi, Fedala and Mahdia in Morocco were in American hands.) (In Washington the war department issued this communique: "North Africa. "Land operations at Algiers have ceased during the armistice negotiations. Our troops received a heavy and successful cooperation of French workers and the general population has been good. Royal air force fighters are giving air cover over Algiers bay. "American troops have captured Oran, supported by the royal navy and the United States army (with air force and naval aircraft). "United States naval forces have overcome to a large degree the resistance of French soldiers on the coast in the area. The French battleship, Jean Bart, is burning in port. Naval aircraft continued to support army forces on shore. Saffi, Fedala, and Mahdia are in our hands."

LONDON, Nov. 10 (AP)—A strong force of royal air force bombers dropped a "considerable tonnage" of explosives on Hamburg and several other targets in northwest Germany during the night, the air ministry announced today.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10 (AP)—Secretary Knox predicted today that the Germans would concentrate their submarine attacks against American supply lines to north Africa in an effort to break down the flow of supplies to our advancing forces there.

LONDON, Nov. 10 (AP)—British light naval units torpedoed an enemy tanker and probably torpedoed another enemy ship last night in an attack on a convoy off Holland, the admiralty announced today.

GIROUD REGARDED AS ABLE GENERAL

Gen. Henri Giraud, who was reported in dispatches from the north African front to have joined the American forces there, has now been regarded as one of the most able French military leaders and an unrivaled expert on north Africa.

After Giraud escaped the Germans offered a reward for his recapture. His whereabouts had not been known since last summer, when he was still in France, until he was reported yesterday to be in north Africa.

A Washington report said that Gen. Giraud, a 63-year-old leader beloved and respected by French troops, and 65,000 soldiers, would command all the French forces in Africa that switched to the allies' side.

He was old soldier with tattered white brows and mustache that quivering but with the first World War — escaping to fight again against the boche.

On a train to the Swiss frontier Giraud is said to have been hailed enthusiastically by a man. Army corps officers pressed the question of his leadership.

Every package received from him was contained five strands of cable three feet long and three to four inches in diameter.

Berlin fumed for weeks about the execution of 300 French officers and 300 imprisoned French officers were executed by the Nazis for all they had done in France.

But the Germans never got Giraud, nor did Pierre Laval manage to bring him back to France.

LIVES SAVED BY AFFRICAN THRUST

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 10 (AP)—Louis F. Lochner, chief of the Associated Press bureau in Berlin, said that the United States went to war, against the odds, to save the lives of innumerable allied soldiers.

Had the allies planned around the channel from England and moved eastward across France into Germany, he said in an interview, they would have encountered two tremendously fortified lines.

Lochner explained it on the channel itself which Germany had guarded by every kind of weapon. The second is the Siegfried line, the latter Germany built to counter the French Meuse line.

The Siegfried line is actually tough, said Lochner, who came here in 1942 on a mission to buy war material. "It is miles deep, studded with concrete pill boxes, tank traps and barbed wire entanglements."

Lochner doubted that the coastlines of Italy or southern France were so well guarded as the Siegfried line. He said that the line would not be an invasion so easily in coastal areas.
