## French Resistance Near Collapse in Northern Africa

### Casablanca Calls For Armistice as Axis Hits Tunisia

Casablanca fell to American invasion troops today as the allies pushed their offensive in north Africa and it was announced at allied headquarters that German air-borne troops had been landed in French Tunisia, directly across the Mediterranean from the French mainland.

Fast shipping up on a complete rout of the axis in north Africa, swift-breaking developments today included:

1. French authorities asked for an armistice at Casablanca, north Africa, after a violent three-day assault by American troops and ships. This meant the virtual collapse of French resistance in north-west Africa.
2. Italian troops crossed the frontier into France to help the French coast against allied attacks from north Africa, the Rome radio announced.
3. A Vichy broadcast reported that Italian marines had occupied Bizerte, big naval base in Tunisia.

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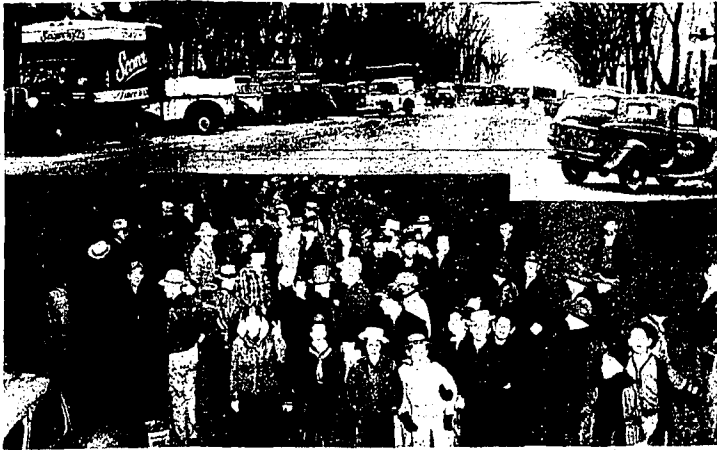

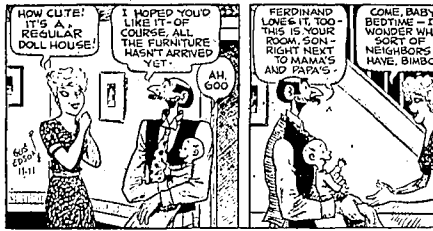

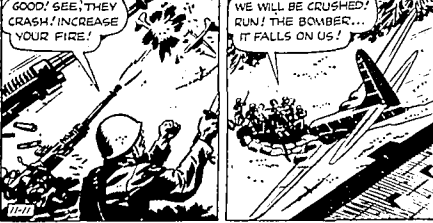

### ARMY MEN MAY GO TO COLLEGE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11 (AP)—A defense program for sending thousands of uniformed soldiers to college, with an active duty status, to meet army and possibly civilian requirements for specialized training other college trained men was announced on the house floor yesterday by Rep. Frank Sparkman.

The men would be under military control, the army would prescribe their courses and pay the costs of their schooling, Sparkman said. This program is expected to begin about Feb. 1, 1943. Training courses would include medical, technical and scientific.

Not in excess of 100,000 men would be selected for training under this program, the Alabama said. The war department had informed him "on the basis of the results of educational, scholastic aptitude and achievement tests, and under test of leadership."

The selection will be made from the army at large and it will be accomplished by means of a system of selection that now in effect for the selection of candidates for the officer candidate schools.

Sparkman emphasized that the new program was "entirely apart" from the existing program where students already in college may enroll in the army or navy reserve and remain in school until called into the service with which they are connected.

### NAVAL UNIFORMS MONOPOLY ENDED

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11 (AP)—The naval uniform business here has announced today that the navy had decided to cancel an order under which two manufacturers had a "virtual monopoly" in the production of ready-made uniforms for naval officers.

The committee heralded with a two-page statement receipt of a letter from the department and the exclusive contracts of Cohen, Goldman & Co., New York City, and Stanley & Wells, Cleveland, Ohio, would be rescinded.

"Navy officers now are at work on a new plan which will spread orders for officers' uniforms among many of the smaller concerns," the statement added.

Capt. P. DeLahanty told the committee recently that the original order was placed June 27 last for officers' uniforms and that many stores were charging high prices for the uniforms.

Stanley J. Cummings, executive secretary of the National Association of Uniform Manufacturers, complained to the committee that the navy order was proving disastrous to members of the association who, he said, were manufacturing 85 per cent of all uniforms produced for the navy.

Some of the original manufacturers declared had been pushed "close to the wall of bankruptcy."

### CHRISTMAS MAIL SPEED-UP URGED

Renewed plea for early mailing was made today by Postmaster M. A. Stronk, as he pointed out that the postoffice department now is starting the most gigantic task in its history—the movement of a deluge of Christmas parcels and letters while maintaining the regular flow of millions of pieces daily and from the armed forces all over the world.

"Indications are that the volume of Christmas mail will be the largest on record," Stronk said. "Already in September, the latest of December, 1941, according to the department of commerce. And sales are rising. Such heavy purchases always pressure heavy mailings."

"If thousands of our soldiers, sailors, marines and civilian friends are not to be disappointed at Christmas time, the public must cooperate by mailing earlier than ever before and by addressing letters and parcels properly."

About 20,000 experienced postal workers are busy mailing by the war services, Stronk said, and free mailing for members of the service has increased its volume by an estimated 30 per cent.

The postoffice department is urging the public to handle of mail it handled in 1941, and making an effort to avoid a repetition.

### BUS SERVICE IN EAST IS SLASHED

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11 (AP)—Quoting the Budget committee's "discomfort or deficit" ultimatum to rubber consumers, Joseph B. Egan, director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, has ordered drastic curtailment of bus service in six major cities, thus compelling many riders to switch to street cars.

The public has been urged to similar steps in all cities having street car systems still in operation. In other cases, where it is not possible to eliminate bus services, a percentage reduction in mileage operated is ordered.

Egan estimated that the annual savings in the six cities would be about \$20,000,000 by the time a year.

Egan said he issued the orders after careful study of the transportation needs of the six cities, the facilities available, and the ability of these facilities to serve the public adequately after complying with the order.
