

ONLY AN ARMISTICE We speak to World War 1 and World War I as though the fighting of 1914-18 had been erminated by peace, and this were a new onflict, but, in fact, this is the second main pisode of a alingle war which began in 1914 and will earn the right to be known as the econd Thirty Years of war. The Armistice which we celebrate today, or, the 25th time, was only an armislice, and not the stepping stone to peace. We think of the war of 1914-18 as a nation-listic struggle, and of this as an ideological onflet. There is some merit in this ap-ratasi, but not too much. The episode is ideological in the sense hat, if we were to lose, the nations to whom se would have to scrape the knee would im-sse upon us the Vicious practice of totali-trainsm. The penaltics of defast would be ore intolerable than in what we call World as re-

more intolerable than in what we call World War I. But so far as causes are concerned, and so far so ut hinking about the bases for perma-nent peace is controlled by them, we should recognize that this is just one more attempt by an inherently militaristic nation—Ger-many—to impose her hegemony upon the Occidental world. Lisly, of course, is a pawn, both of Hitler and Mussolini, Finland is a pawn of her own mistoriume. Japan seeks to take advantage of ourfilstractions elsewinere to establish her hegemony in the Ortient. Totalitarianism in the form of commun-sim took over Kussia because of the unspeak-able conditions created by carism. Totali-tarianism in the form of xalional Bocialism won over the reich because it promised to

restore and expand military and economic

won over the reich because it promised to restore and expand military and conomic prestige. So far as most Germanis are concerned, Nazism is merely the machinery by which they hoped to accomplish that imperialism which Kaiserism failed to achieve and to making little progress. The issue in the Occident still is, as it was up to Nov. 11, 1916, whether the Teutons by force of arms can make themselves political and economic dictators over the world. We say they can not. On this 281h Armistice day we pay tribute to the millons who died and the millons who lived through the battles of the first episode. We rapic the whole the first episode. 




