## Allies Drive Back Enemies in Initial Tunisia Clash

### American, British Troopers Pour in From Every Side

Adolf Hitler's air-borne invaders of Tunisia were reported to have been driven back today in their first clash with a powerful American-British expeditionary force driving into the French north African protectorate.

An Algiers radio broadcast said the Nazi setback came in a skirmish with allied reconnaissance forces, spearheading a thrust by perhaps 150,000 American and British soldiers.

Other British-American troops from columns were reported sweeping into Tunisia from the south.

The Berlin radio broadcast a report from Madrid that the Spanish cabinet had ordered mobilization of defense forces to "protect the neutrality of Spain."

There was no indication from what quarter Spain feared violation of its neutrality.

Following announcements from allied headquarters that French troops already were holding the Atlas, DND news agency said Lt. Gen. Nehring had appealed to the French position and urged the French to Africa to help repulse the British and Americans.

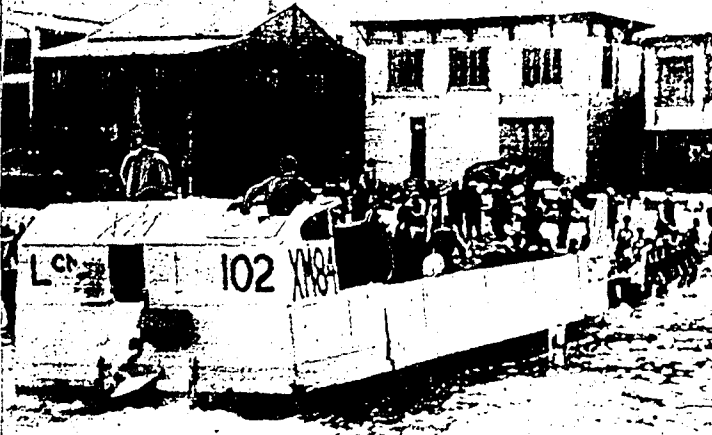

### 23 Nip Warships Sunk in Pacific's 'Sugging Match'

HEADQUARTERS UNITED STATES PACIFIC FLEET, Pearl Harbor, Nov. 17 (AP)—America's naval victory in the Solomon Islands means the eventual expulsion of the Japanese from Guadalcanal, said Chester W. Nimitz, commander in chief of the Pacific fleet, said today.

"We are going to clean them out," he promised.

Nimitz described the four-day engagement in which the Japanese lost one battleship, five cruisers, five destroyers, and 12 transports, against two American light cruisers and six destroyers, as one of the most decisive battles of the war, a major United States victory and the "toughest" and "most important" which the navy had engaged since the Civil War 80 years ago.

He said the result justified the hope that the battleship's destruction and those of the United States destroyers contributed to the shattering enemy losses.

A startling feature of the battle, Nimitz said, was the Japanese carrier losses, but American carrier-based planes played an important part in the Japanese carrier losses, he said, and he was "proud" to have claimed them.

Planned Double Thrust

Nimitz disclosed also that the Japanese, with their greatest naval base in the West Indies, were themselves at 30 ships, apparently had planned a double thrust against the southern Solomons and New Guinea.

The result was a historic American victory in the Solomons, and in New Guinea Gen. Douglas MacArthur assumed personal command of the front-line Australian and American troops who seemed likely within the immediate future to drive the enemy entirely off the north coast of New Guinea and leave their rugged base in the southwest Pacific open to attack.

### M'ARTHUR LEADS TROOPS ON BUNA

GEN. MACARTHUR'S HEADQUARTERS, Australia, Nov. 17 (AP)—Led by Gen. Douglas MacArthur, his command of allied land forces, and Australian troops forged without heavy cannon shot of Buna today, ready to fight the Japanese for that key Japanese base or take it by daylight.

### 8TH ARMY TRIES TO CUT OFF NAZI AFRICAN RETREAT

CAIRO, Nov. 17 (AP)—The British 8th army, it was indicated today, has sent its columns into the desert from Meixli in an attempt to cut off the retreat of the German army, which the German Afrika corps in the vicinity of the Gulf of Sirte.

# NAZI RULE NOW AT CROSSROADS

LONDON, Nov. 17 (AP)—The allied blows in North Africa struck Nazi Germany at a time when it was entering the grimmest winter of the war.

From the standpoint of five determining factors of war—military, economic and political—Germany is not at a crossroads.

It is not a question of a "turning point" like the 1917 which presaged the fall of Imperial Germany.

But Germany has eaten through her reserves despite the strictest rationing. This year's overall harvest is reported to be only 80 per cent of normal, although the Germans were still killing a million more people than last year when the harvest was 13 per cent below average.

Wheat production down  
Disembarked by war, drought, peasant hoarding and guerrilla warfare, the rest of Europe is much more self-sufficient. In France, wheat production is down a half-million tons to 8,000,000 and the Germans have ordered the French to double their deliveries to the reich despite the recent loss of African supplies.

Italy can barely squeeze through with its 7,000,000 tons.  
The Balkans, supposed to be the Nazi granary, will not produce enough food for themselves. Production is generally less, meaning that there is likely to be a high standard of living in the Balkans.

The north African occupation has cut off Germany's supplies of phosphates—irreplaceable as fertilizers, vegetable oil, manganese, antimony, wool, cotton, tin and lead. Besides it has closed a link in the blockade through which Hitler was getting an eastern supply such as rubber.

Hitler has exhausted his own labor force. Six million foreign workers, every four workers—are engaged in Germany, but they are mostly of low efficiency. The German labor force needs are in France where Frenchmen have declined to help the Nazis.

# OPA WILL SLASH SALES 'FRILLS'

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17 (AP)—The Office of Price Administration is working out details of a plan to eliminate from retail merchandising such frills as style ands and fancy wrapping paper, it was announced today.

RUBBER MAKING WILL TOP NAZIS  
CINCINNATI, O., Nov. 17 (AP)—The United States will surpass Germany in production of synthetic rubber, probably by the end of 1942, and will fill 90 per cent of the nation's rubber needs, Dr. Robert V. Yohe told a farm chemurgy council conference today.

Dr. Yohe, of the B. F. Goodrich company's chemical division, estimated that Germany is living on 10 per cent synthetic rubber.

He said that in 10 years, "this country is endeavoring to do what no single industrial country of the world's production would have at present to do in 15 years, even if it had all the scientific brains of the country at its disposal."

Dr. Yohe said that tires whose rubber content is 98.4 per cent synthetic are being tested on highways now, and that under certain severe service conditions they wear better than natural rubber tires.

# JAPS' MILITARY RULE SHIPPENED

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17 (AP)—Japanese military authorities were reported by an American official observer today to have imposed an iron rule on the Philippines and Malaya, shooting without trial anyone who ventures into forbidden zones.

Commenting on the military reports of the army's command and general staff school observations during the fighting on Luzon, the observer, who went nameless, said the mere presence of a civilian on a chartered road near Manila and the Philippines truck drivers involved in a collision at a crossroads at San Fernando (Philippines) were shot by Japanese officers because their damaged vehicles obstructed the road and delayed the passage of a tank platoon, "said the observer.

**Shot Without Trial**

"Civilians found in the vicinity of Japanese transport parks, headquarters, military installations, military telephone lines, unless they have a specific authorization, are shot without examination or trial," he said.

Malayan and Filipino civilians found walking, cycling, or motoring on roads which had been ordered cleared for the passage of Japanese troops or transportation vehicles, summarily shot. It is reported that groups of civilians as many as a hundred or more in this death with.

"After the capture of large cities in British Malaya and Luzon the Japanese military authorities instructed the civilian law enforcement agencies to continue to function. In Manila the Japanese military authorities instructed the civilian law enforcement agencies that they would hold the latter responsible for attacks on Japanese paratroopers or other troops.

**Held Incommunicado**

"They also instructed the civilian law enforcement agencies that they would hold them accountable if they allowed, hid, or otherwise assisted in the escape of any Japanese military or civilian. It may be presumed that the immediate heads of the civilian law enforcement agencies would be held responsible if they allowed any Japanese military or civilian to escape. The army publicist's report stated that American prisoners of war in Batavia and Cororor were forced to march long distances in the vicinity of their workbenches.

"The observer said there is evidence that Japanese military and armored troops are liable to kill, instead of capture, small enemy groups which fall into their hands. During their examination, prisoners are given no food or water and allowed to starve to death. They are given no medical treatment.

# CLARK WILL SEEK VOL'S EQUIPMENT

BOISE, Ida., Nov. 17 (AP)—Gov. Clark A. Clark today said he will seek an appointment with Secretary of War Stimson he will go to Washington to attempt to secure uniforms and proper equipment for the Idaho volunteer army.

"The President has stated a bill providing for the equipping of the volunteers, or guards, as they are known in some states, with the provisions of the secretary. This would be decided how and when they should be equipped," Clark said.

"Before I leave office I want to know that the volunteers are properly equipped and ready for any emergency."

Between 10,000 and 11,000 men have enlisted in the volunteers in Idaho. Gov. Clark has about 25,000. The volunteer companies were organized under the supervision of the Idaho military department.

The governor said he hoped the men could be given uniforms and arms.

# JUDGE QUESTIONS ARMY AUTHORITY

PORTLAND, Nov. 17 (AP)—Legality of orders by Lieut. Gen. J. L. Dewulf of the western district court, issued regarding activity of Japanese American citizens was questioned today by Federal Judge James A. Prendergast.

Specifically he ruled that the curfew order, applying to enemy aliens and persons of Japanese ancestry, was unquestionably void insofar as it applied to American citizens of Japanese descent.

Judge Prendergast said that a military commander under no circumstances is given power of legislation.

Judge Prendergast said that in case of martial law, suspension of the writ of habeas corpus, military commanders have great powers, but he held that this condition does not exist.

He pointed out that "there is a distinction between the known as 'partial martial law' calling it 'a perversion' that cannot be justified by any sound theory of civil constitutional or military law."

While in the case of Minoru Y. Yoda, American-born son of Japanese aliens, Judge Prendergast declared that it was "unquestionably void in so far as citizens of the United States were concerned."

He said that the curfew order was alien and convicted him of violating the order.

Two days a week are meatless, and on two other days a "dickie" stew, containing a restaurant piece of meat or no meat at all, is served. The restrictions on restaurant meals in Great Britain is that not more than three courses may be served.

# INDUSTRY, HOME GAS RATION SEEN

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17 (AP)—Gas will be rationed to the home and industry in immediate winter if current and threatened shortages develop into a major menace to the war effort, war production officials said today.

Control of rationing already has been imposed over supplies of manufactured and natural gas. Herbert S. Marks, acting chief of the War Relocation Authority, said that supplementary orders and directives dealing with particular localities will be required to meet a situation already "airing."

Nevertheless, officials said, there will be enough gas to meet "really essential" needs. Whether rationing there is immediate conservation and shortages are prevented, in the same time, it was emphasized that essential needs should not be confused with peacetime luxury.

For example, WPB officials said it won't be necessary for a person to take two baths a day. The bathtub needn't be filled to the brim; a man can shave without letting the water run throughout the operation; less water can be used in washing dishes, and meats can be defrosted with ice water instead of cooking. Those and other habits are regarded by WPB as in the "other class" and must be abandoned if essential needs are to be met.

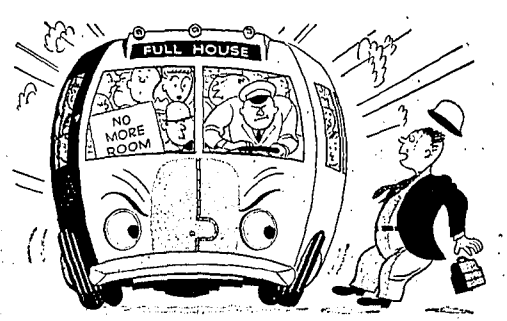

# KNOX PRAISES ADMIRALS FOR LATEST VICTORY OVER JAPS

## PREDICTS ENEMY WILL COME BACK

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17 (AP)—United States Admiral Kinkaid today praised the American forces "have now won round two of the battle of the Solomons" and are in complete control of the area in and around Guadalcanal, but he warned that "the Japs will come back."

Knox said, adding that we can expect round three.

The Jap forces, he said, will regroup and return from the north as soon as they consider it feasible. "They cannot retreat the way we too highly on this action," Knox said. "Great credit is due to the admirals, Chester W. Nimitz, William F. Halsey, and Daniel J. Callaghan and their staffs. They not only drove a superior force from the field but they employed a most daring type of action to accomplish this result."

"As after the first round, American forces are in disturbed possession of the area. They are in complete control of the area, both as to ships and personnel."

Knox emphasized, however, that great as the Japanese losses were—23 ships destroyed—they probably were not severe enough to keep the enemy from trying again.

"We are making our plans for that," he said. "Each time we keep the enemy off-balance, they will come back, but we know they will come back."

Knox said that both sides were risking a great deal for the control of Guadalcanal. He said the island was the most vital line of communication which must be protected.

Knox declined to comment as to whether American forces had now obtained naval supremacy in the Pacific. He said it would be a matter of speculation.

"We don't know their true strength," he said. "All we know is that they were driven from the field. We can lick 'em again, but we will eventually defeat them. We will take the action on when, but we will."

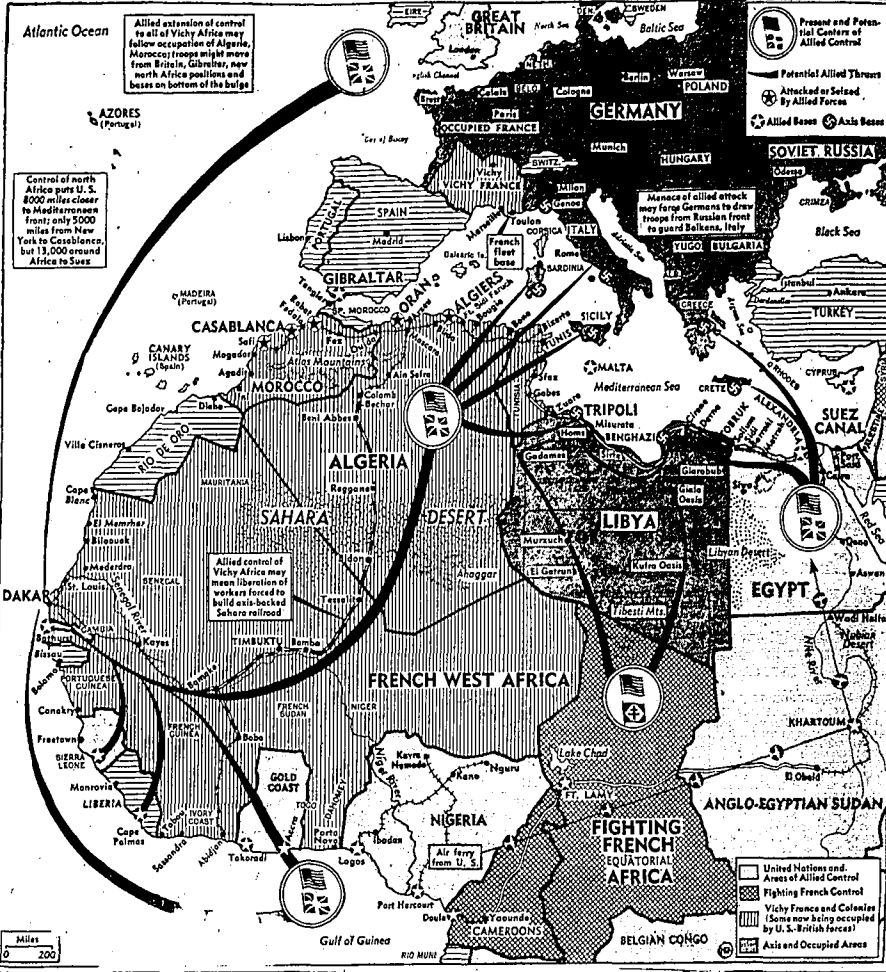
**No Greater Battle**

Knox did not refer to the latest naval battle in the Solomons as the greatest since Jutland. At Jutland, he said, more ships were involved. Possibly the battle of Matapan in the Mediterranean was larger, but he emphasized that the engagement was the greatest surface force battle of the present war.

Knox said the two-day battle "went along beautifully." He said the speed of delivery of ships was most gratifying and called the day would not be a difficult one to win. He declined to comment on how many Japs were being killed, but he said there was a considerable number.

Despite Knox's conservatism, some naval observers believed it possible that the Solomons battle may have been the greatest since the Japanese fleet in the southwest Pacific.

Important Suggestions to Motorists on Registration for Gasoline Rationing

Motorists, these suggestions are for your information and guidance on the procedure to follow on registration for gasoline rationing.

THE DATES: Wednesday, November 18; Thursday, November 19 and Friday, November 20.

THE PLACE: Your nearest school.

THE TIME: This will vary in each community. Get exact time from your local newspaper.

THE PROCEDURE:

1. Bring to the registration place the brief form which you can obtain from any service station. This gives the name and address of the car's registered owner, the car's license number, year, model, make, body type, tire serial numbers of the five tires on your car (including one spare).

2. Bring your automobile certificate of registration to the registration place. No ration book will be granted without it.

3. It is not necessary that the owner or principal user of the car make the application. Some other member of your family may find it more convenient to register your car. The application must be signed by the owner, however. It is not necessary, either, that this be presented in your home town.

4. After you have properly registered, you will receive a basic gasoline ration book ("A" book) which will allow you to purchase the amount of gasoline allowed for basic occupational and essential family driving: (This is now 16 gallons—240 miles a month based on 15 miles to a gallon.) The registrars are not authorized to discuss the question of supplemental rationing. If because of a lack of public transportation, you believe you will need to drive more than the basic occupational mileage (at present 150 miles), you should ask for an "Application For Supplemental Gasoline." This application should be taken with you and filled out later and submitted to your local rationing board for study. DEWITT IGNORES COURT'S RULING

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 17 (AP)—The western defense command said today all its orders would remain in force despite a ruling by Federal Judge James A. Fox at Portland, Ore. that Lt. Gen. John L. DeWitt, commander, has no power to regulate activities of United States citizens.

Ruling on the appeal of Minoru Yasui, Hiroo Hara and a Japanese accused of violating the curfew order, Fox held that the order was valid with respect to aliens, but not in the case of citizens.

He upheld Yasui's conviction, although he is American-born, on the grounds that he has forfeited citizenship by association with the Japanese consulate-general.

Ruling Negligible Federal attorneys said they believed effects of the ruling would be negligible because of the delay pending appeal to a higher court, because rulings of district courts are not binding on other districts, and because several previous cases in California district courts have upheld DeWitt.

In the California case, judges held that the military has the power to regulate civilian life when there is threat of invasion even if martial law has not been declared.

Could Have Repercussions Effective reversal of DeWitt's orders would have widespread repercussions because under his decrees thousands of Americans, Japanese and others have been evacuated from military areas of the west coast.

Officials requested "discretionary" exclusion of "potentially dangerous" excluded and demit zones established.

"Military zones" such as those defined in the western states by DeWitt have no authority under national civil law within them as has been asserted by martial law.

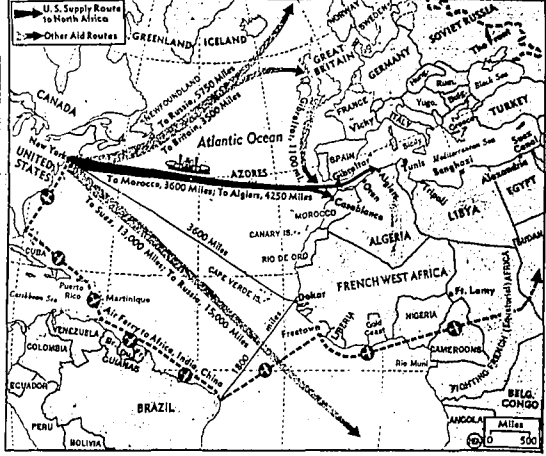
