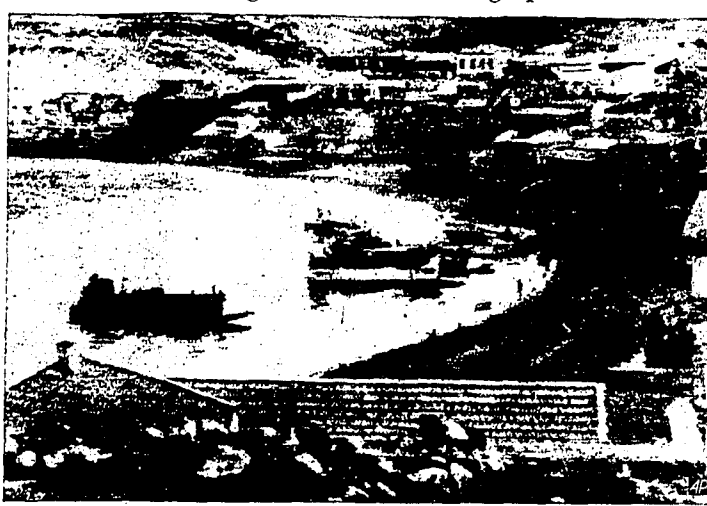

RICKENBACKER'S GOOD BOAT TRIP GOOD

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18 (AP)—Edward W. Rickenbacker, 67, of the southeast Pacific, when his plane was forced down Oct. 21 and rescued three weeks later, rode the wings of the rescue plane while it sailed 60 miles on the ocean surface to the base, the war department has disclosed today.

A department announcement said that although Rickenbacker still needs at least two weeks in a hospital to complete his recovery, the same report says he already has expressed his desire to complete the mission assigned by Secretary of War Stimson—a tour of inspection of aviation facilities in the southwest Pacific.

Lieut. W. P. Zedler, U. S. N. and Aviation Radioman L. H. Bourke found the raft containing Rickenbacker and two companions, they were seen landing their two-place Kingfisher observation scouting plane with the aid of flares on a sea of calm.

CAIRO, Nov. 18 (AP)—From the Mediterranean sea down to the steaming equator, Africa's huge bulk is vibrating today with news of the great allied victories along its broad northern shores.

There in the hinterland we find men from many allied nations responding with feverish energy in an effort to back up their colleagues on the battlefront.

There are Yankee boys there from all parts of Uncle Sam's wide acres. And you have to experience the magic of primitive Africa to understand with a riotous heritage we are defending in smiling America.

There are British and French boys, and others of our allies, all westward in the wilderness.

With them, laboring on the edge of jungle and primitive Africa, are a countless multitude of willing laborers. These happy-dispositioned folk are about during the winter, involved in the war, but they do understand that an ax victory means bonanza.

And what are these soldier and civilian workers contributing to the cause? It is a magnificent contribution to the allied war effort and an equally great contribution to the progress of civilization.

During the 12 days it took me to reach Cairo from England by devious routes, I covered some 8,000 miles, mainly by air.

I was in Lisbon the day Uncle Sam made his sensational landing on northern Africa. The melody of peoples who get to make up the Portugal—settled with excitement.

There was little news beyond word that a big operation was under way, but the fact that the allies had assumed the offensive in a new quarter was in itself a momentous development.

CAFES' COFFEE TO BE SLASHED

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18 (AP)—Coffee consumption in restaurants, hotels and institutions will be curtailed by about the same percentage from normal as individual rationing, the office of price administration had said today.

Coffee rationing became effective after midnight Nov. 28. An adult will be entitled to one pound each five weeks. OPA estimated this would result in a reduction of about 28 per cent from normal consumption.

OPA announced today that restaurants, hotels and institutions would receive an allotment for the period Nov. 22-Jan. 31 equal to the amount of coffee they served in September and October. Deliveries in September and October by roasters and wholesalers were limited to 65 per cent of their deliveries in the same two months in 1941.

The effect of the OPA order will be to limit their consumption of coffee in the 71-day period from Nov. 22 to Jan. 31 to the consumption of 61 days in September and October.

LAW CATCHES UP AFTER 20 YEARS

CEDAR RAPIDS, Ia., Nov. 18 (AP)—John (Jack) Barber Factor, who the government charged made millions "clipping" others through investments instead of in a barber chair, had given in today to the law that has been slipping at his heels for 20 years.

Factor pleaded guilty in federal court to charges of mail fraud and conspiracy in connection with a whisky warehouse receipts case. He and 11 others were indicted last Aug. 20, the government charged 200 investors out of a \$1,000,000 case in 1922.

The Indianapolis charge Factor and his fellow defendants persuaded holders of whisky receipts to surrender them on promise that the receipts would be sold by three now defunct Chicago firms and sold at big profits.

Proceeds Retained
The receipts, which it was alleged, were sold by the operators, who retained the proceeds. Factor had previously pleaded innocent. He and all the others are at liberty under bond. Judge Robert C. Bell said he would pronounce sentence later.

It was a new experience for Trial Nov. 22. It was a new experience for Factor to plead guilty.

Now 47 and once a barber in Chicago, he has never been convicted, although he has been charged with participation in several previous swindle cases—one involving the Florida land boom and another concerning 17,000,000 British investors made in mining stock.

U. S. Ships Steamed Through Entire Jap Fleet in Solomons

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18 (AP)—A sleek American cruiser which heeled as it steamed past three times her size and will be ready soon to fight again for her country took to the sea today to head off the Japanese ships and daring heroes in American history.

The warship was the heavy cruiser San Francisco. She was the spearhead of an American naval force that attacked and sank the Japanese battleship Yamato last Friday morning off Guadalcanal. The San Francisco led the fleet that today is steaming through the American vessels steamed at high speed through the entire Japanese fleet and broke the back of the enemy offensive.

President Roosevelt paid tribute to the San Francisco, her officers and men in a radio address to the new York Herald Tribune forum and also revealed that:

Urges Ship Decoration
"The commander of the task force of which the San Francisco was a part has recommended that she be the first of our navy's vessels to be decorated for outstanding service. If the ship is decorated, it would recall the recent decoration bestowed on the island of Midway by the British king."

The San Francisco was hit many times during its dangerous dash through the enemy fleet but Mr. Roosevelt said a lieutenant commander brought her safely back to port and she will fight again for her country.

It was aboard the San Francisco that Mr. Roosevelt's close personal friend and former aide, Rear Admiral Daniel J. Callaghan, was killed in action. He commanded the attacking fleet. A shell from the enemy battleship blew away the San Francisco's bridge and killed Callaghan and the skipper of his flagship, Capt. Casin Young.

Another admiral was killed in the action which President Roosevelt has described as a major naval victory for the United States. He was Rear Admiral Norman Scott.

Oldest Maneuver
The American naval forces is one of the oldest but most dangerous in naval history. The first battle was fought in the battle of Trafalgar to gain a great naval victory over France.

The action of the American ships so confused the Japanese that they began firing at each other. Before the San Francisco had finished she had hit two other ships, sinking one of them.

Ships Compared
The daring of Callaghan and Young in challenging the Japanese ship is best explained by a comparison of the two vessels.
The San Francisco, commissioned in 1931, displaces 9250 tons and is 588 feet long. She carries a normal complement of 551 officers and men. Her fire power is concentrated in nine eight-inch guns—six forward and three aft. Anti-aircraft and other smaller guns and torpedo tubes make up the rest of her gunnery. She is protected with armor plate measuring up to eight inches around the conning tower, but only five inches amidships.

The Japanese battleships of the Kongo class which the San Francisco challenged are old-fashioned of them having been built before World War I. But they displace 29,300 tons, and their armor—mainly 14-inch guns—four forward and four aft; 16 anti-air guns on the port and starboard sides; eight five-inch anti-aircraft guns, and machine guns, landing guns and torpedo tubes. They carry complements of 980 men and their armor ranges up to 10 inches around the turret and five inches at the main belt amidships.

CLOUDS LIFTING, WELLES STATES

NEW YORK, Nov. 18 (AP)—In a triumphant speech reflecting satisfaction over recent military achievements, Under-secretary of state Sumner Welles said last night that "the clouds are lifting" and Americans now can see the final victory over the axis is inevitable.

"The men and women of the United States are now enabled to see for themselves the development of the strategic moves in which their commander-in-chief and their military and naval leaders are engaged," Welles said in a speech prepared for the New York Herald-Tribune forum.

In a sarcastic reference to the recent boom from clamor here and abroad at the time preparations were being made for American intervention in north Africa, Welles suggested that Americans now can evaluate the clamor at its true worth.

Not "be our guiding motive." "Let justice be our aim—justice and firmness tempered by wisdom," she said in an address for delivery on the forum. Her address was read by Dr. H. J. Van Mook, Netherlands minister of overseas territory. Queen Wilhelmina pledges support of her nation "on the side of those who are willing to make a genuine contribution towards international safety from aggression, towards the freest possible flow of commerce, as a free and independent state imbued with a sincere spirit of cooperation."

Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek of China said that in order to achieve political, social and economic justice for all people the United Nations must start at once "to organize an international order embracing all peoples to enforce peace and justice among them."

44 ARE HURT IN 2 TRAIN WRECKS

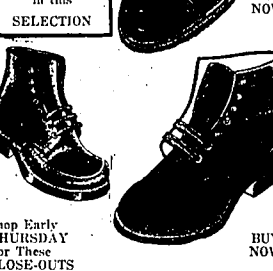
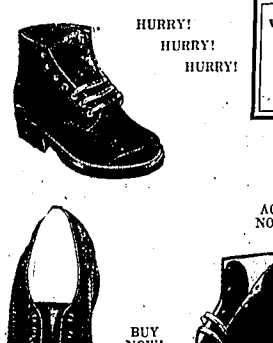

CHRISTMAS GIFT BUYING GREATER

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18 (AP)—With so many of its fighting men overseas, the nation has done more of its Christmas shopping early this year than ever before, census bureau figures had indicated today.

During October, sales of gift-type articles took unprecedented leaps over the records set the previous fall, the nation's independent retailers reported.

Topping the list was the \$2 per cent sales increase reported by the jewelry stores, followed by 32 per cent in both apparel and department stores, and 31 per cent in drug stores.

The volume of the sale of mail-order type articles indicated that Johnnie Doughboy won't be the only one to get most of his Christmas gifts out of the mailbox. Because of war-time travel restrictions, the mailing of gifts to civilians is expected to show a big increase.

While several causes—including

the heavy excise taxes which went into effect in October, 1941, planting a damper on sales—were seen behind the general increase over that month, the campaign to make early to the boys overseas was admitted a potent factor in the heavy purchasing.

The total October increase for all types of stores from the 31 states which made reports was 22 per cent. However, this failed to show the actual high points of the purchasing picture since the average was held down by two understandable decreases—an 81 per cent drop reported by motor vehicle dealers and an 11 per cent decrease in filling station business.

"But we don't talk about those any more," stressed a census bureau official.

SLASH IN DAIRY FOOD IS STUDIED

NEW YORK, Nov. 18 (AP)—The Herald Tribune says that the food requirements committee of the war production board met today in Washington to study means of reducing civilian dairy product consumption by at least 12 1/2 per cent under current consumption.

A study just completed by the office of agricultural war relations, the Tribune says, recommends the following civilian supply reductions through governmental control:

1. Reduce butter by 18 per cent.
 2. Reduce cheese by 43 per cent.
 3. Reduce evaporated and condensed milk by 21 per cent.
 4. Reduce cream by 43 per cent.
 5. Reduce milk by 18 per cent.
- To provide a dietary compensation, it was said, the following increases are recommended:
1. Fresh milk and cream supplies by 3 per cent.
 2. Skim milk by 43 per cent.
 3. Ice cream by about 2 per cent.

Destroyer Continues Battle Although Fire Sweeps Deck

ABOARD THE DESTROYER SMITH IN THE SOUTH PACIFIC.
Nov. 1 (Delayed)—A Japanese torpedo plane, plummeting from the sky, crashed squarely on the forecastle of this American destroyer in the battle off the Santa Cruz Islands, and set off fires which swept half the length of the ship.

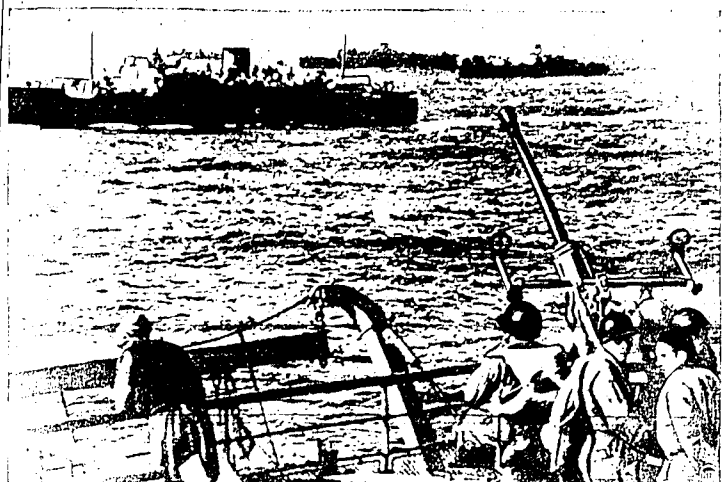
