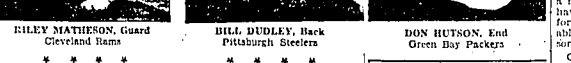

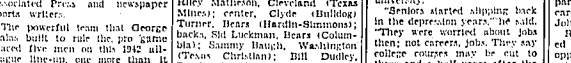

NEW YORK—For the second successive year the big bad bears from Chicago dominated the all-league professional football team chosen by Associated Press and newspaper sports writers.

The powerful team that George Halas built to rule the pro game placed five men on the 1942 all-league line-up, one more than it landed a year ago. They were: half-back, Fred Goetz, Cleveland; tackle, Turner, center, George Wilson, end, Sid Luckman, quarterback, Chicago.

Others on the reserve eleven are: Bob Mackay, Washington, end; Bruce Kilgus, Brooklyn, and Chester Adams, Cleveland, tackles; Bill Edwards, New York, and Charles Gierman, Green Bay, backs; Charles Clemens, Pittsburgh, center; Tuffy Leeman, New York; Mervyn Conner, Brooklyn, and Gary Fagelberg, Bears, backs.

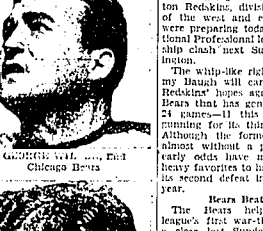

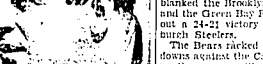

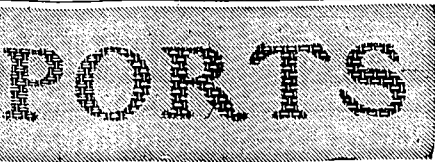
