ALLIES READY TO HIT JAPS AGAIN

Rogers Finds Dad's Statue

By FRANK TREMAINE. UNITED STATES PACIFIC FLEET, Rear Adm. H. H. Rogers, U.S.N., is concentrating a big naval transport force in the south Pacific and a battle equal in size and importance to Midway is developing, well informed quarters reported today.

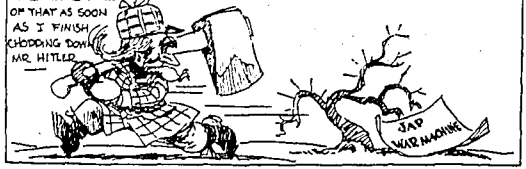

Every two years, as a new administration takes office in Idaho, there comes a shake-up in the office of directors of highways with the result that one of the state's most important functions and one that spends the most money is by no means the business-like organization it should be.

T. Malt Holly, retiring state highway director, like most of his predecessors, realized that this periodic turn-over meant to the state, in the biennial report of the public works department released several days ago, Mr. Holly recommends the creation of a state highway department, divorced from the department of public works, and responsible to the governor or to a highway commission.

Among other things, he reiterated a recommendation that department personnel be employed on a merit system basis, to eliminate the present arrangement, that the biennial interruptions of uncertainties of service and so enhance the quality of personnel that can be obtained.

"Since the bureau of highways' operations have become the chief function of the department of public works and have outgrown the reorganization of 1919," he felt that a more direct and effective administration can be obtained through the creation of a state highway department, headed by a duly qualified state highway engineer.

Another job of such magnitude as planning, building and maintaining a statewide system of highways, costing millions of dollars, it stands to reason we should have a highway department that is no repeatedly reorganized by the purveyors of political patronage. Good plans and decisions are not influenced by the politicians.

Efficient road building requires careful, long term planning, but under the present set-up in Idaho that's next to impossible. It's too much of a grab-bag proposition, with many jobs and projects being assigned to the office with each succeeding change in administration.
