They agreed on a certain number of points, chiefly that contacts should be established at once between the French national committee and the Vichy government.

De Gaulle and Girac agreed to cooperate in the economic and administrative fields. They agreed also on various minor problems.

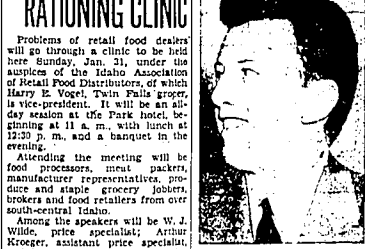

## Yanks Dispose Of "Goody" After 13 Years

NEW YORK, Jan. 27 (AP)—Senior Vernon (Lefty) Gomez, the goody Castilian whose southpaw slants helped the New York Yankees to seven pennants and six world championships, was sold up the river to the Boston Braves today for an estimated \$10,000.

The 32-year-old Spanish-Irish hurler ended his career with the Yankees, during which his antics became legendary and his peculiar habit of making one of baseball's few southpaws in that field hit over 100 games and led 191.

Came in 1921. In 1922, in a wince-cracking baseball game, was purchased from the San Francisco Seals in 1929 for \$25,000. He was a part of the famous "Goody" team that won the 1929 pennant but had been on the market since 1940 when, suffering from an arm injury, he won three and lost three. He came back to win 15 white league wins in 1941—but remained up for sale.

A man who heard the death rattle of Bataan "came back" to the United States in the ears of a Twin Falls audience at the high school auditorium Tuesday night.

Col. Carly P. Remick, former member of the staff of Gen. Douglas MacArthur and the last man to leave the beleaguered Philippine peninsula, gave his audience a starkly graphic account of the Japanese horrors in a mysterious advance, after hunger, exhaustion and disease had weakened the Americans and Filipinos who remained after four months of fighting.

Two hours ahead of the final capitulation of Bataan, Colonel Remick left for Australia under orders from Gen. Jonathan Wainwright, and carrying sealed dispatches to General MacArthur.
