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TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

COUPS—United Nations leaders, including President Roosevelt, Premier Winston Churchill and possibly Comissar Stalin, may soon issue a pronouncement expanding and clarifying the Atlantic charter which P. D. R. and W. Churchill signed in London August 14, 1941. In view of political developments in China, India and the Middle East, the Atlantic charter now appears somewhat out of date.

The new world constitution, which the American and British governments are supposed to have written provisionally for all nations and which the British premier is said to have relinquished his claim to absolute dominion. So will the French and the Soviet Union be one of history's greatest dictatorships. It is not so abrogated by minor political events.

It should be noted that the Atlantic charter and the states of the Levant and bring all those countries into the war on our side. In fact, P. D. R., Churchill and the British premier are said to have signed one of the most magnificent diplomatic coups of all time to climax the spectacular meeting in Africa.

WITNESSES—A noted New York reporter, the author of the arrangement whereby we have great Britain 50 percent of the world's oil, is said to have written a letter to Arthur Hays Sulzberger, his name is Arthur D. Howden Smith. He worked under the editor 20 years ago on the old, venerable New York Evening Post, which he then owned and controlled by Thomas W. Lamont of J. P. Morgan and company.

The famous arrangement was not consummated until Sept. 1, 1940. But the following private correspondence discloses that the deal was in the making months before that date. Behind the scenes, the deal was being consummated, despite Pearl Harbor. On May 2, 1940, Mr. Smith sent this message to his old friend, Lord Arthur Hays Sulzberger to Washington and formerly Lord British ambassador to Washington.

"I had the pleasure of knowing you as Phillip Kerr many years ago when you were in London. I am now in the United States, where my final biography is still in progress. If you chance upon it, you will find it a fascinating account of the life of a man who has been of service to the allied cause. But that is not really the occasion of this letter.

"I am writing you because I have an increasing need for expert services as warfare proceeds. Our navy has a large reserve of warlike destroyers, destroyers, torpedo boats, and other vessels and they have been adequately maintained. Forty or 50 were reconferred for use in the neutrality zone last fall.

"Am I taking an undue liberty, as a private citizen, if I suggest that it might be possible for the destroyer, torpedo boat, and other vessels to be used in the service? I see no difference between such a demonstration of 'benevolent neutrality' by the administration and the making of a maritime contract in the allies' favor."

The envoy's reply to Arthur's suggestion is significant. It is not only a letter, but it is a letter that is being read to the United States Congress, which is now in session. It is said that the sale of warships would be somewhat illegal. His communication is dated May 17, 1940. It is said that the precedents under Sept. 3 of that year.

"My dear Arthur Hays Smith: Thank you for your kind letter of May 2. I will remember our previous meetings. I would dearly like, if I have the leisure, to read in September your biography of that war man, Colonel Lord. It is a very interesting one, and I am passing it on to my naval friends.

"But you will not doubt realize that international law forbids a neutral government to sell warships to the belligerent. American ships, such as the USS (the fall of France—editor's note) are, of course, being sold to the French and British governments by private sale. It is not possible to sell them to the United States.

"Thank you for your suggestion and with kindest regards, I remain, Sir, your obedient servant.

FOUR YEAR TERMS FOR OFFICIALS

Should the legislature adopt the proposed amendment to the Idaho constitution, which would lengthen the terms of elective state officials from two to four years, it would be accomplished in keeping with the demand for greater efficiency in our state government.

Introduced by two Republicans and one Democrat, and with a provision that it would not become effective until 1945, the measure was so weighted on its own merits, without any suggestion of its being a political ruse or an attempt to lengthen the terms of officials now in office.

A significant feature of the measure is a provision that no governor could be a candidate to succeed himself until after the lapse of a full term.

Idaho would benefit in many ways should this practice be adopted and the people will do well to urge their representatives to support the proposed amendment.

Under the present set-up, our elected officials spend too much of their time campaigning for re-election. Instead of administering the affairs of state for which they are responsible. By the time they have their official duties, they are so fatigued that they are unable to do their jobs in order, being tired thinking of the next election and govern themselves accordingly.

With a governor limited to one four-year term, there would be little possibility of his traveling all over the state, shaking hands, passing out cigars and "kissing babies." He would be far more interested in the duties of his office, with practically no incentive for building up a machine of political followers.

If we are going to return to business like methods in state government, it is about time to put an end to all this continuous campaigning. Having a complete shake-up in our statehouse every two years is too often too late.

FACING FACTS
