

65 DRAFTEES IN 18-YEAR GROUP

Sixty-five of the 71 registrants of Twin Falls county received their draft board "I" cards yesterday, Feb. 1, for induction into the enlisted men's reserve to be 18-year-olds who registered here in December. It was reported at the office of the board Tuesday.

Here's Explanation on Why Stations Can't Charge Gas

By 10 a.m. Monday every service station operator in town knew how members of the legislature are going to feel when they try to explain reversal of the voter initiative act to the elderly folks who voted for it.

It is just how individuals—a certain percentage of them—feel.

They were told that Uncle Sam had canceled their credit at all the filling stations in the nation. One station operator explained that he had to pay two cents per gallon, but it was enough to ruin his tank, and start him yelling for help in explaining that the new rule is long-time credit.

The rule, briefly, is this: you can't buy gasoline on credit in these United States unless you have a certain amount of money in your government or some political subdivision thereof, (2) are buying it to use in a motor boat for commercial purposes, or (3) are buying it to use in a motor vehicle displaying a "T" rating sticker (sticker for trucks or pickup trucks used for commercial purposes).

Quoted by the points in the foregoing paragraph, you'll find that this year in the national defense law book: "Commencing Feb. 1, 1943, no person shall, directly or indirectly, grant or accept or participate in the granting or accepting of credit in connection with the sale of any petroleum products or by through any retail outlet."

It is understood that the directive containing this order, issued by the War Finance Department, is to reduce the amount of bookkeeping by oil companies.

MINOR LEAGUES FACE MOST IMPORTANT CRISIS IN HISTORY

March 1 Set As Deadline For '43 Plans

NEW YORK Feb. 2 (UPI)—

The minor baseball leagues, amateur source of freshman major leaguers, were facing the most important crisis in their history today but although the 1943 war road looks rocky, most of circuits will then have to provide fogfests to protect their personnel.

"Minor league owners have a little less than a month to come to the decision point, as whether their circuits can continue in operation since March 1 was the deadline set at the Chicago convention of the American Association of Professional Baseball Leagues last December. Club meetings will then have to provide fogfests to protect their personnel."

The situation is not as optimistic as it first appeared. Only most of the lower classification associations appear on the verge of folding, but from the start of the G or C groups having given up since the start of the 1942 season.

Three More Fall

During the past weekend, three more circuits gave up, bringing to 19 the total of minor leagues which have suspended since Pearl Harbor. In 1941 there were 20 circuits in operation, 10 less than the 1941 total.

Five other leagues suspended after the 1942 season opened and three more quit early this year. That would leave a total of 17 apparently ready for operation this year but there will be more foldings.

The latest to give up is the Mid-Atlantic and Penn State Base-ball leagues, announced yesterday that "there is no hope at all" in the two classes of amateur sports under present restrictions on gasoline and pleasure driving are relaxed.

Will Call Meet
